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July 29, 1972 Terre Haute, Indiana

#### SECTION I

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The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Arrow Room, Hulman Center, Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana, at 9:00 a.m., E.S.T., July 29, 1972. Members present were: Board President, Herbert I. Lamb; Vice President, William L. Hitch; Secretary, Nancye T. Mitchell; Mr. James T. Morris; Mr. Hugh D. McQuillan; Mr. John E. McCutchan; and Mr. James D. Acher (because of illness, Mr. Acher left the meeting after nomination of officers of the Board). President Rankin, President Rice and Vice Presidents Hardaway, Moulton, Townsend and Truitt were present. Also attending were Dr. James E. Rentschler, Assistant to the President; Dr. James R. Bash; President of the Faculty Senate; Mr. Paul O'Dell, President of SGA; Mr. Charles Reeves, Vice President, SGA; and Mr. John Brewer, Editor of the STATESMAN.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Lamb called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Dr. Elmer S. Ciancone, newly-elected President of the Faculty Senate, was introduced to the Board.

### ORGANIZATION OF THE BOARD, 1972-73

Mr. Lamb called for the nomination of officers of the Board for the coming year. Mr. Acher nominated the following officers of the Board of Trustees for a term of one year or until their successors are elected and qualified. Mr. McCutchan seconded the nomination.

No further nominations were made, and the Secretary was instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for those nominated. Mr. Lamb then relinquished the chair to Mr. Hitch.

# A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING JUNE 17, 1972

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the Minutes of the June 17, 1972 meeting were approved.

### B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held on September 16, 1972. The Executive Session will be on Friday, September 15.

#### C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Rankin expressed appreciation to Mr. Lamb, retiring Board President, for his consideration and cooperation during the past year. He said it had been a pleasure working with him and was delighted that Mr. Lamb will continue to serve the University. He also announced that this was the last meeting for Dr. Bash. He said that Dr. Bash had been most understanding and a great help to him. He added that he is looking forward to working with Dr. Ciancone.

#### Commission for Higher Education

The President reported that Dr. Kessler, Commissioner Huber, President Rice, and President Graves of Evansville University met on July 7, 1972, to discuss possible cooperative efforts between the two campuses (see President Rice's comments, page 5).

He told the Board that the Commission has placed a moratorium on all new programs pending the development of their master plan. This means that new degree programs probably will not be acted upon for some time. The President noted that we have six or eight programs before the Commission at the present time; of particular concern is the Afro-American Studies Program. In regard to this program, the President appeared before the Commission on July 20, 1972, in a special meeting to request that they make exception for this program. He pointed out to them that work on developing this program was initiated in 1969, well before the Commission was created; that a moral commitment had been given to embark on this program; and that serious harm to human relationships would likely occur if the Commission could not see their way clear to approve it. The Commission did not act on the matter at this special meeting but asked the President to submit his request in writing and they would take action at their regular August meeting.

The President said he had just been notified by the Commission that budget hearings will begin on September 5.

NOTE: The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in Executive Session at Terre Haute, Indiana, Friday afternoon, July 28, 1972. Those in attendance were Mr. Lamb, Mr. Hitch, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. McQuillan, Mr. Morris, Mr. Acher, President Rankin, President Rice, Vice Presidents Moulton, Townsend, Truitt, and Hardaway. Mr. Paul O'Dell and Mr. Charles Reeves attended a portion of the meeting.

# Commission for Higher Education (Continued)

The draft of the master plan which the Commission is developing will be submitted for our comments before it is sent to the legislature, thus giving each institution a chance to see what is being proposed and the opportunity to react and suggest changes in it.

The state university presidents have been asked to attend a subcommittee meeting, chaired by Commissioner Lucas, on Wednesday, August 2. The purpose is to discuss the problem of occupational education in Indiana. Each of the public institutions in the state has been asked to report to the Commission their specific roles in the post-secondary occupational education. This is a problem in developing the master plan and in determining the long-range role of Indiana Vocational and Technical College as well as the other institutions in regard to occupational education.

Data for the ten-year projection (enrollments, new programs and capital), which the Commission has asked that we submit by August 1, are being gathered. It will be most difficult for the schools in the state to meet this deadline but the Commission understands this.

#### Black Cultural Center

President Rankin said he was pleased to announce that the Black Cultural Center's remodeling is virtually complete and that the Director, Mr. Michael Ard, has moved into his office there. The President commented that he is looking forward to this addition to campus life.

#### Mid-West Conference

The presidents of the four remaining institutions in the Mid-West Conference met and have made application for membership in the Mid-America Conference. Mr. Lamb stated he thought ISU should try to \*re-schedule as many games as possible with schools in the Mid-America Conference. President Rankin said he had already spoken to Mr. Chalmers about this but it is difficult to find openings except far in advance.

#### Enrollment for Summer Terms

Total enrollment for the first summer term was 6600, a drop of 168 students from the same term last year. Final figures for the second summer term are not in but tentative enrollment figures indicate a drop of 1145 students from last year. The President said he believed that we held up as well as or better than other state schools and indicated that the decrease in enrollment for the second summer session might be attributed to the new academic calendar. Dean Darrow reported that many students have told her they would not want to end one term on the 25th of August and start another one on the 28th.

#### River Campus

The River Campus has received approval from the Department of Natural Resources. We are now awaiting approval from the State Board of Health.

#### Building Construction Program

The building construction program is moving along ahead of schedule according to President Rankin. He reported that portions of the new Student Union will be open before school begins in the fall; that the ground and first floors of the link building will be finished in early September; and the cafeteria will be completed in October. Carpeting is down on all five floors in the library and the stacks are being erected. All construction in the library is in the final stages and the new structure will be ready for occupancy during the fall semester. He noted that the work on the University-Civic Amphitheater is progressing ahead of schedule.

### D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

## 1. Master Charge

The Citizens National Bank of Evansville has agreed to accept charges for tuition and fees and Bookstore sales without a service charge to the University. The Board designated the bank as a depository of funds for the Indiana State University at Evansville campus on September 1, 1965. The resolution which appears in EXHIBIT B authorizes the execution of a Master Charge Member Agreement with the Citizens National Bank of Evansville. Approval of the resolution was recommended.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Morris, the resolution was approved.

#### 2. Consultant for Classroom, Applied Science and Technology Building

A consultant is needed to assist in the planning of the Classroom, Applied Science and Technology Building. Mr. Robert L. Petry, the director of New Vocational Center, Louisville, Kentucky, has been in charge of the planning of vocational technical schools for the Louisville Board of Education and has been recommended by various Indiana and Kentucky colleges and universities as a most knowledgeable person in the field of facilities and equipment for this type of building. Mr. Petry's fee is \$100 per day plus travel expenses. It was recommended that Mr. Petry be appointed to work with and assist the architects in the design, development, and equipping of the Classroom, Applied Science and Technology Building. Mr. Petry has estimated that this consulting assignment will require his services for 40 days.

On motion by Mrs. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the recommendation was approved.

### 3. University Center

### a. Debt Service Subsidy Grant

The Department of Housing and Urban Development has advised of the preliminary approval and a fund reservation for a debt service subsidy grant in the amount of \$44,100 for 30 years to assist in financing the construction of the University Center. The preliminary approval is based exclusively on the eligibility of the institution and the need for the facilities proposed as set forth in the preliminary application submitted to HUD. The fund reservation is not a binding commitment by HUD but it does assure that Federal funds will be available upon approval of the full application which consists of the material already submitted together with such additional data and material as is required to be submitted.

### b. Approval of Plans and Specifications

Mr. Walter Given and Mr. James Sutton presented the final plans and specifications of the new University Center for the consideration of the Board.

The Center is to be directly west of the library and connected to it with an overhead bridge or link building at the third floor level. The building will be dug back into the hill and open onto a down-hill slope on the south. The first floor will house the student government offices, student organizations, conference rooms, a large recreational area, storage space, service elevator, mechanical room and service tunnel. The second floor (ground floor) will have the lobby entrance with an information counter; area for offices with secretaries; waiting room and counseling space; area for placement interview, conferences, the Dean's office, file space, and lounge area. Also on this floor will be the entrance to the bookstore, service elevator and doors opening onto a plaza.

The main dining room, the serving line, and a balcony off the dining room are located on the third floor level. The connecting link or bridge extends across to the library and is one large open room which can be subdivided into small rooms.

The elevations are reinforced concrete with precast concrete facings to match the library.

President Rice noted that the student and faculty input for this structure was more than usual. He believed that the costs will come in within the bonding authorization. He said it would be possible to build the basic structure and then go back to finish the bridge.

Approval of the final plans and specifications and authorization to advertise for the receipt of bids for the construction of the facility was recommended, subject to the approval of the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Morris, the recommendation was approved.

#### 4. Grants

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the following grants were approved:

#### a. College Library Resources Program 1972-73--Fund No. 9221

Grant No. OEG-0-72-6159 (314) has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in the total amount of \$5,664 consisting of \$5,000 basic materials grant and \$664 supplemental grant for the period from June 30, 1972, through June 30, 1973. The total grant will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

#### b. Educational Opportunity Grants Program--Fund No. 9271

Approval of supplemental authorized federal expenditures in the total amount of \$14,986 for initial year awards has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for the Educational Opportunity Grants for the fiscal year 1972-73. This authorization will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

#### 5. President Rice's Report

President Rice said three things came out of the meeting with Dr. Kessler, Mr. Gohman, Mr. Huber and President Graves: (1) that the University of Evansville and ISUE would share with each other their development plans; (2) that a regional economic study be completed (it was suggested that the Evansville area might be the region for the study); and (3) that the discussions pertaining to the development of the joint or cooperative masters degree work in business would continue.

Developments on the Technology building are on schedule. He said that certain phases that would normally have to be done at a later time are being done earlier, but he felt the work was progressing on schedule.

He reported that enrollment for the first summer term was 917, a decrease of 156 from the previous year; the enrollment for second term was 699 which is 101 less than 1971 second summer term.

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# E. GRADUATION LIST, AUGUST 23, 1972

The candidates for degrees to be conferred August 23, 1972, were presented as EXHIBIT A. On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the award of the respective degrees subject to completion of the requirements were approved.

# F. POSTHUMOUS DEGREE - Paul Arthur Cooper

Paul Arthur Cooper, a senior student with 132 semester hours and a cumulative grade point average of 2.39, sustained fatal injury, June 30, 1972, in an automobile accident. On motion by Mrs. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Lamb, and in accordance with the criteria for awarding degrees posthumously, approval was granted for the conferring of the Bachelor of Science degree posthumously on Paul Arthur Cooper. The degree will be granted as of the Class of 1972, August 23, 1972.

# G. POST-DOCTORAL STUDY

It was recommended that the policy presented below pertaining to post-doctoral study at Indiana State University be approved. The policy statement was approved by the Graduate Council on April 26, 1972, by a vote of 6-0; by the Executive Committee of the Senate on May 11, 1972, by a vote of 8-1; and by the Faculty Senate on May 23, 1972, by a vote of 29-1:

Opportunity for post-doctoral study is available at Indiana State University for visiting professors from other institutions, post-doctoral fellows, and others who have also attained doctoral status. These scholars may conduct research, attend classes, and participate in seminars. On request of the appropriate department, they may teach classes.

The privilege of attending class without credit or payment of fees will be granted upon the approval of the appropriate department chairman and the dean or assistant dean of the School of Graduate Studies.

Persons who may wish to receive academic credit for courses attended must register as graduate students and pay appropriate fees.

Prospective researchers requiring laboratory space must be sponsored by a member of the graduate faculty and meet approval of the chairman of the department in which work is planned.

Library and parking privileges and general usage of University facilities will be available on the same basis as for regular staff without obligation of the University for salary and insurance.

All fees and tuition for credit or non-credit will be waived for full-time faculty members and administrators from member institutions of the Midwest Academic Conference.

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the policy was approved as recommended.

(Note: Mr. McQuillan asked if space and secretarial assistance were available for our emeriti faculty. President Rankin said a number of retired faculty members from time to time have raised this question. He commented that the University wants to be as considerate of the emeriti faculty as is possible and that this matter is being studied by a faculty committee. Dr. Bash pointed out that there are already some privileges given to the retired faculty such as membership in University Club, parking privileges, subscription to STATESMAN, etc.)

# H. NEPOTISM POLICY

The existing policy pertaining to nepotism includes the following:

No person (academic, administrative, or non-academic), including full-time, part-time or temporary employees, (including students) may be employed in a position within the scope of supervision or organizational line of authority of a member of his family, nor may more than one member of a family be employed in the same functional working unit.

It was recommended that the clause "nor may more than one member of a family be employed in the same functional working unit" be eliminated. This recommendation was approved by the Faculty Affairs Committee on March 20, 1972, by a vote of 7-0; by the Executive Committee on April 13, 1972, by a vote of 7-1; and by the Faculty Senate on May 9, 1972, by a vote of 28-0-1. The policy as amended is in agreement with suggestions of AAUP and conforms to recent Civil Rights requirements.

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommendation was approved by a vote of 5 to 1. Mr. McQuillan asked that the record show that he voted against the motion.

# I. AIR CONDITIONING OF PARSONS HALL AND DREISER HALL

The plans for the air conditioning of Parsons Hall and Dreiser Hall have been completed by M & E Engineering Service and will be presented to the Board for review and approval. The estimated cost for the air conditioning of the buildings is \$725,000 and the project has been approved by the State Budget Agency. It was recommended that approval be given to advertise for the receipt of bids for the air conditioning work. The bids will be received on August 11, 1972, and it was recommended that President Rankin, Mr. Lamb, Mr. McQuillan and Mr. Moulton be constituted as a committee to receive the bids and award the contracts for the work.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, approval was given to advertise for the receipt of bids for the air conditioning work. Because Mr. McQuillan would not be available at the time the bids would be received, the Board approved the members of the committee as recommended, excluding Mr. McQuillan.

#### J. GRANTS

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On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the following grants and appropriations were approved as recommended.

1. Law Enforcement Education Program - Fund No. 2055

Notice of a supplemental award in the amount of \$3,000 has been received from the Department of Justice through the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration Regional Office for grants and loans for the period July 1, 1971, through June 30, 1972. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the award.

2. Indiana Academy of Science Research Grant - Fund No. 2132

Letter of Award in the amount of \$378 has been received from the Indiana Academy of Science to conduct a research project entitled "Origin and Evolution of External Parasite Fauna of Western Jumping Mice, Zapus" during the summer, 1972, under the direction of Dr. John O. Whitaker, Jr., Professor of Life Sciences. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the original proposal and the award letter.

3. Home Economics Pre-Ninth Grade Workshop - Fund No. 2133

Letter of Award in the amount of \$4,350 has been received from the Indiana State Board of Vocational and Technical Education to conduct a "Pre-Ninth Grade Workshop for Consumer and Homemaking Teachérs" held from June 29, 1972 to July 18, 1972, under the direction of Dr. Ruth Turner, Associate Professor of Home Economics. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the original proposal and the award letter.

4. Practical Research for Distributive Education - Fund No. 2135

Letter of Award in the amount of \$500 has been received from the Indiana State Board of Vocational and Technical Education to conduct a project entitled "Conducting and Evaluating Practical Research with Special Application for Distributive Education Instructors and Students" under the direction of Dr. Harry F. Krueckeberg, Director of the Bureau of Business Research. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the award letter.

5. Office Laboratory Follow-up and Evaluation Project - Fund No. 2136

Letter of Award in the amount of \$1,000 has been received from the Indiana State Board of Vocational and Technical Education to conduct a project entitled "Intensive Office Laboratory Follow-up and Evaluation" under the direction of Dr. Wynnie Ford, Associate Professor of Business. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the award letter.

6. Vocational-Technical Project for Upgrading Conditionally Licensed Teachers - Fund No. 2137

Letter of Award in the amount of \$12,000 has been received from the Indiana State Board of Vocational and Technical Education to conduct a research proposal entitled "A Project to Develop Self-Instructional Materials for Upgrading Conditionally Licensed Teachers" during the fiscal year 1972-73, under the direction of Dr. Walter Weffenstette, Professor of Vocational-Technical Education. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

7. Vocational Technical Project for Development of Photographic Process - Fund No. 2138

Letter of Award in the amount of \$6,970 has been received from the Indiana State Board of Vocational and Technical Education to conduct a research proposal entitled "A Plan for Development of Photographic Process Overhead Transparencies" during the fiscal year 1972-73, under the direction of Mr. Thomas Eachus, Associate Professor of Vocational-Technical Education. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

8. College Library Resources Program, 1972-73 - Fund No. 2139

Notification of Grant Award No. OEG-0-72-6157 (314) in the amount of \$8,619 has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, consisting of \$5,000 for basic materials and \$3,619 for supplemental materials to improve the library for the period from June 30, 1972, through June 30, 1973. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

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# 9. Training Personnel in Physical Education of the Handicapped - Fund No. 2140

Notification of Grant Award No. OEG-0-72-4023 (603), Project No. 21-2993, in the amount of \$26,500 has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to continue the program of training professional personnel in the education of the handicapped for the period from June 26, 1972, through August 31, 1973, under the direction of Dr. Thomas Songster, Associate Professor of Physical Education. Matching funds will include waiver of contingent fees and out-of-state fees for the eight fellows participating in the program and in-kind contribution of faculty salaries. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

## 10. Bureau of Business Research - Fund No. 252

Research Agreement No. 12-14-100-11,228 (52) in the amount of \$15,000 has been received from the United States Department of Agriculture to conduct a project entitled "A Survey of Buying Practices of Small Independent Food Service Operators" during the period from June 7, 1972, to June 30, 1974, under the direction of Dr. Harry F. Krueckeberg, Director of the Bureau of Business Research and Associate Professor of Business. In-kind contributions totaling \$9,700 will be provided by the University. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the agreement.

# 11. Indiana Consortium for International Programs - Fund No. 2093-5

Grant Agreement No. OEG-0-72-0108 (820) (824) in the amount of \$5,435 in U.S. Dollars and \$2,785 equivalent in Indian Rupees, total \$8,220 has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to partially support the professional activities of a curriculum consultant, Lalita P. Vidyarthi, during the academic year 1972-73, beginning September 1, 1972. \$5,000 will be provided as matching funds by the Indiana Consortium for International Programs. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant agreement.

### 12. Educational Opportunity Grants - Fund No. 293

An adjustment in the Allocation Letter for Educational Opportunity Grants has been received from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare decreasing the allocation for renewal year awards in the amount of \$15,000, for the fiscal year 1971-72. It was recommended that the records be amended to reflect this decrease in accordance with the allocation letter.

13. Nursing Scholarship Fund - Fund No. 2034

Notice of Award No. B-7-24-0040-07-1 has been received from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Public Health Service, in the amount of \$29,147, for the purpose of awarding nursing scholarships for the period from July 1, 1972, through June 30, 1973. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

14. Nursing Student Loan Fund - Fund No. 521

Notice of Award No. B-7-24-0040-07-1 has been received from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Public Health Service, in the amount of \$24,193, for nursing student loans to be matched with Student Service Fees in the amount of \$2,638.11, for the period from July 1, 1972, through June 30, 1973. It was recommended that the total amount be available for loans and matching funds be transferred in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

### 15. Center for Professional Development in Vocational-Technical Education - Fund No. 2134

Letter of Authorization has been received from the State Director of Vocational Education to expend the unexpended funds in the amount of \$19,513.64, which remain from the original amount approved by the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education to establish a program for interdisciplinary supervisors through the Center for Professional Development in Vocational-Technical Education under the direction of Dr. Donald L. Hagen. It was recommended that the unexpended funds be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the contractual agreement.

#### 16. Nursing Capitation Grant Program - Fund No. 2141

Notice of Grant Award No. 1-E04-NU00370-01 has been received from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Public Health Service in the amount of \$44,663 for the purpose of providing a dependable support base for the educational programs of the School of Nursing for the period from July 1, 1972, through June 30, 1973, under the direction of Dean Harriet 0. Reeves. It was recommended that the total amount of the budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

17. Training of Teachers of Handicapped Children Grant - Fund No. 2142

Notification of Grant Award No. OEG-0-72-4023 (603) has been received from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare in the amount of \$50,000, to provide support for personnel in programs to prepare professional personnel in the education of the handicapped and to provide stipends for twelve graduate students in the various fields of special education for the period from June 26, 1972, through August 31, 1973, under the direction of Dr. Rutherford B. Porter, Chairman of the Special Education Department. The tuition fees of the participants are waived. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

#### 18. Home Economics Curriculum Development Fund - Fund No. 2143

Approval has been received from the Division of Vocational Education, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, in the amount of \$15,850, for the continuation of a project for planning and developing curriculum materials in vocational home economics for the period June 1, 1972, through May 31, 1973. It was recommended that the total budget amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the agreement. 2

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### 19. National Tech Physics Project Coordination - Fund No. 2144

Letter of approval has been received from the American Institute of Physics in the amount of \$28,890, to provide a part-time project coordinator for the steering committee which supervises the National Tech Physics Project and pay part of the operating costs to coordinate the activities of the steering committee. Dr. Philip DiLavore, Associate Professor of Physics, has been approved to act as part-time director for the period from July 19, 1972 through October 31, 1973. It was recommended that the total budget amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

## K. PROCEDURE FOR VALIDATING SGA CLAIMS FOR PAYMENT

Article IX of the Indiana State University Student Constitution provides that "Student Government shall receive into its budget a certain percent of the Student Activities Fee and maintain control over specific expenditures subject to budgetary limitations and/or the veto of the University President on the grounds of unlawful expenditure, but with right of appeal to the Board of Trustees." Burns Indiana Statutes 28-7106 states that the Treasurer of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees "shall be responsible for the receipt, custody, accounting and proper protection of all funds due and accruing to Indiana State University and the Indiana State University Board of Trustees from any and all sources and for whatever purpose such funds and receipts may be designated . . . "

From time to time the Treasurer adjudges it necessary to refuse a claim presented by Student Government although Student Government claims the Treasurer cannot refuse its claim unless the expenditure is unlawful or in violation of budgetary limitations. It is difficult, if not impossible, to prove that some questionable expenditures are unlawful and it was recommended that the Board authorize the Treasurer to use his judgment to determine the validity of claims presented for payment. Appeals of claims for payment rejected by the Treasurer may be presented to the President of the University.

President Rankin noted that this item had been discussed with Mr. O'Dell and Mr. Reeves in the executive session and asked if they had any new comments to make regarding the item. Mr. Reeves asked if this procedure would in any way change the SGA Constitution? Mr. Moulton said this only authorizes him to judge whether an expenditure is proper and lawful; it would not change day to day operations.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. Morris, the recommendation that the Board authorize the Treasurer to use his judgment to determine the validity of claims presented for payment was approved, subject to appeal to the President.

# L. STUDENT HEALTH INSURANCE, 1972-73

1. Receipt of Bids for Student Health Insurance

Blue Cross-Blue Shield has written the Indiana State University Student Health Insurance coverage for the past several years on an annual contract renewal basis and anticipated a substantial premium increase for the 1972-73 renewal because of poor claim experience. Because of the completion of the new Student Health Center and some change in the provision of health services at Indiana State University, the Student Health Insurance program has been revised.

Proposals were asked from several insurance companies on the basis of benefits described in EXHIBIT C; a list of the companies receiving material is provided in the exhibit. Proposals were received from the following insurance companies:

- 1. American Community Mutual Insurance Company
- (G-M Underwriters, Inc.)
- 2. Blue Cross-Blue Shield
- 3. Jefferson National Life Insurance Company (Forrest Sherer, Inc.)
- 4. Maine Fidelity Life Insurance Company
- (Bethalto Insurance Agency)
- 5. Mutual of Omaha
- 6. University Life Insurance Company of America

The proposal from American Community Mutual Insurance Company (G-M Underwriters, Inc.) was the only program which met all of the requested benefits and requirements. The proposal was presented as EXHIBIT D. The following proposals were received:

It was recommended that the proposal submitted by American Community Mutual Insurance Company (G-M Underwriters, Inc.), including Alternate #2 with a \$10,000 Major Medical benefit be approved effective August 28, 1972. The proposal contains a provision for a two-year contract with the same premium rates guaranteed.

#### 2. Elimination of Waiver Card

On June 16, 1967, the Board authorized the procedure whereby all students who are eligible for health services from the University were required to participate in the Student Health Insurance Program unless they signed a waiver indicating that they did not wish to participate. The requirement has been exceptionally difficult to enforce and has created an excessive work load in the University Business Office. There were approximately 11,900 students eligible to enroll in the student insurance program in the fall of 1971 and some 2,877 actually enrolled in the program. It was recommended that the waiver requirement be discontinued effective August 28, 1972.

Discussion: Mr. Morris asked if this proposal had been reviewed by a committee. Mr. Moulton said the Health Center staff, Dr. Truitt, and the insurance coordinator reviewed all the proposals submitted; also, the insurance coordinator determined what Ball State's experience was with the company submitting the low bid. The information received from Ball State indicated that they were pleased with the American Community Mutual Insurance Company plan. Mr. 0'Dell said he had discussed this with Dr. Truitt and President Rankin and he felt this plan was much better than our present one particularly because of the optional maternity clause.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the proposal submitted by American Community Mutual Insurance Company (G-M Underwriters, Inc.), including Alternate #2 with a \$10,000 Major Medical benefit was approved, effective August 28, 1972. In the same motion the Board also approved the recommendation that the waiver requirement be discontinued effective August 28, 1972.

#### M. IN MEMORIAM

Dr. Byron L. Westfall, Professor Emeritus of Education and Associate Dean of the School of Education, passed away on June 25, 1972. A Resolution, EXHIBIT E, was presented for approval of the Board.

Dr. Florence M. Thompson, Associate Dean Emeritus of Student Life for Special Services and Associate Professor Emeritus of Education, passed away on July 26, 1972. A Resolution, EXHIBIT H, was presented for approval of the Board.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the Resolutions were approved as presented.

## N. ESTABLISHMENT OF AN APPLICATION FEE AND ABOLISHMENT OF THE ADMISSION DEPOSIT

Several years ago the Administration recommended to the Board of Trustees that an admission deposit of \$25 be mandatory for all students seeking admission to the University. If the student enrolled, the deposit was credited against his fees; if the student did not enroll, a partial refund was made. The purpose of the admission deposit was to prevent multiple applications and shopping for financial aid. Administering the admission deposit has required an excessive amount of processing by the Business Office. Elimination of the deposit fee would reduce the work load of the Business Office, and establishment of an application fee would provide a significant source of income with fewer problems of administration because it would be non-refundable and non-applicable to fees.

It was recommended that effective with the first summer term 1973, the \$25 mandatory deposit be abolished and all students who file an application for admission be assessed a \$10 application fee. This policy would be effective both at Terre Haute and at Evansville.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the recommendation was approved.

## 0. ESTABLISHMENT OF A STUDENT LEGAL COUNSELING AND REFERRAL SERVICE

In February 1970 the Board of Trustees approved an agreement between Student Government Association and a local law firm, the purpose of which was to provide legal aid to students. It is the opinion of the University's attorney that no University funds can be used to provide any type of legal aid to students except legal counseling and referral. In accordance with this opinion, it was recommended that the President of the University develop the procedures and guidelines for the establishment of a Legal Counseling and Referral Service.

President Rankin noted that this matter was discussed with Mr. O'Dell and Mr. Reeves in Executive Session, at their request, and that agreement in principle was reached as to the general nature and purpose of such a service.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the recommendation that the President of the University develop the procedures and guidelines for the establishment of a Legal Counseling and Referral Service was approved.

#### P. INTERPRETATION OF THE HOUSING POLICY - COMMUTING RADIUS

The University Housing Policy states under Section A:

Students who will have earned 86 semester hours of credit as of August 31, and students who will become 21 years of age on or before September 30, may live in housing facilities of their own choosing. All other single undergraduates who do not return to their homes each evening must reside in housing facilities maintained by the University.

The rationale for the following recommendation is:

- 1. As presently stated, the housing policy is difficult to enforce because of the absence of a definition of a realistic commuting distance. A card is sent to the home of each student who indicates he or she is commuting from home. The parent must sign and return the card verifying that the student is returning to his home each evening. With no limit on commuting distance, cards have been returned from homes as far away as Elkhart and Munster, Indiana, indicating that the student is commuting. These students, in effect, are allowed "privileged immunity" from the intent of the Housing Policy. The recommended addition to the Interpretation of the Housing Policy would enable staff to discuss in depth the reasons for commuting, if in fact the student is going to do so, and help insure consistent application of the policy when students and parents do try to avoid the policy.
- 2. One of the most frequent reasons given for living at home and commuting is the financial savings to be realized. Unless a student has special conditions, transportation costs for commuting over sixty miles plus other personal expenses would in most cases exceed the cost of living in a residence hall.
- 3. A.student who wishes to commute from a distance of sixty miles or more will spend at least two hours per day in transit. In most cases this time could be more wisely invested in a part-time job, studying, or in the non-classroom educational opportunities on campus.

It was recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the following statement to be added to the Interpretation of the Housing Policy effective with the fall semester 1972:

Students who wish to live with their parents and commute to classes and whose home is not within a radius of sixty miles from the Indiana State University campus at Terre Haute must be approved to be an exception to the Housing Policy.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the Board approved the recommendation to add the statement to the Interpretation of the Housing Policy, effective with the fall semester 1972.

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## Q. POLICIES REGARDING THE USE OF UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES BY NON-UNIVERSITY AGENCIES AND GROUPS

During the Spring Semester 1972, concern was expressed by students regarding the use of the Tirey Memorial Union lower lobby by non-University agencies. President Rankin established a committee of students, faculty and administrators to prepare a policy statement regarding the use of University facilities by non-University agencies and groups. The committee, chaired by Dr. Wayne Schomer, developed a statement which provides essentially the same clarification for use of University facilities by non-University agencies and groups as was developed for University groups and approved by the Board of Trustees on January 17, 1969. It was recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the Statement Regarding the Use of University Buildings and Facilities by Non-University Agencies and Groups as shown in Section 1, EXHIBIT F.

Discussion: President Rankin noted that this item was discussed with Mr. O'Dell and Mr. Reeves in Executive Session. It was his impression that members of the Board thought the statement itself was difficult to follow and needed to be refined. He added that the statement was a result of the work of an ad hoc committee, made up of administrators, students, and faculty and had been approved unanimously at their last meeting. He pointed out that Mr. Reeves is a member of that committee but was not present at that particular meeting. He said that as a result of this discussion in the Executive Session, he recommends that the Board approve the approach with the idea that the statement would be clarified and, if possible, simplified.

Mr. Morris moved that the Board approve the idea in principle but not the statement itself. Mr. McQuillan seconded and the motion carried.

In clarifying the motion, Mr. Hitch said the Board would approve the idea in principle with the understanding that the statement be refined and asked Mr. Reeves to follow up on this matter to satisfy the concerns expressed by SGA.

## R. HONORARY DEGREE

It was recommended that the honorary degree, Doctor of Letters, be conferred upon Dr. Eldon L. Johnson at the August 23, 1972 Commencement, at which occasion Dr. Johnson will deliver the commencement address. Dr. Johnson is a 1961 recipient of the ISU Distinguished Alumni Award and is currently an executive vice president of the University of Illinois. He served as the thirteenth president of the University of New Hampshire (1955 to 1962) and as president of the Great Lakes Association from 1962 to 1966.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the recommendation that the degree, Doctor of Letters, be conferred upon Dr. Eldon L. Johnson at the August 23, 1972 Commencement was approved.

#### S. SUMMER INTERSESSION

The Dean of Summer Sessions, Dr. Harriet D. Darrow, has proposed the establishment of a threeweek intersession to be held prior to the first five-week summer session, beginning with summer 1973. The concept of the intersession has been brought about by the change to the "early semester" calendar. The second semester is now completed in early May, with the first summer term starting in June. The proposed intersession should provide additional educational opportunities primarily for undergraduate students. Also, with the second summer term ending very close to the beginning of the fall semester, there is a likelihood of decreased enrollments in the second summer term. The intersession may tend to offset such decreases.

The proposal has been approved in principle by the Economic Benefits Committee on June 22, 1972, by a vote of 7-0. The Faculty Senate, on July 13, 1972, recommended that in view of unresolved issues concerning faculty load and compensation, an extensive study be made of the ramifications of the intersession as related to the total summer program.

It was recommended that authority be given to the administration to proceed with the establishment of a three-week intersession, effective summer 1973, if it is determined that the intersession is feasible.

Discussion: President Rankin said that there is some difference of opinion as to whether or not the Economic Benefits Committee has approved the idea of an intersession. In any event, general faculty opinion appeared to favor the intersession but the faculty did not agree on proposed salary scales. The administration believes it would be helpful to have the Board's reaction to the idea at this time rather than later.

Dr. Bash said it was his understanding that the proposal has not been approved by the Economic Benefits Committee. He said Dean Darrow had submitted two proposals to the Faculty Senate; one on intersessions and one on summer stipends. The Senate felt the two proposals were related and could not be considered independently of each other. The suggestion of Dean Darrow for summer stipends appears to propose a reduction in faculty salaries and both proposals therefore are in abeyance and will be considered in the fall.

Vice President Townsend said he was on vacation when the Senate discussed the proposals but it was his understanding that the Executive Committee approved the concept of an intersession but decided to wait until the matter of salary formula could be considered by the Economic Benefits Committee.

## S. <u>SUMMER INTERSESSION</u> (CONTINUED)

Mr. McCutchan said it did not sound reasonable that the Board should approve something that has not had a recommendation from the Faculty Senate. He asked why Board action could not be deferred until the Senate finishes its work. Vice President Townsend said summer programs are developed in August and if the intersession is to be made effective in the summer of 1973, it would be necessary for the Board to take action now.

Mr. Morris moved that the Indiana State University Board of Trustees go on record in support of the concept of the establishment of an intersession at the University. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Mitchell and carried.

T. BUKSAR, ET AL vs. THE TRUSTEES OF INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY, ET AL

The United States District Court, Southern District of Indiana, Terre Haute Division, in the matter of Robert Charles Buksar, et al, Plaintiffs, vs. the Trustees of Indiana State University, et al, Defendants, No. TH 72-C-58, has found in favor of the University on all counts and has decreed that the University housing policy is fair and reasonable in all respects and is not arbitrary and capricious. A copy of the judgment entered on the subject case is presented in EXHIBIT G.

## U. TERRE HAUTE CENTER FOR MEDICAL EDUCATION

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Indiana University has approved the following operating budget for the Terre Haute Center for Medical Education:

Capital Outlay	64,400
Total	\$195,000

The appropriation for capital outlay includes \$17,000 for alterations and renovations, \$5,000 for library books, and \$42,400 for office and educational equipment. Indiana University has issued a purchase order to Indiana State University in the amount of \$195,000 for the purpose of reimbursing Indiana State University for expenses incurred by the Terre Haute Center for Medical Education. Approval of the budget was recommended.

On motion by Mr. McQuillan, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the budget was approved.

Before adjourning the meeting, Mr. Hitch asked if anyone had any comments to make. Mr. Lamb said he wished to thank the members of the Board of Trustees for the honor of serving as president for the past year and wanted to thank all present for the splendid cooperation he received. He said he is looking forward to three more years on the Board. President Rankin said it is the custom of the Board to present a memento of appreciation to the retiring president and that this will be done as soon as the gift is received.

Dr. Bash expressed his appreciation and thanks to Mr. Lamb and the members of the Board for the many courtesies that were extended through the year. He said he has enjoyed working with President Rankin who has been very candid and considerate at all times.

Mr. O'Dell said he was glad of the positive attitudes at today's meeting and certainly appreciated the opportunity to discuss some of the issues at the Executive Session. Mr. Reeves said he also wanted to thank the Board for allowing him to come to the Executive Session.

Mr. Brewer said he had enjoyed his meetings with the Board and was enlightened to watch the Board in action. He introduced Miss Connie Kirkpatrick, fall editor of the STATESMAN. Miss Kirkpatrick invited the trustees to visit the STATESMAN'S office when they are in Terre Haute for their September meeting. She said she would get in touch with Mr. Hitch to make definite arrangements.

President Rankin announced that the Board agreed to furnish Sections I and II of the Agenda to the official observers of the meeting, which include the president and vice president of SGA and the editor of the STATESMAN. He said the Board did not agree to furnish copies of the Minutes on the grounds that these sections of the approved Minutes are available in Dr. Hardaway's office to anyone wishing to read them.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Morris, the meeting adjourned at 11:15 a.m.

#### MASTER CHARGE

## Master Charge Member Agreement

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RESOLVED, that any one of the following: the President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary or Assistant Secretary of this corporation be and hereby is authorized:

> To execute and deliver on behalf of this corporation a Master Charge Member Agreement with the Citizens National Bank of Evansville ("Bank"), and supplemental agreements amending or revising such Agreement from time to time; and

To deliver for credit, in accordance with the terms of such Member Agreement and any supplemental agreements thereto (such Member Agreement and supplemental agreements being hereafter referred to as the "Agreement"), such sales drafts as are executed and delivered to the corporation as payment for merchandise and/or services sold through the use of Master Charge; to execute and deliver sales drafts in accordance with the terms of the Agreement; and to pay any amounts payable by this corporation under the terms of the Agreement; and

To pay all fees imposed upon this corporation under the terms of the Agreement and to perform all acts and execute and deliver all such other instruments or documents which the Bank may deem necessary to carry out the purposes and intent of the Agreement and these Resolutions.

## INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY

### Student Health Insurance

### GENERAL INFORMATION

The following data is being submitted for Indiana State University in order to request estimates of premium costs for a revised Student Health Insurance Program for the Terre Haute campus. A new Student Health Center was completed and occupied in November 1971. The total enrollment of the University Terre Haute campus for the Fall Semester of the 1971-72 school year was 7,431 males and 6,077 females. Of this group 6,604 males and 5,355 females were enrolled for seven credit hours or more and were eligible for services through the I.S.U. Student Health Center.

Part of the student service fee paid by each student enrolling at the University is budgeted for health services rendered by the Student Health Center. For this fee the following services are provided without additional cost to the student: first aid, diathermy (heat treatment), x-rays, and physiotherapy. Prescription drugs, including injections, are charged to the student. Surgery is limited to suturing of lacerations. Entrance physical examinations are not provided.

The University presently retains four full-time general practitioners and one psychiatrist. These physicians are normally scheduled for an eight-hour day and are on call 24 hours a day on a rotation schedule. Students are not charged for any calls. The Health Center also retains ten full-time and six part-time registered nurses and three nurses aids. These staff members are scheduled for eight-hour shifts. In addition, the Health Center also has one full-time x-ray technician and one full-time pharmacist.

The new Student Health Center provides 34 beds for in-patient overnight care. There is no limitation on the number of days of in-patient care for each student; however, the student is charged for any medication administered.

For more serious illnesses and surgery, the two local Terre Haute hospitals are used. St. Anthony Hospital presently has a semi-private room and board charge of \$47.50 per day, and Union Hospital charges \$50.50 per day for a semi-private room.

#### ELIGIBILITY

All students attending Indiana State University who are enrolled for at least seven (7) semester credit hours and are eligible for the services of the Student Health Center, are eligible to participate in this insurance program. Coverage to be effective August 28, 1972, for the 1st semester, January 8, 1972, for the 2nd semester or June 11, 1972, for the summer terms. This should include the option of insuring the spouse and eligible children under age 19. If the student marries, he should have the option of applying for additional coverage for his dependents within thirty (30) days of such marriage. The premium should be pro-rated for the remainder of the policy period.

#### BENEFITS

1. Aggregate Limit. The total expenses for an Insured paid under this policy as the result of any one injury or any one sickness shall not exceed the Basic Benefits described herein plus 80% of additional reasonable and necessary expenses, in excess of \$100, which are covered under the Major Medical Benefit provision of this policy.

2. <u>Basic Benefits</u>. Benefits to be paid as described below for expenses actually incurred which are the result of an injury sustained or a sickness beginning while insured under the policy.

- (a) Hospital Room and Board Up to 30 days per admission, in an Off-Campus Hospital, the company will pay the standard semi-private room rate. Renewal of benefits after 90-day waiting period.
- (b) Miscellaneous Charges -

<u>Alternate I</u> - When hospital confined, usual and customary charges will be paid up to \$300 for necessary expenses including x-ray, operating room, recovery room, anesthesia, laboratory, drugs, medicines, appliances, dressings, ambulance directly to a local hospital, licensed or graduate nurse when prescribed, but not including telephone, television and other personal items.

Alternate II - These charges covered in full.

Alternate III - Up to \$300 of these charges paid in full with an 80% co-insurance benefit for remaining balance of these charges.

- (c) Surgical Expense Expenses actually incurred for surgical expenses, including postoperative care, up to a maximum of \$500 for any single surgical procedure according to a surgical schedule.
- (d) Professional Anesthesia When not available as a hospital service, the anesthesiologist (physician) will be paid \$15 or 20% of the basic surgical allowance, whichever is greater, but not to exceed the actual charge.
- (e) Physicians' Hospital Visits For treatment other than surgery, obstetrics, and postoperative care, expenses actually incurred, but not to exceed \$10 for the first visit and thereafter \$5.00 per day, up to \$150 per admission for one or more visits by one or more physicians.
- (f) Medical Consultation Up to \$20 will be paid for medical counsel or assistance by a legally qualified physician not on the Health Service staff when required by the attending physician for any one injury or any one sickness.
- (g) Miscellaneous Out-Patient Accident Expense When accidental injury does not require hospitalization, the expenses actually incurred will be paid up to \$150 for any one injury. If the treatment includes Surgery Expense or Anesthesia Expense, the amounts paid will be according to policy maximums.
- (h) Dental Expense Up to \$300 paid for each accident, for expenses incurred for necessary dental treatment which is the result of accidental injury to sound, natural teeth.
- (i) Psychiatric Care -

<u>Alternate I</u> - For hospitalization because of mental sickness or a nervous condition requiring psychiatric treatment or care, expenses actually incurred will be paid, subject to the Basic Benefits of the Policy, with a maximum of 10 days per policy year.

Alternate II - Same as Alternate I, but with a maximum of 30 days per policy year.

(j) Out-Patient Laboratory and Diagnostic Expense - the present Health Center is equipped to provide x-ray and laboratory services, but this provision would provide benefits for students away from Campus during holidays and vacation breaks as well as at other times when the services of the Health Center are not readily available.

Alternate I - \$50 maximum per policy year.

Alternate II - \$100 maximum per policy year.

Alternate III - \$50 per policy year with the Student Health Center eligible for reimbursement for laboratory and x-ray services.

(k) <u>Radiation Therapy</u> - Charges actually incurred for radiation therapy up to a maximum of \$150 per course of treatment will be covered.

3. <u>Major Medical Benefit - 80% Co-Insurance</u>. The Company will pay benefits equal to 80% of the usual and customary charges in excess of (a) the Basic Benefits, and (b) a \$100 deductible amount, incurred per calendar year for services which are performed or prescribed by the physician in charge. Complications resulting from pregnancy are covered, but pre-natal charges are to be considered only under the maternity benefits provisions. After two \$100 deductibles are met, the remaining members of a family unit need not meet a deductible.

<u>Alternate I</u> - The maximum amount payable under this benefit is \$5,000. The limitations and exclusions of the policy apply to this benefit.

Alternate II - Same as Alternate I, but with \$10,000 maximum.

#### PREMIUM RATES

Premium rates are desired for:

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- (1) Student only coverage.
  - (2) Student and spouse only.
  - (3) Student, spouse, and children coverage.
  - (4) Student and children only coverage.

### MATERNITY BENEFITS

A separate optional coverage will be available under the student, spouse and children coverage, and/or the student and children only coverage for maternity benefits. A separate premium should be quoted for this additional coverage option.

The maximum hospital maternity benefit for each pregnancy shall be \$200. In addition, the following maximums for physician charges shall be provided:

\$200 for Caesarean Section \$100 for normal delivery

\$ 75 for miscarriage

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### INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORTS

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Intercollegiate sports coverage for injuries is carried under a separate policy and is to be excluded from this proposed plan.

## ENROLLMENT METHOD

The enrollment for this coverage shall be on a voluntary basis, using an enrollment card plan with a contract term or policy year of 12 months.

There should be at least 3 enrollment periods during each policy year: (1) in late August for the fall semester (full policy year); (2) in January for the spring semester and summer terms; and, (3) in June for both summer sessions.

Each company should provide detailed information concerning the materials which it will provide for enrollment, the type of solicitation (mail or personal contact) to be used, and the information which the University must provide such as student address lists, etc. The company should include information concerning personnel available to assist with enrollment during the University registration periods.

A description of the procedure to be followed for claims processing should also be included as well as information concerning the retention charge and administrative/overhead charge made by the company for administering the account.

Information should also be provided concerning detailed periodic reports which are made available to the policyholder by the company. The company shall also indicate the period of time for which premium rates are guaranteed (i.e., 1, 2, or 3 years).

### POLICIES REGARDING USE OF UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES BY NON-UNIVERSITY AGENCIES AND GROUPS

Indiana State University resources, facilities, and services are utilized primarily and most directly for the benefit of students who are matriculated at the institution and for scholarly and supportive pursuits of faculty and staff inherent to the operation and development of the University.

In addition, the University recognizes its obligation to extend concomitant benefits to and for the communities-at-large. These benefits bring together students, scholars, and the public-atlarge in educational and cultural settings, both on campus and off campus. University-connected projects concerned with the solution of societal, environmental, business, or industrial problems often involve students, faculty, and representatives of the communities-at-large engaged together for mutual advantage. This interactivity becomes a valuable part of the students' educational experience and works toward the common good of the total population.

The University has established policies and procedures for maximum benefit and utilization of its resources, facilities, and services. The policies and procedures include safeguards and administrative guidelines, and define the University's obligations to matriculated students, the faculty, the staff, and the public-at-large. The University must make available its facilities to a variety of groups in order to encourage a wide sharing of information. The University, if it is to be true to its historic mission, may not pass judgment on the merits of the information so long as the information is presented in a manner that does not infringe upon the rights and privileges of others.

The facilities of the University as defined by this policy include all buildings and grounds owned or leased by the University. Space within the buildings and grounds is of three types: (1) Dedicated (academic and office), (2) Semipublic, (3) Public.

The dedicated or academic and office space is defined as space used primarily to serve and support the educational, cultural and recreational functions of the University. Although dedicated areas may on occasion be used by public groups, University functions have priority. Examples of such space are classrooms, laboratories, residence halls, restricted parking, recreational facilities (with the exception of the Stadium golf course), intramural and athletic fields, etc. The semipublic space areas are defined as space available for use by internal and external individuals, groups, organizations, associations, private business, etc., on a reservation only basis. Normally, non-University organizations will pay for the use of such space. Examples of such space are Tilson Music Hall, East and West Ballrooms, and meeting rooms in various buildings such as Tirey Memorial Union, Hulman Center and the University-Civic Amphitheater.

The public space areas are defined as areas which accommodate traffic flow, provide access to semipublic facilities, and facilities of the University open to the public for their use and pleasure such as the Gourmet Room and the Snack Shop in Hulman Center, Cafeteria and Grill in the Student Union Building. Every person with legitimate business at the University has the privilege of free access to the public areas of the buildings and grounds during those hours when they are open, such hours to be determined by the President or a University official designated by him. These areas are defined to include sidewalks, closed streets, entrances to buildings, corridors in classroom and office buildings, library reading rooms, and commons areas in the residence halls and Tirey Memorial Union.

Space in those lobbies which are designated public areas as defined by this policy may be reserved by recognized student, faculty, or staff organizations. Public groups, organizations, or agencies may reserve these areas for purposes other than recruitment for employment, if approved by the administrative office designated for this purpose by the President of the University.

Reservations for the use of lobby areas and for the use of the semi-public space areas must be made with and approved by the University official responsible for the space requested. The University President or his representative reserves the right to deny the use of areas if the President or his representative determines that access by the group is disrupting the normal operation of the facility or the University. Soliciting for monetary reasons or selling will not be permitted in the public areas except in cases of student groups whose activities are approved through the Student Activities Office.

Agencies coming to the campus to recruit full-time employees must make reservations for space and schedule with the Placement Bureau. The Bureau will schedule personal interviews in the facilities of the Bureau or in semipublic areas if the facilities of the Bureau do not accommodate the demand. Recruiting agencies wishing to exercise their function near a heavy traffic area may reserve a room at a regularly established rental rate. Reservations for facilities of this nature must be made with the person responsible for the building in which the space is located.

Agencies coming to the campus to recruit students for part-time or temporary positions may make reservations for space with the Financial Aids Office or with the person responsible for the building in which desired space is located.

## JUDGMENT ON FINDING OF FACTS AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The matter was submitted to the Court for trial upon the issues of the complaint and answer thereto. The parties waived the right to submit oral testimony and agreed to submit the evidence in writing consisting of stipulations, agreements, affidavits, depositions and documentary evidence. The parties submitted briefs in lieu of final oral arguments. The Court being advised in the matter does find, conclude and adjudge as follows:

Plaintiffs, fourteen (14) in number, are or were students at Indiana State University. Plaintiffs individually are seeking in this cause a declaratory judgment that the housing policy instituted at Indiana State University and enforced by defendants herein is unconstitutional and in violation of statutes enacted by the United States Congress and plaintiffs further seek an injunction to prevent the enforcement of said housing policy.

Defendants in this cause are the trustees and administrative officials of Indiana State University. Indiana State University is located at Terre Haute, Indiana. It is a part of the educational system of the State of Indiana and is a public, government supported institution of higher learning, constituting an organ of the State of Indiana, supported by funds appropriated by the Indiana General Assembly. The government of the University is vested in Indiana State University Board of Trustees with authority delegated to do everything necessary to accomplish the objects of the University. (Burns Indiana Statutes Annotated, 1970 Replacement, Section 28-1704, 28-6501 through 28-6506.) The universities of the state, including Indiana State University, have been instituted by the Legislature of the State of Indiana pursuant to the powers granted by and to comply with the constitutional mandage of Article VIII, Section 1 of the Constitution of the State of Indiana "to encourage by all suitable means, moral, intellectual, scientific, and agricultural improvement" of the citizens of the State of Indiana. Acts of the Indiana General Assembly of 1927, Chapter 137, Page 425 (Burns Section 28-7528 through 28-7537) provide that Indiana State University Board of Trustees is authorized from time to time as the governing board finds a necessity therefor exists, "to erect, construct, reconstruct, extend, remodel, improve, complete, equip, furnish, operate, control and manage dormitories and other housing facilities for single and married students and school personnel; food service facilities; student infirmaries and other health facilities; together with parking facilities and other appurtenances in connection with any of the foregoing....for the purpose of said respective institution."

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The Constitution of the State of Indiana and the Indiana State Legislature have granted to Indiana State University Board of Trustees the power and the responsibility to construct, finance, operate, control and manage dormitories and other housing facilities for the purpose of the institution in order to provide educational and moral training for its students, thus satisfying the constitutional mandate to provide moral and intellectual improvements for the citizens of the State of Indiana.

The Legislature of the State of Indiana has also expressly delegated to Indiana State University Board of Trustees the responsibility of providing the rules and regulations governing the use of said dormitory facilities and the conduct of the students pertaining thereto.

The Acts of the Indiana General Assembly of 1925, Chapter 89, Section 2, Page 259 (Burns Section 28-7021) specifically authorizes the Board of Trustees to finance the building of dormitories by the issuance of bonds, which such bonds:

"May be sold either privately, or at public letting, as such Board may determine. The principal and interest of such bonds, when sold, shall be a primary, fixed charge against the net income of such dormitories; and such net income shall be applied by such Board in payment of the principal and interest of such bonds as the same shall become due, until full and final payment of all such bonds and interest. Whenever the net income of such dormitory in any year shall not be sufficient to meet the total amount of principal and interest of such bonds falling due in such year, then such Board may pay the balance of such principal and interest so falling due out of any of the other revenues and funds of such normal school which shall be available therefor."

The housing policy at Indiana State University requiring all students who do not return to their homes each evening to live in one of the residence halls maintained by the University was adopted by the Board of Trustees of said institution on January 21, 1960. The housing regulations complained of by plaintiffs and presently in effect at the University were redefined by Indiana State University Board of Trustees by resolution at its meeting of March 19, 1966 as follows:

"UNIVERSITY HOUSING POLICY

A. Students who have earned 86 semester hours of credit as of August 31, and students who will become 21 years of age on or before September 30, may live in housing facilities of their own choosing. All other single undergraduates who do not return to their homes each evening must reside in housing facilities maintained by the University.

B. Students who will have earned 86 semester hours of credit as of August 31, but who will not have reached their twenty-first birthday on or before September 30, must file a statement of parental consent with the office of Student Life Administration with their request to live in housing facilities other than those maintained by the University.

INTERPRETATION OF HOUSING POLICY

A. Returning students who are making housing arrangements in the spring for the next academic year may live in housing facilities of their own choosing, if they will become 21 years of age on or before September 30.

B. Returning students who are making housing arrangements in the spring for the next academic year may live in housing facilities of their own choosing if they earn 86 semester hours of credit by August 31 of this year.

C. Students who are matriculating in September may live in housing of their own choosing if they will become 21 years of age on or before September 30 of this year.

D. Students who will have earned 86 semester hours of credit by the last day of spring semester may live in housing facilities of their own choosing for the summer sessions.

E. Students may live in housing of their own choosing for the summer sessions if they become 21 years of age on or before the last day of the spring semester.

F. Students who have had one year or more of active duty in the Armed Forces may live in housing facilities of their own choosing.

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G. Returning students who are members of fraternities may live in fraternity housing in the next academic year if eligible according to fraternity policy.

H. Students who otherwise are not eligible to live in housing of their own choosing, but who wish to live with relatives (aunts, uncles, grandparents, and older, usually married, brothers and sisters) must be granted permission.

To make application to be an exception to the housing policy or to request to live with a relative, students should contact the office of Residence Hall Programs, lower level, Mills Hall."

The housing policy of Indiana State University is published in the Indiana State University Undergraduate Bulletin 1970-72, in the Code of Student Conduct and in the Student Handbook, all of which publications are made available to all incoming students of the University, including each of the plaintiffs herein. Plaintiffs were or should have been fully aware of the housing policy then and there in effect at Indiana State University prior to their registration at the University.

Plaintiffs, Robert Charles Buksar, Michael Duane Barnette, Christine A. Wheeler, Joe L. Sharp, Jr. and Gwendolyn Marie Locke, in accordance with the University housing policy, signed a housing contract with the University and either applied for exception to the housing policy, release from housing contract, or both, which applications were denied. Each of said plaintiffs were notified by University officials that if their housing contract was not paid as agreed, their registration would be cancelled. Plaintiffs, Robert Charles Buksar, Christine A. Wheeler and Gwendolyn Marie Locke, each paid the amounts due on their housing contract and are now in good standing at the University. Plaintiffs, Michael Duane Barnette and Joe L. Sharp, Jr., have failed to pay sums owing on their housing contracts and their registrations at the University have been cancelled. It is the finding of this Court that the housing policy of Indiana State University was well known to plaintiffs before enrolling as students at the University; that the procedures used by the University to enforce the housing policy of the University and to collect monies due the University were reasonable and fair and that the constitutional rights, privileges and immunities of the herein named plaintiffs were in no way abridged by the action taken by the University to enforce its housing policy and to collect monies due the University from Plaintiffs. It is further the finding of this Court that the herein named plaintiffs' applications for exception to the housing policy, or for housing contract release were properly processed and said plaintiffs were given adequate opportunity for hearing thereon and for administrative appeal from the ultimate decision thereon.

Indiana State University Board of Trustees has been granted the power, by the Indiana State Legislature, to make rules and regulations for the good government and management of the University and of each department thereof and to prescribe rules and regulations of the admission of students. The power of said Board of Trustees necessarily includes the power to pass all rules and regulations which the Board of Trustees considers to be for the benefit of the health, welfare, morals and education of the students.

Proper housing for students is an integral part of the responsibility placed upon Indiana State University Board of Trustees. The great majority of the students must have a home away from home while attending school at the University, and it is incumbent upon school authorities to see that all precautions are taken to insure that not only adequate but also suitable housing is available.

Before a student is permitted to attend classes at the University, he must comply with the housing regulations. This has the effect of being a condition precedent to enrollment in the University. There

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is no absolute and unequivocal right belonging to any individual to attend the University free of any restrictions or rules pertaining to admission. Indiana State University Board of Trustees has found it desirable, expedient and for the good of the University as well as the students to require them to live in the designated housing insofar as it is available. To accomplish the end in view, the housing regulations were put into effect as part of the requirements for admission to the University. This court finds that said regulations are fair and reasonable in all respects and are not arbitrary and capricious.

The housing policy of the University has been carefully planned and implemented and is one which best serves the individual student's educational and moral needs as well as the educational mission of Indiana State University and the State of Indiana. The housing policy of Indiana State University is an integral part of the overall educational mission of the University and a necessary part thereof.

It is further the finding of this Court that post war expansion and a general population increase in the State of Indiana made it necessary for Indiana State University to expend great sums of money for buildings to house students. It is within the power of the State acting through an administrative agency (Indiana State University Board of Trustees) to provide such facilities, and when it is necessary for rules to be passed to provide payment for such buildings and furtherance of the object to be accomplished, such rules are valid as a means accompanying the overall policy of furnishing the needed facilities.

The housing facilities at Indiana State University were provided for the purpose of providing for the needs of University students. It was the education and moral development goals to be attained which the housing policy is designed to accomplish which motivated the construction of the dormitories in recognition of the expanding demands upon the educational facilities if the citizens of Indiana were to be best served. The fact that the probability of maximum occupancy may have been a consideration affecting the ready availability and lower cost bond issue financing does not provide the reason for the housing policy which itself implements the goals motivating the construction of dormitories. The Court finds that the housing policy at Indiana State University does not become unconstitutional as to plaintiffs or others similarly situated because one of the reasons for such housing policy may be the repayment of the cost of such housing facilities.

Plaintiffs have voluntarily chosen to enroll at Indiana State University with full knowledge of the rules and regulations applicable to students at the University and plaintiffs are therefore bound to abide by said rules and regulations which the Court finds are reasonably calculated to enhance the total educational experience of the student.

The Court further finds that the classification of students to whom the housing regulations apply to wit: All students under the age of 2l years and who have earned less than 86 semester hours of credit, are a group classification reasonably calculated to best serve those students who m9st need the training which on-campus living provides. The application of this policy to that particular group does not deny members of the group (including plaintiffs) equal protection of the laws nor is said group classification discriminatory constitutionally.

Certain exceptions are permitted to the housing policy for those students who have earned more than 86 semester hours of credit, who have had one or more years of active duty in the Armed Forces, who are members of a fraternity, or who live with relatives off campus. This Court finds that the exemption provisions are reasonable and non-discriminatory and do not prejudice the rights of other students, including plaintiffs, at Indiana State University.

It is further the finding of this Court that requiring students to live in on-campus housing environment does not unreasonably restrict a student's right of privacy.

Finally, it is the finding of this Court that the Indiana State University housing policy is one of long standing, based upon sound, educational and moral principles and is one best suited to the educational and moral training of students at Indiana State University. It is further the finding of this Court that Indiana State University housing policy does not violate the constitutional rights of plaintiffs in this case.

The Court has jurisdiction of the parties and subject matter of the action. Title 28 U.S.C. Section 1343(3) and (4).

The plaintiffs have each failed to maintain their burden of proving by a preponderance of the evidence all of the essential elements and alleged facts of each element.

The law is with the defendants and against each of the plaintiffs.

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That the housing regulations in effect at Indiana State University were adopted and defined by Indiana State University Board of Trustees as a valid exercise of the power conferred upon Indiana State University Board of Trustees to prescribe rules for admission to the University and to establish those regulations which they deem to be in the best interest of the University and its students.

That the housing regulations in effect at Indiana State University are a reasonable exercise of the power and discretion of school authority. That the Indiana State University housing regulations do not infringe on the constitutional rights of plaintiffs nor do they deny plaintiffs any rights, privileges and immunities granted to plaintiffs by the 9th, 13th or 14th Amendments to the United States Constitution. That the classifications included within Indiana State University housing policy have a reasonable connection with the educational mission of Indiana State University and do not violate plaintiffs' rights of due process and equal protection of the law.

That the plaintiffs are not entitled to the relief sought in plaintiffs' complaint and plaintiffs' petition for permanent injunction against defendants is therefore denied.

#### JUDGMENT

It is therefore considered, ORDERED, ADJUDGED and DECREED that the housing policy of Indiana State University presently maintained and enforced by the defendants does not violate the constitutional rights of plaintiffs as guaranteed by the United States Constitution and

It is further ORDERED, ADJUDGED and DECREED that the housing policy of Indiana State University is not an unreasonable or arbitrary exercise of the power given to said Board of Trustees by the Legislature of the State of Indiana. Judgment is therefore rendered in this cause in favor of the defendants and against the plaintiffs and plaintiffs prayer for injunctive relief is hereby denied.

Judgment is therefore rendered against the plaintiffs and for the defendants, that plaintiffs recover nothing from the defendants and their action be and is hereby DISMISSED with prejudic<sup>e</sup> and with the costs assessed against the plaintiffs in the sum of \$\_\_\_\_\_\_.

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#### INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

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With Market

September 16, 1972 Terre Haute, Indiana

## SECTION I

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Arrow Room, Hulman Center, Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana, at 9:00 a.m., E.S.T., September 16, 1972. Members present were Board President, William L. Hitch; Secretary, Hugh D. McQuillan; Mr. James D. Acher; Mr. Herbert I. Lamb; and Mr. John E. McCutchan. Members absent were: Vice President, Nancye T. Mitchell; and Assistant Secretary, James T. Morris. President Rankin, President Rice and Vice Presidents Hardaway, Moulton, Schomer, Townsend and Truitt were present. Also attending were Dr. James E. Rentschler, Assistant to the President; Dr. Elmer S. Ciancone, President of the Faculty Senate; Mr. Paul O'Dell, President of SGA; and Miss Connie Kirkpatrick, Editor of the STATESMAN.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Hitch called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

#### A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING, JULY 29, 1972

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the minutes of the July 29, 1972 meeting were approved as corrected (Mr. Lamb asked that the word "reschedule" on page 3, paragraph 2, be changed to read "schedule").

#### B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held on October 21, 1972. The Executive Session will be on Friday, October 20.

#### C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

#### Summer Activities

The President reported on developments during the summer. He noted that it had been a very busy summer due in a large part to the early starting date of the fall semester. He said that the staff had devoted a great deal of time during the latter weeks of the summer preparing the ten-year projection for the Commission for Higher Education. He added that the reports from all the state institutions have now been sent to the Commission.

The President said that ISU's exhibit at the State Fair compared most favorably with others and that the University had received many compliments on the quality of the work done by our staff. He called attention to the fact that an ISU coed, Miss Vicki Sotak, was named "Miss Indiana State Fair."

The University also had an exhibit at the Black Festival in Indianapolis, where another ISU student, Miss Linda McClendon, was named "Miss Black Indiana."

Commencement was held as scheduled and went very well. The President said that Eldon Johnson, Vice President of University of Illinois, was greatly pleased with the growth of the University and was most grateful for the honors conferred on him. He wanted the President to convey his appreciation to the Board.

Despite the extremely short time between the close of the second summer term and the start of the fall semester, registration went very well. We did not experience the usual problems associated with the opening of a new academic year.

#### Enrollment

President Rankin said that enrollments for the fall semester are holding up better than was anticipated last December. He pointed out that final figures are not yet in but we will have an enroll-ment of over 13,000. He added that it is difficult to present accurate figures because approximately 200 late registrants have not yet been processed. He noted that Evansville enrollments slightly exceed those of last year and remarked that this is quite an achievement considering the fact that enrollments, generally, are not up to predictions. He expressed his appreciation to the University High School Relations Department and to others who had worked hard presenting ISU's picture to prospective students.

The President commented that it was difficult to account for the fact that enrollments were either down, holding or having very slight increases. He said he believed that no new factors could account for this; he noted that approximately the same number of seniors were coming out of the high schools and that to increase enrollments would mean taking from another institution or

admitting more out-of-state students. He pointed to the rising fees in Indiana and said this might be a factor. He explained that Indiana is an expensive state in terms of costs (in fact, it is among the most expensive states in the country) and that scholarship funds in Indiana are not as generous as in some states. High costs have prompted many students to stay in their own communities and enroll at regional campuses. The lack of employment opportunities for graduates lead some people to develop a questionable attitude toward the value of a college education. The President thought that the new programs emerging at the Ivy Tech campuses in occupational fields will attract many students. President Rankin pointed out that the Commission's moratorium on new programs may have had some effect on enrollments. He noted that a great deal of interest was shown in our Clinical Psychology program and estimated that we have had at least fifty more students if the program had been started this fall.

Some interesting trends were evident the President said. Nursing is up substantially and, in general, the social sciences have tended to drop. He stated this is a trend around the country; students seem to be most interested in the social service areas.

#### Residence Halls

The occupancy in the residence halls has exceeded expectations and it was necessary to open another hall this fall. The figures indicate a 90% occupancy; if the assignment of single rooms to some students is considered, the figures would show a 97½% occupancy. The President noted that some 300 students have requested single room occupancy and he was pleased that the University has been able to provide more flexibility in the housing areas.

#### Space Assignments

Some shifts in space assignments have been made. Because of the fire in the Art Annex, it was necessary to relocate the activities housed in that building. Some of the programs will be housed in the Shirley Warehouse Building, which the University has just acquired; and painting, photography and print-making have been assigned to the east half, first floor, Reeve Hall. Two rooms in the old library will be used for Art Education. Although the Art Department is fragmented and will be in four different places, the department is pleased with their new facilities. The Computer Center will move into the west half of the first floor in Reeve Hall. President Rankin indicated that a portion of the old part of the library will be used for museum purposes and will house the Carson Collection. The "new" wing is being turned over to a number of academic programs such as Urban Regional Studies, Department of Criminology, Center for Governmental Service, University Studies, etc. All of the building has not yet been assigned.

#### Construction Progress

The President reported on the progress of the construction projects. He said that the work on the University-Civic Amphitheater is on schedule but noted that expectations for the Student Union Building have not materialized and it will probably be late October before the work is completed.

The Library is moving on schedule and plans are being made to move into the new structure over the Christmas holidays. While the building will probably be ready before that time, it would be too disruptive to move during the semester.

#### Academic Affairs Conference of Midwestern Universities

The Academic Affairs Conference of Midwestern Universities is planning a Chicago Urban Study Center. Funds for the project will be used out of the AACMU budget, to which all participating universities contribute. The Center will be housed in the YMCA in Chicago and initial emphasis will be given to art students who would benefit from a study center close to the Art Institute and art galleries.

#### Commission for Higher Education

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The Commission for Higher Education hopes to have the first draft of their master plan on September 29th. The President said the University will have a chance to respond on October 13th. Mr. Acher pointed out that if we had to respond on October 13th, the Board would not be given a chance to study the document. He thought this was premature and that the trustees should be given an opportunity to pass judgment on the plan. President Rankin said he would discuss this with Dr. Kessler at a meeting scheduled for September 18. He said it might be possible to have a special Board meeting or perhaps pertinent sections of the document could be sent to the trustees for their individual reactions.

Mr. Lamb suggested that appropriate letters of congratulations be sent to the two girls who were chosen queens and that a letter of appreciation be directed to Dr. Schomer and others for the State Fair exhibit. The President commented that he had personally written letters to each of these people but would be glad to convey the Board's appreciation. Mr. Hitch said he thought it would be appropriate and good public relations to recognize these girls at Homecoming. Mr. Hitch then introduced Miss Connie Kirkpatrick, editor of the STATESMAN. He thanked her for arranging the tour of the STATESMAN's offices and said he was looking forward to having her at the Board meetings for the next several months. He also welcomed Dr. Ciancone, President of the Faculty Senate.

# D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

# 1. Emergency Student Loan Fund

It was proposed that an Emergency Student Loan Fund be established for the Evansville Campus as outlined in EXHIBIT A. Approval of the establishment of the loan fund and the transfer of \$10,000 from the Evansville Campus Vending Commission Fund to provide the initial funding for the loan program was recommended.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the recommendations as presented were approved.

## 3. Grants

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a. Lilly Endowment, Incorporated Regional Archives Fund--9223

The Lilly Endowment, Incorporated has approved a grant request for Indiana State University Evansville in the amount of \$70,000 for the development of regional archives over a three-year period ending August 31, 1975, to employ an archivist, a consultant and clerical personnel and to provide for related supplies and expenses, equipment and materials. The first and second annual payments will be \$25,000 each and the third payment will be \$20,000. Approval of this grant was recommended.

Mr. Lamb's initial appointment expired August 31, 1970, and on October 16, 1970, he was re-elected for a three-year term, effective August 31, 1970.

Mr. Hitch's initial appointment expired August 31, 1971, and on September 18, 1971, he was re-elected for a three-year term, effective August 31, 1971.

In accordance with the by-laws, Mr. McCutchan's term expired August 31, 1972. It was recommended that a member of the Board be elected to serve on the Indiana State University Evansville Foundation for a three-year term, effective September 1, 1972.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, Mr. McCutchan was re-elected for a three-year term, effective September 1, 1972.

#### 5. Receipt of Bids for University Center Construction

In accordance with the advertisement for bids published in THE TERRE HAUTE STAR and THE TERRE HAUTE TRIBUNE on August 14 and 21, 1972, bids for the construction of a University Center were received until 10:00 a.m., September 13, 1972, after which time the bids were publicly opened and read. The bids are presented in EXHIBIT G.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the following resolution was approved as recommended, subject to the concurrence in the awards by the Department of Housing and Urban Development and further subject to the approval of additional funding by the State Budget Agency:

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## 6. President Rice's Report

President Rice reported on the progress of some of the campus projects. He said the tennis courts will be finished early next week, the baseball diamond will be ready next month and the Westwood Lodge will be completed this fall. He also reported that the Evansville Center for Medical Education began its first year of classes with five students enrolled. He noted that Mr. Ed Fritz, president of the Virginia Corporation, donated a number of items to the Dental Technology Program.

ISUE and the University of Evansville co-hosted the AACTE School for Executives. President Rice told the Board that the planning for the Technology Building is progressing and plans will be submitted to the Board next month. He said that ISUE faculty and staff were initiating the self-study this year for the North Central Association visit and evaluation for accreditation.

#### E. PARSONS HALL AND DREISER HALL AIR CONDITIONING

In accordance with the advertisement for bids published in THE TERRE HAUTE STAR and THE TERRE HAUTE TRIBUNE on July 18 and 25, 1972, bids for the air conditioning of Parsons Hall and Dreiser Hall were received until 10:00 a.m., August 11, 1972, after which time the bids were publicly opened and read. A summary of the bids was presented as EXHIBIT B.

The committee composed of President Rankin, Mr. Lamb, and Mr. Moulton awarded the contract in the amount of \$456,150 for the work to the low bidder, Freitag-Weinhardt, Inc. The work is to be completed by March 1, 1973.

#### F. MARTINA ERICKSON PARSONS ESTATE

The assets of the Martina Erickson Parsons estate have been distributed following the death of Mrs. Parsons' sister who received a life income from the estate. Cash and securities of the approximate value of \$67,006.16 were given in fee simple absolute to the Indiana State University Board of Trustees to be held and administered as a part of and an addition to the "Parsons-Sandison ' Living Memorial Fund" heretofore established as a loan fund to aid worthy students attending Indiana State University at Terre Haute, Indiana.

#### G. TIREY MEMORIAL UNION BUILDING FIRE

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A fire occurred in the northeast section of the Tirey Memorial Union Building at approximately 2:00 p.m., Friday, August 4, 1972. The fire was confined to the exterior insulation of the air conditioning ductwork in the pipe chase adjacent to the elevator shaft in the area. The insulation there is fiber glass which is non-combustible, however, it has a backing paper and asphalted surface which serves as a vapor barrier and it was the paper and asphalted surface that burned. The fire destroyed about 20 feet of the insulation on the vertical ductwork and approximately 10 feet of the insulation of the horizontal ductwork at the third floor level. There was little smoke damage and the water damage appears to be confined to a newly-installed lay-in ceiling in a kitchen area immediately under the horizontal ductwork. The damage is estimated to be less than \$2000.

The fire occurred when a United Piping Corporation workman was trying to remove an old section of pipe by loosening a lead joint with a torch. The contractor has notified his insurance carrier of the fire and it appears that the cost of the repair of the damage will be covered by the contractor's liability insurance rather than by the University's builder's risk insurance.

#### H. AGREEMENT BETWEEN SCHOOL OF NURSING AND VIGO COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT

An agreement between the ISU School of Nursing and the Vigo County Health Department whereby students of the School of Nursing may use the Health Department's facilities for community health nursing practice was presented as EXHIBIT C. The agreement has been approved by University Counsel. Approval of the agreement was recommended.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the agreement was approved.

## I. BUDGET REQUEST, INDIANA HIGHER EDUCATION TELECOMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM (IHETS)

During the early part of August, 1972, the proposed biennial budget for the Indiana Higher Education Telecommunications System, EXHIBIT D, was approved by the IHETS Board of Directors. The legislation for IHETS requires that such budget requests be approved by the Boards of Trustees of the state public institutions prior to submission of the budget to the State Budget Agency. The submission date to the State Budget Agency was August 24, 1972. Inasmuch as the Board does not meet in August, the Trustees were polled by mail ballot on August 9, with the recommendation that the proposed budget be approved. The Trustees indicated unanimous approval of the proposed IHETS budget. The item is presented herein in order that the Trustees' action may be entered in the official record. έį.

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# J. PROPOSAL FOR AN ASSOCIATE OF SCIENCE DEGREE PROGRAM IN MEDICAL LABORATORY TECHNOLOGY

It was recommended that a Medical Laboratory Technology program, culminating in an Associate of Science Degree, be established. A description of the curriculum, with an explanation of need and application, is provided in EXHIBIT E.

The proposed program has the endorsement of the Vice President for Academic Affairs, and was approved by the Curricular and Academic Affairs Committee on May 2, 1972, by a vote of 6-1; by the Executive Committee of the Senate on July 6, 1972, by a vote of 7-0-1; and by the Faculty Senate on July 13, 1972, by a vote of 25-1 with four abstentions. Subsequent to approval by the Board of Trustees, the curriculum proposal will be submitted for appropriate action to the Indiana Commission for Higher Education.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the proposal for an Associate of Science Degree Program in Medical Laboratory Technology was approved as recommended.

(Mr. McQuillan asked why there was always one dissenting vote. President Rankin said the dissenting vote was expressed by a member of the nursing faculty who had some questions about the capabilities of the University in implementing this program. Vice President Townsend said the faculty member questioned the general education courses but told the Board that the two-year program was set up in such a way that a student would not lose credits if he decided to continue for a four-year degree.)

# K. GRANTS

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the following grants were approved:

1. Educational Opportunity Grants - Fund No. 293

A supplemental award of authorized federal expenditures in the amount of \$82,536 for initial year awards has been received from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare for the Educational Opportunity Grants program for the grant period July 1, 1972, through June 30, 1973. It was recommended that this authorization be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

2. National Direct Student Loan Fund - Fund No. 519

Official Allocation Letter dated August 30, 1972, has been received from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, authorizing federal capital contributions in the amount of \$510,478 for National Direct Student Loans to be matched with Student Service Fees in the amount of \$56,719.78 for the period July 1, 1972, through June 30, 1973. It was recommended that the total amount be made available for loans and the matching funds be transferred in accordance with the terms of the loan agreement.

3. Vocational Instructional Resource Center - Fund No. 2114-1

Funding has been received in the amount of \$33,180 from the State Board of Vocational-Technical Education to expand the operational capabilities of the Vocational Instructional Resource Center during the fiscal year 1972-73. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the original proposal.

4. Nursing Student Loan Fund - Fund No. 521

Supplemental Notice of Award No. B-7-24-0040-07-1 has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Public Health Service, in the amount of \$12,337 for nursing student loans to be matched with Student Service Fees in the amount of \$1,370.78, for the period from July 1, 1972, through June 30, 1973. It was recommended that the total amount be available for loans and matching funds be transferred in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

5. Law Enforcement Education Program - Fund No. 2055

Initial Letter of Award No. 001807-6-73-1-1 has been received from the U.S. Department of Justice, Washington, D.C., in the amount of \$14,144 to provide grants and loans under the Law Enforcement Education Program for the period July 1, 1972 through June 30, 1973. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the award letter.

6. Vocational Instructional Resource Center - Fund No. 2114-2

Funding has been received in the amount of \$8,000 from the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education for the production and dissemination of Home Economics curriculum materials by the Vocational Instructional Resource Center under the direction of Dr. Tom Reckerd. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the original proposal.

7. Vocational-Technical In-Service Teacher Training - Fund No. 2145

An official notification letter has been received in the amount of \$65,270 from the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education to provide in-service training programs in the public school systems located in the southern half of the state during the period from July 1, 1972 through June 30, 1973, under the direction of Dr. Tom Reckerd. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the award letter.

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The John W. Anderson Foundation Board of Trustees has approved a grant of \$25,000 to Indiana State University for the purchase of library books. Approval of this grant was recommended.

Note: President Rankin called the Board's attention to item No. 8. He said this grant came about through the interest of one of our students, Mrs. Susan Rosback DeMeyer, whose grandfather, Mr. Harold Rudd, is a member of the foundation's Board. The grant was probably offered primarily because of the student's satisfaction with ISU.

# L. IN MEMORIAM

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Dr. Robert H. Meyne, Chairman, Department of Recreation, and Professor of Physical Education, passed away on September 6, 1972. A Resolution, EXHIBIT F, was presented for approval of the Board.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Acher, the Resolution was approved.

## M. STADIUM GOLF COURSE SEASON TICKETS

It is necessary to raise the selling price of the Stadium Golf Course season tickets in order to meet the increased cost of operations. It was recommended that the season ticket rates be as follows:

The fee for daily play will remain the same: \$1.75 for weekdays and \$2.25 on weekends and holidays.

Discussion: Mr. Moulton said that when the University took over the management of the Stadium Golf Course, the rates at Rea Park and the Stadium were the same. The rates at Rea now are \$25 for juniors, \$30 for women and \$40 for men. Mr. Hitch asked if the recommended rates would be sufficient to operate the Stadium Golf Course. Mr. Moulton said the new rates were recommended by Mr. Donald Hilt who has been business manager of the course since the University took it over. He said he felt these rates are adequate for now.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the recommended rates were approved.

# N. POLICIES REGARDING THE USE OF UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES BY NON-UNIVERSITY AGENCIES AND GROUPS

At the July 29, 1972 meeting of the Board of Trustees, a policy statement regarding the use of University buildings and facilities by non-university agencies and groups was approved in principle. However, final approval of the specific statement of policy was deferred pending clarification and refinement. The modified policy statement is presented as EXHIBIT H. Approval was recommended.

Discussion: Mr. Hitch asked Mr. O'Dell if he and Mr. Reeves had read the modified statement. Mr. O'Dell said he did not know about Mr. Reeves but that he had read it and he was satisfied with the statement. He noted that the one item that Mr. Reeves had questioned was not incorporated in the document.

On motion by Mr. McQuillan, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the policy statement was approved.

At the close of the meeting, Mr. Hitch asked if there was any discussion. Mr. Acher asked what had happened to the two-year program in Aerospace as well as the other two-year technology programs. The President said that the programs in Electronics and Drafting and Design had been approved by the Commission for Higher Education. Vice President Townsend said the University has plans for initiating a number of two-year programs during the next ten years. He said we have not been able to move ahead with the Aerospace program (which has not yet gone through the Faculty Senate) because of the expense in acquiring on-site facilities at an airport. Mr. Acher asked if the Board could have a report on the two-year programs at their next meeting.

Mr. O'Dell said he wanted the Board to know that SGA accepted the responsibility for the recent publication DISORIENTATION HANDBOOK, even though they did not take part in writing any of the articles except those that carried their names. He said the matter of the publication of the HANDBOOK went through the SGA Senate last May and SGA was supposed to set up a committee to work on it. He failed to see that this was done. He acknowledged his mistake in handling the matter and apologized to the trustees and administrators. He further pointed out that contracting the manual did not negate responsibility of SGA. He added that he had extended his personal apologies to those people who had been maligned by the articles in the bulletin. He expressed the hope that this kind of thing would not happen again. Mr. Hitch commented that the trustees were sorry the publication happened and said he could not see how it had helped the University in any way. He added that he appreciated Mr. O'Dell's apology.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the meeting adjourned at 10:20.

#### EMERGENCY STUDENT LOAN FUND

This fund is to provide emergency loans to students whose sources of funds for schooling are temporarily delayed or unavailable. It shall be the responsibility of the Director of Student Financial Aid of the Evansville Campus to receive applications for loans and to approve such applications. It shall be the responsibility of the Business Office to obtain a signed promissory note stating the terms of the loan, to maintain a file of necessary documents and records, to disburse the loan funds, to bill the student prior to the maturity date, and to be otherwise responsible for all collection procedures.

- 1. The general purpose of the loans shall be for the payment of student fees and books.
- 2. The limit of the loans shall be for the amount of the student's tuition for the particular semester plus a reasonable amount for books and supplies.
- 3. Interest on the loans shall be at a simple interest rate of 6 percent from the date of the note until maturity and a simple interest rate of 8 percent after maturity, or a \$1.00 service charge, whichever is more.
- 4. Repayment of the loans is to be made within the semester for which the loan is granted.

# AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT made this 1st day of JUNE, 1972, by and between INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY, for its SCHOOL OF NURSING, hereinafter referred to as "UNIVERSITY" and VIGO COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF Terre Haute, Indiana, hereinafter referred to as "AGENCY",

#### WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, the VIGO COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT at the request of the SCHOOL OF NURSING has agreed to make available its facilities for community health nursing practice of students of the SCHOOL OF NURSING of the "UNIVERSITY" upon certain terms and conditions hereinafter set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION OF the mutual covenants herein contained the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The "AGENCY" will accept students of the basic baccalaureate program in nursing of the "UNIVERSITY" for field experience in community health nursing.
- 2. The number of students receiving the experience at one time and the time periods will be arranged by the DEAN of the SCHOOL OF NURSING and the HEALTH COMMISSIONER of the "AGENCY".
- 3. The students will wear the dress uniform of the SCHOOL or a white blouse and dark skirt.
- 4. Health supervision will be the responsibility of the "UNIVERSITY". Only those students who are in good health will be assigned to the "AGENCY".
- 5. The "UNIVERSITY'S" Community Health Nurse Faculty will be responsible for the guidance and supervision of the students' community health nursing experience in close cooperation with the Supervisor of the "AGENCY". There will be mutual pre-planning and an active on-going process of evaluation to assure a maximum learning experience for the students.
- 6. There will be no exchange of money involved in this arrangement.
  - Public health nursing bags for the use of students will be furnished by the a. "UNIVERSITY".
  - b. Supplies for the bags will be provided by the "AGENCY".
  - c. Transportation of the students to assignments in Community health nursing practice will be the responsibility of the students.
- 7. Each party to this AGREEMENT shall perform his duties and obligations hereunder. This AGREEMENT shall continue in full force and effect for a period of one (1) year from \_\_\_\_ and so long thereafter until terminated by either of the parties. Any party desiring to discontinue the operation of this AGREEMENT shall give to the other party at least one (1) full year's notice of its intent to discontinue the association.

# JUSTIFICATION FOR ADDITIONAL PERSONNEL

# FIELD TELEVISION ENGINEER

IHETS currently operates intracity television distribution systems in the Calumet region and South Bend/Mishawaka. In the near future as IHETS' service extends to IVY Tech, hospitals, private colleges, and industries, additional intracity television systems (CATW, ITFS, etc.) will be implemented. This growing IHETS responsibility for intracity systems generates the need for a highly-qualified full-time field engineer to assure optimum operation of the systems. The development and installation of teleprocessing facilities (remotely operated off-line video tape recorders and associated equipment) will also add to the need for services of such a highly skilled television engineer.

#### PROJECT ADMINISTRATOR

Long-range planning for interinstitutional program development calls for the production of from three to four program series per year. There will be an increasing demand on university television production and faculty time in planning and administering this kind of production. A central staff position is requested to help meet the anticipated need for a full-time administrator in this area. His responsibilities would include interfacing with producing faculty and television production centers during development of interinstitutional programs, and providing staff assistance in development of proposals and budgets for such productions.

# .201 SWITCHED VIDEO NETWORK

The statewide switched video network will need the following additions during the 73-75 biennium.

# 1. South Bend Origination - January, 1974.

A new channel is needed to permit statewide viewing of instructional programming originated from the northern part of the state. Television studio facilities to be constructed at IVY Tech South Bend will originate the first instructional television materials for shared use among the IVY Tech regional institutes. Other South Bend originations would be possible through this South Bend trunk. (Est. \$4175/month)

#### 2. Richmond Reception - September, 1974.

A new channel is needed to extend IHETS' service to Richmond, Indiana. Extension of network service to Richmond has been delayed pending relocation of Indiana University-East to its permanent campus which will be occupied in January, 1974. Service to the new campus location is needed in September of 1974. This channel would also serve IVY Tech, hospitals, and other potential educational sites in the Richmond area. (Est. \$2133/month)

# 3. <u>Vincennes University Origination</u> - September, 1974.

A new channel from Vincennes to the Terre Haute switch is needed to allow origination of instructional programs from Vincennes University produced by them for and with the cooperation of the other state universities, Indiana Vocational Technical College, and public television stations. (Est. \$2375/ month)

#### 4. Public Television Stations Connections - September, 1974.

Connection of additional public television broadcasting stations to the IHETS television network is needed for the transmission of instructional and general education programs from all origination points on the network directly to homes within the signal areas of stations in the following cities: Evansville, Indianapolis, New Albany/Jeffersonville (Louisville). IHETS service is already available to public television stations in Bloomington, Muncie, Vincennes, and the Calumet region. (Est. \$1500/ month)

#### 5. Indianapolis IVY Tech Originations - January, 1975.

Completion of television studio facilities for IVY Tech Indianapolis in January of 1975 will call for the addition of a local channel connecting that studio to the IHETS network. This connection will allow IVY Tech to originate instructional materials from Indianapolis to their regionals. (Est. \$890/month)

#### .202 STATE UNIVERSITIES VOICE NETWORK

Growth funds are requested based on traffic study projections provided by the telephone industry. This budget further anticipates increased service to IVY Tech regional institutes.

#### .203 TELETYPE NETWORK

Funds are requested to continue operation of the teletype network at the present level.

#### .204 TALKBACK

Funds are requested for improving the quality of and upgrading the present talkback system and for extending talkback service to include new receive locations on the video network.

#### .205 TELECOMMUNICATIONS RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

The field of telecommunications technology is developing rapidly; new hardware and transmission techniques are emerging each year. A continuing effort needs to be made to survey these developments and investigate their potential value to the IHETS System.

Problems and challenges unique to IHETS and the state universities will also need to be solved to improve the efficiency of IHETS and its value as a resource to Indiana education. Funds requested here will be utilized to make the latest technology available to this system and its users.

# .301 NON-EMPLOYEE SERVICES

Additional funds are requested to provide technical consulting services for engineering design and advice on technical problems in connection with IHETS responsibility for operation of Instructional Television Field Service (ITFS) and CATV connection systems in cities where service is delivered to more than one using institution.

#### .302 COMPUTER SERVICES

Increased traffic on the computer-controlled video network will require additional computer time for processing schedule information. Computer data processing is also utilized in analysis of network traffic, technical path analysis, and compilation and analysis of system utilization statistics.

#### .303 INTERINSTITUTIONAL PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

The state universities have a high commitment to the development of interinstitutional programs. However, existing university resources are not sufficient to meet the growing interest of faculties in the production of consortia programs. Supplemental funds for program development would permit increased interinstitutional sharing of resources and would encourage and reward cooperation among institutions.

These monies would in no way diminish the commitment of the universities to interinstitutional cooperation. Rather it would serve as a supplement to university resources.

Certain requirements for use of these funds may be designed to encourage multi-institutional cooperation, i.e., only projects developed by three or more of the six participating institutions would be eligible for such funding; both credit and non-credit programs would be developed. Such interinstitutional cooperation realizes a savings to the universities, and ultimately, to the taxpayers of Indiana as increased interinstitutional cooperation prevents unnecessary and wasteful duplication of needed programs by the universities.

Items 1-3 The office furniture and equipment is necessary for additional new staff.

- Item 5 A truck, van type, is required for the transport of the field engineer and his tools, equipment and spare parts.
- Item 6 An Instructional Television Fixed Service Transmitter/Repeater Calibrator is required to permit observation and adjustment in the field of the frequency, amplitude, phase and differential response of the 2500 MHz television transmitters operated by IHETS.
- Item 7 A portable spectrum analyzer is required to facilitate observation of received television signals with particular regard for possible interference from other commercial and non-commercial transmission.

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#### A NARRATIVE FOR THE MEDICAL LABORATORY TECHNOLOGY (MLT) ASSOCIATE OF SCIENCE DEGREE PROGRAM

Associated with the Allied Health Professions are the needs for laboratory assistance ranging over several types of assignments. Included among these is Clinical Laboratory Technology. Technicians trained under this program perform the more basic laboratory tests and procedures, thus relieving the more highly skilled medical technologists for the completion of specialized, advanced laboratory work. Through a program of Medical Laboratory Technology, beginning laboratory workers (known as Certified Laboratory Assistants) may upgrade their skills professionally.

Currently there are fifty medical laboratory technology programs in the United States. The demand for products of these programs is far greater than the supply.

The Medical Laboratory Technology program proposed is based on a total requirement of sixty semester hours. Of this number, twenty-five hours will be utilized in general education and cognate course requirements with thirty-five semester hours for courses taught by the Life Sciences Department at the University. Included in the thirty-five hours are four courses yet to be approved which are designed to provide the student with basic laboratory skills involving the preparation of re-agents, use of clinical balances, calibration of spectrophometers, calculations of stand deviation and confidence limits, venipuncture, immunohematology, serology, uninalysis, and the techniques of clinical microbiology and clinical chemistry.

Laboratory facilities available on the University campus and at the two local hospitals are expected to satisfy laboratory facilities needs.

The program is part of a "two-plus-two" design in that the curriculum can be absorbed into a fouryear program culminating in a baccalaureate degree.

The proposed program will culminate in an Associate of Science degree. Responsibility for the administration of the program is assigned to the Department of Life Sciences, the College of Arts and Sciences.

## POLICIES REGARDING USE OF UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES BY NON-UNIVERSITY AGENCIES AND GROUPS

#### INTRODUCTION

Indiana State University resources, facilities, and services are utilized primarily and most directly for the benefit of students at the institution and for scholarly and supportive pursuits of faculty and staff. The University must make available its facilities to a variety of groups in order to encourage a wide sharing of information. If it is to be true to its historic mission, the University may not pass judgment on the merits of the information so long as the information is presented in a manner that does not infringe upon the rights and privileges of others.

In addition, the University recognizes its obligation to extend its benefits to its communities-at-large. These benefits bring together students, scholars, and the public in educational and cultural settings both on campus and off campus. University-connected projects concerned with the solution of societal, environmental, business, or industrial problems often involve students, faculty, and repre-sentatives of the communities-at-large to mutual advantage. This interactivity becomes a valuable part of the students' educational experience and works toward the common good.

The University has established policies and procedures for maximum benefit and utilization of its resources, facilities, and services. The policies and procedures include safeguards and administrative guidelines, and define the University's obligations to matriculated students, the faculty, the staff, and the public.

#### DEFINITION OF FACILITIES

The facilities of the University as defined by this policy include all buildings and grounds owned or leased by the University. Space within the buildings and grounds is of three types: (1) Dedicated, (2) Semi-public, (3) Public.

#### Dedicated

The dedicated space is defined as space used primarily to serve and support the educational, cultural, living, and recreational functions of the University. Although such areas may be used by the public, University functions have priority. Examples of such space are: classrooms, laboratories, libraries, residence halls, restricted parking areas, recreational facilities (with the exception of the Stadium golf course), intramural and athletic fields.

#### Semi-public

The semi-public space areas are defined as space available for use by internal and external individuals, groups, organizations, associations, private business, etc., on a reservation only basis. Normally, non-University organizations will pay for the use of such space. Examples of such space are: Tilson Music Hall, ballrooms, and meeting rooms in various buildings such as Tirey Memorial Union, Hulman Center and the University-Civic Amphitheater.

#### Public

The public space areas are defined as those which accommodate traffic flow, and facilities of the University open to the public for their use and pleasure, such as the Gourmet Room and the Snack Shop in Hulman Center, and the cafeteria and grill in the Student Union Building. These areas are defined to include sidewalks, campus streets and drives, entrances to buildings, lobbies and corridors in classroom and office buildings and semi-public facilities, and commons areas in the residence halls and Tirey Memorial Union.

#### POLICY STATEMENTS

- 1. Every person with legitimate business at the University has the privilege of free access to the public areas of the buildings and grounds during those hours when they are open, such hours to be determined by the President or a University official designated by him.
- 2. Space in those lobbies which are designated public areas as defined by this policy may be reserved by recognized student, faculty, or staff organizations. Public groups, organizations, or agencies may reserve these areas for purposes other than recruitment for employment or which are intended to culminate in recruitment for employment, if approved by the administrative office designated for this purpose by the President of the University.
- 3. Reservations for the use of lobby areas and for the use of the semi-public space areas must be made with and approved by the University official responsible for the space requested. The University President or his representative reserves the right to deny the use of areas if the President or his representative determines that access by the group is disrupting the normal operation of the facility or the University. Soliciting for monetary reasons or selling will not be permitted in the public areas except in cases of student groups whose activities are approved through the Student Activities Office.
- 4. Agencies coming to the campus to recruit full-time employees must make reservations for space and schedule with the Placement Bureau. The Bureau will schedule personal interviews in the facilities of the Bureau or in semi-public areas if the facilities of the Bureau do not accommodate the demand.

Recruiting agencies wishing to exercise their function near a heavy traffic area may reserve a room at a regularly established rental rate. Reservations for facilities of this nature must be made with the person responsible for the building in which the space is located.

5. Agencies coming to the campus to recruit students for part-time or temporary employment may make reservations for space with the student employment staff in the Financial Aids Office.

All confirmations, notices and demands upon this corporation may be delivered by the brokers verbally or in writing, or by telegraph, or by telephone to any such officer and he is authorized to empower any person, or persons, that he deems proper, at any time, or times, to do any and all things that he is hereinbefore authorized to do. 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### INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

October 21, 1972

### SECTION I

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Arrow Room, Hulman Center, Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana, at 9:00 a.m., E.S.T., October 21, 1972. Members present were: Board President, William L. Hitch; Vice President, Nancye T. Mitchell; Mr. James D. Acher; Mr. Herbert I. Lamb; and Mr. John E. McCutchan. Members absent were: Secretary, Hugh E. McQuillan; and Assistant Secretary, James T. Morris. President Rankin, President Rice and Vice Presidents Hardaway, Moulton, Schomer, Townsend and Truitt were present. Also attending were Dr. James E. Rentschler, Assistant to the President; Dr. Elmer S. Ciancone, President of the Faculty Senate; Mr. Paul O'Dell, President of SGA; Mr. Charles Reeves, Vice President of SGA; Miss Connie Kirkpatrick, Editor of the STATESMAN; and Dr. William R. Osmon, Dean of Student Administrative Services.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Hitch called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING SEPTEMBER 16, 1972

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. Acher, the minutes of the September 16, 1972 meeting were approved.

B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held on November 18, 1972. The Executive Session will be on Friday, November 17.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Rankin said he had a number of announcements and matters of interest to bring to the attention of the Board which he thought should be entered in the minutes of the Board's meeting.

### National Drivers Excellence Contest

Indiana State University will be the site of the National Drivers Excellence Contest to be held next May. The President said this was a compliment to our Drivers Training Program.

# Continuing Education for Women

A very interesting article appeared in the local newspapers concerning ISU's program for continuing education for women, directed by Dr. Harriet D. Darrow. The article is a tribute to Dean Darrow and the excellent work she is doing in this very important program. (The article was circulated to the trustees.)

### Jails and Lockups

The publication, JAILS AND LOCKUPS IN INDIANA, is the report of a survey completed by ISU's Assistant Professor of Criminology, Mr. Robert G. Culbertson, and Mr. James A. Decker, an intern in Criminology at Indiana State. The survey has received wide coverage in the <u>Indianapolis Star</u>. President Rankin said there is a strong student interest in this field and pointed out that Indiana State has a growing Criminology Department.

### Top Awards in Geography

Two Indiana State University graduate students won the top student awards for papers presented at the annual meeting of the West Lakes Division of the Association of American Geographers in St. Louis. Joseph V. Gardner, a doctoral student, won the top Ph.D. award and William J. Todd, a masters student, won the top masters level award.

#### College Athlete of the Month

Bob Poss, co-captain of ISU's varsity football team, was named College Athlete of the Month by The Sport Magazine. Copies of the article will be mailed to the Trustees.

NOTE: The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in Executive Session at Terre Haute, Indiana, Friday evening, October 20, 1972. Those in attendance were Mr. Hitch, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. Achur, Mr. Lamb, Mr. McCutchan, President Rankin, President Rice, Vice Presidents Moulton, Townsend. Truitt and Hardaway. Attending a portion of the meeting were Dean Lewis W. Yoho, Dr. Ivan W. Bates and Mr. James Sullivan.

### Grant Awards - Department of Life Sciences

The Department of Life Sciences has received a total of \$207,000 from outside grants for this current year. Although most of the grants are from the Federal government, the department has received awards from the Indiana Power and Light Company, Indiana Academy of Sciences, Monsanto Corporation, and others. The President commended Life Sciences for this impressive record, adding that this department has developed a strong research orientation through the years, particularly so since Vice President Townsend has been here.

### Women in Higher Education

President Rankin and Dr. Julia Curtis, Associate Professor of Speech, attended the national meeting of the American Council on Education on October 4-6. The Council's theme this year was "Women in Higher Education." President Rankin said that this meeting is one of the largest educational conferences in the United States. The papers presented at the meeting have been placed in ISU's library. The main point that came out of this meeting was that educational institutions must demonstrate a good faith effort in the recruitment of women and minorities. This is required in guidelines just released by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Dr. James Rentschler, ISU's Affirmative Action Program Director, will continue to devote the necessary time to promote our compliance with these guidelines. President Rankin pointed out that Dr. Curtis, acting chairwoman of the Commission on the Status of Faculty Women at ISU, presented her committee's report to him late in the summer but that he had not yet had a chance to study it. He said he intends to do this just as soon as possible and follow up with appropriate action.

#### Student Legal Counseling Service

The Student Legal Counseling Service approved in principle by the Board in July 1972, is now in operation. The President announced that Mr. Darrell E. Felling has been appointed as attorney for this service and added that he was pleased that the University could provide this service for the students. He commented that it has been difficult to find a qualified person for this position but believes we are fortunate in Mr. Felling's availability.

### Fall Enrollment

Total enrollment for the Terre Haute Campus is 13,508, a drop of 494 students from last year (3.66% decrease). This total includes 1,597 graduate students, an increase of 171 students or nearly 11% over that of last year; and 11,401 undergraduates, 664 less than last year. On the Evansville campus, enrollment totaled 2,648, an increase of 24. The Extension Centers dropped off approximately 20%, and correspondence study was down 9%. President Rankin said Indiana State was not alone in this phenomenon. At the recent meeting of the American Council on Education, of eight presidents from universities similar to ISU, six reported enrollments down; the other two said their enrollments held or were up very slightly. This seems to reflect a general trend around the country. He noted that the Admissions staff and the University-High School Relations staff are working hard to tell Indiana State's story in recruiting prospective students. The President pointed out that enrollment drops result in reduced income which creates budget problems. He said that the staff is giving consideration to the impact this will have on the budget. He said this is a difficult and complicated step for the University to take as it can lead to misunderstanding and friction but added that it was a very necessary step and one which we must face realistically.

### Names for Rooms in Student Union Building

The Student Union Board has written to President Rankin suggesting names for some of the rooms in the Student Union Building. Since the Board has always approved the names for buildings, halls, rooms, etc., he said he assumed that the trustees would prefer that he bring recommendations to them rather than proceed on his own initiative. He thought he could come to the Board next month with specific recommendations.

### Construction Progress

President Rankin reported that the Student Union Building is not yet ready. The new Grill is partially in use and the East Ballroom is virtually complete and has been used for meetings; the new lounge, which is larger and more attractive, is now open, but not quite complete. Work on the University-Civic Amphitheater is on or ahead of schedule. The President showed color charts which suggested shades of orange and yellow for the interior of the building, and blue and white for the locker rooms. He said if the trustees had any strong reactions to these colors, now was the time to express them; however, no one objected to the color schemes.

Mr. Lamb said he would like to bring out a point concerning the patio around the Student Union Building. He told the trustees that he had walked in that area after the last heavy rain and said he found portions of the patio to be "like basins filled with water." He added that he did not think this condition should be accepted until better drainage is provided. Mr. Reeves said he had noticed cracks in the concrete on the patio and wondered if the waterproofing work that was being done would seal these cracks. Mr. O'Dell also said the cracks were quite obvious. Mr. Ewing Miller said he had not seen the patio but commented that it is usual, when a room of any size is put under ground and constructed with a concrete roof, to have surface cracks and other such problems. Mr. McCutchan said that he did not believe that such had to be the case. Mr. Hitch asked Mr. Miller to look into this matter.

### Presentation to Mr. Lamb

At this point President Rankin and Mr. Hitch presented the past president's memento to Mr. Lamb and told him it was given with the affection and appreciation of all the trustees for his service as board president during 1971-72.

- D. EVANSVILLE REPORT
  - 1. University Center
    - a. Preliminary Report

A report of the status of the University Center construction was presented. As of October 12, 1972, the Food Service Equipment plans and specifications are being revised and a decision relative to the carpeting is being studied; a request for additional funding had been submitted to the Commission for Higher Education and to the State Budget Committee. President Rankin announced that the Commission for Higher Education has approved this request and we are now awaiting the State Budget Agency's approval. Mr. Moulton said there are some bonding problems on this particular project because there was a mistake in the 1971 legislation which approved additional funding for the Terre Haute Campus rather than for the Evansville Campus, but he said the State Budget Agency is aware of this and he expects the project to be approved without delay.

b. Interim Financing

It is necessary to obtain interim bank loans to provide funds for the construction of the University Center until the loans can be retired from the proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized to finance the project. On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the following resolution was approved as recommended.

- WHEREAS, there exists a need for the construction of the University Center on the Evansville Campus of Indiana State University, and
- WHEREAS, it is necessary for temporary financing until such time when loans can be retired from the proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized to construct the facility;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that J. K. Moulton, Vice President for Business Affairs and Treasurer of Indiana State University be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to negotiate for such temporary financing as may be required; and he is hereby authorized and directed to execute on behalf of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees such application forms, agreements, notes and other documents as may be required in the making of said loans for temporary financing.
- 2. Applied Science and Technology Building
  - a. Application for Construction Grants

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the following resolution was approved as recommended:

- WHEREAS, the Indiana State University Board of Trustees did by appropriate resolution at a regularly scheduled meeting held on May 15, 1971, determine the need for the construction of an Applied Science and Technology Building on the Evansville Campus of Indiana State University, and
- WHEREAS, the State Budget Agency, the State Budget Committee and the Governor of the State of Indiana did on May 17, 1972, approve the appointment of Hironimus-Knapp-Given-Associates as architects and Ewing Miller Partnership as design architects and authorized the University to proceed with the project, and
- WHEREAS, the project is eligible for grant consideration by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the President or the Vice President for Business Affairs and Treasurer of the University be authorized to submit applications for a Title I grant and an interest subsidy grant for the Applied Science and Technology Building to the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

### b. Schematic and Design Development Plans

Mr. Ewing Miller and Miss Mary Ann Knight of Ewing Miller Partnerships, Inc., presented the schematic and design development plans for the Applied Science and Technology Building for the consideration of the Board.

The two-story building will contain approximately 45,000 square feet and will be cut into the grade so that the ground floor will be at grade level and come out onto a service drive. It is designed so that two more stories may be added at a later time. The ground floor will contain the core curriculum programs in groupings: power processing, metal processing, wood working, plastics, communications, power mechanics. Clean labs, computers, all machinery, shop benches, drill presses, etc., will be housed on the ground floor. Some of the small labs will be equipped with benches and stools with backs so that the labs can double for classrooms. b. Schematic and Design Development Plans (Continued)

The shop labs, learning center, AV room, faculty offices, dean and assistant dean's offices, conference room, classrooms, duplicating and photography teaching areas, drafting rooms, and an informal lounge will be on the second floor. All offices and other areas will be easily accessible to students.

The stairways, mechanical pods and duct work have been pulled to the outside of the building so that expansion can be made in the future without any great difficulty.

The basic schematics do not define materials. The large academic area will have a ceiling that projects out in forceful overhangs and a strip of glass goes all away around to protect windows from wind and rain. Two major pods will carry the ventilating equipment from the basement.

It is planned that carpet material made of rejected airplane tires will be installed in the shop areas for acoustical control and ease of maintenance. Mr. Hitch asked President Rice if the plans meet with the approval of the thinking of the Evansville Campus. President Rice said they had relied heavily on Mr. Petry, the consultant on this building, and that discussions with IVTC had been held so that duplication in laboratories would not occur; he said the staff of the Evansville campus does approve of the plans.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Acher, the design development plans were approved.

3. Budget Adjustments

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the following appropriation transfer was approved as recommended:

### 4. <u>Grants</u>

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the following grant was approved as recommended:

National Defense Student Loan Program--Fund No. 9502

Official allocation of \$66,490 federal capital contribution has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for the National Defense Student Loan Program for the fiscal year 1972-73. Matching funds equal to one-ninth of the federal contribution or \$7,387.77 is provided by the University from the Student Reserve Fund.

### 5. President Rice's Report

President Rice told the Board that President Rankin, Mr. Miller and he had visited Graceland College to see the Health, Physical Education and Recreation facility to get some ideas for ISUE's future planning. He said that the North Central Association Self-Study has now begun. A series of discussions have been held with officials from Oakland City College, Vincennes University, and Purdue regarding development projects. He reported that discussions with IVTC regional directors, President Renner, President Rankin and others had proved very fruitful and productive. President Rice attended the American Council on Education Conference and brought back papers for the faculty to study. Officers of the ISUE Foundation were reelected for another year at their annual fall meeting. President Rice met with representatives of the Foundation's Advisory Board to review the Master Plan of the Commission. He said the American Medical Accreditation Association visited both Terre Haute and Evansville campuses. In this connection, President Rankin said the Association had no complaints or suggestions and seemed interested in knowing the administration's attitude toward this kind of program.

### E. 1973-75 OPERATING APPROPRIATION RECOMMENDATION

The Commission for Higher Education announced its biennial operating appropriation recommendations for the state universities, except the Indiana Vocational Technical College, on September 28, 1972. The recommendation has since been changed and a copy of the revised recommendation is presented in EXHIBIT A.

Mr. Moulton said the methodology used by the Commission staff is as follows: (1) the base year (1972-73) was accepted as presented; (2) the current staffing and class ratios were held constant until valid data indicating a need for a change are collected and presented; (3) our requested increases were reviewed in light of current trend information, tentative long range plan recommendations, and mission assignments; and (4) the current enrollment projections were accepted as presented for the basic analysis pending receipt of actual enrollment figures.

President Rankin said this appropriation recommendation is still under study and that the Commission is planning to spend a half-day at Indiana State reviewing the budget before making final recommendations. N. A

### F. IN MEMORIAM

Dr. George David Koch, Professor Emeritus of Geography, passed away on September 19, 1972. A Resolution, EXHIBIT B, was presented for approval of the Board. On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the Resolution was approved.

### G. INDIANA PLAN FOR POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION

Copies of the Indiana Plan for Postsecondary Education had been distributed to the trustees. Volume I presents "The Current Status"; Volume II is entitled "A Pattern for the Future" and is a preliminary draft for public discussion. Discussion on the statewide master plan ensued.

President Rankin reported the presidents of the state institutions reacted to the preliminary draft at the October 13th meeting and reminded the trustees that a series of public hearings were being held throughout the state during the period October 16 through November 9. Two of the six hearings have been held.

The President said that copies of Volume I and Volume II had been distributed to the appropriate administrative offices, to student leadership, the Faculty Senate, Department Chairmen, and others. Copies of the remarks he made to the Commission at the October 13th meeting have also been distributed. President Rankin has met with his immediate staff, with Dr. Ciancone and his two predecessors, with the Faculty Executive Committee twice, and with Mr. O'Dell and Mr. Reeves, concerning the Master Plan. A special meeting with the Faculty Senate on October 25th has been arranged in order to obtain additional points of view about the plan.

The Board viewed a 45 minute video tape of the news conference which Dr. Kessler and Dr. Carmichael held at the time the Master Plan was released on September 29. Dr. William Osmon, who is ISU's representative on the Commission staff, was present to answer questions.

Mr. McCutchan asked if the open admissions policy mentioned in the report would require all students to have a high school diploma? Dr. Osmon said this required only that the student possess certain ability qualifications to succeed in higher education. Mr. McCutchan asked what was considered a "full-range of doctoral programs" and what institutions provide this? The Commission's definition of the Type I institution offering a minimum of twenty doctoral programs was cited. Mr. McCutchan said that last week at the Association of Governing Boards' meeting, Carnegie Commission representatives stressed the importance of the Doctor of Arts degree in the teaching profession, and he hoped the Commission would consider our DA in History and other DA programs. President Rankin said that this suggestion was incorporated in his statement to the Commission.

Mr. Hitch asked if the classifications, Type I and Type II, would continue to be used. He referred to the article published in an Evansville newspaper which quoted Mr. Beurt Servaas, Vice Chairman of the Commission, as referring to Indiana State and Ball State as "second class" institutions. He said the Board objects to having Indiana State referred to as a "second-class" institution. Mr. Acher said he thought there was an apparent attempt on the part of the Commission to delineate our admissions policy. He went on to say that although the Commission has been charged with setting up an overall plan for the state institutions, he would take high exception to any attempt on their part to delineate our admissions policy. He felt that this was a basic responsibility of the trustees and not that of the Commission.

Mr. Lamb asked why the suggested Evansville board was not made a permanent board from the very beginning? Mr. Acher said he thought the Commission was using Evansville as an example; that this interim is a two-year breathing spell for them. Dr. Osmon said he felt the Commission did not want to establish a precedent at this time.

Miss Kirkpatrick asked when ISU's Board of Trustees had met with the Commission and if we had seen Volume II before it was released. President Rankin replied that the Commission had met our Board members when the Commission met in Terre Haute last March. He added that he had not seen Volume II before it was publicly released. He said that each of the state universities had provided a staff member to assist the Commission. Dr. Osmon clarified his position by saying that the representatives from the state schools, plus a representative from the Independent Colleges and Universities in Indiana, had worked as a planning task force to develop alternatives from which the Commission could choose.

Mr. O'Dell said he thought ISU should try to coordinate efforts and work with the other universities in trying to get some changes made. He stated that many of the concerns that have been expressed are shared by the students and that he would like to see the University take some sort of direction in this. Mr. Hitch asked Mr. O'Dell if he had read President Rankin's response to this plan. He told him that the Board is going to respond to the Commission, bringing out the objections the trustees have to the plan. He said the Board is also going to send a response to Mr. Servaas in regard to the article in the Evansville newspaper which points up our objections to "Type I and Type II" classifications. He added that he, Mr. Acher, and Mr. McCutchan were going to attend the meeting in Columbus on November 9th to express the trustees' position publicly.

Dr. Ciancone pointed out that he had met with President Rankin, with the Executive Committee and that the entire Senate would meet on October 25th to determine what action the faculty should take relative to the Master Plan.

It was taken by consensus that Mr. Hitch, as President of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees, would transmit a letter to the Commission expressing the trustees' reactions to the plan. Also a letter would be sent to Mr. Servaas objecting to the statements he allegedly made in the Evansville news conference.

### H. PROCEDURE FOR VALIDATING STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION CLAIMS FOR PAYMENT

On July 29, 1972, the Board of Trustees took action which was designed to interpret the responsibility of the Treasurer of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees with respect to the custody, accounting and proper protection of all funds due and accruing to Indiana State University and the Indiana State University Board of Trustees from any and all sources. On September 6, 1972, the Student Government Association Senate introduced a resolution which was passed on September 13, 1972, and which expressed their displeasure because University officials and the Board of Trustees took an action which they felt to be in violation of Article IX of the Student Government Association Constitution. This resolution urged that the Board of Trustees as well as the Administration reconsider this action and use the guidelines established for amending the Student Government Association Constitution. As a result of this request by the Student Government Association, University officials requested an opinion from the University attorney regarding whether action taken by the Board of Trustees in their July 29 meeting violated Article IX of the Student Government Association Constitution as well as the procedure designed to modify and amend the Constitution. The University attorney's opinion is shown in EXHIBIT C.

Discussion: Mr. Reeves said he was glad that the administration is willing to reconsider this procedure but he said he was concerned because SGA did not have any input in the question that went to the attorney. He said he did not know this was going to be considered at this Board meeting. Mr. O'Dell said he thought it only fair that he and Mr. Reeves should have been given an opportunity to consult with a lawyer of their choosing. He pointed out that he had not seen Mr. Sullivan's letter until yesterday. He felt that the University had not given them adequate time to respond to the action.

President Rankin said he would like to make a comment which might promote a little understanding. He indicated that Mr. Reeves had had conversations with Dr. Truitt about this matter and that it should come as no surprise to him that the Board is reconsidering this procedure at this meeting. He said he had explained to both Mr. O'Dell and Mr. Reeves why the letter was not available before yesterday. He had pointed out to them that there was some language in the first letter that seemed to divide the authority reposed in the president and the treasurer, and that he had called Mr. Sullivan because he believed the language should be revised so that it would not be misleading as to who is the chief executive of the institution. He also pointed out to Mr. O'Dell and Mr. Reeves that the trustees had not seen the letter until Friday evening. He said he thought it might be wise to postpone any action until the students can talk to Mr. Sullivan about this. He pointed out, however, that Dr. Truitt had tried to convey the students' thinking on this. He said that Dr. Truitt is a friend of the students and wants the best for them, but if the student leadership still has questions, he suggested that the Board defer action until SGA has had an opportunity to talk to University counsel.

Dr. Truitt told the Board that because there was some question as to whether or not Article IX of the SGA Constitution is in violation with Indiana laws, he had written Mr. Sullivan to get his opinion about the matter before SGA started revisions on the present constitution. He said he did not want the student body and Senate to vote on something that is illegal and was trying to get it cleared away before any revisions were made. Mr. O'Dell said he was not questioning the intention, he was just questioning the methods.

By consent of the Board, action was deferred until the November meeting.

### I. PROPOSAL FOR A BACHELOR OF SCIENCE DEGREE IN PACKAGING TECHNOLOGY

It is proposed that a Packaging Technology Program, culminating in a Bachelor of Science degree, be established. The program responsibilities will be assigned to the Department of Industrial Professional Education, School of Technology. A description of the curriculum, with an explanation of need and application, is provided in EXHIBIT D.

The proposed program has the endorsement of the Vice President for Academic Affairs and was approved by the Curricular and Academic Affairs Committee on June 9, 1972, by a vote of 5-0-1; by the Executive Committee on the Senate on July 6, 1972, by a vote of 8-0-0; and by the Faculty Senate on July 13, 1972, by a vote of 30-0-0. Subsequent to approval by the Board of Trustees, the curriculum proposed will be submitted for appropriate action to the Indiana Commission for Higher Education. Approval of the proposed curriculum in Packaging Technology was recommended.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the proposed curriculum in Packaging Technology was approved.

### J. AGREEMENT BETWEEN SCHOOL OF NURSING AND CANTERBURY CONVALESCENT CENTRE

An agreement between the ISU School of Nursing and the Canterbury Convalescent Centre whereby students of the School of Nursing may use the Centre's facilities for clinical laboratory practice is presented as EXHIBIT E. The agreement has been approved by the University Counsel. Approval of the agreement was recommended.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the agreement between the ISU School of Nursing and the Canterbury Convalescent Centre was approved.

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Before adjourning, Mr. Hitch asked if anyone had comments. For the record, Mr. Acher said he would like to say that he appreciated the discussion the trustees had in the Executive Session regarding the University's two-year programs, and that he would like to suggest that the administration not wait but follow up religiously with these two-year programs, particularly Aviation Technology, so that the University will have something viable to go with within the next year.

Mr. McCutchan said he would like to add his support to this.

Mr. Reeves said he had met and talked with Mr. Felling and was quite impressed with his attitude and capabilities.

Mr. O'Dell said he thought Mr. Felling is going to be a tremendous asset to the students and would like to make the students aware of this.

Miss Kirkpatrick said she also was very impressed with Mr. Felling.

Mr. meeting adjourned at 12:55 a.m.

Immediately after the meeting, after a very short luncheon period, the trustees toured the Afro-American Cultural Center under the guidance of Mr. Michael A. Ard, Director of the Center.

Re: Article IX Student Government Constitution

#### Dear John:

In reply to your letter of September 21, 1972, and your oral inquiry of September 22, 1972, we have reviewed the law of Indiana as it applies to the management of University funds and it appears that the Board of Trustees of the University have been charged with the responsibility of appointing a Treasurer who shall have responsibilities for University funds and by Section 28-7106 of Burns Indiana Statutes Annotated, those responsibilities are described as follows:

"The Trustees...shall appoint a qualified person, not a member of the Board, to serve as permanent Treasurer, who shall be responsible for the receipt, custody, accounting and proper protection of all funds due and accruing to Indiana State College [Indiana State University] and the Indiana State College Board [Indiana State University Board of Trustees] from any and all sources and for whatever purposes such funds and receipts may be designated and who, before completing his duties shall give bond in an amount prescribed by the Board."

It would appear from the above quoted section of the Indiana Statutes that the Treasurer of the University has personal responsibility for the expenditure of funds and the requirement for bond would seem to emphasize this personal responsibility. The fact that the Treasurer is charged with "accounting and proper protection of all funds" would indicate a large area of discretion vested in the Treasurer so far as approval of expenditures are concerned. Mr. John W. Truitt September 25, 1972 Page 2

Article IX of the Student Government Constitution reads as follows:

"Student government shall receive into its budget a certain percent of the student activities fee and maintain control over specific expenditures subject to budgetary limitations and/or the veto of the University President on the grounds of unlawful expenditure, but with right of appeal to the Board of Trustees."

If Article IX can be read to imply that the University Treasurer does not have the right of veto on expenditures by the Student Government Association, then it would appear that said Article IX is in violation of the laws of the State of Indiana. In order to properly amend said Article IX to comply with the statutes of the State of Indiana, we would suggest that the said Article IX be amended to read as follows:

"Student Government shall receive into its budget a certain percent of the Student Activities Fee and maintain control over specific expenditures subject to budgetary limitations and/or the veto of the University Treasurer on the grounds of improper or unlawful expenditure, but with right of appeal to the University President and, ultimately, to the Board of Trustees."

We do believe that the suggested language for the Student Constitution would solve the problem and would fully comply with the Indiana law on the subject.

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE DEGREE IN PACKAGING TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENT OF INDUSTRIAL PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION

Indiana State University, Terre Haute

1. Description of the Program and Its Purpose

The program's objective is to prepare students for supervisory, managerial, and technologist positions in packaging and packaging material manufacturing and using industries, the latter of which includes almost all types of industrial, public, and transportation organizations. In addition to the university-wide 50 semester hour general education requirement, the curriculum provides a broad base of 52 to 56 semester hours of Manufacturing Technology courses and from 19 to 23 semester hours of mathematics and science.

### 2. Justification of the Program: Need Analysis--Student Demand--Employer Demand

The proposal for the establishment of a Packaging Technology curriculum at Indiana State University was initiated by members of the packaging industry in the state and by the National Paperboard Packaging Council. Subsequent investigation of the need for the program by School of Technology administration and faculty elicited very strong support for its establishment at the University by members of packaging and packaging material industries of Indiana and by the Education Committee of the Indianapolis Chapter of the Society of Packaging and Handling Engineers. Further evidence of support for the program has been a \$2,500.00 grant to the University for its development from a division of a major, nationally-known industry and gifts of equipment valued at many thousands of dollars from several other major industries.

According to a nationwide study conducted jointly by the Packaging Foundation, Inc. and Modern Packaging magazine in 1967, over 3,000 new personnel will be needed in the packaging field in the ten-year period from 1967 to 1977. This need will occur at a time when less than a dozen major universities in the United States--none in Indiana--offer curriculums in this field and when the knowledge requirements of this personnel are increasing manyfold. Special emphasis must be given to knowledge requirements in the packaging field in relationship to our rapidly increasing ecology crisis. The Packaging Foundation points out that "as packaging has become a multi-billion dollar ingredient in distribution, its need for professionalism has increased at every level . . . Suppliers and users are mutually relient on the professional competence of technical and marketing specialists whose educational base is adequate for the solution of future problems as well as those of the present . . . The fact that there is a shortage of such people has made it obvious to many individual companies and groups that support and encouragement of adequate training within the framework of institutions of higher education is the rational source for such professional strength on a continuing basis."

Although precise, current statistics of employer demand for graduates of Packaging Technology are not available, these data and statements are evidence of this demand. Student interest in such programs will grow inevitably from their observations of the opportunities for satisfying, meaningful careers in the packaging field as an outgrowth of successful completion of the program.

The convertibility of course work on the Packaging Technology curriculum to other School of Technology curriculums should be emphasized. A student pursuing a major in Packaging Technology could transfer from it either to the Manufacturing Supervision or the Manufacturing Design curriculums at the end of his freshman year with no credits lost, at the end of his sophomore year with a total of 9 credits lost, and at the end of his junior year with a total of 12 credits lost. In addition to the possibility of transfer to these two curriculums, the student also could transfer either to the Automotive or the Manufacturing Electronics curriculum at the end of his sophomore year with only a total of 9 credits lost.

### 4. <u>New Courses Necessary to Implement the Program</u>

A study of curriculums in packaging in other universities and consultation with personnel in the packaging field have revealed instructional needs related to specialized knowledge of the packaging field which have required the development of new courses. These courses are: Principles of Packaging; Packaging Materials; Package Development; Packaging Operations and Equipment; and Packaging Problems.

It is expected that these courses will be of interest to students on one or more majors in the School of Business, as well as to students pursuing a major in Packaging Technology.

### 5. Resources Required for the Program

Additional faculty will not be required until at least 1977-78, assuming the program is started in 1973. The introduction of the specialized Packaging Technology courses will require part of the time of one of the present faculty until that date.

Existing space dedicated to the program will be adequate for the Packaging Technology laboratory for the foreseeable future.

Substantial gifts of equipment which already have been received and additional equipment gifts which have been promised, together with the current special equipment budget allocation, will fulfill major equipment needs for the program.

Supply costs will be handled on an existing \$5.00 per enrollment basis on which these funds are allocated and are not anticipated to exceed \$500.00 per year until after the program has been in operation a few years.

A budget of approximately \$750.00 per year will be required to provide student workers to assist in the Packaging Technology laboratory.

Library and teaching materials needs are not so large that they cannot be provided out of current budgets.

Repair costs should not exceed \$250.00 annually.

Total annual cost for at least the first few years of the program's operation in all areas except faculty salary should not exceed \$2,000.00.

### 6. Proposed Funding of the Program

As previously noted, gifts of money and equipment already have been made to support the development of the program. Additional gifts of money and equipment have been promised after the program is in operation. With these gifts and funds already allocated for the purchase of equipment, the total annual cost of \$2,000.00 for the operation of the program would be funded through the University's regular operating budget.

### 7. Benefits of the Program

The beneficiaries of the program will be: (1) the graduates of the program, who will gain challenging and rewarding careers; (2) business and industry, which will be able to operate more efficiently and effectively as a consequence of availability of better-trained, more competent personnel; and, (3) society in general, through whatever added contributions to a better society individuals make who are realizing their greatest potential in every aspect of their daily lives and the added contributions business and industry make through a more productive economy.

### AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT made this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 1972, by and between INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY, for its SCHOOL OF NURSING, hereinafter referred to as "UNIVERSITY" and COLONIAL CREST NURSING CENTER, INC., doing business as CANTERBURY CONVALESCENT CENTRE, Terre Haute, Indiana, hereinafter referred to as "THE CENTRE".

### WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, "THE CENTRE" has agreed to make available its facilities for clinical laboratory practice of students of the School of Nursing of the "UNIVERSITY". WHEREAS, the "UNIVERSITY" has agreed to accept the offer of "THE CENTRE" and use the facilities of said "CENTRE" upon certain terms and conditions hereinafter set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION OF the mutual covenants herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

- The "UNIVERSITY" may use the facilities of "THE CENTRE" for the clinical laboratory practice of its students.
- 2. The overall assignment of students to the clinical areas will be made by the Faculty of the School of Nursing of the "UNIVERSITY" in consultation with the Administrator of "THE CENTRE" and the Director of Nursing Service.
- 3. The assignment to the clinical areas may be planned to take place at any time during the year. Specific weeks, days and hours are to be arranged with "THE CENTRE" according to the students' learning needs.
- 4. The "UNIVERSITY" Faculty will be responsible for the teaching and guidance of the students in clinical laboratory practice. The assignment of patients to the students for nursing care will be made by a "UNIVERSITY" Instructor in consultation with the Head Nurse or Supervisor of "THE CENTRE".
- 5. The Instructor will be responsible for functioning within the policies of "THE CENTRE", for maintaining high standards of nursing care and safeguarding the patients assigned to the students.
- 6. Supervision of the students' health will be the responsibility of the "UNIVERSITY". The students and faculty assigned to this clinical area for learning experiences will meet the health requirements of "THE CENTRE".

Individual consideration will be given by the "UNIVERSITY" and "THE CENTRE" to determine the time when a pregnant student or faculty member should leave the clinical area. The students who have disabilities which may not negate success in nursing practice will be admitted to selected learning experiences if acceptable to "THE CENTRE".

- 7. Evidence will be furnished to "THE CENTRE" that each student and faculty member using "THE CENTRE" for learning experience is covered by malpractice insurance.
- 8. "THE CENTRE" will supply conference rooms for the faculty and students.
- 9. Each party to this AGREEMENT shall perform his duties and obligations hereunder at no cost to the other party. This AGREEMENT shall continue in full force and effect for a period of one (1) year from \_\_\_\_\_\_, and so long thereafter until terminated by either of the parties.

Any party desiring to discontinue the operation of this AGREEMENT shall give to the other party at least one (1) full year's notice of its intent to discontinue the association.

#### INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

November 18, 1972

#### SECTION I

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Arrow Room, Hulman Center, Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana, at 9:00 a.m., E.S.T., November 18, 1972. Members present were: Board President, William L. Hitch; Vice President, Nancye T. Mitchell; Secretary, Hugh E. McQuillan; Assistant Secretary, James T. Morris; Mr. James D. Acher; Mr. Herbert I. Lamb; and Mr. John E. McCutchan. President Rankin, President Rice, and Vice Presidents Hardaway, Moulton, Schomer, Townsend and Truitt were present. Also attending were Dr. James E. Rentschler, Assistant to the President; Dr. Elmer S. Ciancone, President of the Faculty Senate; Mr. Paul O'Dell, President of SGA; Mr. Charles Reeves, Vice President of SGA; and Miss Connie Kirkpatrick, Editor of the STATESMAN.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Hitch called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Mr. Hitch welcomed the students present and said he was very glad to have them. He remarked it was the largest turnout of students since open visitation was on the Agenda.

A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING, OCTOBER 21, 1972

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the minutes of the October 21, 1972 meeting were approved.

#### B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held on December 16, 1972. The Executive Session will be on Friday, December 15.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

#### Commission for Higher Education

President Rankin asked that the record show that the Commission for Higher Education will hold a public hearing in Terre Haute on Monday, November 20, 1972, in the Cotillion Room of Hulman Center. This will be similar to the hearings held in other cities in the state at which reactions to the statewide master plan are being obtained. He said he has discussed the matter with faculty representatives, with Mr. O'Dell and with members of the University staff and that a number of people will make statements at this hearing.

#### Indiana Conference of Higher Education

The President attended the annual meeting of the Indiana Conference of Higher Education on November 9 and 10. The principal speaker was Deputy Commissioner of Education, Mr. Joseph Cosand. He said Mr. Cosand's speech was most informative but some of his statements were a little disquieting. He said Mr. Cosand was disturbed and discouraged by the number of federal controls in higher education and is considering resigning his post. The President said this would be a great loss to all of higher education.

#### American Association of State Colleges and Universities

The national meeting of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities was held in Washington, D.C., on November 13-14. President Rankin said that as chairman of this group's Federal Relations Committee, he presided at a half-day session. The speakers at this session included Mr. Cosand and the Assistant Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare. They reviewed the financial outlook in the next Congress and the President said it was his opinion that there would be funds available for student aid but that there was little hope that any would be available for institutional grants.

One session of the meeting dealt with Affirmative Action Programs and the question of discrimination against women and other minority groups in higher education. The President told the Board that if we compare ourselves with the progress of other institutions, Indiana State is not behind. He mentioned the ISU Commission on the Status of Faculty Women, which was created a year and a half ago; he said he has now had a chance to review their report, which was submitted late in the summer, and is planning to meet with this commission on November 27, to go over the report with them. Dr. Rentschler, who was appointed Director of the Affirmative Action Program last spring, is actively making efforts to assure that Indiana State complies with federal regulations. The problem is complicated by the fact that most institutions are no longer adding to staff. If institutions do not have an appropriate representation from women and minority groups now, it is going to be difficult to correct such deficiencies or to make any radical changes in the situation when there are so few openings to fill.

Another topic of concern which was reflected at this meeting is that of declining enrollments that many institutions are facing. Most of the colleges and universities throughout the country are confronted with the problem of what they can do in terms of adjusting budgets and curtailing programs.

NOTE: The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in Executive Session at Terre Haute, Indiana, Friday evening, November 17, 1972. Those in attendance were Mr. Hitch, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. McQuillan, Mr. Morris, Mr. Acher, Mr. Lamb, Mr. McCutchan, President Rankin, President Rice, Vice Presidents Moulton, Truitt and Hardaway. Attending a portion of the meeting were Mr. Paul O'Dell and Mr. Charles Reeves.

#### Indiana's Outstanding Young Woman of the Year

The President said he was pleased to report that Miss Susan Turner, an ISU graduate, was named Indiana's Outstanding Young Woman of the Year. She is the daughter of Mrs. Lucille Turner, Assistant Director, Academic Enrichment and Learning Skills Center. Miss Turner is among the winners now being considered for one of this year's Ten Outstanding Young Women of America Awards.

#### Intersession

In July 1972, the Board approved the concept of an intersession, a three-week session which would follow the conclusion of the second semester of the regular academic year (May 13-June 7). President Rankin said that the Faculty Senate has voted to favor an intersession with the recommendation that salaries be 2.67% of base salary per credit hour. He told the trustees that the summer faculty is now paid 9% (3% per hour) of their annual salary for the first three-hour course and 6% (2% per hour) for the second three-hour course, or a total of 15% for one summer term (faculty is limited to teaching two three-hour courses). Because of the seeming inequity, the administration wishes to establish a rate of 2.5% per credit hour. The Economic Benefits Committee has suggested that we pay 2.67% for each of these six hours. The President said that although this seems like a compromise, it actually is an increase from 15% to 16% for 6 hours of teaching and the University cannot take any steps at this time that would increase operating costs. He said serious and careful consideration is being given to the matter of summer salaries and as soon as a decision is reached, the intersession will be brought to the Board for consideration.

#### Student Union Patio

Last month the Board discussed the problem of pools of water standing on the Student Union patio after a heavy rain and asked Mr. Miller to investigate. President Rankin said Mr. Miller has looked into this matter and will soon advise the Board what steps are necessary to correct the situation.

#### Federal Planning Commission

The President told the Trustees that now there is new federal legislation which requires every state to have an educational planning commission if they expect to get federal funds. The President said that he is a member of a committee scheduled to discuss the tentative guidelines with Washington officials but he would be unable to go to Washington because of a conflicting schedule. The law calls for a representative planning commission but he was not informed about the possible effect of the new law on Indiana's approach to coordinating higher education.

#### D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

#### 1. Evansville Campus Curator of Alcohol

The Evansville Campus Division of Science and Mathematics has need for the use of tax-free alcohol in some of their instructional programs. It is necessary for a Curator of Alcohol to be appointed and to be responsible for storing, dispensing and record-keeping as required by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

It was recommended that the position of Purchasing Agent for the Evansville Campus, Mr. William Muller, present incumbent, be appointed as the Curator of Alcohol for the Evansville Campus of Indiana State University.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Morris, the recommendation was approved.

## 2. President Rice's Report

President Rice said that ISUE is continuing discussions with Indiana University School of Dentistry in regard to dental auxiliary education programs. He reported that the Commission for Higher Education held a public hearing in Evansville on October 27. He told the Board that discussions were held regarding the expansion of the Allied Health program with Deaconess Hospital. The self study for the North Central Association is progressing and President Rice said the first draft of the accreditation proposal is almost ready. The Varsity Club initiated another year of activities for the support of the athletic programs. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held on November 8. Mr. Hitch said the ceremonies were excellently done with several dignataries attending. The site development work on the Applied Science and Technology Building is progressing on schedule. President Rice said the consultants have almost completed their work concerning the utilities and will have this in the hands of the architects very soon.

## E. FEE REMISSION AND OTHER SCHOLARSHIPS (1972-73)

The new awards of academic scholarships for the 1972-73 academic year and the award of athletic scholarships for the spring 1972 semester and the fall 1972 semester are presented as EXHIBIT A. Approval of the scholarships was recommended.

Discussion: Mr. Reeves said that in looking through the list of athletic scholarships for spring 1972, he saw several individuals with a grade point average below what is required to stay in school. He asked for clarification. Mr. Moulton said that the Board could be assured that if the student is still in school, he meets the requirements of the institution. President Rankin said he would furnish the trustees with a report on each of the students in question but that he did not believe this should be discussed in a public meeting since this would be in violation of the student's right to privacy. He assured the Board that no one would receive a scholarship if he were not eligible.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the scholarships were approved.

#### F. GRANTS

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the following grants were approved as recommended:

1. American Chemical Society - Petroleum Research Fund - Fund No. 2146

P.R.F. No. 2741-G2 has been received from the American Chemical Society in the amount of \$7,500 awarded to Dr. Myong-Ku Ahn, Assistant Professor of Chemistry, for individual fundamental research in the petroleum field entitled "ESR Lineshapes of Iov-Pair Association-Dissociation Equilibria" for a three-year period from September 1, 1972 to August 31, 1975. The first year award is \$3,500. It was recommended that the first year award be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the original proposal.

2. Public Health Service Research Grant - Fund No. 2147 - Dr. Donald G. Dusanic

Notice of Grant Award No. 7ROIAIII369-01 TMP has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Public Health Service, in the amount of \$19,565 total direct costs, for the purpose of conducting a research project entitled "Metabolic and Immunophysiological Studies on Trypanosoma L" for the period from September 1, 1972, through August 31, 1973, under the direction of Dr. Donald G. Dusanic, Department of Life Sciences. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

3. Public Health Service Research Fellowship Grant - Fund No. 2148

Notice of Research Fellowship Award - Fellowship No. 1-F03 CA 53590-01 CAN has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Public Health Service in the amount of \$1,000 to provide a supply allowance for Dr. Jerome F. Wermuth who will be conducting research studies under the sponsorship of Dr. Charles D. Barnes, Professor of Life Sciences for the period from September 1, 1972 through August 31, 1973. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

G. SUMMER SESSION RESIDENCE HALLS RATES

The proposed residence halls rates for the 1973 Summer Session are presented in EXHIBIT B. The rates have been established on the basis of the 1972 Summer Session rates, adjusted to include the increase in residence hall rates which was effected in September, 1972. Approval was recommended.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the proposed residence halls rates for the 1973 Summer Session were approved.

H. REQUEST TO STATE BUDGET AGENCY

Although funds appropriated by the State Legislature for the purchase of land have not been allocated because of the State's financial condition, the University has made certain commitments for the purchase of land as the land became available for purchase. It was recommended that the Board approve the following resolution which requests the allocation of funds appropriated for the purchase of land:

- WHEREAS, it is necessary for Indiana State University to purchase additional property in order to provide instructional and related facilities for present and anticipated enrollment, and
- WHEREAS, the 1969-71 and the 1971-73 Capital Outlay programs of Indiana State University included specific requests for the purchase of land and improvements for campus expansion;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the President of the University be authorized to request the Commission for Higher Education, the State Budget Agency, the State Budget Committee, and the Governor of the State of Indiana to allocate for the purchase of land the amount of \$236,945 appropriated from the General Fund by Chapter 401, Acts of 1969, and the amount of \$500,000 appropriated from the Post War Construction Fund by Public Law No. 479, Acts of 1971, Indiana General Assembly.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Morris, the resolution was approved.

I. PROCEDURE FOR VALIDATING STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION CLAIMS FOR PAYMENT

On July 29, 1972, the Board of Trustees took action which was designed to interpret the responsibility of the Treasurer of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees with respect to the custody, accounting and proper protection of all funds due and accruing to Indiana State University and the Indiana State University Board of Trustees from any and all sources. On September 6, 1972, the Student Government Association Senate introduced a resolution which was passed on September 13, 1972, and which expressed their displeasure because University officials and the Board of Trustees took an action which they felt to be in violation of Article IX of the Student Government Association Constitution. This resolution urged that the Board of Trustees as well as the Administration reconsider this action and use the guidelines established for amending the Student Government Association Constitution.

## I. PROCEDURE FOR VALIDATING STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION CLAIMS FOR PAYMENT (CONTINUED)

As a result of this request by the Student Government Association, University officials requested an opinion from the University attorney regarding whether action taken by the Board of Trustees in their July 29 meeting violated Article IX of the Student Government Association Constitution as well as the procedure designed to modify and amend the Constitution. The University attorney's opinion is shown in EXHIBIT C. As a result of an appeal for reconsideration by the Student Government Association, this item was placed on the October 21, 1972 Agenda. Mr. Paul O'Dell and Mr. Charles Reeves indicated that they did not have enough time to present their case regarding this item. The Board of Trustees agreed to postpone any further action on this item until the November 18, 1972 Board of Trustees meeting. Reaffirmation of the Board's action of July 29, 1972, was recommended.

President Rankin asked Mr. O'Dell and Mr. Reeves if they had any comments to make regarding this item. They indicated they had none.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the Board's action of July 29, 1972, was reaffirmed.

## J. POLICY FOR SGA TO REQUEST LEGAL OPINIONS

On September 6, 1972, the Student Government Association passed a bill (Senate Bill #18) appropriating \$3,000 to be used to pay attorneys of their own choice to obtain legal opinions. Money was to be paid to attorneys only after a written opinion had been rendered on any particular subject. In addition to passing this Bill, a contract was signed by Mr. Paul O'Dell, President of Student Government Association, with a local attorney. The contract called for an opinion which Student Government Association wanted and the amount to be paid for this opinion was \$500.

Vice President Truitt and President Rankin did not approve the Bill passed by Student Government Association nor the contract negotiated between Student Government Association and a local attorney. The basis for this decision is that the Student Government Association is a part of the University and funds are budgeted for it like other departments within the University. Hence, if the Student Government Association needs legal opinions, it can submit a request to the Vice President for Student Affairs who in turn would have the University legal counsel furnish the opinion.

Mr. Paul O'Dell has requested under Article VII, Section 12-A-12 of the Student Government Association Constitution that this item be placed on the Agenda for the November 18, 1972 Board of Trustees meeting.

It was recommended that the Board of Trustees uphold the veto of the President and the Vice President for Student Affairs on Senate Bill #18 and approve a policy of allowing Student Government Association to request legal opinions from the University counsel through the Vice President for Student Affairs.

Discussion: President Rankin said that Mr. O'Dell and Mr. Reeves had discussed this matter with the trustees in the Executive Session. He asked them if they had any further comments to make.

Mr. O'Dell said that the trustees had indicated that they would uphold the veto of the President and the Vice President for Student Affairs on Senate Bill No. 18 and also approve the policy of allowing SGA to request legal opinions from the University counsel through Vice President for Student Affairs on the grounds that if SGA were permitted to ask for legal opinions, then other groups on campus might ask for the same right. He said he thought SGA was distinctly different from any other group, with the possible exception of the Faculty Senate, and he did not feel that other groups would seek this service. He mentioned that AAUP is allowed funds for legal defense. President Rankin said that the AAUP is a completely separate organization, and gets no funds from the University for legal counsel or any other purpose.

Dr. Ciancone said the question of Senate Bill #18 was discussed in the Faculty Senate meeting last Tuesday. He said there was a resolution to be considered but it did not reach the floor before adjournment. However, he said several opinions were expressed by faculty and most seemed to favor the students' position. The question regarding faculty groups did come up at the meeting and there were several faculty members who asked the question what would happen if a similar situation arose in regard to the Faculty Club? He asked to have an expression from the Board. Mr. Moulton said there was no similarity between the Faculty Club and SGA. He said that as far as the Faculty Club is concerned, the Board could only exercise a form of control concerning facilities. If the Faculty Club were not located on campus, the Board would have no control at all. Dr. Ciancone indicated this answer was satisfactory.

Mr. O'Dell asked if Mr. Felling would be available to SGA. Dr. Truitt replied that Mr. Felling's primary function is to counsel individual students about their problems of a legal nature, not to work up legal briefs for organizations. Mr. Hitch asked if SGA could be furnished legal opinions by Mr. Felling. Dr. Truitt said SGA could seek Mr. Felling's advice about what could be done in regard to a legal matter. President Rankin pointed out that a time element is involved since Mr. Felling is only half-time. He said individual legal counseling would be his predominate responsibility.

Mr. O'Dell asked if SGA wanted an opinion from the University counsel and went through Dr. Truitt's office, would they have any input into the question put to the University lawyer? President Rankin told him that if SGA wished legal counsel, they should approach Dr. Truitt, review the matter with him for clarification, and then they could phrase their question as they wished. He said the reason for this is to protect the law firm and the University. He pointed out that if everybody in the University were free to approach University counsel, there would be no way of determining responsibility for paying the bill.

Mr. Acher said the Board is here to govern a multi-faceted organization: faculty, administrators, students, service employees, and many other identifiable groups. He said the Board has to deal with the problems of all of them, and that if a policy is established to provide independent legal counsel for one facet, then such counsel would have to be available to the other facets. He said it was his opinion that if a group wanted to settle a situation, they did not need a lawyer; if they wanted to fight, then they needed a lawyer. He cited some of the problems over the years that had been settled without a lawyer or a lawsuit. He said he stood with the administration's recommendation on this matter.

Mr. McQuillan said we should be very careful not to issue an absolute veto to SGA. He said the Board should keep an open mind and not become too legal. Mr. McCutchan concurred with Mr. McQuillen saying that the Board should review individual situations, that he felt with the surveillance of the SGA elected officials the money would be spent wisely. He said he felt that SGA should come back to the Board if other situations should need review.

Mr. Reeves said Article No. 9 provides that SGA shall maintain control over specific expenditures, subject to budgetary limitations and the veto of the University president on the grounds of unlawful expenditure, but with the right of appeal to the Board. He said it seems to him that the Board is overriding the Student Government Constitution since this is not an unlawful expenditure. Dr. Truitt pointed out to Mr. Reeves that Article 9 is in violation of Indiana law.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the recommendation to uphold the veto of the President and the Vice President for Student Affairs on Senate Bill #18 and approve a policy of allowing Student Government Association to request legal opinions from the University through the Vice President for Student Affairs was approved.

## K. TEN-YEAR PROJECTIONS: OPERATING AND CAPITAL NEEDS (1973-1983)

On June 2, 1972, the Indiana Commission for Higher Education requested that each of the state institutions for Higher Education prepare ten-year projections of operating and capital needs for the period 1973-74 through 1982-83. The requested date for submission of the ten-year projection was August 1, 1972. The reports for both the Terre Haute and Evansville Campuses were completed during July and August and transmitted to the Commission on August 14, 1972. Inasmuch as the trustees do not meet in August, they did not have an opportunity to review the reports with the administration until the September 16 meeting, at which time President Rankin reported on their status and asked the trustees for their comments at their earliest convenience. No comments have been received except for Mr. Acher's request that the two-year aerospace programs be implemented earlier than scheduled. Consequently, with Mr. Acher's request in mind, it was recommended that the Board approve the documents as submitted to the Commission with the understanding that the ten-year projections will be reviewed and updated at periodic intervals in accordance with the Commission's directive which indicated that "the data requested will not be considered the finalized plans of the University."

Discussion: In response to a question from Mr. Acher regarding aerospace programs, Dr. Townsend recalled that Mr. Acher had estimated a budget of \$50,000 for the aerospace programs whereas the School of Technology's figures were approximately \$300,000. He said he has asked the School of Technology to go back over their figures and restudy the program to see if the \$50,000 and \$300,000 figures can be brought closer together. He said they are in the process of studying the matter and will bring it to the Board when they have completed the review. He told the trustees that if the cost is \$300,000, he could not support the programs, but added that if the School of Technology fime that the two figures compare more closely to each other, he would do all he could to get the programs started as soon as possible. Mr. McCutchan said it seemed appropriate that Dr. Townsend's comments be recorded in the minutes.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Morris, the documents were approved as submitted to the Commission.

#### L. SPECIAL PROGRAM FOR STUDENT SPOUSES

On December 18, 1971, the Board of Trustees approved a special program for student spouses, effective spring semester 1972. The program was approved on a one-year trial basis and student spouses were permitted to enroll for credit in a maximum of three semester hours of undergraduate work during a semester or summer session at a cost of \$5 per class. Dr. Harriet D. Darrow, Dean of Summer Sessions and Academic Services, who supervises the program, reports that during the spring of 1972, ninety-eight students were enrolled on the Student-Spouse Program, that during the summer of 1972, twenty-three were enrolled and that during the present semester, sixty-five students are enrolled. An analysis of the summer enrollments in this program reveals, however, that most of the summer students did not qualify for the program during the regular academic year but became eligible in the summer when their spouses enrolled in summer terms.

It was recommended that the Special Program for Student Spouses be continued with the stipulation that students may not enroll for summer work in this program, if they are not eligible for participation during the regular academic year.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Morris, the recommendation was approved.

#### PROPOSAL FOR GRANTING A SECOND BACCALAUREATE DEGREE Μ.

Inquiries by current and former students about the possibility of having the University confer a second baccalaureate degree has resulted in this proposal. At this time, there is no systematic method for accommodating such requests. The following policy statement has been prepared to allow alumni or graduates of other universities to modify original educational objectives through the completion of the degree requirements in academic disciplines identified at a time later than the establishment of original educational objectives:

A student who desires a second bachelor's degree must complete a minimum of 30 semester hours in addition to those required for the first degree and must fulfill all requirements for the second degree. A maximum of 10 of the required hours may be taken in extension and correspondence courses from ISU and the remainder must be taken in residence. If a student received his first bachelor's degree from another accredited university, 30 hours in residence are required to fulfill the requirement for the second bachelor's degree. Two bachelor's degrees may be granted simultaneously providing all requirements for both degrees have been completed.

This policy statement was initiated and approved by the Council of Academic Deans on April 24, 1972. The Curricular and Academic Affairs Committee gave unanimous support on September 28, 1972, and the Faculty Senate, in a vote of 30-1-0, approved the proposal on November 14, 1972. The policy also has the support of Vice President Townsend. It was recommended that the policy be approved.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the policy was approved.

#### N. LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS RECOMMENDED BY STATE BUDGET COMMITTEE

The operating appropriations recommended by the State Budget Committee for the state universities were entered for the record and are shown in Attachment 1.

At the close of the meeting, Mr. Reeves introduced Mrs. Shirley Cusick and referred to the matter he had brought up in the Executive Session regarding Mrs. Cusick. He said that Mrs. Cusick, who is a handicapped student, had told him that certain administrative officials were asking questions of her neighbors and officials of her high school, after she had made certain public statements concerning the University. Mr. Hitch assured Mr. Reeves that the trustees were very concerned over this and that the matter had been discussed after he had left the Executive Session. He said that both President Rankin and Mr. Moulton were shocked to hear this charge and he wanted the record to show that President Rankin has asked Vice President Moulton to investigate this matter thoroughly. President Rankin said the Board and SGA will be furnished a report of the results of this investigation. Mr. Hitch addressed Mrs. Cusick and said he would like her to know that the trustees were happy to have her on campus and if there were anything they could do to make her stay on campus more pleasant, he hoped she would feel free to call on them.

The meeting adjourned at 10:35 a.m.

Immediately following the meeting, the trustees toured the recreation facilities at Brazil, Indiana.

Re: Article IX Student Government Constitution

Dear John:

In reply to your letter of September 21, 1972, and your oral inquiry of September 22, 1972, we have reviewed the law of Indiana as it applies to the management of University funds and it appears that the Board of Trustees of the University have been charged with the responsibility of appointing a Treasurer who shall have responsibilities for University funds and by Section 28-7106 of Burns Indiana Statutes Annotated, those responsibilities are described as follows:

"The Trustees...shall appoint a qualified person, not a member of the Board, to serve as permanent Treasurer, who shall be responsible for the receipt, custody, accounting and proper protection of all funds due and accruing to Indiana State College [Indiana State University] and the Indiana State College Board [Indiana State University Board of Trustees] from any and all sources and for whatever purposes such funds and receipts may be designated and who, before completing his duties shall give bond in an amount prescribed by the Board."

It would appear from the above quoted section of the Indiana Statutes that the Treasurer of the University has personal responsibility for the expenditure of funds and the requirement for bond that seem to emphasize this personal responsibility. The fact that the Treasurer is charged with "accounting and proper protection of all funds" would indicate a large area of discretion vested in the Treasurer is far as approval of expenditures are concerned.

Article IX of the Student Government Constitution reads as follows:

"Student government shall receive into its budget a certain percent of the student activities fee and maintain control over specific expenditures subject to budgetary limitations and/or the veto of the University President on the grounds of unlawful expenditure, but with right of appeal to the Board of Trustees."

If Article IX can be read to imply that the University Treasurer does not have the right of veto en expenditures by the Student Government Association, then it would appear that said Article IX is in violation of the laws of the State of Indiana. In order to properly amend said Article IX to comply with the statutes of the State of Indiana, we would suggest that the said Article IX be amended to read as follows:

"Student Government shall receive into its budget a certain percent of the Student Activities Fee and maintain control over specific expenditures subject to budgetary limitations and/or the veto of the University Treasurer on the grounds of improper or unlawful expenditure, but with right of appeal to the University President and, ultimately, to the Board of Trustees."

We do believe that the suggested language for the Student Constitution would solve the problem and would fully comply with the Indiana law on the subject.

INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

Terre Haute, Indiana December 16, 1972

## SECTION I

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Arrow Room, Hulman Center, Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana, at 9:00 a.m., E.S.T., December 16, 1972. Members present were: Board President, William L. Hitch; Vice President, Nancye T. Mitchell; Secretary, Hugh E. McQuillan; Assistant Secretary, James T. Morris; and Mr. Herbert I. Lamb. Members absent: Mr. James D. Acher and Mr. John E. McCutchan. President Rankin, President Rice, and Vice Presidents Hardaway, Moulton, Schomer, Townsend and Truitt were present. Also attending were Dr. James E. Rentschler, Assistant to the President; Dr. Elmer S. Ciancone, President of the Faculty Senate; Mr. Paul O'Dell, President of SGA; Mr. Charles Reeves, Vice President of SGA; and Miss Connie Kirkpatrick, Editor of the STATESMAN.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Hitch called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

#### A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING NOVEMBER 18, 1972

On motion by Mr. McQuillan, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the minutes of the November 18, 1972 meeting were approved.

#### B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held on January 20, 1973. The Executive Session will be on Friday, January 19, 1973. Mr. Hitch pointed out that Founders Day is on the 19th and said the trustees will be notified of the plans being made for the various activities.

#### C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

**Old Business** 

President Rankin said he would like to clear up some old business which has been carried over from former meetings. He reported that the charges that Mr. Reeves had made against a University official regarding Mrs. Cusick, a handicapped student, have been investigated and found to be without foundation. He said that Mr. Reeves has apologized to the official and that Mrs. Cusick has indicated complete concurrence with a memorandum presenting the details and a description of the events and circumstances of the matter.

At the November meeting, Mr. Reeves questioned the eligibility of eleven students named on the athletic scholarship list. President Rankin said the trustees have been given a report regarding each of the students in question. He said seven of the students have left school, two have been dropped from the scholarship program, and six were readmitted by their academic deans. He added that it was not the University's policy to give scholarships to those who do not meet academic requirements.

The President said he has received a report from Mr. Moulton concerning the resurfacing of the parking lots. He has estimated that it will cost approximately \$335,000 to resurface all 37 parking lots on the campus. President Rankin said there is not enough money to blacktop all the parking lots and that a careful study will be made to determine just which ones can be resurfaced and to determine a system of priorities. He told the trustees that when the study is completed, he would bring recommendations to them for their consideration.

#### Commission for Higher Education

The Commission for Higher Education has held a number of meetings around the state in an attempt to obtain public reactions prior to the completion of the final draft of its master plan. The President said the public hearing which was held in Terre Haute was well attended and that a number of people from the community as well as from the University had made statements regarding the master plan. President Rankin attended the regular December meeting of the Commission in Indianapolis on December 8, 1972, at which time he attended a meeting with Mr. Don K. Gentry, State Director of the Division of Vocational Education, to discuss the subject of vocational education. He reported that he and President Pruis had met with Commission members to discuss the proposed budgets for the next biennium and review with the Commission possible plans to reconcile the variances between budget requests and the recommendations of the State Budget Committee and the Commission.

#### Legislative Meetings

President Rankin said he and other University staff members have attended several legislative meetings throughout the state this past week and will attend others in an effort to acquaint legis-lators with some of the details of the budget requests for the next biennium. At these meetings, representatives of the other public institutions of higher education have also been present.

NOTE: The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in Executive Session at Terre Haute, Indiana, Friday evening, December 15, 1972. Those in attendance were Mr. Hitch, Mr. Lamb, Mr. McQuillan, Mr. Morris, President Rankin, President Rice, Vice Presidents Moulton, Townsend, Truitt and Hardaway •

## The Indiana Society of Chicago

Indiana State University was recognized as the "University of the Year" by the Indiana Society of Chicago at their annual dinner on December 9, 1972. ISU's gymnasts and singers provided a large part of the entertainment and the President said he has received many letters from Indiana notables, including the President Pro Tem of the Senate and the Secretary of State, complimenting the University on the excellent impression made by these entertainers. He said the audience paid a great and unique tribute to ISU students when they stood to applaud the performance. He added that the singers have been invited to perform at the Inaugural Ball for Governor Bowen on January 8, but because school is not in session until that date, he said it would be very difficult for them to find time to rehearse and therefore may not be able to accept the invitation.

#### D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

#### 1. Applied Science and Technology Building

Ewing Miller of the Archonics Corporation was to have presented the Applied Science and Technology Building design development documents for the consideration of the Board but was unable to do so at this meeting. The presentation will be made at the January 20, 1973 meeting.

#### 2. Real Estate

It was recommended that the following purchase of property be approved:

The property is needed to protect and enhance the Bent Twig nature area on the west side of the campus. The University has negotiated with Rev. Myers for the purchase of the property for the past several months. It was further recommended that funds be appropriated and transferred from Rental Property Fund 9301 and Vending Commission Fund 9602 for the purchase of the property.

On motion by Mrs. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the recommendations were approved.

## 3. Fee Remission and Other Scholarships (1972-73)

The new awards of academic and talent fee waiver scholarships for the 1972-73 academic year and the award of athletic scholarships for the Fall 1971, Spring 1972, and Fall 1972 semesters are presented in EXHIBIT A. Approval of the scholarships was recommended.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. Morris, the scholarships were approved.

4. Credit-by-Examination Fee Structure

Credit-by-Examination in an established and recognized program in higher education, and has received increased interest in recent months. For effective participation in the program, the Evansville Campus must be able to administer examinations and the following credit-byexamination fee structure was recommended for approval.

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the credit-by-examination fee structure was approved.

## 5. President Rice's Report

**President Rice reported that the first mailings have gone out for the University Center Donor Recognition Program and that the Foundation Board met to plan a follow-up program.** 

He noted that the North Central Association has changed significantly the criteria used to accredit campuses and are now evaluating campuses on the characteristics of the students enrolled, the faculty, and the programs offered and their effectiveness. He said the Evansville Campus Committee is rewriting the self-study report in accordance with the revised standards.

**Progress is being made on the University Center project.** HUD approved the contracts and **a notice to proceed was issued for November 30, 1972, with completion date established as December 1, 1973.** He noted that the basic digging has been completed and that work on the footings will be started shortly. He said the drawings on the Technology Building have been received from Mr. Ewing Miller and construction drawings have been started based on these developed sketches.

**President Rice said that he had met with Dr. Settle, Dr. Lee, and Dr. Graves to continue discussions on cooperative programs with the University of Evansville.** 

The County Surveyor has sent final sketches of the overpass to the appropriate officials so that steps can be taken to deed the necessary land. These plans were approved by the Board some months ago.

Sixteen students will be receiving their caps at the Dental Hygiene Capping ceremonies on January 14, 1973. There were fourteen in last year's capping ceremony and he said plans are to add two each year to this program. ISUE has signed an agreement with the public schools to provide dental hygiene experiences in the public schools.

#### E. GRANTS

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On motion by Mr. McQuillan, seconded by Mr. Morris, the following grants were approved.

1. Council on Library Resources Conference Grant - Fund No. 2149

Letter of Grant Award No. CLR-554 has been received from the Council on Library Resources in the amount of \$1,500 for the support of a conference on books-by-mail to be held just prior to the American Library Association meeting in Las Vegas on June 23, 1973, under the direction of Dr. Choong H. Kim, Associate Professor of Library Science. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

2. National Science Foundation Grant - Fund No. 226-42

Grant No. GW-7821 has been received from the National Science Foundation in the amount of \$30,544 for the support of the "1973 Summer Institute in Mathematics for Secondary School Teachers," under the direction of Dr. Walter J. Sanders, Associate Professor of Elementary Education, for the period from June 11, 1973, to July 17, 1973. Fees for the 30 participants will be waived. It was recommended that the total grant be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

3. Indiana Consortium for International Programs - Fund No. 2093

The Indiana Consortium for International Programs is continuing its activities during 1972-73 under the direction of Dr. John B. Stabler, Executive Secretary. Membership fees will be paid by each member institution. A federal grant from the Institute of International Studies has been received to partially support a curriculum consultant from India during 1972-73.

#### F. STUDY-BEDROOM VISITATION POLICY

At the February 27, 1971, Board of Trustees meeting, the Board approved a Study-Bedroom Visitation Policy. Included in this action was a provision which limited visitation to six days a week. Part of the rationale for this provision was that one day a week should be set aside for meetings which dealt with hall goverance, hall programming and other internal matters within the hall. A survey has indicated that few of the residence halls hold meetings on the day that visitation is not permitted. The Residence Hall Association, after much study and discussion, has recommended that visitation be permitted seven days a week. The recommendation has the support of the Associate Dean for Residence Hall Programs. It was recommended that the Board approve this change in the visitation policy from six days to seven days per week, with no change in hours, effective second semester 1972-73. The rationale and supporting documents for this recommendation are presented in EXHIBIT C.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommended change in the visitation policy was approved.

#### G. PROPOSAL FOR INTERSESSIONS ON A TWO-YEAR TRIAL BASIS

The use of an intersession, as explained in EXHIBIT B, has been studied and approved by the Council of Academic Deans, the Dean of Summer Sessions, and Vice President Townsend. The Faculty Senate, on November 2, 1972, approved the recommendation of an ad hoc faculty committee--the Summer Sessions Subcommittee--that there be approval of an intersession if a salary rate of 2.67 percent per semester hour is accepted. In accordance with guidelines provided in EXHIBIT B, and on a trial basis for the summers of 1973 and 1974, it was recommended that approval of an intersession be given. Summer salary rates are the subject of a separate agenda item. (No. H., Section I.)

Discussion: Most of the discussion concerning this proposal centered around the matter of the salary rate to be paid for the summer. Vice President Townsend pointed out that the administration would have no objection to going to the 2.67 percent per semester hour if it could afford to. He said it would mean cutting the summer programs considerably and taking money out of the regular academic year. He did not feel this was the way to do it. President Rankin said that ISU's recommendation of 2.5 percent per semester hour rate is comparable to what other institutions pay; in some instances the rate of 2.5 would be a little better.

Mr. Morris said he was personally pleased that ISU was proposing an intersession. He said that he felt the intense concentration which is required to take a course in such a short period of time was a unique educational experience.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the recommendation for the Intersession was approved.

#### H. A PROPOSAL FOR A NEW FACULTY COMPENSATION RATE FOR SUMMER SESSIONS

The changing nature of the summer sessions, including the proposed intersessions, necessitates a rate schedule for faculty compensation for summer teaching assignments which allows flexibility and equity in salary amounts. The Faculty Senate on November 2, 1972 (by a vote of 23-6-5), accepted the recommendation of a Subcommittee on Summer Sessions, and advised that the rate be 2.67 percent per semester hour. The Faculty Senate recommendation, if implemented, would significantly increase costs of the summer program and probably limit faculty employment opportunities. EXHIBIT D provides both the administrative rationale for proposed changes and the new schedule, based on a 2.5 percent per semester hour rate, which is to become effective with the 1973 summer sessions. Approval was recommended.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the compensation rate for summer sessions was approved.

#### I. UNIVERSITY CALENDAR

The proposed calendar for 1973-74 was presented to the Board for consideration and approval. The calendar was approved by the Administrative Affairs Committee on October 12, 1972, by a vote of 8-0-0, by the Executive Committee on October 24, 1972, by a vote of 7-1-0, and by the Faculty Senate on December 5, 1972, by a vote of 33-2-1. The proposed calendar is presented as EXHIBIT E.

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the calendar was approved.

## J. CHANGE OF NAME FOR DIVISION OF EXTENDED SERVICES

Beginning with the 1921-22 academic year, the Division of Extended Services has operated as an integral part of the University, offering citizens of Indiana a variety of study programs representing almost every academic discipline. Although originally conceived as a means of extending existing programs to students located beyond the Terre Haute campus, during the period of its existence the Division has initiated educational services on its own so that in function it has provided for continuing education. In support of the emerging program thrust of the Division and in order to more closely describe its functions, it was recommended that the name of this office be changed from Division of Extended Services to Division of Continuing Education and Extended Services, effective immediately.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the change of name was approved.

**Before** the meeting closed, President Rankin pointed out that this was Miss Kirkpatrick's last Board meeting as she would be going out on a student teaching assignment the first part of the new semester. He told the Board that he had enjoyed working with her and that she had been very faithful with her weekly meetings. He then introduced Mr. Joe Baker, the new editor of the STATESMAN.

Mr. Hitch also said that all the trustees had appreciated Connie's presence. Miss Kirkpatrick said she had enjoyed working with the Board and that she was grateful that the trustees had consented to let the STATESMAN office have copies of the Agenda this year.

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the meeting adjourned at 10:20 a.m.

## PROPOSAL FOR AN INTERSESSION SUPPLEMENT TO THE CURRENT ACADEMIC SUMMER PROGRAM

The intersession is a time segment, of varying lengths, used for scheduling classes between regular semesters and summer sessions, in what would otherwise be periods when students are absent from campus. It provides opportunities for the institution to offer regular or special courses to all students as a means of increasing the number of hours of credit which a student can earn during a twelve months period. Short sessions of this type have been used for several years by colleges and universities. The success of these programs is confirmed by the enrollment figures.

The concept of the intersession at Indiana State is a result of the change of the University calendar to begin the first semester before Labor Day and conclude the academic year in May. This change was instituted effective with the 1972-73 academic year. The result of the calendar change for the summer sessions has been to allow only a brief period of time between the end of the Second Summer Session and the beginning of the First Semester. This reduction in vacation time, it is believed, may have influenced enrollment for the Second Summer Session, resulting in decreasing numbers of students.

In order to provide for students the opportunity to utilize the summer period for earning additional credit toward degree completion, an intersession is planned. This would permit a student the opportunity to earn 15-18 hours of credit should he be enrolled for an intersession plus both summer sessions. From the standpoint of the University, the establishment of an intersession permits greater utilization of the physical plant of the institution and the opportunity to employ more faculty during the twelve-months year as a part of a summer program.

For the summer of 1973, planned intersession dates will be May 21 through June 8, encompassing a period of three weeks. Intersessions scheduled in subsequent years will be placed in the period between the end of the Second Semester and the beginning of the First Summer Session.

The intersession will be conducted in accordance with the following general guidelines:

1. The maximum class load during an intersession for an undergraduate student would be one class, earning not more than a maximum of four semester hours. The maximum graduate student load for an intersession would be one course, earning not more than three semester hours.

2. Classes scheduled during an intersession will conform to the standards maintained during the regular academic year, i.e., for each semester hour of credit granted, a class shall meet not less than 16 class hours. This provides for a four-hour class to be in session 64 hours, a three-hour class to meet 48 hours, a two-hour class to meet 32 hours, and a one-hour class to meet not less than 16 hours.

(a) Workshop courses will be arranged on a flexible basis determined by credit to be earned.

(b) Registration day, the first scheduled class day, will be included as part of the total class day period.

3. Faculty assignments will be made on the basis of registration information and only for courses with sufficient enrollment to justify continuation. Contracts will not be offered in advance for intersession assignments. It is expected that faculty will usually be requested to teach in no more than two of the three summer employment periods. An amount equal to thirty per cent of the preceding academic year's salary is the maximum salary limit which the faculty member may earn for the two summer sessions under existing practice. This percentage will be retained as a desirable maximum for proposed expanded employment opportunities now to include three periods.

An intersession period will be scheduled for the summer of 1973 and for 1974 on an experimental and trial basis. Continuation beyond the summer of 1974 will be recommended following a careful evaluation of the results of the program during the trial period.

RE: Change in Visitation Policy

Attached is the rationale for extending the visitation policy in the residence halls from six to seven days a week. I have discussed the matter with Mr. Edgerton and Dr. Melloh and we all three recommend that visitation be extended to seven days a week. This does not mean that each residence hall will have seven days of visitation but it would allow those which wished to go to seven days to do so.

This change should go to the Board of Trustees. When the present visitation policy was passed in the February 27, 1971 Board meeting a specific motion was made that the policy be for six days a week. In order to accommodate this new proposal an item will have to be submitted for the December Board meeting which amends the action taken in the February 1971 meeting.

Proposal #1 by R.H.A. Visitation Comm.

#### Proposal:

The Residence Hall Association Visitation Committee hereby proposes that the number of days involved in the visitation policy be changed from six days a week to seven days a week.\*

\* We, the committee, realize that it is the prerogative of each individual hall, and floor within each hall, to set the guidelines as to the usage of visitation hours within the limitations of the expressed maximum hours per day as it stated in the present visitation policy.

#### Rationale:

The rationale of the present visitation policy for the six day visitation week, with Thursday being the non-visitation day, is that Thursday is the day set aside for the hall government meetings and for hall programming. It has been recently noted that most hall governments meet on nights other than Thursday. R.H.A. Representatives have stated that the attendance at the meetings has been just as it was before the implementation of the open visitation policy. Most hall programing is not done for Thursday night. With regard to the questionaire that was sent out concerning seven day visitation, it was found that students not wanting seven day visitation least listed the reason of Thursday being a night for hall programing.

Our second point in the rationale is that of the student sentiment. The survey that was circulated by the R.H.A. Visitation Committee polled all students living in the University Residence Halls with the exception of Hendricks Hall and Lincoln Quad. 76.8% of students eligible to be polled responded to the survey. From this response we learned that of the 2935 students participating in this survey, 78.2% were in favor of seven day visitation as opposed to 21.8% of the students who were against the seven day visitation proposal. Of the 2298 students who were in favor of the proposal, 51.6% were living on visitation floors and 48.4% were living on nonvisitation floors.

Our final point is that there are problems incurred by the present six day visitation policy with regard to the new life styles that are present on our campus. Often it is very easy for one to forget about Thursday being a non-visitation night. The residents are not allowed to move about freely in the coed hall situations because of restrictions that are placed on them by the present visitation policy. This causes decreased hall activity. In the traditional halls there is confusion in general because people have forgotten that there is no visitation on Thursday and there is a general disruption in the majority of students normal routine and living styles.

We, the Residence Hall Association Visitation Committee, feel that we have presented valid reasoning for asking for the adoption of our proposal. We feel that we are speaking for the wishes of the students who reside in the Residence Halls.

## Implementation:

We would like to see this proposal implemented as soon as possible to better serve the needs of the residents here at Indiana State University.

Recently the Residence Hall Association sent me a proposal to change the Visitation Policy by eliminating the concept of one universal non-visitation day per week throughout the residence hall system. I have discussed the proposal with the officers of the Residence Hall Association and have received residence hall staff reaction to the proposal. As a result of that input, we in the Office of Residence Hall Programs have discussed the proposal thoroughly and recommend that the Residence Hall Association's proposal to change the Visitation Policy by eliminating the one universal non-visitation day per week be accepted. We make this recommendation for the following reasons:

1. It is our understanding that the intention of having one universal non-visitation day was essentially two-fold in nature. A non-visitation day would provide one day when hall councils, hall committees, and floor level governments could meet and not be hindered by visitors utilizing the Visitation Policy. The one non-visitation day was also intended to provide a day when hall students would be free from any invasion of privacy which accompanied the visitation program.

Since the policy implementation in September of 1971, the Residence Hall Association, hall councils, hall committees, and floor level governments have spread their meeting times over all days and times during the week. There has not been a concentration of meetings on the non-visitation day. This can be seen in the proposal from Residence Hall Association. There are only three of fifteen governmental groups meeting on Thursdays. This would indicate to us that one of the intentions of having a universal non-visitation day is no longer valid.

The matter of having one non-visitation day for privacy purposes retains some validity. The women's residence halls in particular, report that during the tenure of the Visitation Policy, Thursday has been a day when students have done their laundry, utilized the crosslounge area in a more informal way, and have planned events which do not require the same dress standard as during the visitation hours. Men's halls and co-ed halls report no such need for privacy by residents as provided by a non-visitation day.

2. The elimination of the universal non-visitation day would not, in our opinion, affect the aspects of the Visitation Policy which are of primary concern to us, those being hours and security arrangements. The proposal would include the same week day hours for Thursday as stipulated in the present policy. In effect we would be adding six more hours of visitation to our weekly total.

The proposal does not in any way change the security aspect of the Visitation Policy. Sign-in and hosting would still be required for all visitors.

- 3. One implication of this proposal is of somewhat concern to us. When parents authorized their students for visitation or non-visitation for this year- they did so on the basis of a policy that included one non-visitation day. We are not sure whether changing the policy to eliminate the universal non-visitation would cause any parent to rethink his/her stand on visitation. Our feeling is that it would not. Once a parent agrees to the concept of visitation in study-bedrooms the crucial questions to the parent seem to be, "how long?" and "how secure will my student be?". The "how long" refers to until how late at night and/or starting how early in the afternoon, rather than how many days. This agreement which we have with parents might be affected by this change in policy.
- 4. Residence Hall Association is asking that the proposal be implemented immediately. We do not see any reason to wait until the end of the semester, the beginning of the next semester, or next Fall, to implement the proposal if it is acceptable. It would not cause great confusion nor disrupt the sign-in system if we went to a seven day Visitation Policy. Therefore, we recommend that, if accepted, the change go into effect as soon as possible.
- 5. We feel that visitation has been most successful on our campus. Three unique aspects of our Policy which have made it successful are the need for parental authorization, the reasonable nature of the hours structure, and the security provided by the system of guest registration and hosting. This proposal would, in the eyes of students, enhance the value of the Visitation Policy.

If a floor or a hall wished to retain a non-visitation day for that hall, they could do so. The present policy permits a floor to alter its hours any time a two-thirds majority of the students are in favor of such a reduction. Therefore, we would recommend that if this proposal is acceptable, that before it would go into effect anywhere, each visitation floor would be required to vote on whether or not they wanted visitation hours on what is now the universal non-visitation day and what those hours would be.

I hope that we have provided you with a full analysis of both the proposal and residence hall staff reaction to it. If you have questions, we will be happy to discuss them with you.

#### A PROPOSAL FOR A NEW FACULTY COMPENSATION RATE FOR SUMMER SESSIONS

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The use of the existing schedule providing for salary compensation to faculty who hold teaching assignments during summer sessions has provided administrative problems, largely resulting from the variable compensation percentage rates applicable to courses granting different credit hour amounts. The present schedule provides for the payment of one of several percentages, based on the preceding academic year salary, with the specific percentage determined by the number of semester hours or classes taught during a single summer period. The current schedule is presented below.

When this schedule was approved, Indiana State was a smaller institution with a faculty composed, for the most part, of generalists. Hence, a faculty member could teach several different courses in a department. However, the University now has a more specialized faculty with faculty members who cannot often be utilized in any but fairly narrow limits of class assignments. This limitation restricts the development of schedules which meet the needs of students and are, at the same time, not excessively expensive. A department chairman who wishes to employ a faculty member in his department may assign the individual two classes (for a total of six semester hours) for a maximum cost in a five weeks session of fifteen percent of his preceding academic year salary. If the courses needed are within the competency of the faculty member, the assignment may be easily made; however, if the course requirements necessitate the employment of two individuals to teach one three-hour class each, the cost is nine percent per faculty member, or a total of eighteen percent. Other combinations of courses result in similar variations in cost. These variations may also produce income inequities between faculty through the application of the variable per semester hour rates. Additionally, complications result in the utilization of faculty for the instruction of courses which best meet the needs of students.

The most equitable solution to this complex issue seems to be a change to the use of a summer salary schedule based upon a uniform percentage amount per each semester hour assigned. The recommended rate is a 2.5 percent per semester hour. The application of this schedule will permit the continued payment of a fifteen percent amount for a six-semester hour teaching assignment, which is the same as provided for in the current schedule. However, a uniform per semester hour rate will eliminate the inequities allowed through the variable percentage amounts also incorporated in the existing schedule.

The proposed schedule, utilizing the 2.5 percent per semester hour rate, follows.

The adoption of this single percent per semester hour rate will expedite for the department chairman the task of assignment of faculty for teaching in summer sessions. It will permit the best utilization of faculty for a schedule prepared in the best interests of the students, and it is expected that the number of faculty who can receive summer session assignments can be increased.

The use of this type of reimbursement for summer employment is followed by other institutions including the University of San Francisco, the University of Vermont, Arizona State University, and Indiana University (for a six-weeks session).

The proposed rate change is to become effective with the intersession and summer sessions scheduled in 1973.

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#### INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

Terre Haute, Indiana January 20, 1973

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Arrow Room, Hulman Center, Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana, at 9:00 a.m., E.S.T., January 20, 1973. Members present were: Board President, William L. Hitch; Secretary, Hugh E. McQuillan; Mr. James D. Acher; Mr. Herbert I. Lamb and Mr. John E. McCutchan. Members absent: Mrs. Nancye T. Mitchell and Mr. James T. Morris. President Rankin, President Rice, and Vice Presidents Hardaway, Moulton, Schomer, Townsend and Truitt were present. Also attending were Dr. James E. Rentschler, Assistant to the President; Dr. Elmer S. Ciancone, President of the Faculty Senate; Mr. Paul O'Dell, President of Student Government Association; and Mr. Charles Reeves, Vice President of Student Government Association.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Hitch called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

## A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING DECEMBER 16, 1972

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the minutes of the December 16, 1972 meeting were approved.

#### B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held on February 17, 1973, with the Executive Session on Friday evening, February 16, 1973.

#### C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Rankin congratulated Mr. O'Dell on his recent marriage and expressed the best wishes of everyone present.

#### Library

The new Cunningham Memorial Library was officially opened to students and faculty on January 11, 1973. President Rankin said that the news media in this area had provided excellent coverage about the new building. He noted that many people contributed to its planning and development: the Faculty Library Committee, headed first by Dr. Bash and then Dr. Venable; Dean Hanes, Director of the Library; and many other people on the University staff, particularly in Vice President Moulton's area. He told the trustees that the consultant for the library, Dr. Keyes Metcalf, Librarian Emeritus of Harvard University, had made a very real contribution to the project.

### Construction Work

In reporting the progress of the various construction projects around the campus, President Rations said the work on the radio station in Dreiser Hall will be completed the last of February. The renovation of the Shirley Building East, which has been assigned to the ceramics and sculpture sections of the Art Department which were destroyed by fire last April, is continuing and should be completed by February 15. Satisfactory progress is being made on the air conditioning work in the Fine Arts Building, Dreiser and Parsons Halls. Remodeling of the Fine Arts Gallery is about completed, and the work on the old Lodge room in the Elks building has proceeded. He said that the work on the University-Civic Amphitheater is moving forward on schedule. Considering all aspects of the project, approximately fifty percent of the work is completed; ninety percent of the structural steel is up, and thirty percent of the siding and almost all the roof is on.

#### Rockefeller Foundation

The Rockefeller Foundation has made a \$157,000 grant to the five universities in the Academic Affairs Conference of Midwestern Universities. The funds are designed to provide internships in administration to potentially-able administrators coming from minority groups. The President said this is a major grant and is a tribute to Dr. Harold Walker and the representatives from each of the five institutions in the Conference. In this connection, he said he has agreed to an exchange idea whereby ISU would waive tuition for five students from the other four institutions if they choose to carry on studies here. He said he thought he had the authority to do this, but if the auditor needs Board approval, he will present an item to the trustees in February.

#### Parking Lots

The President said he had met with Mr. Moulton to review the matter of resurfacing the parking lots and will bring specific recommendations and cost estimates to the Board in February.

NOTE: The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in Executive Session at Terre Haute, Indiana, Friday evening, January 19, 1973. Those in attendance were Mr. Hitch, Mr. Lamb, Mr. McQuillan, Mr. McCutchan, Mr. Acher, President Rankin, President Rice, Vice Presidents Moulton, Truitt, Townsend and Hardaway. Attending a portion of the meeting were Mr. Gordon Chalmers, Mr. Howard Wooden, Mr. Donald Foltz and Dr. Wayne Crockett.

## Air Pollution

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The precipitators installed in the smoke stacks at the Heating Plant are not adequate to comply with the new air pollution requirements and President Rankin said it would be necessary for the University to take further steps. He has authorized Sverdrup-Parcel Engineering Company of St. Louis to make a study of the situation and to give us their recommendations as to the best course of action to take.

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#### Commission for Higher Education

President Rice, Vice President Moulton, Mr. Hilt and President Rankin, together with representatives of the other state institutions, met with the Commission for Higher Education to review the variances between the budget requests of the state institutions and the recommendations of the Commission staff in order to try to reconcile these differences. He said the Commission will meet again on Monday, January 22, 1973, to come to some conclusion as to what they will recommend to the Legislature. The President said that all institutions have agreed that the Commission will take the leadership in presenting the case of higher education to the Legislature and that the universities will support the recommendations of the Commission, once agreed upon.

#### D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

## 1. Applied Science and Technology-Building

Mr. Ewing Miller of Archonics Corporation presented the Applied Science and Technology Building design development documents for the consideration of the Board. Approval was recommended.

The artist's rendering of the building showed the building from the campus side. Mr. Miller said the exterior of the building will be finished in the same materials as those used on the Library and University Center. He said a wall will hide the service area which will be located on one side of this building. The building which has all the stairways, mechanical pods and duct work exposed will be painted and finished in such a way that all these exposures will blend in with the overall decor of the buildings. The single corridor which serves both sides of the building is an extension of the main campus pedestrian way. Detailed plans of this building were approved by the Board on October 21, 1972.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the design development documents were approved.

#### 2. Budget Adjustments

On motion by Mr. McQuillan, seconded by Mr. Acher, the following budget adjustments were approved as recommended:

#### 3. President Rice's Report

The Dental Capping Ceremony was held on January 14, 1973, for thirteen students. President Rice said the dental auxiliary program has 13 first-year hygienists, 12 second-year hygienists and 15 dental assistants. He said next year's enrollment will be 20 first-year and 13 second-year hygienists and 20 dental assistants.

He reported that the contractor has started the footings on the University Center.

The University Center Donor Recognition Program progress report shows \$25,000 in contributions and promises for about that much more.

President Rice said <u>A Guide to the Use of Campus</u> Facilities has been prepared and copies are being mailed to the trustees.

## E. LATIN-AMERICAN AREA STUDIES PROGRAMS

EXHIBIT A is a presentation of the rationale and organization of an area concentration and an area minor concentration in Latin-American Studies. The proposed programs were released by the Academic Planning Council on March 23, 1972, approved by the Curricula and Academic Affairs Committee on May 16, 1972 (by a vote of 7-0-1), received and approved by the Faculty Senate Executive Committee on June 13, 1972 (by a vote of 5-4-0), and by the Faculty Senate on November 14, 1972 (by a vote of 26-0-5). The proposal also has the support of the Vice President for Academic Affairs. Approval was recommended. Subsequent to Board approval, the curricula will be submitted to the Indiana Commission for Higher Education for its consideration.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Acher, the proposal for the Latin-American Area Studies Program was approved.

## F. STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION

The Student Government Association Constitution includes a provision that a constitutional convention be held every three years to consider revisions. The original constitution was approved by the Board of Trustees November 21, 1969, consequently, some major revisions have been proposed this year. However, the revisions must be approved by a student referendum before they are submitted to the Trustees for consideration. It was anticipated that the student balloting would be completed prior to January 20, 1973, and that a recommendation for Board action would be proposed. The referendum was not conducted as scheduled; consequently, consideration of the student constitution was deferred until a subsequent meeting.

#### G. IN MEMORIAM

Mrs. Catherine S. O'Dea, Assistant in News Services, Office of Information Services, passed away on December 10, 1972. A Resolution, EXHIBIT B, was presented for approval of the Board.

Miss Florence M. Curtis, Professor Emeritus of Women's Physical Education, passed away on December 16, 1972. A Resolution, EXHIBIT C, was presented for approval of the Board.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the resolutions were approved.

#### H. NEW LIBRARY

A representative of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare conducted the final inspection of the new Library on January 16, 1973.

Approval of the following resolution was recommended:

WHEREAS, the Indiana State University Board of Trustees on the 18th day of December 1970, entered into contracts for the construction of the new Library, Project No. 5-5-00600-C, with Repp and Mundt, Inc., for General Construction; Prox & Burget Company, Inc., for Plumbing, Heating, Ventilating and Air Conditioning Work; The Sanborn Electric Company for Electrical Work; Sound and Equipment Company, Inc., for the Dial Access Learning System; and Sperry Rand Corporation, Remington Rand, Library Bureau Division, for Library Equipment; and

WHEREAS, the contract completion date was December 18, 1972, and

WHEREAS, the project was substantially completed on December 18, 1972, and

WHEREAS, the project was occupied by the University on December 18, 1972,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees inspected the completed project and accepted the same as complete in accordance with the plans and specifications and approved change orders thereto.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the resolution was approved.

#### I. TIREY MEMORIAL UNION ADDITION AND REMODELING

A representative of the Department of Housing and Urban Development conducted the final inspection of the Tirey Memorial Union Addition and Remodeling project on January 12, 1973.

Approval of the following resolution was recommended:

WHEREAS, the Indiana State University Board of Trustees on the 28th day of May, 1971, entered into contracts for the construction of the Tirey Memorial Union Addition and Remodeling, Project No. CH-IND-127(S) with Repp and Mundt, Inc., for General Construction; United Piping Corporation for Mechanical Construction; the Sanborn Electric Company for Electrical Construction; and Hillman's Equipment, Inc., for Food Service Facilities; and

WHEREAS, the contract completion date was December 8, 1972, and

WHEREAS, the project was occupied by the University on January 8, 1973,

#### BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees inspected the completed project and accepted the same as complete in accordance with the plans and specifications and approved change orders thereto.

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Discussion: President Rankin referred to the question raised by the trustees at a previous meeting about the ponding of water on the patio. He read a memorandum written by Mr. Dawson, Director of the Physical Plant, who felt that the problem could be solved by the installation of an additional area drain. The President said he had personally observed this area the morning after a heavy rain and the patio was dry except for two or three areas where water was standing. Mr. Miller said he had inspected the area and it was his opinion that the contractor had performed his work according to the plans and specifications. He explained the construction of the concourse and said it was most difficult to trowel an area this size so that there would not be low spots. He said this was quite within the realm of normal tolerance and he felt the contractor had done an exceptional job.

Mr. Lamb said that he had inspected the area under the Link Building after a rain and had observed big pools of water there in several different spots. He said he objected to accepting the building from the contractor until this condition was corrected.

Mr. McCutchan suggested to the trustees that they go to the Link Building and see this condition for themselves. Mr. Acher asked if action could be deferred on this item until the trustees had had a chance to see the area in question. Mr. Reeves said he walks through that area every day and he found the ponding of water to be very slight.

Mr. Moulton said there would be no problem deferring action on the item but he said in his opinion the contractor had performed his work according to the plans and specifications.

Mr. McCutchan said he believed the conditions around the glass house and the other low spots were more than "normal tolerances" and felt that these areas would cause trouble if not corrected.

By concensus, action on the item was deferred until the February meeting.

#### J. GRANTS

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On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the following grants were approved as recommended:

1. National Science Foundation Grant - Fund No. 226-33

An additional institutional grant for science has been received in the amount of \$5,671 from the National Science Foundation as Amendment No. 3, to Grant No. GH-3355, to be used at the discretion of the University for the conduct of scientific activities, including scientific research and education in the sciences. It was recommended that the additional grant be appropriated in accordance with the award letter.

2. Criminology Internship Program - Fund No. 2118

Grant Award No. 9-80-72-F-1, Part E has been received from the Indiana Criminal Justice Planning Agency in the amount of \$18,000 to conduct an internship program under the direction of Dr. William Nardini, Chairman of the Department of Criminology for the period from December 1, 1972, through November 30, 1973. An indirect cost reimbursement of \$6,000 will be provided by the University. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

#### 3. Commercial Solvents Corporation - Department of Chemistry Research Grant - Fund No. 2150

Letter of Award dated January 5, 1973, has been received from Commercial Solvents Corporation with \$500 first installment of a \$1,000 unrestricted grant to the Department of Chemistry under the direction of Dr. William Bunger, Chairman. It was recommended that the total budget as prepared by the Chairman be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

Before adjourning, Mr. Hitch asked if anyone had comments. Mr. O'Dell said he would like to thank the administrators and faculty for being so cooperative in helping to bring the Third World Conference to ISU. He said he did not know if the trustees were aware of this Conference but he wanted them to know how helpful President Rankin and other administrators had been. Mr. Hitch told him that the trustees were aware of this and were also aware of the fact that President Rankin and the administration were getting abuse from some of the townspeople. He said the Board is fully behind the administration and hoped the Conference would be a success.

Mr. McCutchan congratulated the STATESMAN on their editorial on President Truman. He said he thought it was excellently done.

On motion by Mr. McQuillan, seconded by Mr. Acher, the meeting adjourned at 10:30 a.m.

Immediately following the meeting, the trustees went to the patio area under the Link Building to observe the conditions which were discussed at this meeting. Following this inspection, they were taken on a tour of the new Library.

## A PROPOSAL FOR AREA PROGRAMS IN LATIN-AMERICAN STUDIES

The objectives of the proposed programs in Latin-American Studies are two-fold: (1) to offer students knowledge and experience in the Latin-American culture, and (2) to provide career preparation for students who plan to work in teaching, research, government, journalism, or business in Latin-American countries.

The proposed Latin-American Area Studies programs are an interdisciplinary approach, integrating curricula existing in the College of Arts and Sciences. The programs offer to the student an opportunity to develop a background in the culture of Latin-American countries by utilizing courses offered in the Departments of Foreign Languages, Anthropology, Geography, History, and Political Science. The programs, as proposed, do not duplicate existing curricula.

Current faculty and instructional resources are sufficient for implementing the proposals. Attention will be given to strengthening library resources through extensions of the existing Latin-American library collection.

Rather than utilize the traditional major and minor designations which are more frequently adapted to use within one academic discipline in contrast to interdisciplinary study programs such as these proposed for Latin-American Studies, students completing one or the other of these proposed patterns will have an "area concentration" or an "area minor concentration."

The "Area Concentration" will consist of thirty-two semester hours of required course work and a minimum of six semester hours of electives in Latin-America content courses. Course requirements are indicated below:

Spanish 101-102, Elementary Spanish
Spanish 201-202, Intermediate Spanish
History 480, History of Colonial Latin America
History 481, History of Modern Latin America
Anthropology 491, Peoples of Middle & South America
Geography 412, Geography of South America
Pol. Sci. 483, Government & Politics of Latin America
Interdisciplinary Seminar in Latin American Studies,
Selected Topics
32 hours

Electives: Six hours in one or more disciplines. Courses must be Latin American content courses.

The only course listed above not currently offered within the College of Arts and Sciences is the last one, the interdisciplinary seminar which will deal with selected topics related to interpretations of the Latin-American society. Including the six semester hours of directed electives, the total semester hour requirement is thirty-eight.

The area minor concentration will be comprised of the same content courses, less the senior seminar and the language requirements. The eighteen semester hour minor concentration represents a broad introduction to the area and includes three semester hours as electives.

The proposed program will be directly administered by a faculty coordinator selected from one of the five academic disciplines represented in the program. Assisting him in implementing and developing the curricular patterns will be a faculty advisory committee of five, one member chosen from each of the academic departments represented. The Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, or his designee, shall have final responsibility for the administration of the programs.

Implementation of the curricula is expected to begin with the 1973-74 academic year, subject to necessary approval action.

Terre Haute, Indiana February 17, 1973

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Arrow Room, Hulman Center, Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana, at 9:00 a.m., E.S.T., February 17, 1973. Members present were: Board President, William L. Hitch; Secretary, Hugh E. McQuillan; Assistant Secretary, James T. Morris; Mr. James D. Acher; Mr. Herbert I. Lamb and Mr. John E. McCutchan. Members absent: Mrs. Nancye T. Mitchell. President Rankin, President Rice, and Vice Presidents Hardaway, Moulton, Schomer, Townsend and Truitt were present. Also attending were Dr. James E. Rentschler, Assistant to the President; Dr. Elmer S. Ciancone, President of the Faculty Senate; Mr. Paul O'Dell, President of Student Government Association; Mr. Charles Reeves, Vice President of Student Government Association, and Mr. Joe Baker, Editor of the STATESMAN.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Hitch called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

## A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING JANUARY 20, 1973

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the minutes of the January 20, 1973, meeting were approved.

#### B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held on March 17, 1973, with the Executive Session on Friday evening, March 16, 1973.

#### C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

#### Cheerleaders

President Rankin announced that ISU's cheerleaders were chosen as one of the top ten squads in the nation. He said he had conveyed his congratulations to this dedicated and highly trained group for this achievement. Mr. Hitch said he felt the Board also should extend its congratulations to the squad.

#### Third World Conference

The Third World Conference was held last weekend with no incidents of any kind being reported. The conference was smaller than anticipated with approximately 150 delegates from outside the community attending. The president said that financially the conference was successful in that there was enough income to meet the costs. He said Mrs. Jimison and Mr. Howell happily acknowledged the cooperation of our staff and he in turn expressed to both of them the administration's thanks for their cooperation.

#### Commencement Speaker

William B. Ruckleshaus, Director of Environmental Protection Agency, has accepted our invitation to be Commencement speaker. President Rankin said he was pleased that Indiana State will have a distinguished Hoosier on the platform.

#### Enrollment and Admissions

Total enrollment for the second semester was 12,019 students, a drop of 851 students from the second semester last year. The president said the outlook for the coming year is not encouraging. He told the trustees that the 3200 graduating seniors will not be replaced by as great a number of incoming students this fall. Many schools are faced with fewer applications this year than last and it is difficult to pinpoint the reasons for this. The number of high school graduates is no larger and there are more places for them to go; the attitude toward the necessity for a college education is changing and most high school counselors feel that because the pressures are not as great, many high school graduates are deferring their decisions to apply for admission.

## American Council on Education

President Rankin, a member of the Federal Relations Commission of the American Council on Education, met with that group in Washington on February 1 and 2 for the purpose of considering the administration's recommendations regarding appropriations for higher education, and to determine what procedure the Commission should take. He pointed out that the federal administration proposes to eliminate interest subsidies on academic facilities and housing loans; to eliminate aid for undergraduate teaching, language and area studies, libraries, etc., and to curtail drastically aid in many other areas. The Basic Opportunity Grant Program, established by the Education Amendments of 1972, will be funded but not to the full \$1400 per student level. The grants will be limited to one-half the cost of attending the institution where a student is enrolled. The administration is intending to assist more students than before but the assistance programs have not yet been funded and prospects for early action are not good.

NOTE: The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in Executive Session at Terre Haute, Indiana, Friday evening, February 16, 1973. Those in attendance were Mr. Hitch, Mr. Lamb, Mr. McQuillan, Mr. McCutchan, Mr. Morris, Mr. Acher, President Rankin, President Rice, Vice Presidents Moulton, Truitt, Townsend and Hardaway. Mr. Gordon Chalmers attended a portion of the meeting.

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#### Dental Hygiene Program

On Monday, February 19, President Rankin will meet with a group of regional and local dentists for the purpose of determining what furthur steps can be taken to obtain money for developing a dental hygiene program. He said he was not optimistic that we would get any help from Washington.

Mr. Hitch asked if a definite decision had been made on the two-year nursing program. Vice President Townsend said the School of Nursing faculty is still discussing curriculum. He said that the grant which they had hoped to get from the federal government was not forthcoming and they have been somewhat hesitant to go ahead, however, he said discussions are continuing and he hoped the program would be funded this spring.

## D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

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President Rice reported that the Dental Auxiliary Program accreditation team spent four days on campus. He said they were very thorough in their investigation and for the most part were pleased with the program. He said the National Council of Accreditation of Teacher Education will be on the ISUE campus in March.

The Student Government Association, together with the History Department faculty, sponsored a Black History Week. The University Center construction is coming along quite well. The Foundation Board is planning a telethon as a follow-up to the Donor Recognition Program. He said some of the corridors in the Classroom Applied Science and Technology Building were eliminated, making additional classrooms possible. President Rice said that Mr. Fritz, in connection with the Donor Recognition Program, had donated \$60,000 with the stipulation that it be used for the furtherance of the dental education program.

## E. TIREY MEMORIAL UNION ADDITION AND REMODELING

Action on the following resolution was deferred at the January 20, 1973, Board meeting. The Architect and University representatives have again reviewed drainage conditions and have agreed to proceed with certain actions intended to remedy the deficiency. The Department of Housing and Urban Development representative has recommended that the contractor's work on the project be accepted as complete in accordance with the plans and specifications and it is anticipated that any additional work done will not be at the contractor's expense. Approval of the following resolution was recommended:

WHEREAS, the Indiana State University Board of Trustees on the 28th day of May, 1971, entered into contracts for the construction of the Tirey Memorial Union Addition and Remodeling, Project No. CH-IND-127(S) with Repp and Mundt, Inc., for General Construction; United Piping Corporation for Mechanical Construction;

The Sanborn Electric Company for Electrical Construction; and Hillman's Equipment, Inc., for Food Service Facilities; and

WHEREAS, the contract completion date was December 8, 1972, and

WHEREAS, the project was substantially completed on January 8, 1973, and

WHEREAS, the project was occupied by the University on January 8, 1973,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees inspected the completed project and accepted the same as complete in accordance with the plans and specifications and approved change orders thereto.

Discussion: President Rankin said that Mr. Miller had reported to him that Repp & Mundt has asked Freitag-Weinhardt to install an additional drain in the low spot underneath the Link Building and will attempt to find out if the area around the glass house can be brought up to grade by using an epoxy concrete that is compatible with the waterproofing that was used on the surface of the concourse.

Mr. McCutchan asked who would pay the additional expense for these corrections. He said he thought it was incomprehensible that the University should be expected to pay additional money to correct someone's mistake. Mr. Moulton said the University will try to get the architect to cover this expense. The contractor has not volunteered to pay. Mr. McCutchan said he did not think the Board should approve errors; that it is condoning our campus planners. Mr. Moulton said that in this instance we are saying that the contractor has done the work according to plans and specifications. Mr. Acher said he thought the original plans were in error and the contractor was working in what might be called an impossible situation. He added that he had gone through the entire building and thought it was a beautifully designed building as well as being a functional one. Mr. Redfearn had told him that they had experienced one problem with leaks but that had been resolved.

On motion by Mr. McQuillan, seconded by Mr. Acher, the resolution was approved as recommended. Mr. McCutchan voted against the motion.

## F. REVISION IN SUMMER TERM REFUND POLICY

It was recommended that the following refund policy be approved for the Intersession and the regular summer sessions:

#### Intersession

Students dropping courses or withdrawing from school through the second day of regular classes will receive a 90% refund; 60% refunds will be given during the third day through the fourth day of classes. No refund will be given for dropped courses or withdrawals after the fourth day of classes.

#### Summer Term

Students dropping courses or withdrawing from school during the first week of regular classes will receive a 90% refund of fees; 60% refunds will be given during the sixth day through the eighth day. No refund of fees will be given for dropped courses or withdrawals after the eighth day of classes.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the summer term refund policy was approved as recommended.

#### G. RETURN CHECK PENALTY

A considerable number of checks made payable to Indiana State University for the payment of tuition, for cash and other reasons, are returned to the University by the bank as uncollectible items. It is necessary for University employees to expend a considerable effort to recover the proceeds of the checks. There is evidence that some students use the University's cash to take care of their own financial problems. Most business establishments, banks, and universities charge a penalty for checks returned as uncollectible items. Ball State University charges \$5 for each check returned; Indiana University charges \$25 for the return of a check written for fees and \$5 for return of a check issued for other purposes.

It was recommended that a \$5 penalty be assessed on returned checks effective immediately.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the recommendation was approved.

## H. CONDEMNATION OF REAL ESTATE

The former Pennsylvania Railroad right-of-way and contiguous parcels of land owned by Penn Central Transportation Company have been in the process of purchase by the University since 1969. Abstracts for the property were not available and it has taken more than a year to have an abstract prepared and subsequently examined by University counsel. Because of the numerous equipment mortgage trusts outstanding, it is not possible for Penn Central Transportation Company to award a clear title for the property to the University, therefore, it is necessary to acquire the property in proceedings in eminent domain. Indiana State University has petitioned the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania for permission to condemn the real estate. It was recommended that the Board approve the acquisition of the property in this manner.

The University has been negotiating the purchase of the Cut-Rate China property located at 209 North Ninth Street for an extended period of time. The remainder of the properties abutting Ninth Street between Eagle and Mulberry Streets east of the University-Civic Amphitheater have been acquired, and it appears that it will be necessary to acquire the Cut-Rate China property through condemnation action. It was recommended that the Board approve the acquisition of the property through proceedings in eminent domain.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the recommendations were approved.

### I. GRANTS

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the following grants were approved as recommended:

#### 1. Office of Naval Research Grant - Fund No. 2152

Contract No. N00014-73-A-0231-0001 has been received from the Office of Naval Research, Department of the Navy, in the amount of \$20,999, to conduct a research project entitled "Trypanosoma lewisi: an in vitro model system for the study of the effects of humoral factors on growing parasitic protozoa" under the direction of Dr. Donald G. Dusanic,

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**Professor of Life** Sciences, for the period from September 1, 1972, to December 31, 1973. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the contract.

#### 2. The Jewish Chautauqua Society Grant - Fund No. 1000

A resident lectureship grant has been received from the Jewish Chautauqua Society in the amount of \$750 to provide a course in Judaism during the spring semester 1973. The grant will be credited to the Current Operating Fund to pay the major portion of the salary for said course.

### 3. English Department - Science Fiction Studies - Fund No. 2151

An agreement has been made between the Department of English, Dr. James Misenheimer, and Dr. Richard Mullen, Professor of English, for the cooperation of the English Department in the production of a periodical entitled, "Studies in Science Fiction."

Dr. Mullen agrees to deposit \$2,000 to cover the cost of publishing the first four issues. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the agreement.

## 4. Lilly Endowment Planning - Evaluation Grant - Fund No. 2153

A check in the amount of \$15,000 has been received from the Lilly Endowment, Inc., to establish a planning evaluation grant for the Indiana Consortium for International Programs administered at Indiana State University under the direction of Dr. John B. Stabler, Executive Secretary, for the period from March 1, 1973, through June 30, 1974. It was recommended that the total amount of the grant be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

#### 5. Center for Education in Family Finance - Fund No. 280

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A continuation grant in the amount of \$15,000 has been authorized in a letter dated February 6, 1973, from the Institute of Life Insurance for the calendar year 1973, to conduct a program in education in family finance. University funds in the amount of \$2,400 from Unappropriated Current Operating Funds plus the tuition and workshop fees paid by forty participants are included in the total budget to be appropriated. It was recommended that the unexpended balance as of December 31, 1972, plus the total budget as indicated below be appropriated in accordance with the proposal and authorize the transfer of cash, tuition, and workshop fees from Current Operating Funds.

#### 6. Indiana Higher Education Telecommunication System Non-West Studies: East Asia - Fund No. 2098

The Board of Directors of IHETS has authorized the repeat of the course entitled "Non-West Studies: East Asia" during the second semester 1973, under the direction and support of the four institutions of higher education. Based upon an estimated budget of \$10,000, as approved by the IHETS Board of Directors, \$5,000 will be shared equally by the four institutions and the remaining \$5,000 will be charged to each institution proportionately to the number of students enrolled for the course. Each institution will collect regular fees from the students enrolled on each campus. It was recommended that billing be issued to the four institutions for the \$1,250 each, plus the amount due based upon enrollments, and that the transfer of \$1,250 from Unappropriated Current Operating Funds be authorized.

## J. EXECUTIVE OFFICE, INDIANA PARK AND RECREATION ASSOCIATION

The Indiana Park and Recreation Association has requested that the Department of Recreation of Indiana State University house the executive office of the Association. The organization is self-supporting with its own operating budget. The only expense to the University would be incurred with the establishment of an account and handling of disbursements together with providing space, utilities, and filing equipment. A faculty member of the Recreation Department would supervise the operation but no released time would be involved. The office would enhance the public relations of the University.

It was recommended that authority be granted to establish the executive office of the Indiana Park and Recreation Association at Indiana State University.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the recommendation was approved.

#### K. BACHELOR OF SCIENCE DEGREE: ROBERT L. GARD

In 1959, Mr. Robert L. Gard left the University in good standing to accept a job offer but without attempting to be graduated. He had completed 125½ semester hours with a grade point average of 2.57, but as a general business major he was deficient in the completion of 2-1/3 semester hours of communications and 2-1/3 semester hours of speech.

In the interim period Mr. Gard has achieved success in business and his responsibilities have required the use of the skills represented by his deficiencies. Dr. Clinton G. Baker, Dean of the School of Business, reports that Mr. Gard's performance has demonstrated bachelor degree level work and is supportive of appropriate recognition. Dean Baker further reported that Mr. Gard, at the time, thought he had finished his work and accepted a position with Marathon Oil Company. Dean Baker said this misunderstanding in some measure could be attributed to the method of record keeping in those years. He said had the matter been placed with him at the time, he would have waived the courses required.

It was recommended that the Bachelor of Science Degree with a general business major be awarded to Robert L. Gard, effective second summer term 1959.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Morris, the recommendation was approved.

#### L. RESPONSIBILITY OF THE ALL-UNIVERSITY PROMOTIONS ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Section 2, Article II, of the Faculty Constitution contains the following provision:

Faculty Senate actions requiring approval of the Board of Trustees and Faculty Senate actions in the area of its primary authority with which the President does not concur shall be transmitted to the Board by the President with his recommendations no later than the second Board meeting following such action.

On December 5, 1972, the Faculty Senate, by a vote of 17-10-3, took the action as presented below. This action had been approved previously by the Executive Committee by a vote of 5-3.

The All-University Promotions Advisory Committee will, in addition to its other duties, serve as an All-University Tenure and Retention Advisory Committee.

The Academic Vice President will refer to this Committee all materials relating to any faculty member for whom there are conflicting recommendations between successive levels of judgment. The Committee will review the recommendations, and confer with the Academic Vice President and with other such persons as it may deem necessary. The All-University Committee will then make its own recommendation to the President. The referral to the All-University Promotions Committee will occur according to the notification calendar. This policy will serve during the 1972-73 academic year while further study of the whole procedure is undertaken.

For a number of reasons, President Rankin is unwilling to institute the proposed procedure and recommended that it not be adopted for reasons stated in the Faculty Senate Minutes of December 5, 1972, as quoted below:

President Rankin disagreed with the theory that questions of Tenure and Retention parallel the matter of Promotions. Tenure is a matter of primary concern to a department and great weight should be given to the recommendations of departmental members as to who receives a permanent appointment. Promotions are very important, too, but a university-wide standard governs promotion to a particular rank while tenure must reflect certain departmental considerations which may not always be pertinent to the University as a whole. Furthermore, the proposed tenure procedures would call for recommendations being made directly to the President, omitting the Vice President. The Promotions Committee, on the other hand, makes its recommendations to the Vice President. President Rankin pointed out that the text of the motion says the committee will review the recommendations and confer with the Vice President and such other persons as necessary. He asked how the committee could reconsider these differences if they don't conduct a hearing, thus jeopardizing existing procedures. He said also that there are more than a few cases of conflicting recommendations involved between a departmental committee and chairman and the dean of the school, etc. President Rankin said he believes reconciliation is most desirable but that he doesn't think we should wait for formal procedures to do this because reconciliation is open to us at any time.

Discussion: President Rankin reiterated his reasons for not instituting this procedure and added that no right of any faculty member is being denied as appeal procedures exist. He pointed out that the closeness of the vote (one-third of the Executive Committee and one-third of the Senate voted against it) indicated division on this procedure. He asked Dr. Ciancone for comments.

Dr. Ciancone said the closeness of the vote would indicate misunderstanding rather than disagreement. He said he thought this could be explained by the fact that although many faculty members agreed with the statements made by President Rankin that tenure and promotion should not be handled similarly, they were still concerned about the tenure and retention policy in light of financial exigencies. He said perhaps the motion was hastily drawn. Taking into consideration this dichotomy of thought, many faculty members had difficulty in making judgments. Their genuine

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concern over the fact that the criterion for tenure might not be the same as that used in the past and the fact that faculty did not actually participate in this determination made many members uncomfortable. He said it is probably a matter of "too little and too late" and that perhaps two or three years ago would have been the time to do something about financial exigencies. He pointed out that two years ago the administration did bring before the Faculty Senate the concerns of tenuring instructors. He said then might have been the time to have settled this situation. He said there has been talk of an ad hoc committee being appointed to develop procedures covering financial exigencies and the Executive/Committee has submitted to President Rankin the names of five faculty members to serve on this committee.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. Morris, the recommendation that this procedure not be adopted was approved.

#### M. LONG TERM LEASE OF UNIVERSITY PROPERTY TO SWOPE ART GALLERY

In a letter dated January 16, 1969, the Board of Directors and the Board of Overseers of the Sheldon Swope Art Gallery requested the Board of Trustees of Indiana State University to consider the relocation of the gallery in the program for future physical expansion of the University. In the intervening years, discussions have been held with the joint boards of the gallery with such relocation in view. The existing gallery is a fire hazard and maintaining security of the collection is a matter of serious concern. The ultimate solution will be the construction of a new facility to house the gallery, and a public fund drive is being planned by gallery officials to raise the money necessary to build the structure. The success of the fund drive will depend to some extent upon the determination of a suitable site for the building.

For many years there have been close associations between the Swope Art Gallery and various segments of the University, particularly the Art and Humanities Departments. A number of classes are conducted in the gallery and personnel from the gallery have participated in the University's instructional programs. This association has greatly enhanced the University's art and humanities programs. The gallery is fully accredited by the American Association of Museums and accreditation was granted in part because of the unique relationship between the gallery and the University.

It was recommended that the Board of Trustees approve a long-term lease of university-owned property to the Sheldon Swope Art Gallery to be used as the site for the construction of the proposed facility. If feasible, the University will furnish heat to the building from its heating plant. It is understood that the facility will be available to the University for educational purposes. (See letters from gallery officials in EXHIBIT B.)

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Morris, the recommendation was approved.

#### N. STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION

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The Student Government Association Constitution includes a provision that a constitutional convention be held every three years to consider revisions. The original constitution was approved by the Board of Trustees November 21, 1969, consequently, some major revisions have been made this year. These revisions have been made through the efforts of a committee composed of students, faculty and administrators. The Student Government Association Constitution must be passed by the Student Government Senate as well as by the student body in a referendum. The Student Government Senate unanimously approved the proposed Constitution on December 20, 1972. The referendum was held February 1, 1973, with 297 voting for and 54 voting against. The constitution including the proposed revisions is included as EXHIBIT A. It was recommended that the Board of Trustees delete Article X, Section 2, from the Student Government Association Constitution. It was further recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed amended Constitution, with the exception of Article X, Section 2.

Discussion: President Rankin said the primary reason for revising the Student Government Association Constitution was to rewrite the Judicial Section. He added that the trustees had discussed Article X in the Executive Session. Mr. O'Dell said he had spent a lot of time working on the Judicial Section and was extremely pleased with that section, but that he was not really sure that Article X, Section 2, had been handled in the manner he preferred. He said his preference would have been that SGA have their own counsel advising them on points of law rather than relying on Mr. Sullivan's recommendations. President Rankin pointed out to him that the only difference in Article X Section 2, was the addition of the words "right of any person or persons, association or organization." The meaning of the section was not changed, it was simply clarified.

Nr. Acher said he did not see any substantial difference between the two paragraphs. He said he thought it would be presumptuous for the Student Government Association Constitution to define the Board's powers; that is done by Indiana statutes. Mr. Reeves said their only argument was the fact that they did not know if something were being said in this change that they did not know about. He said they were suspicious of Mr. Sullivan's recommendations. Mr. Acher said the Constitution is now before the Board for approval and asked him if he recommended its approval. He replied that he did.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the recommendations were approved.

### 0. CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL OF THE STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION

The authority of the Board of Trustees as it relates to the Student Government Association Constitution adopted on November 21, 1969, was made a part of the Student Government Association Constitution. Since the authority of the Board of Trustees is not subject to student approval, it was recommended that the statement of the relationship of the authority of the Board of Trustees to the Student Government Association Constitution be approved as an action separate from the Student Government Association Constitution. Upon approval of the revised Constitution, this action will be shown as a condition of approval by the Board whenever the Student Government Association Constitution is duplicated.

The revised Constitution of the Student Government Constitution approved on February 17, 1973, by the Board of Trustees of Indiana State University subject to the following conditions:

The Student Government Association Constitution shall not be construed as a relinquishment by the Indiana State University Board of Trustees of any of their rights, obligations, responsibilities and authorities conferred upon them by the State of Indiana, nor shall this Constitution be construed as a relinquishment by said Board of Trustees to act in final judgment on the management of institutional affairs nor shall said Constitution be construed as a recognition by Indiana State University Board of Trustees of any right of any person or persons, association or organization to take any concerted action (including any kind of demonstration) to impede, or to threaten to impede, the Board of Trustees or administration officials in proper and orderly management and operation of the University.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, the recommendation was approved.

#### P. PARKING LOT IMPROVEMENT

The University administration has completed a study of the need to improve University parking lets and has established the order of preference for paving of the lots as follows:

Approval of the paving of the parking lots was recommended, provided however that the President of the University is authorized to change the order in which the parking lots are to be paved and to include the improvement of parking lots intended to serve the University-Civic Amphitheater. It may be necessary to obtain State approvals in order to proceed with one or more of the paving projects and the completion of the total parking lot improvement program is dependent on the continuing availability of funds for the work.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the recommendation was approved with the understanding that the administration be permitted to use their own judgment as to the order in which the parking lots are to be paved.

## Q. ASSIGNMENT OF FLIGHT TRAINING CONTRACT TO REID AIRWAYS, INC.

Reid Airways, Inc., has purchased Hulman Field Aviation and has requested assignment of the flight training contract presently in effect with Hulman Field Aviation, Inc. Mr. Charles Reid, owner of Reid Airways, Inc., served as manager of Hulman Field Aviation, Inc., for a number of years prior to his relocation in West Lafayette, Indiana. Mr. Reid and his company are well qualified to perform the services required by the flight training contract, and the ISU Department of Aerospace Technology has requested that the contract be assigned as requested. The University counsel has reviewed and approved the Assignment of Contract to provide flight training. Approval was recommended.

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## Q. ASSIGNMENT OF FLIGHT TRAINING CONTRACT TO REID AIRWAYS, INC. (CONTINUED)

In response to questions raised by Mr. McCutchan, Mr. Moulton pointed out that Mr. Reid had conducted this program previously for Hulman Field Aviation, Inc., and those associated with it felt the program was conducted much better then. He said that Reid Airways has a flight training contract with the United States Air Force and is properly certified with the FAA. He added that certificates of insurance will be forwarded to the University.

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. McQuillan, assignment of the flight training contract to Reid Airways, Inc., was approved, contingent upon the proper certification being available.

## R. ESTABLISHMENT OF A NEW STUDENT ORIENTATION PROGRAM FEE

For a number of years freshmen have been brought to campus during the summer months for primarily three purposes: testing, academic advising and registration. Another function which has been performed is orientation to university life, but only when time permitted. There is some concern that the student and parent are not getting an adequate orientation to Indiana State University as an institution. University officials who work with these sessions believe that more time should be made available in the summer program to provide in-depth orientation for parents and students about the University and its major tasks.

The decrease in the amount of time needed for testing and the transfer of other non-essentials out of this program to the Fall has made time available for greater orientation of a general institutional nature. In order to insure the greatest probability of success for the program, it has been suggested that trained students serve as leaders for small group orientation sessions. In order to make such a plan workable, the students would be selected and trained prior to the arrival of the new students on campus. Because the sessions are overlapping, the small group discussion leaders will be needed full-time during the period of the eight orientation sessions. To finance such a program many universities have an "orientation fee" of some type.

To obtain needed fund to improve the new student orientation program, it was recommended that the University establish a new student orientation program fee of \$2 per student and per parent, effective summer of 1973. Board of Trustees approval was recommended.

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the recommendation was approved.

Before adjourning, President Rankin shared with the trustees the correspondence from Mrs. Tirey in which she thanked the members of the Board for their concern for her welfare.

Meeting adjourned at 11:05 a.m.

RE: Student Government Constitution Revisions

At your request, I have reviewed the final working draft of the Student Government Constitution, dated December 1972, and have compared it to the present constitution in order to clarify the changes as proposed. The changes are highlighted on the attached working draft; though many of them are editorial or made to bring the constitution in line with current practice, some of the changes are significant and need to be so identified.

Article IV - Section 7 (Rights of Students in Disciplinary Procedures)

A very helpful change is the move from affording full due process to all students who are accused of a violation of University or residence hall regulations, to the use of the full process only when the adjudication may result in a change of student status or standing. In this same section the search and seizure statement stipulates three options whereby search and seizure may be undertaken: permission of the student (same as before), permission of designated University official(s), or a legal search warrant. The statement is intended to clarify the meaning of "warrant" which appears in the current constitution.

An additional part was added to this section which permits a complainant to request to be informed as to the outcome of his complaint. In the current constitution the complainant does not have the right to know the status of the complaint nor the results.

Article V - Section 5

A change was made in this section which will enable record-keeping personnel who are not employed full-time, to have access to student records and files.

Article VI - Executive

The provision for a cabinet made up of representatives from Women's Hall Association, Men's Hall Association, Interfraternity Council, Panhellenic Council, Tirey Memorial Union Board, Black Student Forum etc. was deleted from this constitution.

Article VII - Legislative

Section 11, A, 11

Provides for the Student Senate to make recommendations on matters affecting Student Government Association to both joint Student-Faculty-Administrative Committees and appropriate University officials as well as to pass resolutions indicating approval or disapproval of any proposals affecting the student body from both joint committees and University officials.

Article VIII - Judicial

A major change in the proposed constitution deals with the judicial branch--the entire article has been rewritten with the main objective being the amalgamation of the complex, commuter, and IFC courts into one Student Court. The jurisdiction originally assigned to all of the different courts has been placed under the Student Court.

The option for splitting the All-University Court of Appeals into Triads, to enable the Court to hear more cases during times when the load is heavy, has been placed in the proposed constitution--this option is considered the supplemental triads system. The provision for establishing an emergency triad system still exists also. The major difference between the two triad systems is the appeal route--the supplemental triad appeals go to the full All-University Court, then to the President. Appeals from the emergency system go directly to the President.

The makeup of the All-University Court has been changed to bring the numbers into balance for a triad system to function; provision is made for six faculty members, six students, and six administrative officials. An administrative non-voting advisor has also been added to the All-University Court of Appeals; they already have been functioning with the other courts.

The role of the student court coordinators has now been defined constitutionally and their responsibilities have been delineated.

Since the work of the student courts has varied greatly in the past, the drafting committee has added four parts to the constitution that put certain time limits on the actions of the courts.

The last major change in the judicial section concerns the quorum needed for a valid hearing; for both the Student Court and the Traffic Court, the quorum has been reduced to three justices, the court clerk, and the non-voting administrative advisor.

Article IX - Finances

The statement acted upon by the Board regarding protection of University funds has been added to this article.

Article X - Adoption

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Section 2 pertaining to obligations, responsibilities, and authorities of the Board of Trustees has been added to this article.

The above listed statements are the substantive changes in the proposed Student Government Association Constitution.

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### CONSTITUTION

### STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION OF INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY\*

#### PREAMBLE

We, the members of the Student Government Association of Indiana State University of Terre Haute, Indiana, desiring to provide a form of government for the supervision of student activities; to provide a form for the expression of student views and interests; to maintain academic freedom, academic responsibility, and student rights; to improve student social, cultural, and physical welfare; to develop better educational standards, facilities, and teaching methods; to help promote national and international understanding and fellowship at the student level; and to foster recognition of the rights of students in this school and in this community, do hereby establish this constitution.

#### ARTICLE I

#### Name and Purpose

#### Section 1

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The name of the official student governing body at Indiana State University will be the Student Government Association.

#### Section 2

The purposes of the Student Government Association are those stated in the preamble of this Constitution.

#### ARTICLE II

#### Membership

All graduate and undergraduate students currently enrolled for University credit during a regular or summer session of Indiana State University shall be members of the Student Government Association of Indiana State University at Terre Haute, Indiana.

#### ARTICLE III

#### Distribution of Power

Section 1

The Student Government Association will be organized into three branches: the Executive, the Legislative, and the Judicial.

- A. The Executive Branch will consist of the president, vice president, treasurer,
- secretary, parliamentarian, executive commissions, and advisory board (the Cabinet).B. The Legislative Branch will consist of the Student Senate.
- C. The Judicial Branch will consist of the Student Court and the Traffic Court as authorized by the Student Government Association.

#### Section 2

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No person or group of persons in one of these branches will exercise any power belonging to the other, except as hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

#### ARTICLE IV

#### Bill of Rights and Freedoms of Students

Section 1 (Definitions)

Indiana State University or the University is defined as the institution composed of the Board of Trustees, the Administration, the faculty, the students, other University employees, and the facilities of Indiana State University at Terre Haute, Indiana.

The Student Government Association Constitution was ratified by student referendum, November 12, 1969 and approved by the Board of Trustees, November 21, 1969.

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The Board of Trustees is defined as the governing body of the University, deriving its powers from the laws of the State of Indiana.

The Administration is defined as the administrative appointees at the University.

The faculty is defined as those persons appointed primarily for the purpose of conducting classroom activities.

Students are defined as all persons currently enrolled for University credit.

Student laws are defined as those laws made and legally adopted by the Student Government Association.

Section 2 (Right of Access to Higher Education)

- A. No person will be denied admission, readmission, or graduation at Indiana State University or any school, department or division thereof, on the basis of race, creed, religion, national origin, personal beliefs, personal opinions, or fixed physical attributes.
- B. No person will be denied admission, readmission, or graduation at Indiana State University or any school, department, or division thereof, for failure or refusal to submit information concerning his race, creed, religion, national origin, personal beliefs, personal opinions, or fixed physical attributes.
- C. Any student has the right to take any available class or course offered at Indiana State University for which he is willing and able to pay tuition and for which he has fulfilled the University prerequisites.
- D. No person will be denied admission, readmission, or graduation at Indiana State University for refusal or failure to surrender any of the rights, freedoms or privileges guaranteed or granted to him by the Constitution or the laws of the United States, or the Constitution or the laws of the State of Indiana.

Section 3 (Academic Rights)

- A. Students have the right to know their academic standing and the criteria on which they are being evaluated in any course in which they are enrolled. Students have the right to be evaluated solely on the stated criteria in any course in which they are enrolled.
- B. The professor in the classroom and in conference shall encourage free discussion, inquiry, and expression. Student performance shall be evaluated solely on an academic basis, not on opinions or conduct in matters unrelated to academic standards. Students shall be free to take reasoned exception to the data or views offered in any course of study and to reserve judgment about matters of opinion, but they are responsible for learning the content of any course of study for which they are enrolled.
- C. Students shall have protection through orderly procedures against prejudiced or capricious academic evaluation. At the same time they are responsible for maintaining standards of academic performance established for each course in which they are enrolled.

Section 4 (Student Right of Protection from Disclosure of Confidential Information)

Students have the right of protection from invasion of privacy and disclosure of privileged information. Information from academic records, the Student Personnel File including disciplinary records, medical records, psychiatric records, counseling files, and financial aid records will not be available to unauthorized persons on campus or to any person off campus without the express consent of the student, except under legal compulsion or in the case of a serious threat to the welfare or safety of persons or property.

Section 5 (Rights of Assembly and Association)

- A. Students have the right to assemble peaceably on University owned property, subject to lawful regulation by the University.
- B. Students have the right to organize and join associations to promote their common interests.
  C. Organizations have the right to petition Student Government Association for recognition according to standards established and published by the Student Senate. In the event of a dispute as to the recognition of any particular organization, the matter shall be referred to the student judiciary for determination in accordance with its procedures.

No organization will be refused recognition or have its recognition revoked without procedural due process of student law.

- D. Students and student organizations have the right to examine, criticize, and discuss questions of interest, publicly and privately.
- E. Organizations have the right to establish requirements for their own membership except on the basis of race, creed, color, or national origin.
- F. Except as stated in the previous item, neither the University nor the Student Government Association, nor any part of either, shall determine the internal policies of any specific organization.
- G. The student press should be free of censorship and advance approval of copy, and its editors and managers should be free to develop their own editorial policies and news coverage.

Editors and managers of student publications should be protected from arbitrary suspension and removal because of student, faculty, administrative or public disapproval of editorial policy or content. Only for proper and stated causes should editors and managers be subject to removal and then by orderly and prescribed procedures. The agency responsible for the appointment of editors and managers should be the agency responsible for their removal.

All university published and financed student publications should explicitly state on the editorial page that the opinions there expressed are not necessarily those of the college, university or student body.

### Section 6 (Right of Participation in Decision Making)

Students have the right to formal participation in a student government of their own design by means of which they may express their opinions and by which they may effect these opinions. Students shall have a means by which they may determine the structure of said government.

Section 7 (Rights of Students in Disciplinary Procedures)

- A. University procedural due process will be observed in all disciplinary situations which might result in a change of student status or standing.
  - . 1. University disciplinary action is not taken by the University simply to duplicate the judgment of civil law, but to serve the purposes peculiar to the University community.
    - 2. The University shall not institute disciplinary action against a student for offcampus conduct, criminal or otherwise, except in the case of a serious threat to the welfare or safety of persons or property.
    - 3. Criminal conduct on the campus may subject a student to prosecution by civil authorities.
    - 4. For criminal conduct on the campus which has been referred to civil authorities, the University may institute appropriate disciplinary action provided that:
      - a. the University awaits the outcome of the criminal charges, except in the case of a serious threat to the welfare or safety of persons or property; and
    - b. the student requests a speedy trial and proceeds to trial without undue delay.
      5. Within the guidelines of University procedural due process, a student accused of violations of University rules, regulations or policies shall have the right to choose between the Student Court System and the Administrative Hearing System for adjudication, when the Student Court System is functioning.
    - 6. Within the guidelines of University procedural due process, a student accused of violations of University rules, regulations, or policies shall have the right to have a charge brought to bear within six (6) months after a charge is brought before the appropriate official of the Administration.
    - 7. A student has the right to know whether or not statements that he may make in disciplinary or counseling situations can be used in student courts, administrative procedures, or civil courts.
    - 8. A student shall have the right to have his interim suspension reviewed by the All-University Court of Appeals within five (5) school days after that suspension shall take effect; such review shall be conducted by the All-University Court of Appeals or such alternate system as has been provided by this constitution.
    - 9. A student subjected to interim suspension, and later exonerated, shall have the right to appeal to the All-University Court of Appeals to request that the University do everything in its power to see that the student is not unduly damaged by the interim suspension.
- C. Neither the University not Student Government nor any part of either shall make any rule, regulation, or law which shall deny any student of the rights, freedoms, or privileges guaranteed or granted by the United States Constitution or the laws under it, or the State of Indiana Constitution or the laws under it. Nor will any rule, regulation, or law be construed or interpreted as denial of such rights and privileges.
- D. Except under extreme emergency circumstances, neither the property occupied by a student, nor the person of a student, nor his personal possessions will be searched nor seized by representatives, agents, employees or other persons acting for the University without one of the following: permission of the student, permission of designated University official(s), or a legal search warrant.
- E. All students accused of violation of University rules, regulations, or student law shall be considered innocent until found guilty. The mere accusation of a violation shall in no way be construed as to limit the rights or privileges of the student, except in the case of a serious threat to the welfare or safety of persons or property.
- F. A person who files a complaint against a student for violation of University rules, regulations, or student law shall have the right, upon request, to be informed: (1) if a charge has been filed as a result of the complaint, (2) if a hearing has been held, and (3) the results of the hearing.
- G. Students shall have the right of access to all official University rules, regulations, and student laws.

#### ARTICLE V

#### Student Records

Academic freedom and privacy rights intersect and reinforce each other in the sensitive area of academic record-keeping and in the determination of what information may be disclosed within and outside the academic community. The professional relation between teacher and student, somewhat like that between lawyer and client or physician and patient, presupposes, at least within certain limits, privacy of communication. Similarly, the relation between the University and its students presupposes that records will be kept only of matters relevant to the educational process and that even those minimal records will not be disclosed except with the student's consent or in carefully circumscribed instances based upon clearly defined policy.

#### Section 1

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### Separate files shall be maintained as follows:

- A. Academic records, supporting documents, and general educational records;
- B. Student Personnel File including records of discipline proceedings;
  - C. Medical and psychiatric records; and
  - D. Financial Aid records.

#### Section 2

No entry shall be made in a student's academic record or Student Personnel File, and no document shall be placed in a student's academic record or Student Personnel File without actual notice to the student. Publication of grades and announcement of honors shall be deemed actual notice.

#### Section 3

Except for medical, psychiatric, and financial aid records, each student shall have access to his records and files, as outlined above, subject only to reasonable regulation as to time, place, and supervision.

#### Section 4

Information relating in any way to any of the following categories is not relative to the educational process. Accordingly, no record shall be made in relation to a specific student on any such matter except upon the express written request of the student in question.

- A. Race;
- B. Religion;C. Political or social views; and
- C. Political or social views; and
- D. Membership in any organization other than honorary and professional organizations directly related to the educational process.

#### Section 5

Except with the prior written consent of the student concerned, or as stated below, no information in any student file may be released to any individual or organization.

- A. Members of the University staff employed as record-keeping personnel may have access to student records and files, however the information in those files is confidential.
- B. Members of the faculty with administrative assignments may have access to academic records and files for internal educational purposes, as well as for routinely necessary administrative and statistical purposes. Access to financial, medical, and psychiatric records, and Student Personnel File is limited to the officials responsible for those matters. No one having access under this paragraph may disclose any information beyond that listed in C and D below.
- C. The following information may be given any inquirer, and is the only information to be released in response to a telephone inquiry; a student's address, telephone number, date of birth, and social security number; school or college of enrollment; honors and major; periods of enrollment; and degree(s) awarded and date. In addition, a student's signature may be confirmed. Different or further information may not be given in the event that the inquirer's information is incomplete or incorrect.
- D. Properly identified officials from federal, state, and local agencies may be given the following information if expressly requested: school or division of enrollment; periods of enrollment; degree awarded, honors, major field, and date; nature of academic record in general, i.e., excellent, good, fair (not specific grades); address, verification of signature; and name and address of parent or guardian.
- E. No person making an inquiry may be given direct access to any student file, except under legal compulsion.

#### Section 6

No record of any student shall be preserved beyond graduation or other final departure from the University except as follows:

- A. The academic record may be retained subject to the limitations on disclosure stated above;
   B. The Student Personnel File may be retained for three (3) years subject to the limitations on disclosure stated above. After three (3) years, the Student Personnel File will be destroyed and a summary card (which may be retained indefinitely) containing the following information will be filed:
  - 1. Face-sheet data (name, sex, transfer student, marital status, state, country);
  - 2. Information outlined in Section 5, C and D above;
  - 3. Cumulative Grade-Point Average;
  - 4. Membership and offices in student organizations (information volunteered by the student); and
  - 5. Dates of suspension and readmission.
- C. Financial records may be retained so long as any obligation to the University continues; and
  D. Medical and psychiatric records may be retained subject to the limitations on disclosure imposed by the normal rules for privileged information.

#### ARTICLE VI Executive

#### Section 1 (Name)

All executive powers granted in this article are vested in the president and vice president of the Student Government Association of Indiana State University at Terre Haute, Indiana.

## Section 2 (Qualifications)

A candidate for the presidency or the vice-presidency of the Student Government Association must have completed forty-five (45) semester hours of University credit with a cumulative grade point average of 2.00 and have spent at least two (2) consecutive semesters immediately preceding his candidacy as a student on the Terre Haute campus of Indiana State University. He will otherwise fulfill all other requirements of a candidate for the Student Senate.

## Section 3 (Elections)

- A. All members of the Student Government Association are eligible to vote for the president and vice president of the Student Government Association.
- B. If there is only one eligible candidate for president or vice president of the Student Government Association, the election of that candidate shall be automatic.
  C. In order to be properly elected, a candidate must be certified by the Bureau Chief of
- C. In order to be properly elected, a candidate must be certified by the Bureau Chief of Campus Elections in accordance with Section 10 of this Article.

#### Section 4 (Term of Office)

The president and vice president, elected the second Wednesday in March, are to assume their offices on the third Wednesday in April, and are to hold these offices during the ensuing calendar year.

#### Section 5 (Succession)

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- A. Should the president of the Student Government Association be impeached and convicted, resign, withdraw from school, or prove unable to serve for any reason, the vice president of the Student Government Association will succeed him.
- B. Should the vice president of the Student Government Association in like manner be unable to serve, the speaker pro-tem will succeed him; two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate will then select a new vice president.
- C. Should the speaker pro-tem in like manner be unable to serve, two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate will then select a new speaker pro-tem.

#### Section 6 (Oath of Office)

On the third Wednesday in April, the following oath of office will be administered to the president-elect and the vice president-elect by the chief justice of the Student Court or by an associate justice designated by him:

"I, . . . . . . . do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will preserve, protect, and defend the Indiana State University Student Government Association Constitution, and that I will execute the duties of my office to the best of my ability (so help me God)."

#### Section 7 (Impeachment)

The president or vice president of the Student Government Association or any other executive officer may be impeached for malfeasance or dereliction of duty in office.

- A. Impeachment may be instigated by five senators or petition, and effected by two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate.
- B. Impeachment may be effected by a petition of twenty (20) percent of the members of the Student Government Association.

#### Section 8 (Limited Service)

A student serving as president or vice president of the Student Government Association shall hold no other campus office.

#### Section 9 (Student Election Commission)

The Bureau Chief of Campus Elections, appointed by the president of the Student Government Association, will regulate, conduct, and supervise campus elections in accordance with the Indiana State University Student Government Association Constitution and Student Senate legislation.

#### Section 10 (Powers)

- The president of the Student Government Association shall have the power to:
- A. Create commissions, additional cabinet seats, and appoint all necessary personnel, with the approval of two-thirds of the voting memberships of the Student Senate;
- B. Dismiss any executive appointed personnel, excluding judicial and cabinet appointments;C. Dismiss members of his cabinet, with the approval of two-thirds of the voting membership
- of the Student Senate; D. Require opinions in writing from each of the executive appointed officers on any subject relative to the duties of their respective offices;
- E. Call a special session of the Student Senate, and at the same time inform the members of the Student Senate of the subject matter to be considered at that session.
- F. Veto Student Senate legislation as outlined in Article VII, Section 14 of this Constitution; and
- G. Take any other action necessary to the performance of his duties and responsibilities under this Constitution.

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# Section 11 (Duties)

- The president of the Student Government Association shall:
  - 1. Make periodic reports to the Student Senate and suggest measures he may judge necessary and expedient to the efficient operation of the Student Government Association.
    - Represent the Student Government Association at all official functions of Indiana State University or wherever official representation is required;
  - 3. Take care that all student laws are faithfully executed;
  - 4. Act as an ex-officio non-voting member of all committees and board established under the Student Government Association:

  - Assist the treasurer in preparing the annual budget;
     Provide a channel of communications between the Administration and the Student Government Association; and between the faculty and the Student Government Association;
  - 7. Acquaint the president-elect with the duties and responsibilities of the office of president of the Student Government Association.
- B. The vice president shall:
  - 1. Call and preside over meetings of the Student Senate;
  - 2. Act for the president in his absence, upon his request, or in the event that he is temporarily unable to serve;
  - Communicate legislation and other Student Government business to the president; 4. Act as an ex-officio non-voting member of all committees and boards established under the Student Government Association; and
  - 5. Acquaint the vice president-elect with the duties and responsibilities of the office of vice president of the Student Government Association.
- C. The treasurer shall:
  - 1. Prepare an annual budget for the ensuing year and present it to the Student Senate for approval by two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate; 2. Make a record of all expenditures and income;
  - Make monthly reports at Student Senate meetings of any and all single expenditures 3. over \$25.00, income, and balance;
  - Personally keep the accounts of the Student Government Association;
  - 5. Be prepared to present the accounts for inspection upon the request of any member of the University community; and
  - Make (prior to the expiration of his term of office) a final report to the Student Senate, including an exact record and description of all expenditures made and income received during his term of office.

# Section 12 (Resignation)

The resignation of an officer must be presented in writing at a regular meeting of the Student Senate at least two weeks prior to the time the resignation shall take effect.\*

#### ARTICLE VII

#### Legislative

#### Section 1 (Name)

All legislative power granted herein shall be vested in the Student Government Association of Indiana State University at Terre Haute, Indiana, and exercised by the Student Senate.

Section 2 (Membership and Voting Rights)

- A. The Student Senate shall be composed of senators chosen every year by the student members of the several voting districts, as defined in this Constitution. No student may be counted as belonging to more than one voting district.
  - The voting districts of Student Government shall be defined as the residence halls, 1. taken singly, with the total commuter population and Inter-fraternity Housing
  - constituting one voting district each.
  - Each residence hall shall elect one voting senator. 2.
  - Interfraternity Housing shall elect one voting senator. з.
  - Students living in residence halls cannot be elected Senators-at-Large, unless they 4. will be living off campus by the start of the fall's semester.
  - 5. Voting senators-at-large shall be elected by commuter students according to the following formula. Each year as of February 15, the number of commuter students shall be divided by the average number of students in a residence hall. The number of resultant "election units", plus one for any major fraction thereof, shall determine the number of senators-at-large. The necessary data shall be furnished by the appropriate administrative offices.\*\*
- Permanent speaking seats shall be awarded to: в.
  - The Executive Branch of Student Government,

  - 4. Senior Class Council
  - The governing body of RHA. 5.

- 9. The Faculty,
- 10. The Administration, and

11. Any other organization that Student Senate shall designate by majority vote.

All people holding speaking seats shall be subject to the same rules and regulations as those holding voting seats. They may make recommendations to the Student Senate, but may not make any formal motions or seconds.

- Officers of the Student Senate с.
  - 1. President of the Student Senate
    - a. The vice president of the Student Government Association shall act as the
    - president of the Senate.
    - b. The president of the Student Senate may vote only to break a tie.
  - President Pro Tempore 2.
    - a. At the first meeting, the Student Senate shall elect a president pro tempore, by two-thirds of its voting membership.
    - b. The president pro tempore shall preside over all meetings in the absence of the president of the Student Senate.
  - 3. Secretary of the Student Senate
    - a. The secretary shall be appointed by the president of the Student Government Association, with the approval of two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate.
    - b. In the event that the president cannot appoint an acceptable candidate within two successive meetings, the Student Senate shall establish a committee to propose a candidate who meets with the approval of two-thirds of the voting membership of Student Senate at the following meeting.
    - c. The secretary shall keep minutes and a record of attendance at all Student Senate meetings.
    - d. The secretary shall provide a copy of each set of minutes for the members of the Student Senate, the President of the Student Government Association, and the advisors to the Student Senate.
    - The secretary shall keep an official record in a permanent file in the Student e. Government Office of all legislation and minutes and perform any clerical duties required by the Student Government Association.
  - 4. Parliamentarian
    - a. The parliamentarian shall be appointed by the vice president of the Student Government with the approval of two-thirds of the voting membership in the Student Senate.
    - b. In event that the vice president cannot appoint an acceptable candidate within two successive meetings, then the Student Senate shall appoint a committee to propose a candidate who meets with the approval of two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate at the next meeting.
    - c. The parliamentarian shall assist the Student Government Association in all matters concerning parliamentary procedure.
    - The parliamentarian shall be present or represented at all meetings of the Student d. Senate.

Section 3 (Qualifications)

- A. All members of the Student Senate shall be enrolled for at least six (6) hours of University credit and be in good standing with the University during their terms of Office.
- B. All senators shall have and maintain at least a 2.00 cumulative grade point average.C. The Student Senate shall be the sole judge of other qualifications of its members.

Section 4 (Elections)

All voting senators shall be elected at the same time as the president and vice president " of the Student Government Association.

#### Section 5 (Terms of Office)

All voting senators shall assume their offices on the third Wednesday in April, and will hold these offices during the ensuing calendar year.

# Section 6 (Oath of Office)

The chief justice of the Student Court or an associate justice appointed by him shall administer the oath of office taken by the president and vice president of Student Government on the appropriate date as specified in this Constitution.

#### Section 7 (Quorum)

Two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate shall constitute a quorum.

Section 8 (Official Rules and Records)

The Senate may determine the rules of its proceedings, and shall keep an official record of these proceedings, which shall be published at the end of each session.

Section 9 (Recall)

A. Senators elected from a residence hall are subject to recall by a majority vote of the constituents of that voting district, provided that a recall petition shall have been signed by 25 percent of the constituents of that voting district and submitted to the Student Senate.

B. Senators-at-large shall be subject to recall by a majority vote of the votes cast by the constituents of that voting district, provided that a recall petition shall have been signed by 100 of the constituents of that voting district and submitted to the Student Senate. A student may not sign more than one recall petition per year.

Section 10 (Initiative and Referendum)

- A. Upon petition of five (5) percent of the members of the Student Government Association, any legislation which they (the petitioners) deem necessary shall be submitted to the Student Body at the next all-campus election. If accepted, this legislation will have the same standing as any legislation passed by the Student Senate and signed by the president.
- B. One-third of the voting membership of the Student Senate may submit any legislation to the members of the Student Government Association at the next all-campus election. If approved, such legislation shall have the same standing as any legislation passed by the Student Senate and signed by the president.

Section 11 (Powers and Duties of the Student Senate)

- A. The Student Senate shall have the power to:
  - 1. Act as the spokesman for the students of Indiana State University at Terre Haute, Indiana.
  - 2. Approve, by two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate, appointments of the president of the Student Government Association which are not directed by this Constitution.
  - 3. Establish regulations affecting student elections which are open to substantially all the members of the student body or of any one class.
  - 4. Try Student Court, Traffic Court, and student All-University Court of Appeals justices, after their impeachment.
  - 5. Promote and foster cultural, educational, and service projects, and serve the interest of the Indiana State University community.
  - 6. Effect by two-thirds of the voting membership the impeachment of the president or vice president of the Student Government Association or any other executive officer.
  - 7. Approve by two-thirds of the voting membership appointments by the president of the Student Government Association to the All-University Parking and Traffic Committee. It shall be a duty of the Senate to require periodic reports from these appointees, receive other reports from, and make recommendations to the All-University Parking and Traffic Committee.
  - 8. Establish criteria for recognition as a campus organization. Upon application for recognition, it shall be the duty of the Student Senate to circulate said application by appropriate means to the University community. Any administrator acting in his official capacity, any recognized student organization, or any ten members of the University community may, within ten (10) days of the circulation, lodge an objection to recognition with the Student Government Association stating reasons for the objection. It shall be the duty of the Student Government Association to communicate the objection to the organization and to refer the matter to the Student Court System for decision. If no objection is lodged within ten (10) days, the organization is considered recognized.

Social fraternities and sororities will be considered members of IFC and Panhellenic, respectively, and subject to the established recognition procedures of these organize-tions.

- 9. Establish any activities commensurate with the interests of the Student Government Association of Indiana State University.
- 10. Approve student nominations to university committees and all other committees which provide for student representation.
- 11. Make recommendations to joint Student-Faculty-Administrative Committees and appropriate University officials on matters affecting Student Government Association and in matters of importance, pass resolutions indicating approval or disapproval of any proposals affecting the Student Body from joint Student-Faculty-Administrative Committees or University officials with suggestions for change.
- 12. Foster and regulate the non-academic aspects of student life. The committees of the Student Senate which first consider proposed legislation in this area shall have non-voting administrative and faculty members. Legislation passed by the Student Senate shall be transmitted to the Vice President for Student Affairs. If the Vice President concurs with the proposed legislation and determines by the established criteria that it need not be specifically approved by the Board of Trustees, the legislation shall take effect as provided. If the proposed legislation is of such nature that the Board of Trustees must specifically approve it, or if the Vice President does not concur, he shall send it forward to the President for inclusion on the agenda of the Board, together with his commentary and recommendation. A copy of this recommendation and commentary shall at the same time be sent to the President of the Student Government Association. The Vice President shall act on each item of legislation transmitted to him within thirty days, and items sent to the Board shall be placed on the Board's agenda at the earliest feasible date.
- 13. To make all policies, unless otherwise prohibited by this Constitution, which shall be necessary to the exercise of the foregoing and all other powers vested by this Constitution in the Student Government Association.
- 14. Elect the president and vice president of Student Government Association, if none is provided by an election.
- B. All powers not granted to another student organization, student office, or student department shall be reserved solely by the Student Senate.

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# Section 13 (Vacancies)

- A. Should a student senator resign or be removed from office before his term has expired, he shall be replaced at the discretion of the members of his housing district, except for senators-at-large who shall be replaced by appointment of the president with approval of two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate.
- B. All appointments shall be made within thirty (30) days of the occurrence of the vacancy.

# Section 14 (Veto Powers)

- A. Every bill or resolution that is passed by the Student Senate shall, before it becomes law, be presented to the president of the Student Government Association by the president of the Student Senate. The president of the Student Government Association must act on that bill before the next regularly scheduled meeting after its passage unless the Student Senate authorizes an extension of time for its consideration. If the president approves the bill, it will become law. If the president returns the bill to the Student Senate with his veto, the Student Senate will enter the objections in its journal and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such consideration, two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate agree to pass the bill, it will become law. If any bill is not returned by the president after the specified time, that bill will become law as if he had signed it.
- B. If the president vetoes a bill, he shall submit a written explanation to the Student Senate at the next regularly scheduled meeting. That written statement shall be entered in the journal of the Student Senate.

## ARTICLE VIII

#### Judicial

# Section 1 (Name)

All judicial power granted in this article is vested in the Student Court System.

#### Section 2 (Structure)

- A. Student Government Association shall establish and maintain one Student Court.
- B. There shall be one Student Traffic Court, except when, at the determination by the Chief Justice of the Traffic Court in consultation with the Student Court Coordinators and the President of Student Government Association, a plethora of appeals exists which would warrant the establishment of additional Traffic Courts in order to expedite the adjudication of the appeals.
- C. There shall be one All-University Court of Appeals except when, at the determination by the President of the University, in consultation with the Coordinators of the Student Court System, the President or Vice President of Student Government Association, and the Chief Justice of the All-University Court of Appeals, a situation exists on the campus warranting a change of systems to expedite the handling of a large number of cases. Under these circumstances, the All-University Court of Appeals shall be supplemented or replaced with a system of triads.

#### Section 3 (Jurisdiction)

- A. The Student Traffic Court shall have jurisdiction over appellate cases involving decisions concerning violations of University traffic regulations.
- B. The Student Court shall have jurisdiction over:
  - 1. All cases involving the constitutionality under this constitution, or residence hall constitutions and constitutions of campus organizations. National fraternal constitutions are excluded from this jurisdiction.
  - 2. All cases concerning the Student Government Association Constitution;
  - 3. All cases where there is no provision made for jurisdiction in the Constitution;
  - 4. All cases of constitutionality of Student Senate legislation;
  - 5. All cases involving election result contestments in elections involving substantially all of the members of the student body, or any one class, or of any one sex;
  - 6. All cases involving impeachment trials of Student Government executive officials,
  - 7. All cases involving the constitutionality, under this Constitution, of the Constitutions and by-laws of Residence Halls Association, Interfraternity Council, and Panhellenic Council; and
  - 8. All cases involving contested recognition or revocation of recognition of student organizations.
  - 9. All cases of original jurisdiction concerning disciplinary situations when a student, charged with a violation of University policy, chooses to have his hearing with a student hearing group.
- C. The All-University Court of Appeals shall have jurisdiction over:
  - 1. Appellate cases of contested recognition or revocation of recognition of student organizations;
  - 2. All appellate cases involving disciplinary decisions made by the Administrative System except as provided elsewhere in the Constitution.
  - 3. All appellate cases involving disciplinary decisions made by the supplemental Triad System, when it is in operation.

- 4. All appellate cases involving disciplinary decisions made by the Student Court System.
- All reviews of interim suspension.
   All cases referred under the provi All cases referred under the provision of Section 8, C of this article.
- Unusual cases upon referral by the Student Court System or the Administrative Hearing System.
- D.. Triads of the All-University Court of Appeals shall have jurisdiction over the same areas as that of the full All-University Court of Appeals, except for appellate cases from the Triad System.
- E. Charge, Trial, and Appeal
  - 1. A complaint may be brought against a student by any member of the University In all cases, the complaint shall be brought before the appropriate community. official of the Administration. This official will communicate the charge to the student who may then choose between the Student Court System and the Administrative System for adjudication. However, students only have the choice of Administrative or Student Court Systems when the Student Court System is functioning and Student Life has been notified by SGA that the hearing system is functioning. If these provisions are not met, the case will be heard in the Administrative Hearing System.
  - 2. A decision of the Student Court System may be appealed by the defendant or the administration to the All-University Court of Appeals or Triad System, when functioning, provided that:
    - There is a question concerning the constitutionality of the rule, regulation, a. or student law allegedly violated;
    - The failure of due process is claimed; ь.
    - Significant new evidence is to be introduced; с.
    - d.
  - The recommended action is questioned; and The Court or Triad has not previously heard another appeal of the same case. e. 3. Providing the Student Court System is functioning, the defendant may select, at the time the charge is received, either the Administrative Hearing System or the Student Court System. He may then follow the appeal route to the All-University Court of Appeals or Triad, when that system is in effect. Decisions of the All-University Court of Appeals or of a Triad, if the Court is not functioning, may be appealed only to the President of the University, who with the aid of the Vice President for Student Affairs, shall have the final jurisdiction subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees.
  - 4. A student subjected to interim suspension will automatically have his suspension reviewed by the All-University Court of Appeals (or Triad if that system is functioning) to determine if a full hearing is appropriate. If a hearing is to be held every attempt will be made to have that hearing within five (5) school days of the beginning of the suspension. A student will remain in the status of interim suspension, until the Administration or the appeal group has revoked that suspension. A student subjected to interim suspension and later exonerated, shall have the right to request that the Chief Justice of the All-University Court of Appeals notify all appropriate Vice Presidents of the action so that they can do everything in their power to see that the student is not unduly damaged by the interim suspension.

# Section 4 (Student Membership)

- A. Student Court
  - 1. The president of the Student Government Association, with the approval of two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate shall appoint nine (9) justices to constitute the Student Court. These justices should reflect the make-up of the student body, in regard to sex, race, college residence, and class standing; the justices should be in good standing with the University.
  - 2. A duly appointed member of the Student Court shall retain office unless he is impeached and convicted, resigns, leaves Indiana State University, or fails to sign a statement of intent about future court commitments.
- B. Traffic Court
  - 1. The president of the Student Government Association, with the approval of two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate shall appoint nine (9) justices to constitute a Traffic Court. These justices should reflect the make-up of the student body, in regard to sex, race, college residence, and class standing; the justices should be in good standing with the University.
  - 2. A duly appointed member of the Student Court shall retain office unless he is impeached and convicted, resigns, leaves Indiana State University, or fails to sign a statement of intent about future court commitments.
- C. All-University Court of Appeals
  - 1. The court will include faculty, students, and administrative officials appointed by the President of the University, upon recommendation as listed below: a. Faculty Membership
    - Faculty membership shall include one (1) faculty member each from the Academic Schools and Colleges of the University recommended by the Dean of that School or College. The three year terms of these faculty members shall be staggered.
    - b. The six (6) student representatives, no more than three (3) of whom shall be from any one class at the time of appointment, shall be recommended for appointment by the President of the Student Government Association and will retain office until they are removed, resign, or leave Indiana State University, or fail to sign a statement of intent about future court commitments. These student representatives shall be in good standing with the University.
    - c. Administrative Membership Six (6) administrative officials, recommended by the Vice President of Student Affairs, shall be members of this committee. These officials should not have any responsibilities for handling of disciplinary situations in order to prevent conflicting roles. The three year terms of these officials shall be staggered.

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- 2. Responsibilities for performance of duties on this court shall take precedence over other obligations of the student justices.
- 3. The Chief Justice shall be a faculty member. This position shall be rotated each
- year among the Colleges and Schools.
  Specific Hearing Situations

  Any specific hearing committee shall be made up of the Chief Justice (non-voting),
  two (2) other faculty members, three (3) students, and two (2) administrators, all
- selected in accordance with a randomized procedure.
  D. The Student Court, the Traffic Court, and the All-University Court of Appeals, shall
  have an administrative non-voting advisor to insure that due process is observed, and
  that protection is provided for the rights of the court and the individual whose
  conduct situation is being heard.
- E. When the Triad System is in effect, student membership shall be determined by the procedural guidelines established by the All-University Court of Appeals.

### Section 5 (Qualifications)

Qualification of the justices of the Student Court and the Student Traffic Court shall be determined by Student Government Association within the guidelines of this Constitution.

#### Section 6 (Vacancies)

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The filling of vacancies on the student courts shall be determined by Student Government Association. For the student courts, the designated official (the president of the Student Government Association) shall fill all vacancies within two weeks of their occurrence in the manner heretofore mentioned for appointment. Otherwise vacancies will be filled by a vote of two-thirds of the membership of the Student Senate.

Vacancies on the All-University Court of Appeals, will be filled by the President of the University upon recommendation of the person(s) or group(s) making the original recommendations.

#### Section 7 (Impeachment)

Impeachment proceedings of the student court justices shall be determined by the body designated to create said court.

- A. In the case of the Student Court and the Student Traffic Court, a justice may be impeached for malfeasance in office or dereliction of duty by four justices of his/her court.
- B. In the case of the All-University Court of Appeals, a student justice may be impeached for malfeasance in office or dereliction of duty by a majority of the justices of that court.
- C. The impeached justice is tried by the Student Senate and convicted by two-thirds of the voting membership.

#### Section 8 (Meetings)

- A. The meeting policies of the said courts shall be decided by the bodies directed to create said courts. The Student Court and the Student Traffic Court shall meet upon call of their chief justices as frequently as needed to transact the business pending before the courts.
- B. Definite closing dates for courts shall be set by the Student Coordinator who shall be appointed by the President of the Student Government Association and approved by two-thirds Senate vote and the Administrative Student Court Coordinator appointed by the Dean of Student Life. After these dates, no cases of original jurisdiction shall be scheduled. All cases and records shall be completed by the end of the semester. Any pending cases will be completed administratively.
- C. In the event that a large number of students are charged in a short period of time, the Student Court shall be scheduled for as many cases as it can possibly hear in a two week period, providing the closing date is not reached during that time. Upon saturation of the available scheduling dates, which shall be determined by the Student Court Coordinators and the Chief Justice of the Student Court, all further cases shall be handled through the Administrative Hearing System.

#### Section 9 (Chief Justice)

The Chief Justice shall be elected by and from the justices appointed to the court.

# Section 10 (Student Court Coordinators)

There shall be two Student Court Coordinators. One coordinator shall be a student, appointed by the President of Student Government Association. The other coordinator shall be a member of the Student Life staff, appointed by the Dean of Student Life. They shall be responsible for training the court justices, the court clerks, and the administrative members of the courts, as well as for monitoring the student court system.

# Section 11 (Procedures)

- A. The Student Court System shall adopt uniform procedures and all procedures shall be in accordance with Article IV.
- B. Student Court hearings involving disciplinary cases shall be open only to those directly involved in the hearing.

- C. A student accused of violation of University rules, regulations, or laws made by the Student Senate, who is heard in the Student Court shall have the right to:
  - 1. Have written notice of: the charge under the stated rule, regulation, or student laws of which he is accused of violation; the date of said violation, the location, time, and other pertinent elements concerning said violation; the time and place for the hearing of the charges, and the identity of the individual or individuals bringing charges;
  - 2. Have an opportunity to prepare a defense for said violation;
  - 3. Present witnesses for his own defense;
  - 4. Choose counsel in preparation of his/her defense;
  - 5. Choose a member of the University community to advise and assist him/her at all proceedings;
  - 6. Challenge any member of the court for bias or prejudice;
  - 7. Refuse to give self-incriminating evidence;
  - 8. Confront and cross-examine witnesses against him/her; provided, however, that the court may consider testimony presented by affidavit upon a showing that the affiant is unavailable;
  - 9. Have written notice of the decision and recommended action of the court; and 10. Have access to all court proceedings and court records.
- D. Any information gathered in violation of the Student Government Association Constitution or otherwise illegally, will be inadmissable as any form of evidence in student court proceedings.
- E. Strict confidentiality shall be observed in all Student Court hearings and proceedings which deal with disciplinary situations. The results of the specific proceedings may be released to the complainant(s) as provided in Article IV, Section 7, to those persons authorized by the defendant, or when the Administration deems such release to be in the interest of the total University community.
- F. The Student Court and the Student Traffic Court shall write an opinion of each case it hears, stating the basis for its decision in the case, taking extreme care to avoid reference to specific individuals and circumstances. These opinions will be filed as a public record and will be available to any member of the University community.
  G. If the accused fails to appear within three scheduled hearings of the Student Court,
- G. If the accused fails to appear within three scheduled hearings of the Student Court, further disciplinary actions will follow which will be handled administratively and may include administrative withdrawal from the University.
- H. A case must be scheduled, completed and returned to Student Life Administration within two weeks (ten school days) after the accused has declared his choice of hearing systems. If it is not returned within this time, the case will go to the administration for completion.
- I. The Student Court may be closed at the discretion of Student Life Administration if the Court fails to complete three (3) scheduled hearings within the allotted time limit.
- J. If the Student Court or the Student Traffic Court fails to reach a quorum two consecutive times, the cases will be sent to the appropriate administrative office for completion and the Court will be reviewed by the Student Court Coordinators, the Chief Justice of the Court involved, and the President of Student Government Association, and be subject to closing or other appropriate action.

Section 12 (Powers)

- A. All student courts shall have the power to subpoena witnesses. Students refusing to acknowledge a subpoena shall be deemed in contempt of court and charged under the appropriate University regulation.
- B. All student courts upon suspicion of perjury by a student in any hearing, shall be empowered to charge that student under the appropriate regulation.
- C. All student courts shall be empowered to charge any individual who disrupts a hearing in any way with contempt of court under the appropriate University regulation.
- D. All student courts shall have the power to decide what measures they may take when recommending decisions within the framework of action, disciplinary or otherwise, which may be taken by the University.
  - 1. The Student Court shall have the power to recommend disciplinary action not to exceed suspension. This action may include responses which are appropriate to the individual under consideration.
  - 2. The Traffic Court shall have the power to grant appeals, deny appeals, suspend fines,
  - and revoke vehicle permits in accordance with University traffic regulations. 3. The All-University Court of Appeals holds final decision making power, with the
  - exception of the University President and/or Board of Trustees.

Section 13 (Oath of Office)

An Oath of Office shall be administered to all justices upon assuming their office. The oath will be decided upon and administered in whatever way the body delegated to create each court decides.

Section 14 (Quorum)

- A. Student Court--to have a valid hearing a minimum of: (a) three (3) justices, one of which will act as Chief Justice, (b) the court clerk, and (c) the non-voting administrative advisor to the court, are required to be present.
- B. Student Traffic Court--to have a valid hearing, a minimum of: (a) three (3) justices, one of which will act as Chief Justice, (b) the court clerk, and (c) the non-voting administrative advisor to the court, are required to be present.
- C. The All-University Court of Appeals--to have a valid hearing, a minimum of: (a) five (5) justices, (b) A Chief Justice, (c) the court clerk, and (d) The non-voting administrative advisor to the court, are required to be present.

#### ARTICLE IX

#### Finances

Student Government shall receive into its budget a certain percent of the Student Activities Fee and maintain control over specific expenditures subject to budgetary limitations and/or the veto of the University President on the grounds of unlawful expenditure, but with right of appeal to the Board of Trustees.

All such expenditures shall be subject to such action by the University Treasurer for the proper protection of University funds as is contemplated by Section 28-7106 of Burns Indiana Statutes Annotated.

### ARTICLE X

#### Adoption

Section 1

Upon legal adoption, this Student Government Association Constitution in its entirety will supersede all previous Indiana State University Student Government Association Constitutions.

#### Section 2

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This Constitution shall not be construed as a relinquishment by the Indiana State University Hoard of Trustees of any of their obligations, responsibilities, and authorities, conferred upon them by the people of the State of Indiana through Legislative procedures, to act in final judgment on the management of institutional affairs in the public interest, nor as a recognition by Indiana State University Board of Trustees of a right to take any concerted action including any kind of a demonstration to impede, or to threaten to impede, the Board of Trustees or administration officials in the proper and orderly operation of the University.

#### ARTICLE XI

#### Amendments

#### Section 1

Amendments to this Constitution will require a two-thirds vote of the Student Senate membership at two consecutive meetings following the first reading of said amendment, a vote of approval by the majority of those students who vote in the all-campus referendum called for that purpose, and approval of the Board of Trustees.

#### Section 2

Whenever ten (10) percent of the members of the Student Government Association propose an amendment, that amendment will become binding and valid upon the majority approval of those students voting in the all-campus referendum called for that purpose, and approval of the Board of Trustees.

#### ARTICLE XII

#### Constitutional Convention

There should be a Constitutional Convention for the purpose of review and/or revision of the Student Government Association Constitution at least every three years.

#### ARTICLE X

#### Adoption

Upon legal adoption, this Student Government Association Constitution in its entirety will supersede all previous Indiana State University Student Government Association Constitutions.

#### ARTICLE XI

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## Section 1

Amendments to this Constitution will require a two-thirds vote of the Student Senate membership at two consecutive meetings following the first reading of said amendment, a vote of approval by the majority of those students who vote in the all-campus referendum called for that purpose, and approval of the Board of Trustees. Whenever ten (10) percent of the members of the Student Government Association propose an amendment, that amendment will become binding and valid upon the majority approval of those students voting in the all-campus referendum called for that purpose, and approval of the Board of Trustees.

### ARTICLE XII

# Constitutional Convention

There should be a Constitutional Convention for the purpose of review and/or revision of the Student Government Association Constitution at least every three years.

Conditions of approval of the Student Government Association Constitution:

The revised Constitution of the Student Government Association is approved on February 17, 1973, by the Board of Trustees of Indiana State University subject to the following conditions:

The Student Government Association Constitution shall not be construed as a relinquishment by the Indiana State University Board of Trustees of any of their rights, obligations, responsibilities and authorities conferred upon them by the State of Indiana, nor shall this Constitution be construed as a relinquishment by said Board of Trustees to act in final judgment on the management of institutional affairs or shall said Constitution be construed as a recognition by Indiana State University Board of Trustees of any right of any person or persons, association or organization to take any concerted action (including any kind of demonstration) to impede, or to threaten to impede, the Board of Trustees or administration officials in proper and orderly management and operation of the University.

During the spring of 1972 the Board of Managers and the Board of Overseers of the Sheldon Swope Art Gallery employed Haney Associates, a well-known museum fund-raising agency, to study the feasibility of undertaking a community fund-raising campaign for the construction of a new Sheldon Swope Art Gallery. That study was completed in June 1972 and the results indicated that the community strongly recognizes the need for a new Gallery, and furthermore that the community could be expected to support a campaign for the construction of a new building.

It is the intention of the members of the Swope Gallery Boards that a fund drive be initiated during 1973 and if possible, during the spring of 1973. A careful study of various desirable sites has been completed by a Site Committee appointed by the Boards. The results of the Site Committee investigation were reviewed carefully at a joint meeting of the Boards yesterday afternoon, February 2, 1973 and following considerable discussion, the Boards unanimously resolved that the Board of Trustees of Indiana State University be petitioned to consider leasing a site on the periphery of the Indiana State University campus for the construction of a new Sheldon Swope Art Gallery, and furthermore that the Board of Trustees of Indiana State University be requested to supply heat to the new Gallery and to consider the possibility of other support.

I am confident that you will pass this information on to the members of the Board of Trustees at their next meeting. On the basis of their decision we shall proceed with our program accordingly.

#### SPECIAL MEETING

## February 28, 1973 Terre Haute, Indiana

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in special session in the Arrow Room, Hulman Center, Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana, at 12:00 p.m. E.S.T., February 28, 1973. Members present were: Board President, William L. Hitch; Secretary, Hugh D. McQuillan, Assistant Secretary, James T. Morris; Mr. James D. Acher, and Mr. Herbert I. Lamb. President Rankin, Vice President Truitt, Dr. James E. Rentschler, Assistant to the President, and Mr. Gordon H. Chalmers, Director of Athletics, were also present. Mrs. Nancye T. Mitchell and Mr. John E. McCutchan were unable to attend.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Hitch called the meeting to order and called on President Rankin who stated that the purpose of the meeting was to consider the appointment of a head football coach.

President Rankin reviewed the procedures which have been used in the recruitment of a coach. The Search Committee included two alumni, Mr. Esten Fuson and Dr. Paul Siebenmorgen; two members of the faculty, Dr. Larry Bruce and Mr. Woodrow Suttle; and Vice Presidents J. Kenneth Moulton and John W. Truitt. Mr. Gordon Chalmers served as chairman.

The Search Committee interviewed a number of candidates. They did not reach a decision on a recommendation to President Rankin. Subsequently, Mr. Thomas M. Harp was invited by Mr. Chalmers to be interviewed by the Committee. It was the unanimous recommendation of the Search Committee that Mr. Harp be appointed as head football coach with Mr. Herbert Fairfield of Indiana University as runner-up in the event Mr. Harp did not accept.

**President Rankin reviewed Mr.** Harp's credentials. He has served as head coach at Cornell and Duke **Universities.** His present assignment is assistant coach at the Naval Academy.

**President Hitch, Mr. Chalmers and Dr. Truitt supported the candidacy of Mr. Harp because of his experience and the impression he made in the interviews on campus.** 

**President Rankin recommended** to the Board of Trustees that Mr. Thomas M. Harp be appointed as Head **Football Coach and Assistant Professor** of Physical Education, with a five-year contract at a **salary of \$20,500** per year, effective March 1, 1973.

Mr. James Morris moved that Mr. Thomas M. Harp be appointed Head Football Coach and Assistant Professor of Physical Education with a five-year contract at \$20,500 per year, effective March 1, 1973. Mr. Lamb seconded the motion. The motion passed by a unanimous vote.

Mr. Chalmers said the announcement would be released at 2:30 p.m., today. Mr. Acher encouraged bread publicity on the appointment. He recommended a news conference and luncheon in Indianapolis. President Rankin requested Mr. Chalmers to arrange appropriate publicity.

The president reported that Indiana State's gymnasts won the NCAA Eastern Regional meet by defeating Southern Illinois University by a substantial margin. The ISU team will participate in the NCAA National Finals to be held in April at Eugene, Oregon.

#### Congressional Select Subcommittee on Education

Dr. Janet McCarthy, an ISU faculty member, testified before the Congressional Select Subcommittee on Education in Washington on Thursday, March 15, in response to a request by Indiana Representative John Brademas. President Rankin said Dr. McCarthy's field is childhood education in which she has gained wide recognition, as is evidenced by her invitation to appear before this group.

#### Award to Boiler Plant

Indiana State has received an award from the American Institute of Steel Construction in recognition of the outstanding architectural steel construction work done on the Boiler Plant. President Rankin said this award was presented on March 16 at a luncheon given by the Indiana Fabricators Association, Inc.

### Student Elections

Student elections were held on March 15. Gary Coffman, a junior from Fort Wayne, was elected President of Student Government Association. Gary is majoring in marketing and has served as Chairman of the Residence Halls Association. Elected as Vice President of SGA was Lane Ralph. Lane comes from Gary and has served the Residence Halls Association as treasurer. His major is Political Science. Sally Hornback, whose interest is speech and radio-TV, was elected Residence Halls Association Chairman. Sally is from Mundelein, Illinois.

NOTE: The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in Executive Session at Terre Haute, Indiana, Friday evening March 16, 1973. Those in attendance were Mr. Hitch, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. Morris, Mr. Acher, Mr. Lamb, Mr. McCutchan, President Rankin, President Rice, Vice Presidents Moulton, Townsend, Truitt and Hardaway. Attending a portion of the meeting were Dean Osmon, Dr. Hile, Mr. Nelson and Mr. Hilt. President Rankin pointed out that the Commission for Higher Education, through Dr. Kessler and in the draft Master Plan, has expressed its desire for a closer cooperation between Indiana Vocational Technical Colleges and the other institutions of higher education. He said that ISU has cooperated with Wabash Valley Technical Institute through the years but has now approached the matter in a more systematic fashion. He asked Dr. Rentschler to report what steps are being taken to develop a closer relationship with Ivy Tech.

Dr. Rentschler said that he has met with Richard L. Davidson, Dean of Wabash Valley Technical Institute, and meetings with other ISU officials have taken place. Mr. Davidson has met with Mrs. Doris Staggs, Director of the University Bookstore; Mr. Cletis Shouse, Director of Housing; Mr. Kenneth Black, Director of Purchasing; Mr. Fred Hanes, Dean of Library Services; Dr. Ensey and members of the Student Health Center staff; Dr. Townsend and Dr. Boyle, Academic Affairs; and with Mr. William Neihart, University Controller. He said Mrs. Staggs felt that an agreement could be reached between the institutions with regard to the University Bookstore handling book sales for Ivy Tech students. The problems related to Ivy Tech students living in the residence halls have been resolved and he pointed out that there is one Ivy Tech student presently living in a residence hall. Both Mr. Black and Mrs. Staggs felt the question of purchasing could be handled without any significant difficulty.

There appears to be no problems involved with Ivy Tech students using the University Library, except for the problem of identification when they pass through the check-out system. It does seem possible to make ISU's health care services available to Ivy Tech students if the matter of a fee can be resolved. Dr. Townsend and Dr. Boyle believe that sharing of faculty can be arranged with very little difficulty. The possibility of program-sharing is currently being discussed. Mr. Neihart is working on the student services fee. He is attempting to offer a "package" fee which would cover the costs of providing health care services, tickets to athletic contests and eligibility in intra-murals. Dr. Rentschler added that Mr. Davidson is pleased with the cooperation that the ISU staff has given him and has sent a very favorable report to President Renner. President Rankin said that he and President Renner are proposing to forward a statement to the Commission showing what we are trying to do in this particular area.

### Commission for Higher Education

The Master Plan is apparently not going to be presented to the 1973 General Assembly. President Rankin said no announcement to this effect has been made but it is his understanding that the Plan is being rewritten. He said the university presidents would be furnished copies before the document is finalized.

At its March meeting, the Commission recommended additional capital funds for construction of academic facilities for the next biennium as follows: \$5,000,000 bonding authority was recommended for Ivy Tech; \$1,000,000 each for Purdue and Indiana University; \$1,800,000 for Ball State and \$900,000 for Indiana State. For the Evansville Campus, the Commission recommended \$220,000 to be used for upgrading the campus sanitation system. The President said that on the surface it may appear that ISU has not been treated equally but pointed out that we have a carry-over of \$5,450,000 from the previous biennium which gives the University more bonding authority than it can utilize. He said he understood that Ball State did not have a significant carry-over. He said that we had asked for authority to construct another building on the Evansville Campus but added that decisions were made without a hearing being conducted.

Mr. Acher asked what plans were being made to utilize the space in Reeve Hall and the old Library building. President Rankin said the Painting Department had been assigned the east side, ground floor of Reeve Hall. The west side and basement areas are being renovated for the Computer Center. He said the first floor level and the old stack area in the old Library building will contain the Carson Collection. He hoped that one day this area could be made into a museum, Dr. Hardaway pointed out that the Department of Library Science is still located in the old Library building and there are four classrooms in the building. In addition, offices for the Center for Urban-Regional Studies, Center for Governmental Services, Special General Education Project and the Department of Criminology will be housed in this building.

#### Indiana Senate Budget Subcommittee Hearings

per student.

Reporting on his appearance at the Indiana Senate Budget Subcommittee hearings on March 16, President Rankin said he had briefed the trustees in Executive Session but had not had an opportunity to report to the faculty or to the community the main issues presented at this hearing. He said the discussions were initiated by Dr. Kessler and Mr. Gohman who reported that the Commission for Higher Education was recommending \$461,000,000 for the state institutions for the next biennium and they presented a strong appeal for support of that figure. Each president was called upon to make a brief statement. President Rankin said he pointed out to the subcommittee that the House budget recommendations, which call for an increase of only \$676,000 for next year and an additional \$220,000 for the second year of the biennium, would not cover the unavoidable and inflationary costs facing the University. For retirement alone, an additional \$75,000 would be needed next year and \$50,000 for the following year. This shortage of \$125,000 would have to come out of some budget. He told the Board that this is a serious matter and that he has asked Dr. Townsend, Mr. Moulton, and others on the University staff to consider emergency measures that can be put into effect immediately if the General Assembly does not act to improve the situation. This means reviewing all areas of the University and retrenching wherever we can with minimum effects on the academic offerings. If Indiana State is to have salary increases and money for new programs, funds will have to be reallocated. He said the outlook was a dismal one for all the main campuses and the other university presidents share his view. For the regional campuses, with the exception of those He of Purdue, the House's recommendations were approximately the same as the Commission's. said all the institutions will have to keep in mind that a goal of the Commission and of many House members is to bring their minimal support level of the regional campuses up to \$1,000

# University-High School Relations and Admissions Information

President Rankin called attention to the display of information materials in the Board Room. These materials are used to inform prospective students of opportunities at Indiana State and to tell our story to the general public.

# E. EVANSVILLE REPORT

# 1. President Rice's Report

President Rice called attention to the change order extending the completion date for the University Center Project one month. He said the contractor is working very hard and that the walls for the lower level are basically completed and the project is progressing satisfactorily. Progress is also being made on the Classroom-Applied Science-Technology Building. The architects will have the plans ready for bid in May. The National Council of Accreditation of Teacher Education team has been on the ISUE campus during the month of March. President Rice said he had met with the County Commissioners to review the progress of the grade separation. Because of the election last fall, this project had been pushed back on the Commissioners' agenda but President Rice said he was hopeful that the project could get started very soon. He said that sixty percent of the eight o'clock classes have been eliminated to reduce the accidents occurring on this highway. He hoped that a safe four-lane highway out to campus would be completed when the weather breaks. This, coupled with the grade separation, he felt would minimize the driving hazards. He announced the Evansville Commencement would be on Thursday, May 10, at 5:00 p.m.

## 4. Grant

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the following grant was approved as recommended:

### Rockefeller Foundation Grant - Fund No. 9226

Dr. Gordon J. Leitch has received a grant in the amount of \$12,150 from the Rockefeller Foundation for research entitled "Development of Sodium and Bicarbonate Transport in the Rabbit Ileum" which is to be carried out at the Evansville Center for Medical Education. This grant was awarded to Indiana University and the Evansville Campus of Indiana State University shall be reimbursed for cost incurred on a cost basis. It is recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the original proposal.

#### F. TWO-YEAR SECRETARIAL CURRICULUM

The School of Business has a two-year program in secretarial preparation which terminates in a certificate. There are 142 majors enrolled in the program in the 1972-73 academic year, with 72 of these students beginning the program with the Fall Semester. A proposed two-year secretarial curriculum which grants an associate degree and which replaces the existing program is included as EXHIBIT A. This program was approved by the School of Business Curriculum Committee, the Chairman of the Department and the Dean, School of Business, prior to November 1972. Subsequently, approval was given by the University Curricular and Academic Affairs Committee on December 14, 1972, the Executive Committee on January 25, and the University Faculty Senate on February 16, 1973. The proposal has the support of the Vice President for Academic Affairs. Successful completion of the program will result in the Associate of Science degree in Secretarial Science. It was recommended that approval be given. Following Board approval, the program must be submitted to the Indiana Commission for Higher Education for approval.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Acher, the recommendation was approved.

### G. CHANGE OF NAME FOR DEPARTMENT OF INDUSTRIAL PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION

Dean Yoho has requested that the name of the Department of Industrial Professional Education be modified. He believes that the use of the word "edication" implies teacher education, a concept which is not part of either the mission of the department nor a definition supported by the department curricula. Vice President Townsend supports the need for a change and approves of the proposed title. It was recommended that the title be changed to: Department of Industrial Professional Technology, effective immediately.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the recommendation was approved.

#### H. LEAVES OF ABSENCE, 1973-74

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. Acher, the leaves of absence, both with and without pay, for the 1973-74 academic year, presented in EXHIBIT B, were approved as recommended.

# I. GRANTS

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the following grants were approved as recommended:

#### 1. Center for Professional Development in Vocational-Technical Education - Fund No. 2134

Letter of Authorization and Check No. 425208 has been received from the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education in the amount of \$23,520 to continue the program for interdisciplinary supervisors through the Center for Professional Development in Vocational-Technical Education under the direction of Dr. Thomas Reckerd, Chairman of the Vocational-Technical Education Department. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the contractual agreement.

#### 2. Terre Haute Medical Education Foundation Grant - Fund No. 2154

The Terre Haute Center for Medical Education has received a grant to participate with the Terre Haute Medical Education Foundation and the Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center, Inc., in a program of Medical Education on alcohol abuse and alcoholism for first-year medical students. Indiana State University will be reimbursed for costs incurred. It was recommended that the total grant be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the agreement.

# 3. Crane Naval Ammunition Depot Research Contract - Fund No. 2155

Contract No. N00164-73-C-0370 has been received from the Crane Naval Ammunition Depot for the firm fixed price of \$8,095 to conduct research exploring ways and means of improving and refining the radiation process. This contract will be completed by April 23, 1973, under the direction of Dr. Clyde E. Parrish, Professor of Chemistry. It was recommended that the total budget amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the contract.

# J. SALE OF LIBRARY AND BUILDING AIR CONDITIONING BONDS

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RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE AND SALE OF INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BUILDING FACILITIES FEE BONDS, SERIES E OF 1973, AND THE EXECUTION OF A SUPPLEMENTAL TRUST INDENTURE SECURING SUCH BONDS.

WHEREAS, Indiana State University Board of Trustees have heretofore determined that a necessity exists in order to carry on the educational programs of Indiana State University to erect, construct, equip and furnish on its campus in the City of Terre Haute the following facilities:

- (a) New Central Library in accordance with plans and specifications dated July 24, 1970, prepared by Ewing Miller Associates, architects of Terre Haute, Indiana;
- (b) Air Conditioning system for the Fine Arts Building in accordance with plans and specifications dated April 26, 1972, prepared by M & E Engineering Service, Inc., mechanical and electrical consultants of Indianapolis, Indiana;
- (c) Air conditioning system for Dreiser Hall and Parsons Hall in accordance with plans and specifications dated July 10, 1972, prepared by M & E Engineering Service, Inc., mechanical and electrical consultants of Indianapolis, Indiana;

(all of said facilities being hereinafter referred to as the "Series E Building Facilities") which determination is hereby reaffirmed; and

WHEREAS, the Board finds that the total estimated cost of the "Series E Building Facilities" is in the amount of Six Million Seven Hundred Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$6,770,000), and that in order to finance the cost of building such "Series E Building Facilities" it is necessary that the University borrow money and issue its negotiable revenue bonds therefor in the total amount of Six Million Seven Hundred Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$6,770,000), secured with the bonds of prior series by a first lien on and pledge of building facilities fees to be charged and collected from students attending Indiana State University, and the various divisions thereof, and from other persons enjoying the use of the facilities of Indiana State University and its divisions; and

WHEREAS, there has been prepared and submitted to Indiana State University Board of Trustees a form of Third Supplemental Indenture dated as of April 1, 1973, supplemental to the Indenture dated as of June 1, 1967, executed by Indiana State University Board of Trustees to Terre Haute First National Bank, Trustee, which Third Supplemental Indenture provides for the issuance of "Indiana State University Building Facilities Fee Bonds, Series E of 1973," in the total amount of Six Million Seven Hundred Seventy Thousand dollars (\$6,770,000) to finance part of the cost of said "Series E Building Facilities"; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED by Indiana State University Board of Trustees as follows:

Section 1. The form of the Third Supplemental Indenture submitted to Indiana State University Board of Trustees, dated as of April 1, 1973, supplemental to the Indenture dated as of June 1, 1967, executed by Indiana State University Board of Trustees to Terre Haute First National Bank, Trustee, which Third Supplemental Indenture provides for the issuance of "Indiana State University Building Facilities Fee Bonds, Series E of 1973," in the total amount of Six Million Seven Hundred Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$6,770,000) to finance the cost of said "Series E Building Facilities" be and the same is hereby approved and is made a part of this resolution as if fully copied and contained herein.

Upon the receipt and acceptance of bids for the "Series E Bonds of 1973," the Secretary or the Assistant Secretary of Indiana State University Board of Trustees is authorized to cause the said Third Supplemental Indenture to be completed by filling in the interest rate, or rates, to be paid on the "Series E of 1973 bonds"; and the President or the Vice President of Indiana State University Board of Trustees, in the name of Indiana State University Board of Trustees and on its behalf, is hereby authorized and empowered to execute such Third Supplemental Indenture; and the Secretary or the Assistant Secretary of Indiana State University Board of Trustees is hereby directed, authorized, and empowered to affix the corporate seal of Indiana State University Board of Trustees to the Third Supplemental Indenture and to attest the same.

Section 2. The issuance of bonds by Indiana State University Board of Trustees upon the terms and conditions set forth in said Trust Indenture and Third Supplemental Indenture is hereby authorized, said bonds to be issued in the amount of Six Million Seven Hundred Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$6,770,000) and to be designated as "Indiana State University Building Facilities Fee Bonds, Series E of 1973".

Section 3. The Vice President and Treasurer of Indiana State University is hereby authorized and directed to cause notice of the sale of said Bonds to be published as required by law. The Vice President and Treasurer is further authorized and directed to receive the bids submitted for said Bonds and to award the "Series E of 1973 Bonds" to the highest bidder therefor, to be determined by computing the total interest on such Bonds from the date thereof to the date of maturity and deducting therefrom the premium bid, if any.

Section 4. The Vice President and Treasurer of Indiana State University is hereby authorized and directed to have prepared the bond forms required for use in the issuance of said Bonds and cause the same to be executed by the proper officers of Indiana State University Board of Trustees as provided in said Third Supplemental Indenture and Original Indenture.

Upon the execution of said Bonds, the Treasurer of Indiana State University Board of Trustees shall deliver said Bonds to Terre Haute First National Bank, as Trustee, for authentication and, upon such authentication, is authorized and directed to deliver said Bonds to the purchasers thereof upon payment of the purchase price. The President, the Vice President, the Secretary, and the Assistant Secretary of Indiana State University Board of Trustees and the Vice President and Treasurer of Indiana State University are hereby authorized and directed to do any and all further acts and things necessary in order to complete the execution and delivery of said Third Supplemental Indenture and the "Series E of 1973 Bonds" hereby authorized.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the resolution was approved as recommended by President Rankin.

Mr. Hitch told Mrs. Bakerman it was nice to have her at today's meeting and asked if she had anything to bring before the Board. She replied that she did not. The meeting adjourned at 10:05 a.m.

# Proposed Two-Year Secretarial Curriculum, Department of Business-Distributive Education and Office Administration, School of Business

Objectives Of The Two-Year Secretarial Program. The graduates of the two-year secretarial program are prepared to fill secretarial positions in business, professional, and governmental offices. Abilities, skills, attitudes, knowledges, and understandings are cultivated in the following areas in order to prepare students for employment in secretarial positions:

- 1. Basic Education
  - a. Development of knowledges and understandings in the areas of general education vital to associating with other college educated people.
  - b. Development of a basis for continued interest and self-development in the liberal arts after college graduation.
- 2. Communications
  - a. Development of high-level skills in typewriting, shorthand, and shorthand transcription.
  - b. Development of competency in machine transcription.
  - c. Development of the ability to apply basic skills in typewriting, shorthand, and transcription to a variety of business communication problems.
  - d. Development of the ability to apply the basic principles of grammar and business writing to a variety of office situations.
  - e. Development of the ability to communicate orally in a clear, tactful, and objective manner.
  - f. Development of the ability to listen--to be receptive to and profit from supervision.
- 3. Business and Office Administration
  - a. Development of the background necessary to understand the structure of business organizations and business environment and the role of secretarial activities in accomplishing the objectives of the firm.
  - b. Development of understandings and skills in executing basic office operations and procedures.
  - c. Development of an understanding of the relationships existing among various office functions.

- d. Development of a background to facilitate adaptation to changes in business and office policies and procedures and to apply problem-solving techniques in helping determine needed changes.
- e. Development of the ability to recognize work which needs attention and to establish priorities for completing it.
- 4. Human Relations
  - a. Development of the ability to get along with superiors, peers, and subordinates in office situations.
  - b. Development of the ability to represent the firm in a creditable manner at all times.
  - c. Development of personal values in keeping with socially accepted standards of speech and conduct.
- 5. Professional Traits

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- a. Development of an awareness of the importance of honesty, dependability, and industry in carrying all work through to a satisfactory completion.
- b. Development of efficient work habits.
- c. Development of an awareness of the importance of keeping office matters confidential.
- d. Development of an awareness of the necessity to continue further formal education and to engage in self-improvement activities to further professional growth.

INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

Terre Haute, Indiana April 21, 1973

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Arrow Room, Hulman Center, Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana, at 9:00 a.m., E.S.T., April 21, 1973. Members present were: Board President, William L. Hitch; Vice President, Nancye T. Mitchell; Secretary, James T. Morris; Assistant Secretary, Herbert I. Lamb; Mr. James D. Acher; Mr. Rex E. Breeden and Mr. John E. McCutchan. President Rankin, President Rice, and Vice Presidents Hardaway, Moulton, Schomer, Townsend and Truitt were present. Also attending were Dr. James E. Rentschler, Assistant to the President; Dr. Elmer S. Ciancone, Chairperson, University Faculty Senate; Mr. Gary Coffman, President, Student Government Association; and Mr. Lane Ralph, Vice President, Student Government Association.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Hitch called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

Before the order of business was started, Mr. Hitch introduced and welcomed Mr. Rex E. Breeden, newly appointed Board member; Mr. Gary Coffman, President of Student Government Association; and Mr. Lane Ralph, Vice President, Student Government Association.

## A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING MARCH 17, 1973

On motion by Mrs. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the minutes of the meeting of March 17, 1973, were approved.

#### B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held on May 26, 1973, with the Executive Session on Friday evening, May 25.

#### C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

'Swope Bill

The president announced that the Swope Bill was passed by the General Assembly and signed by Governor Bowen. The president said it was not an easy measure to get passed. With its passage, Indiana State University is now free to hold further discussions with the Swope Art Gallery in regard to leasing property to them for their new building.

#### Indiana Commission for Higher Education

President Rankin said he has had personal discussions with Mr. Benbow, chairman of the Commission's planning committee, regarding ISU's degree programs awaiting Commission approval. The president hoped there would be action from the Commission in the near future. He said the Master Plan is promised in May. Dr. Kessler has assured the president that a copy will be sent to each of the presidents of the four state universities before the plan is considered for adoption.

## Faculty Senate Actions

The president said the Faculty Senate has taken some significant steps in recent weeks. One was to disapprove the proposal from the Economics Benefits Committee suggesting that the TIAA-CREF Retirement Program permit faculty members the option of contributing any amount desired (including nothing) without the University's contribution to the program being affected. The Senate, at its April 19, 1973 meeting, passed a resolution (28-4-6) to establish a Women's Advocate. The president said this poses some problems for him. First, he has conflicting recommendations. The Faculty Women's Club has submitted another kind of recommendation which is not quite the same as the recommendation from the Senate. Secondly, he said if the University establishes an office of a Women's Advocate and does not establish an office of a Minority Advocate, it could be subject to criticism. Also, in these times of financial stress, this would be a burden of \$20,000 or more. He pointed out that the University does have a director of Affirmative Action who is working hard with an advisory committee (made up of faculty members and staff) to bring an Affirmative Action Plan to the Board for consideration and adoption at its May meeting. Mr. Breeden asked what the purpose of the Women's Advocate is. He said he did not see the need for someone "looking over the president's shoulder". President Rankin said the Advocate would work with Faculty Government and with the administration to implement the recommendations of The Commission on the Status of Faculty Women at Indiana State University. This commission was appointed two years ago by the president to study the status of faculty women and to report their findings to him. The Commission submitted their report along with a list of recommendations. President Rankin said the women feel very strongly that the best way to insure that these recommendations are being implemented is to create the office of a Women's Advocate. He did not think it was a question of confidence in his office; the women feel they are being discriminated against. He said the office of Women's Advocate could be compared to that of an ombudsman.

NOTE: The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in Executive Session at Terre Haute, Indiana, Friday evening April 20, 1973. Those in attendance were Mr. Hitch, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. Morris, Mr. Lamb, Mr. Acher, Mr. Breeden, Mr. McCutchan, President Rankin, President Rice, Vice Presidents Moulton, Townsend and Hardaway. Mr. Morris said we do have a record of sensitivity to the problem of discrimination and he was not sure that another office could do anything more than has already been done. He said our record of promotions, especially the current one, is a good one and it was his feeling that the University is making great strides.

President Rankin said that there are several departments which have no women. He said the University is pursuing a goal to find women for posts in those departments and Dr. Rentschler is reviewing the situation with department chairmen. There are very strong pressures from the Federal government to see that we correct any discrimination that may exist but the president pointed out that it is going to be slower than we had hoped for because the University is not going to be hiring in those areas except as vacancies occur.

Mr. McCutchan asked Mrs. Mitchell for her opinion as to whether or not the Women's Advocate office was necessary. She said that in light of what the University was doing, she did not feel this office was necessary. Mr. Breeden asked about differences in average salaries for men and women. President Rankin asked Dr. Hardaway, who has made an extensive study of faculty salaries and differences, to answer this question. Dr. Hardaway pointed out that averages hide significant differences. Men had had more training; been on staff longer; had more time in rank, etc. He said promotions are approved for those people who are qualified. In individual cases the difference usually can be explained. He said in a few cases, with all factors being equal, the difference in salary might be determined by performance. He reported the University has 130 full professors; 16 are women. Of those women, seven have above-average salaries, while one-half of the men are below that average. He said 55% of the men and 28% of the women have doctorate degrees.

Mr. McCutchan said he believed it was the feeling of the Board that the Women's Advocate was unnecessary.

#### SGA Leadership

President Rankin said he was pleased with the letters he received from Mr. O'Dell, outgoing SGA president, and from Professor Warner, SGA advisor. He shared the letters with the trustees. Mr. Hitch also shared the letter he had received from Mr. O'Dell.

#### Commencement

Commencement for the Evansville campus will be on May 10, 1973; for the Terre Haute campus, May 13, 1973. President Rankin explained the procedures of Commencement for Mr. Breeden and said that all the trustees would receive a notice reviewing this procedure.

## Financial Conditions

For the record, President Rankin pointed out that the Indiana Legislature on Thursday, April 19, 1973, completed its deliberations and appropriated monies for the coming biennium. Evansville received \$4,500,000 for the two-year period and Terre Haute was given \$42,500,000 for the same period. He said this means that the Terre Haute campus is faced with some rigid limitations in its financial expenditures in the next two years. This sum is inadequate to permit the University to operate at the present level and it will be necessary to reduce operational costs. The administration is working very hard to find out just what has to be done in order to have a balanced budget for the coming year. Dr. Townsend is working on a paper to present to the appropriate committee of the faculty and the other vice presidents are working in their areas to determine where we can cut back. He told the trustees that there is the greatest sense of urgency. If it is necessary to cut regular faculty members, it is required to notify them a year in advance. He pointed out that the deadline for the year's notice is May 10. He said this is a very difficult time and he wanted the Board to know that the administration is taking it very seriously. He said he considered this to be the most critical matter for the University in the last eight years.

Mr. Acher noted that the percentage of increase in our appropriations is less than 5% and it is obvious that the University would not only have to cut back but would probably have to eliminate faculty positions and salary increases. He asked that the trustees pass a resolution pointing out that the Board fully supports the position taken by the administration in its efforts to meet this financial crisis. The resolution was taken by consent.

President Rankin said he appreciated this kind of support from the Board. He said the time for giving the year's notice is so short that there is only limited opportunity for consultation with faculty.

President Rankin said the disquieting thing about the present situation is that he doesn't see any great hope for the years ahead. He feels it is going to be this way for a number of years.

Mr. Morris suggested that now is the time for the University to think of ways to raise money from outside sources, such as foundations, grants, alumni, etc. President Rankin pointed out the Alumni Office is making every effort to reach our alumni and that it has been very successful in its recent telefund drive. Dr. Schomer said that in every instance, the contributions were doubled but that this method of raising funds will reach a plateau and that the University is about three years from that high plateau.

## D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

1. President Rice's Report

President Rice reported that representatives from IHETS have completed their engineering studies in Evansville and have decided the best way to serve the Evansville area is to mount a fifty foot tower atop a campus building. The Indiana Commission for Higher Education has announced the funding of the IMPACT study for Fort Wayne, South Bend and Evansville. President Rice said this study is one of the studies the preliminary plans of the Commission called for and he understands the Commission has a group from outside the state working on this. Southern Indiana Higher Education, Inc., Board met last week to review plans for utilizing log structures from SIHE properties. Sanitary sewer connections and possible land easement requirements were also discussed. The county commissioners, county surveyor and the Area Plan Commission met to discuss fund capabilities and plans for Eichoff Road interchange and extension. Discussions were held with IVTC regarding possible cooperative programs.

## 2. Candidates for Degrees, May 10, 1973 - Evansville Campus

The candidates for degrees to be conferred May 10, 1973, are presented as EXHIBIT B. On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Acher, the Board approved the award of the respective degrees subject to completion of the requirements.

## 3. Memorandum of Agreement with Deaconess Hospital

An agreement between the Evansville Campus of Indiana State University and Deaconess Hospital, setting forth the relationships for participation in the Radiologic Technology program is presented in EXHIBIT C.

The Deaconess Hospital Radiologic Technology Program is a long-established accredited hospital program. Accreditation requirements now suggest that such programs be officially affiliated and this agreement sets forth university-hospital participation. ISUE students would be enrolled for an Associate Degree in Radiological Technology to participate in the program. The 42 semester hours of academic courses are general education and other academic courses regularly scheduled in other degree programs. Approval of the Memorandum of Agreement was recommended. Subsequent to Board approval this program will be submitted to the Indiana Commission for Higher Education for consideration.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the Memorandum of Agreement was approved.

4. Business Division Contract - Fund No. 9227

The Business Division has received a contract from Mead Johnson and Company to perform instructional and consulting services for \$400. It was recommended that this amount be appropriated as follows: Personal Services, \$330; Supplies and Expense, \$70.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Acher, the recommendation was approved.

5. Budget Adjustments

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the following appropriation transfers were approved as recommended:

G. GRANTS

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. Breeden, the following grants were approved as recommended:

#### 1. Public Health Service Research Fellowship Grant - Fund No. 2157

Notice of Research Fellowship Award, Fellowship No. 1 F02 NS55062-01 NSRA, has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Public Health Service, in the amount of \$1,000 to provide a supply allowance for Susan R. White who will be conducting research studies under the sponsorship of Dr. Charles D. Barnes, Professor of Life Sciences for the period from November 1, 1972, through October 31, 1973. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

## 2. National Institutes of Health Volunteer Program Contract - Fund No. 2115

Supplemental Agreement to Contract No. NIH-72-C-499CC has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Public Health Service, to renew the contract for the period January 1, 1973, through December 31, 1973, in order to continue the transportation costs and stipends for volunteers for participation in medical research projects sponsored by the Clinical Center, National Institutes of Health, to be administered by the Cooperative Professional Practices Program under the direction of Mr. E. R. Pettebone. National Institutes of Health will pay the University a flat rate of \$153.45 for each volunteer plus \$8.75 for each volunteer's day of residence at the Clinical Center. Allowance is made in the charges to reimburse the University for handling the contract, said reimbursement to be credited to the Current Operating Fund. It was recommended that the funds be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the contract.

3. Indiana Committee for the Humanities Grant - Fund No. 2158

Regranting Agreement, Control No. 13, in the amount of \$4,850 has been received from the Indiana Committee for the Humanities through the Indiana University Board of Trustees in order to conduct a series of seminars on the various functions of local government to support the project "Government by the People" under the direction of Mr. Duane Sorensen, Crane Center for Economic Development, for the period March 15, 1973, to August 31, 1973. The University agrees to provide in-kind matching funds in the amount of \$4,875. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with terms of the grant agreement.

#### 4. Allied Health Special Improvement Program Grant - Fund No. 2159

Notice of Grant Award No. 1-D01-AH 50454-02 SRC has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Public Health Service, in the amount of \$20,601, to conduct a special improvement program in Medical Technology for the period July 1, 1973, through June 30, 1974, under the direction of Dr. Syd Husain, Department of Life Sciences. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

## H. LEGISLATIVE REPORT

Mr. Moulton reported on the following legislation which was considered by the 1973 Indiana General Assembly:

<u>Collective Bargaining</u>. The legislation, which authorizes an agency shop at the public universities, failed in conference committee after passing the House and Senate.

"Swope." The legislation authorizes university boards of trustees to lease property to others. The legislation carried an emergency clause and is effective now.

OSHA. This legislation, which passed, amends the Occupational Safety and Health Act and sets new standards, rules, procedures, and methods of operation. The University will be subject to inspection by the Indiana Department of Labor and may be required to pay fines or be otherwise penalized for failure to comply with the OSHA legislation, all at the discretion of the Indiana Department of Labor.

"Freedom of Choice" Scholarships. Permits state scholarship awards or grants to help cover actual tuition costs at private schools.

## I. ADVANCED PLACEMENT AND CREDIT BY EXAMINATION

In September 1971, the Board of Trustees was presented with an informational discussion of a proposal for a campus program allowing for credit by examination and advanced placement. These allowances were to be extended to qualified students planning to enroll at ISU if they had special experience or exceptional high school attainment. The request for review and action by faculty government originated with University administrative offices--the Office of Student Administrative Services, the Office of Academic Affairs, including the Council of Academic Deans, and the Office of the President.

Subsequent to the discussion with the Board of Trustees, the Faculty Senate, through its subcommittees, continued review of the particulars of the recommendation. Specifically, the action of the Faculty Senate was to accept 31 semester hours equivalent through achievement of pre-determined minimal or better scores on any one of several applicable examinations. The types of examinations to be used and the minimal score achievements are presented in EXHIBIT D.

On March 8, 1973, the Faculty Senate, in a vote of 32-2-0, approved the allowance of 31 semester hours of credit by examination. Prior to action of the Faculty Senate, the Faculty Senate Executive Committee had voted in favor of the motion 8-0-0. It was recommended that approval be given as indicated above. On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the recommendation was approved.

#### J. SALE OF REAL ESTATE TO PUBLIC SERVICE INDIANA

Mr. Moulton explained that it had been determined by the University and by Public Service Indiana that a need presently exists for the construction on the Indiana State University campus of a new electrical substation to serve the new University-Civic Amphitheater as well as certain other buildings on the east side of the campus and Public Service of Indiana has offered to erect said facility and to purchase the ground therefor from the University in accordance with the applicable laws of the State of Indiana. This arrangement is very advantageous to the University since the University will obtain needed electrical service at no additional capital expense to the University. The land was initially purchased by the University so that it would be available when needed as the site for the electrical substation to serve additional University needs.

Burns Indiana Statutes Annotated, 1970 Replacement, Volume 6 Part 4, Section 28-7547 and 28-7548, specifies that the Governor of the State of Indiana must approve the sale and appoint three disinterested appraisers to appraise the real estate before it can be sold by the University. It follows that the Indiana State University Board of Trustees must authorize, by appropriate resolution, the request to the Governor of the State of Indiana for approval to sell the real estate. On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Morris, the following resolution was approved as recommended:

"WHEREAS, Indiana State University Board of Trustees presently own the following described real estate (not acquired by gift or devise) located at the Southeast corner of South 7th and Spruce Streets in the City of Terre Haute, Vigo County, Indiana, and more particularly described as follows:

Lot Number One Hundred Fifty-six (156) in Chauncey Rose's Subdivision of 84-65/100 acres off the North end of the Northwest quarter of Section Twenty-two (22), Township Twelve (12) North, Range Nine (9) West, in Terre Haute, Vigo County, Indiana.

WHEREAS, Public Service of Indiana has offered to build an electrical substation on the Indiana State University campus to serve the needs of Indiana State University and has offered to purchase the above described real estate for the purpose of erecting thereon the aforesaid electrical facility.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the hereinafter described real estate (not acquired by gift or devise) located at the Southeast corner of South 7th and Spruce Streets in the City of Terre Haute, Vigo County, Indiana, to-wit:

Lot Number One Hundred Fifty-six (156) in Chauncey Rose's Subdivision of 84-65/100 acres off the North end of the Northwest quarter of Section Twenty-two (22), Township Twelve (12) North, Range Nine (9) West, in Terre Haute, Vigo County, Indiana.

title to which is in the name of Indiana State University Board of Trustees, is not needed for any of the purposes of Indiana State University and it would be advantageous to Indiana State University to sell and convey the same to Public Service of Indiana for the purpose of erecting thereon an electrical substation to serve the campus of Indiana State University and its facilities.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Treasurer of the University be and he is hereby authorized to submit a copy of this resolution to the Governor of the State of Indiana with a request that three disinterested appraisers be appointed by the Governor to appraise the above described real estate and to authorize the sale of said real estate for an amount not less than the full appraised value found by said appraisers.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that William L. Hitch and James T. Morris, the President and Secretary, respectively, of Indiana State University Board of Trustees be and they are hereby authorized to execute on behalf of Indiana State University Board of Trustees a Warranty Deed and such other documents as may be necessary in order to carry into full force and effect the foregoing resolution."

At the close of the meeting, Mr. Hitch asked if anyone had comments to make. Mr. Coffman said he hoped the Board would consider allowing SGA to have an entire agenda. Mr. Hitch said the Board is not trying to keep anything from SGA, it was simply that the trustees felt that Section III contains personal information and they did not see the need for this information to be available to the student body. He said this was agreed upon by former SGA representatives after the Board had spent a lot of time discussing it. President Rankin pointed out that SGA was not being singled out in this regard. He said that others, including the Faculty Senate representative, do not receive this part of the agenda.

Mr. Breeden said he considered his appointment to the Board more than an honorary one. He said he would serve with dedication and in some measure try to repay what he feels he owes to the University. Mr. Hitch said he was delighted to have him on the Board and was sure he would make many contributions.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the meeting adjourned at 10:50 a.m.

#### UNIVERSITY - DEACONESS HOSPITAL ASSOCIATE DEGREE PROGRAM IN RADIOLOGIC TECHNOLOGY

#### AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made by and between

### INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY-EVANSVILLE

a corporation of the State of Indiana, hereinafter referred to as "University" and

### DEACONESS HOSPITAL, INC.

a corporation of the State of Indiana, located at Evansville, Indiana and hereinafter referred to as "Hospital".

Students enrolled in the Radiologic Technology program are hereinafter referred to as "Student". Instructors (both University and Hospital) in the Radiologic Technology program are hereinafter referred to as "Faculty" or "Instructor".

WHEREAS, the University and the Hospital acknowledge a public obligation to contribute to the education of Radiologic Technologists;

WHEREAS, the Hospital has an established program in Radiologic Technology approved by the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association, and

WHEREAS, the University has facilities suitable for the non-clinical portion of the Hospital's program in Radiologic Technology; and

WHEREAS, it is to the mutual benefit of both the University and the Hospital that students have opportunities for high quality education and clinical experience as students and future practitioners.

THEREFORE it is agreed as follows:

#### I Accreditation

- A. The University will assume responsibility for obtaining the necessary approval from appropriate recognized accrediting agencies to grant an associate degree in Radiologic Technology.
- B. The Hospital will maintain the standards required for approval of a program in Radiologic Technology as set forth by the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association.

#### II Instructional Responsibility

- A. The University agrees:
  - 1. To provide the necessary faculty members, who shall be qualified instructors, to teach the academic, non-clinical portions of the curriculum.
  - 2. To utilize the necessary instructors, who shall be competent practitioners and persons on the staff of Deaconess Hospital, in those areas requiring specialized clinical training. Such instructors, subject to the joint approval of the University and the Hospital, shall be accorded University Adjunct Faculty status without remuneration or tenure.
  - 3. Provide periodic evaluations of each student to the Hospital as deemed necessary.
- B. The Hospital agrees:
  - 1. To provide a qualified radiologist and a trained radiologic technologist to serve as director and technical supervisor of the clinical training at the hospital. Such radiologist shall be a licensed physician and certified or eligible for certification by the American Board of Radiology. The Radiologic Technologist shall be registered by the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists.
  - 2. To provide a member of its staff to coordinate the administrative functions and procedures of the hospital clinical training portion of the program with the University. Such person shall be a professionally qualified educator; shall represent the Hospital in all matters pertaining to the Radiologic Technology program; and will be responsible for coordinating the admission procedures, maintenance of student clinical training records, submission of grades, clinical training scheduling in cooperation with appropriate University officials.

- 3. To maintain a ratio of one registered Radiologic Technologist for each 3 students for adequate supervision of students undergoing clinical training at the Hospital.
- 4. To provide the services of its staff in the Radiologic Technology program on a guest lecturer basis upon mutual agreement of the Hospital and the University.

### III Admission of Students

- A. Admission procedures will be the responsibility of the University, except the University and the Hospital, in mutual agreement, will determine the selection of students to be enrolled in the Radiologic Technology program. Students will meet both the University's and the Hospital's criteria for admission.
- B. The University and the Hospital, upon admission of a student to the Radiologic Technology program, shall accept a commitment to offer the academic course of study and clinical training experience as outlined at the time of admission.
- C. Students will be admitted as full-time students at the University and eligible for all rights and privileges pertaining to financial aid, scholarships, student activities, counseling services, etc.
- D. The University will require of students a pre-entrance physical examination and chest x-ray and shall submit to the Hospital written evidence of good physical health and x-ray report for each student.
- E. Student applicants shall be notified by (to be determined) of admission acceptance or rejection to the Radiologic Technology program.

### IV Curriculum

- A. The curriculum (both academic and clinical training portions) shall adhere to the requirements as outlined in the "Essentials of an Accredited Educational Program for Radiologic Technologists" of the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association.
- B. The program, beginning July 1 each year, shall total 30 consecutive calendar months, encompassing four regular 16-week semesters and three 5-week summer semesters.
- C. Scheduling of the curriculum will be structured so that the University conducted courses and the Hospital conducted clinical training will be conducted concurrently throughout the entire program. In addition, the course work of the student shall be scheduled to permit the student to spend solid blocks of time in academic courses at the University and solid blocks of time in clinical training at the Hospital.
- D. The number of credit hours required for successful completion of the Associate Degree in-Radiologic Technology is 85 semester hours, constituted approximately as follows:
  - 1. 42 semester hours of credit for courses conducted at the University.
  - 2. 43 semester hours of credit for the clinical training experiences conducted at the Hospital.
- E. The student, upon successful completion of Radiologic Technology curriculum, and certification by the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists as having successfully passed the Registry examination, will be conferred the Associate Degree by the University.

#### V Student Services

A. The Hospital will provide the following services to the Student:

1. Use of parking areas

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- 2. Lockers and dressing areas
- 3. Food services made available to members of the hospital staff
- 4. Emergency medical care while the Student is participating in the clinical training at the hospital, to adults and to minors for whom their parents or legal guardians have given permission, such permission to be on file at the hospital.
- 5. Basic professional and premise liability insurance for Students participating in the clinical training experience within the premises of the hospital.
- B. The Student is responsible for his or her own lodging, meals, transportation and uniforms.

#### VI Tuition, Fees & Expenses

- Students admitted to the University Radiologic Technology Associate Degree program will be subject to regular University fee per semester hour for both the academic courses and the clinical training conducted at Deaconess Hospital.
  - 1. The University will remit to the Hospital, in consideration of clinical training expense, 75% of the amount charged the Student for semester hours of clinical training credit.

- 2. Such remittance will be made to the hospital each semester on the basis of the number of credit hours of clinical training for which the student has registered.
- B. The University will pay the \$100 initial application fee required by the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology for university affiliate programs.
- C. Deaconess Hospital will pay the annual registration fee of \$75 required by the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology for hospital affiliated with in accredited program.

It is further agreed that:

- A. That the Student performing as such, while participating in the clinical instruction and training at the Hospital, will not replace members of the hospital staff, nor give service to patients apart from that rendered for its educational value as a part of the planned Radiologic Technology curriculum; and then only under competent supervision.
- B. The Student will be subject to the authority, policies and regulations of the University and the Hospital, and appropriate ethical and professional conduct will be required of all students assigned to the Hospital.
- C. Students who are currently enrolled or have been enrolled in the past in the Deaconess School of Radiologic Technology prior to initiation of the University Associate Degree program in Radiologic Technology, will be granted an Associate Degree in Radiologic Technology provided they:
  - 1. Are currently a registered Radiologic Technologist as certified by the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists.
  - 2. Have been certified by the Hospital as having successfully completed the required 2-year program in Radiologic Technology conducted by Deaconess Hospital's School of Radiologic Technology.
  - 3. Have successfully completed the additional academic course requirements of the University necessary for Associate Degree conferment.
- D. Revisions or changes to any part of this agreement must be approved by both the University and the Hospital.
- E. The University or the Hospital may terminate this agreement by notifying the other party in writing, not later than one year before the start of the class to be affected by termination.

### CREDIT BY EXAMINATION

Indiana State University has a comprehensive credit by examination program that enables students to receive credit in areas in which they have academic strengths or experiences that have provided a background comparable to college work in given areas. Credit can be awarded on the basis of a student's test scores from any of the following College Entrance Examination Board testing programs:

- 1. College Level Examination Program (CLEP).
- 2. College Entrance Examination Board Advanced Placement Examination Program.
- 3. College Entrance Examination Board Achievement Test Program.

## HOW MUCH CREDIT CAN BE EARNED

A maximum of 31 semester hours of credit can be earned through the Credit by Examination Program. Additional credit can be earned through examinations given by each academic department. This is equivalent to one academic year.

## HOW IS CREDIT APPLIED

Any credit earned through the Credit by Examination Program applies toward the General Education requirements of the University. Credit is awarded in one or more of the seven areas of the General Education requirements as they appear on the back of the folder. Credit is not given for specific courses, and additional course work may be taken in the academic area in which credit is received.

## WHEN DOES A STUDENT RECEIVE THE CREDIT

Students will be notified of their eligibility for credit by the Office of Admissions as test scores are received. Credits will be validated officially and placed on the student's transcript immediately following the student's initial enrollment.

## WHEN CAN THE TEST BE TAKEN

The College Entrance Examination Board Achievement Tests are given five times each year, and they may be taken at any test center on any of the national test dates. Students must be enrolled in a school that participates in the College Entrance Examination Board Advanced Placement Program before they can earn credit through the testing program. Tests given by the College Level Examination Program are administered at open test centers and are given the third week of each month.

Students interested in taking any of these tests should check with their counseling office for additional information. On the Indiana State University campus, the Director, Student Research and Testing Office, will coordinate campus testing sessions.

## SECTION II

#### A. SALE OF BONDS

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1. Summary of Bids Received and Bond Award

Pursuant to applicable federal and state statutes, bids were received until 12:00 Noon, April 5, 1973, for \$6,770,000 Indiana State University Building Facilities Fee Bonds, Series E of 1973.

A summary of the bids received was presented as EXHIBIT A. The award appears in EXHIBIT B. Board authorization to receive bids and make awards was given on March 17, 1973.

## 2. Building Facilities Fee Computation

The original Indiana State University Building Facilities Fee Bonds Trust Indenture authorizes the issuance of additional series of bonds subject to certain conditions one of which is that fees, income and funds pledged shall be equal to or greater than 110% of the maximum amount of additional bonds to become due in any succeeding fiscal year for the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds then outstanding and on the bonds then to be authenticated and delivered. The annual income to be derived from such building facilities fees is to be determined by applying the amount of such building facilities fee of the University in effect at the time of the request for authentication of such additional bonds is made to the average annual enrollment of students at Indiana State University, and the various divisions thereof, during the two years preceding the request for authentication. The computations are to be made by the Vice President and Treasurer of the University and approved by the Indiana State University Board of Trustees.

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Arrow Room, Hulman Center, Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana, at 8:30 a.m., E.S.T., May 26, 1973. Members present were Board President, William L. Hitch; Vice President, Nancye T. Mitchell; Secretary, James T. Morris; Assistant Secretary, Herbert I. Lamb; Mr. James D. Acher; Mr. Rex E. Breeden and Mr. John E. McCutchan. President Rankin, President Rice, and Vice Presidents Hardaway, Moulton, Schomer, and Townsend were present. Also attending were Dr. James E. Rentschler, Assistant to the President; Dr. Elmer S. Ciancone, Chairperson, University Faculty Senate; Mr. Gary Coffman, President, Student Government Association; Mr. Lane Ralph, Vice President, Student Government Association; and Mr. Mark Morse, summer editor for the Indiana Statesman.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Hitch called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m. Mr. Hitch introduced and welcomed to the meeting Mr. Mark Morse, summer editor of the Statesman.

#### A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING APRIL 21, 1973

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the minutes of the meeting of April 21, 1973, were approved.

## B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held on June 16, 1973. Since it is the custom of the Board to hold one meeting a year at the Evansville campus, the June meeting will be held at Evansville. The time and place of the meeting and of the Executive Meeting will be announced later.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

#### Commencement Speaker

President Rankin said he was pleased to announce that Wesley N. Haines, President of Franklin College, will be the speaker at the August 21, 1973, Commencement.

#### Progress Report on Parking Lots

Bids have been received for the paving of three student lots (north of Arena, west of Health Center, and west of Lincoln Quadrangle). Bids for paving three other parking lots, two staff and one student, will be received in the very near future. These lots are located east of Holmstedt Hall, east of Arena and east of Health Center. The president said the bids are running somewhat higher than estimates.

#### Indiana Commission for Higher Education

Copies of excerpts from the final master plan which relate to ISU at Terre Haute and Evansville were distributed to the trustees. The president said that the Board would receive copies of the final master plan as soon as they are available. He told the trustees that he had written to Dr. Kessler and appeared before the Commission to object to the portion of the plan relating to the doctoral programs offered at Indiana State. At the last Commission meeting he was assured that it was their intention that Indiana State's mission statements in this plan be similar to those of Ball State and the revised plan has now been phrased accordingly.

#### Intersession

Enrollment for the Intersession is 830 which exceeded estimates and expectations. The president said a number of the courses offered were overflowing and about 100 students were turned away. He noted that this is the first intersession to be held at Indiana State and it will help guide the University in respect to future ones.

NOTE: The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in a special Executive Session at 2:00, Friday afternoon, May 25, 1973, in Terre Haute, Indiana. Those in attendance were Mr. Hitch, Mr. Breeden, Mr. McCutchan, Mr. Lamb, President Rankin, Vice President Moulton and Vice President Hardaway. Mr. Acher, Mr. Morris and Mrs. Mitchell joined the meeting later. Mr. Bruce Bottom of Columbus, Indiana, was also in attendance. The regular Executive Session was held Friday evening, May 25, 1973, in Terre Haute, Indiana. Those present were Mr. Hitch, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. Morris, Mr. Lamb, Mr. Acher, Mr. Breeden, Mr. McCutchan, President Rankin, President Rice, Vice Presidents Moulton, Townsend, and Hardaway, and Dr. Rentschler. Attending a portion of the meeting were Dr. Ann Bass, Dr. Effie Hunt, Dr. Maryanne Roehm and Dr. Elmer Ciancone.

## Retrenchment

The president reported that the administration has been fully occupied in developing the 1973-74 budget to reflect this year's limited legislative appropriation, the effects of the expected decline in enrollment, and unavoidable rising costs. To provide modest salary increases for faculty and staff (4 percent for faculty and 5 percent for secretarial and hourly personnel), it was necessary to cut back \$1,400,000 from the current year budget level. The vice presidents were asked to curtail their budgets by approximately 5 percent and the president said he has had their full cooperation. Vice President Townsend, because he has the largest budget, has had to cut nearly \$1,000,000. He was able to contribute a sizable share of the 5 percent cutback by not filling approximately 55 positions that are vacant in the academic area. Several persons occupying administrative posts will not be reappointed next year, expenditures for travel, supplies, equipment, etc., will also be reduced. For the second year of the biennium, it was necessary to notify 27 faculty members that they would not be reappointed for the 1974-75 academic year. A year's notice of non-reappointment is required by our faculty personnel policy. The president pointed out that any faculty member who received such a notice and who feels he was unjustly treated or perhaps discriminated against, has an opportunity for a hearing. On May 7, 1973, the president said he appeared before the faculty in a major address (copies were distributed to the Board) and outlined in detail the actions that the administration will have to take. He said he believes that most faculty understand the necessity for this action.

## Student Fees

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President Rankin said the administration is working on a proposed increase in the student service fee for consideration at the June 16 meeting of the Board. Indiana University's Board of Trustees has approved a student fee increase of \$40 per year and the president said he received a letter from the Commission asking what Indiana State's plans are for increasing fees. Since the Appropriations Act of 1973 established that student fees for General Fund purposes could not be increased by more than a \$7,000,000 total for the state institutions, the Commission is interested in knowing what our plans are in light of the proposed IU increase. The president said he did not believe the kind of fee increase that ISU proposes would fall within the Commission's purview since the fees are not to be used for general operations. He said that he would work closely with the Commission's staff in seeking their understanding.

#### Guaranteed Student Loan Program

A report from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare was received by President Rankin indicating the extent that ISU students are benefiting from the Guaranteed Student Loan Program. He cited some of the averages for the past three years: 1972 national average loan per student--\$1,036, average loan per ISU student--\$1,043; 1971 national average--\$965, ISU average--\$939; 1970 national average--\$910, ISU average--\$918. The president said the banks in this country use their funds to assist students in this program and that the University is involved in much of the paper work.

#### D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

#### 1. President Rice's Report

President Rice announced that the ISUE Golf team won the District 21 championship and will compete in the National Association of Inter-collegiate Athletics at Spartanburg, South Carolina, on June 5-8. He said Evansville does not have money in the athletic budget for such a trip and has asked the newspapers to help in its efforts to raise money for transportation.

The Westwood Garden Club entered the Westwood Log Lodge restoration project in a state contest and won first prize in the Sears-Roebuck sponsored Garden Club Improvement Project. He said that ISUE has been asked to participate on a proposed new Board of Directors for the WNIN (Channel 9) Public Television Corporation.

## 2. Classroom, Applied Science and Technology Building

Mr. James Sutton and Mr. Wallace Given of Hironimus-Knapp-Given Associates presented the final plans and specifications for the Classroom, Applied Science and Technology Building. The plans are basically the same as presented before. The building, located at the south axis of the mall, is an open-thrust type of building which contains two floors. The first floor will house the shop area and classrooms. Faculty offices, TV station, dark rooms, duplicating and photography teaching areas, lounge, etc., will be located on the second floor. The material used on the exterior of the building will be sand-blasted concrete and pre-cast concrete to match the other buildings on campus.

Approval of the final plans and specifications and authorization to advertise for the receipt of bids for the construction of the facility was recommended, subject to the approval of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the recommendation was approved.

## E. PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY CONSTITUTION

Proposed amendments to the University Faculty Constitution are presented in EXHIBIT A. The vote on each amendment by the Executive Committee and by the Senate is presented with the amendments as listed in the Exhibit. The faculty vote is shown on the Offical Ballot (page 3 of the Exhibit). In general, the recommended amendments are mechanical in nature and are designed to facilitate the functioning of faculty government.

It was recommended that the revisions to the Faculty Constitution be approved with the exception of the proposed addition to Article II, Section 3 which stipulated that "Information necessary to the Faculty Senate and its Standing Committees in order to fulfill the advisory responsibilities of the faculty should be made readily available by appropriate administrative officers upon request." President Rankin said that this is not an appropriate article for a faculty constitution since it attempts to govern a non-faculty arm of the institution. Moreover, he thought that compliance with the requirement could result in the release of confidential data to which faculty members might object. For example, the files of faculty members are confidential and if this revision to the Constitution were approved that might not be the case. He said it has always been his purpose to cooperate with faculty government and he thinks he has a good record in this respect. He said his recommendation would come as no surprise to the Faculty Senate as he has already told the Senate his feelings about this amendment. He asked Dr. Ciancone for his comments. Dr. Ciancone said he believed the Senate agreed with President Rankin but their concern was for the future. He said that they receive complete cooperation from the present administration but felt that this might not be so under another administration. This was their primary reason for asking for this revision.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the proposed amendments were approved with the exception of the addition to Article II, Section 3.

#### F. TIAA DISABILITY INSURANCE PROGRAM

On April 12, 1973, the Faculty Senate unanimously approved (33-0) a recommendation of the Faculty Economic Benefits Committee (7-0) that the TIAA Disability Insurance Program be modified so that the University's share of the premium payments be increased to 100 percent, beginning July 1, 1975. At the present time, participation in the TIAA Disability Insurance Program is optional for full-time regular faculty, administrative employees and professional nurses upon completion of three years of service. The university-employee contribution basis is 50-50.

In view of financial realities and a budget commitment of from \$30,000 to \$35,000 of new money which would be involved if the Senate action is accepted, an alternative plan was proposed, namely, that all new employees be required to participate in the TIAA Disability Insurance Program as a condition of employment upon eligibility (after the third year of employment) and that the present university contribution of 50 percent be retained. Approval of the proposal was recommended.

On motion by Mrs. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Acher, the alternative plan was approved.

# G. SICK LEAVE AND MATERNITY LEAVE POLICIES

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Revisions of existing sick leave and maternity leave policies are incorporated into the policy statements as presented below. The sick leave and maternity leave policies pertaining to faculty were developed by a joint committee of the Economic Benefits Committee and Faculty Affairs Committee and approved unanimously (33-0) by the Faculty Senate on April 12, 1973. The policy statements approved by the Senate have been reviewed by University counsel who recommended that the sick leave policy for faculty be expanded to include administrative staff, that accumulation of sick leave without maximum is not advisable, and that there be incorporated provisions for extension of sick leave beyond a fixed maximum. Likewise the policies for non-academic staff have been revised, primarily to incorporate maternity leave provisions, and have also had counsel review. The suggestions of the University attorney have been incorporated into the policy statements as presented. Approval was recommended:

## 1. Sick Leave Policy for Faculty and Administrative Staff

Sick leave with pay shall be granted full-time members of the instructional and administrative staff. Such individuals are eligible for twelve working days of sick leave at the beginning of the regular academic year for instructional staff and at the beginning of the fiscal year for administrative staff.

It shall be the responsibility of department chairmen and the heads of administrative divisions to report all absences because of illness of their respective staffs to the Payroll Office on the prescribed payroll form. Sick leave is not intended as earned time off with pay and will not be granted except for bona fide illness. The University may require appropriate medical evidence at reasonable intervals as confirmation of the bona fide illness.

Unused sick leave may be accumulated, but not more than sixty days of accumulated sick leave shall be granted automatically. With appropriate medical evidence, additional sick leave beyond sixty days (if accumulated by the individual employee) will be granted only upon prior approval by the appropriate vice president and the president of the University. Sick leave beyond that accumulated to date of leave shall be without pay. Any sick leave with pay which exceeds six months must have Board approval. The effective date for accumulation beyond sixty days shall be June 30, 1971.

Sick leave may be used in accordance with the foregoing policy for illness or medically determined inability to work due to pregnancy.

Instructional staff beginning their service after August, or administrative staff beginning their service after July 1, will be granted sick leave with pay proportionate to their length of service during the year. Members of the faculty are eligible for sick leave with pay during summer term appointments.

In cases of serious illness which extends beyond the accumulated sick leave period, special sick leave with pay will be granted only on special recommendation of the president and the approval of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees.

#### 2. Maternity Leave Policy for Full-Time Faculty and Administrative Staff

Sickness related to pregnancy or medically determined inability to work due to pregnancy is given the same consideration for sick leave with pay as is other sickness.

A member of the faculty or administrative staff may, following childbirth, elect to take leave without pay in addition to leave with pay as stated above. This election may extend to all or part of two semesters, counting the semester during which childbirth occurs as one of the two semesters. Additional leave without pay shall be granted only on request at the discretion of the appropriate vice president.

A member of the faculty or administration who otherwise qualifies for special leave shall not be denied such leave because of pregnancy.

#### 3. Adoption Leave Policy for Full-Time Faculty and Administrative Staff

A member of the faculty or administrative staff may, following adoption of a child, elect to take leave without pay. This election may extend to all or part of two semesters, counting the semester during which the adoption occurs as one of the two semesters. Additional leave without pay shall be granted only on request at the discretion of the appropriate vice president.

#### 4. Sick Leave Policy for Non-Academic Staff

Sick leave with pay will be granted all full-time, regular, non-academic employees on the basis of one working day of sick leave accumulated for each month or portion of a month of service. Sick leave will not be granted during the probationary period.

It shall be the responsibility of department chairmen and the heads of administrative divisions to report all absences because of illness of their respective staffs to the Payroll Office on the prescribed payroll form. Sick leave is not intended as earned time off with pay and will not be granted except for bona fide illness. The University may require confirmation of actual illness by a licensed physician in cases where unjustifiable use of sick leave is suspected.

Unused sick leave may be accumulated, but not more than sixty days of accumulated sick leave shall be granted automatically. With the submission of appropriate medical evidence to the Personnel Office, additional sick leave beyond sixty days (if accumulated by the individual employee) will be granted only upon prior approval by the appropriate vice president and the president of the University. Sick leave beyond that accumulated to date of leave shall be without pay. Any sick leave with pay which exceeds six months must have Board approval. The effective date for accumulation beyond sixty days shall be June 30, 1971.

Sick leave may be used in accordance with the foregoing policy for illness or medically determined inability to work due to pregnancy.

In cases of serious illness which extends beyond the accumulated sick leave period, special sick leave with pay will be granted only on special recommendation of the president and the approval of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees.

#### 5. Maternity Leave Policy for Non-Academic Staff

Sickness related to pregnancy or medically determined inability to work due to pregnancy is given the same consideration for sick leave with pay as is other sickness.

A member of the non-academic staff may, following childbirth, elect to take leave without pay in addition to leave with pay as stated above. This election may extend to a total of three months following the month in which childbirth occurs. Leave without pay shall be granted only on request to the Personnel Office and the approval of the appropriate vice president.

### 6. Adoption Leave Policy for Non-Academic Staff

A member of the non-academic staff may, following adoption of a child, elect to take leave without pay. This election may extend to a total of three months following the month in which adoption occurs. Leave without pay shall be granted only on request to the Personnel Office and the approval of the appropriate vice president.

On motion by Mr. Breeden, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the sick leave, and maternity and adoption leave policies were approved.

## H. REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE STATUS OF FACULTY WOMEN

On April 19, 1973, the Faculty Senate, by a vote of 28-4-6, approved and accepted the report of a Special Committee on the Status of Women as written including its implementation. The report was approved by the Executive Committee on April 5, 1973, by a vote of 8-0-0.

At the April 21, 1973, meeting of the Board of Trustees, President Rankin reported on the Senate's action and discussed some of the implications and issues involved with the report. The implementation of the report calls for the establishment of a Women's Advocate with a carefully defined function and specific responsibilities. A number of administrative concerns have been created inasmuch as no reference to advocates for other minority groups and no reference to specific relationships or coordination with the existing Affirmative Action Committee are incorporated into the report. Therefore, further discussion of this report was suggested.

Discussion: President Rankin said that the trustees have received copies of the Report of the Special Committee on the Status of Faculty Women and that three representatives of faculty women, Drs. Ann Bass, Effie Hunt and Maryanne Roehm, appeared before the Board in Executive Session to present their views concerning the implementation of the report. He said it was discussed at length and it was his recommendation that the matter be taken under advisement until the June meeting. Mr. Acher said that if this was the president's recommendation, he would move that the matter be continued until the June 16, 1973 meeting, at which time further discussion would be held. The motion was taken by consent.

#### I. AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PLAN

Public institutions with Federal contracts are now required to have a written Affirmative Action Plan according to amended regulations of Federal Executive Order 11246. These plans are to be submitted to the Office of Civil Rights, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare by May 19, 1973. An Affirmative Action Committee was appointed by President Rankin in October 1972, to assist Dr. James E. Rentschler, Director of the Affirmative Action Program, in preparing the plan. The committee, composed of four faculty members and three persons from non-academic areas, has endeavored to develop a plan designed to comply with the guidelines issued by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in order to insure that discrimination does not occur at Indiana State University on the basis of sex, race, religion, or national origin. The Affirmative Action Plan, as developed by the committee, is presented in EXHIBIT B. Approval was recommended.

Discussion: President Rankin said he was pleased to recommend the Affirmative Action Plan for endorsement. He told the trustees that the plan represented the result of extended efforts on the part of University personnel, starting with the appointment of the Commission on Human Relations in 1967 up to the present-day Affirmative Action Committee. He said Indiana State has tried to keep abreast of the thinking in this country and he thought it was far ahead of many other institutions insofar as compliance with Civil Rights legislation is concerned. He said the Affirmative Action Plan is a good one and he believes it complies with the HEW guidelines. He asked Dr. Rentschler to give further details. Dr. Rentschler explained that the present Affirmative Action Committee is made up of seven members of the University community--three from administration, three from faculty, and one from the secretarial staff. He said that the Plan recommends that effective September 1, 1973, this Committee be comprised of seven members of which at least three will be from the academic staff and at least three from the non-academic staff. A seventh member will be appointed from whatever area the president chooses. He explained that faculty members and the employees who are union members have had a grievance procedure for some time but administrators and the secretarial staff have never had one. The Plan has established a grievance procedure for all groups.

Mr. McCutchan asked what kind of problems the Committee anticipates. Dr. Rentschler said he felt the first problems would be from people who have lost their jobs because of retrenchment and from those who feel they have a salary inequity. Mr. Breeden said he thought the Plan was a good one and called attention to the fact that a number of the considerations contained in the Plan were the same considerations the faculty women had brought to the Board in the Executive Session. However, he said he thought that all complaints should be in writing, whether an employee chooses Option I or Option II in the grievance procedure. His experience has proved that all complaints should be documented. Mr. McCutchan also expressed concern regarding this and said that the complaints and any conversations or discussions pertaining to the complaints should be in writing as there are always disagreements about what has been said and that having the discussions in writing would protect the Committee. Dr. Rentschler explained that it was hoped to settle as many complaints as possible by informal proceedings but that minutes will be taken of all the discussions and that these minutes would serve as a written record. He hoped this would meet Mr. Breeden and Mr. McCutchan's reservations.

Mr. Morris said the plan was extremely impressive. He noted that ISU has a good record of sensitivity for fairness. He said he did believe that historically there have been some inequities at the University. He said it is appropriate to assume that anyone discriminated against ten years ago, has been discriminated against each year thereafter and that the University should continue its efforts to right this situation. One approach would be to conduct an inventory of individual cases with respect to possible discrimination. Mr. Hitch asked Dr. Ciancone if he had seen the Plan. Dr. Ciancone said that he and the newly elected chairperson of the Faculty Senate had reviewed the Plan and that they had met with Dr. Rentschler and his Committee. He said he thought it was an excellent document. Mr. Hitch asked if the students have representation on the Committee and if they could use the grievance procedure. Dr. Rentschler said the Committee did not have a student representative and that only Option I of the grievance procedure was open to the students. He said that student concerns will be referred to the Human Relations Commission which was especially established for students and which has nine student members. Mr. Coffman said he thought that on the whole the Affirmative Action Plan is a good one but he felt there should be a student representative on the Committee. He said the Affirmative Action Program was established by the Federal government to serve everyone, including students. He said he had discussed this with President Rankin and Dr. Rentschler. Mr. Ralph said it is very likely that the students may feel discriminated against if only the Human Relations Commission can hear their complaints. President Rankin said he understood the Committee prefers not having a student on the Committee because of their concern for the privacy of hearings. He suggested that Mr. Coffman and Mr. Lane discuss their concerns with the Committee. Mr. Coffman said he does plan to discuss this with the Affirmative Action Committee.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. Morris, the Affirmative Action Plan was approved as recommended.

## J. GRANTS

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On motion by Mrs. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Morris, the following grants were approved as recommended:

#### 1. Russell Sage Foundation Research Grant - Fund No. 2091

Letter of Award dated April 26, 1973, for an additional amount of \$2,885.19 has been received from the Russell Sage Foundation in order to complete the research project entitled "National Study of Black Elected Officials", under the direction of Dr. James E. Conyers, Professor of Sociology. The ending date of the project is also extended to September 30, 1973. It was recommended that the additional amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

## 2. Vocational Instructional Resource Center - Fund No. 2114-1

Funding has been received in the amount of \$37,200 from the State Board of Vocational-Technical Education to support the second year of operation of the Vocational Instructional Resource Center in the areas of materials for in-service and pre-service vocational teacher education under the direction of Dr. Tom Reckerd, Chairman of the Vocational-Technical Education Department. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the original proposal.

#### 3. Crane Naval Ammunition Depot Research Contract - Fund No. 2155

Modification of Contract No. N00164-73-C-0370 dated April 9, 1973, has been received authorizing an increase of \$250 for materials making the total fixed price read \$8,345. It was recommended that this additional amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the contract.

4. The Link Foundation Grant - Fund No. 2160

Letter of Award dated April 9, 1973, in the amount of \$1,000 has been received from the Trustees of the Link Foundation to conduct Phase I of the project to develop a national clearinghouse for teacher-created learning packages on aerospace education under the direction of Dr. Chris Buethe, Chairman of the Secondary Education Department, during the period ending December 31, 1973. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the original proposal.

## 5. Public Health Service Research Grant - Fund No. 2161

Notice of Grant Award No. 5-R01-AI-10828-02 VR has been received from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare in the amount of \$44,268 to conduct the second year of a research project entitled "Poxvirus Biochemistry and Synthetic Virus Particles" for the period from May 1, 1973, through April 30, 1974, under the direction of Dr. Wayne E. Magee, Department of Life Sciences. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

### 6. Criminal Justice Planning Agency - Safety & Security Grant - Fund 2162

Grant No. 5-11-72-A-1 in the amount of \$507 and Grant No. 6-83-72-A-1 in the amount of \$500 have been received from the Indiana Criminal Justice Planning Agency to provide funds for special training of Safety & Security personnel. It was recommended that the funds be appropriated in accordance with the grant requests.

7. Purdue University LARS Project Grant - Fund No. 2163

Memorandum of Agreement between Purdue University and Indiana State University was entered on April 16, 1973, whereby Indiana State University will provide the services of Dr. Paul Mausel to perform research at the Laboratory for the Applications of Remote Sensing (LARS) at Purdue University for which the University will be reimbursed for the released time plus fringe benefits and indirect costs totaling \$3,765 for the period from January 1, 1973, through May 31, 1973. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant agreement.

8. American Philosophical Society Research Grant - Fund No. 2164

Grant Award No. 6559 in the amount of \$1,200 has been received from the American Philosophical Society to conduct a research project entitled "Origin of External Parasite Fauna of Western Jumping Mice, Zapus," under the direction of Dr. John O. Whitaker, Jr., Professor of Life Sciences. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

9. National Science Foundation Grant - Fund No. 226-43

Grant No. GB-38433 has been received from the National Science Foundation in the amount of \$37,000 for the support of the project entitled "Rhizobial Infection of Legumes in Vitro" under the direction of Dr. Donald A. Phillips, Department of Life Sciences, for the period from September 1, 1973, through February 29, 1976. It was recommended that the total grant be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

10. Taft Institute of Government Seminar - Fund No. 2005

Grant letter dated March 8, 1973, has been received from the Robert A. Taft Institute of Government authorizing a grant in the total cash amount of \$7,901 plus \$2,500 in services and materials making the total grant \$10,401 to conduct the Summer Seminar on "The American Two-Party System and Responsible Government" for the seventh year under the direction of Dr. Charles W. Engelland, Director of the Social Science Education Center. The two-week seminar will be offered to thirty participants who will register for two hours credit. The in-kind contribution by the University will total \$4,422. It was recommended that the total grant be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant letter.

#### 11. Research Corporation Grant - Fund No. 2165

Letter award dated May 7, 1973, has been received from the Research Corporation in the amount of \$1,760 to conduct a research project entitled "Analysis of Long Chain Bio-Molecules by Scanning Electron Microscopy" under the direction of Drs. John A. Swez and James B. Westgard, Department of Physics. It was recommended that the total grant be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

## 12. Vocational Summer Teaching Intern Program Grant - Fund No. 2166

An award letter and check in the amount of \$2,983 have been received from the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education to provide a summer internship program in cooperation with Purdue University for vocational teachers who will be working with disadvantaged students. The intern stipend will be paid directly to the interns by the State Board. The program will be under the co-direction of Dr. Herbert Ross, School of Business. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the original proposal and terms of the award letter.

## 13. Vocational-Technical Education Mini Grant - Fund No. 2167

An award letter and check in the amount of \$487 have been received from the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education to conduct a research project entitled "Assessment of the Duties and Responsibilities of Vocational Education Administrators in Indiana" under the direction of Dr. Tom Reckerd, chairman of the Vocational-Technical Department. It was recommended that the total grant be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the award letter.

# K. SALARY SCHEDULES

Salary schedules for non-academic staff are presented in EXHIBIT C as follows:

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the salary schedules were approved as recommended.

## L. AGREEMENT BETWEEN SCHOOL OF NURSING AND ST. ANTHONY HOSPITAL

An agreement between the ISU School of Nursing and the St. Anthony Hospital whereby students of the School of Nursing of the University may use the Hospital's facilities for clinical laboratory practice is presented in EXHIBIT D. This agreement has been approved by university counsel. Approval of the agreement was recommended.

On motion by Mr. Breeden, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the recommendation was approved.

(Note: Mr. McCutchan asked Mr. Moulton to find out who was responsible for getting the malpractice insurance. Mr. Moulton said he thought it was the student's responsibility but he would bring clarification to the next Board meeting.)

#### M. PROPOSAL FOR USE OF MINI COURSES (Information item only)

In February 1973, the Council of Academic Deans discussed and later approved a proposal for the use of "mini courses" as a supplement to the offering of both undergraduate and graduate curricula. The "mini course" is defined as an organized learning experience of shorter duration than the traditional academic course, and may be offered on a regular, irregular, or non-regular time schedule. EXHIBIT E is the rationale and definition of the mini-course concept.

Subsequent to approval by the Council of Academic Deans, the University Curricula and Academic Affairs Committee approved on March 30, 1973, a modified version of the Deans' proposal. The Executive Committee voted, on April 26, 1973, 7-0-0 in support of the CAAC version and the Faculty Senate, on May 9, 1973, in a vote of 30-0-2 gave approval.

Under current procedures, new course approval does not require action by the Board of Trustees. This material was presented as an informational item only.

## N. PROPOSED TRANSFER OF ACCOUNTING FUNCTION TO EVANSVILLE CAMPUS

Numerous meetings of Main Campus and Evansville Campus Business Office staff have been held in anticipation of the separation proposed for the Evansville Campus and it has been planned to transfer a portion of the accounting function to the Evansville Campus on July 1, 1973. In accordance with appropriate procedures Mr. Byron Wright, ISUE Vice President for Business Affairs, submitted forms to the Indiana State Board of Accounts for approval and subsequently that agency has questioned the legality of the transfer of the records.

The State Board of Accounts letter presented as EXHIBIT F questions the adequacy of internal control following the proposed change and further asks that the responsibility of the Treasurer of the University Board of Trustees for the Evansville Campus operation be clarified in order to comply with existing statutes. In meetings held since the letter was first issued, the State Board of Accounts has questioned the legality of the transfer of the accounting function to the Evansville Campus and has requested that the University Counsel issue an opinion on the legality of the proposed transfer of records and approval obtained from the Indiana State University Board of Trustees and the Commission for Higher Education for such transfer. There appears to be an indication that the State Board of Accounts will

approve the transfer of the accounting function to the Evansville Campus if the approvals indicated are obtained. Mr. Sullivan's opinion is presented in EXHIBIT G. Board approval of the transfer of the accounting function to the Evansville campus was recommended. It was further recommended that the Indiana State University organization chart be amended to add the ISUE fiscal operations as an area responsible to the Indiana State University Vice President for Business Affairs and Treasurer.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommendations were approved.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Acher, the meeting adjourned at 10:15 a.m.

The trustees met in a special Executive Session immediately following the meeting.

The following proposed changes and additions to the University Faculty Constitution are being presented to you for your vote in accordance with Article IX of the University Faculty Constitution. The attached ballot should be completed and returned to the Faculty Senate Office by April 23, 1973.

#### Chairperson, vice chairperson

The following motion was passed by the Executive Committee of the University Faculty Senate by a vote of 7-0-1 and by the University Faculty Senate by a vote of 27-5-2:

That the language of the constitution and bylaws be altered in that the terms chairperson and vice chairperson be substituted throughout for the language now used.

Article II, Section 3 (Approved unanimously by the Executive Committee and Senate)

Add as next to last paragraph:

Information necessary to the Faculty Senate and its Standing Committees in order to fulfill the advisory responsibilities of the faculty should be made readily available by appropriate administrative officers upon request.

Article III, Section 2 (Approved unanimously by Executive Committee and Senate)

Let paragraph six read:

The elected student representatives shall serve one-year terms, but may be re-elected once.

Article III, Section 4 (Approved unanimously by Executive Committee and Senate)

Let the final paragraph read:

The officers of the newly constituted Faculty Senate shall be elected at the organizational meeting in May (Art. IV, Sec. 1, below.). The President of the University, or in his absence the Vice President for Academic Affairs, shall preside at this meeting until the officers are elected.

Article III, Section 5 (Approved unanimously by the Executive Committee and Senate)

Let the final sentence of the first paragraph read:

The Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, and Secretary of the Faculty Senate shall be the officers of the Executive Committee.

Let the final paragraph read:

The six elected members of the Executive Committee shall be nominated at the May meeting of the newly constituted Faculty Senate, their election to be supervised by the officers of the Faculty Senate as soon as those officers have themselves been elected.

Proposed Changes and Additions to the Constitution of the Faculty of Indiana State University

# Article IV, Section 1 (Approved unanimously by the Executive Committee and Senate)

Let the first paragraph read:

The Faculty Senate shall meet at least once in each calendar month throughout the academic year. The newly constituted Faculty Senate shall hold its first meeting in May; the sole purpose of this meeting will be the election of officers and other members of the Executive Committee. The newly constituted Faculty Senate and its committees, appointed in the summer and confirmed at the first meeting of the Faculty Senate in the new academic year, shall begin functioning with the opening of the academic year.

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Let paragraph three read:

The Executive Committee shall meet at least twice in each calendar month throughout the academic year and during other months as necessary. Meetings will be called by the Chairperson or, in his absence, by the Vice Chairperson. Notice of the meetings shall, whenever possible, be published by the Secretary.

Article IV, Section 3 (Approved unanimously by the Executive Committee and Senate)

Let paragraph two read:

Two-thirds of the voting membership of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum.

Article VII, Section 1 (Approved unanimously by Executive Committee and Senate)

Let the first sentence of paragraph two read:

Appointive members of the Standing Committees shall be appointed by, and may be discharged by, the Executive Committee of the Faculty Senate with the approval of the Faculty Senate.

Article VII, Section 2 (Approved unanimously by Executive Committee and Senate)

Let paragraph two read:

The Faculty Senate or the Executive Committee of the Faculty Senate may respectively appoint or discharge members of such Special Committees.

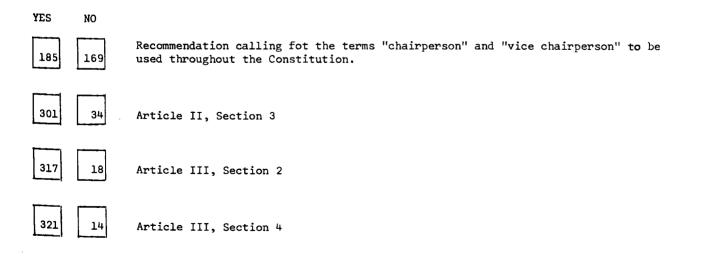
Article VIII, Section 4 (Approved unanimously by Executive Committee; approved by University Faculty Senate by vote of 34-1-1.)

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#### AFFIRMATION OF POLICY

Indiana State University has endeavored to comply with recent Civil Rights legislation enacted at local, state, and national levels of government. The University has given assurances of compliance with provisions of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 on January 5, 1965 and Executive Order 11246 as amended by Executive Order 11375 on February 26, 1973. A policy of non-discrimination was adopted by the Board of Trustees in March, 1967, a paragraph of which is excerpted as follows:

"The Indiana State University Board of Trustees, being duly empowered by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana to establish and maintain Indiana State University, hereby <u>reaffirms</u> its present policy of non-discrimination with respect to all organizations, services, and programs under its direct control in full compliance with the spirit and intent of all laws -- local, state, and federal."

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The University will continue to support the Civil Rights Act of 1964 which prohibits discrimination in employment practices because of race, color, sex, religion or national origin. In December, 1966, the Faculty Council of the University adopted the following statement relative to discrimination in the community experienced by minority faculty:

"The Faculty Council of Indiana State University deplores the evidence of racial bigotry and instances of discrimination against members of the University faculty. The Council urges the University faculty, administration, and Board of Trustees to continue to exhaust every legal, economic, and moral means available to them to reduce or eliminate discrimination in the future. The Council further recommends that the widest possible publicity be given to this statement."

To ensure that the provisions of the Civil Rights Act are carried out, a permanent Commission on Human Relations (September, 1967), an Ad Hoc Commission on Black Studies (May, 1969), a Minority Groups Personnel Information Committee (academic) (February, 1971), an Ad Hoc Commission on the Status of Faculty Women (February, 1971), a Non-Academic Employment Advisory Committee (March, 1971), a Director of Affirmative Action (January, 1972), have been appointed.

With regard to Equal Employment Opportunity, the University utilizes (and did so even prior to the Civil Rights Act of 1964) employment practices that exceed the minimal expectations of the law as it relates to minorities and it is continuing to take positive measures to prevent overt acts of discrimination against women and minorities.

In addition to evaluating current employment policies of the University, Affirmative Action will be taken to recruit, employ, train, and promote women and members of minority groups. All faculty and staff position vacancies will be published in the <u>University Bulletin</u> and equal opportunity will be given to all persons who wish to be considered for such positions.

The officers and Trustees of Indiana State University fully support this program. All members of the faculty and staff are expected to give full support to the programs of <u>Equal</u> <u>Employment Opportunity</u> and <u>Affirmative Action</u>.

- a. The Affirmative Action Program will be announced to all members of the University community.
- b. The University Affirmative Action Plan will be included in the policy handbooks for faculty and staff.
- c. Periodic reports concerning the implementation of the Affirmative Action Plan will be disseminated to the University faculty, staff and students through such publications as the <u>University Handbook</u>, <u>The Indiana Statesman</u>, the <u>University Bulletin</u>, <u>Student Handbook</u>, and other relevant publications.
- d. The "Equal Opportunity and Affirmative Action Employer" clause will be included in official University publications.
- e. Special meetings will be conducted with all supervisory personnel, academic and non-academic, to explain the intent of the University policy.
- f. All persons involved in recruiting will be informed verbally and in writing of the University's Affirmative Action Program, and these persons will be directed to recruit actively members of minority groups and women.
- g. Periodic meetings will be conducted with academic and non-academic supervisory personnel to discuss human relations issues, equal employment problems or changes in policy.

## RESPONSIBILITY FOR ADMINISTERING AND IMPLEMENTING THE UNIVERSITY'S AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PROGRAM

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees has assigned to the President of the University the responsibility for the development and implementation of the equal opportunity policy and Affirmative Action Program. Specific authority and responsibility are delegated by the President as follows:

- a. The Director of the Affirmative Action Program is responsible for the University's overall compliance with Executive Orders 11246 and 11375.
- b. Consistent with the University's administrative organizational structure, the Vice Presidents will assume direct responsibility for compliance with the Affirmative Action Plan by all personnel in their administrative areas.
- c. All faculty, staff and administration are responsible to the heads of their departments for the implementation of the Affirmative Action Plan.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PROGRAM

- a. Serve as chairperson of the Affirmative Action Committee.
- Develop policy statements, new programs and means of communication concerning the Affirmative Action Program.
- c. Identify problem areas.

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- d. Assist persons who have concerns about discrimination.
- e. Assist supervisors in arriving at solutions to problems relative to the Affirmative Action Program.
- f. Develop auditing and monitoring systems which will determine the effectiveness of the University Affirmative Action Program. These studies will include salaries, fringe benefits, promotions, and other areas in which discrimination may occur.
- g. Serve as a liaison between the University and governmental and community agencies.
- h. Inform the administrative heads and supervisory personnel of the latest developments in all equal employment opportunity areas such as recruitment, training, and job classification.
- i. Issue reports on October 1 and April 1 to the faculty, staff, administration and students evaluating the progress and effectiveness of the Affirmative Action Program.
- j. Initiate and conduct investigations of any alleged or suspected discrimination against students, faculty, staff or administrators.

# AFFIRMATIVE ACTION COMMITTEE

The Affirmative Action Committee is appointed by the President of the University. Effective September 1, 1973, the Committee will be comprised of seven members of which at least three will be from the academic staff and at least three from non-academic staff. In addition, the Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs and the Director of Personnel Administration will serve as ex officio members. Consideration will be given to maintaining a proportionate number of members of minority groups and women on this Committee. One member from each area, academic and nonacademic, will be appointed for a three year term, one from each area for a two year term, and one from each area for a one year term. The seventh member will serve a two year term. The appointments are effective September 1, of each year. Members may be reappointed by the President.

The function of the Affirmative Action Committee is to assist the Director of Affirmative Action in all areas of equal employment opportunity and affirmative action. Responsibilities will include preparation of the Affirmative Action Plan, implementation of its policies, studies, investigations and informal hearings related to the program. 5

Studies will be made of the following:

- a. Racial and sex composition of the faculty, staff, administration, and student body.
- b. Racial and sex composition of the job applicant flow.
- c. Total employment selection process including recruitment, position descriptions, application forms, interviews and final selection procedures.
- d. Decisions pertaining to promotions and tenure.
- e. University sponsored employee benefit programs.
- f. Salaries.
- g. Opportunities for self improvement.

h. Areas of student concerns as listed in the section under <u>Goals for Students</u>. Continuity will be sustained through periodic reports.

## UTILIZATION ANALYSIS OF ACADEMIC POSITIONS AND MAJOR JOB CLASSIFICATIONS

In determining whether women and persons of minority groups are being underutilized, the Director of the Affirmative Action Program will consider at least the following factors:

- a. The present percentage of women and members of minority groups in academic departments, non-academic areas and administrative positions.
- b. The availability of women and members of minority groups within the University, the community, and nation to fill positions in academic, non-academic, and administrative positions.
- c. The degree of training which the University is reasonably able to undertake as a means of making more job classes available to women and members of minority groups.
- d. A study of the current job assignments of women and minority groups.

#### INTERNAL AUDIT AND REPORTING SYSTEM

The Director of Affirmative Action is responsible for monitoring job applications, placements, transfers, promotions, terminations, operating budgets, salaries and fringe benefits at all levels to ensure that the University's non-discriminatory policy is carried out.

The Vice Presidents will require formal reports from administrative heads in September and March to determine progress toward goals and timetables.

The Director of the Affirmative Action Program will submit biannual reports on October 1 and April 1 to the President, faculty, staff, administration and students on the effectiveness of the program and make recommendations to improve any unsatisfactory areas. Exit interviews will be conducted by the Office of the Director of Personnel Administration or the appropriate Vice President's office to determine problems in policies and reasons for employees leaving the University. Steps will be taken to alleviate conditions pertaining to discrimination against any employee.

## GOALS

## ADMINISTRATIVE POSITIONS

Goals cited here are relative to administrative positions<sup>1</sup> in the areas of Academic Affairs, Business Affairs, Student Affairs and Development and Public Affairs.

- 1. The University will have a percentage of women employed in administration in the four areas of Academic Affairs, Business Affairs, Student Affairs, and Development and Public Affairs at least comparable to the percentage of women who are being prepared at the national level for specific positions in these areas. See Exhibit A for statistics on numbers of women in these administrative areas. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)
- 2. The University will have a percentage of persons from minority groups employed in administration in the four areas of Academic Affairs, Business Affairs, Student Affairs, and Development and Public Affairs at least comparable to the percentage of persons from minority groups who are being prepared at the national level for specific positions in these areas. See Exhibit A for statistics on numbers of persons from minority groups in these administrative areas. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)
- 3. The University will determine salaries, promotions and fringe benefits without regard to sex, race, religion or national origin. (Continuing)
- 4. The University will, whenever possible, continue to make available opportunities for professional growth and improvement of job skills for employees through formal courses, workshops and on-the-job training without regard to sex, race, religion, or national origin. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)
- 5. The University will ensure that job titles, work assignments and working conditions are determined without regard to race, sex, religion, or national origin. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)
- 6. The University will have a percentage of women and persons from minority groups at all levels of administrative positions at least in proportion to the percentage employed at Indiana State University. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)

#### GOALS

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## FACULTY

Goals cited here are relative to all University positions that carry faculty or comparable rank.

- 1. Indiana State University will have a percentage of women faculty members in each department at least comparable to the percentage of women being prepared at the national level with terminal degrees as defined by each discipline. (See Exhibit B for discussion of goals and timetables.)
- 2. The University will have a percentage of persons from minority groups in each department at least comparable to those being prepared at the national level with terminal degrees as defined by each discipline. (See Exhibit C for discussion of goals and timetables.)
- 3. The University will make a concerted effort to recruit women and persons of minority groups with terminal degrees or those who are actively pursuing them. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)
- 4. The University will increase the percentage of women and persons from minority groups at all levels of administrative positions at least in proportion to the percentage of women and persons of minority groups in higher education. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)
- 5. The University will determine salaries and fringe benefits without regard to sex, race, religion, or national origin. (Continuing)
- 6. The University will make available opportunities for professional growth such as leaves of absence, attendance at workshops and conferences for faculty without regard to sex, race, religion, or national origin. (Continuing)
- 7. The University will ensure that teaching, research, and administrative assignments are made without regard to sex, race, religion, or national origin. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)

#### GOÁLS

## NON-ACADEMIC POSITIONS

Goals cited here are relative to non-academic positions in the areas of Clerical, Computer Center, Bookstore, Dining, Housing, Physical Plant, and Safety and Security.

- The University will have a percentage of women employed in each area at least comparable to the percentage of women in the employment market in Vigo County. See Exhibit D for statistics on numbers of women in non-academic positions. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)
- 2. The University will have a percentage of persons from minority groups in each area at least comparable to the percentage of persons from minority groups in Vigo County. See Exhibit D for statistics on numbers of persons from minority groups in non-academic positions. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)
- 3. The University will have a percentage of women and persons of minority groups at all levels of supervision positions at least in proportion to the percentage of women and persons of minority groups employed at Indiana State University. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)

- 4. The University will determine salaries, promotions and fringe benefits without regard to race, sex, religion or national origin. (Continuing)
- 5. The University will make available opportunities for improvement of job skills such as formal courses, workshops and on-the-job training for employees without regard to race, sex, religion, or national origin. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)
- The University will ensure that job titles, work assignments and working conditions are determined without regard to race, sex, religion or national origin. (Fall, 1973 and continuing)

#### GOALS

#### STUDENTS

- Indiana State University will actively recruit women students and students from minority groups at both the graduate and undergraduate levels. (Continuing)
- The University will ensure that requirements for admission to the University at both the undergraduate and graduate levels do not restrict the admission of capable students. (Continuing)
- 3. The University will ensure that policies and regulations do not discriminate against students on the basis of sex, race, religion, or national origin in at least the following areas: (Continuing)
  - a. admissions

- b. financial aid
- c. university housing
- d. fellowships and assistantshipse. use of facilities
- f. curricular content and programs
- g. student life programs
- h. academic requirements
- i. student health services
- j. athletic programs
- k. student employment
- 1. placement

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Approved exceptions to this policy include such things as: the assignment of members of the same sex to a room in a residence hall, separate restroom facilities for men and women, organizations designed for members of one sex (i.e., honor societies, fraternities, sororities), organizations whose members share a common religious belief (i.e., Newman Club, Baha'i Club, Jewish Student Association) or organizations designed for students whose national origin is outside the United States (i.e., International Student Association.) Students will be appointed to all committees of the Affirmative Action Committee which have

to do with investigations of student concerns as cited in paragraph 3.

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# ACTIONS TO MEET AFFIRMATIVE ACTION GOALS ADMINISTRATIVE POSITIONS

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- All vacancies and new positions in administration will be published in the <u>University Bulletin</u> by the appropriate vice president. The positions will not be filled for a period of 30 days from publication.
- 2. Recruiting procedures will involve all possible professional means of reaching qualified candidates. These will include professional societies, journals, and especially organizations with records of women candidates and persons of minority groups. The statement, "Women and members of minority groups are encouraged to apply" will be included in recruiting notices.
- 3. Members of the administration staff will be represented on University committees which have responsibilities that affect them. Women and members of minority groups will have at least proportionate representation on such committees.
- 4. Funds will be designated in the University budgets for 1973-74 and 1974-75 to correct any salary inequities identified due to sex, race, religion, or national origin. The process of identification and correction of any such inequities will be completed before the end of the biennium (1974-75). Inequities will be corrected as soon as they are verified by the President of the University.
- 5. The final decision on salary inequities due to sex, race, religion, or national origin will be made by the President of the University upon recommendation of the appropriate vice president. The vice president will consult with heads of departments concerning persons who should be considered for correction of inequity due to sex, race, religion or national origin.
- Salary studies will be initiated by the vice presidents to identify any salary inequities due to sex, race, religion or national origin.
- 7. Salaries and fringe benefits for administration personnel will be analyzed by the Director of Affirmative Action and the Affirmative Action Committee to ensure that discrimination is not taking place.
- 8. Department heads, vice presidents, the Director of Affirmative Action and the Affirmative Action Committee will study the job titles and descriptions in administrative areas to ensure that discrimination is not occurring.
- 9. A greater effort will be made by the vice presidents, department heads, Director of Personnel Administration, Director of Affirmative Action, and other employing officials to increase the number of qualified women and persons of minority groups in administrative positions by encouraging them to apply for such positions.
- 10. The vice presidents and the Director of Affirmative Action will determine whether discrimination is practiced by any department head or person with responsibility for employing persons. They will study all recommendations for positions to ensure that women and persons of minority groups are given an equal opportunity and fair consideration for the positions. A summary of the recruiting activities will be included with the recommendation for appointment.
- 11. Each administrator will encourage persons in his or her area to continue their education through appropriate workshops, in-service training, and formal courses.

- 12. The vice presidents will maintain statistics on job applicants by sex, race, and ethnicity.
- 13. The vice presidents will ensure that exit interviews are conducted with all employees who leave or are terminated to determine the cause for such action.
- 14. Administrative employees who believe they have been discriminated against on the basis of sex, race, religion or national origin may appeal through procedures outlined in Exhibit E.

# ACTIONS TO MEET AFFIRMATIVE ACTION GOALS FACULTY

- 1. Each department will inventory its faculty each year on forms provided by the Director of Affirmative Action to determine the composition by sex, race, and national origin.
- Each department will prepare a plan to meet the goals of Affirmative Action as to numbers of women and persons of minority groups.
- 3. Each department will submit its inventory and plan to the Dean of the School, Vice President for Academic Affairs and the Director of the Affirmative Action Program.
- 4. All new and vacant faculty and administrative positions with faculty rank will be listed in the <u>University Bulletin</u> as soon as confirmed by the President or appropriate vice president. The position will not be filled for at least 30 days from the day of publication in the University Bulletin.
- 5. Recruiting procedures will involve all possible professional means of reaching qualified candidates. These will include professional societies, journals, and especially organizations with records of women candidates and persons of minority groups. The statement, "Women and members of minority groups are encouraged to apply," will be included in recruiting notices.
- 6. Women and persons of minority groups will be represented on administrative search committees and involved in the screening of faculty within departments. If no women or persons of minority groups are in the department such persons shall be invited from other disciplines to participate in the screening process.
- 7. The Vice President for Academic Affairs and the Director of Affirmative Action will ensure that women and persons of minority groups are actively recruited for faculty and administrative positions in academic areas.
- 8. In order to verify that good faith efforts are made to recruit women and persons of minority groups, department chairpersons will include with their recommendations for appointment a report of recruitment activities countersigned by the academic dean for review by the Vice President for Academic Affairs, Director of Affirmative Action, and the President.
- 9. Department chairpersons will consult with the Indiana State University Minority Personnel Information Committee for assistance in recruiting persons from minority groups.
- 10. All University publications will be analyzed by the Director of Information Services to ensure that discrimination is not being fostered through references to job classifications by sex.

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12. Funds will be designated in the University budgets for 1973-74 and 1974-75 to correct any salary inequities identified due to sex, race, religion or national origin. The process of identifying and correcting any such inequities will be completed before the end of the biennium (1974-75.) Inequities will be corrected as soon as they are verified by the President of the University.

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- 13. The final decision on salary inequities due to sex, race, religion or national origin will be made by the President of the University after consultation with the appropriate vice president, dean, department chairperson and a review of recommendations from faculty committees conducting salary studies.
- 14. The administration will continue to cooperate with appropriate faculty salary study committees of the Faculty Senate.
- 15. Promotion and tenure data will be analyzed annually by the Director of Affirmative Action and the Affirmative Action Committee.
- 16. Faculty members who believe they have been discriminated against on the basis of race, sex, religion, or national origin may appeal through procedures outlined in Exhibit E.

# ACTIONS TO MEET AFFIRMATIVE ACTION GOALS NON-ACADEMIC POSITIONS

- All vacancies and new positions in non-academic areas will be listed by the Director of Personnel Administration in the <u>University Bulletin</u>. Persons will have at least three days from the date of the publication to apply for such positions.
- 2. The Director of Personnel Administration will maintain current statistics as to the numbers of women and persons of minority groups by job classifications.
- 3. The Director of Personnel Administration will maintain statistics on job applicants and the disposition of them by sex, race, and ethnicity.
- 4. The Director of Personnel Administration and the Director of Affirmative Action will work with department heads and employing officials to encourage greater utilization of members of minority groups and women.
- 5. Promotion practices will be analyzed by the Vice President for Business Affairs, Director of Personnel Administration and the Director of Affirmative Action to ensure that women and members of minority groups are given equal opportunity for such promotions.
- 6. The Director of Personnel Administration and the Director of the Affirmative Action Program will work with local high school counselors and leaders of the black community to encourage greater numbers of applicants for positions at the University.

- 7. The Director of Personnel Administration will have exit interviews conducted with all employees in the non-academic area who leave or are terminated to determine the cause for such action. Monthly reports will be made to the Director of Affirmative Action.
- 8. The Director of Personnel Administration will prepare a study of all job titles and descriptions to ensure that discrimination is not occurring as to salary or working conditions.
- 9. All announcements concerning employment at the University will contain "Indiana State University welcomes applications from women and persons from minority groups."
- 10. The Director of Personnel Administration will develop plans for improving the promotion opportunities of employees through training and education programs.
- 11. The Director of Personnel Administration and Director of Affirmative Action will examine all hiring procedures such as application forms, interviews, tests, and recommendations to ensure that members of minority groups and women are not discriminated against. Only validated tests will be used as means of screening applicants.
- 12. The work force in the Terre Haute area will be studied by the Director of Affirmative Action and the Director of Personnel Administration to determine the available numbers of minority groups and women who are available for work.
- 13. Demotions, layoffs, recall following layoffs and transfers will be made in accordance with University practice and in terms of applicable Union agreements.
- 14. Funds will be designated in the University budget for 1973-74 and 1974-75 to correct any salary inequities identified due to sex, race, religion, or national origin. The process of identifying and correcting any such inequities will be completed before the end of the biennium (1974-75). Inequities will be corrected as soon as they are verified by the President of the University.
- 15. The final decision on salary inequities due to sex, race, religion or national origin will be made by the President of the University after consultation with the Vice President for Business Affairs. The Director of Personnel Administration will consult with heads of departments regarding persons who should be considered for correction of inequity due to sex, race, religion, or national origin.
- 16. The administration will continue to cooperate with appropriate salary study committees of non-academic personnel.
- 17. Salary and fringe benefits will be analyzed by the Director of Affirmative Action and the Affirmative Action Advisory Committee to ensure that discrimination is not taking place against any person due to sex, race, religion, or national origin.
- 18. Members of the non-academic staff will be represented on University committees which directly affect them. Women and members of minority groups will have at least proportionate representation on such committees.
- 19. The Vice President for Business Affairs, the Director of Personnel Administration, and the Director of Affirmative Action will ensure that discrimination is not practiced by any department head or person with responsibility for employing persons. They will study all recommendations for positions to determine that women and persons of minority groups are given an equal opportunity for employment or promotion. A summary of recruiting activities will be included with the recommendation for appointment.

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20. Criteria used in recommendations for merit increases will be examined by the Vice President for Business Affairs, Director of Personnel Administration and the Director of Affirmative Action to ensure that discrimination is not occurring in a department.

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21. Employees in the non-academic areas who believe they have been discriminated against on the basis of sex, race, religion or national origin may appeal according to the grievance procedure explained in Exhibit E.

# ACTIONS TO MEET AFFIRMATIVE ACTION GOALS STUDENTS

- 1. The personnel from the Office of University-High School Relations and the Office of Admissions, will make special efforts to visit schools where enrollment is primarily that of minority groups.
- 2. Department chairpersons will, as part of their recruiting program, make concerted efforts to recruit additional women and persons of minority groups for graduate programs.
- 3. Academic departments will submit annual reports in September to the Director of Affirmative Action on recruiting, interviews and awarding of fellowships and assistantships so that the Director may determine whether or not discrimination has occurred.
- 4. Persons responsible for the student areas listed in the <u>Goals for Students</u> will make annual reports in September to the Director of Affirmative Action.
- 5. The Affirmative Action Committee will support the work of the Human Relations Commission as the Commission endeavors to prevent discrimination against students.
- 6. The Affirmative Action Committee will request the administration and the Student Government Association to appoint to committees proportionate numbers of women students and students from minority groups.
- 7. The statement "Women and persons of minority groups are encouraged to apply," will be included in recruitment brochures.
- Students who believe they have been discriminated against on the basis of sex, race, religion, or national origin may appeal through procedures outlined in Exhibit E.

- ENGLISH--The department meets the minimum goal. The goal is to maintain at least the current level during 1973-74.
- FOREIGN LANGUAGE--Recruiting for one position is being conducted for 1973-74. The goal is to add one woman in 1974-75.

GEOGRAPHY-GEOLOGY--The department meets the minimum goal. Two positions may be filled for 1973-74.

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#### EXHIBIT C

#### GOALS AND TIMETABLES FOR PERSONS OF MINORITY GROUPS IN FACULTY AND ADMINISTRATIVE POSITIONS

Data were requested from state, regional, and national headquarters of the Office of Civil Rights regarding numbers of persons from minority groups in higher education. The Director of Affirmative Action was informed by all offices that such data are not available by academic discipline or even for total faculty.

There are currently 27 faculty members, 14 administrators, and one coach from minority groups as defined by the Federal Government on the staff of Indiana State University.<sup>1</sup> This does not include fifteen minority group faculty members from foreign countries.

In the absence of reliable data, the goal is to increase the number of faculty from minority groups by 50 percent in a period of three years (1976-77) and the number of administrators by 25 percent in the same period. There are currently ten Blacks, ten Orientals, one American Indian and six Spanish Surnamed for a total of 27 persons from minority groups on the faculty. Of the 15 persons in administration, 14 are Black and one is Oriental.

In the event a member of the University Family believes he or she has been discriminated against on the basis of sex, race, religion or national origin, the following grievance procedures may be implemented.

EXHIBIT D--continued

#### Option I. Discussion

Any member of the University Family may present, in writing or verbally, to the Affirmative Action Committee through its chairman, the Director of Affirmative Action, a complaint relative to discrimination. The complaint may be on his own behalf or on behalf of someone else. When possible, the Affirmative Action Committee will resolve the problem. When a resolution is not possible, the Affirmative Action Committee will refer the case to the Human Relations Commission or recommend that the individual initiate formal grievance procedures.

)ption I is a procedure open to students as well as staff members.

#### Option II. Discussion

This option is open only to employees of the University. At each supervisory level the employee will be informed in writing within five working days after filing his complaint of the supervisor's decision as to whether or not discrimination is indicated and, when appropriate, of his recommendation for its correction. Upon receipt of this information, the employee may find his problem resolved or he may choose to take his case to the next supervisory level.

#### Appeal Committees:

A case presented to an appeal committee must be filed in writing. Appeal committees shall forward to the President majority and minority reports. Appeal committee membership shall be determined by constitution, rules and regulations or resolutions.

Faculty members and administrators with faculty rank will appeal to the Faculty Government according to procedures outlined in the Faculty Constitution.

Jnion members will follow prescribed union grievance hearing procedures.

Clerical employees will take their cases to the Clerical Appeal Committee. The Clerical Appeal Committee shall be a standing committee consisting of five regular members and five alternates. Members and alternates shall be selected by the Office Personnel Council. Members and alternates are selected for a one-year period. Selection must take place by August 1 of each year. An alternate shall be designated for each regular member and shall serve on the Appeal Committee in the absence of that particular member.

Administrators (without faculty rank) will take their cases to the Administrators (without faculty rank) Appeal Committee. The Administrators (without faculty rank) Appeal Committee shall be a standing committee consisting of five regular members and five alternates. Two administrators shall be elected from each division in the University which employs administrators without faculty rank. At the present these divisions are under the supervision of Vice President Truitt, Vice President Townsend, Vice President Schomer, Vice President Moulton and President Rankin. One administrator from each division shall be elected as a regular member and the other shall be elected as that person's alternate. The alternate shall serve on the Appeal Committee in the absence of the regular member from his division. Members and alternates are elected for a period of one year. It shall be the responsibility of the appropriate vice president or the President to see that the election takes place by August 1.

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 1973, by and between Indiana State University for its School of Nursing (hereinafter referred to as University) and St. Anthony Hospital, a not-for-profit general hospital located in Terre Haute, Indiana, (hereinafter referred to as Hospital) WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, the University desires to make use of Hospital's facilities for clinical laboratory practice by students of the School of Nursing of the University, and

WHEREAS, the Hospital has agreed to make its facilities available to the students and faculty of the University for the desired purpose.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and acts to be kept and performed by the parties hereto, the parties do herewith agree as follows:

1. The Hospital agrees to make its facilities available in all areas of patient care for observation and participation by the students and faculty of the School of Nursing of Indiana State University as a part of the program of said School of Nursing subject to the conditions and limitations contained herein.

2. The arrangements for use of said facilities of the Hospital will be made by the Dean of the School of Nursing on behalf of the University and the Administrator and Director of Patient Care on behalf of the Hospital. The plan and program will be organized and agreed to by said persons prior to the commencement of the program.

3. The University will be responsible for the teaching and guidance of the students in the clinical laboratory practice and will be available to the students.

The specific assignment of learning experiences to specific students will be made and arranged by the Faculty Clinical Instructor on behalf of the University in consultation with the Head Nurse, Supervisor or Co-ordinator on behalf of the Hospital.

4. The use of Hospital's facilities will be consistent with and in conformity with all applicable rules, regulations and policies of the Hospital, and the Clinical Instructor on behalf of the University will be responsible for maintaining proper standards of nursing care and safeguard of patients assigned to students.

5. Supervision of the health of all students making use of any of the Hospital facilities as contemplated herein will be the responsibility of the University.

All students and faculty assigned to or making use of any clinical area of the Hospital under the contemplated program will meet all health requirements of the Hospital.

The Dean of the School of Nursing on behalf of the University and the Administrator or the Director of Patient Care on behalf of the Hospital will determine when a pregnant faculty member or student should cease use of any clinical area. Clearance from the physician attending the pregnant faculty member will be required before that faculty member may resume use of any clinical area, and clearance from a physician of the University Student Health Service will be required before a pregnant student may resume use of any clinical area. Students who have physical or emotional disabilities which may negate success in nursing practice will not be permitted to use the Hospital's facilities under this program. Students who have disabilities which may not negate success in nursing practice may participate in the contemplated program if approved by the Hospital.

Prior to the use of any Hospital facilities under the contemplated program the University will furnish the Hospital a medical record for each participating student showing that said student fully complies with the health requirements required by the Hospital.

6. The faculty of the University participating in the contemplated program will receive an orientation to the Hospital by the appropriate Hospital staff. The University faculty participating in the program may be included in demonstrations of new equipment and procedures. Each new faculty member of the University participating in the program will arrange with the Director of Patient Care on behalf of the Hospital for an orientation prior to the assignment of that new faculty member to any clinical area.

7. The Hospital facilities may be available for the University's continuing education program on a pre-planned project basis, the arrangements for such to be made with the Director of Patient Care on behalf of the Hospital and by the Director of Continuing Education and the Dean of the School of Nursing on behalf of the University.

8. Neither party hereto will be paid any monetary reimbursement as such by the other party hereto for the contemplated program or for use of either party's facilities by the other party. Neither party hereto will have any responsibilities or liabilities to the other party or its employees, students or anyone participating in the contemplated program. Faculty and students shall be covered by malpractice insurance prior to any assignment for practice at the Hospital.

9. The Hospital will supply dressing rooms, space for storage of clothing not in use while students are practicing at the Hospital, and conference room facilities for use of faculty and students.

10. Either party hereto may terminate this Agreement by at least one (1) school calendar year's written notice to the other party. All students enrolled in the University's School of Nursing and participating in the program contemplated herein at the time that notice to terminate this Agreement is given by either party to the other shall be permitted to complete at the Hospital the clinical laboratory practice needed for graduation.

#### RATIONALE AND PROPOSAL FOR OFFERING MINI COURSES

#### I. DEFINITION

- A. A mini course is an organized learning experience presenting material in smaller units and/or for shorter duration than the traditional academic course, and may be offered on a regular, irregular, or non-regular time schedule.
- B. A mini course may be designed in a variety of formats, including fractions of regular courses and forms such as short courses, seminars, workshops, conferences, internships, externships, and other comparable educational experiences.

## II. RATIONALE

- A. The mini-course committee has sent detailed questionnaires to twenty-nine (29) institutions. Of nineteen (19) returns, nine (9) institutions do offer mini courses. All nine report that their programs are operating satisfactorily, and that they have generated considerable attention from students, faculty, and the community. The Carnegie Commission on Higher Education observes that colleges and universities suffer from "reluctant attenders," courses which are too long, and from a tendency to overspend. The mini course has proved successful at several institutions in combatting this problem. Notre Dame has offered mini courses in history for three years, and surveys show a 95% student endorsement of the practice. The University of Hawaii also reports a successful program which began in the mid-sixties. Two other institutions, Mankato State College and the University of Wisconsin, have also registered considerable success.
- B. Specific claims that have been cited by these and other institutions are:
  - 1. They are a useful device for extending the present curriculum to new content, by new methods, to new audiences.
  - 2. They permit easier combinations of employment and formal study.
  - 3. They respond more sensitively to the educational needs of adults--and to the educational implications of lifelong learning.
  - 4. They minimize the time, content, and money risk involved in exploratory or survey study--and increase the variety of such explorations.
  - 5. They allow for preliminary exploration of emerging fields of study--as, for example, "problem" areas which may be currently "overpriced" at one semester hour of credit.
  - 6. They are particularly appropriate for updating professional and technical competencies.
  - 7. They permit greater flexibility and precision in the allocation of instructional resources, and in the planning of individualized student programs.
  - 8. They permit the offering for credit of short courses, workshops, seminars--and other structures for teaching and learning--which have been excluded (largely) by the magnitude of the credit hour.

#### III. POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

- A. Mini Course Credit
  - 1. The basic unit of academic credit shall be the Semester Hour (S.H.), defined as credit for the learning which accompanies one hour of instruction per week for sixteen weeks, or a total of sixteen (16) hours of instruction.
  - 2. Each hour of instruction or contact hour shall require not fewer than two hours of related out-of-class activities by students.
  - 3. Mini courses may be offered in units of 1/4 semester hours.
  - 4. Credit courses shall be determined as follows:

Non-laboratory courses: 1/4 semester hour for not fewer than four contact hours

Laboratory courses: 1/4 semester hour for not fewer than eight contact hours

- 5. All credit awarded for mini courses shall be based on adequate evaluation of course outcomes or student performances.
- 6. The approved University grading system shall be used for mini courses.
- B. Guidelines for Mini Courses
  - 1. Innovative and experimental topics shall comprise the mini-course offerings, and regular University courses may be offered on this basis.
  - 2. Mini courses may be developed by appropriate structuring of the content, method, time, and credit dimensions of:
    - a. Courses currently approved and listed in the University Bulletins.
    - b. Courses proposed and approved for experimental and limited offering under applicable University policies.
  - 3. Educational experiences offered to the off-campus community by means such as radio, television, extension, independent study--and by combinations and extensions of such means--shall be eligible for mini-course credit.
  - 4. Mini courses may be offered at both the undergraduate and graduate levels and may be designed to meet general education, major, minor, and/or elective requirements.
  - 5. Undergraduate students may offer no more than 24 hours of mini-course credit toward their degrees. Graduate students may present no more than six credit hours of mini courses for their degrees.
  - 6. The same fee shall be charged non-credit students as students seeking credit. Mini courses may not be audited.
  - 7. Faculty loads and pay for teaching mini courses shall be determined under the existing University regulations.
  - 8. Courses currently in the catalog shall be identified on transcripts using the following pattern:
    - Art 151 Arts in Civilization (A) 1
      - NOTE: The letter A designates that the first half of the course was completed. One hour credit was given. The second half of the course would be given a (B) designation...and so on.

Courses which shall provide experiences not listed in the catalog shall use the following pattern on transcripts.

UNTO 100M - University Topics - Art: Art of the Wabash Valley, 1/4 s.h.

NOTE: UNTO designated University Topics. M designates a mini course.

The catalog description shall appear in one location in the University <u>Bulletins</u> with the following description:

100 - 600M UNIVERSITY TOPICS - 1/4, 1/2, 3/4, 1 plus. Designed to provide learning experiences of shorter duration than the full semester course. Check special section labeled Mini Courses in the Schedule of Classes.

#### C. Mini Course Procedures

- 1. Proposals for mini courses may be developed by any department. Interdisciplinary, interdepartmental, and experimental proposals shall be encouraged. Evidence of student input in the form of suggested content, methodologies, or schedule patterns shall be interpreted as particularly compatible with the spirit and intent of mini courses.
- 2. Mini courses based on courses listed in the Graduate and Undergraduate Bulletins shall require the approval of the appropriate Department and Dean, and the Vice President for Academic Affairs. Graduate mini courses must also be approved by the Dean of the School of Graduate Studies.
- 3. Mini courses which are not listed in the Graduate and Undergraduate Bulletins shall require approval of the appropriate Department and Dean, the Vice President for Academic Affairs, and appropriate curriculum bodies. Graduate mini courses must also be approved by the Dean of the School of Graduate Studies.
- 4. All approved mini courses shall be announced in the University Bulletin, and shall be listed in a special mini-course section of the official University class schedule for each term; except that this rule shall not restrict a Department from offering special approved mini courses as the opportunity presents itself during the course of a term.

#### IV. REVIEW OF MINI-COURSE OFFERINGS

At the end of three academic years, a specific projection of the term and conditions of continuing the mini-course program shall be made by appropriate administrative offices and forwarded to CAAC and Graduate Council for their review and recommendations.

#### Dear Mr. Moulton:

Officials of the I.S.U. Evansville Campus have requested our Indianapolis Office to approve certain accounting procedures at the Evansville Campus. These proposed changes bring attention to the matter of internal control in respect to administrative authority and responsibility over fiscal matters. In order to evaluate the proposed changes, as well as the present system, we would appreciate additional information concerning the following:

#### (1) Present Organization

The organization table on page 1-6 of the Indiana State University Handbook indicates that the Evansville Campus is directly under the Board of Trustees and the President, and is above the Vice President for Business Affairs and Treasurer.

Does this mean that the fiscally responsible officer, the Vice President and Treasurer, does not have control and authority over fiscal matters at the Evansville Campus? Please explain the degree of control.

(2) Check Signing and The Proposed Procedure The proposed changes indicate that invoice voucher checks are to be written at Evansville. We believe that Burns 28-7106 would require that your signature as Treasurer would have to be used on all checks. If this is true, it appears that there may be a further weakening of internal control and the authority of the Treasurer over Evansville under the proposed changes.

What authority and administrative control will the Vice President and Treasurer, under the proposed changes, have over the following activities at Evansville:

RE: Evansville Campus Accounting Records and Procedures

Dear Ken:

We have reviewed your letter of May 23, 1973 concerning the subject matter, and we have also reviewed the statutes which we believe are applicable in connection with this matter, and we have formed the following observations and opinions.

Since no distinction is made between the Terre Haute and Evansville campuses of Indiana State University, it appears obvious, under existing statutes, that the operation of both campuses is directly under the Indiana State University Board of Trustees. Under Burns 28-7106, the Trustees are directed by statute to appoint a qualified person, not a member of the Board, to serve as permanent Treasurer, who shall be responsible for the receipt, custody, accounting, and proper protection of all funds due and owing to Indiana State University from any and all sources and for whatever purposes such funds and receipts may be designated. It appears from this section of the statute that the University Treasurer is charged with full responsibility for the fiscal matters of all the University operations, including those operations conducted at the Evansville campus. Until the Evansville campus becomes an entity of its own, we do not believe that the ultimate fiscal responsibility for the Evansville campus can be deleted from the duties of the University Treasurer.

While we believe that the above quoted Burns 28-7106 charges the University Treasurer with ultimate responsibility for the fiscal matters of the University, yet we can find no statutory prohibition against delegating certain responsibilities to other fiscal officers on the Evansville campus, keeping in mind, of course, that the ultimate responsibility remains in the Treasurer of the University. In other words, we see no legal restrictions against appointing assistant treasurers or assistant comptrollers for the Evansville campus operation, but we do believe that control of fiscal operations on the Evansville campus must be retained by the Treasurer of the University which would, we believe, necessitate routine audits of the records kept at Evansville and it should be made clear that the ultimate fiscal authority rests in the University Treasurer.

As to the signing of checks originating from the Evansville campus, we can see no reason why the same procedure cannot be used in Evansville as is used here in Terre Haute. In other words, if you now use a facsimile signature for Terre Haute checks and if the facsimile signatures are placed in the custody and control of the comptroller or one of the assistant treasurers, then we can see no reason why same cannot be done in Evansville. The State Board of Accounts appears to question the potential weaknesses inherent in having a divided office (Terre Haute vs. Evansville) and this certainly is a point to be considered when developing the controls for the Evansville campus operation. However, we see no statutory difficulties as far as the division of labor is concerned.

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#### INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

#### Evansville, Indiana June 16, 1973

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Library Building on the Indiana State University campus at Evansville, Indiana, at 11:00 a.m., E.S.T., June 16, 1973. Members present were Board President, William L. Hitch; Vice President, Nancye T. Mitchell; Secretary, James T. Morris; Assistant Secretary, Herbert I. Lamb; Mr. James D. Acher; Mr. Rex E. Breeden and Mr. John E. McCutchan. President Rankin, President Rice, and Vice Presidents Hardaway, Moulton, Schomer, Townsend and Truitt were present. Also attending were Dr. James E. Rentschler, Assistant to the President; Mr. Gary Coffman, President, Student Government Association; Mr. Lane Ralph, Vice President, Student Government Association; and Mr. Mark Morse, summer editor for the Indiana Statesman. Mr. Byron Wright and Dr. Donald Bennett of the Evansville campus were also present.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Hitch called the meeting to order at 11:00 a.m. Mr. Hitch thanked President Rice and his staff for their hospitality.

### A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING MAY 26, 1973

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. Breeden, the minutes of the meeting of May 26, 1973, were approved. (This motion was made by Mr. Morris with the stipulation that a statement made by him on page 9, Section I, of the minutes be clarified. It was agreed that the official minutes would be changed to incorporate this clarification rather than carry the correction in this month's minutes.)

#### B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees will be held on Friday, July 27, 1973, at 9:00 a.m. The Executive Session will be held on Thursday evening, July 26, 1973.

#### C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Rankin reported that some long-awaited demolitions have begun. The Art Annex Building at Ninth and Chestnut has been razed and the lots leveled. The storage warehouse at Ninth and Chestnut Streets is in the process of being demolished. The 'President said this will greatly improve the appearance of the area.

### Paving of Parking Lots

Paving of additional parking lots on campus has started. Work is under way on the area north of the arena and the large student parking lot across Sycamore Street between Fourth and Fifth Streets (west of the Student Health Center).

### Student Legal Counseling Service

Mr. Darrell E. Felling, attorney for the Student Legal Counseling Service, has submitted his first annual report (copies were furnished to the trustees). The Student Legal Counseling Service, approved in principle by the Board in July 1972, was established to provide free legal advice and counseling to Indiana State students. The president said he was pleased with what Mr. Felling was doing and believes that the service has been well-received by the students. He noted that out of the total number of cases Mr. Felling handled, less than one-third pertained to students with university-related problems.

#### Proposed Transfer of Accounting Function to Evansville Campus

President Rankin said he had received a letter from Dr. Kessler, Commissioner for Higher Education, in which he states that the Commission has no direct interest in the matter of transferring responsibility for certain accounting functions to the Evansville Campus. Mr. Moulton has written to the State Examiners asking them for appropriate action as soon as possible.

#### Legislation Affecting College Athletes and Coaches

The President called attention to a bill now before Congress. This legislation, H.R. 7918, filed by Representative James O'Hara, is the result of the conflict between AAU and NCAA and is intended to prohibit any institution of higher education, or any organization having as members institutions of higher education, from preventing any student athlete from

No college or organization could penalize any athlete who participated, with the exception that a college may establish uniform rules covering all student athletes. The President said this bill is viewed with alarm by many athletic departments around the country and he has, in his role as Chairman of the Federal Relations Committee for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, sent an Actiongram to 300 college and university presidents alerting them to this proposed legislation and the problems it could pose for intercollegiate athletes. He said Mr. Chalmers and other athletic directors have written to Mr. Brademas regarding this bill.

#### Season Tickets for Students

Mr. Chalmers has suggested selling student season tickets for reserved seats in the new Amphitheater. It was his thought that students might be interested enough in reserving seats that they would be willing to pay \$5 for a season ticket. President Rankin said he has discussed this suggestion with Mr. Moulton and will place the matter on the Agenda for July.

#### First Summer Term Enrollment

As of June 14, the enrollment figure for the first summer term was 5,515. President Rankin said the figures are not complete and that the workshops and travel courses could increase the figures by 200 or 300. This compares with a final figure of 6,200 for last year. He pointed out that if the 830 enrolled for the Intersession were counted, enrollment for the first summer term would be substantially above last year.

#### Salary Inequities

President Rankin recalled that at the last Board meeting it was decided that the way to approach the matter of salary inequities was to examine individual cases and he asked Dr. Hardaway to explain what has been done in this regard. Dr. Hardaway showed the basic work sheets to the trustees and explained that faculty members had been listed by department, age, date hired, time in rank, and their salary for 1972-73. From these facts, summary data were tabulated. He said that when an individual seemed to be out of line, training, experience and beginning salary were considered. He said the summary material showed that 71% of the males and 53% of the females in the professor, associate professor and assistant professor ranks have doctorate degrees. Tables made up from the work sheets showed the average salary by rank and the percentage by sex that exceed the average. From these data, he said we were able to identify individual cases where inequities might exist. In the instances were individual faculty members seem to be out of line, it will be necessary to review with the chairman of the department to find out about performance and contributions to the University. Dr. Hardaway said he thought that most differences would be explained by factors other than sex. President Rankin said he wanted to examine every single case and would like to review this material with a subcommittee of the Affirmative Action Committee so that there will be understanding in faculty circles and so that he could obtain the opinions and advice from some of our own faculty people.

#### D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

#### 1. President Rice's Report

President Rice reported that the Council on Dental Education granted provisional approval to the dental assisting and dental hygiene programs. The programs will be revisited for evaluation in 1975 as a normal procedure. He pointed out that the first students in the programs had graduated this year and all graduates have taken and passed the State Board Examinations.

The ISUE golf team was able to travel to the final competition in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics at Spartanburg, South Carolina. He said this is the first time an Indiana team has played in this competition.

The Foundation Board meets this week and the Donor Recognition Program is on the agenda. He said there has been approximately \$99,000 in donations for furnishings with still some follow-ups to be made.

First summer term enrollment is 790, compared to 917 for the first summer last year. He said enrollment in the intersession might account for some of the difference.

#### 2. Salary Lists, 1973-74

Proposed salaries for the Evansville Campus personnel for the year 1973-74, had been submitted to the trustees in the Agenda as EXHIBIT A (A-1, Faculty and Administrative; A-2, Non-Academic Salaried Employees; A-3, Non-Academic Wage Employees). On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the Evansville campus salaries were approved as recommended. (EXHIBIT A is on file with the official proceedings.)

#### 3. Operating Budgets, 1973-74

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Lamb, the operating budgets for the 1973-74 fiscal year presented in EXHIBIT B were approved as recommended.

#### 4. Library Landscaping Construction

On July 24, 1970, Indiana State University entered into a contract with G & D Blount Bros., Inc., to provide lawns and planting for the Evansville Campus Library. The contract price was 67,900. G & D Blount Bros., Inc., completed nearly all of the work specified, however, the contract specifications require that the plants be guaranteed for the duration of one full growing season following planting. Hironimus-Knapp-Given Associates made numerous unsuccessful efforts to persuade the contractor to replace plantings in accordance with the contract. G & D Blount Bros., Inc., has declared bankruptcy and will be unable to complete their contract with the University. Proposals to complete the work as specified have been received from Colonial Garden Center in the amount of 17,750 and from Doug Wearren Nursery for 18,654. The bonding company for G & D Blount Bros., Inc., The Transamerica Insurance Company, has agreed to pay Indiana State University the amount of 17,750 plus the 135 cost of the Colonial Garden Center bond, less the 6,790 retained by the University from G & D Blount Bros., Inc. In exchange therefor, Transamerica Insurance Company has requested a complete release from the contract. University Counsel and State Board of Accounts examiners have approved the release.

It was recommended that a contract for the Evansville Library landscaping work to be completed as originally specified be awarded to Colonial Garden Center in the amount of \$17,885. It was further recommended that payment be accepted as set forth hereinabove from Transamerica Insurance Company and that they be released from further responsibility for the G & D Blount Bros., Inc., contract.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the recommendations were approved.

#### 5. Budget Adjustments

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the following budget adjustments were approved as recommended:

### 6. Building Facilities Fee

It was recommended that \$180,000 of the Building Facilities Fee collected in the 1972-73 year be reallocated and transferred to a Special Projects Fund to pay for improvements for which other funds are not currently available. The projects to be completed from the Special Projects Fund include the replacement of defective fume hoods, the installation of washers on Science laboratory vents, the construction of an Art Classroom and a Chemical Storage Room, and other projects which may be designated by the President of the University.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. Morris, the recommendation was approved.

#### 7. Purchase of Bookstore Inventory

It was recommended that approximately \$50,000 be appropriated from Student Activities Fund 9201 for the purpose of purchasing the Bookstore inventory. The inventory is presently owned by the Terre Haute campus Bookstore. Although the Terre Haute campus Bookstore has had the investment in inventory, the profits from the ISUE Bookstore operation have accrued to the Evansville Campus for the past several years.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the recommendation was approved.

8. Grant

On motion by Mrs. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Acher, the following grant was approved as recommended.

#### a. U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Grant - Fund No. 9229

An agreement between the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and Indiana State University Evansville Campus was entered into on May 14, 1973, whereby Indiana State University Evansville Campus will provide the services of Dr. Billy J. Fairless, Associate Professor of Chemistry, to serve as Chief, Chemistry Unit for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region V, S. & A. Division, Central Regional Laboratory for the period of June 1, 1973 through May 31, 1974. The University will be reimbursed for Dr. Fairless' salary of \$23,088 and fringe benefit costs. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the agreement.

### 9. Receipt of Bids for University Center Food Facilities Equipment

In accordance with the advertisement for bids published in the EVANSVILLE PRESS and the EVANSVILLE COURIER on February 5 and 12, 1973, bids for food facilities equipment for the University Center were received until 2 p.m., February 28, 1973; after which time the bids were publicly opened and read. The bids are presented in EXHIBIT B-1.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Acher, the following resolution was approved as recommended, subject to the concurrence in the award by the Department of Housing and Urban Development:

- WHEREAS, the Indiana State University Board of Trustees, pursuant to the advertisement for bids for food facilities equipment for the University Center, Project No. CH-IND-133(S), heretofore published on February 5 and 12, 1973, did on the 28th day of February, 1973, at 2 p.m., receive bids for said food facilities equipment, and
- WHEREAS, the bid of \$183,500 submitted by Weber Equipment Company is the lowest bid submitted by any responsible bidder;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the contract for food facilities equipment in the amount of \$183,500 be awarded to Weber Equipment Company.

#### E. HONORARY DEGREE

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Breeden, the recommendation that the honorary degree, Doctor of Laws, be granted to Wesley N. Haines was approved. The degree will be conferred at the August 21, 1973 Commencement, at which time Dr. Haines will deliver the graduation address. Dr. Haines has served as President of Franklin College since 1964.

### F. DEPOSITORY FOR COLLECTION OF LIBRARY MATERIALS ON ALCOHOLISM (INFORMATION ITEM)

An agreement has been effected with the Terre Haute Medical Education Foundation whereby the Indiana State University Library will serve as an agency to develop and service a collection of library materials on alcoholism. Funds for the purchase of the materials will be provided by the Terre Haute Medical Foundation and the ISU Library will assume costs relating to cataloging, processing, housing and circulating materials purchased for the Alcoholism Collection. Title to all materials purchased for the Alcoholism Collection will be permanently vested in the University Library. Materials in the collection will be housed and catalogued in conformity with existing procedures and circulation will be governed by the current policies regulating the use of all library materials. All qualified medical and premedical personnel of the Terre Haute area shall have access to the Alcoholism Collection; also, such individuals shall have access to materials in the University Library's general collections.

#### G. SALARY LISTS, 1973-74

Proposed salaries for the Terre Haute Campus personnel for the 1973-74 year had been presented to the trustees in the Agenda as EXHIBIT C (C-1, Faculty and Librarians; C-2, Administration; C-3. Non-Academic Salaried Employees; C-4, Non-Academic Wage Employees). On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the Terre Haute campus salaries were approved as recommended. (EXHIBIT C is on file with the official proceedings.)

#### H. OPEPATING BUDGETS, 1973-74

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Morris, the following operating budgets for 1973-74 were approved as recommended:

Current Operating Budget, EXHIBIT D Student Services Budget, EXHIBIT E Auxiliary Services Budget, EXHIBIT F

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### I. STUDENT FEE INCREASE

It is necessary to increase the Student Service Fee \$2 per semester hour because of the loss of income due to reduced enrollment and the need to provide \$545,000 debt service annually for the bonds to be issued to finance the construction of the University-Civic Amphitheater. The construction of the University-Civic Amphitheater has been financed by interim bank loans and the bank loans are to be repaid from the proceeds of the sale of revenue bonds previously authorized by the Indiana General Assembly, the State Budget Committee, the State Budget Agency, and the Governor of the State of Indiana. The out-of-state fee has been increased an additional \$3 per semester hour in keeping with the University practice of maintaining the out-of-state fee at a level approximately twice that of the Indiana resident fee.

Discussion: President Rankin asked the students for comments. Mr. Coffman said in the past, whenever there has been an increase in student fees, the president of SGA went on record as opposing the increase. He said that although he did not like the increase, he was not opposing because he felt the time to complain was when the Amphitheater was being planned. President Rankin said that at the time the Amphitheater was being considered, he had met with the Student Government Association president, Bruce Simon, to discuss the plans for constructing such a facility. He said that Mr. Simon was very enthusiastic about the project at that time. The President said he appreciated Mr. Coffman's comment and told him that it was not every year that such an understanding statement came from Student Government.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the schedule of fees presented in EXHIBIT G, effective August 1973, was approved as recommended.

#### J. BUDGET REQUEST, INDIANA HIGHER EDUCATION TELECOMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM (IHETS)

On May 24, 1973, the Board of Directors of the Indiana Higher Education Telecommunication System approved the 1973-74 budget for INETS. Prior to that time, it had received review and approval by the State Universities Telecommunication Coordinating Council on May 16, 1973. The budget is presented as EXHIBIT H, as approved.

The legislation for IHETS requires that such budget requests be approved by the Boards of Trustees of the state public institutions prior to submission of the budget to the State Budget Agency. The item is presented herein in order that the Trustees' action may be entered in the official record. Approval was recommended.

On motion by Mr. McCutchan, seconded by Mr. Morris, the budget was approved.

#### K. BUREAU OF SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION BUDGET, 1973-74

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. Breeden, the following budget for the Bureau of School Administration for 1973-74 was approved as recommended:

#### L. UNIVERSITY HOUSING POLICY REVISION

The change is to reflect the first day of registration rather than a specific date. This was the intent of the original draft of the Housing Policy. It was recommended that this change be approved by the Board of Trustees and become effective the Fall Semester 1973-74 academic year.

#### Present Housing Policy Regarding Age and Academic Standing

Students who will have earned 86 semester hours of credit as of August 28, and students who will become 21 years of age on or before September 30, may live in housing facilities of their own choosing. All other single undergraduates who do not return to their parents' homes each evening must reside in housing facilities maintained by the University.

#### Proposed Housing Policy Regarding Age and Academic Standing

Students who will have earned 86 semester hours of credit as of the first day of registration for the fall semester, and students who will become 21 years of age on or before September 30, may live in housing facilities of their own choosing. All other single undergraduates who do not return to their parents' homes each evening must reside in housing facilities maintained by the University.

On motion by Mr. Acher, seconded by Mr. McCutchan, the recommendation was approved.

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### M. SALE OF UNIVERSITY-CIVIC AMPHITHEATER BONDS

APPROVAL OF FORM OF INDENTURE OF MORTGAGE SECURING INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY CIVIC-AMPHITHEATER FIRST MORTGAGE BONDS; AUTHORIZING EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF INDENTURE OF MORTGAGE; AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF BONDS; AND AUTHORIZING SALE, EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF BONDS.

Mr. Moulton advised that a form of Indenture of Mortgage had been prepared by Ice Miller Donadio & Ryan, bond counsel, for the purpose of securing bonds, to be designated "Indiana State University Civic Amphitheater First Mortgage Bonds," in the principal amount of \$6,000,000, to finance the construction and equipment of the field house and hall of music known as the civic amphitheater. He then presented to the Board the form of Indenture of Mortgage.

The Board considered the provisions of the form of Indenture of Mortgage and unanimously adopted a resolution as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED by Indiana State University Board of Trustees that a necessity exists to erect, construct, complete, equip, furnish, operate, control and manage a field house and hall of music known as the civic amphitheater, to be located on real estate now owned by Indiana State University Board of Trustees and constituting a part of the campus of the University in the City of Terre Haute, Indiana, at an estimated cost of \$10,000,000, of which \$4,000,000 is to be paid by gifts and \$6,000,000 is to be paid from the proceeds of the bonds.

RESOLVED FURTHER that the issuance of the Bonds by Indiana State University Board of Trustees be authorized in an amount not exceeding \$6,000,000 and in accordance with the provisions of the form of Indenture of Mortgage between Indiana State University Board of Trustees and Terre Haute First National Bank submitted to the Board at this meeting, which form of Indenture is hereby approved for use in securing the Bonds to be designated "Indiana State University Civic Amphitheater First Mortgage Bonds," and made a part hereof as if fully copied and contained herein.

Mr. Moulton then advised that in order to avoid delay in the financing of the project, it would be expedient for the Board to approve a notice of sale and to authorize the publication of a notice of sale. He then presented a form of Official Bond Sale Notice for consideration by the Board.

The Board considered the provisions of said form of bond sale notice and unanimously adopted a resolution as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED by Indiana State University Board of Trustees that the form of Official Bond Sale Notice submitted to this Board at this meeting and made a part hereof as if fully copied and contained herein, is hereby approved.

RESOLVED FURTHER that the Vice President and Treasurer of Indiana State University be and he is hereby authorized and directed to fix the date of sale and to publish the form of Official Bond Sale Notice in a newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Terre Haute, Indiana, in a newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, and in The Bond Buyer, a financial journal published in the City and State of New York.

Mr. Moulton suggested that delay could be avoided and the necessity of a further meeting of the Board obviated by the authorization at this meeting of the award of said bonds upon the receipt of bids after due advertisement, execution and delivery of the Indenture of Mortgage to the Trustee, and the execution and delivery of the bonds.

After due consideration, the Board unanimously adopted a resolution as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED that the Vice President and Treasurer of Indiana State University is authorized and directed to receive the bids submitted for said Bonds and to award the Bonds to the highest bidder therefor, the highest bidder for said Bonds to be determined by computing the total interest on such Bonds from the date thereof to the date of final maturity of the Bonds, and deducting from such total interest the premium bid, if any; said Vice President and Treasurer is authorized and directed to cause the Bonds to be prepared in the form contained in the Indenture of Mortgage; the proper officers of the University are authorized and directed to cause the Indenture to be completed in conformity with said bid; the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary of this Board are authorized and directed to execute the Indenture when so completed and to cause the same to be delivered to the Terre Haute First National Bank, Trustee, for execution. The President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary of this Board are authorized and directed to execute said Bonds and the President or Vice President of this Board is authorized to execute the coupons attached to said Bonds by his facsimile signature, and to deliver said Bonds to the Trustee for authentication; and the Vice President and Treasurer of Indiana State University is authorized and directed to deliver the Bonds, when so executed and authenticated, to the purchaser thereof upon payment of the purchase price in accordance with the bid therefor.

Mr. Acher then moved the adoption of the several resolutions above as introduced and read. Mr. McCutchan seconded the motion, and, on roll call, the following voted "Aye":

The President then declared the motion carried and all resolutions adopted as introduced and read.

### N. OFFICE OF WOMEN'S ADVOCATE

At the May meeting of the Board of Trustees, three representatives of the faculty women spoke at the Executive Session in support of the creation of an Office of Women's Advocate. The matter was discussed further at the regular meeting of the Board and the President . recommended that action be deferred until the June meeting in order to permit Board members and the administration to give further consideration to the proposal.

In view of the fact that the Affirmative Action Plan, adopted at the May meeting, is designed to develop the machinery and procedures for the purpose of accomplishing the same goals that are incorporated in the Women's Advocate Office, it is believed unnecessary and undesirable to create such an office. It was recommended that the proposal not be approved.

On motion by Mr. Breeden, seconded by Mr. Morris, the recommendation of disapproval was accepted.

### O. IN MEMORIAM

Mrs. Bertha Wools Fitzsimmons, Associate Professor Emeritus of Elementary Education, Laboratory School, passed away on June 13, 1973. A resolution, EXHIBIT I, was presented for approval of the Board.

On motion by Mr. Lamb, seconded by Mr. Acher, the resolution was approved.

#### P. GRANTS

On motion by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the following grants were approved as recommended:

#### 1. Construction Industry Advancement Program Grant - Fund No. 2168

A letter award has been received in the amount of \$1,500 from the Construction Industry Advancement Program of Indiana to provide the salary plus fringe benefits for an Experienced Teacher Consultant for an Industrial Arts course under the direction of Dr. Larry Browder, Assistant Professor of Industrial Arts Education. It is recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the letter award.

#### 2. Lilly Endowment Social Studies Materials Grant - Fund No. 2169

A letter award has been received in the amount of \$20,000 from the Lilly Endowment, Inc., to support the project for the development of teaching materials for the seventh grade social studies program on Asia and the Non-Western world under the direction of Dr. Charles W. Engelland, Director of the Social Science Education Center. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the letter award.

#### 3. Training Personnel in Physical Education for the Handicapped - Fund No. 2170

Notification of Grant Award No. OEG-0-73-6088, Project No. 31-3691, in the amount of \$22,273 has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to continue the program of training professional personnel in the education of handicapped for the period from June 1, 1973, through May 31, 1974, under the direction of Dr. Dolores Geddes, Department of Women's Physical Education. Matching funds will include waiver of contingent fees and out-of-state fees for five fellows participating in the program and in-kind contribution of faculty salaries. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

### 4. Training of Teachers of Handicapped Children Grant - Fund No. 2171

Notification of Grant Award No. OEG-0-73-6088, Project No. 31-3772, in the amount of \$42,025 has been recieved from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to provide support for personnel in programs to prepare professional personnel in the education of the handicapped for the period from June 1, 1973 through May 31, 1974, under the direction of Dr. Rutherford B. Porter, Chairman of the Special Education Department. The contingent fees and out-of-state fees for the fellows participating will be waived. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

## 5. College Library Resources Program Grant, 1973-74 - Fund No. 2172

Notification of Grant Award No. OEG-0-73-3549 (314) in the amount of \$5,000 has been received from the Department of Nealth, Education and Welfare, for materials to improve the library for the period from June 30, 1973, through June 30, 1974, under the libration of Mr. Fred Manes, Dean of University Libraries. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.
