SECTION I

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in Room C of the Hulman Civic University Center on the Terre Haute Campus. Trustees present: Mr. Ainlay, Mr. Brames, Mr. Breeden, Mrs. Fouty, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. Winchell, Mr. Schmelzer, Dr. Siebenmorgen, and Mr. Woll. President Landini, President Rice, Vice Presidents Moulton and Clokey and Dr. Hardaway were present. Also attending were Dr. T. Bakerman, Chairperson of the Faculty Senate on the Terre Haute Campus and Dr. Mussard, Chairperson of the Faculty Council on the Evansville Campus.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Ainlay called the meeting to order at 10:20 A.M.

ORGANIZATION OF THE BOARD, 1980-81

Mr. Ainlay indicated that the annual July meeting was the organizational meeting and the first order of business was the election of officers for the 1980-81 fiscal year. A committee consisting of Mr. Winchell, Chairperson, Mr. Brames and Mr. Schmelzer had been named to recommend the nominees.

Mr. Winchell reported that the Nominating Committee appointed by the President at the June, 1980, meeting of the Board unanimously nominated the following slate of candidates for offices of the Board:

There being no other nominations, on a motion by Mrs. Fouty, seconded by Mr. Schmelzer, the officers were unanimously elected.

Mr. Ainlay stated that he would hope that 1980-81 will be one of our very best years. He thanked everyone for their cooperation and for the support he had received over the past year. He hopes that we will excel in the activities that we undertake and continue to improve in all facets of the University.

At this time, President Landini called a brief recess in order to provide time for photographs to be taken of the newly elected officers.

B. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING OF JUNE 24, 1980

On a motion by Dr. Siebenmorgen, seconded by Mr. Brames, the minutes of June 24, 1980, were approved.

C. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

President Landini announced the date of the next meeting will be August 29, 1980, in Indianapolis, Indiana.

The University is host to a number of Summer Music Workshops which are held from June 15 through August 16 for junior and senior high school students. The workshops include orchestra, concert band, piano, swing choir and music theatre.

Indiana Special Olympics

On June 26-28 the University was host to the Indiana Special Olympics. The Institution is very proud of its association with the Special Olympics and of the fact that the State Headquarters Office is housed on the campus of ISU. The President remarked that Eunice Kennedy Shriver, President of the Kennedy Foundation, was again in attendance and wanted him to convey her greetings and great appreciation to the University for its work with the Special Olympics.

School Administration Conference

Dr. Arthur Foshay, distinguished Professor Emeritus of Columbia University, was the keynote speaker on June 27 for the annual conference in school administration which was held on the ISU campus.

Summer School

The first summer term for 1980 will end Friday, July 11 and second summer, 1980 registration will begin July 14. The second summer term enrollment is expected to be slightly higher than the 1979 second summer term if present predictions hold.

Agenda Item

A major item of this agenda is the capital budget requests for 1981-83. The expansion of the HPER facilities is the top priority item; this project is of an academic nature rather than designed for intercollegiate athletic uses. Upon Board approval of the state budget requests the needs of the campus will be expressed to the State Budget Agency. The Commission for Higher Education meeting on Friday, July 11 will provide some opportunity to express and justify our needs.

Taft Institute

Again, the Institution will host the Taft Institute July 13-25, which will bring high school teachers from the state, midwest, and nation to the campus for seminars and colloquiums in the operation of city, county and state government. Governor Otis Bowen who has taken a very strong interest in this program will be on campus for the event. A special ceremony is being planned by the University for the Governor in recognition of his leadership and strong support of our educational undertakings.

Status of PBS Application

The President referred to an extended discussion of the PBS Station in the General Welfare Meeting. The President reported that it is the primary interest of the University to make this a community enterprise rather than one of just the University. He feels very strongly that the University can help the people of the Wabash Valley to live more fulfilled and beneficial lives with this service.

Mr. Ainlay remarked that the Board is proud of the University's connection with the Special Olympics. As he was leaving for Terre Haute recently, he spoke with a family from his hometown of Goshen, Indiana, and they expressed their gratitude for this event and

a. Medical Education Center Budget, 1980-81 - 2190

The following is the detail of the Medical Education Center Budget for the fiscal year 1980-81. Ratification of the budget is recommended:

b. Library Resources Grant, 1980-81 - 2326

Official Notification has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare authorizing an expenditure level of \$1,900 in the College Library Resources program for fiscal year 1980. Ratification of the award was recommended. The authorized amount will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant notification.

c. College Work Study Program - 2700

Official notification has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare authorizing an approved level of Federal expenditures in the College Work Study Program of \$78,436 during fiscal year 1980-81 at Indiana State University Evansville. Ratification of the authorization was recommended. The authorization will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the allocation notification.

d. Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant Program - 2710

Official notification has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare authorizing an approved level of Federal expenditure in the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant Program of \$58,814 during fiscal year 1980-81 at Indiana State University Evansville. Ratification of the authorization was recommended. The authorization will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the allocation notification.

e. ICHE Counseling Skills Program - 2776

Indiana State University Evansville has been offered an additional \$2,960 by the State of Indiana Commission for Higher Education. The additional funding will provide the necessary money to produce additional copies of the Community Resources Guide developed during the grant period. The initial grant budget was ratified at the September 1979 Board of Trustees meeting. Ratification of this additional funding was recommended. The additional budget will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant agreement.

f. Water Resources Contract--2782

Indiana State University Evansville has received official notification from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Institute for Water Resources for the assignment of Augustine J. Fredrich, Professor of Engineering Technology, as a Research Associate for the period June 1, 1980 to August 24, 1980. Professor Fredrich will be assigned under the provisions of the Intergovernmental Personnel Act of 1970. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will reimburse Indiana State University Evansville for the salary of \$8,678 and employee benefits as provided in the assignment agreement. Ratification of the contract was recommended. The contract amount will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the Assignment Agreement.

On a motion by Mr. Woll, seconded by Mr. Brames, the ratification was approved.

F. CANDIDATES FOR DEGREES, AUGUST 15, 1980 - TERRE HAUTE

The candidates for degrees to be conferred August 15, 1980, are presented in EXHIBIT A. It was recommended that award of the respective degrees be approved subject to completion of the requirements.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the recommendation was approved.

G. REVISED SCHEDULE OF FEES FOR 1980-81

The Board approved the Schedule of Fees for 1980-81 on April 25, 1980. It is necessary now to reallocate the fees because the improvement in market conditions may permit the sale of academic facilities construction bonds in the near future. The debt coverage for the bonds is secured by building facilities fees paid by students. Subsequently the loss of contingent fee income to the General University operating fund will be replaced by a legislative appropriation identified as fee replacement.

The bonds to be sold include an additional \$1,100,000 authorized for the ISUE Health, Physical Education and Recreation Building and \$4,725,000 authorized for the ISU School of Technology Building.

The total fees for both campuses will remain as previously approved. The Building Facilities Fee will be icnreased \$1.25 per semester hour for the Terre Haute campus and \$1.00 per semester hour for the Evansville campus. The Contingent Fee will be reduced in an amount equal to the Building Facilities Fee increase for the campus. Approval of the Schedule of Fees presented in EXHIBIT B was recommended.

Mr. Ainlay remarked that he understands this to be only a reallocation of the fees and asked Mr. Moulton to explain.

Mr. Moulton stated that it does not raise the fees as approved by the Board on April 25, 1980, but simply realigns them. At that time we were not ready to finalize what the needs He feels the bond market in three months will be such that they can be sold would be. again and the revised fee schedule will enable us to meet our obligations.

On a motion by Mr. Breeden, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the recommendation was approved.

H. TECHNOLOGY REMODELING

In accordance with the advertisement for bids published in the TERRE HAUTE STAR and the TERRE HAUTE TRIBUNE on June 23 and 30, 1980, bids for the remodeling of the Technology Building and the Business Building will be received until 2:00 P.M., July 22, 1980, after which time the bids will be publicly opened and read.

It was recommended that a committee composed of President Landini, Mrs. Fouty, Mr. Schmelzer Dr. Siebenmorgen and Mr. Moulton be authorized to award contracts for the remodeling work if satisfactory bids are received.

On a motion by Mr. Breeden, seconded by Mr. Brames, the recommendation was approved.

I. TIAA GROUP DISABILITY INSURANCE

The University disability insurance program with Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association of America is subject to renewal effective July 1, 1980. This coverage provides income benefits and TIAA-CREF retirement contribution continuation (Annuity Premium Benefit) in the event of a long term total disability.

The "Annuity Premium Benefit" in the present policy stipulates contributions based on the current Social Security base salary. The TIAA-CREF Revised Retirement Plan total contribution schedule is 11% of \$10,800 plus 15% of the base salary in excess of \$10,800. The new "Annuity Premium Benefit" rate reflects a change to the same contribution level as the present University TIAA-CREF Revised Retirement Plan. Present and proposed monthly premium

Renewal of the disability insurance master policy effective July 1, 1980 was recommended. The University pays the entire premium cost of the program for eligible professional staff

On a motion by Dr. Siebenmorgen, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommendation was approved.

J. LEGISLATIVE CAPITAL REQUEST, 1981-83

The 1981-83 legislative capital request is to be submitted to the Commission for Higher Education and the State Budget Agency on August 1, 1980.

On a motion by Mr. Schmelzer, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommendation was approved.

K. PROPOSAL FOR AIR FORCE R.O.T.C. PROGRAM

The Department of Aerospace Technology has submitted a proposal whereby an Air Force R.O.T.C. Program would be established at Indiana State. The program would involve three distinct phases, the first of which would be the development of a "Crosstown Agreement" with the Air Force Program at Indiana University. The second phase would involve the establishment of an Operating Location at ISU, and the final step would result in the creation of a Department of Air Force R.O.T.C. at ISU. A description of the proposed Air Force R.O.T.C. is presented in EXHIBIT D. The proposal was approved by the Curriculum and Academic Affairs Committee on May 7, 1980; by the Executive Committee on June 16, 1980 and by the Faculty Senate on July 1, 1980. It has the support of the School of Technology and the Vice President for Academic Affairs. Approval of the proposed Air Force R.O.T.C. was recommended.

Dr. Lawson remarked that the School of Technology had been considering this program for some time. He is very enthusiastic about it and it is supported by the students. It is for all students on campus and not just Technology majors.

Mr. Woll stated that he feels it is a common occurrence that R.O.T.C. programs have been closing down around different parts of the country and wondered what effect such a program would have on this campus.

President Landini stated he had served on a campus with two such programs and that although interest did wane at one time it renewed with growing interest of aerospace students not only in the military but also in the job opportunities offered in this field. It seems on balance a worth while program and gives the University a chance to be involved with a "Crosstown Agreement" with I.U.

Mr. Winchell stated he personally feels very gratified by this program, that it has national fiber and national posture and hopes it will be a very rewarding program.

Mrs. Fouty concurred with Mr. Winchell and said she feels it is very patriotic and is most supportive of the program.

Mr. Buckingham of the Aerospace Department stated he appreciated the attention given this program by the Board. He said the program will initially require the first year students to travel to Bloomington but that it is expected the Operating-Location staffing will be sent here after the first year and that ultimately a detachment will be placed on the ISU campus.

On a motion by Mr. Breeden, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the recommendation was approved.

1. College Work-Study Program Grant - Fund No. 270

Official Notice of Funding dated May 30, 1980, has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in the amount of \$360,000.00 for the College Work-Study Program for the period from July 1, 1980 through June 30, 1981. Matching funds will be provided by the various departmental budgets. It was recommended that the total authorization be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the award letter.

- 2. Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants Program Fund No. 293
 - Official Notice of Funding dated May 30, 1980, has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in the total amount of \$136,349.00 consisting of \$66,141.00 for initial year awards and \$70,208.00 for continuing awards for the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants Program for the period from July 1, 1980 through June 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total authorization be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the award letter.
- 3. National Direct Student Loan Program Fund No. 519

Official Notice of Funding dated May 30, 1980, has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in the amount of \$336,164.00 for National Direct Student Loans to be matched with Current Operating Funds in the amount of \$37,351.56 for the period from July 1, 1980 through June 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total amount be made available for loans and that the matching funds be transferred in accordance with the terms of the loan agreement.

- 4. Vocational-Technical Trade & Industrial Education Summer Workshop Grant Fund No. 2651
 - Letter Award dated June 23, 1980, Project No. 159-80-III-5, has been received from the State Board of Vocational Technical Education in the amount of \$6,240.00 to support in-service workshops in the trade and industry area under the direction of Dr. Lowell Anderson, Chairman of the Department of Industrial Technology Education during the summer of 1980. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.
- 5. National Library of Medicine Medical Library Resource Improvement Grant Fund No. 2653

Grant No. 1 GO7 LM03595-01 BLR has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Public Health Service, in the amount of \$20,225.00 to support the Medical Library Resource Improvement Grant Consortium under the direction of Dr. Earl Tannenbaum, Cunningham Memorial Library, for the period from July 1, 1980 through June 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

6. Indiana Department of Public Instruction Leadership Training Grant - Fund No. 2549

Check No. 4034814 has been received from the Indiana Department of Public Instruction for Project No. 16-180 in the amount of \$4,000.00 to support a music educators leadership workshop to be held July 7-11, 1980, under the direction of Dr. Eleanor Meurer, Assistant Professor of Music. In-service training programs and follow-up seminars will be conducted during 1980-81. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

7. Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program - Fund No. 2185

Official Authorization Letter dated July 1, 1980, Document No. P 008101534, has been received from the Department of Education in the amount of \$1,615,590.00 for grants awarded under the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program for the period from July 1, 1980 through June 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

On a motion by Mr. Woll, seconded by Mrs. Fouty, the ratification was approved.

M. AGREEMENT

It was recommended that an agreement whereby Lafayette Home Hospital, Inc., shall provide Indiana State University Department of Health and Safety students with clinical laboratory experience as set out in EXHIBIT E be approved. The agreement has been reviewed by University Counsel, and suggestions made have been incorporated in the document.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommendation was approved.

MULTI-PURPOSE ADDITION TO THE HEALTH, PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND RECREATION BUILDING

The School of HPER is a multi-faceted academic unit with many diverse responsibilities. Consisting of four departments -- Health and Safety, Physical Education for Women, Physical Education for Men, and Recreation -- a total of eight undergraduate and four master's degree areas of study are offered. Minor programs are available in each of the major areas.

All of the departments offer service courses in partial satisfaction of the General Education requirements of the University. Each student of the University is required to enroll satisfactorily requirements.

In addition to major, minor and General Education programs the School administers a comprehensive University-wide recreational and intramural program. Elements of the program include organized competitive activities for men and women. Non-competitive recreational activity programs are supervised during periods of time when the activity areas are not used for instruction and competition. Activity areas are utilized from 7 A.M. to midnight during the academic year.

The additional building needs, as proposed by the School of HPER, are as follows:

For instruction of gymnastics, personal defense, martial arts, modern dance, folk, square and social dance.

For undergraduate and graduate courses in athletic training and sports medicine; service all physical education courses, intramural and recreational activities.

1,400 Physiology and Movement Study Laboratory

For instruction in Physiology of Exercise, Motor Learning, Bio-Mechanics and Adapted Physical Education. Physical fitness analysis, cardiac rehabilitation and research work in each area.

REHABILITATION OF FAIRBANKS BUILDING

The Fairbanks Building was completed in 1904 as a public library. It is a masonry building, brick back-up and limestone and sandstone veneer. The interior is a large open space. The mechanical and electrical systems are old and outdated.

The former library is uniquely adaptable to the studio requirements of fine art without major interior change. The large windows and high ceilings are appropriate to the intended use.

Structurally the building is in remarkably good condition evidencing no signs of cracking or settlement. New mechanical and electrical systems are required and certain interior modifications are needed. Insulating glass should be installed in the existing frames and thermal insulation added over the entire upper level ceiling. Certain modifications are required to conform to code and regulations for the handicapped. The addition of a sprinkler system may be required. The architects state that remodeling can be accomplished at notably less cost than new construction.

The building is a good example of its architectural type and exists in very nearly its original form and detail. There is a possibility of modest grants-in-aid for part of the architectural fees and construction cost. Acceptance of the structure by the National Register of Historic Places would also relieve certain building code restraints.

The completed facility will provide desirable studio space for art instruction for faculty who are presently inadequately housed.

REMODEL FINE ARTS BUILDING

There has been no major renovation work on the Fine Arts Building since its completion in 1940. The project consists of the remodeling of the basement, second and fourth floors of Fine Arts to improve the principal facilities available for music instruction. Additional air conditioning is needed for the basement and for the Art Gallery, which is located on the first floor of Fine Arts.

The proposed project will complement the music facilities remodeling work scheduled for the former School of Business Building and the Fine Arts Building in the 1980-81 fiscal year.

LIBRARY EXPANSION

This project involves expanding the University Library into the lower level of the Library Building. At the present time the lower level of the Library contains classrooms, a lounge and faculty and administrative offices. The Library will utilize this additional space with hour study area. The Archives and the Learning Resources Center, and a twenty-four (24) 4,000 square feet of the floor area. Book stacks will be located in these areas to accommodate utilize the remaining space.

The relocation of Archives, Learning Resources and Technical Services will make it possible to provide shelving on the upper levels of the Library.

This project completes the first phase of Library development in the present building. The building, which was constructed in 1970-71, was designed to hold 150,000 volumes. Currently, makes additional space a necessity. The renovation of the space in the Classroom-Administration Building, designated as the Forum, will accompany this move. Present activities located in the the Forum.

The area to be remodeled is 11,639 gross square feet.

FORUM RENOVATION

This project involves the renovation of Room 37 of the Classroom-Administration Building, commonly known as the Forum, into a two-level complex to provide faculty and staff offices and conference rooms, classrooms, and a centralized copy, printing, and publications center. The complex will be connected to the existing Administration Offices by the use of existing passageways on both the lower and upper levels.

The Forum is presently a large one floor multi-purpose room comprised of 7,200 square feet of floor area with a ceiling height of 24 feet. It forms the south of the Administration Building. Adjoining the north side of the Forum are areas now utilized as storage spaces, Nurse's Office and treatment rooms, restrooms, hallways, and the existing Copy Center. Approximately 2,200 square feet of these areas will be renovated to provide accesses to the Forum and to improve the utilization of these areas.

The renovation of the Forum will make possible the continuation of instructional and administrative activities presently located in the lower level of the Library. Further, it will make possible the consolidation of the Printing and Duplicating Services for the campus. This latter move will also provide needed space for expansion of the computer center and make available one additional laboratory for the Engineering Technology program. This will be accomplished by the move of the Print Shop to the renovated space in the Forum area.

This project consists of the renovation of 15,100 square feet at an estimated cost of \$848,000 based on a bid date of December 1981 and an estimated completion date of 1982.

ART STUDIO

This project involves the construction of a one-room modular building to house an art classroom including a storage area. Classes scheduled for the building include painting, drawing and printmaking. The building's gross square footage will be approximatley 2,000 square feet and of similar design and structure as the existing Art Studio II Building.

This building will make available instructional space to replace that previously located in the Engineering Technology Building, which space is to be converted to a laboratory for the Mining Engineering Technology program. Existing classrooms do not provide the lighting, instructional space, clean-up facilities, or storage area needed for art classes. It is anticipated that a new building may make it possible to move the ceramics classes from the basement of an old frame house to Studio II which is presently used as a general purpose art classroom and as a storage area for ceramics. Location of all ceramics work in one facility will provide a much improved class environment. The construction of the new building and the dedication of Studio II to ceramics will enhance the overall campus plan by locating major art activities in the same area.

Please find enclosed materials relating to a proposal originating with the Department of Aerospace Technology and approved by the School of Technology for the initiation of steps that would eventuate in the establishment of a Department of Air Force ROTC. CAAC has reviewed these materials, consulted with the Department of Aerospace Technology and with the Department of Military Science.

The Committee had difficulty defining what was requested. What is being proposed is the initiation of a three step process that would result in the development of an Air Force ROTC program at ISU. Initially, a Crosstown Agreement would be established with the Air Force program at Indiana University. Four courses would be offered under the Department of Aerospace Technology but students would travel to IU to receive the instruction. These students would receive credit on their ISU transcripts.

The next step would be establishment of an Operating location at ISU. An Air Force Officer and an non-commissioned officer would be stationed at ISU and deliver instruction on Campus. The initiation of this is contingent on the enrollment of at least 5 students in the Professional Officer Course.

The final step would be placement of a detachment and establishment of Department of Air Force ROTC at ISU. This step is contingent upon enrollment of 17 Professional Officer Course students

CAAC reviewed the proposed courses, program, and issues related to granting University credit for the course work. We took into account the current practice both at ISU and other host institutions. It voted at its meeting on May 7, 1980 to recommend initiation of the proposed steps (7-1-0).

For the present this means recommending approval of the four advanced level courses and establishment of the Crosstown agreement. It is recommended that credit be given for the courses. The entire program would be re-examined by University government when a new department is proposed.

I forward this recommendation to you for further action.

Dear Dr. Murphy:

In response to your telephonic request of 25 April for additional information regarding future plans for AFROTC at Indiana State, I would like to submit the following comments.

First, the crosstown or commuting phase of AFROTC program implementation at ISU is contingent only upon the approval of our proposed curriculum with appropriate academic credit granted, approval of an Education Services Agreement and a Crosstown Agreement between ISU and Indiana University, and student acceptance and participation. The success or failure of this phase has no bearing on successive phases.

Secondly, for the Operating Location stage, with a proposed starting date for the fall 1981 semester, we anticipate that an Air Force officer and non-commissioned officer would be assigned to Terre Haute on a permanent-change-of-station basis to provide on-campus instruction. This phase would be contingent on participation of at least five ISU students enrolled in the Professional Officer Course at the 300 or junior level, who have completed a field training activity during the summer just prior to junior year. The minimum of five students may be any mix of two or four-year program students and admittance to the Professional Officer Course is in no way dependent on previous participation in the crosstown phase. We feel that there will be no problem at all in recruiting at least five junior students at ISU.

Lastly, the full detachment phase can be reached once the institution demonstrates a sustained enrollment of at least 17 Professional Officer Course students at the 300 or junior level. The achievement of this phase is predicted on the rate of growth of the program as demonstrated by student participation.

In summary, the crosstown or beginning phase of an Air Force ROTC program depends on academic accreditation and approval of contractual arrangements for the program by ISU, IU, and the Air Force. The establishment of an Operating Location at ISU is dependent on the approval of the same program agreements required by the crosstown phase, enrollment of at least five junior students, and the availability of additional instructor personnel to fill the Operating Location positions (positive indications have been given to Detachment 215 that this is scheduled to occur in time to begin the fall semester 1981 at ISU). The achievement of full detachment status is predicted primarily on success of the Operating Location.

Hopefully, this response will answer your questions. If not, or if you have additional needs, we would be delighted to help in any way we can.

One dealing with cross-enrollments (AFROTC Regulation 11-12, page 1 in Attachment A) which has been modified to Operating-Location (OL) on the ISU campus with ISU AFROTC courses being taught by qualified AF personnel from Indiana University-Bloomington (reference: June 4, 1979 letter to Dr. Ehrle). The other set of objectives for the program is derived from correspondence from Col. Albertson's letter of June 22, 1979 (Attachment B, Appendix A) which are:

A frequency count was not maintained but enough interest was shown that prompted the faculty of the Aerospace Technology Department to investigate the possibilities of having an OL here.

Secondly, a survey of student interest was pursued. Initially, a sample pilot study was conducted within the School of Technology. Some students majoring outside the School of Technology were included in the survey. Comments ranged from "feel an AFROTC program here at ISU would be highly successful" to "not interested at all."

AT 101 Air Force Role in National Security I

l sem. hr.

This course deals with the Air Force in the contemporary world through a study of the total forces structure, strategic offensive and defensive forces, general purpose forces and aerospace support forces. Leadership Laboratory activities are included. First half of the 100 level series. May not be taken Pass/Fail.

AT 102 The Air Force Today II

l sem. hr.

The second half of the 100 series level. Course continues in dealing with the Air Force in the contemporary world through a study of the total force structure, strategic offensive and defensive forces, general purpose forces and aerospace support forces. Leadership Laboratory activities are included. May not be taken Pass/Fail.

AT 201 The Development of Air Power I

1 sem. hr.

This course includes the study of the development of Air Power from balloons and dirigibles through the peaceful employment of United States Air Power in relief missions and civic action programs in current times to the end of World War II. Analysis of the development of doctrine, strategy and technology throughout the history of air deployment. First half of the 200 level series. May not be taken Pass/Fail.

Prior to becoming an Air Force ROTC instructor each officer is required to submit a resume and academic credentials package for Hq AFROTC review. After selection these packages are submitted to each sponsoring university for examination (Indiana University in this case). At Indiana the ROTC committee which is made up of members of academic departments reviews the application and approves or disapproves the applicant. If approved, Hq AFROTC finishes the assignment process and the officer joins the faculty in July of the current year.

Hq AFROTC has four important criteria which guides its selection of individuals. First, have a Masters Degree. Third, they must have completed some form of professional military education (Squadron Officers School or higher level). Finally, the officer must possess a good record in his previous military endeavors.

Every officer currently in AFROTC instructor duty possesses a Masters Degree or higher level of education. Prior to beginning the AFROTC instructor assignment the officer must attend the five week Academic Instructor Course taught at Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama, to sharpen his teaching skills. Every two years the Hq Air Training Command Inspector General standards.

8. Additional Resources and Faculty needed

A transportation budget to allow AFROTC instructional staff to commute to ISU will be required initially until the Department of Defense determines OL transportation support allocations in a new fiscal year. The approximate cost based upon a 3-semester hour course taught here could be \$907.50 per academic year which could be offset by approximately \$110,000 brought to the University by Air Force scholarships (the present situation at Indiana University).

No other additional resources are needed except to provide a desk, chair, cabinet file space and classroom scheduling considerations. Faculty are already on the AFROTC staff at Indiana University-Bloomington, a few of whom will be assigned to teach the ISU classes here.

It has been proposed that a U.S. Air Force ROTC operating location (OL) be established at It has been proposed that a contract affecting such establishment is contained in Appendix Indiana State University. The contract affecting such establishment Indiana State University. The contract arrows required for such a program are contained in A for Dr. Ehrle's consideration. The four courses required for such a program are contained in Appendix B for the Faculty Senate's consideration.

In November, 1976, contact was made with Col. Jack Albertson, USAF, ROTC Unit Detachment 215 at Indiana University, about the possibility of starting an ROTC unit on the ISU campus. time cross-town agreements required students to travel to IU and enroll in IU AFROTC courses. It was decided at that time that such an arrangement would work a hardship upon the students to travel such a distance to attend classes weekly and increased enrollments would also strain the detachment's staffing. Since that time, the Air Force has modified the program to increase the staffing and allow the instructor to travel to a university where the students are located the staffing and allow the instructor to travel to a university where the students are located in order to conduct the classes. This would permit the establishment of an OL on the ISU campus where the ISU student could be enrolled in an ISU AFROTC course taught by an Air Force Staff Officer from Detachment 215.

There have been two meetings to answer questions and establish an information base from which this program might be included at Indiana State University. Prior to these meetings information about the program had been forwarded to President Landini, Vice-President Ehrle, and the deans in an attempt to keep them abreast of the nature and procedural developments. The result has been the documents enclosed in Appendix A & B.

At this point in time, your attention to the documents in Appendix A & B is needed to properly process the establishment of an AFROTC Operation Location at Indiana State University.

WHEREAS, University has an Undergraduate Program in Health and Safety for training of students as community health specialists, and desires the assistance of the Hospital in providing

WHEREAS, the Hospital recognizes the need for providing the community which it serves with personnel qualified as community health specialists; and is willing to assist by providing clinical experience to the students enrolled in the program; and

WHEREAS, the contracting parties are desirous of cooperating to furnish the clinical education;

THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed by and between said parties that:

- The University and the Hospital shall cooperate to provide clinical experience to students of the University enrolled in the Undergraduate Program in Health and Safety.
- The University and the Hospital shall establish a coordinated advisory committee, with

- 3. The objective of the Hospital training shall be to create an awareness in the students of the activities of a hospital Health Education Program and to have the students gain clinical experience in the activities of the Hospital Health Education Department, and exposure to general hospital procedures.
- 4. The clinical experience for students majoring in Health and Safety shall occur beginning March through June each year commencing May 19, 1980. The student shall receive clinical experience under the Hospital's Director of Health Education.
- 5. For each new group of students, the Director of Health Education of the Hospital shall conduct an orientation session, prior to the students receiving individual clinical experience
- 6. During their clinical experience, the students shall be under the direction of the Hospital's Director of Health Education, who shall be assisted by the staff of the Hospital's Health Education Department.

The Director of Health Education shall:

- a. Complete the program planning prior to the orientation of students. The program plan shall include established methods of evaluating the program content and the performance of students.
- b. Make student assignments.
- c. Be responsible for the students in fulfilling their assignments.
- d. Prepare a written evaluation of the program at the end of the semester.
- 7. The cost of teaching supplies and materials utilized in the Hospital facility for the Community Health Education Program shall be the responsibility of the Hospital.
- 8. Students participating in the program shall undergo a health examination and/or supply any health document which the Hospital may require.
- 9. Should any student become ill or sustain an injury while in the Hospital, expedient, emergency medical care shall be supplied by the Hospital.
- 10. For the purposes of the Agreement, the Director of Health Education shall be considered a member of the University's faculty or staff while conducting the services authorized by this Agreement. The appointment shall be at an appropriate class and rank, without pay or tenure.
- Staff of the University and the Hospital shall meet to evaluate the program conducted under the terms of this Agreement prior to May of each year. This Agreement shall be effective upon its execution and shall be continued indefinitely unless terminated.
- 12. Said Agreement may be amended or terminated and may be altered or terminated by either of the contracting parties by the giving of sixty (60) days prior written notice of said termination. Such amendment or termination shall not become effective with respect to students then enrolled and participating in the program at the time of the Alteration or termination.

SECTION I

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Administration Building of the Indiana Vocational Technical College in Indianapolis, Indiana. Trustees present: Mr. Ainlay, Mr. Brames, Mrs. Fouty, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. Schmelzer, Dr. Siebenmorgen, Mr. Winchell and Mr. Woll. absent: Mr. Breeden. President Landini, President Rice, Senior Vice President Moulton, and Dr. Hardaway were present. Also attending were Dr. Backes, Chairperson of the Faculty Senate on the Terre Haute Campus and Dr. Shaw, Chairperson of the Faculty Council on the Evansville Campus.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Ainlay called the meeting to order at 10:25 A.M.

A. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF MEETING OF JULY 9, 1980

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Mrs. Fouty, the minutes of the July 9, 1980, meeting were approved.

B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

President Landini announced that the date of the next meeting will be October 3, 1980, on the Evansville Campus.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Landini expressed appreciation to the Ivy Tech Administration for the privilege of using their facilities for the ISU Board of Trustees meeting. The President, Trustees, and Administrators were impressed with the Board Room and the fine surroundings. It was unique for the Board to have its meeting in Indianapolis and a good change from tradition for the meeting to be held where there are other facilities of higher education.

Symposium

The Trustees Symposium which was held on Thursday in Indianapolis was very helpful and productive and was well worth the time which was spent on organizing it. The President was productive and was well worth the time which was spent on organizing it. grateful to the Administrators for their attendance since it was an inconvenience for them

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to be off campus due to Fall registration. He also expressed gratitude to the Trustees for to be off campus due to rall registration. He days schedules and devoting this amount of their attendance and for taking time out of their busy schedules and devoting this amount of their attendance and for the University by the Board of Trustees was time to the University. The interest in the University by the Board of Trustees was time to the oniversity. The littless was expressed on Thursday at the day long Symposium. The Symposium allowed the Administrators expressed on inursuay at the day long symptotic seek confirmation of plans and development in the strengthening of the University and for the Trustees to offer their advice and counsel.

Registration

Both campuses will begin Fall classes on Tuesday, September 2, with the usual standard flourish. Registration at the Terre Haute Campus was strong with no greater or nc less problems with closed courses. The August 15 report on new student applications for the 1980 Fall semester was up 6.7% over the previous Fall new student admission applications.

Second Summer session enrollment was 3,631 a 4.7% increase over the previous summer session enrollment. There is reason to believe that the Evansville campus enrollment will hold firm. The President stated how pleased he was to see the students on campus again. remarked that the University experiences at least three rebirths each year. It is "Born Again" each Fall, with renewed hope and vigor and experiences a rebirth in January and again in the Spring.

NCAA Conference

The President has been designated by the Missouri Valley Conference presidents to represent the Conference at a national meeting of the NCAA, Division I Schools in Kansas City the end of September. The meeting should be interesting and useful as it will involve organizations and costs of athletics in Division I of the NCAA. Across the nation there is a great deal of concern in the headlines regarding the illegitimate transfer of credits and other illegal procedures being used in the Athletic Departments. ISU is not casting stones against any other institution but would like to assure the Board of Trustees that no one at this Institution has or will knowingly or intentionally take part in any such activities.

Alumni Outings

During the summer the President attended several alumni outings in Brazil, Paris, Illinois, South Bend, and Indianapolis. He reported that in each and every instance the alumni remain steadfast and loyal to the University.

Taft Institute

On July 13-25 the University was host to the Taft Institute which is funded in part by the Taft Endowment and is headed on campus by Professor Will Engelland. The featured speaker was the distinguished Governor Otis Bowen. The University is very proud of this program which is a two week period of symposiums and colloquiums of instruction in civics and local and state government for high school teachers from across the state, midwest and nation.

Public Broadcasting Station

The Public Broadcasting Station is of great interest to the faculty and staff. The Institution has received a grant of \$800,000 from federal agencies in support of the physical structure to establish such a station on campus. As attractive as that idea is and knowing the great benefit it would serve to the people of the Wabash Valley, culturally, socially and intellectually. socially and intellectually, the President reported that he cannot find the means to divert the funds necessary to proceed with the station at this time. An Advisory Committee has been established and the Office of Development and Public Affairs is working on ways to find outside means of support for this project. The prospects are neither dim nor bright. Efforts will simply have to be renewed on this project.

D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

The new HPER Building is being painted and it will be ready for dedication in October. The only piece of equipment yet to be installed is a heater for the swimming pool.

Freshman orientation was recently held on campus and it appears that new student enrollment will be slightly above that of last was

The faculty has been involved with an Interchange Program between Southern Illinois
University Edwardsville Wisconsin Portland Program between Southern Illinois
The University Edwardsville, Wisconsin Parkside, and Indiana University Southeast. The faculty is looking forward to an interesting years and Indiana University Southeast. is looking forward to an interesting year as a result of this interchange program.

On a motion by Mr. Woll, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the following ratification and recommendation was approved:

1. <u>Grants</u> - <u>Evansville Campus</u>

Ratification of the following grant was recommended:

Basic Education Opportunity Grant - 2720

Official notification has been received from the U.S. Office of Education authorizing a level of federal expenditures in the amount of \$218,960 for the Basic Education Opportunity Grant Program during fiscal year 1980-81 at Indiana State University Evansville. Ratification of the authorization was recommended. The authorization will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the notification document.

2. Laboratory Fee

It is necessary to establish a basic laboratory fee in the area of Aero-Technology.

Approval of a laboratory fee of \$6.50 for the credit course TECH 191X, Aero-Technology was recommended.

E. AGREEMENTS

It was recommended that the agreements listed below be approved. The contracts are set forth in order that the agencies cited are authorized to provide the services as stipulated in the agreements. These agreements follow the prescribed format and content as approved by University Counsel.

1. Chestnut Cooperative Preschool, Inc. - EXHIBIT A

An agreement whereby Chestnut Cooperative Preschool, Inc., makes available facilities for laboratory experiences for students in the Home Economics Department of Indiana State University.

2. Cross-Town Agreement with Indiana University and United States Air Force R.O.T.C. - EXHIBIT B

An agreement whereby the U.S. Air Force R.O.T.C. will provide instruction and training for ISU students enrolled in the A.F.R.O.T.C. with the initial program being held on the campus of Indiana University.

3. Hancock Memorial Hospital - EXHIBIT C

An agreement whereby Hancock Memorial Hospital is authorized to provide clinical laboratory practices for ISU medical technology students.

4. Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center, Inc. - EXHIBIT D

An agreement whereby Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center, Inc., will provide clinical laboratory experiences for students in the ISU School of Nursing.

On a motion by Mrs. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Brames, the recommendation was approved.

Mr. Woll asked how long the agreement with the Air Force R.O.T.C. was for and what do we expect from it.

President Landini remarked that it is to effect a relationship with the R.O.T.C. training program initially beginning on the Indiana University campus. It will expand opportunities for our students through the military, navigation, piloting and other areas of Air Force activities. Continuation of the program will depend upon future enrollments.

Mr. Woll asked whether or not after four years the students would become officers?

The President replied that if the students continue for four years they would be required to sign an agreement to continue in the military and would be commissioned as Second Lieutenants

F. POLICY ON EARLY RETIREMENT

On May 9, 1980 and June 24, 1980 the Board of Trustees approved revisions of the Retirement Policy of Indiana State University. The revisions pertained to provisions addressed to the Mandatory Retirement Age, Normal Retirement Age, Terminations for Reasons Other than Retirement and Staff Benefits Following Retirement.

Prior to the Trustees action on May 9 and June 24, considerable attention and discussion were devoted to the topic of Early Retirement. Discussion centered mainly on policy and incentives for early retirement. The administration had prepared a position paper on early retirement which was appropriately reviewed by the Faculty Economics Benefits Committee, the Executive Committee, and the Faculty Senate. On July 1, 1980, the Faculty Senate adopted a revised version of the Administration's statement on Early Retirement.

The Policy on Early Retirement adopted by the Faculty Senate agrees in principle with the provisions originally proposed by the Administration. However, the Administration's

proposed policy and the policy recommended by the Faculty Senate are not in agreement on certain features, notably the amount of severance pay. Following careful study of the Faculty Senate's recommendation, the Administration has notified the Senate of its decision to recommend to the Board the enclosed policy and provisions on early retirement.

The proposed policy on early retirement is presented in EXHIBIT E. Approval of the Policy on Early Retirement was recommended. If approved, the policy will become Section V of the University Retirement Policy approved by the Board on May 9, 1980, and the current Section V Staff Benefits Following Retirement, will become Section VI.

On a motion by Mr. Schmelzer, seconded by Mrs. Fouty, the recommendation was approved.

Mrs. Fouty stated she would like to go on record as being pleased with the early retirement policy. She also raised the question as to whether or not it was possible for a person in an earned sabbatical to ask for another one and then retire?

The President remarked that the language in the policy is such that it would be possible but such an occurrence would be very unlikely. The sabbatical leave is subject to review by the Dean, the Vice President and approval of the Board of Trustees. The award is subject to appropriateness at the time and current staffing. The President expressed his confidence in the good faith of the faculty and did not believe that this would happen.

Mrs. Fouty stated she felt that it would be very difficult for the public to understand a person receiving two consecutive sabbaticals.

Mr. Winchell asked if the Faculty Senate had approved this policy?

The President replied that a proposed document was sent to the F.E.B.C. and later it was sent through the Faculty Senate. He received a document from the Faculty Senate which was studied in detail. Although the two documents were in general agreement, there were some differences. He then informed the Senate that he was going to present this policy for approval by the Board. In a sense the Faculty Senate did not approve the policy in all specifics but it also did not reject it.

G. NAME CHANGE - BUREAU OF CONFERENCES AND SPECIAL EVENTS

 $\overline{\text{Non-Credit Program}}$ and be renamed the Office of Conferences and Non-Credit Programs. The recommendation has the support of the Dean of Academic Services and the Vice President for Academic Affairs. The new name is designed to provide a more accurate description of the functions of the Bureau.

On a motion by Mrs. Fouty, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommendation was approved.

H. REORGANIZATION AND NAME CHANGE - FORMER TRIO PROGRAMS - SPECIAL SERVICES, UPWARD BOUND, ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT & LEARNING SKILLS CENTER, FRESHMAN OPPORTUNITY PROGRAM AND TALENT SEARCH PROGRAM

It was recommended that the former Trio associate programs, Special Services, Upward Bound, Academic Enrichment and Learning Skills Center, the Freshman Opportunity Program and the Talent Search Program be reorganized and placed into Educational Opportunity Programs. The recommendation has the support of the staff, the Director, and the Vice President for Academic Affairs and is designed to coordinate and facilitate the efficiency of the various units involved.

On a motion by Mrs. Fouty, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommendation was approved.

Mr. Schmelzer asked if each of the units in this area had a separate director.

President Landini explained that these units were being grouped together and their activities would be coordinated by Dr. Draper. Each unit has a supervisor or director who will be answerable to Dr. Draper who in turn is answerable to Vice President Clokey.

I. REMODELING OF TECHNOLOGY AND BUSINESS BUILDING - INFORMATION ITEM

In accordance with the advertisement for bids published in the TERRE HAUTE STAR and the TERRE HAUTE TRIBUNE on June 23 and 30, 1980, bids for the remodeling of the Technology and Business Buildings were received until 2:00 P.M., July 22, 1980, after which time the bids were publicly opened and read. A summary of the bids received is presented in EXHIBIT F.

At the July 9, 1980, meeting of the Board a committee composed of President Landini, Mrs. Fouty, Mr. Schmelzer, Dr. Siebenmorgen and Mr. Moulton was authorized to award contracts for the remodeling work if satisfactory bids were received.

Mrs. Fouty asked which land was involved in this request.

President Landini remarked that the properties involved were located on Chestnut Street and in the Statesman Towers area, and were both surrounded by University owned property.

K. RESIDENCE HALLS ROOM DEPOSIT

A residence halls room deposit of \$20.00 has been in effect since 1956.

 $\underline{\text{It}}$ was $\underline{\text{recommended}}$ that the room deposit be increased to \$50. $\underline{\text{It}}$ was $\underline{\text{further}}$ $\underline{\text{recommended}}$ that a \$20.00 administrative charge be assessed when cancellation is received 60 days prior to registration date. Room deposits are not refundable if cancellations is received less than 60 days prior to registration date.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Mrs. Fouty, the recommendation was approved.

Mr. Moulton remarked that ISU is long overdue in raising this fee.

Mr. Schmelzer stated that he is concerned about this and the problem he sees is that the students who sign the contract in April and then over the summer decide they don't want to live in the residence halls are unable to get their deposit back. He feels there should be some type of understanding.

Mr. Moulton explained that last year there were 900 cancellations and this year there have been 1200 cancellations. With the new policy a student cancelling 60 days prior to the start of the school year would receive \$30 back and cancellations after that time would mean forfeiting the entire \$50. The students do not seem to care about \$20 but would show some concern about \$50. The school has been lenient compared with other schools.

L. ALTERATIONS TO HOLMSTEDT HALL, NEW LABORATORY FACILITIES

Letter Award dated July 22, 1980 has been received from the Terre Haute Medical Education Foundation in the amount of \$10,718.00 plus unexpended funds from last year of \$2,482.38 making the total \$13,200.38 to continue the support of the Library Information Center under the direction of Mr. Earl Tannenbaum, Director of Library Public Services, for the period from July 1, 1980 through June 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

6. City of Terre Haute Aerial Thermography Project Grant - Fund No. 2588

An Amendment to the Agreement between the City of Terre Haute, Department of Redevelopment and Indiana State University dated February 28, 1979 and March 12, 1979 in the increased amount of \$10,000.00 making the total \$35,000.00 for the first phase of a three phase program to conduct energy loss assessment for the City of Terre Haute under the direction of Dr. Walter Carnahan, Professor of Physics. It was recommended that the total increase be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the amendment.

7. Upward Bound Program Grant - Fund No. 2652

Notification of Grant Award No. G0080000780, Project No. 492AH00482, has been received from the Department of Education in the amount of \$148,002.00 to support the Upward Bound Program under the direction of Mr. Laurence A. Howell for the period from June 1, 1980 through June 30, 1981. Matching cash funds in the amount of \$12,456.00 will be contributed by the University from the Unappropriated Current Operating Fund. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated and the matching funds be transferred in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

8. Northern Kentucky University Land Use Inventory Grant - Fund No. 2655

Purchase Order No. 18253 and Check No. 32672 has been received from Northern Kentucky University in the amount of \$4,883.96 to support the professional assistance in implementing the community research grant: "A Land Use Inventory of Northern Kentucky Using Lands at Imagery", under the direction of Dr. Benjamin Moulton, Chairman of the Department of Geography and Geology, for the period from June 1, 1980 through September 1, 1980. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the purchase order.

9. <u>National Historical Publications and Records Commission Eugene V. Debs Papers Grant - Fund No. 2659</u>

Grant No. 80-107 has been received from the National Historical Publications and Records Commission in the amount of \$35,527.00 to continue to support the edition of the correspondence, writings and speeches of Eugene V. Debs under the direction of Dr. J. Robert Constantine, Professor of History, for the period from September 1, 1980 through August 31, 1981. In-kind contributions by the University will total \$45,346.00. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

10. Indiana Arts Commission Contemporary Music Festival Grant - Fund No. 2660

Grant Agreement No. 81-0061-MC-007 has been received from the Indiana Arts Commission in the amount of \$5,000.00 to support the Contemporary Music Festival under the direction of Dr. Robert L. Cowden, Chairman of the Music Department, for the period from July 1, 1980 through October 31, 1980. In-kind contributions to match the grant will be provided by the University. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the agreement.

On a motion by Mr. Woll, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the ratification was approved.

Mr. Woll asked what phase the Aerial Thermography Project Grant referred to in paragraph 6 was in

President Landini replied that it is his understanding that this study is now completed so far as the taking of pictures is concerned and the project is now ready for interpretation. The President remarked that this project was started by Professor Llewellyn who has now left the campus to go to the University of Central Florida and the project is being taken over by Professor Carnahan.

Mr. Woll stated he feels this is a very worth-while project and that the results were quite revealing.

O. EASEMENT AGREEMENT

In conjunction with the closing of the alley between the School of Technology building and its proposed addition, University officials have negotiated an agreement with Terre Haute Gas Corporation and Hulman & Company to grant a permanent easement over and across a 28 foot strip of University land lying immediately west of the Terre Haute Gas Corporation building. The easement agreement is presented in EXHIBIT J.

Approval of the easement agreement was recommended.

On a motion by Dr. Siebenmorgen, seconded by Mr. Schmelzer, the recommendation was approved.

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this 1st day of August, 1980, by and between INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY, for its CHILD DEVELOPMENT-FAMILY LIFE Section of the HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT, hereinafter referred to as the "UNIVERSITY", and the CHESTNUT COOPERATIVE PRESCHOOL, INC., an Indiana not-for-profit corporation, with its principal office in the City of Terre Haute, Indiana, hereinafter referred to as "COOPERATIVE";

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, the COOPERATIVE has agreed to make available their facilities for laboratory experiences of the students of the Home Economics Department of the UNIVERSITY.

WHEREAS, the UNIVERSITY has agreed to provide meeting and classroom space in Walden Apartments, located at the corner of Seventh and Chestnut Streets in the City of Terre Haute, Indiana, for use as a classroom and meeting room for the operation of COOPERATIVE's nursery school.

NOW, THEREFORE, FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL COVENANTS HEREIN CONTAINED, THE PARTIES HERETO AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The UNIVERSITY shall make available to COOPERATIVE during morning hours, rent free, two apartments in Walden Apartment Building, located at the corner of Seventh and Chestnut Streets in the City of Terre Haute, Indiana, consisting of approximately ten (10) rooms and two (2) baths, for use by the COOPERATIVE in the operation of its nursery school.
- 2. UNIVERSITY may use the operational facilities of the COOPERATIVE for the laboratory experiences of its students.
- 3. The assignment of students to any part of the COOPERATIVE program will be made by the Child Development-Family Life faculty of the UNIVERSITY in consultation with the Board of Directors of COOPERATIVE.
- 4. The UNIVERSITY will select and pay the salary of one (1) teacher, who will carry three-fourths (3/4) of a teaching load, which teaching load is defined as coordinator of the UNIVERSITY and COOPERATIVE relations, supervisor and teacher of the three (3) year old class and teacher of one (1) class in the Home Economics Department of UNIVERSITY. Other employed personnel will be paid by the COOPERATIVE.

The parent-nursery teacher of the four(4) year old class will be jointly selected by the UNIVERSITY and the Board of Directors of the COOPERATIVE and will be paid by the COOPERATIVE. If a qualified graduate assistant is available, a student will be assigned to the nursery school and paid by the UNIVERSITY and the COOPERATIVE.

- 5. A member of the Child Development-Family Life faculty of the UNIVERSITY will serve in a coordinating and supervising capacity for the students who observe and participate in the COOPERATIVE program.
- 6. Material and equipment for the nursery school project may be purchased by either parties involved, but it shall be the responsibility of the parent-nursery teachers of the UNIVERSITY and the equipment chairman of the COOPERATIVE to label and keep an official up-to-date listing all equipment owned and purchased by their respective employers. Copies of these inventories secretaries of the respective organizations.

- 7. The assignment of students to the parent cooperative program will take place during the academic year from September to June and during any summer program agreed upon by the parties.
- 8. The Child Development-Family Life faculty and the parent-nursery teachers of the UNIVERSITY will be responsible for the guidance and supervision of the UNIVERSITY students.
- 9. Supervision of the UNIVERSITY students' health will be the responsibility of the UNIVERSITY. The students and faculty assigned to the children's program will be required to meet the same health standards as the parents participating in the program.
- 10. COOPERATIVE agrees to indemnify and same harmless the UNIVERSITY from any and all claims and demands, actions and causes of actions, costs, expenses and compensation, including attorneys fees, which may arise in or out of the operation of the nursery school contemplated by this Agreement, and COOPERATIVE's use and/or occupancy of the premises let hereby to COOPERATIVE.

COOPERATIVE agrees that it will, at COOPERATIVE's sole expenses, carry public liability insurance on the premises and the operation of the nursery school contemplated herein in limits not less than Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) per person and/or accident with an insurance company acceptable to the UNIVERSITY, and with the UNIVERSITY named as co-insured therein. A certificate of insurance showing the UNIVERSITY as co-insured therein in the amount above stated will satisfy requirements of this paragraph.

ll. This Agreement shall continue in effect for a period of one (1) year from <u>September 1, 1980-</u> September 1, 1981, and so long thereafter until terminated by one of the parties.

Any party desiring to discontinue the operation of this Agreement shall give to the other party at least six (6) months written notice of the intent to discontinue this Agreement. Any program initiated in an academic year (September to June) during the six (6) months notification period may continue until the end of the academic year.

CROSS-TOWN AGREEMENT TO EXTEND AFROTC INSTRUCTION TO STUDENTS AT INSTITUTIONS NOT HOSTING AFROTC

This agreement is among the governing authorities of Indiana University (hereinafter known as Institution A) which hosts Air Force ROTC Detachment 215, the governing authorities of Indiana State University (hereinafter known as Institution B) which does not host an AFROTC unit, and the Commandant, Air Force ROTC. It is the purpose of this agreement to make the Air Force ROTC General Military Course and the Professional Officer Course available to qualified students of Institution B who desire to earn appointments as commissioned officers in the United States Air Force.

AGREEMENT

- 1. The Commandant, Air Force ROTC, will:
- a. Provide AFROTC instruction in the General Military Course and the Professional Officer Course to qualified and selected applicants who are students of Institution B. Air Force ROTC instruction will be provided those selected students of Institution B on the campus of Institution A.
- b. Enroll qualified students of Institution B who are selected for the General Military Course and the Professional Officer Course as members of the Air Force ROTC detachment at Institution A.
- c. Provide uniforms, in accordance with the existing contract agreement between Institution A and the Secretary of the Air Force, to Institution A for all Air Force ROTC cadets who are enrolled as members of the Air Force ROTC detachment at Institution A.
- d. Provide subsistence allowance, in accordance with existing policies, to all Air Force ROTC cadets who are enrolled as members of the Air Force ROTC detachment at Institution A.
 - e. Provide tuition and fees, in accordance with existing policies:
 - (1) To Institution A for all Air Force ROTC cadets on scholarship status who are enrolled as members of the Air Force ROTC detachment at Institution A.
 - (2) To Institution B for all Air Force ROTC cadets on scholarship status who are enrolled as members of the Air Force ROTC detachment at Institution A if a separate education service agreement exists between the Department of the Air Force and Institution B.
- The governing authorities of Institution A will:
- a. Furnish necessary uniforms and accessories to all enrolled members of the Air Force ROTC unit which it hosts.
- b. Provide adequate classroom and related administrative facilities to support the Aerospace Studies instruction of all enrolled members of its Air Force ROTC unit who receive instruction on its campus.
- c. Report estimated and actual costs of tuition and fees for each fiscal year to the AFROTC detachment at Institution A. This report will be the basis for funding obligations for each fiscal year.
- 3. The governing authorities of Instutiton B will:
- a. Include in appropriate publications announcement of the Aerospace Studies courses of Air Force ROTC available to its students.
- b. Grant appropriate academic credit applicable toward graduation for the successful completion of courses offered by the Department of Aerospace Studies at Institution B.
- C. If a separate education service agreement exists between the Department of the Air Force and Institution B, report estimated and actual costs of tuition and fees for each fiscal obligations for each fiscal year.

- 4. The governing authorities of Institutions A and B will:
- a. Negotiate a formal written agreement whereby Institution A transfers tuition and fees to Institution B for those students on scholarship status from Institution B enrolled in Air Force ROTC at Institution A; or

Concur that a separate education service agreement between the Department of the Air Force and Institution B is desired. 5. The governing authorities of Institution B affirm that: a. It is accredited to award baccalaureate degrees by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. THIS AGREEMENT, MADE AND ENTERED INTO THIS 12 day of May, 1980, by and between INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY for its Center for Medical Technology (hereinafter referred to as "UNIVERSITY") and Hancock Memorial Hospital, Greenfield, IN, a clinical affiliate (hereinafter referred to as "CLINICAL AFFILIATE").

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, THE UNIVERSITY desires to make use of the CLINICAL AFFILIATE's facilities for clinical laboratory training of students for the Center for Medical Technology of the UNIVERSITY, and

WHEREAS, the CLINICAL AFFILIATE has agreed to make its facilities available to the students and faculty of the UNIVERSITY for the desired purpose:

NOW, THEREFORE, FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL COVENANTS AND ACTS TO BE KEPT AND PERFORMED BY THE PARTIES HERETO, THE PARTIES DO HEREBY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

1. The CLINICAL AFFILIATE agrees to make its laboratory facilities available for the clinical laboratory training of students of the UNIVERSITY subject to the conditions and limitations contained herein. Other CLINICAL areas may be used for observation and participation by said students of the UNIVERSITY upon obtaining prior consent of the CLINICAL AFFILIATE.

- 2. The use of the facilities of the CLINICAL AFFILIATE will be consistent with and in conformity with all applicable rules, regulations and policies of the CLINICAL AFFILIATE.
- 3. The UNIVERSITY shall offer an approved course of study for students in a Medical Laboratory Technician program in accordance with requirements established by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences. The UNIVERSITY will ensure that all pre-clinical prerequisites are completed before the student is assigned to the CLINICAL AFFILIATE.
- 4. The arrangements for the use of said facilities of the CLINICAL AFFILIATE and the number of students to be assigned will be made jointly by representatives of the UNIVERSITY and the CLINICAL AFFILIATE.
- 5. The representatives of the UNIVERSITY shall be:
 - 1) The Director of the Medical Laboratory Technician program.
 - 2) The Education Coordinator or designated faculty member.
 - 3) The administration.
- 6. The representatives of the CLINICAL AFFILIATE shall be:
 - 1) The Clinical Director of the facility and/or the designated representatives.
 - 2) The Medical Director of the facility.
 - 3) The Administrator or a designated representative.
- 7. The specific assignments of UNIVERSITY students at the CLINICAL AFFILIATE will be planned and coordinated for the calendar year with the specific times and dates to be arranged according to the program of the students involved. Said assignments will be during an ordinary work week as established by the Director of the CLINICAL AFFILIATE and the representatives of the UNIVERSITY. A log of student hours will be maintained by the UNIVERSITY.
- 8. The CLINICAL AFFILIATE agrees to provide supervision of the students in the assigned areas. The CLINICAL AFFILIATE agrees to furnish the UNIVERSITY with a report of satisfactory or unsatisfactory progress for each student at the end of the assignment.
- 9. The UNIVERSITY representatives will coordinate the teaching and guidance of the students in the clinical facility in cooperation with the representatives of the CLINICAL AFFILIATE within the framework of the established policy of the CLINICAL AFFILIATE.
- 10. Each party to this Agreement will perform its duties and obligations hereunder at no cost to the other party.
- 11. The students assigned to the clinical facility will meet all health requirements of the UNIVERSITY. Before assignment to any clinical area, the student will complete any health preventative measures deemed necessary by the CLINICAL AFFILIATE.
- 12. The CLINICAL AFFILIATE agrees to give immediate first-aid and medical treatment for any injury sustained during the student's assigned time at the clinical facility. Injuries requiring referral for hospitalization and/or more extensive care are the responsibility of the student, and students shall be so informed.
- 13. Each student participating in the program contemplated herein will provide liability insurance coverage for malpractice with a limit of Two Hundred Thousand and no/100 (\$200,000.00) Dollars for injury or damage to any one person and a limit of Six Hundred Thousand and no/100 (\$600,000.00) Dollars for injury or damage arising from any one incident
- 14. Each party releases the other of any liability as a result of any acts of its agents, for any injury or damage sustained by it or any person in privity therewith.
- 15. While the student is on the CLINICAL AFFILIATE premises, the student will conform to all CLINICAL AFFILIATE rules, regulations, and policies.
- 16. The representatives of the UNIVERSITY and CLINICAL AFFILIATE will meet at least twice each of the curriculum.
- 17. The CLINICAL AFFILIATE will designate representatives who will have an adjunct appointment to the UNIVERSITY upon UNIVERSITY approval. The UNIVERSITY will designate representatives the CLINICAL AFFILIATE approval.

- IV. RESPONSIBILITY OF INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY (SCHOOL OF NURSING)
 - A. Function within all applicable rules, regulations, and policies of Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center, Inc.

- Assume responsibility for the teaching-guidance of the students in clinical laboratory Assume responsibility for the contract will be available to students in the clinical experiences. School of Nursing faculty will be available to students in the clinical experiences. School of Marsing lands will be made by the faculty member in areas. Clinical assignments for students will be made by the faculty member in areas. CIIIICAL assignments los solutation of Katherine Hamilton Mental Health consultation with the appropriate program director of Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center, Inc.
- C. Provide the anticipated number, the type of schedule planned, the kind of educational experiences desired, and the academic status of students at least one (1) month prior to the semester in which they are placed for clinical laboratory experiences.
- Provide to the Director of Education at Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center, Inc., the objectives for students' clinical laboratory experiences.
- E. Require each student participating in the program to provide liability insurance coverage for malpractice with a limit of two hundred thousand and no/100 (\$200,000) dollars for injury or damage to any one person and a limit of six hundred thousand and no/100 (\$600,000) dollars for injury or damage arising from any one accident.
- Provide a brief resume of each student to the program director of the selected department prior to finalizing the assignment.
- Submit a resume containing degree level and certification and/or licensing levels of each faculty assigned to supervise students.
- H. Respect confidentiality at all times, with no disclosure, oral or written, being made directly or indirectly, of any information concerning any client or consultee acquired in the functioning of programs.
- I. Neither students or faculty supervisors will use their position or status with the Katherine Hamilton Mental Center, Inc., in a manner whereby a conflict of interest might arise between Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center, Inc., and student(s) and/or faculty supervisor(s).

V. RESPONSIBILITIES OF KATHERINE HAMILTON MENTAL HEALTH CENTER, INC.

- Accept students for educational experiences in those courses for which placement has been mutually revised, planned, and arranged, whenever these arrangements do not interfere with the primary purposes, priorities and delivery of services to which the Center is obligated, as stated within its bylaws.
- B. Make available those clinical laboratory experiences agreed upon.
- C. Provide orientation to the School of Nursing faculty and students to familiarize them with clients; the Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center, Inc., philosophy, policies and procedures; the physical facilities, and such other aspects as are pertinent to the education of students and ISU School of Nursing faculty.
- D. Provide interview and conference space, as available, following mutually arranged
- E. Communicate to the School of Nursing any changes in policies, procedures, and services.
- F. Allow students and faculty supervisors to attend general staff meetings, inservice training and continued education programs, when appropriate.
- G. Make available the Center's library facilities to students and faculty for use on the

VI. MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. Confer on plans, problems, and changes related to the clinical laboratory experiences.
- B. Perform duties and obligations at no cost to the other party.
- C. Release the other party of any liability as a result of any acts of its agents, servants, employees, officers and students occurring out of the operation of this program for any injury or damage sustained by it or any person in privity therewith.

VII. AMENDMENT

This Agreement will be reviewed annually. Any revision or addition covered by this Agreement will be done in writing and agreed upon by both parties.

VIII. TERMINATION

Each party may terminate this Agreement by at least one (1) calendar year's written notice to the other party. All students enrolled in the School of Nursing program at the time that notice to terminate this Agreement is given by either party to the other shall be permitted to complete at the Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center, Inc., the clinical laboratory experiences needed for graduation subject to the terms and conditions contained herein.

V. EARLY RETIREMENT

Effective September 1, 1980, members of the regular full-time faculty and administrative staff who have been employed by the University for 15 or more consecutive years and who are age 60 or older may commence early retirement under the following conditions:

- A. Early retirement should be arranged one year in advance of the requested early retirement date.
- B. The early retirement benefit period may not start later than July 1 following age 65 and will end July 1 following the attainment of age 66.
- C. Sabbatical leaves shall be counted as years of service. Leaves of absence for other reasons shall not count as years of service; they will not constitute a break in consecutive service, however.
- D. During the final year of full-time employment immediately prior to the early retirement effective date, the faculty or administrative staff member may request a leave of absence equivalent to one semester with full pay. As mutually arranged by the staff member and the University, the leave may be used either as a one semester leave with pay or as one-half assignment for the final academic year with full pay.
- E. Based on length of University service, the early retiree shall qualify for severance pay as follows:
 - 15 years 15% of final year's full-time salary
 - 16 years 16%
 - 17 years 17%
 - 18 years 18%
 - 19 years 19%
 - 20 years 20%

21 years 21%

22 years 22%

23 years 23%

24 years 24%

25 or more years 25%

Severance payment shall be made as of June 30 of the final year of full-time service.

- F. Early retirement may begin with any fiscal year or academic year following attainment of age 60. Reduced employment may be arranged by mutual agreement of the faculty or staff member and the University administration, following the fiscal year in which the individual attains age 60, or in any subsequent year prior to the normal retirement age. The reduced employment under this policy will normally not exceed 50%. Once arranged, the percentage of time employed may be changed only by mutual agreement. A person who elects to begin early retirement more than five years prior to the normal retirement age agrees to accept full retirement no later than five (5) years after beginning early partial retirement. However, reduced employment will continue no longer than through July 1, following age 66.
- G. During the period of early retirement or reduced employment, the University will continue contributions to the TIAA-CREF annuity contracts based upon the faculty or administration member's full-time equivalent base salary and the Revised TIAA-CREF Retirement Plan contribution schedule. The University shall make no contribution to the annuities beyond the end of the fiscal year in which the individual reaches the age 66.

EASEMENT AGREEMENT made among INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES, a corporate body politic duly appointed, qualified and acting under the laws of the State of Indiana, as the Board of Trustees of Indiana State University, having offices at 217 North 6th Street, Terre Haute, Indiana 47809, hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Grantor", and TERRE HAUTE GAS CORPORATION, an Indiana corporation having its offices at 632 Cherry Street, Terre Haute, Indiana, and HULMAN & COMPANY, an Indiana corporation having offices at 900 Wabash Avenue, Terre Haute, Indiana, hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Grantees" or, individually, as a "Grantee", WITNESSETH that:

WHEREAS, the parties hereto own all of the real estate abutting upon that certain alley situated between Cherry Street and the area platted as and formerly known as Mulberry Street, heretofore vacated, said alley running from the east line of North 6th Street to the west line of North 7th Street, all in the City of Terre Haute, Indiana; and,

WHEREAS, Grantor proposes to seek the vacation by the City of Terre Haute of that portion of the above-described alley described as follows:

Beginning at the point where the south line of said alley intersects with the east line of North 6th Street, thence east 261 feet and 8 inches, more or less, to the northeast corner of the above-described real estate owned by Terre Haute Gas Corporation, thence north to the north line of said alley, thence west to the east line of North 6th Street, thence south 16 feet, more or less, to the point where the east line of said alley intersects with the east line of North 6th Street;

and,

WHEREAS, Grantees have indicated to Grantor that they will not object to such vacation if Grantor gives and grants to the Grantees the easement hereinafter given and granted by Grantor to Grantees over, upon and across lands of the Grantor; and,

WHEREAS, it is the desire and intent of all the parties hereto to lay out and establish a driveway for the mutual benefit and use in common of the parties hereto and the respective successors and assigns thereof who may hereafter be the owners of the above-described parcels of real property now owned by Terre Haute Gas Corporation, Hulman & Company and the Board of Trustees of Indiana State University, respectively, said driveway to be located as herein provided for access to the real estate of the parties hereto in lieu of and as a substitute for the access to such property presently provided by the portion of said alley the vacation of which is to be sought by Grantor.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter contained and set forth, and in consideration of the benefits and advantages to be obtained and derived by each of the parties hereto by reason of the establishment and maintenance of said driveway, said parties hereto do hereby mutually promise, covenant and agree as follows, to-wit:

1. The parties hereto do hereby agree that a driveway shall be laid out and maintained for their private and mutual use in common over and across a strip or parcel of land 28 feet in width, described as follows:

Beginning at the southwest corner of the tract of real estate owned by Terre Haute Gas Corporation, hereinabove described, and running thence north along the west line of said tract now owned by Terre Haute Gas Corporation 158 feet, more or less, to the north line of the existing alley hereinabove referred to, thence west along the north line of said alley 28 feet, thence south 158 feet, more or less, to the north line of Cherry Street, thence east 28 feet to the place of beginning, all in the City of Terre Haute, Vigo County, Indiana,

and that said driveway shall be so located that the east line thereof, except the portion thereof which is now a part of the alley to be vacated, shall coincide with the boundary line between the lands now owned by Terre Haute Gas Corporation above described and the lands of the Board of Trustees of Indiana State University, hereinabove described and referred to.

PREFACE

In accord with regulatory principles and in compliance with guidelines prepared by the State Budget Agency and the Indiana Commission for Higher Education, Indiana State University is pleased to submit its 1981-83 operating budget request in support of its campuses at Terre Haute and at Evansville.

The University's budget request is informed by the advice and counsel of faculty and staff members and academic and fiscal administrators, and it is submitted with the knowledge, approval, and endorsement of the Board of Trustees. It is an expression of the academic, financial, and physical needs of the institution, which are described in the narrative of the budget statement. The budget request includes a statement on the philosophy, aims, and goals of the University, and it attempts to justify the budget proposed for 1981-83 in terms of major objectives during the biennium.

This 1981-83 budget request is based on the University's understanding of its mission, purposes, and functions as mandated by the State of Indiana and its people. The history of the institution is punctuated by the quality of its educational and public service programs and by the range and integrity of its scholarship and research in the various fields of academic inquiry. The proposed budget is designed and calculated to strengthen the University's mission to serve the educational, cultural, and social needs of its students and the common good of the people of the State.

GENERAL STATEMENT AND OVERVIEW OF THE OPERATING BUDGET REQUEST, 1981-83

History

In January 1981, Indiana State University will celebrate the lllth anniversary of the enrollment of its first students, in January, 1870. The formal opening of the institution was the result of enabling legislation enacted by the General Assembly (Special Session) December 20, 1865. The original purpose of the then designated Indiana State Normal School was the preparation of teachers for the "common schools" of Indiana.

In the one-hundred year period between 1865 and 1965, the institution evolved through successive states of development from a Normal School to a Teachers College (1929), to a College (1961) and to a University (1965). The granting of University status to the institution by the Indiana General Assembly was official recognition of its development and of the growing public

demand for educational programs, services, and opportunities to be provided by the University.

Indiana State Normal, Eastern Division, was established in 1918, in Muncie. In 1929, the Eastern Division became Ball State Teachers College. Both institutions remained under the governance of one Board of Trustees until 1961, when Indiana State Teachers College became Indiana State College and the two institutions were placed under the governance of separate boards.

Between 1945 and 1965, the institution's academic programs were greatly expanded and newly developed, providing opportunities in teacher education, the arts and sciences, and in the fields of business, nursing, technology, allied health professions, in physical education and recreation, and in graduate study. sites include the Clinical Nursing Education Building adjoining Terre Haute Union Hospital; a leased 6-acre Driver and Traffic Safety Instructional Demonstration Center at the Vigo County Fairgrounds; a 28-acre Life Sciences research area in northern Vigo County; a 66-acre Science Research and Recreation Area in Clay County; a leased 78-acre Life Sciences Research and Field Study Area in Fontanet, Indiana; a 50-acre site for life sciences, geography and geology research in northwest Vigo County; and a 6-acre plot of original terrain north of Terre Haute known as "Little Blue Stem Prairie."

The main campus is contiguous to the north side of the downtown business district of Terre Haute and covers some 100 acres in the heart of the city. The south campus, a 15-acre site less than a mile from the main campus, is occupied by four married student apartment buildings. The east campus, leased in 1966 for 99 years, consists of 51.6 acres and includes Memorial Stadium, two miles east of the main campus. The river campus (95 acres) lies on the Wabash River northwest of the main campus.

Physical Plant and Resources

The estimated insurance replacement value of the physical plant at the main campus is \$275,287,525. The physical resources of the campus include eighteen academic buildings, Cunningham Memorial Library, eight administrative and student service buildings, twelve residence halls for single students, and four married student apartment buildings.

Located in an urban setting, the main campus of the University could expand over the last two decades only by purchasing property within the immediate area. This slow and expensive process has resulted in some costly disadvantages to the University in fulfilling its educational mission. Classrooms have been and continue to be housed in rental properties or in property originally designed for commercial and industrial activity. Out of necessity they have been used by the University for academic purposes.

Though proud of its historic relationships to the city of Terre Haute, the University has found that its urban setting does not always lend itself easily to optimum educational enterprises typically found at most universities. Considerable time, money, and effort have been devoted over the past twenty years, therefore, to the physical improvement, landscaping, and enhancement of the main campus. The learning environment has been strengthened by those endeavors.

Accreditation

Indiana State University is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools to offer bachelor's and master's degrees, the Educational Specialist degree, and the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

The physical resources of the campus include eighteen academic buildings, Cunningham Memorial Library, eight administrative and student service buildings, twelve residence halls for single students, and four married student apartment buildings.

Located in an urban setting, the main campus of the University could expand over the last two decades only by purchasing property within the immediate area. This slow and expensive process has resulted in some costly disadvantages to the University in fulfilling its educational mission. Classrooms have been and continue to be housed in rental properties or in property originally designed for commercial and industrial activity. Out of necessity they have been used by the University for academic purposes.

Though proud of its historic relationships to the city of Terre Haute, the University has found that its urban setting does not always lend itself easily to optimum educational enterprises typically found at most universities. Considerable time, money, and effort have been devoted over the past twenty years, therefore, to the physical improvement, landscaping, and enhancement of the main campus. The learning environment has been strengthened by those endeavors.

Accreditation

Indiana State University is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools to offer bachelor's and master's degrees, the Educational Specialist degree, and the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

Indiana State University is accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education to offer curricula for elementary teachers, secondary teachers, and school services personnel at the bachelor's and master's degree levels, the Educational Specialist degree, the Ph.D. degree, and, in cooperation with Indiana University, the Doctor of Education degree.

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The School of Business baccalaureate programs are accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business.

The School of Nursing is approved by the Indiana State Board of Nurses' Registration and Nursing Education; baccalaureate graduates are approved for school nursing by the Division of Teacher Education and Certification, Indiana State Department of Public Instruction. Both the associate degree and the baccalaureate degree programs are accredited by the National League for Nursing; the continuing education program is accredited as a provider by the American Nurses' Association.

The programs in the College of Arts and Sciences have received accreditation by the following organizations: American Chemical Society, Council of Medical Education of the American Medical Association, National Association of Schools of Music, American Dietetics Association, American Home Economics Association, and Foundation of Interior Design Education Research.

The speech pathology program is accredited by the American Board of Examiners in Speech Pathology and Audiology of the American Speech and Hearing Association.

Indiana State University is accredited to prepare students for certification granted by the National Athletic Trainers Association, a medically recognized organization (of people) actively involved in athletic training. The Environmental Health program is fully accredited by the National Environmental Health Association.

In the School of Technology, the industrial technology programs are accredited by the National Association of Industrial Technology. Memberships are held in the Printing Industries of America, Incorporated, the National Association of Industrial Technology, the Society of Manufacturing Engineers, and the Associated Schools of Construction.

Indiana State University holds membership in the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, the American Association of University Women, the American Council on Education, the Midwestern Association of Graduate Schools, the Council of Graduate Schools in the United States, the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, the College Entrance Examination Board, the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admission Officers, the Association of College Admission Counselors, and the National Association for Foreign Student Affairs. It is also on the approved list of the Association of American Universities.

Both graduate and undergraduate curricula for the preparation of teachers have the approval of the Indiana State Board of Education. Graduates are able

to qualify for most of the teaching and administrative certificates granted by the State Department of Public Instruction.

Trends: Student Enrollment

Between 1960 and 1970, the University's growth and development was marked by dramatic enrollment increases, by a concomitant increase in faculty and staff employment, and by the expansion of the building program--primarily in the construction of student residence halls. In 1960 the on-campus student enrollment was approximately 4,520 undergraduate and graduate students and by 1970 the enrollment had increased to approximately 13,500 students.

From 1971 through 1974, enrollments declined sharply to approximately 10,500 students. Since the fall of 1975, the enrollment of students has risen steadily. The fall 1979 enrollment was 12,056 students. The expected enrollment for the fall of 1980 is approximately 12,300 students. Enrollments are likely to stabilize during the 1981-83 biennium. It is anticipated that enrollments will settle somewhere between 11,800 and 12,300 students for the next 4 - 6 years.

Every one of the State's 92 counties is represented in the student body at Indiana State University. Approximately 75% of its resident students come from outside Vigo County. About 20% of the students come from other states and from foreign countries. Fees paid by non-resident students are more than twice those paid by resident students.

The number of new freshman students who were graduated in the top 10 percent of their high schools has increased in the last four years, from 350 in 1974 to 602 in 1979.

It is our perception that students and their parents are finding it more and more difficult to meet the increased costs of public higher education. Two out of every three (65%) of our 1979 freshman students reported that they were seriously concerned about their ability to finance their education. Approximately 38% of the University's 1979 freshman class estimated their parental income at less than \$16,000 per year. It is also significant to note that 50% of the students come from families with three or more children and that about 56% are first generation students.

A recent report prepared by the State Student Assistance Commission of Indiana reveals that 1,445 students expecting to attend Indiana State University this fall will be eligible for the Indiana Educational Grant Awards, whereas, the number of students shown for Purdue University is 1,494. Since the grant awards program is based on financial needs, the above figures suggest further evidence that a greater portion of ISU students come from families with limited economic resources.

Trends: Faculty and Staff

With the steady increase of student enrollments over the last several years, the University has directed its attention and resources toward

strengthening existing academic programs and toward the renewal and development of its facilities and resources.

The University is now five years into a new era of self-improvement and internal development, aided by student, faculty, and staff efforts to provide an educational environment that will meet and satisfy the instructional, research, and service needs of our State and its people.

The success of an institution of higher learning and the quality and integrity of its academic programs are directly proportional to the ability, competence, and dedication of its faculty and staff. Throughout its history, and most especially in the last several years, the University has made a concerted effort to strengthen the faculty and to enhance the educational environment. Teaching facilities, laboratories, equipment, and offices have been improved. Class sizes have been limited to acceptable ratios and teaching assignments have been made in accord with appropriate standards. Significant recognition of the University's efforts to improve the educational environment was noted in the spring of 1980 by a 10-year accreditation (with no restrictions) extended by the North Central Association, and in accreditation by the American Assembly of the Collegiate Schools of Business. (Approximately 10 percent of all University Schools of Business are accredited by the AACSB.)

The University's faculty and administration share a common goal of widened and improved scholarly research and academic service activities. The production of scholarship and research has increased markedly in the past five years. More support and encouragement for faculty research is necessary and desirable. Little tangible improvement can be achieved unless teaching and service assignments can be more appropriately balanced in order to accommodate research activities.

The sharp enrollment decline from 1970 (13,500) through 1974 (10,500) resulted in the reduction of the size of the faculty, including professional librarians, by some 120 positions, from approximately 820 in 1970-71 to 700 in 1974-75. Despite an enrollment increase of 1,556 students since 1974, the University has increased only slightly the total number of faculty positions. The 1980-81 budget allows for 712 positions, which includes the professional librarians and the teaching staff of the University School.

Neither the sharp decline (1970-74) nor the subsequent increase (1975-80) in enrollment was evenly spread throughout the University. Some departments and programs have been more keenly affected than others over the last ten years. In some cases the enrollment decline simply reduced excessively high student-faculty ratios to more reasonable levels; in others, high ratios were reduced to favorable levels; and in still others, favorable ratios were reduced to levels that were less than optimal.

The recent enrollment increases (1975-80) have not always occurred in the departments or disciplines which had experienced a decline in the earlier period. In certain fields the student-faculty ratio has risen sharply, therefore, to levels of serious concern. In other fields the student-faculty ratio has remained stable. Student interests and enrollments in higher education shift and change rapidly, making it difficult to anticipate and respond quickly to those changes.

The recently passed Age Discrimination Act permits all employees of the University to work until age 70. The University had required retirement at July 1 following age 66. The Federal law permits the universities to continue mandatory retirement prior to age 70 for all tenured personnel until July 1, 1982.

Retirement is another way in which the University has an opportunity to revitalize its staff through the replacement of retired employees with younger faculty and provides also the opportunity to make internal shifts of staff because of the demands of student programs.

The need to continue an even flow of retirement is especially important during a period of steady state enrollments, and even more so during a period of enrollment downturns, since such conditions may result in mandated reductions in the staff of the University.

The Board of Trustees has adopted a resolution which continues the policy that a person is eligible for normal retirement on July 1 following age 66 and makes it mandatory to retire on July 1 following age 70.

The University believes it is important to continue a retirement benefit program which will provide funds for adequate retirement at July 1 following age 66. The Board of Trustees has adopted a policy that no additional retirement contribution paid by University funds will be added to the retirement accounts of persons working beyond July 1 following age 66.

Our records indicate that between July 1, 1980 and July 1, 1987, there will be 103 faculty and administrators eligible for normal retirement.

In order to ensure a continued flow of retirement, the Board of Trustees is expected to adopt at its next meeting a resolution which provides for incentives toward retirement prior to age 66. These incentives include a special leave of absence, the possibility of reduced teaching or work assignment, severance pay, and continuation of the University share of retirement contribution until age 66. The program is expected to obtain additional benefits over and above the initial investment, but there are some initial expenses, such as severance pay, replacement for persons granted leave of absence, and continued retirement contribution, which must be met by presently available resources. These temporary additional expenses will be funded through internal reallocation, but it is expected that salary savings and reduced retirement contributions for new employees will offset the overall future cost of the program.

The University has had some success, nevertheless, in shifting faculty positions from the less needy to the needier departments and programs. The ordering and reordering of staffing priorities has always been a continuing process in the management of universities, and we see nothing in the University's immediate future that would suggest staffing issues in the 1981-83 biennium will be any different from those experienced in the immediate past two biennia.

At Indiana State University we are conscious of the character and essential meaning of a university and of its importance to our society and civilization. We are careful, therefore, to avoid reductions or expansions of faculty positions on a semester-to-semester basis or in spontaneous response to a single year's profile of student credit hours. We think it unwise to base faculty position allocations on the inconsistent trends of student course selections. In our view such actions call into question the integrity and quality of academic programs. At the same time, however, we must and will continue to effect and encourage staffing balances, efficiency, and economy, in order to ensure the vitality of the University.

In order to attract and retain qualified faculty members, it is necessary to be competitive with institutions of comparable history, size, and range of programs—in terms of salaries, benefits, and development opportunities. In recent years special efforts have been directed toward increasing salaries and expanding the fringe benefit program. Despite those efforts, Indiana State has not held its own with comparable institutions in Indiana and in neighboring states.

Trends: Academic Programs

Within the past five years, the faculty has sustained its attention to the improvement of continuing programs and has also concerned itself with the development of new and expanded programs in vocational, occupational, and professional fields. Several associate degree programs and a few new baccalaureate degree programs have been implemented. Beginning with the Fall Semester 1980, the University will initiate a new Bachelor of Science degree in Computer Technology. The graduate curriculum has remained the same during this period, with the single exception of a Master of Public Administration degree program, which was initiated in 1976.

In the development of all new programs, the faculty has followed its traditional philosophy regarding general education requirements. The University still requires fifty credit hours of general education in all baccalaureate programs, despite the national trend toward lowering such requirements and even though new state teacher certification provisions require only forty hours of general education. A twenty-five hour general education requirement obtains in the two-year associate degree programs.

One of the major purposes of the University's curriculum is to provide each student with the knowledge and experiences which will result in continuing self-development throughout his or her personal and professional life. We believe that our general education program encourages proficiency in language usage, provides an acquaintance with scientific methodology, and enhances our students' understanding of their culture and society.

Trends: Facilities and Resources

Excellence in teaching, scholarship, and public service are supported by the availability of library resources, laboratory equipment, and instructional

aids. In recent years the University has concentrated efforts to expand and upgrade the library holdings and to improve the inventory of laboratory and research equipment. Such resources are essentials to research and scholarship and to keeping pace with modern developments. The need to replace worn out or obsolete equipment continues to be a serious concern.

When the enrollment expanded rapidly, the University was permitted to finance the construction of residence halls by the sale of self-supporting revenue bonds. For many years, however, the State did not elect to provide the funding needed for classrooms and other instructional facilities. Many offices and classrooms are located, therefore, in temporary buildings or in facilities classified as totally inadequate. In recent years the University has converted four former residence halls into academic facilities, providing classrooms, laboratories, faculty offices and work space for administrative and student services.

The most recent of these developments was the conversion of Statesman Towers West into a School of Education Building and Statesman Towers East into a School of Business Building. For the first time in three decades the School of Education faculty has been united in a single facility. This consolidation has improved the programs of the School of Education. Beginning in the Fall of 1980, the School of Business will be housed in the new facility, and all programs in business will be greatly enhanced in the improved educational environment.

The conversion of both residence halls (the Towers) and the planned construction of an addition to the School of Technology Building allows for the demolition of several private dwellings and industrial buildings which were acquired by the University for classroom and instructional use during the enrollment "boom" in the sixties.

With the attainment of University status in 1965, the faculty responded to the mandate of research and service activities which are among the responsibilities universities offer in advanced, post-graduate study. Prior to 1970, however, because of rapidly increasing enrollments and a need to develop appropriate academic programs, research and service efforts assumed a relatively low profile. Within the past five years, published scholarship, research production, and public service activities have naturally evolved as significant elements in the many missions of the University. Increased support of the research and service functions of the faculty has been characteristic of recent trends, and it is anticipated that administrative support and encouragement will continue.

SUMMARY: 1981-83 INSTITUTIONAL BUDGET REQUEST

The Indiana State University Biennial Budget request proposes an appropriation increase of \$5,253,320 (14.4%) for 1981-82 and \$5,018,267 (12.0%) for 1982-83. The increases are requested to provide funding for price inflation, activity level change, quality improvement, and program change.

I. Price Inflation

The decade of the 70's was extremely trying for the University, mainly because of inflationary cost increases and the energy crisis. Price inflation generates the need for 82.25% and 97.68%, respectively, of the additional appropriations requested in the two year budget. Only a small percent of the additional funds requested, therefore, can be used directly to increase the educational quality of the University. Inflation is likely to continue to erode the quality of the institution unless and until funds appropriated for salaries and supplies and equipment are equal to the increased costs.

Our recent analysis of the University's budget from 1969-70 through 1979-80 reveals that the conversion of assets, both tangible and intangible, at Indiana State University has been in process throughout the period. The Consumer Price Index has increased by 125.7% during the 70's. We would ask consideration of the following items:

- The University's budget for capital outlay, principally equipment, was \$1,559,122 in 1969-70 and \$1,498,037 in 1979-80. Given the sizable increase in the cost of equipment, it is apparent that purchases were reduced and funds that should have been expended for capital equipment were diverted to meet other needs within the University.
- The repair and maintenance budget increased 97.6% during the period, evidencing the cost of maintaining the usage of old equipment. However, some equipment must be replaced ultimately, and funds generally have not been available for this purpose.
- 3. During the period of 1969-70 through 1979-80, the University's personal service budget grew by 70% which is considerably below the inflation rate of 125.7%. The schedule included below shows the yearly comparison of salary gain or loss for faculty compared to the Consumer Price Index. Administrative personnel have generally received a half percent less than faculty, whereas service and clerical staff have received an average of one-half percent more than that received by faculty members each year.

The above schedule shows that in recent years (1975-76 through 1979-80), University faculty and staff have been especially hard hit, since the loss to inflation totals 7.1% of the 9.9% for the period of 1969-70 through 1980-81. The total shown in the schedule above is an accumulation of annual differences, which does not reflect the compounding effect of the year-to-year loss, which substantially increases the overall loss.

A study of the mean salaries of the 15-Institution Study for 1975-76 and 1979-80 reveals that Indiana State faculty salaries continue to fall farther behind, as detailed below:

Adequate funding is needed in order for Indiana State University to compete with other universities in the employment of new faculty. If the competitive balance is not more favorably tipped toward ISU, the quality of the institution and the education of our students will suffer.

Our studies show that the salaries of our non-academic clerical and service personnel are significantly lower than the salaries paid for comparable positions employed by the State Personnel Board. Our studies reveal that at six different clerical and office positions a 31% unfavorable differential exists.

Generally the unavoidable expense items of health care and fringe benefit programs, because of the direct relationship to salaries and utilities, have increased at a rate greater than that of the overall inflation.

We are estimating the rate for unavoidable expense items to be approximately equal to the overall inflation figure during the 1981-83 biennium. The life insurance and medical insurance cost increases of 15% and 16%, respectively, will be offset by better management of energy resources. The University has made a concerted effort to conserve on energy-related items. Arrangements have been made with the Vigo County Air Pollution Control Board to effect a fuel mix which will meet sulfur dioxide emission requirements and still permit the burning of Indiana coal, which is our most inexpensive fuel.

The computer-controlled energy management system was installed recently. This should make it possible to optimize electricity usage and reduce annual costs. These efforts to conserve utilities and fuel are reflected in the comparatively low increases for these items, 4.77% in 1981-82 and 8.07% in 1982-83.

II. Activity Level Change

1. Enrollment Change

Student enrollment will remain approximately the same during the biennium. However, the table presented below indicates the movement expected in the various student programs and levels of learning. The changes will result in increased costs to the University.

III. Quality Improvement

A. Retirement

Enabling acts passed by the Indiana General Assembly in 1967 authorized the University to establish a retirement program (IC 20-12-56-2). Previously University faculty and tenured administrators were members of the State Teachers' Retirement Fund (STRF). The administrators who were not eligible for the State Teachers' Retirement Fund program and all non-academic staff were members of the Public Employees Retirement Fund (PERF).

Since 1937, the University has had a supplemental retirement program funded through the Teachers Insurance Annuity Association (TIAA) for participants in the State Teachers' Retirement Fund.

The Revised Retirement Program was initiated effective July 1, 1967, and was based on a Social Security offset principle. The participant contributed 5% of base salary and the University paid 6% of the first \$6,600 and 10% of the amount of salary which exceeded the Social Security base.

The present (1980-81) formula is as follows: the participant pays 2% and the University pays 9% of the first \$10,800 and 13% of the amount of salary exceeding \$10,800. The University has utilized internal reallocations in recent years to reduce the amount of the individuals contribution from 5% to 2%. At the present time 158 faculty and administrators are counted in the original State Teachers' Retirement Fund and Supplemental

TIAA-CREF program. We estimate that 596 faculty and administrative staff will participate in the Revised Retirement Plan in the 1980-81 fiscal year. Further estimates suggest that there will soon be some 40 to 50 members remaining in the old retirement plan, principally those persons employed in the University School.

We are requesting funds to provide for a non-contributory program at the University similar to that offered at Indiana University, Purdue University, and Indiana Vocational Technical College. The 1979-80 American Association of University Professors report shows that Indiana University, Bloomington, contributes to its faculty fringe benefits the amount of 22+% of salary base as does Indiana University-Purdue University, Indianapolis. The report also shows that only one regional campus of Indiana University is below 22%, and it is at 21+%. Purdue University, Lafayette, contributes 21+% of base salary to its faculty fringe benefits and its regional campuses are contributing 21+% and 22+%, respectively. Indiana State University presently contributes 19.96% of salary base to faculty fringe benefits, but the contribution is estimated to be 21-22%, if the \$399,706 we have requested is approved by the Legislature.

We request \$399,706 in the first year of the biennium to remove the benefit inequity which exists between staff at ISU and their counterparts at other state universities in Indiana. No additional funds for this purpose are requested in 1982-83.

B. Equipment Replacement

The funds available for equipment have been eroded to a deplorable situation during the period of the 1970's. As noted previously in this request, the budget for capital expenditures is only slightly greater in 1979-80 (\$1,598,037) than in 1969-70 (\$1,559,122). By necessity the repair and maintenance budget has been increased 97.6%, evidencing the cost of maintaining the usage of old equipment. However, some equipment must be replaced, and funds have not been available within the existing university budget for this project.

We have recently completed an inventory of all institutional equipment. We request funds needed to provide an orderly replacement of equipment used in the academic departments and classified as General/Instructional and Laboratory Equipment. Funds for the replacement of equipment in the other three categories identified in this report are not included in this section.

The most urgent need is to provide students the opportunity to learn the use of equipment they will find where they move into the job market and to provide faculty with tools for teaching as well as for research. The amounts requested are \$228,408 for 1981-82 and \$251,248 in 1982-83.

C. Faculty Renewal and Professional Enhancement

Much has been written about the steady state which higher education can anticipate will persist throughout the 1980's. Competition for students, limited budget increases in real dollars, and changing student interests are among the major concerns. However, a stable faculty presents perhaps the biggest challenge to many universities, since the devices traditionally employed to encourage faculty diversity and vitality will be diminished during the coming decade. Turnover in faculty will be substantially slower since mobility for senior faculty exists in relatively few disciplines, the average age of the faculty employed in the boom years of the 1960's is rising. Retirements will not generate many openings until the 1990's, and opportunities to employ young graduates of doctoral programs will not increase for some time. It is therefore incumbent upon the universities to offer increased opportunities and incentives for faculty to renew their skills, respond to changing student interests and adjust to new social forces affecting academic life.

Indiana State University presently has in place a number of programs for faculty renewal and professional development. The University has established over the past several years a strong sabbatical leave program; a grants and contracts office headed by the Associate Dean of Graduate School has substantially increased the assistance available to faculty seeking external research funds; a faculty research committee allocates seed money to scholars getting started on new projects; and the academic deans are allocating funds to assist faculty travel to professional conferences and to pursue research. But a substantial increase in funds for faculty renewal and professional enhancement is essential if the impact upon faculty is to be broad and continuing over the next decade. Faculty renewal must be a routine part of the academic enterprise.

The three most important projects for which additional funding is essential are: 1) an expansion of the leaves program; 2) a faculty exchange program; and 3) the creation of an office of teaching evaluation and assistance. Estimated costs for these proposals are \$100,000 for the first year of the biennium and \$200,000 for the second year.

The University awards eligible faculty with approved projects leaves of absence for one semester at full pay or for an academic year at half pay. Nearly all faculty choose the one semester leave, not only because of financial pressures, but because their departmental colleagues almost always cover their courses during their absence without replacement. An expansion of leaves for selected faculty to an academic year at full pay will almost certainly require hiring of a replacement. Three such leaves in the first year, with replacements funded at \$15,000 each, will allow faculty either to undertake more extensive research projects than otherwise planned or to pursue updating of knowledge or skills appropriate to changing curricula, new student interests or evolving trends in the disciplines. Two illustrations of the latter are the instruction of faculty in the application of computers to such widely varied disciplines as history, physical education, management, health fields, the library,

and linguistics; and the familiarization of faculty with the new word processing devises for those increasingly used in business education and a variety of communication fields. A second year goal would be to increase the number of such leaves to eight at a cost of \$120,000. A full year of study or a paid summer leave for such study will have lasting value to faculty and students alike.

A faculty exchange program, of obvious benefit to faculty who move into a different academic environment for a month, semester or academic year, and to students who will be exposed to faculty from other universities and nations, is already appearing in many universities. ISU has been invited to participate in such a program and is seriously considering it. The costs are largely associated with housing and travel for faculty of both host and guest universities. A modest start in the first year of five faculty could probably be funded at \$4,000 each, with an increase in the second year to seven or eight faculty. An expansion of the program internationally could contribute significantly to the preparation of students to compete successfully for the increasing job opportunities working with people in other cultures.

Although teaching evaluation and assistance routinely goes on at the departmental level, the improvement of teaching would be likely to be enhanced if there could be a university-wide Teaching Evaluation and Assistance Center. Such an office could assist faculty members and departments in devising procedures for evaluating the effectiveness of teaching, in disseminating information on research regarding teaching and the effectiveness of new techniques, and in organizing workshops to promote improved teaching. The salary of a director, clerical support, and released time for faculty who lead workshops would be the main items of cost. A total cost of \$43,000 the first year and \$50,000 the second year would establish this program on a provisional basis. Expected byproducts should include programs of team teaching, personalized systems of instruction, interaction of senior and junior faculty, and the teaching of writing in courses in a wide range of disciplines. Successful centers on other campuses, some funded by the Lilly Foundation for two year periods, have demonstrated that some new techniques and approaches to teaching have surfaced, but the results often were to remind faculty of what they already knew but were not utilizing, or to encourage faculty to share what they do best with others. Ongoing evaluation of teaching is one of the desirable end products.

Each of these products has the potential to expand several times its initial dimension and cost; indeed, to have a measurable impact it would have to grow. But faculty renewal has many more facets which will draw upon university resources over the remainder of the decade, and Indiana State University will have ample reason to propose additional projects of quality improvement for state funding. International education requires the mastery of foreign languages, by faculty as well as students, an opportunity to study language must increase for those who learn abroad. Establishment of temporary foreign study centers, perhaps in cooperation with other American universities, will provide important advantages to students who work for multi-country corporations and faculty studying and

teaching abroad. The expansion of visiting scholars programs and of professional conferences will undoubtedly result from the increased costs of sending faculty elsewhere to maintain professional currency. These are examples of additional programs which are designed to enhance faculty renewal. They are not included in this proposal because we believe they do not have as high a priority as the three presented above.

Universities will have to come to accept the fact that for the next decade and beyond, the task of maintaining faculty expertise, vitality and currency in the disciplines will no longer be primarily the by-product of occupational mobility, employment of new doctorates, and the predictable retirements of senior faculty. Funds spent for faculty renewal and development projects will return to the student, the university, and the taxpayer many times over.

The funds requested to assist in increasing the quality of the staff and additional education opportunities for graduates is as follows:

1982-83 \$200,000

IV. New Programs

1. Educational Values of a Public Broadcasting Station

While primarily a service to West Central Indiana, a public television station offers Indiana State University several significant educational advantages. Students in our broadcast major will have superb opportunities to participate in preparation of local programming, working with professionals in the operation and management of the facility, and learning to use current sophisticated television technology. Students in a variety of other disciplines--most notably music, art, theatre, the humanities, political science and journalism--will benefit from involvement in the creation and performance of local programs. The University would also offer on-theair credit and non-credit instruction, now provided by arrangement with local commercial stations. By coordinating current IHETS facilities with the PBS station, the University can complement and supplement state-wide educational television with local community broadcasts. Finally, the many educational, artistic and informational programs on national public television can be more effectively utilized in on-campus classroom instruction, an opportunity which has generally been difficult, since the closest PBS outlet is more than forty miles from the University and accessible to relatively few students.

The budget for proposed PBS at ISU in the 1981-82 biennium is as follows:

Due to the unfavorable bond market, the University has not yet sold the \$4,725,000 of bonds authorized by the 1979 General Assembly for the Addition to the School of Technology. Architectural and engineering expenses have been incurred and the Project will be bid in the very near future. The University expects to sell the bonds during the 1981-83 biennium. Construction payments are being funded by interim bank financing. It is expected that the interest on the interim financing will be reimbursed from funds appropriated for the 1979-81 biennium. Based on an average annual interest cost of 7½ percent for 30 years, the average annual debt service for the bonds will be \$400,071.

The Academic Facilities Retirement of Indebtedness fund balance at 6/30/80 was \$960,899 and is projected to be the same for the fiscal years ending 6/30/81 and 6/30/82.

The Bond Indenture require that the Bond Reserve Accounts be maintained at an amount equal to the average annual principal and interest payments.

II. EXPLANATION:

The TIAA-CREF Revised Retirement Program total contributions are based on 11 percent of \$10,800 and 15 percent of appointment salary above \$10,800. The participating member contributes 2 percent of the appointment salary while the University contributes 9 percent of the first \$10,800 and 13 percent of the amount which exceeds \$10,800.

The 1980-81 base budget included \$90,840 to reduce the individual contribution to 2 percent of base appointment salary. This reduced the participants' contribution by one-half percent. A net increase of 20 new participants at a cost of \$38,160 is also included. Salary increases resulted in an unavoidable increased cost of \$179,349.

For 1981-82 a net increase of 15 new participants is requested at a cost of \$32,130; salary increases will result in an increased cost of \$178,993.

In 1982-83 salary increases will increase the request by \$174,441; a net increase of 10 new participants at a cost of \$24,000 is also requested.

II. EXPLANATION:

The group Life Insurance Program is based on appointment salary. The insurance schedule has a \$15,000 minimum and a maximum of \$75,000 with an equal amount of accidental death benefits. Coverage amounts approximate two times the individual salary. The University pays the full premium cost for the first \$15,000 of coverage and the cost in excess of \$.31 per thousand for coverage over \$15,000.

The 1980-81 base budget includes \$25,083 for increased life insurance volume resulting from salary increases. A rate adjustment of \$.02 per \$1,000 or \$3,421 is incorporated to cover loss experience and census age adjustment.

For 1981-82 the additional volume request is \$28,300 and the \$.02 per \$1,000 rate increase is \$4,020.

In 1982-83 a total increase of \$37,491 is requested which includes \$32,521 for volume increase and \$4,970 for a \$.02 per \$1,000 rate adjustment.

II. EXPLANATION:

The Medical Insurance Plan with Blue Cross-Blue Shield includes the "usual and customary" (Local County Program) schedule of benefits. The Equitable Major Medical/Dental Insurance plan has \$250,000 maximum benefits with a calendar year \$800 maximum dental benefit per person. The University pays 75 percent of the premium cost. Income protection (Long Term Disability) is provided through TIAA after six months of total disability with a \$2,500 maximum monthly benefit. The University pays the full premium cost for the disability insurance.

Current medical inflation factors, based on information received from each of the carriers, indicate an average increase of 16 percent per year.

An increase of \$210,784 is requested for 1981-82 to cover medical inflation and increased claims experience. An amount of \$244,509 is requested for 1982-83 to cover the projected 16 percent increase in premium rates.

In order to comply with Indiana Air Pollution Regulation APC 13 regarding sulfur dioxide emission the University currently burns a 50-50 mixture of low and high sulfur coal. Both types of coal are from Indiana mines. However, the cost of the low sulfur coal is \$2 to \$3 per ton more than for the high sulfur coal. By burning the mixture of low and high sulfur coal the University has been able to reduce the need for oil and maintain its compliance with sulfur dioxide emission standards.

Coal usage was down somewhat in 1979-80 because of the mild winter and because of the need for major repair to coal-fired equipment. An increased usage of coal is projected in 1981-82 and 1982-83 with a corresponding drop in oil and gas usage. Coal is the cheapest fuel source. The 8.65 percent unit cost increase in 1981-82 and 10.01 percent unit cost increase in 1982-83 reflect increased costs anticipated as a result of a new labor contract to be negotiated in the Spring of 1981 and higher transportation costs.

Oil is used principally as an emergency fuel when problems occur with coal-fired equipment or as a supplemental fuel when a need for quick capacity is required. The University has made a concerted effort to minimize oil usage. Although the University has experienced large unit price increases in the past five years, it is not expected that the rapid increases will continue and therefore only a 9.96 percent unit price increase in 1981-82 and a 10.34 percent unit price increase in 1982-83 has been projected.

II. EXPLANATION:

Public Service Indiana has submitted a request to the Indiana Public Service Commission for a rate increase ranging from 12 to 18 percent, depending on the type of customer. It is expected that this increase will go into effect during the 1980-81 fiscal year. K.W.H. usage is expected to increase during 1980-81 due to the recent occupation of Statesman Towers East by the School of Business. Electricity usage for the Statesman Towers Complex is particularly high because the buildings are equipped with window air conditioners. An approximate 1 percent annual increase in electricity usage is normally experienced due to equipment additions. It is anticipated that the recently installed computer-controlled energy management system will compensate for the normal growth rate therefore no increase in usage during the biennium is projected. The relatively small 6.06 percent unit price increase for 1981-82 and the 8.00 percent unit price increase for 1982-83 represent anticipated fuel adjustment charges.

II. EXPLANATION:

Boiler plant gas has been more available than expected because of the deregulation of natural gas prices. However, the resulting increase in gas cost has made coal the least expensive fuel to use. Gas is now used mainly as an emergency fuel during the repair of coal handling equipment. The contract with Terre Haute Gas Co. requires a minimum usage per month when gas is available. Since the University has an interruptble contract a gas curtailment during severe winter months is possible. When this occurs, oil becomes the emergency fuel. Based on supplier's estimates cost increases of 11.11 per unit in 1981-82 and 10.71 percent in 1982-83 have been projected.

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the University Center, Conference Center, Rooms 350-351, on the Evansville Campus. Trustees present: Mr. Ainlay, Mr. Brames, Mr. Breeden, Mrs. Fouty, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. Schmelzer, Mr. Winchell and Mr. Woll. Trustee absent: Dr. Siebenmorgen. President Landini, President Rice, Vice Presidents Moulton, Roberts, Truitt and Dr. Hardaway were present. Also attending were Dr. Backes, Chairperson of the Faculty Senate on the Terre Haute Campus, Dr. Shaw, Chairperson of the Faculty Council on the Evansville Campus, Mr. Harrison, President of the ISUE SGA and Ms. Wolfe, Vice President of the ISUE SGA.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Ainlay called the meeting to order at 11:10 A.M.

A. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF MEETING OF AUGUST 29, 1980

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the minutes of August 29, 1980, were approved.

B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

President Landini announced that the date of the next meeting will be November 7, 1980, on the Terre Haute Campus.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dedication of HPER Building

The President stated that it was a very happy occasion to participate in the ribbon-cutting and dedication of the new HPER Building on the Evansville Campus. It represents a milestone in the development of the campus and he remarked that it would not be the last. A principal aim of the administration and the Board of Trustees is to provide maximum opportunities in education for students in the Evansville area.

Enrollment

The final Fall Semester figures on enrollment on the two campuses total 16,734; this represents an increase of 4%, or 641 students. Enrollment on the Terre Haute Campus is 12,362, excluding the 1,121 Independent Study students, an increase of 306 students, a 2½% increase over last year. ISUE has a 7.7% increase over last year with an enrollment of

3.251. The President was very pleased to report that the Evansville Campus enrollment is the highest in the fifteen year history of the institution. The total enrollment of 16,734 the growth and progress of the interests of the people not only in Southwest Indiana and West Central Indiana but the entire State of Indiana.

Fall Semester

The faculty of the University has begun the Fall Semester with a great deal of vitality and enthusiasm. The 1979-80 academic year was very successful; the institution is healthy and we can indeed pledge to bring about another successful year.

Media Appreciation Night

On September 10 a Media Appreciation Night was held for the electronics and newspaper people of the Terre Haute area. The event was held as an expression of our gratitude for their support, coverage of our activities and the constant and favorable publicity they give to the campus.

Service Awards

The Service Awards reception and dinner was very well attended on September 18 in honor of the employees who have served the University for five or more years. The non-academic employees are very often the "unsung heroes" and on behalf of the Trustees, the President expressed greetings and gratitude to those employees who were honored with the service

Contemporary Music Festival

The annual Contemporary Music Festival was held on September 22-25, again bringing national attention to the campus. The President remarked he would like to have had more people in attendance as this activity tends to enhance and strengthen the cultural and social qualities of our lives.

Payment for City Services

The President reported that Senior Vice President Moulton's office has been studying the various aspects concerning the payment for services due the City of Terre Haute. At the November Board meeting a recommendation is expected to be presented as to what the payments to the City should be. We hope to be able to keep in line with Muncie, Bloomington, and other cities of similar size relative to our obligations for the services provided by Terre Haute.

NCAA Meeting

President Landini recently returned from a special invitational meeting of the NCAA, attended by 30 presidents, each one of whom represented a Division I conference or institution. He remarked the subjects were many and varied but most particularly important was the issue of increasing costs of Intercollegiate Athletics to all institutions due primarily to inflation. The impact and effect of Title IX to Intercollegiate Athletics designed to bring full equity to Women's Intercollegiate Athletics was also discussed. The women have not been given all the attention they deserve. Although there have been scandals in some parts of the country, the general health of intercollegiate athletics is good.

D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

President Rice reported that as many as 5,200 different students have been enrolled at one time or another but that 3,251 are actively enrolled with an additional group numbering over 1,000 enrolled in Continuing Education, non-credit programs.

He was very pleased with the appreciation breakfast and ribbon-cutting ceremonies dedicating the new HPER Building and reported that the entire campus is participating in events centered around the Fall Semester Open House.

1. EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIANS-PARAMEDICS - Information Item

Indiana State University Evansville has entered in a cooperative effort with University of Evansville, Deaconess Hospital, Welborn Baptist Hospital and St. Mary's Medical Center to incorporate the training of Emergency Medical Technicians-Paramedics personnel into regular existing Associate Degree programs. Paramedic speciality courses in the curriculum will be offered at the University of Evansville with the cooperation of the three hospitals. Those students completing the required general education - academic courses at ISUF and wishing a domain for Tourness and Tourness and Tourness at Tourness and Tourness a courses at ISUE and wishing a degree from ISUE may transfer the paramedic speciality course work from University of Fyanguillo to Catiofic account and account account and account and account and account and account and account and account account account and account account account account and account acc course work from University of Evansville to satisfy existing degree requirements.

a. Indiana University School of Medicine - EXHIBIT A

An Addendum to a memorandum agreement entered into with the Indiana University School of Medicine on July 1, 1972, and approved by the Board of Trustees on June 17, 1972, whereby paragraph two of the original agreement shall be changed as stated in the attached EXHIBIT B.

b. Deaconess Hospital, Inc. - EXHIBIT B

An agreement whereby Deaconess Hospital, Inc., is authorized to provide clinical laboratory practices for ISUE medical technology students.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Mr. Woll, the recommendation was approved.

ADMINISTRATIVE MERGER - DEPARTMENTS OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION FOR WOMEN AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION F. FOR MEN

It was recommended that the Departments of Physical Education for Women and Physical Education for Men be merged into a single Department of Physical Education, effective Fall Semester 1981. The proposal to merge the two departments has the support of the faculty of the respective departments, the Executive Committee of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, the School faculty and the Dean of the School. The proposal was approved unanimously by the University Faculty Executive Committee on July 8, 1980, and by the Faculty Senate on September 11, 1980. The proposal has the support and endorsement of the Vice President for Academic Affairs. Background information pertaining to the recommendation for the merger is presented in EXHIBIT C.

On a motion by Mrs. Fouty, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommendation was approved.

F. GRANTS - TERRE HAUTE CAMPUS

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Ratification of the following grants was recommended.

It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

2. Vocational-Technical In-Service Teacher Training Grant - Fund No. 2661

Letter Award dated August 21, 1980 has been received from the Indiana State Board of Vocational and Technical Education in the amount of \$78,300.00 under Project No. 337-80-III-5 to support the in-service teacher training program under the direction of Mr. James F. Nickell, Vocational-Technical Services Center, for the period from September 1, 1980 through August 31, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

Vocational-Technical Special Needs Personnel Training Coordination and Internship Grant Fund No. 2662

Letter Award dated August 21, 1980 has been received from the Indiana State Board of Vocational and Technical Education in the amount of \$40,500.00 under Project No. 342-80-III-5 for \$28,000.00 and Project No. 343-80-III-5 for \$12,500.00 to support the special vocational needs coordination and internship program under the direction of Dr. William Kern, Special Education Department, for the period from September 1, 1980 through August 31, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

Letter Award dated July 25, 1980 has been received from the Indiana Department of Natural Resources in the amount of \$1,500.00 to support the Wildlife Research Grant entitled

Whitaker, Jr., Professor of Life Sciences, for the period from July 1, 1980, through June 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant order.

It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the purchase order.

9. Vocational-Technical Trade and Industrial Education Workshops 1980-81, Development and Operations Grant - Fund No. 2668

Project No. 481-80-III-5 has been received from the Indiana State Board of Vocational and Technical Education in the amount of \$6,240.00 to support the in-service Trade and Industrial Education Workshops for 1980-81 under the direction of Dr. Lowell Anderson, Chairman of the Industrial Technology Education Department for the period from October 1, 1980 through September 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

10. Mursing Capitation Grant Program - Baccalaureate Degree - Fund No. 2669

Grant No. 1-E04-NU02237-02 has been received from the Department of Health and Human Services, Public Health Service, in the amount of \$21,244.00 to provide a support base for the baccalaureate degree educational programs in the School of Nursing under the direction of Dr. Maryanne Roehm, Dean of the School of Nursing, for the period from July 1, 1980 through June 30, 1982. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

11. Nursing Capitation Grant Program - Associate Degree Fund No. 2670

Grant No. 5-E04-NU02012-03 has been received from the Department of Health and Human Services, Public Health Service, in the amount of \$8,672.00 to provide a support base for the associate degree educational program in the School of Nursing under the direction of Dr. Maryanne Roehm, Dean of the School of Nursing, for the period from July 1, 1980 through June 30, 1982. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

Mr. Woll inquired as to what Item 4 of the Grants referred to in regard to the Talent Search Program.

President Landini replied that the Talent Search Program is designed to seek out young people in the rural and urban areas who have academic talents but who have not been identified as prospective college students and who have not been advised or counseled as to the advantages of attending a University.

Mr. Woll also asked about the grant in Item 5 of \$1,500 to support "The Exposure of Bobwhite Quail to Paraquat and its Effects on Various Reproductive and Histological Parameters".

President Landini replied that there is a good deal of feeling in Indiana concerning the preservation of wildlife, and much of the information derived from this study will help to

President Rice remarked that Paraquat is used by farmers as an insecticide and this study will show the effect of the paraquat on the Bobwhite Quail which may become extinct because of the poisonous elements found in their food supply.

On a motion by Mr. Woll, seconded by Mr. Schmelzer, the ratification was approved.

G. AGREEMENTS

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It was recommended that the Agreements and Addendum listed below be approved. The contracts are set forth in order that the agencies cited are authorized to provide the services as stipulated in the Agreements and Addendum. These Agreements and Addendum follow the prescribed format and content as approved by University counsel.

1. Indiana University School of Medicine - EXHIBIT D

An Addendum to a memorandum agreement entered into with the Indiana University School of Medicine on July 1, 1972 and approved by the Board of Trustees on June 17, 1972, whereby paragraph two of the original agreement shall be changed as stated in the attached EXHIBIT D.

2. Vigo County Health Department - EXHIBIT E

An agreement whereby the Vigo County Health Department shall provide Indiana State University School of Nursing students with clinical laboratory experience. The agreement conforms with the standard format of such agreements approved by the Board of Trustees on April 25, 1980.

3. Benjamin S. P. Ko, M.D. - EXHIBIT F

The University Student Health Services is in need of the services of a roetgenologist. Dr. Benjamin S. P. Ko, M.D. is qualified by profession and training to provide these services. The proposed contract between Dr. Ko and the University has been reviewed by James Sullivan, University Counsel. The agreement with Dr. Ko replaces the agreement with Dr. Hogan who is now deceased.

A copy of the proposed agreement between Indiana State University and Benjamin S. P. Ko, M.D. is provided in EXHIBIT F and approval was recommended.

4. Deaconnes Hospital, Inc., Evansville, Indiana - EXHIBIT H

An agreement whereby Deaconnes Hospital, Inc., Evansville, Indiana, is authorized to provide clinical laboratory practices for ISU medical technology students. This agreement follows the prescribed format and content as approved by University Counsel.

5. Lakeview Medical Center

It was recommended that the following statements be added to the agreement with Lakeview Medical Center approved by the Board of Trustees, February 1, 1980. Agreements with various agencies which provide clinical practices for our medical technology students are being renewed and the statements are being added upon the advice and approval of University Counsel.

Students will pay the in-state fee for courses in the amount approved by the Trustees of the University. From the amount paid to the University, the University will remit to the Hospital an amount equivalent to seventy-five per cent (75%) of the fees collected in consideration of the services provided by the Hospital hereunder.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Mr. Winchell, the recommendation was approved.

H. IN MEMORIAM

Henry G. Reifsnyder, Jr., Professor of English, died on September 22, 1980. A Resolution, EXHIBIT G, was <u>presented</u> for <u>approval</u> of the Board.

Charles W. Margason, Assistant Director of Physical Plant, died on September 16, 1980. A Resolution, EXHIBIT I, was <u>presented</u> for <u>approval</u> of the Board.

The Resolution in memory of Professor Reifsnyder was read by Mr. Brames and the Resolution in memory of Mr. Margason was read by Mr. Winchell. Both resolutions were unanimously approved by the Board.

The President remarked that he did not have the privilege of knowing Mr. Margason but has been advised by his colleagues that he was a very remarkable man and made many contributions to the University. He further stated that he felt disconsolate and diminished over the death of Professor Reifsnyder of the English Department of which the President is also a death of Professor Reifsnyder was a man of great sensitivity and that he member. He remarked that Professor Reifsnyder was a man of great sensitivity and that he frequently sought him out for advice and counsel not only in English but in everyday thinking.

I. GROUP LIFE INSURANCE PROGRAM, 1980-81

It was recommended that the present group life insurance master contract with The Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States be renewed effective October 1, 1980.

The present life insurance rate of \$.43 per \$1,000 will be increased to \$.46 per \$1,000. The accidental death premium rate will be increased from \$.03 to \$.04 per \$1,000. Increased death claims and the older census age average are major factors in this rate increase. The University will continue to pay the full cost of the first \$15,000 of life insurance and accidental death insurance coverage and \$.16 per thousand for life insurance coverage which exceeds \$15,000.

On a motion by Mr. Woll, seconded by Mr. Schmelzer, the recommendation was approved.

J. GROUP MAJOR MEDICAL/DENTAL INSURANCE

Renewal rates have been received from the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States for the group major medical/dental insurance program. Increased claims experience and medical cost inflation are reflected in the approximate 9 per cent rate increase.

Approval of the master policy renewal, effective October 1, 1980 was recommended.

SCHOOL OF MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

Deaconess Hospital, Inc. Evansville, Indiana

and Indiana State University Evansville

This is an agreement made and executed by and between Deaconess Hospital, Inc., "Hospital" and Indiana State University Evansville "University" for the purpose of training students in Medical Technology.

WHEREAS, the Hospital conducts a school of medical technology accredited by the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association in accordance with the policies and procedures established by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences (NAACLS) and

WHEREAS, the University conducts academic programs accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and

WHEREAS, the parties hereto are desirous of entering into this agreement in order to provide qualified students with an educational program which will provide training in Medical Technology and a Bachelor's degree by the University upon satisfactory completion of the prescribed courses at the University and at the Hospital.

Therefore both parties agree as follows:

I. Curriculum

- A. The Hospital agrees to furnish training in Medical Technology by providing instruction, facilities, administration and clinical opportunities for persons admitted as students from the University in the Hospital's School of Medical Technology which will fulfill all of the requirements established by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences for an accredited school of Medical Technology.
- B. The University shall offer an approved prerequisite course of study appropriate for students in a Medical Technology Program in accordance with requirements established by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences.
- C. The University will grant a minimum of 32 semester hours credit upon successful completion of the Hospital program with approximate credit allocated each segment as follows:

D. The University will grant a baccalaureate degree to eligible students who successfully complete the Medical Technology Program at the Hospital. Granting of the degree shall not be contingent upon certification of the student by the Registry of Medical Technologists of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists, according to the ASCP requirements effective December, 1972.

II. Admissions

- A. The Hospital agrees to consider for training in medical technology those students from the University who qualify according to the criteria established by the Hospital. The Hospital may also accept qualified applicants from other properly accredited colleges or universities.
- B. Minimum criteria for admission to the Deaconess Hospital School of Medical Technology include:
 - Completion of the equivalent of a minimum of 90 semester hours of academic credit in a college or university approved by a recognized regional accrediting agency. Prerequisite credit from the University must meet the requirements of the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences, and the Hospital's School of Medical Technology.
 - A student, to be qualified, shall have maintained a cumulative grade point average of not less than 2.0 (4 point system) and 2.5 in biology and chemistry courses taken.
 - 3. Each student shall file with the Hospital a complete application, a copy of his/her transcript along with a listing of courses in programs, a statement of health by a physician, two letters of recommendation from the university science faculty, and a satisfactory transcript evaluation by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences.
- C. The Hospital reserves the right to refuse admission to any student who does not meet the above criteria. Final selection of students will be determined by the Admissions Committee of the Deaconess Hospital School of Medical Technology.

III. Evaluation, Progress Reports & Dismissal

- A. The Hospital agrees to furnish the University with a final grade for each course taken by the student, and provide student progress reports upon request of the University Medical Technology Advisor. A final transcript of all grades will be sent to the University at the students completion of the Hospital's Medical Technology Program.
- B. Students must maintain a minimum grade of "C" in each course.

C. If in the opinion of the Hospital a student fails to meet the required standards of performance and competency while enrolled in the Hospital program, or violates relevant hospital policy rules the Hospital may disenroll the student. The decision to dismiss a student will be determined by the Advisory Committee of the Hospital School of Medical Technology. Before a final decision is made the student will be afforded an opportunity to have a hearing before the Advisory Committee. In all such cases the University will be notified by the Hospital, and may send a representative to meet with the student and the Advisory Committee prior to any final determination being made to dismiss a student.

IV. TUITION, FEES & EXPENSES

- A. The University may require appropriate fees for the year the student is in the clinical program of the Hospital, in the amount approved by the trustees of the University. From the amount paid to the University, the University will remit to the Hospital 75% of the fees collected for the clinical courses in consideration of the services provided by the Hospital.
- B. In event the University does not charge the student for the clinical year at the Hospital, the student will be required to pay directly to the Hospital fees in an amount comparable to the University's prevailing tuition fees for instate courses.

V. Liaison and Faculty Appointments

- A. The University shall designate a person to act as a liaison between the University and the Hospital, without remuneration, to facilitate communications and coordination of efforts between the two institutions in accomplishing mutual objectives.
- B. Representatives from the University and the Hospital shall meet at least once each year for purposes of interpreting, evaluating, coordinating and reviewing curriculum.
- C. Academic appointments (adjunct or clinical) without remuneration, to the University will be accorded by the University to the program officials and full time faculty of the Hospital's School of Medical Technology.
- D. The University Liaison appointee will have adjunct appointment without remuneration to the faculty of the Hospital's School of Medical Technology.

VI. Publications

A. The Hospital agrees to recognize the University as an affiliated institution in its publications, and the University shall make similar identification in its literature.

VII. Professional and Ethical Conduct

- A. The student performing as such; while undergoing the year of clinical training at the hospital, will not replace members of the hospital staff; nor give services in the hospital apart from that rendered for its educational value as a part of the planned hospital medical technology curriculum; and then only under competent supervision.
- B. The student will be subject to the authority, policies, and regulations of both the University and the Hospital, and appropriate ethical and professional conduct will be required of all students.
- C. Student matriculation practices and student and faculty recruitment shall be non-discriminatory with respect to race, color, creed, sex, handicaps or national origin.

VIII. Liability

- A. Students will be covered under the Hospital's basic professional liability insurance while undergoing clinical training on the Hospital premises and liability insurance coverage of students will conform to the policy of the Hospital applicable to all students at the time any liability claim arises.
- B. The University and Deaconess Hospital indemnify and save each other harmless for liability each may incur arising from the activities involved in the education and training of medical technology students pursuant to this agreement.

IX. Term of Agreement

- A. This agreement shall continue in force commencing with the clinical year of study following the date of execution of the agreement, and shall renew automatically each year thereafter unless notice of termination is given in writing by either party to the other one year in advance.
- B. All students enrolled in the program at the time of the notice to terminate this agreement shall be permitted to complete the clinical laboratory training needed for graduation subject to the terms and conditions herein.

*Membership of the HPER Faculty Executive Committee is defined in the HPER Faculty Constitution and includes one elected faculty representative from each department.

Historical Trends

The School of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation was established by the Board of Trustees in 1965. Within the School were four departments, Health and Safety, Physical Education for Women, Physical Education for Men, and Recreation.

The separation and identification of two physical education units at that time was necessary and correct. There were two distinctly different curricula with separate functions. Preparation of women majors was principally designed to prepare the most competent teacher possible. At the same time, because of secondary school demands, the curriculum for men required the preparation of a teacher/coach because of the athletic requirements of the schools. These trends in curricula continued into the early 1970's.

With the development of new teaching strategies, Title IX, and the growth of women's athletics, the faculty of the Departments began the development of a common physical education curriculum. Title IX, dictated the preparation of teachers to teach co-educational classes and the development of women's athletics created a demand for coaches of women's sports.

A common undergraduate physical education curriculum was initiated in 1978 through the joint efforts of the two faculties. This course of study has been accepted and it has provided a new dimension of opportunity for both men and women major students. Assignment of faculty to their areas of specialization without regard to departmental membership has enhanced the learning opportunities. Adjustments and changes in the curriculum have been effected with mutual understanding and cooperation. An ad hoc joint curriculum committee has been functioning since 1975.

Title IX, in its original guidelines, mandated the elimination of administrative units that were designated men or women. In reaction to that mandate, an ad hoc committee of faculty from the two departments was appointed to study the guidelines and to propose a plan for merger. This occurred in 1976. The committee met frequently during that school year and considered many alternatives. During the Spring of 1977 the HEW office published a revision of their mandate which stipulated, "that administrative structure was not discriminatory." The committee in reaction to this change submitted three plans to the faculty for consideration two of which included a merger and the third to remain as separate departments. The third plan was the choice of the faculty. (Spring 1977)

The Faculty Executive Committee of the School was charged with the task of examining the total administrative structure of the School as its major project for the 1979-1980 school year. Their diligent work resulted in the development of the proposal submitted.

Procedures:

I. A proposal to merge the Departments of Physical Education effective Fall 1981 was submitted to the faculty of the departments. Results of the vote were:

Women's Physical Education 14 for 1 opposed 1 abstention. Men's Physical Education 13 for 5 opposed.

- II. The decision of the faculty of the Departments to merge effective Fall 1981 was accepted by the HPER Executive Committee on April 23, 1980. (Vote: 4 for 0 opposed.)
- III. Preliminary discussion of a proposed administrative reorganization was held in April at a School faculty meeting.
 On May 5, 1980 the faculty of the School approved the proposed reorganization plan and it was recommended to the Dean.
 The plan includes the merger of the Physical Education Departments.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY AND VIGO COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT

- I. This Agreement is entered into as of the 1st day of September, 1980.
- II. It is understood and agreed by the parties that the purpose of the relationship established by this agreement is to facilitate the clinical laboratory experiences of students enrolled in the associate, baccalaureate, graduate and continuing education program in the School of Nursing.

III. PLAN FOR INSTRUCTION

Treasurer

- A. Placement of students to the Vigo County Health Department will be planned in accordance with the calendar of the School of Nursing by the Dean and the Nursing Supervisor at the assignment.
- B. Specific times of the placements to the Vigo County Health Department will be arranged according to the students' educational program and the available clinical laboratory
- IV. RESPONSIBILITY OF INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY (SCHOOL OF NURSING)
 - A. Function within all applicable rules, regulations, and policies of the Vigo County Health Department.
 - B. Assume responsibility for the teaching-guidance of the students in clinical laboratory experiences. School of Nursing faculty will be available to students in the clinical areas. Clinical assignments for students will be made by the faculty member in consultation with the nurses in the clinical settings.

- C. Provide the anticipated number, the type of schedule planned, the kind of educational experiences desired, and the academic status of students at least one (1) month prior to the semester in which they are placed for clinical laboratory experiences.
- D. Provide to Vigo County Health Department staff the objectives for students' clinical laboratory experiences.
- E. Require each student participating in the program to provide liability insurance coverage for malpractice with a limit of two hundred thousand and no/100 (\$200,000.00) dollars for injury or damage to any one person and a limit of six hundred thousand and no/100 (\$600,000.00) dollars for injury or damage arising from any one accident.

V. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE VIGO COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT

- A. Accept students for educational experiences in those courses for which placement has been mutually revised, planned, and arranged.
- B. Make available those clinical laboratory experiences agreed upon.
- C. Provide orientation to the School of Nursing faculty to familiarize them with clients; Health Department philosophy, policies, and procedures; the physical facilities; and such other aspects as are pertinent to the education of students.
- D. Provide conference and classroom space, as available, following mutually arranged schedules of use.
- E. Make available the Health Department library facilities to students and faculty for use on the premises.

VI. MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES:

- A. Confer on plans, problems, and changes related to the clinical laboratory experiences.
- B. Perform duties and obligations at no cost to the other party.
- C. Release the other party of any liability as a result of any acts of its agents, servants employees, officers and students occurring out of the operation of this program for any injury or damage sustained by it or any person in privity therewith.

VII. AMENDMENT

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This Agreement will be reviewed annually. Any revision or addition covered by this Agreement will be done in writing and agreed upon by both parties.

VIII. TERMINATION

Each party may terminate this Agreement by at least one (1) calendar year's written notice to the other party. All students enrolled in the School of Nursing program at the time that notice to terminate this Agreement is given by either party to the other shall be permitted to complete at the Health Department the clinical laboratory experiences needed for graduation subject to the terms and conditions contained herein.

IX. DISTRIBUTION

SERVICE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT MADE AND ENTERED INTO this first day of September, 1980, by and between BENJAMIN S. P. KO, M.D. of 681½ Wabash Avenue, Terre Haute, Indiana hereinafter referred to as "DOCTOR", and INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY hereinafter referred to as "UNIVERSITY",

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, DOCTOR has offered his services as a roentgenologist to the UNIVERSITY as such time as may be convenient to both parties, and the UNIVERSITY has extended an offer to DOCTOR for use of his services.

WHEREAS, the parties have agreed that DOCTOR will work in conjunction with the Student Health Center of the UNIVERSITY in order to provide radiology service on a fee basis.

NOW, THEREFORE, FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL COVENANT CONTAINED HEREIN, THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. DOCTOR shall provide medical service to the UNIVERSITY Student Health Center where DOCTOR shall conduct radiological studies, read X-ray films and provide such other services as may be compatible with his medical specialty.
- 2. For the services rendered, DOCTOR shall bill the UNIVERSITY at least monthly, in accordance with the fee schedule attached hereto, made a part hereof and marked Exhibit "A".
- 3. UNIVERSITY shall make available to DOCTOR the radiological equipment which DOCTOR may need to provide the services required by the UNIVERSITY, but in no event shall the UNIVERSITY be required to purchase additional equipment beyond what is now installed at the UNIVERSITY Student Health Center.
- 4. DOCTOR assumes full responsibility for his own acts, omissions, errors, or wrongdoings arising in or out of the services performed pursuant to this agreement, and DOCTOR further agrees to carry his own medical malpractice insurance in an amount of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) and shall provide UNIVERSITY with a Certificate of Insurance showing such insurance coverage; provided, however, that the UNIVERSITY shall not be an "insured" under said policy, and said DOCTOR shall not be responsible for the defense of any action against the UNIVERSITY or for any liability adjudged against said UNIVERSITY.
- 5. The parties hereby agree that this contract shall remain in effect for a period of five years from the date hereof except that, after the first anniversary date of said contract, either party shall have the unconditional right to terminate said contract by the giving of one hundred twenty days (120) prior written notice of intention to terminate. Notice shall be considered to have been given when delivered in person or when posted by registered mail, postage prepaid, and properly addressed to the party to whom said such notice is to be given.

SCHOOL OF MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

Deaconess Hospital, Inc. Evansville, Indiana

and
Indiana State University

This is an agreement made and executed by and between Deaconess Hospital, Inc., "Hospital" and Indiana State University "University" for the purpose of training students in Medical Technology.

WHEREAS, the Hospital conducts a school of medical technology accredited by the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association in accordance with the policies and procedures established by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences (NAACLS) and

WHEREAS, the University conducts academic programs accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and

WHEREAS, the parties hereto are desirous of entering into this agreement in order to provide qualified students with an educational program which will provide training in Medical Technology and a Bachelor's degree by the University upon satisfactory completion of the prescribed courses at the University and at the Hospital.

Therefore both parties agree as follows:

I. Curriculum

- A. The Hospital agrees to furnish training in Medical Technology by providing instruction, facilities, administration and clinical opportunities for persons admitted as students from the University in the Hospital's School of Medical Technology which will fulfill all of the requirements established by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences for an accredited school of Medical Technology.
- B. The University shall offer an approved prerequisite course of study appropriate for students in a Medical Technology Program in accordance with requirements established by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences.
- C. The University will grant a minimum of 32 semester hours credit upon successful completion of the Hospital program with approximate credit allocated each segment as follows:

D. The University will grant a baccalaureate degree to eligible students who successfully complete the Medical Technology Program at the Hospital. Granting of the degree shall not be contingent upon certification of the student by the Registry of Medical Technologists of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists, according to the ASCP requirements effective December, 1972.

II. Admissions

- A. The Hospital agrees to consider for training in medical technology those students from the University who qualify according to the criteria established by the Hospital. The Hospital may also accept qualified applicants from other properly accredited colleges or universities
- B. Minimum criteria for admission to the Deaconess Hospital School of Medical Technology include:

 1. Completion of the equivalent of a minimum of 90 semester hours of academic credit in college or university approved by a recognized regional accrediting agency. Prerequisite credit from the University must meet the requirements of the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences, and the Hospital's School of Medical Technology.
 - 2. A student, to be qualified, shall have maintained a cumulative grade point average of not less than 2.0 (4 point system) and 2.5 in biology and chemistry courses taken.
 - 3. Each student shall file with the Hospital a complete application, a copy of his/her transcript along with a listing of courses in progress, a statement of health by a physician, two letters of recommendation from the university science faculty and a satisfactory transcript evaluation by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences.
- C. The Hospital reserves the right to refuse admission to any student who does not meet the above criteria. Final selection of students will be determined by the Admissions Committee of the Deaconess Hospital School of Medical Technology.

III. EVALUATION, Progress Reports & Dismissal

- A. The Hospital agrees to furnish the University with a final grade for each course taken by the student, and provide student progress reports upon request of the University Medical Technology Advisor. A final transcript of all grades will be sent to the University at the students completion of the Hospital's Medical Technology Program.
- B. Students must maintain a minimum grade of "C" in each course.
- C. If in the opinion of the Hospital a student fails to meet the required standards of performance and competency while enrolled in the Hospital program, or violates relevant hospital policy rules the Hospital may disenroll the student. The decision to dismiss a student will be determined by the Advisory Committee of the Hospital School of Medical Technology. Before a final decision is made the student will be afforded an opportunity to have a hearing before the Advisory Committee. In all such cases the University will be notified by the Hospital, and may send a representative to meet with the student and the Advisory Committee prior to any final determination being made to dismiss a student.

IV. Tuition, Fees & Expenses

- A. The University may require appropriate fees for the year the student is in the clinical program of the Hospital, in the amount approved by the trustees of the University. From the amount paid to the University, the University will remit to the Hospital 75% of the fees collected for the clinical courses in consideration of the services provided by the Hospital.
- B. In event the University does not charge the student for the clinical year at the Hospital, the student will be required to pay directly to the Hospital fees in an amount, comparable to the University's prevailing tuition fees for instate courses.

V. Liaison and Faculty Appointments

- A. The University shall designate a person to act as a liaison between the University and the Hospital, without remuneration, to facilitate communications and coordination of efforts between the two institutions in accomplishing mutual objectives.
- B. Representatives from the University and the Hospital shall meet at least once each year for purposes of interpreting, evaluating, coordinating and reviewing curriculum.
- C. Academic appointments (adjunct or clinical) without remuneration, to the University will be accorded by the University to the program officials and full time faculty of the Hospital's School of Medical Technology.
- D. The University Liaison appointee will have adjunct appointment without remuneration to the faculty of the Hospital's School of Medical Technology.

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VI. Publications

A. The Hospital agrees to recognize the University as an affiliated institution in its publications, and the University shall make similar identification in its literature.

VII. Professional and Ethical Conduct

- A. The student performing as such; while undergoing the year of clinical training at the hospital, will not replace members of the hospital staff; nor give services in the hospital apart from that rendered for its educational value as a part of the planned hospital medical technology curriculum; and then only under competent supervision.
- B. The student will be subject to the authority, policies, and regulations of both the University and the Hospital, and appropriate ethical and professional conduct will be required of all students.
- C. Student matriculation practices and student and faculty recruitment shall be non-discriminate with respect to race, color, creed, sex, handicaps or national origin.

VIII. Liability

- A. Students will be covered under the Hospital's basic professional liability insurance while undergoing clinical training on the Hospital premises and liability insurance coverage of students will conform to the policy of the Hospital applicable to all students at the time any liability claim arises.
- B. The University and Deaconess Hospital indemnify and save each other harmless for liability each may incur arising from the activities involved in the education and training of medical technology students pursuant to this agreement.

IX. Term of Agreement

- A. This agreement shall continue in force commencing with the clinical year of study following the date of execution of the agreement, and shall renew automatically each year thereafter unless notice of termination is given in writing by either party to the other one year in advance.
- B. All students enrolled in the program at the time of the notice to terminate this agreement shall be permitted to complete the clinical laboratory training needed for graduation subject to the terms and conditions herein.

1. Indiana State University Alumni Association Constitution

SECTION I

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in Room C, Hulman Civic University Center on the Terre Haute Campus. Trustees present: Mr. Ainlay, Mr. Brames, Mr. Breeden, Mrs. Fouty, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. Schmelzer, Dr. Siebenmorgen, Mr. Winchell and Mr. Woll. President Landini, President Rice, Vice Presidents, Clokey, Moulton, Truitt and Roberts and Dr. Hardaway were present. Also attending were Dr. Backes, Chairperson of the Faculty Senate on the Terre Haute Campus, Dr. Shaw, Chairperson of the Faculty Council on the Evansville Campus and Miss Wolfe, Vice President of the Evansville Campus SGA.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Ainlay called the meeting to order at 10:15 A.M.

A. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF MEETING OF OCTOBER 3, 1980

On a motion by Mrs. Mitchell, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the minutes of October 3, 1980 were approved.

B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

President Landini announced that the date of the next meeting will be January 9, 1981 on the Terre Haute Campus.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The President reported there were a number of significant items in the agenda which he wished to bring to the attention of the Board of Trustees. In particular is the Doctor of Psychology Degree program which has been reviewed and analyzed by the various faculty groups on campus. It is presented with the recommendation of the President, Vice President for Academic Affairs and the University Faculty Senate.

A resolution giving official recognition to the Alumni Association and its Council is also presented with his recommendation for approval by the Board of Trustees.

A recommendation for approval of the final plans and specifications of the new Technology Building is included in the agenda.

The agenda contains a report on and gives an update of our budget requests to the State of Indiana as recommended by the Commission for Higher Education. There are severe restraints on the budgets of the State of Indiana due to high unemployment and lower industrial earning thereby reducing State income tax revenues. For these reasons and others the revenue surplustice considerably lower than normal. Concerns have been expressed by the State Budget Agency as to the availability of funds for higher education. On November 7 the Commission approved a Resolution which will present to the State Budget Agency a recommendation for appropriation increases of approximately 10% for each year of the biennium. In addition the Commission has increase of approximately 10% for each year of the biennium; the other provides for no increase an approximate 5% increase for each year of the biennium; the other provides for no increase in the first year and a 5% increase in the second year. Needless to say the first of the budget recommendations is the one the University wishes to be considered and approved by the State Legislature and we will make every appropriate attempt to persuade the legislators that such funding is in the best interest of the State of Indiana.

Built into all of the recommendations by the Commission is the necessity of a 12% student fee increase. Given the history and philosophy of higher education in Indiana, this is an unhappy turn of events.

The President commented that 12% is a rather severe increase in student fees. On the Terre Haute campus the increase will be \$120 for the year, or \$60 for each of the two semesters. If this is the eventual outcome, this amount will be added to the \$1,000 per year already paid by the students. The total amount is less than fee comparisons with some states in the nation but it is a good deal higher than desired.

The President remarked he is giving this report with some regret but if the State's economical condition and the inflationary spiral were in better condition there could be a more favorable response to the needs of higher education in Indiana.

Now the arenas for discussion on the budget have shifted to the State Legislature and to the several committees of the House and Senate.

Mr. Ainlay raised a question in regard to the budget request submitted to the Commission for Higher Education.

President Landini responded that the Commission had instructed the University to submit various priority alternatives based on our needs as we perceive them. The University submitted budget alternatives showing the use of additional appropriated funds of (a) a first 5% increment, (b) a second 5% increment and (c) an additional 3.4% increment. These are unusual presentations but these are unusual economic times in the State of Indiana. However, early predictions in the past 72 hours cite an upturn in unemployment and this might indicate an overall economic improvement.

It is not a dark and brooding future that we face but it is a future that creates the possibility that there will have to be even more belt tightening.

Mr. Moulton remarked that in some states the Universities have been asked to return appropriated monies to the state.

Mr. Ainlay concurred that the financial condition of the State was not good and expressed hope that the budgets may ultimately be improved. He further stated concerns that the Legislature does not lose sight of the order of priority for governmental expenditures with regard to the support of higher education.

Mr. Winchell indicated that he saw nothing in the capital budget report in regard to the remodeling of the Old Library.

President Landini said the projects which were recommended by the Commission were placed into three categories: Those of high priority; those worthy of consideration; and those which should not be authorized now. The HPER Building was ranked #16 of 58 and was given high priority. The request for funds for the Fine Arts Building Remodeling was also awarded high priority (#8) and Land Acquisition was placed in the "Worthy of Consideration" category. The remainder of the requests, including five items on the Evansville Campus, were rated "Should Not Be Authorized" at this time.

President Landini announced that he was unhappy to report the resignation of Bob King, Athletic Director but that he understands full well the reasons for his resignation. The institution has been well served by Bob King and he will be missed. A search will begin for his replacement with the first step being the forming of a Search Committee. It will be difficult to find a replacement with his background and diligence.

The President also regretted to announce that Dr. Donald Roberts, Vice President for Development and Public Affairs has requested that he be released from his contract. Dr. Roberts will be working with the Ohio legislature as chief assistant to the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The matter has been discussed at great length and a press release has been prepared. The President said he wished Dr. Roberts well on behalf of himself and the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Carl Parks, Director of the ISU Foundation, has also expressed his desire to leave his position and move into private enterprise after the first of the year. He has been important in the development and strengthening of this institution. It will be very difficult to find a person as qualified as Mr. Parks to fill this position.

The President remarked that he feels distressed with the resignations of Mr. King, Mr. Parks and Dr. Roberts. He commended their work and the fact that they were effective team members. In all of these cases one cannot continue to work with each without establishing personal friendships. He further stated it is with concern and loss of these people as friends that he expressed best wishes for each and everyone as they go on their way.

In the past year the campus has been visited by various accrediting teams, the most recent of which was the American Psychology Association which reviewed the Counselor Education and School Psychology Programs. In addition we are pleased with the establishment of two honorary organizations, Phi Kappa Phi and Sigma Xi, and the favorable evaluation reports of the North Central Association and the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business. These accreditations strengthen the University and give added prestige to our academic programs.

The President called upon Dr. Hardaway to report on the various campus activities which had occurred in recent weeks. Dr. Hardaway remarked that the campus has been active as usual since the last Board meeting. The principal campus function was the annual homecoming week which ended on October 11. A new attendance record was made at the football game which was won by ISU.

On October 6 President Landini and the Vice Presidents held a "State of the University" press conference for the local media representatives. Also on that date the President and Vice President Truitt held a luncheon meeting with the campus ministers.

The Indiana Commission for Higher Education met on October 9-10 in Indianapolis, and the meeting was attended by President Landini, Vice President Clokey, Senior Vice President Moulton, and Mr. Hilt.

The President addressed the Indiana Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers on October 23, 1980 in Indianapolis. On October 27, President Landini attended a meeting of the Missouri Valley Conference Presidents in Tulsa.

The annual meeting of the Indiana Conference of Higher Education, held November 6-7 in Indianapolis, was attended by the President and Vice President Clokey. President Landini was elected President of this group for the coming year.

D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

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Dr. Rice reported that the Open House held in October was enthusiastically supported and attended by a record number of persons.

The Women's Tennis team placed 7th in the IAW tennis match and the Soccer team is doing well

A team of eight University of Wisconsin Parkside faculty members will visit ISUE, I.U. Southeast Campus and Southern Illinois Edwardsville.

1. Appointment of Assistant University Counsel for Evansville

There is a need to have local counsel available for the Evansville Campus on a daily basis. Counsel for the Evansville Campus should, however, keep University Counsel apprised of developments in Evansville.

It was recommended that the law firm of Kahn, Dees, Donovan & Kahn be appointed Assistant University Counsel for Evansville, subject to the approval of the Attorney General of the State of Indiana.

2. Grants - Evansville Campus

Ratification of the following grants was recommended:

a. <u>CO-OP</u> Education Grant, 1980-81 - 2783

Official notification dated September 19, 1980 has been received from the Department of Education authorizing a federal level of support of \$42,546 for the CO-OP Education Program at Indiana State University Evansville. This appropriation is for Education Program at Indiana State University Evansville. This appropriation is the fiscal year ending August 31, 1981. Ratification of the appropriation was recommended. The appropriated amount will be allocated in accordance with the terms of the grant contract.

b. SBA Contract, 1980-81 -

Indiana State University Evansville has been offered a \$2,000 contract by the Small Business Administration for the period October 1, 1980 through September 30, 1981.

The purpose of the contract is to provide management counseling and technical assistance to small business concerns. Ratification of the contract was recommended. The contract amount will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the approved contract.

3. Fee Remission and Other Scholarships - Evansville Campus

The new awards of academic scholarships for the 1980-81 academic year and athletic scholarships for the Fall Semester, 1980 are presented in EXHIBIT E. Approval was recommended.

On a motion by Mr. Woll, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the ratification and recommendations were approved.

E. FEE REMISSION AND OTHER SCHOLARSHIPS - TERRE HAUTE CAMPUS

The new awards of academic scholarships for the 1980-81 academic year and athletic scholarships for the 1980 Fall Semester are presented in EXHIBIT A. Approval was recommended.

On a motion by Mr. Schmelzer, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommendation was approved.

F. AGREEMENTS

It was recommended that the Agreements listed below be approved. The contracts are set forth in order that the agencies cited are authorized to provide the services as stipulated in the agreements. These agreements follow the prescribed format and content as approved by University counsel.

1. Vermillion County Hospital - EXHIBIT B

An agreement whereby Vermillion County Hospital shall provide Indiana State University School of Nursing students with clinical laboratory experience. The agreement conforms with the standard format of such agreements approved by the Board of Trustees April 25, 1980.

2. St. Francis Hospital Center - EXHIBIT F

A revision of an agreement whereby St. Francis Hospital Center is authorized to provide clinical laboratory practices for ISU medical technology students (originally approved by the Board of Trustees on May 18, 1974).

On a motion by Mr. Breeden, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the recommendation was approved.

G. DOCTOR OF PSYCHOLOGY (PSY.D.) DEGREE

The Doctor of Psychology Degree program is designed to provide training in the professional applications of clinical psychology, with the primary objective of equipping graduates for the skilled delivery of clinical services. The recipients of the Psy.D. degree will be proficient practitioners qualified to treat successfully psychological problems and to approach such problems through academic inquiry and critical thinking. The emphasis in the program will be on individualized clinical supervision, combined with broad practical experience and research training oriented toward clinical applications. The program was approved by the Department of Psychology on February 22, 1980, by the Faculty Council of the College of Arts and Sciences on April 9, 1980, by the Graduate Council on June 19, 1980, by the Executive Committee of the Faculty Senate on September 16, 1980 and by the Faculty Senate on October 16, 1980 by a vote of 31-1-1. The program has the support and endorsement of the Vice President for Academic Affairs. Specifics of the Doctor of Psychology Degree program are presented in EXHIBIT C. Ultimate approval action by the Indiana Commission for Higher Education is required.

Approval of the new degree program was recommended.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Mr. Brames, the recommendation was approved.

H. RESOLUTION TO RECOGNIZE THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

Historical materials reveal that the Alumni Association at Indiana State University has existed for nearly 100 years. However, there is no evidence of any legal authority for an Alumni Association or an Alumni Council, even though our former students have given admirable service and shown dedicated loyalty to Indiana State throughout its history. In recent months the Alumni Council has considered a revision of the Alumni Association Constitution in order to provide for broader representation on the Council. During these discussions the issue of the "legal status" of the Association and Council was raised. Subsequent Trustees officially recognizes the Alumni Association as the representative of the University's former students in University matters. Similar recognition has been extended to the Faculty, Student Government Association and the Office Personnel Council.

On September 20, 1980, the Alumni Council approved the concept of a resolution authorizing an Alumni Association. A proposed resolution which has been reviewed by University counsel, is presented as EXHIBIT D. Also, at the September 20, 1980 meeting, the Alumni Council approved a proposed revision to the Alumni Association Constitution, which will ultimately be subject to approval by the membership of the Alumni Association, pending approval of the Resolution by the Board of Trustees. The proposed constitution is presented as ATTACHMENT 1.

Approval of the Resolution was recommended.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Mrs. Fouty, the recommendation was approved.

I. NEW TECHNOLOGY BUILDING

The completed plans and specifications for the construction of the new Technology Building were presented for Board consideration.

Mr. Tom Dawson introduced Mr. Steve Ford from Walter Scholer and Associates of Lafayette, the architectural firm for the new building, who gave a brief presentation.

Mr. Ford said the new Technology Building, located at the corner of Sixth and Cherry Streets, will provide an entrance to the University on 6th Street with the building name on the entrance wall. The first floor will house Construction Technology, Packaging Laboratory and Auto Technology. The alley north of the building will be developed into an area for pedestrian traffic and will be covered by a canopy allowing protection for students from the elements.

The second floor will house the Drafting area, Plastic Packaging and Mechanical Laboratory and the Fluid Laboratory.

The basement will house strictly mechanical equipment. Mr. Ford stated that the building is very compact and functional.

Mr. Winchell asked if there is room along Cherry Street to plant trees.

Mr. Ford said he believed there would be adequate room.

Mr. Ford showed the Board members samples of South Carolina jumbo brick. He said it is $12" \times 4"$ and was selected for its economy as it will take less brick and less mortar.

Mr. Winchell remarked the brick looked to be compatible to the existing Technology Building.

Mr. Breeden asked about the raised area pictured on the third story of the building. He was advised that the Packaging Laboratory requires 20 foot ceilings and the elevated area was to meet this need.

Mr. Woll asked if there was room for expansion.

Mr. Ford advised that no provisions for additional expansion were made, although it was pointed out that the existing Print Shop was designed for the addition of two floors.

Mr. Moulton said any future space needs of the School of Technology could be accommodated across the street to the West of the new addition.

Approval of the plans and specifications was recommended.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Mr. Brames, the recommendation was approved.

It was then stated that in accordance with the advertisement for bids published in the TERRE HAUTE STAR and the TERRE HAUTE TRIBUNE on October 21, and 28, 1980, bids for the construction of the new Technology Building will be received until 2:00 P.M., November 18, 1980, after which time the bids will be publicly opened and read.

It was further recommended that a committee composed of President Landini, Mrs. Fouty, Mr. Schmelzer, Dr. Siebenmorgen and Mr. Moulton, be authorized to award contracts for the construction work if satisfactory bids are received.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Mr. Brames, the recommendation was approved.

J. SPECIAL FEES

Approval of the following special fees was recommended:

1. Blumberg Conference

The School of Education may offer one semester hour credit for those attending the Blumberg Conference who desire to enroll and complete specified tasks. The fee for the credit hour will be \$16.00 for Indiana residents and non-resident students.

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2. Library Reference Data Base Searches

A fee is needed because of University costs for royalties, computer time and telecommunications.

a. Campus Users (Students, faculty, administration and staff)

Government Sponsored Bases (No royalty fees): \$8.00 plus charges for off-line prints Examples: AIM/ARM, ERIC, Exceptional Child Educational Resources.

Commercial Data Bases (Royalty fees charges): \$18.00 plus charges for off-line prints
Examples: Art Bibliographies Modern, Biosis, Previews, CA Condensates (Chemical Abstracts), Energyline, Grants Index Foundations, Historical Abstracts.

b. Community Users (Corporations, individuals, etc.)

Community users will be charged the full cost of the search plus a service charge amounting to 50% of the search cost.

Mr. Woll asked what specified tasks were to be included in the credit to be earned at the Blumberg Conference.

President Landini advised that areas of Early Childhood Education, Education of the Mentally Retarded and provisions for Special Disabilities are encompassed in the program. Students applying for credit would be required to complete a special project in one of these areas.

On a motion by Mrs. Fouty, seconded by Mr. Winchell, the recommendation was approved.

2. Covington, Indiana Credit-based Head Start Training Grant - Fund No. 2672

6. Terre Haute, Indiana Credit-based Head Start Training Grant - Fund No. 2676

Letter Agreement dated September 23, 1980 has been received from the CAP, Inc., in the amount of \$7,720.00 to provide credit-based in-service instruction for the Head Start teachers and teacher-aides under the direction of Dr. Jan McCarthy, Coordinator of the Early Childhood Education Program, Department of Elementary Education, for the period From September 25, 1980 through July 30, 1981. The University will waive the tuition charges for these credit courses. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter agreement.

7. Vocational-Technical Accounting V-TECS Catalogues Grant - Fund No. 2677

Project No. 8-81-III-3 has been received from the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education in the amount of \$11,226.00 to support the development of the V-TECS accounting catalogue under the direction of Dr. Sam Wiersteiner, Executive Director of the Vocational-Technical Services Center, for the period from October 1, 1980 through September 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

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

AGREEMENT BETWEEN

INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY

AND

VERMILLION COUNTY HOSPITAL

- This Agreement is entered into as of the 29th day of September, 1980.
- II. It is understood and agreed by the parties that the purpose of the relationship established by this Agreement is to facilitate the clinical laboratory experiences of students enrolled in the associated, baccalaureate, graduate and continuing education program in the School of Nursing.

III. PLAN FOR INSTRUCTION

- A. Placement of students of Vermillion County Hospital will be planned in accordance with the calendar of the School of Nursing by the Dean and the Director of Nurses, or their designates, at least three (3) months prior to the assignment.
- B. Specific times of the placements to Vermillion County Hospital will be arranged according to the students' educational program and the available clinical laboratory experiences.

IV. RESPONSIBILITY OF INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY(SCHOOL OF NURSING)

- A. Function within all applicable rules, regulations, and policies of Vermillion County Hospital.
- B. Assume responsibility for the teaching-guidance of the students in clinical laboratory experiences. School of Nursing faculty will be available to students in the clinical areas. Clinical assignments for students will be made by the faculty member in consultation with the nurse in charge.
- C. Provide the anticipated number, the type of schedule planned, the kind of educational experiences desired, and the academic status of students at least one (1) month prior to the semester in which they are placed for clinical laboratory experiences.
- D. Provide the Vermillion County Hospital staff the objectives for students' clinical laboratory experiences.
- E. Require each student participating in the program to provide liability insurance coverage for malpractice with a limit of two hundred thousand and no/100 (\$200,000.00) dollars for injury or damage to any one person and a limit of six hundred thousand and no/100 (\$600,000.00) dollars for injury or damage arising from any one accident.
- F. Assign only those students who are in good health to Vermillion County Hospital.

V. RESPONSIBILITIES OF VERMILLION COUNTY HOSPITAL

- A. Accept students for educational experiences in those courses for which placement has been mutually planned and arranged.
- B. Make available those clinical laboratory experiences agreed upon.

- Provide orientation to the School of Nursing faculty to familiarize them with clients; the hospital philosophy, policies, and procedures; the physical facilities; and such other aspects as are pertinent to the education of students.
- D. Provide conference and dressing room space, as available, following mutually arranged schedules for use.
- E. Make available the hospital library facilities to students and faculty for use on the premises.

VI. MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. Confer on plans, problems, and changes related to the clinical laboratory experiences.
- B. Perform duties and obligations at no cost to the other party.
- Release the other party of any liability as a result of any act of its agents, servants, employees, officers and students occurring out of the operation of this program for any injury or damage sustained by it or any person in privity therewith.

VII. AMENDMENT

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This Agreement will be reviewed annually. Any revision or addition covered by this Agreement will be done in writing and agreed upon by both parties.

TII. TERMINATION

Each party may terminate this Agreement by at least one (1) calendar year's written notice to the other party. All students enrolled in the School of Nursing Program at the time that notice to terminate this Agreement is given by either party to the other shall be permitted to complete at the Vermillion County Hospital the clinical experiences needed for graduation subject to the terms and conditions contained herein.

IX. DISTRIBUTION

One copy of the signed Agreement will be retained in the School of Nursing with the remaining signed copies distributed by the School of Nursing to the following:

PROPOSAL FOR A CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY DOCTORAL PROGRAM (PSY.D.)

A. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

1. Objectives

The program is designed to provide training in the professional applications of clinical psychology, with the primary objective of equipping graduates for the skilled delivery of clinical services. It is not the intention to establish another Ph.D. Clinical Psychology program in a state which already has two such programs at other institutions.

The proposed program is patterned after professionally oriented doctoral programs emerging in Departments of Psychology as well as in university based Professional Schools of Psychology. The rationale for the development of this program is to train skilled Psychology. The rationale for the development of this program is to train skilled practitioners who can not only successfully treat psychological problems, but also approach these problems in the spirit of active inquiry and critical thinking. Thus, graduates should be able both to utilize the results of research generated by graduates of traditional doctoral programs and, if necessary, engage in studies useful in their particular settings, the emphasis in the program will be on individualized clinical supervision, combined with broad practical experience and research training oriented toward clinical applications.

The program is intended to train professional psychologists who possess the following:

- a. A firm grounding in the foundations of psychology, including knowledge of normal and abnormal processes of thought, emotion and behavior.
- b. The ability to evaluate critically their own and others' clinical and programmatic interventions.
- c. The ability to implement assessment and treatment techniques to meet a wide variety of mental health service needs.

It should be recognized from the outset that the proposed program is firmly based on experience and faculty expertise in the initiating department. During the past six years the existing master's degree program in Clinical Psychology has established an excellent record of success in clinical training, attracting large numbers of outstanding applicants and placing graduates in highly regarded clinical positions. Employers have often praised program graduates as possessing clinical skills comparable to many doctoral psychologists. However, clinical skills have been acquired at the expense of grounding in psychological theory, as there has been no time to include core areas of psychology in the brevity of a master's program. Thus, while being skilled clinicians, previous graduates can function autonomously only to a limited extent. Although master's level clinical positions continue to flourish, within the field of psychology there has been strong emphasis on establishing the doctoral level of training as the minimal professional credential. This is reflected in licensure laws and program accreditation standards which set the doctoral level as the basic requirement for autonomous clinical practice. Doctoral training thus will allow graduates of the proposed program to contribute more effectively than master's graduates toward meeting the extensive mental health needs of society. The proposed program would wholly replace the existing clinical MS program; this would allow the existing resources and current faculty to be utilized more efficiently.

2. Learning Resources Associated with the Program

a. Available Resources

Much of the expense of graduate clinical training is in the provision of individualized clinical supervision. An excellent clinical faculty, clinical coursework, and a fully equipped Psychology Clinic are already in place. Few changes are anticipated in the clinical training sequence which has shown itself to be successful. The Psychology Clinic is located in its own air conditioned and carpeted building, complete with six interview/ therapy rooms, each equipped with one-way vision, sound, and video recording capability. In addition, there is a seminar/conference room and a large pleasant reception area. clinic has operated as a training facility for six years, and has fully adequate nonstudent patient referrals. The Psychology Department occupies the entire top floor of a classroom/office building, and faculty are provided with pleasant offices and space in support of their teaching and research activities. There are various research laboratories and seminar rooms located in the office building, as well as an animal laboratory and a human interaction laboratory located in two other buildings. The Department has a PDP-8 computer in service of several laboratories, and direct access through possible and handle access through possible access through the possible access the possible access through the possible a through peripheral hardware with the main University computer located in the same building. Additional equipment includes four complete videotape/playback units, one three-channel and three two-channel tachistoscopes, a Grass eight-channel polygraph, three complete biofeedback units, and numerous electronic calculators. The University provides computer serivces, via a newly installed CDC Cyber-171 computer, with remote terminals, two of which are in the Psychology Popper and the Psychology Ps are in the Psychology Department. Audio-Visual services are good, with convenient access not only to ISU holdings but also to those of nearby campuses in Indiana and other states. The library subscribes to most main and other states. The library subscribes to most major and many related journals in the various fields of Psychology. There have been very limited funds in recent years for acquisition of books by and funds to bolk namediate. the library, and funds to help remediate that problem are needed.

b. Needed Resources

In order to offer a program of the highest quality, the following additional resources are needed:

 Increased financial assistance for graduate students. Additional funds for graduatestudent support are needed because students will be on campus longer than in the current program, the total number of students on campus will be larger, and the stipend for doctoral students is larger than for master's students. The program will not be competitive in attracting the best students if adequate financial assistance is not available.

2) Additional Faculty:

this area over the past several years.

At least one, but at most two faculty positions are needed, particularly in the areas of social psychology and clinical applications of statistics, to help staff generalexperimental psychology courses not currently taken by students in the clinical MS program.

3) Library Acquisitions: As indicated above, additional funding is needed for new book acquisitions in the University Library, in order to help remediate the problem of inadequate funding in

B. PROGRAM RATIONALE

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1. <u>Institutional Factors</u>

- a. Mission Compatibility: The proposed program is an outgrowth of the existing MS degree program in Clinical Psychology, and as such is a logical extension of current institutional emphasis on applied programs. Indiana State University is accredited as a level I institution authorized to grant the doctoral degree. The graduate school mission statement as prepared for a recent North Central Association review emphasizes the importance of doctoral level programs toward the achievement of other institutional goals. The addition of this program would aid in the consolidation of that effort. The general orientation of many ISU programs is toward professional preparation, which is compatible with the objectives of the proposed program.
- Program Compatibility: The program will complement other doctoral programs at the University. For example, Graduate Education offers a Ph.D. in Guidance and Psychological Services. While the emphasis of that program is upon counseling the educational psychology, accreditation standards of the American Psychological Association require students in such a program to take course work in core areas of psychology. The availability of a doctoral degree in psychology would provide course work suitable for the counseling program. Furthermore, perspectives of students in both programs would be broadened through shared course work and other contacts. Development of doctoral training in Clinical Psychology will also enhance the educational opportunities of students working toward a master's degree in General Psychology, by making available proseminars otherwise inaccessible to these students.
- c. Particular institutional strengths in the program area:
 - (1) The primary asset is the existence of an already well-supported and strong MS program in clinical psychology, with the numerous resources described above. The clinical program is located within a progressive and viable Psychology Department, with active research and a strong curriculum.
 - (2) The presence on campus of doctoral programs in associated and allied areas provides the availability of complementary coursework and resources appropriate for doctoral training in the form of library holdings, audio visual services, and research facilities.
 - (3) Graduate coursework in related areas such as Counseling, Criminology, Life Sciences, Sociology, and Special Education supplement training available within the Psychology Department.
- d. Impact of the Program on Greater Utilization of Existing Resources.
 - (1) The most significant impact will be on the effective utilization of personnel and physical resources of the Psychology Department. The number and credentials of the Clinical Psychology faculty compare favorably with psychology departments which offer the doctoral degree in Clinical Psychology. Utilizing this resource for the preparation of doctoral clinicians needed in Indiana is prudent. Use of the clinical training facilities would not increase, but application of their availability to doctoral training would be economically judicious. In addition, involvement of the general psychology faculty in doctoral training will make maximal use of their talents as well as enhance their ability to make scholarly contributions to the field.
 - (2) Doctoral training in other ISU programs has led to the development of effective research-proficiency training and evaluation, library resources, computational facilities, and graduate-school administration which all can be fully utilized without modification by the new program.
 - (3) Master's level students in the MS Clinical Program are now receiving significant amounts of financial support in the form of graduate assistantships which could be directed instead to doctoral level training.

SECTION I, EXHIBIT F November 14, 1980

SCHOOL OF MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

St. Francis Hospital Center Indianapolis, Indiana

and

Indiana State University

This document is an agreement between St. Francis Hospital Center, hereinafter referred to as the Hospital, and Indiana State University, hereinafter referred to as the University, regarding an affiliation for the purpose of training students in Medical Technology.

Section I

- St. Francis Hospital Center agrees to abide by the following provisions:
- A. Technology Training: The Hospital agrees to maintain a training program which will fulfill all the requirements established by the Committee on Allied Health Education and Administration and the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Science.
- B. Qualification of Applicants: The Hospital agrees to consider for training in Medical Technology those students from the University who qualify according to the criteria established by the Hospital. The Hospital can also accept qualified applicants from other properly accredited colleges or universities.
- C. <u>Admissions</u>: Minimum criteria for admission to St. Francis Hospital Center School of Medical Technology include:
 - 1. Completion of the equivalent of a minimum of 90 semester hours (135 quarter hours) of academic credit in a college or university approved by a recognized regional accrediting agency. Prerequisite credit from the University must meet the requirements of the National Accrediting Agency of Clinical Laboratory Science and the Hospital's School of Medical Technology.
 - 2. A student, to be qualified, shall have maintained a cumulative grade point average of not less than 2.0 (4.0 point system) and 2.0 in biology and chemistry courses taken.
 - 3. Each student applicant shall file with the Hospital a completed application, a copy of his transcript along with a listing of courses in progress, and a satisfactory transcript evaluation by National Accrediting Agency of Clinical Laboratory Science or designated officials.
- D. <u>Selection of Students</u>: The Hospital reserves the right to refuse admission to any student who does not meet established criteria. Waiver of any of the criteria must be based on mutual agreement between the Hospital and University representatives. Final selection of students will be determined by the Admissions Committee for the School of Medical Technology of St. Francis Hospital Center.
- E. <u>Progress Reports</u>: The Hospital agrees to furnish the University with a final grade for each course taken by the student, and at midterm to give the University a report of satisfactory or unsatisfactory progress for each student.
- F. <u>Dismissal</u>: If, at midterm of the program, the student fails to meet the required standards of performance and competency for hospital work, the Hospital will notify the University and representatives of both institutions will meet with the student. If, university and representatives of both institutions of both the University and Hospital after meeting with the student, it is the opinion of both the University and Hospital representatives that it is advisable, the student will be disenrolled from the Hospital training program.

- Provision for Liaison: The Hospital will designate a person as a liaison between the Provision for Liason. The hospital and the University to facilitate improved communications and better coordination Hospital and the University to facilitate improved communications and better coordination Hospital and the onlycest, to later and the onlycest, to later and the objectives. This assignment of efforts of the two institutions in accomplishing mutual objectives. This assignment will involve no remuneration.
- <u>Injuries</u>: Students will be given immediate first-aid and medical treatment by the Hospital for any injury sustained during the conduct of the student's performance.

Section II

The University agrees to abide by the following provisions:

- Didactic Instruction: The University shall offer an approved didactic course of study appropriate for students in a Medical Technology Program in accordance with requirements established by the Committee on Allied Health Education and Administration and the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Science. The course of studies shall be published in the University Catalog.
- B. Credit: The University will grant academic credit for successful completion of each segment of the Hospital program. The amount of credit for each segment shall be determined by agreement between the two directors.
- C. Degree: The University will grant a baccalaureate degree to eligible students successfully completing the Medical Technology Program at the Hospital. Granting of a degree shall not be contingent upon certification of the student by the Registry of Medical Technologists of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists, according to the ASCP requirements effective December, 1972.
- Liaison Appointment: The University shall designate a person to act as a liaison between the University and the Hospital, to facilitate improved communications and better coordination of efforts of the two institutions in accomplishing mutual objectives. This appointment will involve no remuneration.
- Academic Appointments: Academic appointments for the Director and Educational Coordinator will be provided by the University without remuneration or tenure.
- Student Activities: Medical Technology students will be accorded the same privileges available to other students in similar academic settings.

Section III

- St. Francis Hospital Center, and the University mutually agree that:
- Representatives of the Medical Technology program from each Joint Committee: institution shall comprise a joint committee which shall meet at least once each year to review the progress of the program, develop policy for the following year, and discuss curriculum.
 - 1. Hospital representatives shall be:
 - a.) Director of the School of Medical Technology, or his designated representative
 - b.) Medical Technology Educational Coordinator,
 - c.) Associate Administrator or his designated representative.
 - 2. University representatives shall be the Director of The Center for Medical Technology and/or a designated representative.
- Educational Policies: Development of specific educational policies not provided for in this agreement shall be the responsibility of the Joint Committee.
- Professional Conduct: Appropriate Othical and professional conduct shall be required of all students.
- Fees and Tuition: Students will pay the instate fee per credit hour for courses in the amount approved by the trustees of the University. The University will remit to the Hospital an amount equivalent to 75% of the fees collected in consideration of services provided by the Hospital because Fees and Tuition: services provided by the Hospital hereunder.
- Publications: St. Francis Hospital Center agrees to recognize the University as an affiliated institution in its publications, and the University shall make similar identification of the Hospital School in its literature.
- F. <u>Insurance</u>:
 - 1. Liability: For students participating in the program, liability insurance coverage will conform to the existing policy of the Hospital.

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1. Granting

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Each party releases the other of any liability as a result of any acts of its agents, servants, employees, officers and students occurring out of operation of this program for any injury or damage sustained by it or any person in privity therewith.

- 2. Health: Health insurance coverage will conform to the existing policy of the Hospital.
- G. Term of Agreement: This agreement shall continue in force commencing with the clinical year of study following the date of execution of the agreement, and shall renew automatically each year thereafter. Each party hereto may terminate this agreement by at least one (1) calendar year's written notice to the other party. All students enrolled in the program at the time of that notice to terminate this agreement shall be permitted to complete the clinical laboratory practice needed for graduation subject to the terms and conditions herein.
- H. Changes and Revisions: Revisions or changes to any part of this agreement must involve the official representatives of the Hospital and the University.

This agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto and their successors.

INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

This organization shall be known as the Indiana State University Alumni Association.

ARTICLE II

Purpose

This Association is organized to promote a positive working relationship between the University and its former students for their mutual benefit.

ARTICLE III

Membership

- Section 1: The members of this Association shall include all former students of Indiana State University or the institution as previously named.
- Section 2: Active members shall be those who contribute annually to the Indiana State University Fund or who hold a life membership in the Association.
- Section 3: Associate members shall be those who contribute to the Indiana State University Fund and who are not former students of the University.
- Section 4: Honorary members shall be those persons who are conferred membership by the Alumni Council for service to the Association and the University.

ARTICLE IV

Organization

- Section 1: An Alumni Council shall be elected to govern the affairs of the Association and to serve and to represent the interests of alumni in the University.
- Section 2: The Alumni Council shall consist of the three immediate past presidents of the Association, fifteen members elected by the active members of the Association, and five members elected by the Alumni Council.
- Annually, the active members of the Association shall elect three members of the Alumni Council and the Alumni Council shall elect one member. Elected members shall serve terms of five years and shall not succeed themselves.
- It shall be the responsibility of the Alumni Council to assure that membership of the Alumni Council is representative of the alumni population.
- Section 3: Any vacancy occurring on the Alumni Council shall be filled for the duration of the unexpired term by a majority vote by the Alumni Council.
- Section 4: The president of the University, vice president for development and public affairs, and director of alumni affairs shall be ex officio, non-voting members of the Alumni Council.
- Section 5: The officers of this Association shall be a president, a vice president, and a secretary.
- Section 6: The president and the vice president shall be elected annually by the Council from its membership. Term of office shall be for one year and begin on January 1. The vice president shall succeed to the office of president in the year following the term as vice president. The secretary shall be the director of alumni affairs of the University.
- Section 7: Meetings of the Alumni Council may be called at any time, upon reasonable notice, by the president of the Association, by the president of the University, or by written request of a majority of the Alumni Council members.
- Section 8: Twelve members of the Alumni Council shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 9: A constituent society of the Indiana State University Alumni Association may be organized by any school or department subject to review and approval by the Alumni Council.

Section 10: A local Indiana State University alumni club may be organized on a regional basis, subject to review and approval by the Alumni Council.

ARTICLE V

Election

Nominations for the Alumni Council shall be made by a nominating committee of three members to be appointed by the president of the Association. Nominations shall be made not later than September 1. Additional nominations may be made by presentation of a petition to the secretary of the Association signed by not less than twenty-five active members of the Association.

All active members of the Association shall be eligible for voting privileges. Ballots containing the names of nominees shall be supplied to the voting members and the ballot, properly marked, must be returned to the alumni office on or before December 1.

Any additional member shall be elected by the Alumni Council at the last scheduled meeting of the year. Terms of Alumni Council membership shall begin on January 1.

ARTICLE VI

Amendments

Amendments to these articles may be proposed by a petition signed by not less than twenty-five active members of the Association or by resolution adopted by the Alumni Council. The proposed amendment or amendments shall be submitted to the active members of the Association in a manner prescribed by the Alumni Council. An affirmative vote of the majority of active members casting votes shall be required to amend this constitution.

SECTION I

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Trustees Meeting Room, 11th Floor, School of Business Building, on the Terre Haute Campus. Trustees present: Mr. Ainlay, Mr. Brames, Mrs. Fouty, Mr. Schmelzer, Dr. Siebenmorgen, Mr. Winchell and Mr. Woll. Trustees absent: Mr. Breeden and Mrs. Mitchell. President Landini, President Rice, Vice Presidents Moulton, McKee and Truitt, Dr. Schellenberg and Dr. Hardaway were present. Also attending were Dr. Backes, Chairperson of the Faculty Senate on the Terre Haute Campus, Dr. Shaw, Chairperson of the Faculty Council on the Evansville Campus and Mr. Harrison, President of the Evansville Campus SGA.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Ainlay called the meeting to order at 10:15 A.M.

After calling the meeting to order, Mr. Ainlay remarked that an historic occasion was being marked since this was the first time the Board was meeting in its new meeting room in the School of Business. He indicated that he had heard very favorable comments on these new facilities. He hopes that everyone, no matter what their relationship with the University or the meeting, finds that the facilities are as helpful as the members of the Board have found them to be. He expressed the appreciation and gratitude of the members of the Board to all of those in the University who made the new accommodations possible.

He further commented on the latest Sycamore Yearbook which the Board members had received and expressed the opinion that it appears again to be an outstanding publication. On behalf of the members of the Board he thanked all individuals who have labored so hard to make this book possible and indicated that the members of the Board will enjoy looking through the book.

A. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF MEETING OF NOVEMBER 14, 1980

On a motion by Dr. Siebenmorgen, seconded by Mrs. Fouty, the minutes of November 14, 1980, were approved.

B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

President Landini announced that the date of the next meeting will be March 6, 1981, on the Terre Haute Campus.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Budget

The President remarked the Institution awaits with certain concerns, apprehension and some excitement the opening of the 1981 Indiana General Assembly and their action on the 1981-83 biennium budget. The budget has been carefully conceived within the faculty and administration, carefully reviewed by the Board of Trustees, and is considered to be fair and honest and, indeed, when examined closely, a "bare-bones" budget. Brochures of the principal factors of the budget have been prepared and are being put into the hands of hundreds of individuals, including legislators, the ISU Foundation and the Alumni Council. The brochure was financed by the Alumni Association. He hopes that we gain the support of friends not only of the University but all who support the concept of higher education in Indiana.

Search Committees

The searches for an Athletic Director and a Vice President for Development and Public Affairs are underway. The deadline for applications for Athletic Director is February 1. Twenty-five applications have already been received and are in various stages of candidacy. He feels if experience holds true at least four times that number will be received. In the meantime the Institution will be well served by the Interim appointment of Dale McKee as Acting Vice President for Development and Public Affairs and John Newton as Acting Director of Alumni Affairs. Both positions are most important within the Institution. Dr. Truitt and Mr. Moulton, both of whom have distinguished records of service with the University, chair the search committees for Athletic Director and Vice President for Development and Public Affairs respectively.

New Programs

The President remarked that the consolidation of the University's Intercollegiate Athletic Programs and a new degree program in Health Occupations Education were cited in this agenda. The consolidation of the athletic programs and the Health Occupations Degree Program both were given considerable discussion in the General Welfare Session and both programs are presented with the recommendation of the administration for approval by the Board of Trustees.

Construction & Repairs

Construction and remodeling work in the form of bids for building and remodeling continue to reflect the growth and development of the Institution. Construction is well underway for improvement of land for pilings and footings for the new Technology Building at 6th and Cherry Streets. The sound of gigantic machinery is offset by the knowledge that there will be a magnificent building on that site. The President remarked he has visited the upper most floor of the Technology Building and also the third floor of the Classroom Building formerly, School of Business. The foregoing are internal improvements that are now underway on the campus. Parking lot repair construction at 5th and Cherry Streets has also been completed. The parking lot north of the Towers is also being improved with new tar being poured. The lot benefits faculty, staff and administrators in the Towers and the University School. The lot has been landscaped similar to the lot by the New Theatre. He looks with pride to the Third and Chestnut Street entrance to the campus where two modest and unpretentious signs will be located to announce ISU locally and to persons traveling on U.S. #41.

President's Associates

The President was pleased to announce that the President's Associates, supported fully by himself and his colleagues, are bringing to the campus for three days for lectures, discussions and observations, James Watson, Nobel laureate in genetic research. He will not only be lecturing but also moving about the campus meeting with the faculty, staff and administration. Juanita Kreps, outstanding and noteworthy economist and former Secretary of Commerce will also visit the campus. He publicly expressed his appreciation to those who are making this cultural enrichment possible for our students.

New Board Room Facilities

President Landini also added his comments concerning the new accommodations for the Trustees The new Board Room will be available of course to the Board of Trustees and to others for seminars and meetings. He stated he would be remiss if he did not observe that the utilization of the two Towers is the result of much work and effort on the part of Mr. Moulton. Mr. Moulton was most influential and effective in persuading the legislature to provide funds for changing the Towers from residence halls to the School of Education and the School of Business. He is grateful to the people of Indiana and much credit is due to former President Rankin, Mr. Moulton and the Board of Trustees in this endeavor.

Mr. Ainlay responded briefly to the beautification of the campus. Many of his colleagues have remarked to him about the beautification program. The Board is very pleased with what this administration has done in efforts toward accomplishments of campus improvements. These things occur gradually and one doesn't realize just how much has been accomplished. He is very appreciative of what President Richard Landini, the faculty, administrators and staff have done and looks forward to the annual Donaghy Day when additional efforts are undertaken.

D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

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vor· is collegion eased with President Rice reported that in addition to the usual academic endeavors, the Mid-America Singers presented a one hour television production for a local TV station and will participate in the Inauguration of Governor-elect Orr on January 12.

A signage program has been completed by the members of the Physical Plant and CETA workers and the new signs are very attractive and informative.

The athletic program is moving along very well and the ISUE Screaming Eagles are ranked 5th in the nation in Division II basketball.

1. Grants - Evansville

Ratification of the following grants $\underline{\text{was}}$ recommended:

Voc.-Tech. Equipment Grant, 1980-81 - 2402

Indiana State University Evansville has been offered a \$8,627 grant by the Indiana State Board of Vocational and Technical Education. The funding for fiscal year 1980-81 has been approved by the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education. The purpose of the funding is to provide funds to purchase equipment for the Secretarial Administration program. Ratification of the award was recommended. The grant amount will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the approved proposal budget.

College Work Study - 2700

Indiana State University Evansville has received official notification from the Department of Education that the authorization of College Work Study funds for the campus has been increased by \$3,527 for fiscal year 1980-81. The total authorization for the fiscal year now totals \$81,963. Ratification of the increased authorization level was recommended. The authorization will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the authorization letter.

On a motion by Mr. Woll, seconded by Mr. Brames, the ratification was approved.

E. CANDIDATES FOR UNDERGRADUATE AND GRADUATE DEGREES - December 19, 1980

The candidates for undergraduates and graduate degrees to be conferred at the end of the 1980 Fall Semester, are presented in EXHIBIT A. It was recommended that the award of the respective degrees be approved subject to completion of the requirements.

President Landini remarked that the conferral of degrees is indeed one of the most important activities that the Board engages in. After long and ardous study by these students, the action of the Board should not be merely perfunctory. Mr. Ainlay replied that it is one of the most significant and satisfying recommendations the Board acts on.

On a motion by Mrs. Fouty, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the recommendation was approved.

F. CONSOLIDATION OF THE UNIVERSITY'S INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETIC PROGRAM

In the Fall Semester, 1979, an Ad Hoc Committee was appointed to consider the feasibility of the consolidation of the intercollegiate athletic programs for men and women at Indiana State University. The Committee submitted its Report to the President in April, 1980, with the notation that it was accepted by concensus of the members.

On April 10, 1980, the President submitted a proposal, based primarily on the Report of the Ad Hoc Committee, on the future organization and administrative structure of intercollegiate athletics at Indiana State. The proposal was reviewed by the Department of Women's Physical Education, the Department of Men's Physical Education, the Dean of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, the Director of Athletics and the University Athletic Committee. As a result of the review and commentary of these University individuals, a plan for the consolidation of the organization and administration of intercollegiate athletics at Indiana State University has been developed. The rationale for the proposal, administrative implications and the administrative structure are presented in EXHIBIT B.

It was recommended that the proposal for the consolidation of the Intercollegiate Athletic Program be approved. If approved, the plan will be implemented July 1, 1981.

On a motion by Mr. Woll, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the recommendation was approved.

G. IN MEMORIAM

Dr. Hilda Maehling, past member of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees, passed away on December 3, 1980. A Resolution, EXHIBIT C, was presented for approval of the Board.

Timothy J. Nisley, Instructor in Electronics and Computer Technology, was killed on December 31, 1980. A Resolution, EXHIBIT G, was presented for approval of the Board.

Mr. Ainlay remarked he was very astounded and depressed to learn of the airplane crash in Goshen which took the life of Timothy Nisley, an Instructor in Electronics and Computer Technology. He further commented that it seemed to hit closer to home since it occurred in his own community.

President Landini remarked the Institution lost a most devoted servant in the passing of Dr. Hilda Maehling, a former Board member. The death of Timothy Nisley, a young instructor in Technology was most tragic. The University is always the less when deprived of a young life. He further stated that both deaths were very moving to him. Mr. Nisley did not have the opportunity to give as much service to the Institution as Dr. Maehling but under different circumstances the President has every reason to believe he would have been an extraordinary servant.

He also remarked that we have lost another important alumni of the University in the passing of Bob Gilbert, Chief of Counseling, Penn High School, Mishawaka, Indiana. He had continued to serve the Institution extremely well and with the permission of the Board the President will convey the University's sadness and distress of his passing to his family.

The Resolution in memory of Dr. Maehling was read by Dr. Siebenmorgen and the Resolution in memory of Mr. Nisley was read by Mr. Winchell. Both resolutions were unanimously approved by the Board.

H. B. S. DEGREE PROGRAM: HEALTH OCCUPATIONS EDUCATION

The purpose of the Health Occupations Education program is to provide an opportunity for individuals who are currently licensed, certified, or registered in a health profession to develop teaching competency skills. The graduates shall be qualified to teach in diversified health occupations education programs in secondary schools and/or in specialized areas in post-secondary settings. The proposed program was approved by the School of Nursing on April 18, 1980, approved by the Dean of the School of Education on June 25, 1980, approved by the Curricular and Academic Affairs Committee on October 30, 1980, by the Executive Committee of the Faculty Senate on November 18, 1980, and by the Faculty Senate on December 11, 1980 by a vote of 23-5-3. The program has the support and endorsement of the Vice President for Academic Affairs. Specifics of the Bachelor of Science Degree Program are presented in EXHIBIT D.

Approval of the Health Occupations Education program was recommended.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Mrs. Fouty, the recommendation was approved.

I. GRANTS - TERRE HAUTE CAMPUS

Ratification of the following grants was recommended:

1. Naval Weapons Support Center Contract - Fund No. 2633

Contract/Purchase Order No. N00164-80-M-0031 has been modified by the Naval Weapons Support Center, Crane, Indiana, increasing the total amount \$1,800.00 making the new total \$7,920.00 to support the dose irradiation of semiconductors with 10,000 curie Cobalt 60 Gamma Irradiator under the direction of Dr. John Swez, Professor of Physics, for the period from November 1, 1979 through October 31, 1980. It was recommended that the additional amount be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the contract.

2. <u>Indiana University American Diabetes Assoc.</u>, Indiana Affiliate, Research Grant - Fund

Purchase Order No. 2011-4516 has been received from Indiana University-Purdue University at Indianapolis in the amount of \$26,597.00 to support the research project entitled "Energetics of Normal and Diabetic Cells in Culture" under the direction of Dr. Walter X. Balcavage, Terre Haute Center for Medical Education, for the period from September 1, 1980 through August 31, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the purchase order.

3. American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance Research Grant Fund No. 2680

Check No. 15530 has been received from the American Alliance of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation in the amount of \$400.00 to support the study of leading

scholars in the field regarding future professional trends for the 21st Century under the direction of Dr. Howard A. Richardson, Dean of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, for the period from October 15, 1980, through June 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

4. Lilly Endowment, Inc., Evaluation Assistance Center Grant - Fund No. 2681

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Grant Agreement No. 800224 has been received from Lilly Endowment, Inc., in the amount of \$156,175.00 to continue the support of the Evaluation Assistance Center in the School of Education under the direction of Dr. James E. Higgins, Professor of Elementary Education, for the period from December 1, 1980 through November 30, 1982. In-kind contributions totaling \$47,476.00 will be provided by the University. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant

Indiana Junior Science and Humanities Symposium, 1981 - Fund No. 2682

A Letter Award dated November 6, 1980, has been received from The Academy of Applied Science under the terms of Grant No. DAAG29-77-D-0046 from the U.S. Army Research Office in the amount of \$8,200.00 to conduct the Indiana Junior Science and Humanities Symposium on March 26-28, 1981, under the direction of Dr. Kenneth Uhlhorn, Director of the Science Teaching Center. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

6. Voc.-Tech. Performance Based Vocational Education Food Service Grant - Fund No. 2683

Project No. 449-80-III-3 has been received from the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education in the amount of \$25,000.00 to support the project entitled "Performance Based Vocational Education for Food Service" under the direction of Mrs. JoAnne Rowe, Home Economics Department, for the period from September 2, 1980 through September 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant.

7. Indiana State Library Community Analysis Project Grant - Fund No. 2684

An agreement dated November 3, 1980 has been received from the Indiana State Library in the amount of \$15,889.00 to continue to support the Indiana Community Analysis Project under the direction of Dr. Choong H. Kim, Professor of Library Science, for the period from October 1, 1980 through September 30, 1981. In-kind contributions totaling \$8,243.00 will be provided by the University. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the agreement.

8. Indiana Council for Economic Education Grant - Fund No. 2685

A grant award has been received from the Indiana Council for Economic Education in the amount of \$2,500.00 to support the supplemental activities of the I.S.U. Center for Economic Education under the direction of Mr. Jack Grantham, Director of the Social Science Education Center, for the period from September 1, 1980 through August 31, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

9. Special Olympics, Inc., Computer Center Grant - Fund No. 2401

Letter Award dated November 19, 1980, has been received from Special Olympics, Inc., in the amount of \$7,500 to support for the sixth year the Special Olympics Computer System and assist additional chapters in adopting the system under the direction of Dr. Douglas Smith, Director of the Computer Center, for the period from October 1, 1980, through September 30, 1981. \$3,300 will be credited to the Current Operating Fund for personnel and travel costs and \$4,200.00 will be credited to Fund No. 2401 for other operating costs. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Mrs. Fouty, the ratification was approved.

J. NEW TECHNOLOGY BUILDING -- INFORMATION ITEM

Although the project cost was initially estimated to be \$350,000 to \$450,000 the undeserved optimism relative to costs which was experienced in the early stages of the planning for the project resulted in a funding request of \$350,000. There is an obvious need for additional funding for the project.

INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETIC PROGRAM: ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION

In the proposed organization of a consolidated intercollegiate athletic program, the several sports programs now sponsored by the University would be consolidated within the administrative purview and authority of the Director of Intercollegiate Athletics.

The Director should be assisted by three administrators, each with specified duties and responsibilities assigned to his or her management.

The present organization includes a director, two assistant directors, and a ticket manager.

The organization envisioned would include a director, two associate directors, one of whom must be presently on the faculty of the Department of Women's Physical Education, an assistant director, and a ticket manager.

The advantages that may be anticipated from consolidation of our intercollegiate athletic program are several:

an "institutional" position on Intercollegiate Athletics;

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coordination of energy and resources regarding the management of travel, recruitment, events, sports publicity, brochures and advertisements, administration, logistics, sales and promotion, office operations, schedules, University vehicles, and so on;

administrative efficiency, including influence and counter influence in decision making within the unit;

unification of Varsity Club, I-Men and I-Women, and other "booster" enterprises into main chance promotions; and

enhanced management and administration of University physical resources, equipment, facilities, buildings and grounds in support of Intercollegiate Athletics, recreation, and intramurals.

In studying the feasibility and present practicability of consolidating the University's intercollegiate athletics programs, the President has given considerable attention to present policies and practices. This plan includes, therefore, a body of principles which will govern the practices within a consolidated athletics program. By and large the following practices are presently in effect. Changes, additions, and amendments to current practices have been underscored for ready reference.

All instructor-coaches will be given joint appointments in the Department of Physical Education and ICA.

All appointments to instruction-coaching positions, except those in the sports of football, track, and men's basketball, will be recommended by the Dean, School of HPER, following consultation with the Director, ICA.

All instructor-coaches, except those in the sports of football, $\underline{\text{track}}$, and men's basketball, are eligible for tenure.

All instructor-coaches will be evaluated annually within the School of HPER and evaluations will include the written opinions of the Director of ICA regarding their coaching performance.

Football, track, and men's basketball coach-instructors are not eligible for tenure. Their annual evaluations will be conducted in the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics and include the written opinions of the Dean, School of HPER, regarding their academic performance.

Appointments and reappointments to the football, <u>track</u> and men's basketball head coaching positions will be recommended by the Director, ICA, <u>following</u> consultation with the Dean, School of HPER, and the University Athletic Committee.

The faculty representative to the NCAA will be appointed by the President <u>for a three year term</u>, with reappointment subject to the approval of the President, <u>following consultation with the University Athletic Committee</u>.

The faculty representative to the AIAW will be appointed by the President for a three year term, with reappointment subject to the approval of the President, following consultation with the University Athletic Committee.

The appointment of physicians to ICA will be made by the Vice President for Student Affairs, following consultation with the Director, ICA and the Dean, HPER.

The appointment of trainers to ICA will be made by the Dean, School of HPER, following consultation with the Director, ICA.


Compliance with each and all rules and regulations of the NCAA, IAW, and MVC in all sports is the responsibility of the Director, ICA.

Decisions on the use and assignment of use of all University sports, recreation, and intramural facilities, with the exception of HCUC, Memorial Stadium, and the Baseball Field, will be made by the Dean, School of HPER, based on consultation with the Director, ICA.

Decisions on the use and assignment of HCUC (for athletic events), Memorial Stadium, and the Baseball Field will be made by the Director, ICA, based on consultation with the Dean, HPER, and, as appropriate, with the Director, HCUC.

The administration of all sports "camps" involving the use of University facilities and resources will be the responsibility of the Director, ICA. Contracts and agreements will be acted upon by the President on the recommendation of the Senior Vice President. The starting point toward the implementation of a sports camp will be the office of the Director, ICA, and the Director will serve as the coordinator of the planning for such camps and the chief administrator responsible for the camps, based on consultation with the Dean, School of HPER (regarding the assignment and use of University facilities and resources).

The attached chart is designed to illustrate and clarify the assignments within the plan for consolidation. It should be noted, however, that in light of the search for and appointment of a new Director of Athletics, effective July 1, 1981, the President will authorize the Director to make appropriate changes in the organization (assignment of duties, responsibilities, direction of sports programs, and the like) and to make appropriate personnel changes, in accord with University policies and procedures, with the principal caveat that such changes, if any, will be made under the sense and spirit of the consolidation plan.

PROPOSAL FOR A HEALTH OCCUPATIONS EDUCATION PROGRAM

A. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

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1. Objectives:

The program is designed to prepare individuals who are currently licensed, certified, or registered in a health occupation to develop teaching competency skills. The rationale for the development of this program is to provide an opportunity for health professionals who are skilled practitioners to become teachers in health occupations education. Thus, graduates shall be qualified to teach in diversified health occupations education programs in secondary settings and/or in the specialized area of the recognized health occupation license, certificate, or registration in post-secondary settings. The emphasis in the program will be on the application of teaching competencies in health occupations education programs within the context of principles and philosophy of vocational education.

The program is designed with two tracks: (a) Teacher Certification and (b) Professional-Vocational. The Teacher Certification track is designed for those individuals who seek licensure to teach in secondary education institutions. The Professional-Vocational track is designed for those individuals who choose to teach in post-secondary educational institutions and in health facilities where state licensure is not required.

The program is intended to satisfy state needs for teachers in health occupations education, thereby increasing the quantity of health workers in the State as well as increasing the quality of care provided to citizens. The program is based on the career ladder concept quality of care provided to citizens. It should be recognized that the proposed program is based firmly on information gathered from the State Department of Public Instruction; Indiana Health Careers, Inc.; and from individuals who are currently teaching in health occupations education in secondary and post-secondary settings. An underlying guideline is the fundamental purpose of Indiana Health Occupations Education to provide students with an understanding of all health careers and the pertinent information involved in each career. There is a recognition that post-secondary educational institutions are charged with the responsibility for producing qualified graduates within the health careers. There is an understanding that inservice directors and staff fulfill their responsibilities through meeting the personal and occupational needs of personnel in health facilities. Health careers open up other opportunities for interested youth and adults who may not have found an area of employment in which they have experienced personal and career satisfaction.

Currently, there is an 85% occupancy rate in health facilities and an estimate that the need for trained health workers at all levels will continue to rise at a rate of 40% each year. There is a definite need for a program which prepares teachers for health occupations education programs at all levels. Students in secondary education must have the opportunity to investigate health careers to insure a substantial enrollment in health career programs.

The increased utility and diversity of health facilities, the diversification of health occupations, and the demand for more and better health care by citizens require that institutions have sufficient personnel to properly staff the various units. Also, that same staff must be continuously updated in professional and technological advances through quality in-service programs.

Currently, teachers in health occupations education programs in the state hold conditional licenses. The proposed program will allow these teachers an opportunity to complete a standard license requirement, to professionalize that license, and will serve as a basis for advanced education. Thereby, the quality of instruction will be improved with a corresponding improvement in care provided to citizens.

Inservice directors and staff in health facilities usually possess a license to practice in their occupation. Basic educational programs for health professionals do not include teaching competencies in their curriculum. Therefore, the proposed program will allow individuals in health facilities who are responsible for planning and implementing inservice programs to develop teaching skills for a more responsible approach.

The proposed program, designed with two tracks for Teacher Certification and Professional-Vocational, will allow graduates to contribute more effectively toward meeting the extensive health needs of society. The program complements other University programs in the fulfill-ment of the major purpose of the institution to offer each and every student as broad an opportunity for study and the acquisition of knowledge in the many fields, areas, and disciplines offered by the University as his or her ability, interest and talent will allow. Through the University program, individuals will be able to achieve personal enrichment and professional preparedness through the interrelated required and elective courses.

Learning Resources Associated with the Program:

There is a large holding of audio visual materials and library holdings within the University. There is convenient access to such materials in nearby campuses in Indiana and other states. The library subscribes to most major and many related journals in the various fields of health occupations, and the School of Nursing contributes to this area due to the need to support the concept of the health team which is a major aspect of the nursing curriculum. There is concern within the School of Nursing for all health occupations involved in care of clients.

No changes are anticipated in the physical aspect of the School of Nursing as there is ample classroom space and office space for faculty. Support service, such as secretarial and supplies, is available at the present time.

- 3. Admission Requirements and Student Support:
- a. Admission requirements for the Health Occupations Education Program are set forth in TEACH Rules 46-47: "Candidates for the Health Occupations Major must be licensed, certified or registered in a recognized health occupation and must complete the following course work. . . . Credit toward satisfying this requirement may be granted by the degree institution through supervised work experience or occupational experience. Work experience must include two years (4,000 clock hours) of successful employment in a recognized health occupation, or 1,500 clock hours of supervised work in the health field under an approved health occupation teacher training program, or a combination equivalent thereto."

The program admission requirements include two years of experience as stated above. The School of Nursing believes that a skilled practitioner brings to the learning environment valued experience, knowledge, and information which strengthen and support the theoretical knowledge and experience learned in the educational institution.

Students on the All students will participate in supervised teaching experience. Teacher Certification track will follow the same procedure as all University students who desire teaching certificates. Professional-Vocational track students will follow the procedure set forth in the School of Nursing for supervised teaching experience in a post-secondary educational setting or in a health facility.

- 3) Professional education courses include those courses required by the University School of Education for Secondary and All Grade Education:
 - Exploratory Phase (4 hours) from Secondary Education and Educational Psychology. a)
 - Development Phase (8 to 10 hours) from Secondary Education. b)
 - Pre-Service Phase (12 hours) from Secondary Education. c)
- 4) Elective courses included in the Professional-Vocational track provide for the planning, implementing, and evaluating of courses; student performance evaluation; preparation of audio visual materials; and counseling.
- 5) Clinical Internship:

A requirement for entry into the Health Occupations Education Program is that students must have two years work experience in their field following completion of their educational must have two years work experience in their field following completion for the student who educational program. The clinical internship provides an option for the student who has not worked two years prior to seeking entry into the program. The variable course hours (3 to 11 hours) allow the student to receive from 112.5 to 412.5 clock hours of the required experience in a supervised employment situation. It is not expected that the course would be utilized in a supervised to the course would be utilized. the course would be utilized in lieu of the required work experience, but as a means to complete the requirement.

Existing Courses: All courses are offered as part of current programs, except those indicated by asterisks as being new courses.

d. New Courses:

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1) NUHO 290: Clinical Internship in a Health Occupation - 3-11 hours. This course enables students to acquire supervised work experience clock hours in the appropriate health occupations area to fulfill the work experience requirement of the Health Occupations Education Program. Supervision of the experience is coordinated between the employing health professional and the School of Nursing Supervisor. Prerequisite: Licensure, certification, or registration in a health occupation. Approval by Director of the Program.

2) NUHO 391: Methods of Teaching for Vocational-Technical Health Occupations - 2 hours To develop an understanding of educational principles and practices in relation to teaching in specific health occupations. Focus is on the approaches to teaching that represent the practical application of theory and the results of research based on theory. Emphasis is on a model for systematic instruction to guide

instructional planning and change.

3) NUHO 391: Overview of Health Occupations - 3 hours. To develop an understanding of the major types of health careers as interactive systems in a complex health care Focus is on the historical evolutions, educational preparation, and roles of the different health care occupations and professionals. Emphasis is on levels of health care in relation to what may or will happen in the future as society pressures for change.

5. Form of Recognition:

Students who complete the program will be awarded a Bachelor of Science degree. The School of Education has the responsibility of recommending students for all teaching certificates.

Upon satisfactory completion of all baccalaureate degree requirements on a teaching curriculum, the certification officer in the Advisement and Certification Office will be willing to provide an institutional recommendation to an agency making such a request.

University faculty - will be responsible for teaching all other courses in the program.

Consultant - Chief Consultant, Health Occupations Education, Indiana State Department of Public Instruction.

b. New Faculty Positions. There will be no need for new faculty positions.

7. Description of Unusual Program Features:

a. The program is unique in that it has been designed to provide full-time instruction or part-time instruction to individuals in health careers who are employed on a full-time basis. Within a sixty-mile radius of the Terre Haute Campus, there is no other such program. However, we do recognize the Indiana University Health Occupations Education Program in Indiana Program Indiana Indiana Indiana Program Indiana Indian Indianapolis which may somewhat overlap the eastern portion of the Indiana State University service area.

This program is also unique in that it provides a non-licensure teaching tack intended to serve the needs of those students desiring to teach in post-secondary programs only. track emphasizes adult education through the utilization of professional-vocational courses which are presently being taught on the University campus. An example of the two curricula which are presently being taught on the University campus. which are part of this proposal will reveal the two tracks available to the students.

After completing required core courses, students will have the opportunity to choose the specific track which most closely meets their needs. The program delivery system is innovative in that most, if not all, University courses will be provided in the state at locations which will be accessible to the full-time employed, part-time student. Every effort will be made to find instructors in or near the locale of at least ten students for the particular course where it is possible, arrangements will be made for home campus instructors to travel to the location and teach the course(s). The quality of instruction will be maintained through careful selection of the individual instructor(s). The students will receive bona fide University credit for this course(s). Standards required will be comparable to those on the home campus. The same quality of instructional materials will be made available at the extended campus locations; for example, library reference materials, audio visual materials, and handouts. The scheduling of courses will be flexible. It is anticpated that the course will be provided during the evening or weekend (Friday and Saturday). By holding somewaht longer classes, it is possible to reduce the number of weeks necessary to meet course requirements. This also is possible by meeting two nights in succession or a day and a night.

b. Joint Ventures with Other Parties.

The clinical internship course will require that agreements be reached between the University and various health professionals. Students who need clock hours for the work experience requirement will be placed in a work location of their health specialty. Special arrangements will be made between the School of Nursing and that health professional(s) to fulfill the requirements of that experiential learning.

Students enrolled in the Professional-Vocational track will be enrolled in a special internship course in which they will have student teaching experiences in either a post-secondary educational institution or a health facility. The choice for the experience will be based on the future plans and need of the student. This will require that arrangements be reached between the University and various post-secondary educational institutions and health

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Trustees Conference Room, 11th Floor, School of Business on the Terre Haute Campus. Trustees present: Mr. Ainlay, Mr. Brames, Mr. Breeden, Mrs. Fouty, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. Schmelzer, Dr. Siebenmorgen, Mr. Winchell and Mr. Woll. President Landini, President Rice, Vice Presidents Clokey, McKee, Moulton, Truitt and Dr. Hardaway were present. Also attending were Dr. Ford, Vice Chairperson of the Faculty Senate on the Terre Haute Campus, Dr. Shaw, Chairperson of the Faculty Council on the Evansville Campus, Mr. Butler, President of the Terre Haute Campus SGA and Mr. Harrison, President of the Evansville Campus SGA.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Ainlay called the meeting to order at 10:30 A.M.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF MEETING OF JANUARY 9, 1981

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the minutes of January 9, 1981, were approved.

B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

President Landini announced that the date of the next meeting will be April 3, 1981, on the Terre Haute Campus.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Search for Athletic Director

The President stated that the search for an Athletic Director is well underway with five candidates being interviewed on campus this week. It is highly likely that a report to the Board can be expected within another week.

Legislative Matters

There is very little to report in regard to the budget requests of the Institution the President remarked. The House and Senate are attempting to respond to the requests of the various State Budget Agencies, but are handicapped by financial constraints that are in evidence throughout the Contract in evidence throughout the State.

Another matter which has been before the Legislature this session and which is of considerable interest to the Board of Trustees is the Senate Bill requesting separation of ISUE from the management and administrative control of ISU and the Board of Trustees. At present the Bill is in the Senate Finance Committee.

Spring Enrollment

The President reported that the total University enrollment for the 1981 Spring Semester is 15,500, an increase of 4.2% over the 1980 Spring Semester. The Terre Haute Campus enroll ment is 11,467, an increase of 1.7% over the 1980 Spring Semester. Evansville enrollment is up 11.9% with 2,999. He feels these figures attest to the increased importance and viability of the two institutions as expressed by the people of the State of Indiana.

Phi Delta Kappa

At a Founder's Day meeting of Phi Delta Kappa on January 19, Dr. Charles W. Hardaway was inducted into the Hall of Fame. On behalf of himself and the Board, the President expressed congratulations on this very important and prestigious award.

SGA Elections

The Student Government Association recently held elections which resulted in Mark Butler being chosen as President and Montgomery Kleiman being chosen as Vice President. The President expressed his congratulations to the two and has confidence they will do a good job in leading the SGA for the coming year.

Campus Activities

President Landini called on Dr. Hardaway to report on various campus activities. Dr. Hardaway remarked there were three important items that should be entered into the record.

On February 23, the first of the University Speakers Series was held with Dr. James D. Watson, Nobel laureate, speaking on "Scientific Consequences of Recombinant DNA". Juanila Kreps, economist and former Secretary of Commerce, will be the guest speaker of the next Speakers Series, scheduled for the first week in April.

Indiana State University hosted the Third Thursday meeting of the Terre Haute Chamber of Commerce on February 19. J. Robert Dailey, an ISU graduate and present Speaker of the House of Representatives was the guest speaker; President Landini also addressed the meeting.

Professor Emeritus Joe Schick was guest speaker at the annual Founder's Day held on January 21.

D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

Dr. Rice circulated a picture of the new campus signs which have been installed by the Physical Plant, and which add to the beauty of the campus.

Both the men's and women's basketball teams are participating in tournaments with the women advancing in AIAW action playing Butler at Indianapolis. The men's team received a bid prior to the winning of the Great Lakes Conference championship. They will play Western Illinois who has a record of 20-7. ISUE is ranked 8th in the NCAA Division II ratings.

A Telefund will be hosted by ISUE Alumni during the month of March.

He further remarked that enrollment in Continuing Education was 1,400 for the 1980 Fall Semester.

He reported that Dr. Shaw would speak later during the meeting in regard to the decline in real income and compensation of faculty members at ISUE in comparison with salaries at other institutions. (A copy of Dr. Shaw's study was distributed to the Trustees.)

Mr. Ainlay remarked he was pleased at how successful the basketball teams were and on behalf of the Trustees certainly wished them all the best in their tournament endeavors.

1. Grants - Evansville Campus

Ratification of the following grants was recommended.

a. Medical Education Center - 2190

Official notification has been received by Indiana State University Evansville from the Indiana University School of Medicine increasing the authorization for the Evansville Center for Medical Education by \$28,340. This increased authorization has been specifically identified for capital equipment replacement (to purchase a Beckman Model L8-70 Ultracentrifuge). Ratification of the increase was recommended. The increased authorization will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the authorization letter.

b. Pell Grants (BEOG) - 2720

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Indiana State University Evansville has received official notification from the U.S. Department of Education of an increase in the Pell Grant (formerly Basic Educational Opportunity Grant) authorization for fiscal year 1980/81. increase in the program amounts to \$283,840 bringing the total authorization to \$502,800 for the fiscal year. Ratification of the increased authorization was recommended. The increased authorization will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the authorization letter.

c. Pell Grants (BEOG) - 2720

Official notification has been received by Indiana State University Evansville from the U.S. Department of Education increasing the authorization for Pell Grants (formerly Basic Educational Opportunity Grants) by \$6,590. This increased authorization ceiling has been specifically identified as administrative expense reimbursement as provided in the Education Amendments of 1980. Ratification of the increase was recommended. The increased authorization will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the authorization letter.

d. IAC - Visiting Artist - 2785

Indiana State University Evansville has been offered a \$1,000 grant by the Indiana Arts Commission for the period January 1, 1981 to June 30, 1981. The purpose of the award is to provide funding for a series of visiting artists in the Evansville area. Ratification of the grant was recommended. The grant budget will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the approved grant contract.

e. Indiana Title XX Grant - 2786

Indiana State University Evansville has been offered a \$12,135 grant by the Indiana Office of Social Services for the period January 1, 1981 to April 30, 1981. The prupose of the award is to provide funding for a series of seminars and information conferences where needs, priorities of services of Title XX will be evaluated. Ratification of the grant was recommended. The grant budget will be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the approved grant contract.

Mr. Winchell remarked that without prejudging, he would like to move that Items la, lb, lc and ld, Section D, be approved. Mr. Breeden seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Mr. Woll raised the question as to what the Pell Grants were as presented in Item 1b, Section D.

Dr. Rice explained they are simply student financial aid grants that were formerly called the Basic Educational Opportunity Grants. The grants are now labeled the Pell Grants in honor of Congressman Pell who was instrumental in the establishment of the BEOG financial aid program.

Mr. Winchell said he would like to have an explanation of and a justification of the grant as presented in Section D, Item le.

Dr. Rice stated that this is a grant from Title XX of Indiana Social Services to provide for a series of seminars and information conferences to evaluate the needs and priorities of services of Title XX. It is an effort to remove people from welfare and is a pilot project of Cummins Diesel.

Mr. Winchell further inquired as to who was actually doing this research?

Dr. Rice replied the faculty and officers of Continuing Education are conducting the research in an attempt to assess which of the social agencies are really the most helpful.

Mr. Winchell also asked to what office is this information reported?

Dr. Rice replied that the report was made to the State of Indiana Social Services Office.

Mr. Winchell remarked he felt this looked like another study on top of a study.

Dr. Rice stated that under the present budget, Title XX will be cut back by at least 20%.

Mr. Winchell further asked if these studies were being conducted nationwide or just in Indiana?

Dr. Rice said Indiana was rather unique in conducting this program.

Mr. Ainlay inquired of Dr. Rice as to whether he viewed this study as being something really worthwhile?

Dr. Rice replied he feels it is definitely worthwhile as prior expenditures have been allocated for agencies to set up and it is an attempt to actually interview persons on welfare and determine the most helpful of the social services agencies.

On a motion by Mr. Woll, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the grant presented in Section D, Item le, was accepted.

2. Fee Remission Scholarships, New Awards 1980-81 Spring Semester

New awards of academic and athletic scholarships for the 1980-81 Spring Semester are presented in EXHIBIT H. Approval was recommended.

On a motion by Dr. Siebenmorgen, seconded by Mr. Winchell, the recommendation was approved.

E. FEE REMISSION AND OTHER SCHOLARSHIPS - TERRE HAUTE CAMPUS

The new awards of athletic scholarships and grants-in-aid for the 1981 Spring Semester, are presented in EXHIBIT A. Approval was recommended.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommendation was approved.

F. IN MEMORIAM

James D. Acher, past member of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees, passed away on January 21, 1981. A Resolution, EXHIBIT B, was <u>presented</u> for <u>approval</u> of the Board.

Dr. Mark A. Neville, Professor Emeritus of English, passed away on March 2, 1981. A Resolution, EXHIBIT I, was presented for approval.

Dr. Paul D. Wilkinson, Professor Emeritus of Chemistry, passed away on February 27, 1981. A Resolution, EXHIBIT J, was $\underline{\text{presented}}$ $\underline{\text{for}}$ $\underline{\text{approval}}$.

Mr. Ainlay remarked that he and Nancye Mitchell and some of the other Board of Trustees members had been acquainted with Mr. Acher for several years. Mr. Acher was always ready to discuss the background and history of the Institution out of a sense of love for it. He was a very fine man and a good Trustee.

Mr. Breeden stated that Mr. Acher had taken him under his wing as a new Trustee and would second everything Mr. Ainlay had stated about him. He also added that they became very good friends and feels his life is better for having Mr. Acher as his friend. He was truly dedicated to the University and had a knowledge and sensitivity of the University that very few others have. He was a great asset to the Board and a dear friend; he is going to be missed.

Mrs. Fouty remarked that she had the opportunity of having Dr. Neville as an instructor when she was a graduate student in English. She felt he had a good sense of humor with a slight resemblance to Santa Claus; he had an unusual way of relating to people.

Dr. Siebenmorgen stated he felt it was a real honor to read the Memoriam of Dr. Wilkinson who had taught for 42 years. He remarked he had been President of the Student Council at ISU 40 years ago and that Dr. Wilkinson had helped him very much and he attributed his success in medical school to Dr. Wilkinson's help.

President Landini remarked that the history of the Institution had stood on the shoulders of these men, and quoted Sir Isaac Newton in this respect.

The Resolution in memory of Mr. Acher was read by Mrs. Mitchell, the Resolution in memory of Dr. Neville was read by Mrs. Fouty, and the Resolution in memory of Dr. Wilkinson was read by Dr. Siebenmorgen. All resolutions were adopted by unanimous consensus of the Board.

G. REVISED AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PLAN

The original Affirmative Action Plan of Indiana State University was adopted by the Board of Trustees, May 26, 1973. In subsequent years the Federal Government has expanded the concepts and scope of affirmative action to include such elements as Title IX (sex discrimination), the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (handicapped), the Viet Nam Era Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974, the Age Discrimination Employment Act of 1967, as amended and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended (sexual harassment). These additional aspects of affirmative action have necessitated a revision and an updating of our initial Affirmative Action Plan. Also it was deemed advisable to include guidelines for acting appointments and for filling open positions. Some modifications of the grievance procedures were also in order. The Affirmative Action Committee has developed a revised Affirmative Action Plan which incorporates the items stated above. The revised plan has been reviewed by the Vice Presidents and has the support of the various segments University. The revised plan was presented to and acknowledged by the

The revised Affirmative Action Plan of Indiana State University is presented as EXHIBIT D. Approval was recommended.

Mr. Breeden stated he had voiced certain opinions and objections to the Plan in the General Welfare Session and was advised that the wording of the Plan was such due to Federal regulations, but that he is still somewhat reluctant to accepting the wording.

Dr. Rice remarked that the Plan is also in effect for the ISUE Campus.

Mr. Winchell stated he had reservations of the necessity of unreasonable wording of federal bureaucracy but is in entire accord with the spirit of the program.

Mr. Brames remarked that he would be the first to institute an Affirmative Action Plan if one were not already in existence at the Institution but also is a little reluctant to accept the wording of the Plan as presented.

On a motion by Mrs. Fouty, seconded by Mr. Woll, the recommendation was approved.

H. AGREEMENTS

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It was recommended that the Agreements listed below be approved. The contracts are set forth in order that the agencies cited are authorized to provide the services as stipulated in the agreements. These agreements follow the prescribed format and content as approved by University counsel.

1. Covered Bridge Special Education District - EXHIBIT C

An agreement whereby the Covered Bridge Special Education District and its participating school corporations shall locate a program for Seriously Emotionally Disturbed children on the premises of the Indiana State University School, and that said program be integrated into the general instructional operation of Indiana State University School.

2. Indiana University Department of Geology - EXHIBIT E

A revision of an agreement whereby the Indiana University Department of Geology shall allow Indiana State University Department of Geography & Geology students to use their field camp in Montana (originally approved by the Board of Trustees on December 20, 1968).

3. Good Samaritan Hospital, Vincennes, Indiana - EXHIBIT F

A revision of an agreement whereby Good Samaritan Hospital is authorized to provide clinical laboratory practices for Indiana State University medical technology students. (Originally approved by the Board of Trustees on May 18, 1974.)

4. Terre Haute Regional Hospital - EXHIBIT G

An agreement whereby Terre Haute Regional Hospital is authorized to provide a practicum setting for students working in the counseling and mental health field.

Mr. Woll raised the question as to what the Covered Bridge Special Education Program actually is.

President Landini remarked it is a small district of schools in this area.

Mrs. Fouty stated that it is various school districts that bond together to receive state agency funds in the special education field.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the recommendation was approved.

I. AMENDMENTS TO THE FACULTY CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

The following amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Faculty of Indiana State University were proposed to facilitate the efficient operation of the Faculty Senate and the Standing Committees of the Senate:

ARTICLE III, Section 3, (paragraph 3)

Present statement:

Nomination shall close no later than April 10; the election shall be held before the end of April.

Proposed Revision:

Nomination shall close no later than March 10; the election shall be held before the end of March in each year.

2. ARTICLE III, Section 4 (paragraph 3)

Present statement:

The officers of the newly constituted Faculty Senate shall be elected at the first organizational meeting in May (Article IV, Section 1, below).

Proposed revision:

The officers of the newly constituted Faculty Senate shall be elected at the first organizational meeting in April (Article IV, Section 1, below).

3. ARTICLE III, Section 5 (paragraph 2)

Present statement:

The six elected members of the Executive Committee shall be nominated at the May meeting of the newly constituted Faculty Senate, their election to be supervised by the officers of the Faculty Senate as soon as those officers have themselves been elected.

Proposed revision:

The six elected members of the Executive Committee shall be nominated at the April meeting of the newly constituted Faculty Senate, their election to be supervised by the officers of the Faculty Senate as soon as those officers have themselves been elected.

4. ARTICLE IV, Section 1, (paragraph 1)

Present statement:

The newly constituted Faculty Senate shall hold its first meeting in May; the sole purpose of this meeting will be the election of officers and other members of the Executive Committee. The newly constituted Faculty Senate and its committees, appointed in the summer and confirmed at the first meeting of the Faculty Senate in the new academic year shall begin functioning with the opening of the academic year.

Proposed revision:

The newly constituted Faculty Senate shall hold its first meeting in April; the sole purpose of this meeting will be the election of officers and nomination of members of the Executive Committee. The newly constituted Faculty Senate and its committees, confirmed at the first meeting of the Faculty Senate in the new academic year, shall begin functioning with the opening of the academic year.

5. BYLAWS, I. STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY SENATE (paragraph 3)

Present statement:

Terms of service for these faculty members shall begin with the academic year in September; appointments shall be announced before the end of the preceding spring term.

Proposed revision:

Terms of service for these faculty members shall begin with the academic year. Appointments shall be announced upon Senate confirmation at the first meeting of the Faculty Senate in the new academic year.

The proposed revisions to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Faculty were approved unanimously by the Faculty Senate on January 22, 1981, and by University Faculty vote on February 10, 1981. Approval of the proposed amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Indiana State University Faculty was recommended.

Dr. Ford stated that the revisions were simply to adapt to the early calendar which is presently followed by the University.

On a motion by Dr. Siebenmorgen, seconded by Mr. Brames, the recommendation was approved.

J. GRANTS - TERRE HAUTE CAMPUS

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Ratification of the following grants was recommended:

1. Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program - Fund No. 2185

Official Authorization Letter dated January 30, 1981, Document No. P008101534, has been received from the Department of Education increasing the authorization \$1,507,134.00 making the total amount of \$3,122,724.00 available for Basic Educational Opportunity Grants for the period from July 1, 1980 through June 30, 1981. Authorization has also been received under Document No. R008101534 for \$34,090.00 representing administrative allowance for 1979-80. It was recommended that the additional amounts be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant awards.

2. National Science Foundation - Fund No. 2226-65

Grant No. DEB-8021321 has been received from the National Science Foundation in the amount of \$37,000.00 for the support of the research project entitled "Thermoregulatory Physiological Ecology and Microclimate" under the direction of Dr. George S. Bakken, Associate Professor of Life Sciences, for the period from February 15, 1981, through July 31, 1982. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

3. Indiana Arts Commission Convocation Grant - Fund No. 2553

Grant Agreement No. 81-0617-TH-065 has been received from the Indiana Arts Commission in the additional amount of \$3,945.00 for the Long Wharf Theatre Residency under the direction of Dr. Paul Burns, Academic Services, for the period from January 1, 1981, through June 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

4. Indiana Arts Commission Convocation Grant - Fund No. 2553

Check No. 355743 has been received from the University of Illinois in the amount of \$5,440.00 representing Indiana State University's share of an NEA grant for support of the Long Wharf Theatre Tour under the direction of Dr. Paul Burns, Academic Services, for the period from January 19, 1981 through January 21, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

5. Terre Haute Medical Education Foundation Executive Secretary Fund - Fund No. 2629

Letter award dated January 21, 1981, has been received from the Terre Haute Medical Education Foundation, Inc., in the amount of \$2,133.00 to support the services of an executive secretary of said foundation under the direction of Mr. Frank Shelton, Treasurer of the Foundation, for the period from Decemberl, 1980 through November 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

6. Bio-Response, Inc., Research Contract - Fund No. 2643

Letter Award dated January 9, 1981, has been received from Bio-Response, Inc., in the additional amount of \$3,739.00 making the total amount \$69,409.00 to continue the research project entitled "Preparation and Properties of Lymphocyte-Plasmacytoma Hybrids (Hybridomas)" under the direction of Dr. Joseph Albright, Professor of Life Sciences, for the period from April 1, 1980 through May 31, 1981. It was recommended that the total additional budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the contract.

Purchase Order No. P-80611100 has been received from the Indiana Department of Public Instruction in the amount of \$6,000.00 to conduct an instructional program in motorcycle safety and prepare instructors to meet the minimum standards of the Motorcycle Safety Foundation and the State of Indiana under the direction of Dr. Walter W. Gray, Director of the Driver and Traffic Safety Instructional Demonstration Center for the period from January 1, 1981 through May 31, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the purchase order.

8. Naval Weapons Support Center Research Grant - Fund No. 2686

Purchase Order No. N00164-81-M-0304 has been received from the Naval Weapons Support Center, Crane, Indiana, in the amount of \$6,732.00 to support the use of Cobalt 60 source under the direction of Dr. John Swez, Professor of Physics, for the period from November 1, 1980 through September 30, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the purchase order.

9. Jeffersonville/Mitchell, Indiana Credit-based Head Start Training Grant - Fund No. 2687

Letter Agreement dated December 4, 1980, has been received from the Hoosier Uplands
Economic Development Corp., and the Clark County Community Action Agency in the amount
of \$4,500.00 to provide credit-based in-service instruction for the Head Start teachers
and teacher-aides under the direction of Dr. Jan McCarthy, Dept. of Elementary Education
for the period from December 1, 1980 through May 31, 1981. The University will waive the
tuition charges for these credit courses. It was recommended that the total budget be
appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter agreement.

10. Voc.-Tech. Program Improvement Equipment for Assoc. Degree Nursing Grant - Fund No. 2684

Letter Award dated September 2, 1980, has been received from the Indiana State Board of Vocational and Technical Education in the amount of \$3,949.00 to support the quality improvement of equipment for the Associate Degree of Nursing under the direction of Mrs. Nina Sharrard for the period from September 2, 1980, through June 30, 1981. Matching funds will be provided by the School of Nursing budget. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

11. Voc.-Tech. Educational Instructional Materials Revolving Fund - Fund No. 2238

Letter dated August 20, 1980, was received from the Indiana State Board of Vocational and Technical Education stating that the Indiana Curriculum Materials Center funding for 1980-81 would not be approved and that said project would end on October 31, 1980. As a result of the termination of this project, the Educational Instructional Materials Revolving Fund was also terminated. The State Board of Vocational and Technical Education has authorized the close out of the Revolving Fund in the amount of \$38,799.58 to be transferred to Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana.

Mr. Woll raised the questions in regard to Grant #11 as to why these funds were transferred to Indiana University.

Vice President Clokey remarked that there were several dimensions to this action. The State Vocational Board has had for some time located the curriculum materials center on our campus. The center was mostly for the benefit of the State Vocational Board and that ISU merely housed it. He stated that he was not in disagreement that it be moved to I.U.

Sr. Vice President Moulton remarked that ISU did not have the space to provide for the Center any longer, now with the Technology construction in progress.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the ratification was approved.

WHEREAS, Mr. Acher was one of the original members of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees and served on the Board for sixteen years, 1961-1977, serving as President during 1964-65 and 1968-69, Vice President during 1963-64, 1967-68 and 1976-77 and Assistant Secretary during 1965-67, and during 1966-67; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Acher was deeply interested in the progress and activities and in advancing the development of Indiana State University and gave generously of his time and wise counsel to the conduct of the affairs of the Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, the members of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees, the administration and faculty of Indiana State University have lost an esteemed and loyal friend whose cooperation and contributions have been an inspiration to all;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Indiana State University Board of Trustees and the faculty and administration of Indiana State University, extend to the family of James D. Acher their most sincere sympathy and condolence at his passing and that they further express their gratitude and appreciation for the years of service and support which he gave to Indiana State University; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution be spread on the records of the minutes of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees, and a copy thereof be duly executed and transmitted to the family of James D. Acher.

> SECTION I, EXHIBIT C March 6, 1981

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

BETWEEN, The Covered Bridge Special Education District and its participating school corporations and The Indiana State University School, and Indiana State University.

WHEREAS, an opportunity now exists for cooperative action which would be of mutual benefit to the goals of the above mentioned legal entities.

THEREFORE, it is recommended that the Covered Bridge Special Education District locate a program for Seriously Emotionally Disturbed children on the premises of the Indiana State University School, and that said program be integrated into the general instructional operation of Indiana State University School.

- CONDITIONS: 1. All costs associated with teacher(s), aide(s), transportation and materials will be the responsibility of the CBSED and/or its participating school corporation.
 - 2. ISUS will provide adequate and appropriate classroom space, including furniture.
 - 3. ISUS will provide adequate and appropriate supervision of the program on a day-to-day basis in keeping with those duties and responsibilities normally associated with the building principal.
 - 4. Teacher evaluation shall be in accordance with policies established by the Vigo County School Corporation Board of School Trustees.
 - 5. Teacher rights and responsibilities shall be those established by the Master Contract in effect in VCSC between the VCSC and the sole bargaining agent for the educational employees of VCSC.
 - 6. Assignment of children to this program on either a part-time or full-time basis shall be the responsibility of the CBSED.
 - 7. Selection of Staff shall be the responsibility of CBSED and/or its participating corporations, subject to the approval of the Director, ISUS.
 - 8. CBSED retains the right to reassign and/or relocate staff or program in the best interests of the total program of instruction existant within CBSED.
 - 9. ISUS retains the right to effect the dismissal, reassignment or relocation of any personnel associated with this program should their performance be considered detrimental to the children or instructional program of ISUS. Such dismissal, reassignment or relocation of staff will be conducted according to the policies, procedures and agreements established by CBSED and/or its participating school corporations.
 - 10. Any funds generated by children placed in this program from outside the attendance district of ISUS shall be assigned to the child's corporation of residence or the CBSED, determination of question shall be the responsibility of the CBSED Board of Directors.
 - 11. Access to the program shall be made available to ISUS and ISU staff and ISU students. Such access shall be in accordance with the guidelines established by ISU and ISUS, with advance review and approval of CBSED.

- 12. Any proposed experimentation involving this program, teacher(s), aide(s), or students must be approved in advance by ISU, ISUS, CBSED and VCSC, and conducted within the guidelines established by same.
- 13. No actions may be initiated which are in conflict with P.L. 94-142 and/or Indiana Rule S-1.

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y staff e. lines este The ISUS and ISU, having vested interests in the training of University students to become competent teachers, administrators, researchers, and theorists; the development and furtherance of educational theory and technique; and the enhancement of the educations of the elementary and secondary pupils entrusted to their care, will have access to, under the conditions previously outlined, a program for children having unique handicaps of growing educational psychological, and social concern.

The CBSED and its participating school corporations, having a vested interest in improving the quality of instruction, and providing appropriate program alternatives at minimal or no additional cost, should be able to capitalize on the expertise of the ISUS and ISU staff and additionally capture the benefit of an additional program alternative.

DURATION:

This Memorandum of Understanding shall be considered in effect during the second semester of the school year 1980-81 and each successive semester thereafter unless terminated according to the provisions established under Termination below.

TERMINATION:

The cooperative relationship established by this Memorandum of Understanding may be terminated by any of the cooperative parties by providing written notice of intent to terminate to all cooperating parties. The effective date of termination shall be set out in the notice of intent to terminate. Such effective termination date shall not be established as a date within a given semester unless mutually agreeable to all parties. Notice of intent to terminate must be received by all parties 30 days prior to the effective termination date. Unless otherwise mutually agreed upon, effective termination dates shall always fall between the last school day of a given school year and 30 days before the beginning of the successive school year, or, between the last day of the first semester of a given school year and the first day of the second semester in that school year, provided the 30 day notice requirement has been met.

AMENDMENTS:

Any amendments to this memorandum may be proposed by any of the cooperating parties in the following manner.

- 1. Amendments may be proposed at any time by submitting such amendments to all cooperating parties.
- Cooperating parties shall have 60 days from date of mailing in which to approve or reject such proposed amendments.
- 3. Approval or rejection of such proposed amendments shall be made in writing.
- 4. Failure to respond in writing, either approval or rejection of such proposed amendments, within the 60 day time period shall constitute rejection of the proposal.

AFFIRMATION OF POLICY

Indiana State University is unequivocally pledged to principles of nondiscrimination, assuming fair and equitable treatment of all persons. The University has given assurance of compliance with national, state, and local civil rights legislation and enactments.

Indiana State University reaffirms its present policy of nondiscrimination and equal employment opportunity with respect to recruitment, hiring, training, promotion, and treatment of persons in all organizations, services, and programs under the legal control of the Trustees of Indiana State University which shall be maintained on a nondiscriminatory basis in regard to race, sex, religion, handicap, age, or national origin at all times.

Indiana State University will continue to take positive actions to ensure against discrimination directed to all persons. All members of the faculty and staff are expected to give full support to the University's commitment to equal opportunity and affirmative action.

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees has assigned to the President of the University the responsibility for the development and implementation of the equal opportunity policy and the Affirmative Action Plan. Specific authority and responsibility are delegated by the President as follows:

- 1. The Director of Affirmative Action is responsible for the University's overall compliance with Executive Orders 11246, 11375, Titles VI and VII of the Civil Rights Act, Title IX of the Higher Education Act of 1972, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Viet Nam Era Veteran's Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974, and the Age Discrimination Employment Act of 1967 as amended.

DISSEMINATION OF UNIVERSITY POLICY

- 1. The Affirmative Action Plan will be announced to all members of the University community.
- Relevant portions of the University Affirmative Action Plan will be included in the policy handbooks for faculty and staff and the <u>Student Handbook</u>.
- 3. Periodic reports concerning the implementation of the Affirmative Action Plan will be disseminated to the University faculty, staff, and students through such publications as the <u>University Handbook</u>, the <u>Indiana Statesman</u>, the <u>University Bulletin</u>, Student <u>Handbook</u>, and other relevant publications.
- 4. The "Equal Opportunity and Affirmative Action Employer" clause will be included in official University publications.
- 5. Special meetings will be conducted with all supervisory personnel, faculty, and staff to explain the intent of the University's affirmative action policy.
- All persons involved in recruiting will be informed verbally and in writing of the University's Affirmative Action Program, and these persons will be directed to recruit minorities and women actively.
- Periodic meetings will be conducted with faculty and staff supervisory personnel to discuss equal employment issues or changes in policy.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR ADMINISTERING AND IMPLEMENTING THE UNIVERSITY'S AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PLAN

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees has assigned to the President of the University the responsibility for the development and implementation of the equal opportunity policy and the Affirmative Action Plan. Specific authority and responsibility are delegated by the President as follows:

- 1. The Director of Affirmative Action is responsible for the University's overall compliance with Executive Orders 11246, 11375, Titles VI and VII of the Civil Rights Act, Title IX of the Higher Education Act of 1972, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, theViet Nam Era Veteran's Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974, and the Age Discrimination Employment Act of 1967 as amended.
- 2. Consistent with the University's administrative organizational structure, the Vice Presidents will assume direct responsibility for compliance with the Affirmative Action Plan by all personnel in their administrative areas.
- 3. All faculty, staff, and administration are responsible to the heads of their departments for the implementation of the Affirmative Action Plan.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DIRECTOR OF AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

- 1. Serve as chairperson of the Affirmative Action Committee.
- 2. With the counsel and assistance of the Affirmative Action Committee the Director will develop policy statements, new programs, and means of communication concerning the Affirmative Action Plan, subject to the approval of the President and the Board of Trustees.
- 3. Identify problem areas.
- 4. Assist persons who have concerns about discrimination.
- 5. Assist supervisors in arriving at solutions to problems relative to Affirmative Action.
- 6. Develop auditing and monitoring systems which will determine the effectiveness of the University's Affirmative Action Plan. These studies will include salaries, fringe benefits, promotions, and other areas in which discrimination may occur.
- 7. Serve as a liaison between the University and governmental and community agencies.
- 8. Inform the administrative heads and supervisory personnel of the latest developments in all equal employment opportunity areas such as recruitment, training, and job classification.
- 9. Issue a report on December 1 to the President (and Board of Trustees) evaluating the progress and effectiveness of the Affirmative Action Program.
- 10. Initiate and conduct investigations of any alleged or suspected discrimination against students, faculty, staff, or administrators.
- 11. Recommend to the President upon completion of such investigations, steps to be taken or a course of action to be followed to resolve, conciliate, or adjudicate problems.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION COMMITTEE

The Affirmative Action Committee is appointed by the President of the University. The Committee will be comprised of seven members with no fewer than three from the academic areas and three from staff and administrative positions. In addition the Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs, the Director of Personnel Administration, and a student appointed by the President of the Student Government Association will serve as an ex-officio member on an annual appointment. The President will give consideration to maintaining a proportionate number of minorities and women on this Committee. All appointments are for three-year terms. The appointments are effective September 1 of each year. Members may be reappointed by the President, but no persons shall serve more than two consecutive, three-year terms.

The function of the Affirmative Action Committee is to assist the Director of Affirmative Action in all areas of responsibility including the review of the Affirmative Action Plan, implementation of its policies, and conducting studies and investigations related to the improvement and strengthening of the Plan.

PROBLEM AREAS TO BE MONITORED

Studies will be made of the following:

- Ethnic/racial, handicap, and sex composition of the faculty, staff, administration, and student body.
- 2. Ethnic/racial, handicap, and sex composition of the job applicant flow.
- 3. Total employment selection process including recruitment, position descriptions, application forms, interviews, and final selection procedures.
- 4. Decisions pertaining to promotions and tenure.
- 5. University sponsored employee benefit programs.
- 6. Salaries.
- 7. Opportunities for self improvement.
- 8. Areas of student concerns as listed in the section under Goals for Students.

AVAILABILITY AND UTILIZATION ANALYSIS

In determining whether women and minorities are being underutilized, the Director of Affirmative Action will consider at least the following factors:

- 1. The present percentage of women and minorities in faculty, staff, and administrative positions.
- 2. The availability of women, handicapped, and minorities within the University, the community, and nation to fill positions in academic, staff, and administrative positions.
- 3. The degree of training which the University is reasonably able to undertake as a means of making more job classes available to women and minorities.
- 4. A study of the current job assignments of women, minorities, and the handicapped.

INTERNAL AUDIT AND REPORTING SYSTEM

The Director of Affirmative Action is responsible for monitoring job applications, placements, transfers, promotions, terminations, operating budgets, salaries, and fringe benefits at all levels to ensure that the University's nondiscriminatory policy is carried out.

The Vice Presidents will require annual reports from administrative heads to determine progress toward goals and timetable. Copies of these reports will be forwarded to the Affirmative Action Office.

The Director of the Affirmative Action Program will submit an annual report on December 1 $^{\rm to}$ the President on the effectiveness of the program and make recommendations to improve any unsatisfactory areas.

Reasons for leaving a position in the University will be requested by the Office of the Director of Personnel Administration or the appropriate Vice President's Office to determine problems in policies and reasons for employees leaving the University.

GOALS ADMINISTRATIVE POSITIONS

Goals cited here are relative to administrative positions* in the areas of Academic Affairs, Business Affairs, Student Affairs, and Development and Public Affairs.

 The University will have a percentage of women employed in administrative positions in Academic Affairs, Business Affairs, Student Affairs, and Development and Public Affairs at least comparable to the percentage of women who are being prepared at the national level for specific positions.

*Administrative personnel are those on fiscal year salary who do not hold academic rank and work in such areas as accounting, placement, computer technology, admissions, student life, and alumni affairs.

- The University will have a percentage of minorities employed in administrative positions in Academic Affairs, Business Affairs, Student Affairs, and Development and Public Affairs at least comparable to the percentage of minorities who are being prepared at the national level for specific positions.
- 3. The University will determine salaries, promotions, and fringe benefits without regard to sex, race, religion, age, handicap or national origin.
- The University will, whenever possible, continue to make available opportunities for professional growth and improvement of job skills for employees through formal courses, workshops, and on-the-job training without regard to sex, race, religion, age, handicap, or national origin.
- The University will ensure that job titles, work assignments, and working conditions are determined without regard to race, sex, religion, age, or national origin.
- The University will ensure that all federal regulations regarding the employment of handicapped persons and Viet Nam veterans will be observed.

GOALS FACULTY

Goals cited here are relative to all University positions that carry faculty status:

- 1. Indiana State University will have a percentage of women faculty members in each department at least comparable to the percentage of women being prepared at the national level with terminal degrees as defined by each discipline.
- The University will have a percentage of minorities in each department at least comparable to those being prepared at the national level with terminal degrees as defined by each discipline.
- з. The University will make a concerted effort to recruit women and minorities with terminal degrees or those who are actively pursuing them.
- The University will increase the percentage of women and minorities at all levels of ч. academic administrative positions at least in proportion to the percentage of women and minorities in higher education.
- The University will determine salaries, promotions, and fringe benefits without regard to 5. sex, race, religion, age, handicap, or national origin.
- 6. The University will make available opportunities for professional growth such as leaves of absence, attendance at workshops, and conferences for faculty without regard to sex, race, religion, age, handicap, or national origin.
- 7. The University will ensure that teaching, research, and administrative assignments are made without regard to sex, race, religion, age, handicap, or national origin.
- The University will ensure that all federal regulations regarding the employment of handicapped persons and Viet Nam veterans will be observed.

GOALS

Soals cited here are relative to staff positions.

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- 1. The University will have a percentage of women employed in each area at least comparable to the percentage of women in the employment market in Vigo County.
- The University will have a percentage of minorities in each area at least comparable to the percentage of minorities in Vigo County.
- The University will have a percentage of women and minorities at all levels of supervisory з. positions at least in proportion to the percentage of women and minorities employed at Indiana State University.
- The University will determine salaries, promotions, and fringe benefits without regard to sex, race, religion, age, handicap or national origin.
- The University will make available opportunities for improvement of job skills such as formal courses, workshops, and on-the-job training for employees without regard to race, sex, religion, age, handicap, or national origin.

- 6. The University will ensure that job titles, work assignments, and working conditions are determined without regard to race, sex, religion, age, or national origin.
- 7. The University will ensure that all federal regulations regarding the employment of handicapped persons, disabled and Viet Nam veterans will be observed.

GOALS STUDENTS

- 1. Indiana State University will actively recruit women and minority students at both the graduate and undergraduate levels.
- 2. The University will ensure that requirements for admissions to the University at both the undergraduate and graduate levels do not restrict the admission of capable students.
- 3. The University will ensure that policies and regulations do not discriminate against students on the basis of sex, race, religion, age, handicap, or national origin in at least the following areas:
 - a. Admissions
 - b. Financial Aid
 - c. University Housing
 - e. Use of Pacilities
 - f. Curricular content and programs
 - g. Student Life programs
 - h. Academic requirements
 - i. Student health services
 - j. Athletic programs
 - k. Student employment
 - 1. Placement

Approved exceptions to this policy include such things as the assignment of members of the same sex to a room in a residence hall, separate restroom facilities for men and women, organizations designed for members of one sex (i.e., fraternities, sororities), organizations whose members share a common religious belief, or organizations designed for students whose national origin is outside the United States (i.e., International Student Association.)

- 4. Students will be appointed to all committees of Affirmative Action Committee which have to do with investigations of student concerns as cited in paragraph 3.
- 5. The University will ensure that all federal regulations regarding the Admissions and the employment of handicapped persons and Viet Nam Veterans will be observed.

ACTIONS TO MEET AFFIRMATIVE ACTION GOALS ADMINISTRATIVE POSITIONS

- 1. All vacancies and new positions in administration will be published in the <u>University</u>

 <u>Bulletin</u> by the appropriate vice president. The positions will not be filled for a period of 30 days from publication unless approval is granted by the Director of Affirmative Action.
- 2. Recruiting procedures will involve all possible professional means of reaching qualified candidates. These will include professional societies, journals, and especially organizations with records of women and minority candidates. The statement "Indiana State University is an Affirmative Action/Equal Opportunity Employer" will be included in recruiting notices.
- 3. Members of the administrative staff will be represented on University committees which have responsibilities that affect them. Women and minorities should have representation at least proportionate to the number of women and minorities employed as administrators in that unit.
- 4. A continuous review of salaries will be conducted to determine inequities. Inequities identified due to sex, race, religion, age, handicap, or national origin will be corrected as soon as they are verified by the President of the University and the Board of Trustees.
- 5. Those heading any unit employing administrators shall submit salary equity studies annually to their supervisors who will do similar studies. The process would continue to the level of the appropriate Vice president who will submit an overall salary equity study to the President and to the Director of Affirmative Action.
- 6. Fringe benefits for administrative personnel will be analyzed by the Director of Affirmative Action and the appropriate vice presidents to ensure that discrimination is not taking place.

- 7. Department heads, vice presidents, the Director of Affirmative Action, and the Affirmative Action Committee will study the job titles and descriptions in administrative areas to ensure that discrimination is not occurring.
- 8. Good faith efforts will be made by the vice presidents, department heads, Director of Personnel Administration, Director of Affirmative Action, and other employing officials to increase the number of qualified women and minorities in administrative positions by seeking and encouraging such individuals to apply for available positions.
- 9. The Director of Affirmative Action and the vice presidents will be responsible for preventing discrimination from being practiced by any department head or person with responsibility for employing persons. They will review and approve recruitment plans and selection procedures prior to their implementation. Before any position is offered, the appropriate vice president and the Director of Affirmative Action will review the employment recommendations to insure equal opportunities were given to women and minorities.
- 10. Each administrator will encourage persons in his or her areas to continue their education through appropriate workshops, in-service training, and formal courses.
- 11. The vice presidents will maintain statistics on job applicants by sex, race and ethnicity.
- 12. The vice presidents will ensure that exit interviews are conducted with all employees who leave or are terminated to determine the cause for such action.
- 13. Administrative employees who believe they have been discriminated against on the basis of sex, race, religion, age, handicap, or national origin may appeal through procedures outlined in Exhibit A.
- 14. Acting appointments to administrative positions should be made in accordance with the Guidelines for Acting Appointments which appear in Exhibit B.
- 15. A rationale for restructuring units which results in a change in the number of positions of a different level of positions must be presented to the Director of Affirmative Action prior to the implementation of such restructuring.
- 16. All copies for advertisements relating to position vacancies will be reviewed and approved by the Director of Affirmative Action to ensure compliance with the Affirmative Action guidelines.
- 17. Women and minorities will be represented on administrative search committees and involved in the screening of administrators within each area. If no persons or minority groups are in the area such persons shall be invited from other areas to participate in the screening process.
- 18. Administrators must make available to their immediate supervisor and to the Director of Affirmative Action the criteria for salary recommendations.

ACTIONS TO MEET AFFIRMATIVE ACTION GOALS FACULTY

- 1. Each department will report annually to the Director of Affirmative Action on the composition of its faculty by sex, race, and national origin.
- 2. Each department shall present annually to the Director of Affirmative Action its plans for fostering the concept of Affirmative Action.
- 3. Each department will submit its composition reports and plans to the Dean of the School, Vice President for Academic Affairs and the Director of Affirmative Action.
- 4. All new and vacant faculty and administrative positions with faculty rank will be listed in the University Bulletin as soon as confirmed by the President or appropriate vice president. The position will not be filled for at least 30 days from the day of publication in the <u>University</u> Bulletin.
- 5. Recruiting procedures will involve all possible professional means of reaching qualified candidates. These will include professional societies, journals, and especially organizations with records of women and minority candidates. The statement "Indiana State University is an Affirmative Action/Euqal Opportunity Employer"will be included in recruiting notices.
- 6. Women and minorities will be represented on faculty search committees and involved in the screening of faculty within departments. If no women or persons of minority groups are in the department, such persons shall be invited from other disciplines to participate in the screening process.

- 7. The Vice President for Academic Affairs, deans, chairpersons, and the Director of Affirmative Action will ensure that women and minorities are actively recruited for faculty and administrative positions in academic areas.
- 8. The Director of Affirmative Action and the Vice President for Academic Affairs will be responsible for preventing discrimination by any dean or department chairperson. They will review and approve recruitment plans and selection procedures prior to their implementation. Before any position is offered, the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Director of Affirmative Action will review the employment recommendations to ensure equal opportunities were given to women and minorities.
- 9. All University publications will be analyzed by the Director of Publications to ensure that discrimination is not being fostered through references to job classifications by sex.
- 10. All copy for advertisements relating to position vacancies will be reviewed and approved by the Director of Affirmative Action to ensure compliance with Affirmative Action guidelines.
- 11. Chairpersons must make available to the dean of the school, Vice President for Academic Affairs, and the Director of Affirmative Action the criteria for salary recommendations.
- 12. An annual review of salaries inititated by department chairpersons will be conducted to determine possible inequities due to sex, race, religion, handicap, age, or national origin. Department chairpersons shall submit salary equity studies annually to the deans who will do similar studies. The Vice President for Academic Affairs will submit an overall salary equity study to the Director of Affirmative Action. Inequities will be corrected as soon as they are verified by the President of the University and the Board of Trustees.
- 13. Promotion, leaves, and tenure data will be analyzed annually by the Director of Affirmative Action and the Affirmative Action Committee.
- 14. Faculty members who believe they have been discriminated against on the basis of race, sex, religion, age, handicap, or national origin may appeal through procedures outlined in Exhibit A of the Affirmative Action Plan.
- 15. Acting appointments to administrative positions will be made in accordance with the Guidelines for Acting Appointments shown in Exhibit B of the Affirmative Action Plan.
- 16. A rationale for restructuring units which results in a change in the number of positions or a different level of positions must be presented to the Director of Affirmative Action prior to the implementation of such restructuring.
- 17. Fringe benefits for faculty will be analyzed by the Director of Affirmative Action and the Vice President for Academic Affairs to ensure that discrimination is not taking place.

ACTIONS TO MEET AFFIRMATIVE ACTION GOALS STAFF POSITIONS

- 1. All vacant and new staff positions will be listed by the Director of Personnel Administration in the University Bulletin. Persons will have at least three days from the date of publication to apply for such positions.
- 2. The Director of Personnel Administration will maintain current statistics as to the numbers of women and minorities by job classifications.
- 3. The Director of Personnel Administration will maintain statistics on job applicants and the disposition of them by sex, race, and ethnicity.
- 4. The Director of Personnel Administration and the Director of Affirmative Action will work with department heads and employing officials to encourage greater utilization of minorities and women.
- 5. Promotion practices will be analyzed annually by the Vice President for Business Affairs, Director of Personnel Administration, and the Director of Affirmative Action to ensure that women and minorities are given equal opportunity for such promotions. Promotion criteria will be established by the Director of Personnel Administration and reviewed by the Director of Affirmative Action.
- 6. The Director of Personnel Administration and the Director of Affirmative Action will work with local high school counselors and leaders of the black community to encourage greater numbers of applicants for positions at the University.
- 7. The Director of Personnel Administration will secure exit information from all staff employees who leave or who are terminated to determine the cause for such action. Monthly reports will be made to the Director of Affirmative Action.

- 8. The Director of Personnel Administration will analyze annually all job titles and descriptions to ensure that discrimination is not occurring as to salary or working conditions. The report will be submitted to the Director of Affirmative Action.
- 9. Weekly announcements of services and positions available through the Personnel Office will be made in the local newspapers. A list of positions available will be posted in the Personnel Office for review by any applicant.
- 10. A Staff Development Committee will be established by the Director of Personnel Administration and the Director of Affirmative Action to develop plans for improving the promotion opportunities of the staff through training and educational programs.
- 11. The Director of Personnel Administration and the Director of Affirmative Action will annually review all screening procedures to ensure that minorities and women are not discriminated against. Attention will be given to such things as application forms, interviews, tests, and letters of recommendation.
- 12. The work force in the Terre Haute area will be studied by the Director of Affirmative Action and the Director of Personnel Administration to determine the available numbers of minority groups and women who are available to work.
- 13. Demotions, layoffs, recall following layoffs, and transfers will be made in accordance with University practice and in terms of applicable Union agreements.
- 14. An annual review of salaries will be conducted by department heads, Director of Personnel, Vice President for Business Affairs, and Director of Affirmative Action to determine inequities. Inequities due to sex, race, religion, age, handicap, or national origin will be corrected as they are verified by the President of the University and the Board of Trustees.
- 15. Fringe benefits will be analyzed by the Director of Affirmative Action and the Affirmative Action Committee to ensure that discrimination is not taking place against any person due to sex, race, religion, age, handicap, or national origin.
- 16. Members of the staff will be represented on University committees which directly affect them. Women and minorities will have representation on such committees proportionate to their employment at the University.
- 17. The Vice President for Business Affairs, the Director of Personnel Administration, and the Director of Affirmative Action will ensure that discrimination is not practiced by any department head or person with responsibility for employing persons. They will study all recommendations for positions to determine that women and persons of minority groups are given an equal opportunity for employment or promotion. A summary of likely activities will be included with the recommendation for appointment. A justification of appointment will accompany each recommendation for appointment.
- 18. Criteria used in recommendations for merit increases will be examined by the Vice President for Business Affairs, Director of Personnel Administration, and the Director of Affirmative Action to ensure that discrimination is not occurring in a department.
- 19. Employees in staff positions who believe they have been discriminated against on the basis of sex, race, religion, age, handicap, or national origin may appeal according to the grievance procedure explained in the Affirmative Action Plan, Exhibit A.
- 20. Acting appointments to staff positions will be made in accordance with the Guidelines for Acting Appointments indicated in the Affirmative Action Plan, Exhibit B.
- 21. A rationale for restructuring units which results in fewer positions or a different level of positions must be presented to the Director of Affirmative Action prior to the implementation of such restructuring.

ACTIONS TO MEET AFFIRMATIVE ACTION GOALS STUDENTS

- 1. The personnel from the Office of Admissions and University-High School Relations will make special efforts to visit schools where enrollment is primarily that of minorities.
- 2. Department chairpersons will, as part of their recruiting program, make concerted efforts to recruit additional women and minorities for graduate programs.
- 3. Academic departments will submit annual reports in September to the Director of Affirmative Action of recruiting, interviews, and awarding of fellowships and assistantships.
- 4. Persons responsible for the student areas listed in the <u>Goals</u> for <u>Students</u> will make annual reports in September to the Director of Affirmative Action.

- 5. The Affirmative Action Committee will support the work of the Human Relations Commission as the Commission endeavors to prevent discrimination against students.
- 6. Annually the Affirmative Action Committee will request the administration and the Student Government Association to appoint to committees proportionate numbers of women and minority students.
- 7. The statement "Women and minorities are encouraged to apply" will be included in departmental brochures.
- 8. Students who believe they have been discriminated against on the basis of sex, race, religion, age, handicap, or national origin may appeal through procedures outlined in the Affirmative Action Plan, Exhibit A.

Confidentiality of Information

Information obtained concerning an individual's medical condition or history shall be kept confidential, except that (1) supervisors and managers may be informed regarding restrictions on the work or duties of handicapped individuals and regarding necessary accommodation, (2) first aid and safety personnel may be informed where appropriate, if the condition might require emergency treatment, and (3) government officials investigating compliance with the Acts shall be provided relevant information upon request.

Participation

Any disabled veteran, veteran of the Vietnam Era, or handicapped individual who feels he/she is eligible and would like to be considered under this affirmative action plan is asked to identify himself/herself to the Office of Personnel Administration or the Affirmative Action Office.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PLAN FOR DISABLED VETERANS, VETERANS OF THE VIETNAM ERA, AND HANDICAPPED PERSONS

*

Indiana State University is a government contractor subject to (1) Section 402 of the Vietnam Era Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974, which requires government contractors to take affirmative action to employ and to advance in employment qualified disabled veterans and veterans of the Vietnam Era, and (2) to take affirmative action to employ and to advance in employment qualified handicapped individuals.

Eligibility for Coverage

For purposes of affirmative action, a disabled veteran, a veteran of the Vietnam Era, and a handicapped individual are defined as follows:

A <u>disabled veteran</u> is . . . a person entitled to disability compensation under laws administered by the Veterans Administration for a disability rated at 30 percent or more, or a person whose discharge or release from active duty was for a disability incurred or aggravated in the line of duty.

A veteran of the Vietnam Era is . . . a person (1) who served on active duty for a period of more than 180 days, any part of which occurred between August 5, 1964 and May 7, 1975, and was discharged or released therefrom with other than a dishonorable discharge, or was discharged or released from active duty for a service-connected disability, if any of such active duty was performed between August 5, 1964 and May 7, 1975, and (2) who was so discharged or released within 43 months preceding the alleged violation of the Vietnam Era Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974, the affirmative action clause, and/or the regulations issued pursuant to the Act.

A handicapped individual is . . . any person who (1) has a physical or mental impairment which substantially limits one or more of such person's major life activities, (2) has a record of such impairment, or (3) is regarded as having such an impairment . . . A handicapped individual is substantially limited if he is likely to experience difficulty in securing, retaining, or advancing in employment because of handicap.

Voluntary Identification

A disabled veteran, veteran of the Vietnam Era, or a handicapped individual who would like to be considered under the Affirmative Action Plan should let the University know. Submission of this information is voluntary; refusal to provide it will not subject the individual to discharge or disciplinary treatment. If the individual does not wish to identify himself/herself at this time, but at some future time wishes to benefit under the program, he/she may do so at that

GUIDELINES ON SEXUAL HARASSMENT

Indiana State University is committed to an established policy of nondiscrimination, equal employment, and equal educational opportunity with respect to recruitment, hiring, training, promotion, and treatment of persons in all organizations, services, and programs under the legal control of the Board of Trustees. The University will be managed and operated, therefore, on a nondiscriminatory basis in regard to race, sex, religion, handicap, age, or national origin at all times. In keeping with that commitment and consonant with established policy. the University now asserts that sexual harassment will not be tolerated or condoned. In accord with the Guidelines on Sexual Harassment (Discrimination Because of Sex Under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as Amended) promulgated by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, the University's position is as follows:

POLICY GUIDELINES

A. Definition

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- 1. sexual contact of any nature which is not fully and mutually agreeable to both parties;
- any verbal, written or pictorial communication of a sexual nature, which has the effect of intimidating the person or persons receiving the communicaton;
- unwelcome sexual advances, requests, or contacts of any nature, when such acts are intended to be or have the effect of being the basis for either implicitly or explicitly imposing favorable or adverse terms and conditions of employment or academic standing.

The definition rests on three conditions:

- 1. The sex-related conduct is unwelcome to the recipient.
- 2. a specified or implied connection with employment or student status is involved; and
- 3. the sexual harassment continues after the recipient has made it known that such conduct is unwelcome.

B. Regulations

- 1. It is a violation of University policy for any employee who has the authority to act or to recommend action affecting faculty and staff members or students to engage in sexual harassment as defined in A, above.
- 2. It is a violation of University policy for anyone to seek gain, advancement, or consideration in return for sexual favors. False accusation of sexual harassment is, likewise, a violation of University policy.
- 3. It is a violation of University policy for employees to take action as a reprisal against a faculty or staff member or student reporting or alleging sexual harassment.
- 4. Whenever there is a demonstrated or proven instance of sexual harassment, or reprisal for reporting the sexual harassment, prompt corrective action up to and including dismissal shall be taken, consistent with appropriate provisions in the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, the Faculty Constitution, and the University Handbook.

C. Responsibilities

- Each vice president, dean, director, chairperson, and administrative official of an operational unit is responsible for his or her unit and is obligated to cooperate in the dissemination and implementation of this policy.
- 2. The Director of Affirmative Action is responsible for the dissemination, implementation, and coordination of this policy and its guidelines.
- It is the responsibility of every faculty and staff member of the University within his or her area of authority and responsibility to ensure that this policy is implemented. Responsibility includes both good faith effort to prevent sexual harassment and commitment to take immediate and appropriate corrective action when sexual harassment occurs.

D. Grievance

When a member of the University community believes he or she has been sexually harassed, he or she should follow the grievance procedures outlined in the University's Affirmative Action Plan. Likewise, a member of the University community who believes he or she has been harassed or compromised by the offer of sexual favors or who believes that he or she has been falsely accused of sexual harassment should follow the grievance procedures outlined in the control of the contro outlined in the University's Affirmative Action Plan.

EXHIBIT A

GRIEVANCE PROCEDURES

Every person in the University in a position of authority and responsibility, on his or her own, Every person in the oniversity in a positive of interest of his of her of will correct all existing instances of discrimination so that the implementation of grievance procedures will rarely be necessary.

In the event a member of the University Community believes he or she has been discriminated against on the basis of sex, race, religion, age, handicap, or national origin, the following grievance procedures may be implemented.

Option I. Discussion

Any member of the University Community may present, in writing to the Director of Affirmative Action, a complaint relative to discrimination. The complaint may be on his own behalf or on behalf of someone else. When possible, the Affirmative Action Director will resolve the problem with the advice and counsel of the Affirmative Action Committee, as necessary. When a resolution is not possible, the Affirmative Action Director will report his or her findings and submit a recommendation to the President.

Option II. Discussion

This option is open only to employees of the University. At each supervisory level the employee will be informed in writing within five working days after filing his complaint of the supervisor's decision as to whether or not discrimination is indicated and, when appropriate, of his recommendation for its correction. Upon receipt of this information, the employee may find his problem resolved or he may choose to take his case to the next supervisory level.

Appeal Committees and Grievance Procedures:

- Faculty members will appeal to the Faculty Government, according to procedures outlined in the Faculty Constitution.
- II. Administrators will take their cases to the Administrators Appeal Committee. The Administrators tors Appeal Committee shall be a standing committee consisting of five regular members and five alternates. Two administrators shall be appointed by the President from each division in the University. At the present these divisions are under the supervision of the Vice President for Student Affairs, the Vice President for Academic Affairs, the Vice President for Development and Public Affairs, the Vice President for Business Affairs and the President. One administrator from each division shall be appointed as a regular member from his division. Members and alternates are appointed for a period of one year. It shall be the responsibility of the President to make the appointments by September 1 of each year.
- III. Clerical employees will take their cases to the Clerical Appeal Committee. The Clerical Appeal Committee shall be a standing committee consisting of five regular members and five alternates. Members and alternates shall be selected by the Office Personnel Council. Members and alternates are selected for a one-year period. Selection must take place by August 1 of each year. An alternate shall be designated for each regular member and shall serve on the Appeal Committee in the absence of that particular member.
- IV. Staff members in categories other than those cited above will follow grievance hearing procedures prescribed in the Staff Employees Handbook.

EXHIBIT B GUIDELINES FOR ACTING APPOINTMENTS

1. Except in unusual circumstances, acting or interim appointments will be made only to fill sudden. suddenly vacated or newly created positions while a search, internal or external, is being organized to fill the position organized to fill the position on a permanent basis.

Suddenly vacated or newly established positions should be advertised in the University Bulletin so that any person on the University staff and faculty will have knowledge of the opening and an opportunity to apply.

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- 3. The appropriate Vice President will request a written expression by the Director of Affirmative Action attesting that procedures are in accord with affirmative action policies and guidelines.
- All acting or interim appointments will be made by the President upon the recommendation of the appropriate vice president.
- The interests of women, minorities, and handicapped should be considered affirmatively when acting or interim appointments are made. An acting appointment may be an "on the job" training opportunity which could help the University to meet part of its affirmative action training responsibility.
- Except for the most unusual circumstances, an acting or interim appointment will not extend beyond the start of the following fiscal year (July 1), and then only with the approval of the President.
- The acting or interim appointee will not be involved in the choice of his or her successor if he or she is to be a candidates for the position.

EXHIBIT C GUIDELINES FOR FILLING OPEN POSITIONS

- When a position is created or vacated and authorized to be filled by the appropriate dean or supervisor and vice president, a search committee will be formed.
- 2. At its first meeting, the search committee will receive its task and responsibilities in writing and in person from the dean, supervisor, or vice president to whom the unit reports. The charge will include the number of candidates to be recommended for interviews and the number to be recommended for appointment.
- As soon as possible after its formation, the search committee, with the counsel of the Affirmative Action Director, will develop a timetable for the search and screening process. Generally, the search should be timed so that the successful candidate may assume the position at the start of the following fiscal year, July 1, or at the start of the following academic year.
- 4. After the timetable has been constructed and prior to the submission of advertisements of the position, the chairperson will seek the counsel of the Affirmative Action Director regarding appointment criteria, advertisements, and appropriate affirmative action procedures. The chairperson of the search committee has the responsibility of implementing the schedule.
- 5. All positions will be advertised in the University Bulletin, so that any person on the University staff and faculty will have knowledge of the opening and an opportunity to apply.
- The chairperson, acting on behalf of the committee, will submit written reports of progress, including affirmative action steps and procedures, to the University's director of 6. Affirmative Action as follows:
 - Not later than five days following the announced deadline for the submission of completed applications for the position, the chairperson will inform the Affirmative Action Director of the total number of applicants and the number of women and minority members who have applied.
 - When the search committee has completed its first screening, the chairperson will inform the Affirmative Action Director of the criteria and rationale employed in the screening process.
 - -- When the search committee has decided on the candidates to be interviewed, the chairperson will inform the Affirmative Action Director of the criteria employed in selecting those to be interviewed, the nature of the interview process, and the people and groups who will serve as interviewers.
 - When the search committee has decided on the candidates it plans to recommend to the dean, the supervisor, the appropriate vice president, and President for appointment, the chairperson will inform the Affirmative Action Director of the process. the names and qualifications of the recommended candidates.
 - The President will request a written expression by the Affirmative Action Director attesting that the search and screening process is in accord with affirmative action policies and guide lines prior to the Board of Trustee lines prior to the Board of Trustee. lines prior to making his decision and forwarding his recommendation to the Board of Trustees.

SECTION I, EXHIBIT E March 6, 1981

PURPOSE

The purpose of the conditions outlined below is to facilitate the use of the Indiana University Geologic Field Station, by Indiana State University for required field geology work. These conditions have been jointly arrived at in discussions with the staff of the relevant Departments at both Universities, and they remain in force until either University withdraws from the agreement or it is superceded by a new one.

STUDENTS

- Indiana University agrees to accept all majors recommended by ISU up to a maximum of 15 students per summer. Students will normally be geology majors and have completed the necessary requirements of a minimum of 13 hours of geology, including a course in Structural Geology.
- 2. Students would normally be expected to have completed their junior year or equivalent.

REGISTRATION AND ENROLLMENT

- 1. Students will register for credit at Indiana State University under the course Geology 350 and also will be registered for G 429 at Indiana University as an Auditor.
- 2. Students will pay appropriate fees for credit hours as established by Indiana State University at the time of registration. Students will, in addition to fees collected by the University, be responsible for paying necessary transportation, room and board, and incidental expenses as determined by the administration of the Field Station.

FINANCIAL COMMITMENT

- 1. In consideration of the facilities offered by Indiana University, Indiana State University will provide reimbursement at the rate of \$100.00 per credit hour per student during 1981 and at the rate of \$130.00 per credit hour per student during subsequent years.
- 2. Undergraduate and graduate students will be encouraged to use the Field Station facilities for research at no additional cost to their institution.

FACULTY

- 1. Indiana State University faculty will be encouraged to participate in the planning and teaching of G 429.
- Indiana State University faculty who actually teach in G 429 will be employed by Indiana University as visiting faculty members.

SCHOOL OF MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

GOOD SAMARITAN HOSPITAL

VINCENNES, INDIANA

AND

INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY

This is an agreement between Good Samaritan Hospital of Vincennes, Indiana "(Hospital)" and Indiana State University "(University)" regarding an affiliation for the purpose of training students in Medical Technology.

Section I.

EXHIBITE 981

The Hospital agrees to abide by the following provisions:

- A. Education and Training: The Hospital agrees to offer an educational service to the University by providing instruction, facilities, administration, and clinical opportunities for persons admitted as students from the University in the Hospital's School of Medical Technology which will fulfill all of the requirements established by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences for an accredited school of Medical Technology.
- B. Qualifications of Applicants: The Hospital agrees to consider for training in medical Technology those students from the University who qualify according to the criteria established by the Hospital. The Hospital may also accept qualified applicants from other properly accredited colleges or universities.
- C. <u>Admissions</u>: Minimum criteria for admission to Good Samaritan Hospital School of Medical Technology include:
 - 1. Completion of the equivalent of a minimum of 90 semester hours of academic credit in a college or university approved by a recognized regional accrediting agency. Prerequisite credit from the University must meet the requirements of the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences and the Hospital's School of Medical Technology.
 - 2. A student, to be qualified, shall have maintained a cumulative grade point average of not less than 2.5 (4 point system).
 - 3. Each student shall file with the Hospital a complete application, a copy of his/her transcript along with a listing of courses in progress, two recommendations from university science professors and a satisfactory transcript evaluation by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences, unless the University has an exempt status with the agency.
- D. Selection of Students: The Hospital reserves the right to refuse admission to any student who does not meet the above criteria. Waiver of any of the criteria must be based upon mutual agreement between the Hospital and University representatives. Final selection of students will be determined by the Admissions Committee for the School of Medical Technology of Good Samaritan Hospital. Good Samaritan Hospital and its affiliated colleges and Universities admit students of any race, color, and national or ethnic origin.
- E. Progress Reports: The Hospital agrees to furnish the University with a final grade for each course taken by the student, and to give the University a report of satisfactory or unsatisfactory progress for each student when requested by the University or College.
- F. Dismissal: If in the opinion of the Hospital, a student fails to meet the required standards of performance and competency while enrolled in the Hospital's program, or violates relevant hospital policy or rules, the Hospital may disenroll the student. The University will be notified by the Hospital that it intends to disenroll the student. The University may send a representative to meet with a representative of the Hospital's School of Medical a rechnology and the student. After the representative has viewed the work of the student, Technology and the student. After the representative has viewed the Work of the student, the University representative may recommend that the student remain in the Hospital's the University representative may recommend at any recommendation, this recommendation program. If it is believed that circumstances warrant any recommendation, this recommendation will be viewed by the Advisory Committee of the Hospital's program. The Advisory Committee will make a final recommendation to the administration of the Hospital's program which will make the final decision.

Section II.

The University agrees to abide by the following provisions:

- A. Didactic Instruction: The University shall offer an approved pre-requisite course of study appropriate for students in a Medical Technology Program in accordance with requirements established by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences.
- B. Credit: The University will grant academic credit for successful completion of each segment of the Hospital program. The amount of credit for each segment shall be determined by agreement between a representative of the University and a representative of the Hospital's School of Medical Technology. Course numbers and suggested credit hours for courses included in the Hospital Medical Technology program are included in an appended page.
- C. <u>Degree</u>: The University will grant a baccalaureate degree to eligible students who successfully complete the Medical Technology Program at the Hospital. Granting of a degree shall not be contingent upon certification of the student by the Registry of Medical Technologists of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists, according to ASCP requirements effective December, 1972.
- D. Liaison Appointment: The University shall designate a person to act as a liaison between the University and the Hospital, without remuneration, to facilitate improved communications and better coordination of efforts of the two institutions in accomplishing mutual objectives.

Section III.

Hospital and the University mutually agree that:

- A. <u>Joint Committee</u>: Representatives from the University and the Hospital shall comprise a Joint Committee which shall meet at least once each year to review the progress of the program, develop policy for the following year, and discuss curriculum.
- B. 1. Medical Director of the Medical Technology Program, Associate and Assistant Director and full-time faculty will have academic appointment (Adjunct or Clinical) to the University.
 - 2. The University Liaison appointed will have an adjunct appointment to the faculty of the Hospital's School of Medical Technology.
- C. Educational Policies: Development of specific educational policies not provided for in this agreement shall be the responsibility of the Joint Committee.
- D. <u>Professional Conduct</u>: Appropriate ethical and professional conduct shall be required of all students.
- E. Fees and Tuitions: Students will pay the in-state fee for courses in the amount approved by the Trustees of the University. From the amount paid, the University will remit to the Hospital an amount equivalent to 75% of the fee collected in consideration of the services provided by the Hospital hereunder.
- F. Publications: Hospital agrees to recognize the University as an affiliated institution in publications, and the University shall make similar identification in its literature.
- G. Term of Agreement: This agreement shall continue in force commencing with the clinical year of study following the date of execution of the agreement, and shall renew automatically each year thereafter. Each Party hereto may terminate this agreement by at least twelve months written notice to the other party. All students enrolled in the program at the time of that notice to terminate this agreement shall be permitted to complete the clinical laboratory practice needed for graduation subject to the terms and conditions herein.
- H. Liability insurance coverage of students will conform to the policy of the Hospital applicable to all students at the time any liability claim arises.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY, DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION DIVISION OF COUNSELING AND

TERRE HAUTE REGIONAL HOSPITAL

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this day of , 1981, by and between INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY, DEPARTMENT OF GRADUATE EDUCATION, DIVISION OF COUNSELING (hereinafter referred to as "UNIVERSITY") and TERRE HAUTE REGIONAL HOSPITAL (hereinafter referred to as "HOSPITAL");

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, UNIVERSITY is an institution of higher learning of the State of Indiana which provides a graduate education for students preparing as mental health professionals;

WHEREAS, HOSPITAL is willing to provide a practicum setting for students working in the Counseling and mental health field;

NOW, THEREFORE, FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL COVENANTS HEREIN CONTAINED, THE PARTIES HERETO AGEEE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. HOSPITAL shall accept Indiana State University graduate students enrolled in the counseling Program for their practicum experience and shall:
 - (a) Share a plan of care with students.
 - (b) Provide an orientation for students and faculty supervisors.

- (c) Assign to students specific patients based on curriculum objectives.
- (d) HOSPITAL, however, reserves the right to exclude any individual student's participation after discussing the matter with the faculty supervisor.
- 2. UNIVERSITY understands and agrees that its obligation under this agreement shall be as follows:
 - (a) All faculty and students involved in the experience will abide by the rules, procedures and practices of Terre Haute Regional Hospital.
 - (b) Students will work directly with the Head Nurse of the Mental Health Unit. Students will confer regularly with the Head Nurse and provide verbal feedback concerning all contacts
 - (c) Students will arrange a schedule consistent with the needs of the Mental Health Unit and provide the Head Nurse a copy of said schedule.
 - (d) Students will provide their own liability insurance coverage appropriate for a mental health setting.
 - (e) Students will arrange their interviewing hours with the Head Nurse of the Mental Health Unit.
 - (f) Students will be supervised on a regular basis by the practicum supervisors on campus. When the situation warrants, the practicum supervisor will contact the Head Nurse concerning potential concerns or issues surrounding the experience with the patients.
 - (g) Tape recordings of the sessions with patients will be made providing that patients sign a statement of agreement. Tapes are used only for the class requirements, including review by supervisors.
- 3. The parties agree that either party may terminate this agreement by giving at least months written notice of such determination to the other party. All students enrolled in the counseling and mental health training program at the time that notice to terminate this agreement is given by either party to the other shall be permitted to complete at the HOSPITAL the clinical experiences needed for graduation subject to the terms and conditions contained herein.

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the Trustees Conference Room, 11th Floor, School of Business Building on the Terre Haute Campus. Trustees present: Mr. Ainlay, Mr. Breeden, Mrs. Fouty, Mr. Schmelzer, Dr. Siebenmorgen, Mr. Winchell and Mr. Woll. Trustees absent: Mr. Brames and Mrs. Mitchell. President Landini, President Rice, Vice Presidents Clokey, McKee, Moulton and Truitt and Dr. Hardaway were present. Also attending were Dr. Backes. Chairperson of the Faculty Senate on the Terre Haute Campus, Dr. Shaw, Chairperson of the Faculty Council on the Evansville Campus and Mr. Butler, President of the Terre Haute Campus SGA.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Ainlay called the meeting to order at 10:10 A.M.

A. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF MEETING OF MARCH 6, 1981

On a motion by Mr. Schmelzer, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the minutes of March 6, 1981, were approved.

B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

President Landini announced that the date of the next meeting will be May 8, 1981, on the Evansville Campus.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Athletic Director

The President was pleased to report that a recommendation for the appointment of Bernard Cooper as Athletic Director of the Terre Haute Campus was on this agenda. He comes with a great deal of experience and enthusiasm and is a worthy successor to Bob King who leaves July 1, 1981. Mr. Cooper has been asked to come to the campus May 1, 1981, on special assignment to insure that the institution and the programs under his charge shall have his direct attention and the benefit of counsel and advice from Mr. King before he leaves the campus.

Commission for Higher Education -- Psy. D. Degree Approval

The Commission for Higher Education on the recommendation of the institution and endorsement and support of the Board of Trustees approved the offering of the Doctor of Psychology Degree, a practioners degree. The President was most gratified and pleased, not only

personally, but also on behalf of the Board and the Institution with the response of the Commission in regard to the quality of the proposal brought before them. There are a number of ways to counter-balance the problems of initiating the program such as the elimination of certain portions of the masters degree psychology program. Presently there are still some graduate assistants and university fellows finishing their programs. The program has a great quality and excellence and the institution does indeed intend to implement the program as soon as possible.

Honorary Degrees

This agenda cites several distinguished individuals the institution wishes to honor through degrees. There are five on the Evansville Campus and three on the Terre Haute Campus for the Board's consideration. Information in regard to the candidates has been distributed previously to the Board and a recommendation is now presented for their approval for our May 9, 1981, Commencements.

Promotions and Tenure

Procedures for promotions and tenure for the campus were discussed earlier in the General Welfare Session. Of interest was staffing, the philosophy of the institution and decisions on tenure on both campuses. President Landini remarked he felt the individuals who are presented in the agenda of this day are very deserving as shown by their good teaching records and their scholarship criteria.

Donaghy Day

The 6th Annual Donaghy Day will be held Tuesday, April 7. This has proven to be a very gratifying enterprise. More and more students are responding to the many events of the day culminating with a picnic on the lawn. Past labors are already noticeable with the flowers now coming up and the vast improvement in campus beautification.

President's Associates -- University Speakers Series Lecture

The University lectureship series on the Terre Haute Campus financed by the President's Associates, is designed to help the campus strengthen its intellectual and cultural climate. The second speaker in this series, Dr. Juanita Kreps, former Secretary of Commerce in the Carter administration, was on campus March 31 and April 1 for colloquiums, seminars and lectures. This is an excellent program and the President expressed his gratitude to the members of the President's Associates who support it. All indications are that the program should continue and excellent programs are being planned for next year. The program is not designed to bring a national figure to the campus only for a brief speaking appearance but to bring them to the campus for colloquiums, seminars, lectures and to meet with the students.

School of Business Rededication

The School of Business will be rededicated on April 28. This is another landmark in the history of the institution. With the good work of Mr. Moulton and many others, including administrators, the Board of Trustees and the Legislature, the building has been changed from a residence hall to an academic structure and has greatly enhanced the environment in which our Business programs are conducted.

Mr. Ainlay remarked that he had had the opportunity to meet and talk with Mr. Cooper, the new Athletic Director. He felt Mr. Cooper to be a very impressive individual and remarked it was good to know we have a man with his qualities and qualifications to succeed Bob King, whom we all love and admire.

D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

President Rice stated that the AASCU Exchange Program had been in progress with the University of Wisconsin Parkside and the University of Southern Illinois at Edwardsville.

Also, Margery Shaw, nationally known doctor and lawyer, has been on campus for two days for lectures and seminars.

I. RESIDENCE HALL RATES, 1981-82

A proposal to increase residence hall rates for the 1981-82 academic year is presented in EXHIBIT D. An increase of \$5.00 per week is necessary because of increases in the cost of food and maintenance.

An overall rate increase of approximately 12% is recommended for 1981-82. The new rate will remain the lowest of Indiana's five public residential universities and among the very lowest of the Midwestern universities.

Approval of the residence hall rates presented in EXHIBIT D was recommended.

Mr. Woll asked if Mr. Moulton could show the Board the comparisons of the other institutions in regard to the residence hall rates. Mr. Moulton remarked that although we do exchange this information with other institutions, it is usually agreed that it will be held in confidence.

NONHOST INSTRUCTION CROSSTOWN AGREEMENT TO EXTEND AFROTC INSTRUCTION TO STUDENTS AT INSTITUTIONS NOT HOSTING AFROTC

This agreement is among the governing authorities of Indiana University (hereinafter known as Institution A) which hosts Air Force ROTC, Detachment 215, the governing authorities of Indiana State University (hereinafter known as Institution B) which does not host an AFROTC unit, and the Commandant, Air Force ROTC. It is the purpose of this agreement to make the Air Force ROTC General Military Course and/or the Professional Officer Course available to qualified students of Institution B who desire to earn appointments as commissioned officers in the United States Air Force.

AGREEMENT

- 1. Contingent upon acceptance of this agreement and upon the initial and continuing fulfillment of all the conditions enumerated in paragraphs 2, 3, 4, and 5 following, the Commandant, Air Force ROTC, will:
 - a. Provide AFROTC instruction in the General Military Course and the Professional Military Course to qualified and selected applicants who are students of Institution B. Air Force ROTC instruction will be provided those selected students of Institution B on the campus of Institution B.
 - b. Enroll qualified students of Institution B who are selected for the General Military Course and/or the Professional Officer Course as members of the Air Force ROTC detachment at Institution A.
 - c. Provide uniforms, in accordance with the existing contract agreement between Institution A and the Secretary of the Air Force, to Institution A for all Air Force ROTC cadets who are enrolled as members of the Air Force ROTC detachment at Institution A.
 - d. Provide subsistance allowance, in accordance with existing policies, to all Air Force ROTC cadets who are enrolled as members of the Air Force ROTC detachment at Institution A.
 - e. Provide tuition and fees, in accordance with existing policies:
 - (1) To Institution A for all Air Force ROTC cadets on scholarship status who are enrolled as members of the Air Force ROTC detachment at Institution A.
 - (2) To Institution B for all Air Force ROTC cadets on scholarship status who are enrolled as members of the Air Force ROTC detachment at Institution A if a separate education service agreement exist between the Department of the Air Force and Institution B.

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- 2. Contingent upon the acceptance of this agreement and upon fulfillment of the conditions enumerated in paragraph 1 above, the governing authorities of Institution A agree to:
 - a . Furnish necessary uniforms and accessories to all enrolled members of the Air Force ROTC unit which it hosts.
 - b. Report estimated and actual cost of tuition and fees for each fiscal year to the AFROTC detachment at Institution A. This report will be the basis for funding obligations for each fiscal year.
- 3. Contingent upon the acceptance of this agreement and upon fulfillment of the conditions enumerated in paragraph 1 above, the governing authorities of Institution B agree to:
 - a. Provide adequate classroom, office and related administrative facilities and equipment such as office supplies, telephone service, and secretarial assistance to support the Aerospace Studies instruction of all enrolled members of Air Force ROTC Detachment 215 who receive instruction on its campus.
 - b. Include in appropriate publications announcements of the Aerospace Studies Courses of Air Force ROTC available to its students.
 - c. Grant appropriate academic credit applicable toward graduation for the successful completion of courses offered by the Department of Aerospace Studies at Institution A.
 - d. Report estimated and actual costs of tuition and fees for each fiscal year to the AFROTC detachment at Institution A. This report will be the basis for funding obligations for each fiscal year if a separate education service agreement exists between the Department of the Air Force and Institution B.
- 4. Contingent upon the acceptance of this agreement and upon fulfillment of the conditions enumerated in paragraph 1 above, the governing authorities of Institution A and B agree to:
 - a. Negotiate a formal written agreement whereby Institution A transfers tuition and fees to Institution B for those students on scholarship status from Institution B enrolled in Air Force ROTC at Institution A; or
 - b. Concur that a separate education service agreement between the Department of the Air Force and Institution B is desired.
- 5. The governing authorities of Institution B affirm that:
 - a. It is accredited to award a baccalaureate degree by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.
 - b. For good and valid mutual consideration, and as a condition precedent to acceptance and continuation of this agreement, the institution warrants and represents that it does not, and will not, discriminate in any way with respect to the admission or subsequent treatment of students on the basis of race, color, sex, or national origin. It is further mutually agreed that a violation of the covenant, as determined by the Secretary of the Air Force or a designee, may be regarded as a breach of this agreement, justifying termination thereof, at no cost of the government, by the secretary or designee.
- 6. All parties agree that:
 - This agreement becomes effective 29 August 1981.
 - b. This agreement may be terminated at the end of any school year by any party giving the other two parties at least six months notice of such intent.
 - c. This agreement supersedes all existing agreements between the Secretary of the Air Force or his designee and the above institution pertaining to the establishment of an Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps detachment crosstown.

SECTION I

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in the University Center, Conference Center, Rooms 351-352, on the Evansville Campus. Trustees present: Mr. Ainlay, Mr. Brames, Mr. Breeden. Mrs. Fouty, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. Schmelzer, Dr. Siebenmorgen, Mr. Winchell and Mr. Woll. President Landini, President Rice, Vice Presidents Clokey, McKee, Moulton and Truitt and Dr. Hardaway were present. Also attending were Dr. Shaw, Chairperson of the Faculty Council on the Evansville Campus and Ms. Carroll, President of the ISUE SGA.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Ainlay called the meeting to order at 11:15 A.M.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Ainlay expressed appreciation to the staff of ISUE for the way in which the Board was made welcome. The members of the Board always enjoy coming to Evansville and admire the beauty of the campus. He further thanked President Rice for making the arrangements and accommodations for the Board.

A. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF MEETING OF APRIL 3, 1981

On a motion by Mrs. Fouty, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the minutes of April 3, 1981, were approved.

B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

President Landini announced that the date of the next meeting will be June 4-5, 1981, on the Terre Haute Campus. He also announced the date for the July meeting to be the 30th and 31st.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Legislative Action - 1981-82 Budget

The President reported that the Legislature has acted in regard to the University's appropriation tion request. In a broad outline there will be a 4% overall budget increase for both campuses, which will include a 4% increase for total compensation for faculty and staff of the two campuses. The capital increase will afford the opportunity for Library expansion and Forum Renovation at the Evanguille capital and thus meet established needs to continue and expand Renovation at the Evansville campus and thus meet established needs to continue and expand various academic endeavors. Two major projects on the Terre Haute Campus are provided for: approximately \$1,100,000 for the remodeling of the Fairbanks Library and \$600,000 for the remodeling of the Fairbanks Library and \$ remodeling of the Fine Arts Building.

It should be noted that the Institution submitted a request to the Legislature for an operational increase of 10% for each year of the 1981-83 biennium.

Indiana. This increase is well below the needs of the Institution as set forth in our budget request budget request, but we will do with what we did receive.

A student fee increase has not been requested previously but we cannot begin the 1981-82 academic year without a substantial fee increase of not less than 12%. A fee increase will be recommended to the Board on the June agenda. The fee increase will be kept as low as possible and will not bring a surplus of income to the Institution. The increase is needed to maintain programs of quality and excellence for the students.

Commencement

President Landini remarked that May 9 is a day of great exultation. Commencement is set for 9:00 A.M., May 9 on the Evansville Campus with the traditional ceremony and with 400-500 students graduating. At 3:00 P.M. on the Terre Haute Campus approximately 2200-2300 undergraduate and graduate students will be graduating. The ceremony marks the culmination of the hopes and desires for the formal education of the students. It is also a time of great pride of the Institution as the labors of the faculty and staff are shown by the graduation of the deserving students. The President stated he would stand behind each and everyone of the graduates who will be taking their place in society. The Board should take a great deal of pride in their role as shown in the culmination of years of study of our students.

Mr. Ainlay remarked that the Board was most pleased to participate in Commencement exercises at the two campuses. Because of the logistics involved, not all of the Board members will be present at the Evansville Commencement. President Landini, Mr. Woll and Mr. Ainlay will be present and Mr. Woll will remain at the Evansville Campus to represent the Board at the post-commencement activities.

D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

President Rice reported that the Women's Softball Team won the State tournament last week. This week they will be playing Charleston, West Virginia, in a Regional Tournament at Dayton, Ohio.

Continuing Education, along with the Veterans Administration and the Evansville Courier will be holding a conference for the benefit of Viet Nam veterans. A similar conference was recently held in Columbus, Indiana, and was most successful.

1. Radio Station Donation - INFORMATION ITEM

John Englebrecht, owner of WIKY AM Radio, has offered to donate and transfer WIKY AM franchise to ISUE subject to Federal Communication Commission and University Board of Trustees approval. Appropriate papers of donation and transfer are being developed. It is anticipated that a recommendation for Board action will be presented in the June agenda.

President Rice remarked that WIKY Radio Station has a reception radius of 50-60 miles and is a 250 Watt AM Station. The FCC has accepted the transfer to a public institution and most of the paperwork is ready for the attorney to examine. This station will provide excellent instructional opportunity and a fine laboratory for Speech, TV and Radio students.

 ${\tt Mr.}$ Ainlay remarked that the Board is very excited about this project and sees this as a tremendous opportunity for the Institution.

Mr. Winchell inquired as to whether or not acquisition included both plant and physical equipment. He was advised the acquisition is basically the radio equipment.

Mr. Ainlay asked where the facility will be located?

President Rice replied that it will be housed in the Technology Building but we will use the present WIKY tower and engineering staff.

Mr. Breeden asked if the tower would be moved?

President Rice remarked that a plan to move the tower has been included in a long range plan of 4-5 years.

2. Agreement

It was recommended that the Agreement with Deaconnes Hospital, Inc., of Evansville, Indiana (EXHIBIT F) be approved. This is an agreement whereby ISUE will provide instruction for students of the hospital's School of Nursing.

3. Special Course Fee

Art 400 Special Problems in Art: Advanced Weaving

An intensive two-week workshop will be offered in New Harmony this summer. The limited enrollment for the course necessitates a special fee for each of the students whether they enroll for credit or non-credit. A $\underline{\text{fee}}$ of \$125 for the course, which includes University academic and student services $\underline{\text{fees}}$, $\underline{\text{was}}$ $\underline{\text{recommended}}$.

Mr. Woll commented that the agreement with Deaconnes Hospital was vitally important to the Evansville community due to the great need for nurses.

President Rice said that previous affiliation agreements with Deaconnes through Medical Technology and Radiology have proved to be very successful and rewarding. Deaconnes School of Nursing is well established and one of the oldest in the State. It is very much a patient oriented hospital for training in the various health services.

Dr. Siebenmorgen stated that this is a three year diploma program and that the State Medical Association has gone on record as favoring such programs. Also, he concurred that there is a great shortage of nurses.

On a motion by Dr. Siebenmorgen, seconded by Mr. Woll, Items 2 and 3 were approved.

E. AGREEMENTS

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 $\overline{\text{It}}$ was recommended that the Agreements listed below be approved. The contracts are set forth in order that the agencies cited are authorized to provide the services as stipulated in the agreements. These agreements follow the prescribed format and content as approved by University Counsel.

1. Bethany House - EXHIBIT A

An agreement whereby Bethany House shall provide Indiana State University School of Nursing students with clinical laboratory experience. The agreement conforms with the standard format of such agreements approved by the Board of Trustees on April 25, 1980.

2. Clay County Hospital - EXHIBIT B

An agreement whereby Clay County Hospital shall provide Indiana State University School of Nursing students with clinical laboratory experience. The agreement conforms with the standard format of such agreements approved by the Board of Trustees on April 25, 1980.

3. Simeon House - EXHIBIT C

An agreement whereby Terre Haute Nursing Home shall provide Indiana State University School of Nursing students with clinical laboratory experience. The agreement conforms with the standard format of such agreements approved by the Board of Trustees on April 25, 1980.

On a motion by Mrs. Fouty, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the recommendation was approved.

F. FIELD CAMPUS POLICY

The Department of Recreation and Leisure Studies has developed new procedures for the recreational use of the Brazil Field Campus. The policies, presented in EXHIBIT E, have the approval of theDean of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, the Vice President for Academic Affairs and University counsel. Approval was recommended.

Mr. Ainlay was somewhat concerned about the article which appeared in the <u>Statesman</u> in regard to the rape of an ISU coed at Deming Park. He feels that sunbathers and joggers should be encouraged to engage in such activities in groups.

Dr. Cłokey remarked that Deming Park is a public place and access to the Field Campus is limited, as it is a private facility. This type of problem is not anticipated. It is mostly used by students who are there for a specific academic purpose.

Mrs. Fouty asked if it is a recreational or educational facility? She feels if it is an educational facility it should be used as such to its fullest extent.

Dr. Clokey replied that during the academic year that a number of ISU students use the facilities not only for recreation programs but also for Life Science classes. Dr. Siebenmorgen remarked that his son graduated with a recreational major and feels that the campus is very good for educational purposes. He feels that if the campus was opened to the public the nature aspect of it would be destroyed.

Mr. Woll asked if being a public institution we actually could close it to the public or should we open it to the public when not in use for University purposes.

Mr. Ainlay said that was worthy of consideration but he is concerned about liability.

Mr. Moulton said the University owns this facility because it is a former recreational area that went bankrupt. It was purchased from the SBA with Foundation funds for \$60,000. It is a low budget operation and a very good program.

Mr. Winchell remarked that there are two state parks close to Terre Haute and indicated that he does n of believe another one should be supported.

The President noted that the use policies of the facility are primarily for an educational facility. From time to time there have been requests from faculty members but security could not be provided. This recommendation to the Board defines the uses of the Field Campus.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Mr. Winchell, the recommendation was approved.

The University agrees to provide the following courses of instruction for students of the Hospital's School of Nursing, said instruction to be given by faculty members of Indiana State University, Evansville Campus, during the 1981-82 school year at the place and according to a class schedule mutually agreed upon:

- 2. The University will maintain a sufficient and qualified faculty and laboratory assistants in the courses where students of the Hospital's School of Nursing are enrolled.
- 3. The Hospital agrees to pay to the University the in-state fee per credit hour in the amount approved by the Indiana State University Board of Trustees for nursing students enrolled in the above courses. Laboratory fees will be at the regular University rate. The fee charges will be paid to the University within thirty days after receipt of a statement from the University.

The Hospital agrees to reimburse the University for travel expense incurred by University faculty members to teach those courses mutually agreed upon to be taught at Deaconess Hospital at the State approved rate per mile traveled.

Textbooks for the above courses shall be purchased by the students in cash at the University Bookstore.

Those students desiring to have an ISUE parking permit will register their vehicles and pay the normal parking permit fee.

- 4. The University agrees to furnish to the Hospital:
 - a. An outline for each course to be taught. This is to be submitted prior to the beginning of each school year in a form mutually agreed upon.
 - b. The grade reports of students' progress.
- 5. The Hospital agrees to abide by all requirements and standards of Indiana State University Evansville insofar as they are applicable, according to the statements contained in the official catalog of the University.
- 6. The University grants permission to the Hospital to publish information about the University and the instruction received by the students of the Hospital in its catalog; and the Hospital grants permission to the University to publish information regarding the Hospital program in its catalog. Each party agrees to submit for approval any material to be published concerning the other party. The University gives permission to the Hospital to include on its faculty the professors who teach those courses provided by the University.
- 7. During the time that the students of the Hospital's School of Nursing are on campus of Indiana State University Evansville, they will be subject to the rules and regulations of the University. The University shall promptly refer to the Hospital any disciplinary problems which may arise. Any additional regulations which may be deemed necessary for the students of the Hospital's School of Nursing may be set up according to the mutual agreement of the University and the Hospital. Total credit hours taken at Deaconess Hospital School of Nursing will be considered for determining student status for student activities.

President Landini, President Rice, Vice Presidents Clokey, Dahl, Moulton and Truitt and Dr. Hardaway were present. Also attending were Dr. Backes, Chairperson of the Faculty Senate on the Terre Haute Campus and Dr. Shaw, Chairperson of the Faculty Council on the Evansville Campus Campus.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Ainlay called the meeting to order at 10:10 A.M.

On a motion by Dr. Siebenmorgen, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the minutes of May 8, 1981, were approved.

B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

President Landini announced that the date of the next meeting will be July 31, 1981, on the Terre Haute Campus.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Landini also added his expression of respect and gratitude for the contributions of Roger Schmelzer. Roger has served for two years as Student Trustee and prior thereto as Student Government Association President. He holds two degrees from Indiana State and is a most able and satisfying example of the students produced by our faculty and staff. The President congratulated him on his achievements and wishedhim well in his future endeavors.

The President also reported on the fire alarm which was activated around midnight on Thursday in the Statesman Tower East thus causing the Trustees to evacuate the building. It was a false alarm set off by a heating problem. The fire trucks did respond and the fire chief reset the alarm without undue difficulty. Apparently the system is working adequately.

D. EVANSVILLE REPORT

President Rice reported that although it was too late to be included in the present Agenda, he wanted to state that Sylvia Weinzapfel, Assistant Director of Continuing Education, has received a grant financed by the National Science Foundation providing for the enrollment of 23 baccalaureate degree holders in the mining engineering degree program. The program is for persons whose skills need to be upgraded in order for them to be employable in this field.

1. Schedule of Fees, 1981-82

The spending level approved for the State Universities by the 1981 Indiana General Assembly requires an increase in student fees to supplement the State appropriation in each year of the biennium.

It is necessary to increase student fees on the Evansville Campus \$3.50 per semester hour for Indiana resident undergraduate students and \$10.50 per semester hour for non-resident undergraduate students.

Argonne Research Contract - 2788

4. Radio Station Donation

As reported to the Board on May 8, 1981, the SOUTH CENTRAL BROADCASTING CORPORATION, owner of WIKY AM Radio, has offered to donate and transfer the WIKY AM franchise to Indiana State University Evansville subject to the approval of the Federal Communications Commission and the Indiana State University Board of Trustees.

The Memorandum of Charitable Donation submitted by the Donor is presented in EXHIBIT J. Mr. James E. Sullivan, University counsel, has studied the document and has found it to be satisfactory. Approval of the acceptance of the donation pursuant to the conditions set forth in EXHIBIT J was recommended.

Mr. Woll asked what the characterization of Aqueous Metal-Don/Coal Conversion Organic Interactions referred to in Item 3 meant?

President Rice replied that decontamination is possible through a process whereby the byproducts become non-contaminable. One of the material catalysts reduces the length of time products such as those from power plants are contaminated. The code names used help to keep the scientists up-to-date with readily available information.

On a motion by Mr. Breeden, seconded by Mr. Schmelzer, the recommendations in Item D, Section I, were approved.

E. UNIVERSITY CALENDARS, 1982-83 and 1983-84

The University Calendar for 1981-82 was approved by the Board of Trustees on April 25, 1980. It is advantageous in planning schedules and university events to have a calendar two years in advance. Therefore, proposed calendars for 1982-83 and 1983-84 were presented to the Board for consideration and approval. The calendars were approved by the Administrative Affairs Committee on February 25, 1981; the 1982-83 calendar was approved by the Executive Committee of the University Faculty Senate on April 21, 1981 and the 1983-84 calendar was amended and approved by the Executive Committee of the University Faculty Senate on May 5, 1981. Both calendars were unanimously approved by the University Faculty Senate on May 7, 1981. The proposed calendars for 1982-83 and 1983-84 are presented in EXHIBIT A.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommendation was approved.

F. SCHEDULE OF FEES, 1981-82

The appropriations approved for the State Universities by the 1981 Indiana General Assembly provide for an increase in student fees to supplement the State appropriations.

It is necessary to increase student fees on the Terre Haute Campus:

\$4.50 per semester hour for Indiana resident undergraduate students,

\$12.50 per semester hour for non-resident undergraduate students,

\$6.50 per semester hour for Indiana resident graduate students, and

\$14.50 per semester hour for non-resident graduate students.

The fees for Extension courses, Independent Study/Correspondence and Independent Study/ Hoosier Schoolmaster (Radio and Television) are to be the same as the fees charged for oncampus study.

Approval of the Schedule of Fees presented in EXHIBIT B was recommended.

Mr. Woll asked if ISU has a reciprocal fee agreement with Illinois?

President Landini replied that we do not have such an agreement.

Mr. Woll noted that Kentucky is considering changing their fees for out-of-state students.

President Rice remarked that Kentucky is now charging \$290 per semester for out-of-state students which is less than our own in-state fee.

Mr. Ainlay said Mr. Breeden always chides him about statements on raising fees but in light of the economy it is a matter of great concern. The fee increase is to the point in some ways where it may be adverse to some families who want to provide higher education for their children. He emphasized that in the case of ISU the fee increases have been held to a minimum and that we still afford students very favorable educational opportunities. The increasing cost to families across the nation is a point of concern as it relates to the economy and spiraling inflation.

Mr. Breeden stated that he was not trying to say "we can be an island unto ourselves". He feels we should focus on what's causing the problem and approach it from a philosophical point of view nationally. Our entire society is creating the problems we are all facing.

On a motion by Mrs. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Brames, the recommendation was approved.

On a motion by Mrs. Fouty, seconded by Mr. Breeden, the recommendation was approved.

I. AGREEMENT

An agreement between Indiana State University and Ivy Tech (Terre Haute) whereby students enrolled at the Indiana Vocational Technical College are encouraged to enroll at Indiana State University in order to complete requirements for the vocational teacher-preparation program is presented in EXHIBIT I. The proposal has the endorsement of the Director of the Vocational-Technical Services Center, the School of Technology, and the Vice President for Academic Affairs. Approval of the agreement was recommended.

Mr. Woll asked if there was a need for an agreement such as this for the Evansville Campus?

President Rice replied that there is a shortage of technology teachers across the nation. He cited an instance of a teacher in Mt. Vernon being offered a position in private industry paying double the present salary.

President Landini stated that this is an important agreement. The agreement is acceptable to the University and he feels there is a great need for these types of cooperative programs.

Mr. Woll feels that this is a "feather in our cap".

Dr. Reid said ISUE does not have an Industrial Arts Teaching program but it is available through the Terre Haute Campus.

Dr. Clokey remarked that this is possibly a first in a series of other similar agreements. Itis our intention to pursue agreements in relation to other programs at Ivy Tech.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the recommendation was approved.

J. CHANGE OF NAME, DEPARTMENT OF MATHEMATICS

It was recommended that the Department of Mathematics be renamed the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science, effective August 24, 1981. The recommendation has the support of the Department, the Dean and Faculty of the College of Arts and Science and the Vice President for Academic Affairs. The proposal was approved by the Executive Committee of the University Faculty Senate on May 5, 1981, and by the University Faculty Senate on May 7, 1981. The new name is in keeping with national trends and is an appropriate designation for the Department's objectives.

President Landini stated that at present there is not a separate Department of Computer Science and such name changes are common in aiding the departments to describe and facilitate the program of activities. It comes to the Board for approval after much discussion and approval by the University Faculty.

Mr. Winchell said that "as a gesture, I intend to vote no". He recalled that when he was first appointed to the Board, the name change of the Department of Special Education to the Department of Special Education, School Psychology and Communication Disorders came before the Board. He feels this name is too complex. He also noted that the Department of Special Education is still listed as such in the University Directory.

Mr. Woll asked if software study and uses were applicable to local industry?

Dr. Clokey remarked that there are two programs on the campus that deal with computer science. In mathematics the computer science program is very popular as it deals essentially with language and software. The graduates of this program are finding employment readily, not only locally, but in the state and nationwide. There is contact between the faculty and the local community in placing students for summer employment.

Computer Technology is also very popular as it deals with hardware. The distinction between software and hardware is getting more and more difficult to make. It is essentially the difference between adapting the computer to industrial needs as is done in computer technology or designing uses for them in computer science curricula.

On a motion by Mr. Woll, seconded by Mr. Breeden, the recommendation was approved. Mr. Winchell cast a nay vote.

K. ISU SUMMER THEATER

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It was recommended that ticket prices for Summer Theater be increased from the present \$3.00 charge to \$4.00.

President Landini remarked that the summer theater was the best entertainment one would find in the area for \$4.00.

On a motion by Mrs. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Breeden, the recommendation was approved.

L. TIAA-CREF REVISED RETIREMENT PLAN

The TIAA-CREF Revised Retirement Plan Resolution presented in EXHIBIT K has been amended to incorporate a change in the repurchase policy and to include the increased University contribution. Approval was recommended.

On a motion by Mr. Winchell, seconded by Mrs. Fouty, the recommendation was approved.

M. AGREEMENT BETWEEN INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY AND KATHERINE HAMILTON MENTAL HEALTH CENTER

On October 1, 1976, the Indiana State University Board of Trustees authorized the University to enter into an agreement between the Indiana State University Student Counseling Center and Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center.

Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center agrees to provide psychiatric consultation to the Indiana State University Student Counseling Center. The psychiatrist will not see students who are clients of the Student Counseling Center but will serve in a consulting role to the counselors. Indiana State University agrees to pay a sum of \$660 to Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center for the provision of this service for June, July and August of 1981. Indiana State University further agrees to pay a sum of \$3,520 to Katherine Hamilton Mental Indiana State University further agrees to pay a sum of \$3,520 to Katherine Hamilton Mental Health Center for the provision of this service forthe 1981-82 academic year. Both parties indicate that this agreement has been very successful and should be continued.

It was recommended that the agreement be approved.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Mr. Winchell, the recommendation was approved.

N. REMODEL STUDENT HEALTH CENTER (THIRD FLOOR)

The Third Floor of the Student Health Center is an unfinished space which was constructed to provide for a possible expansion of the facility when needed. It is unlikely that the space will be used for Health Center needs in the foreseeable future.

It would be appropriate to finish the Third Floor of the Student Health Center to provide space for (1) the installation of two electron microscopes with associated support areas and laboratories and (2) an area to be used by the Department of Life Sciences and the Center for Medical Technology for classrooms and laboratories. The State Board of Health has indicated its acceptance of the plan.

It was recommended that President Landini be authorized to request the Commission for Higher Education, the State Budget Agency, the State Budget Committee and the Governor of the State of Indiana to allocate \$446,717 of appropriated funds to finance the cost of the project.

On a motion by Dr. Siebenmorgen, seconded by Mr. Winchell, the recommendation was approved.

O. AGREEMENTS

It was recommended that the Indiana State University School of Nursing agreements presented in EXHIBITS L, M, N, O and P be approved. Each of the agreements provides that Indiana State University School of Nursing students shall have opportunities for clinical laboratory experiences. The agreements follow the prescribed format and content as approved by University Counsel and by the Board of Trustees on April 25, 1980.

Addendum No. 1 to Project No. 449-80-III-3 has been received from the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education in the amount of \$8,750.00 to supplement the project entitled "Performance Based Vocational Education in Food Service" under the direction of Mrs. JoAnne Rowe for the period from September 2, 1980 through September 30, 1981. It was recommended that the additional budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the grant award.

3. The Nature Conservancy Inventory Development Grant - Fund No. 2694

Letter Award dated March 20, 1981 has been received from The Nature Conservancy, Nashville, Indiana, in the amount of \$1,650.00 to conduct a study of Indiana natural areas to develop an inventory methodology under the direction of Dr. Marion T. Jackson, Professor of Life Sciences, for the period from March 20, 1981 through December 31, 1981. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

4. University Library Database Services Research Grant - Fund No. 2695

Intramural Voucher No. 10078 has been received from the University Research Account in the amount of \$2,500.00 to establish an operating fund to conduct the project entitled "Use of On-line Database Services to Support Faculty Research" under the direction of Dr. Ronald G. Leach, Dean of Library Services, for the period from May 7, 1981 through June 30, 1982. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the voucher award.

5. Indiana Department of Natural Resources County Archeological Records Grant - Fund No. 2696

Letter Award dated March 9, 1981 has been received from the Indiana Department of Natural Resources in the amount of \$12,000.00 to support the comprehensive review and survey of archaeological records for Benton, Carroll, Clinton and White Counties, Indiana, under the direction of Mr. Robert Pace, Director of the Anthropology Museum Laboratory, for the period from April 1, 1981 through July 31, 1982. It was recommended that the total budget be appropriated in accordance with the terms of the letter award.

Mr. Woll further inquired as to Item #3 involving methodology.

Dr. Clokey replied that there has not been a very satisfactory inventory of natural areas of the entire state and the project involved will enable Dr. Jackson to develop a standardized inventory system.

Q. SCHOOL OF BUSINESS LABORATORY FEES

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The School of Business has proposed charging laboratory fees for BA 276, Business Information Processing Systems, and for courses offered in the Department of Business-Distributive Education and Office Administration. The laboratory fee is requested to assist in the cost of supplies furnished to students and for the maintenance, upgrading and replacement of equipment used in the classes. Students are not required to purchase textbooks for BA 276 and all equipment and supplies are furnished.

R. BLUE CROSS-BLUE SHIELD MASTER POLICY RENEWAL, 1981-82

The Blue Cross-Blue Shield Master Policy for Indiana State University eligible staff expires on July 9, 1981. It was recommended that the present policy be renewed for the 1981-82 year effective July 10, 1981. The new rates reflect an approximate 14% increase for family coverage; 16% for single coverage; and 11% for over age 65 coverage.

Mr. Moulton stated that the University pays 75% and the individual member pays 25%. The legislature did approve the budget request for this item in full.

Mr. Neihart stated that the University's contributions from the general fund would be \$1,120,000.

Mr. Ainlay remarked he had read where questions are being raised in regard to the carrier.

Mr. Moulton stated that there is an on-going review at all times and if bids are received for lower review. for lower premiums but with the same benefits we would change companies.

On a motion by Mr. Brames, seconded by Mr. Winchell, the recommendation was approved.

S. GROUP LIFE INSURANCE PROGRAM

Proposals for the University group life insurance and accidental death and dismemberment coverage have been received from the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, Regional Marketing, Inc. (a subsidiary of Indiana Blue Cross-Blue Shield), and The Travelers Insurance Company.

Equitable proposed a rate of \$.35 per \$1000 for life insurance and \$.04 per \$1000 for accidental death and dismemberment under a retrospective agreement with an additional settlement maximum of 10 per cent at the end of the policy year depending on claims experience. The Equitable retention rate was approximately 4.5 per cent.

Regional Marketing, Inc., proposed a flex-rate billing premium through National Life Insurance Company. The Mini-rate was \$.30 per \$1000; the Maxi-rate was \$.38 per \$1000 for life insurance. The accidental death and dismemberment rate was \$.03 per \$1000.

The retrospective agreement included an additional maximum settlement of \$.96 per \$1000 of life insurance in force at the end of the policy year. The retention rate was estimated at 8.4 per cent by the company.

The Travelers Insurance Company proposal of \$.34 per \$1000 for life insurance and \$.04 per \$1000 for accidental death and dismemberment coverage under a fully insured program was recommended for approval, effective July 1, 1981. The plan should result in a savings of approximately \$70,000 for the 1981-82 fiscal year when compared to the present Equitable program. The retention plan is approximately 5 per cent under the Travelers plan.

It was further recommended that the University pay the full cost of the first \$18,000 of coverage and the excess cost over \$.30 per \$1000 for life insurance amounts in excess of \$18,000.

The staff member will continue to pay \$.30 per \$1000 for life insurance and \$.04 per \$1000 for accidental death and dismemberment coverage amounts over \$18,000. The University presently pays the full cost of the first \$15,000 of coverage and the excess cost over \$.30 per \$1000 for life insurance amounts in excess of \$15,000.

On a motion by Mr. Schmelzer, seconded by Mr. Winchell, the recommendations were approved.

T. AGREEMENT

This agreement provides that Amax Coal Company will make available a certain area to Indiana State University Anthropology Laboratory students for the purpose of conducting research studies.

On a motion by Mr. Breeden, seconded by Dr. Siebenmorgen, the recommendation was approved.

U. FAIRBANKS BUILDING

The 1981 Indiana General Assembly approved bonding authorization of \$1,178,680 for the renovation and remodeling of the Fairbanks Building for use by the Art Department. The Fairbanks Building will provide efficient studio space for painting, drawing, photography and printmaking; supply office space for the faculties involved in these areas; present studio space for graduate students in art; and consolidate the two-dimensional studio area of the Art Department.

The project will include minor structural changes, electrical and plumbing renovation, provision of storage facilities, certain lighting and ventilation equipment, air conditioning, and renovations which will bring the building up to proper code requirements for the

It was recommended that President Landini be authorized to request the Commission for Higher Education, the State Budget Agency, the State Budget Committee and the Governor of the State of Indiana to authorize the Indiana State University Board of Trustees to take the following actions relative to the \$1,178,680 academic facilities bonding authorization:

- a. To engage architects in connection with the project;
- b. To enter into contracts to construct, equip, finance and otherwise provide for the remodeling of the Fairbanks Building and related facilities;
- To use receipts from fees and earnings for the construction and financing of the project to the extent necessary; and

d. To issue and sell academic facilities bonds in an amount not exceeding the total estimated cost as finally determined by the Board of Trustees to finance the project.

Mr. Winchell remarked that it is very gratifying to him to see this remodeling. He feels the inner-campus appearance will be enhanced when the renovation and remodeling is completed and unsightly and undesirable buildings razed.

On a motion by Mrs. Fouty, seconded by Mrs. Mitchell, the recommendation was approved.

V. FINE ARTS BUILDING

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The 1981 Indiana General Assembly approved bonding authorization of \$583,000 to remodel the Fine Arts Building. The project consists of a remodeling of portions of the second and fourth floors and the entire basement of the Fine Arts Building. A restructuring of internal space plus acoustical insulation to reduce sound-transference will permit the rehabilitated area to provide seven teaching studios, a performance library and storage space, instrument repair facilities, six additional practice rooms and a student lounge.

It was recommended that President Landini be authorized to request the Commission for Higher Education, the State Budget Agency, the State Budget Committee and the Governor of the State of Indiana to authorize the Indiana State University Board of Trustees to take the following actions relative to the \$583,000 academic facilities bonding authorization.

- a. To engage architects in connection with the project.
- To enter into contracts to construct, equip, finance and otherwise provide for the remodeling of the Fine Arts Building and related facilities;
- c. To use receipts from fees and earnings for the construction and financing of the project to the extent necessary; and
- d. To issue and sell academic facilities bonds in an amount not exceeding the total estimated cost as finally determined by the Board of Trustees to finance the project.

On a motion by Dr. Siebenmorgen, seconded by Mr. Breeden, the recommendation was approved.

W. MAEHLING TERRACE DAY CARE CENTER FEE REVISION

The School of Education has requested a change in the fee structure of the Maehling Terrace Day Care Center because of the increased cost of labor and food. Approval of the following fee schedule was recommended; effective Fall Semester, 1981.

PARTNERS IN VOCATIONAL TEACHER PREPARATION

A. The Joint Enrollment Program: In this program a student interested in becoming a vocational teacher would have the opportunity of enrolling at Indiana Vocational-Technical College-Terre Haute for trade-technical preparation while at the same time enrolling in a vocational teacher-preparation program offered by Indiana State University.

This dual enrollment program encompasses the following:

- 1. A vocational-teacher preparation program taken through Indiana State University.
- 2. A trade or technical preparation program taken through the Indiana Vocational-Technical College Campus at Terre Haute.
- 3. The student has dual enrollment, each institution maintaining a separate transcript upon which only the individual institution's courses and grades are entered.
- 4. Indiana State University recognizes the Ivy Tech trade and technical preparation only at the completion of the Ivy Tech program and upon the award of the appropriate recognition by Ivy Tech. Recognition of the trade or technical preparation will be effected as outlined in B.I.5. below.
- 5. Occupational experience for Indiana State University credit will be coordinated, if requested by the student, as outlined in B.I.5.C. below.
- 6. Students in the Joint Enrollment Program will enroll in Indiana State University courses when fulfilling general education requirements of the baccalaureate degree.
- 7. Students matriculating at Indiana State University will be required to meet all baccalaureate matriculation requirements as published in the current <u>Indiana State University Bulletin</u>.
- 8. Advising of the student, while jointly enrolled at both institutions, would be accomplished through an Ivy-Tech-Indiana State University advising team with a representative from each institution as members. A jointly-developed advising form will be utilized by both advisors in establishing and recording the student's academic program.

5. Occupational Experience and Technical Competence:

The content area the student will teach in Vocational-Technical Education is the area in which the student has enrolled at IVTC. Indiana State University will grant 28 semester credits for this experience using any one of the four procedures as guidelines.

These requirements are:

- a. Three years (6,000 clock hours) of occupational experience in specific trade or occupation.
- b. Successful completion of 1,080 clock hours state approved secondary vocational program, plus $2\frac{1}{2}$ years (5,000 clock hours in a specific trade or occupation to be taught).
- *c. Successful completion of an organized apprenticeship program or a full-time twoyear post-secondary technical vocational program, plus an additional two years (4,000 clock hours of additional work experience in a specific trade or occupation to be taught).

- II. Bachelor of Science Vocational-Technical Teacher Education, Non-License Program, for post-secondary proprietary and technical schools.
 - A. General Education Requirements are the same as in the pattern for license option.

^{*}Internships are available if more occupational experience is needed.

- B. Secondary Professional Requirement: This block of 24 credits is not required for the degree in professional education. The 24 credits can be met by additional technical credit in the area of specialization, vocational-technical courses or other areas with the approval of the Industrial Technology Education Department and The Dean of the School of Technology.
- C. Professional Vocational Courses: The requirements are the same as those for the license degree program.
- D. Occupational Experience and Technical Competencies.

III. Summary:

The two degree options within the Bachelor of Science - Vocational-Technical Education require 124 semester credits for competition. The student can work on the program at IVTC-Terre Haute and a degree program at ISU at the same time.

IV. Approval:

MEMORANDUM OF CHARITABLE DONATION

THIS MEMORANDUM, duly made and entered into by and between South Central Broadcasting Corporation, an Indiana corporation with its office and principal place of business at Evansville, Indiana, hereinafter referred to as the "Donor," and the Board of Trustees of Indiana State University, an educational institution organized under the laws of the State of Indiana, for and on behalf of said Indiana State University, hereinafter referred to as the "Recipient,"

WITNESSETH, THAT:

WHEREAS, the Donor is the owner and operator of Radio Station WIKY-AM, an amplitude modulated radio station broadcasting on a frequency of 820 KHZ under a license granted by the Federal Communications Commission (the "FCC"); and

WHEREAS, the Recipient is an institution of higher education and operates an educational facility in Evansville, Indiana; and

WHEREAS, the Donor desires to donate certain of its property used or useful in the operation of its Radio Station WIKY-AM to the Recipient for use by its Evansville, Indiana, campus, subject to the conditions hereinafter set forth and subject to FCC approval; and

WHEREAS, the Recipient desires to receive said contribution as herein provided for;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby declared by the Donor and Recipient as follows:

- Property to be Donated: Upon the effective date of the donation, the Donor shall donate the following property to the Recipient:
 - a. The transmitter presently used by the Donor in the operation of Radio Station WIKY-AM;
 - b. The studio equipment described on Exhibit A, which is attached hereto and made a part
 - c. The FCC license for the operation of an amplitude modulated radio station on a frequency of 820 KHZ.

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- 2. Purpose of Donation: The purpose of this donation shall be to enable Recipient to operate an amplitude modulated radio station on a frequency of 820 KHZ, from a studio site on its Evansville, Indiana, campus.
- (a) that the FCC shall have given its unconditional written consent to the Donor's donation of the property hereinabove described to the Recipient and such consent shall have become a "final order" of the FCC which is no longer subject to administrative or judicial reconsideration, review or rehearing; and (b) that the FCC shall have given its unconditional written consent to the Donor's acquisition of Radio Station WROZ-AM, and such consent shall have become a "final order" of the FCC which is no longer subject to administrative or judicial reconsideration, review or rehearing. In the event that the FCC shall not have given said consents or the same have not become final orders within twelve (12) months after the date of the last filed application to the FCC for its consent to this donation and the Donor's acquisition of Radio Station WROZ-AM or in the event that either of said matters has been designated by the FCC for an evidentiary hearing, or in the event that the FCC shall deny approval of the Donor's acquisition of Radio Station WROZ-AM, then in any of these events, the Donor shall have the option to rescind the donation of the property hereinabove described. In the event that FCC shall deny approval of the Donor shall not make donation of said property.
- 4. Effective Date of Donation: The effective date of the donation shall be the Thirtieth (30th) day following with the satisfaction of the conditions set forth hereinabove in paragraph 3, or such other time as the parties may mutually agree in writing. As of said effective date, the Donor shall execute any and all instruments of conveyance necessary to vest title and the Recipient of any and all property to be donated hereunder.
- 5. Application for FCC Consent and Approval: The parties shall complete all the necessary information and file in final form a grantable application with the FCC requesting its unconditional written consent to this transaction within a period of one hundred twenty (120) days after the date the Donor executes a written agreement for the acquisition of Radio Station WROZ-AM. The parties pledge to take all steps as may be necessary or proper to expeditiously and diligently prosecute said application to a favorable conclusion. Concurrently with the filing of the application for FCC consent and approval, the recipient shall file an application with the FCC requesting a change of the call letters "WIKY-AM" to such other call letters as the recipient shall choose, and recipient shall do any and all other things necessary to effect the change in said call letters.
- Acknowledgment of Donation: The Recipient hereby acknowledges the donation which the Donor desires to make for the purpose expressed herein and subject to the conditions hereinabove set forth and subject to FCC approval. The Recipient hereby declares that upon the effective date of this donation, that it is the intention of the Recipient to operate an amplitude modulated radio station on a frequency of 820 KHZ from a studio site on its Evansville, Indiana, campus, and further to establish a transmitting site upon its Evansville, Indiana, campus within a period of three (3) years from the effective date of the donation, subject to FCC approval. In the event that the FCC shall not approve the establishment of a transmitting site upon Recipient's Evansville, Indiana, campus location, then it is the intent of the Recipient to establish a transmitting site at such location as may be approved by the FCC other than the present location of the transmitting site within a period of five (5) years from the effective date of the donation. The Donor acknowledges the intentions of the recipient with respect to such transmitting site and expresses its willingness to assist the Recipient in the establishment of such transmitting site in any reasonable manner, and subject to FCC approval.

INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY TIAA-CREF Revised Retirement Plan Resolution

- Purpose. A revised TIAA-CREF retirement plan was established for Indiana State University effective July 1, 1967, by action of the Indiana State University Board of Trustees at the May 26, 1967, meeting. The 1978 Amendments to the Age Discrimination in Employment Act were incorporated on June 24, 1980.
- Classes of employees eligible for participation are all regular full-time Participation. II. members of the faculty and related professional administrative staff. One-year appointees are not eligible for participation in this program. Persons employed at Indiana State University for the first time at age 66 or over are not eligible to participate in the TIAA-CREF retirement program. Participation of eligible staff members shall be as follows:

 $\underline{ ext{Class I}}$ - For those employed after July 1, 1967, who are not participating in the State of Indiana Teachers' Retirement Fund:

a) Voluntary after 2 years of service

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ınd itting b) Mandatory for faculty upon the granting of tenure, or

c) Mandatory after four years of full-time service for administrative and professional staff

Current members of TIAA-CREF may participate immediately upon employment if they were covered by their former employer or if they have contributed prior to their employment at Indiana State University for a period of no less than two years. Credit for service rendered at the University under one-year full-time appointments may be counted toward the two-year preliminary service period requirement after the eligible staff member has received a regular full-time appointment.

Class II - For those employed on or before July 1, 1967, who were participating in ISTRF:

a) Voluntary on or before December 31, 1967, or

b) Voluntary within 90 days of the completion of 10 years of credited service in ISTRF

Class III - For those employed after July 1, 1967, who are participating in ISTRF at time of employment:

a) Voluntary after 2 years of service, orb) Voluntary after 2 years of service and within 90 days of the completion of 10 years of credited service in ISTRF

No future election to participate in the TIAA-CREF Revised Retirement Plan will be available other than as outlined above. Employees who choose to continue in ISTRF will participate in the TIAA-CREF Basic Retirement Plan.

- A "normal retirement age" of July 1 following attainment of age sixty-six Retirement Age. A "normal retirement age" of July 1 10110Wing attentions to TIAA-shall be used for retirement benefits planning purposes. University contributions to TIAA-shall be used for retirement benefits planning purposes. CREF will cease on July 1 following the sixty-sixth birthday.
- Contributions to TIAA-CREF will not be made for employment continued beyond the normal retirement age as defined in Section III. Individuals who continue employment beyond the normal retirement age may continue their own contributions to TIAA-employment beyond the normal retirement age may continue their own contributions to TIAA-employment beyond the normal retirement age may continue their own contributions. CREF either through payroll deduction or through use of the tax-deferred annuity option.
- Contributions to this retirement plan shall be made in accordance with the Contributions. following schedule:

Indiana State University shall deduct the contribution of the participant from regular payments, add its own contributions, and apply the combined sum to the purchase of retirement benefits for the ment benefits for the participant as follows:

At the election of the participant, to Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association as a premium for a TIAA retirement annuity contract on the participant's life and/or to the College Retirement Equities Fund as a premium for a CREF retirement annuity certificate on the participant's life, in any proportion including full payment of the premium to either company.

Participants may elect to apply their contributions through the use of the University's Tax Deferred Annuity Program.

- VI. Contracts. Each TIAA retirement annuity contract and CREF certificate issued in accordance with Section V of this plan is for the sole purpose of providing a retirement and/or death benefit and is the property of the individual participant.
- VII. Leave of Absence. During a leave of absence with pay, Indiana State University will continue contributions based on appointment salary while on leave of absence if the participant continues his minimum required contribution. Contributions shall not be continued during a leave of absence without pay.
- VIII. Repurchase. In the event a participant in TIAA and/or CREF leaves the employ of Indiana State University for reasons other than retirement or disability and requests repurchase of his annuity, the University will approve such repurchase provided it meets the conditions under which TIAA-CREF will repurchase annuities automatically. That portion of the accumulation attributable to employee contributions shall be paid to the individual annuity owner and that portion resulting from the University's contributions shall remain in the individual's annuity contract(s) for future payment as a retirement or death benefit, except that if the institution has contributed less than \$2,000 to the annuity owner's contract(s), the entire accumulation value will be repurchased for payment in one sum to the individual annuity owner.
 - X. Amendment. While it is expected that this plan will continue indefinitely, Indiana State University reserves the right to modify or discontinue it at any time.
 - X. Effective Date. This resolution amends and supersedes the Revised TIAA-CREF Retirement Resolution approved by the Indiana State University Board of Trustees on May 26, 1967. The effective date of this amended resolution is July 1, 1981.

SECTION I, EXHIBIT L June 5, 1981

AGREEMENT BETWEEN INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY AND FAMILY PRACTICE CENTER

- I. This Agreement is entered into as of the 27 day of May, 1981.
- II. It is understood and agreed by the parties that the purpose of the relationship established by this Agreement is to facilitate the clinical laboratory experiences of students enrolled in the associate, baccalaureate, graduate, and continuing education program in the School of Nursing.

III. PLAN FOR INSTRUCTION

- A. Placement of students with the <u>Family Practice Center</u> will be planned in accordance with the calendar of the School of Nursing by the Dean and the Director of <u>Family Practice Center</u> or their designates, at least three (3) months prior to the assignment.
- B. Specific times of the placements to the <u>Family Practice Center</u> will be arranged according to the students' clinical laboratory experiences.
- tv. RESPONSIBILITIES OF INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY (SCHOOL OF NURSING)
 - A. Function within all applicable rules, regulations, and policies of Family Practice Center.
 - B. Assume responsibility for the teaching-guidance of the students in clinical laboratory experiences. School of Nursing faculty will be available to students in the clinical areas. Clinical assignments for students will be made by the faculty member in consultation with the Director and designated staff of Family Practice Center.
 - C. Provide the anticipated number, the type of schedule planned, the kind of educational experiences desired, and the academic status of students at least one (1) month prior to the semester in which they are placed for clinical laboratory experiences.
 - D. Provide to the <u>Family Practice Center</u> staff, the objectives for students' clinical laboratory experience.

- Require each student participating in the program to provide liability insurance coverage for malpractice with a limit of Two Hundred Thousand and No/100 (\$200,000.00) dollars for injury or damage to any one person and a limit of Six Hundred Thousand and No/100 (\$600,000.00) dollars for injury or damage arising from any one accident.
- RESPONSIBILITIES OF FAMILY PRACTICE CENTER
 - Accept students for educational experiences in those courses for which placement has been mutually revised, planned, and arranged.
 - Make available those clinical laboratory experiences agreed upon.
 - Provide orientation to the School of Nursing faculty and students to familiarize them with clients; the Family Practice Center philosophy, policies and procedures; the physical facilities, and such other aspects as are pertinent to the education of students.
 - Provide interview and conference space, as available, following mutually arranged schedules of use.
 - E. Make available the agency's library facilities to students and faculty for use on the premises.

MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. Confer on plans, problems, and changes related to the clinical laboratory experiences.
- Perform duties and obligations at no cost to the other party.
- Release the other party of any liability as a result of any acts of its agents, servants, employees, officers and students occurring out of the operation of this program for any injury or damage sustained by it or any person in privity therewith.

VII. AMENDMENT

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This Agreement will be reviewed annually. Any revision or addition covered by this Agreement will be done in writing and agreed upon by both parties.

VIII. TERMINATION

Each party may terminate this Agreement by at least one (1) calendar year's written notice to the other party. All students enrolled in the School of Nursing program at the time that notice to terminate this Agreement is given by either party to the other shall be permitted to complete at the Family Practice Center, the clinical laboratory experiences needed for graduation subject to the torms and conditions contained herein needed for graduation subject to the terms and conditions contained herein.

IX. DISTRIBUTION

One copy of the signed Agreement will be retained in the School of Nursing with the remaining signed copies distributed by the School of Nursing to the following:

- Director of Family Practice Center

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND AMAX COAL COMPANY

THIS COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT, made and entered into this _____ day of May, 1981, between the Indiana State University Board of Trustees, acting through its Anthropology Laboratory (hereinafter called "ISU"), and AMAX Coal Company, a division of AMAX, Inc., a New York Corporation (hereinafter called "AMAX").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, AMAX owns or leases certain property located in Warrick County, Indiana, more particularly described as being that property colored red on the plat attached hereto as Exhibit A and hereby made a part hereof (hereinafter referred to as the "Study Area"); and

WHEREAS, ISU has the facilities, technical expertise, manpower and funding to conduct research studies and desires to conduct research studies on the Study Area in accordance with the provisions of that certain letter dated March 23, 1981, from Mr. Robert E. Pace ("Pace") to Ms. Carol S. Thompson (hereinafter referred to as the "Studies"), a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit B and hereby made a part hereof;

WHEREAS, AMAX is willing to make the Study Area available for the Studies; provided, however, that AMAX's tenant, Glenn Schlensker, consents to having the Studies conducted on the Study Area;

NOW, THEREFORE:

A. ISU agrees:

- 1. To prepare a work plan (the "Plan") for the Studies;
- 2. To let AMAX review and comment on the Plan;
- 3. To conduct the Studies in accordance with the Plan as reviewed and approved by AMAX and with the terms of this Agreement;
- 4. To confine the research activities hereunder to the Study Area;
- 5. To pay or cause Pace to pay all costs for the installation of any equipment and any necessary structures occasioned by the demands of the Studies and at the conclusion of this Agreement, to remove or cause Pace to remove such property;
- 6. To have its representatives sign in and out at the appropriate AMAX mine office when entering upon land owned or leased by AMAX in regard to the Studies conducted hereunder;
- 7. To have its employees and representatives comply with all applicable laws, rules and regulations including but not limited to those laws, rules and regulations regarding health and safety;
- 8. To provide liability insurance in the amount of \$500,000 to protect ISU and AMAX against liability and loss by reason of injury (including death) sustained by or any damage to the property of any person as a result of the negligence or misconduct of ISU or its employees, agents or representatives in connection with the Studies. ISU shall furnish a Certificate of Insurance evidencing such insurance protection.
- 9. To make available to AMAX all data from the Studies but no such data or information contained therein shall be given publicity in any manner by AMAX without the consent of ISU, it being understood that the right to publish, or otherwise impart to the public, the results of the Studies shall be vested in ISU; and
- 10. To furnish AMAX with a copy of any report derived from the Studies and allow AMAX 30 days from its receipt thereof to review and submit written comments in regard to such report prior to any publication thereof. All such comments will be included in such report if desired by AMAX and consented to by ISU which consent will not be unreasonably withheld.
- B. AMAX agrees to make the Study Area available for the Studies and to grant ISU access to such land for the purposes set forth in this Agreement and the Plan; provided, however, that AMAX is able to obtain the consent of its tenant, Glenn Schlensker, for the Studies to be conducted on the Study Area.

- C. Both parties hereto hereby agree as follows:
 - 1. That nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as obligating ISU to expend in excess of appropriations authorized by or funding provided by sponsoring agencies of ISU;
 - There will be no expenditures by AMAX in the form of money, manpower or equipment unless so designated and approved in writing by AMAX's Senior Vice President -Engineering; and
 - 3. That this Agreement will become effective as of the day and year first written above, and will remain in effect until July 1, 1981, unless sooner terminated by either party hereto by such party giving 30 days written notice to the other, whereupon this Agreement shall terminate without further act of either party hereto.



Dear Ms. Thompson:

In view of our telephone conversation on March 20, I am enclosing a topographic map with the location of the archaeological site the ISU Anthropology Laboratory would like to test.

With appropriate permission, tests would be limited to no more than ten units, three meters square or less in size, within an area of one acre. Each unit would be hand excavated to culturally sterile soil (estimated to be no more than 0.8 meter depth), backfilled and compacted. Materials recovered would be processed by the ISU Anthropology Laboratory, with results made available to AMAX Coal Company. All costs would be assumed by the ISU Anthropology Laboratory. We would like to conduct the testing within the time period of May and June.

The site is reported as a probable single component Late Archaic camp, occupied at such lenth or intensity to produce identifiable kitchen midden. Our interest is in recovering sufficient information to establish subsistence patterns, and chronological and spatial affiliations within the region.

Any assistance you may offer in obtaining permission will be appreciated.
