I would like to begin by welcoming everyone to the newest edition of the Journal of Theoretical and Philosophical Criminology. Vol. 2(2) represents the end of our second year of publication and we are definitely looking forward to the future. Our readership has grown continually over the last eighteen months and we fully anticipate that trend to continue as the journal becomes better known to the community of scholars within criminology, criminal justice and offender treatment. In November, we will be introducing the first volume in our special edition series, which will focus on the ethical challenge of solitary confinement for mentally ill inmates.
