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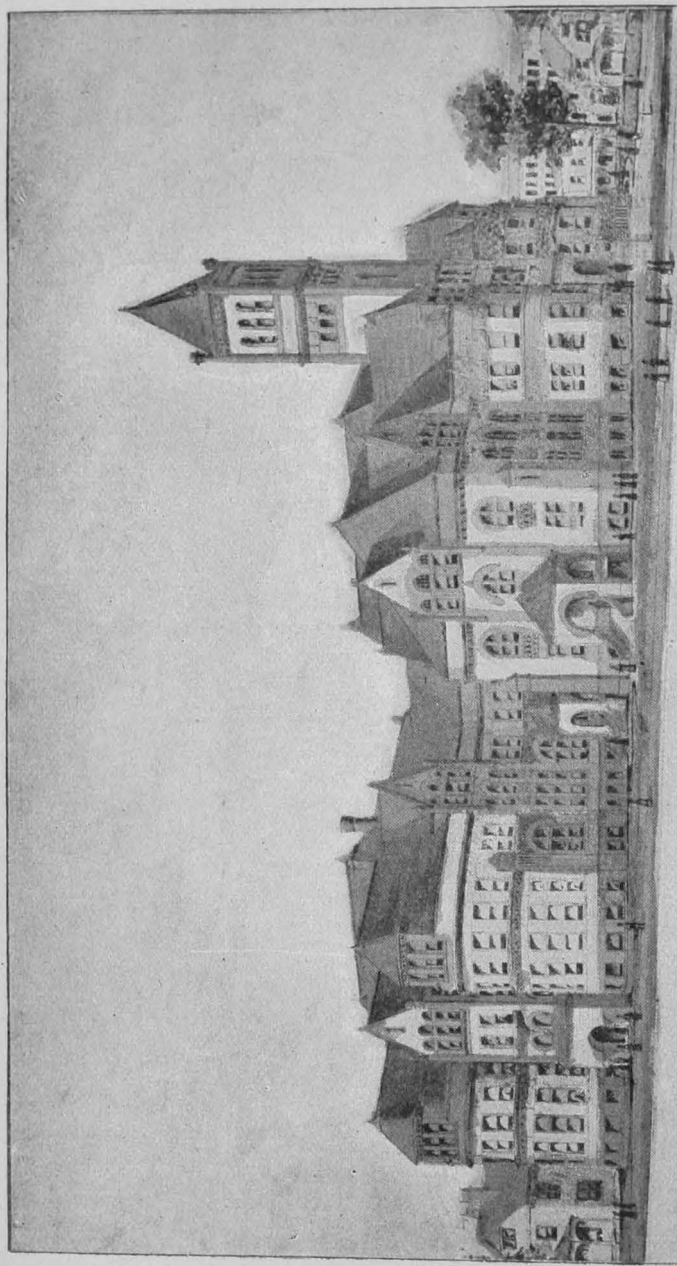

BOARD OF VISITORS

An Act Approved March 5, 1873.

Section 1. "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, That Section 14 of said act be amended to read as follows, to wit: The State Board of Education shall appoint annually in the month of June, or at their first meeting thereafter, a committee of three, who shall constitute a board of visitors, and shall, in a body, or by one of their number, visit said school once during each term, and witness the exercises and otherwise inspect the condition of the school, and by the close of the Normal School year they shall make a report to the board of trustees. The members of said board of visitors shall be allowed five dollars for each day's service rendered, and also traveling expenses, to be paid out of the State Treasury."

INDIANA STATE NORMAL SCHOOL

HISTORICAL SKETCH

The act of the General Assembly which created the State Normal School was approved December 20, 1865. This act defined the object of the school to be "the preparation of teachers for teaching in the common schools of Indiana," provided for the appointment of a board of trustees, the location of the buildings, the organization of a training school, the adoption of courses of study, and created the Normal School fund for the maintenance of the institution. The act further required the trustees to locate the school at the town or city of the State that should obligate itself to give the largest amount in cash or buildings and grounds to secure the school. The city of Terre Haute was the only place to offer any inducements to secure the institution. A tract of land three hundred feet square near the center of the city, valued at \$25,000, and \$50,000 in cash were offered, and the city agreed to maintain forever one-half the necessary expense of keeping the buildings and grounds in repair. This liberal offer was accepted and the construction of the building was begun. Aided by subsequent appropriations, the trustees were able to complete certain por-

tions of the building, and the school was opened January 6, 1870. The professional training of teachers was an experiment in Indiana, and the institution began its work without the confidence and united support of the people of the State.

Twenty-three students were present on the opening day and this number increased to forty by the end of the term. The attendance has grown steadily since the opening of the school, and during the year ending June 22, 1905, 1,398 different students were enrolled. In 1887 the school had become so large that it was necessary for the high school of Terre Haute, which had occupied a portion of the building since its completion, to find new quarters, thus leaving the entire building of three stories to be occupied by the Normal School alone.

On the forenoon of April 9, 1888, the building and its contents were almost totally destroyed by fire. Only the foundations were left unimpaired; the library, furniture, apparatus and everything in the building—the accumulation of eighteen years—were consumed. Terre Haute provided temporary quarters for the school, and, under the contract to maintain one-half the expense of repairs to the buildings and grounds, promptly gave \$50,000 in cash with which to begin the work of rebuilding. The next General Assembly appropriated \$100,000 for the completion of the building and the purchase of a new library, etc. With these sums the school constructed a commodious and beautiful building, and

purchased an equipment for every department much superior to that possessed before the fire.

The Legislature of 1893 appropriated \$40,000 for the construction of a new building to be used for gymnasia, library and laboratories. The General Assembly of 1895 appropriated \$20,000 and the General Assembly of two years later \$10,000 with which to complete this building.

MATERIAL EQUIPMENT

The State Normal School occupies two large, handsome buildings, each four stories high. The larger building, constructed immediately after the fire of 1888, is about 190x150 feet, and is a very commodious, well-appointed school building. It contains an assembly room capable of seating three hundred persons, a beautiful chapel which seats comfortably one thousand persons, the president's office, reception room, cloak rooms, class rooms, wash rooms, etc. It is, architecturally, one of the most beautiful buildings in the State, and its internal arrangement is well adapted to the purpose for which it was constructed.

The second building is about 100x100 feet, and is, architecturally, in general harmony with the larger building. The basement story contains the two gymnasia; the second story is occupied by the library. This is a large, well-lighted, beautiful room, admirably adapted to library use. The third story is occupied by the several science departments. The

fourth story is used by the literary societies and the Y. M. and Y. W. C. A. The library is equipped with every needed appliance, and contains about 35,000 well-selected volumes. The chemical, biological and physical laboratories on the third floor are substantially finished and are equipped with everything needed for the science work of the school.

A handsome four-story model or training school building is in process of construction, and will be completed and ready for occupancy by the opening of the school in September, 1905.

Probably there are few, if any, normal schools in the United States that are more fully equipped in all their departments for work than is this institution.

THE PURPOSE OF THE SCHOOL

The statute of 1865 which created the Indiana State Normal School clearly defined its object. This was declared to be "the preparation of teachers for teaching in the common schools of Indiana." The State Normal School, then, is not an institution for general culture for its own sake; it is a special school—a professional school. Its sole purpose is to confer on its students that education, discipline, professional training and practical skill which will best fit them for teaching in the public schools of Indiana. The school limits its attention and work to this one thing—the preparation of teachers for teaching in the common schools of Indiana. No person is admitted who does not enter for the purpose of prepar-

ing to teach in the common schools of the State, and all the work of the school has this one end in view. Perhaps a brief statement of the school's work in its attempt to fulfill this one object of its existence may aid some to determine whether or not they wish to become students.

Since the common schools of the State consist largely of the district and grade schools and the greater part of the common school work is in the elementary or common branches, the State Normal School seeks first of all to ground its students (such as do not already possess this knowledge) thoroughly in the common or legal branches of study. These lie at the foundation of all learning and scholarship. They are indeed the "fundamental branches of learning." It is also true that the great majority of pupils in the public schools do not advance beyond these elementary subjects. If the State's system of common schools is to become what its founders designed it to be, it must be largely through the efficient teaching of these elementary branches. About one year of the Normal School course is devoted to a thorough, reflective study of these. They are not pursued and taught as in a common elementary school. The student is required to possess the usual general knowledge of these subjects to be admitted. In the Normal School he is led to make a more critical and philosophical investigation of the facts and subject-matter than he has hitherto done. He now studies these subjects from a professional

point of view, from a teacher's standpoint. His own method of studying them, and the method of presenting them appropriate to the different grades of the public schools, are themselves objects of attention and study. The whole presentation of the subject is surrounded by a pedagogical atmosphere which is altogether absent from the ordinary school. The student is not only acquiring a larger and better knowledge of the subjects themselves, but he is learning to teach them. All persons are required to pursue the common school branches before graduating except college graduates and persons holding three years', sixty months', professional or life State licenses.

In the next place the course in the Normal School requires every student to pursue a long line of more strictly professional work—that is, work which is designed to give special insight into all educational questions and to prepare the individual for intelligent and reasonable charge of a school. This line of study consists of educational psychology, experimental psychology, theory of the school, the principles of methods, observation in the training schools and the interpretation of the teaching observed, child-study, history of education, school supervision, school systems of Europe and America, science of education, and practice in the training schools. In this more strictly professional department of the students' work every phase of education receives extended, thorough and systematic treat-

ment—the historical, the theoretical and the practical. The whole object of this is to lead the student to acquire a knowledge of the principles of education and to acquire a reasonable degree of skill in applying these as a teacher. He is to be freed from obedience to mere prescription and rule as a teacher and acquire genuine originality and true individuality. Rational understanding of his vocation is aimed at and the power to determine from the standpoint of principle what the process and work of the school should be.

In the third place, the school requires its students to pursue such advanced lines and courses of study as will best reinforce the knowledge of the common school branches, and at the same time best prepare them for the more advanced grades of public school work. Courses in Latin, German, History, Mathematics, Literature, Science, etc., are offered, and no student can graduate who does not in addition to his study of the common branches and the professional line, pursue a sufficient number of these to complete four years' work in the school. Like the common school subjects, these branches are studied constantly from the teacher's point of view, and the student is frequently led to reflect upon their value as means of education, the method by which they are being studied, methods of teaching these appropriate to the grades in which they are studied, etc. The object is to make the entire work of the school strongly and distinctively professional.

EXPLANATION OF COURSES AND MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION

DIVISIONS OF YEAR

The school year is divided into four terms, denoted respectively the fall, winter, spring and summer terms. The first three are each thirteen weeks long; the summer term is six weeks in length.

CREDITS

The term "credit" is used to denote the successful completion of a course—thirteen weeks—in any subject.

COURSES LEADING TO GRADUATION

The State Normal School maintains five courses of study, as follows: (1) A four years' course; (2) an abridgment of this course for graduates of commissioned high schools; (3) an abridgment of the same course for persons holding one or more three years' licenses; (4) an abridgment of this course for persons holding professional or sixty months' licenses and (5) a course for college or university graduates and persons holding life licenses.

THE COURSE OF FOUR YEARS requires fifty credits for graduation. It is designed to meet the needs of those persons that enter the school having the min-

imum scholarship. The object of this course is to give as thorough and complete a preparation for common school teaching as can be conferred in the period named. The various abridgments of this course are indicated under the next heading.

CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION

1. **LEGAL.**—Sixteen years of age, if females; eighteen, if males. Good health. Satisfactory evidence of undoubted moral character. A pledge that the applicant wishes to enter the school in good faith to prepare to teach, if practicable, in the public schools of Indiana.
2. **SCHOLASTIC.**—The following classes of students are admitted and credited, as explained below:

College graduates and holders of life State licenses are admitted without examination to the Senior class. Twelve credits—one year's work—are required for graduation. Seven of these must be professional subjects—educational psychology three terms, general method one term, and observation and practice in the training school two terms. The other five may be elected by the student from the remaining professional and academic subjects.

Holders of professional or sixty months' licenses are admitted without examination to the Junior class. Twenty-five credits are necessary to graduation. Of these seven must be the professional sub-

jects named above. The other eighteen may be chosen from the remaining professional and academic subjects.

Holders of thirty-six months' licenses are admitted without examination to the Sophomore class. Such students receive fifteen credits on the course. Thirty-five additional credits are necessary for graduation. Of these the seven professional subjects named above and one term in rhetoric and composition are required. The other twenty-seven may be elected from the remaining professional and academic subjects of the course.

Graduates of commissioned high schools are admitted without examination to the Sophomore class. Such persons receive fourteen credits on the course. Thirty-six additional credits are necessary for graduation. Of these seven (as above) are required to be professional subjects, one rhetoric and composition, and fifteen common school branches. The other thirteen credits required for graduation may be made in subjects elected by the student from the remaining professional and academic subjects of the course.

Holders of two years', one year or six months' licenses, graduates of non-commissioned high schools and persons that have completed at least three years' work in commissioned high schools are admitted without examination to the Freshman class. Fifty credits—four years' work—are necessary for graduation. Of these fifteen are required to be made in

the common branches, one in rhetoric and composition, and seven in the professional subjects. The other twenty-seven may be elected from the remaining professional and academic subjects of the course.

SPECIAL COURSES

Many persons are at work in the schools who do not expect to make teaching their life work. They are, however, devoted to the work of teaching while engaged in it, and conscientiously desire to render efficient service as teachers. Others who have adopted teaching as their life vocation are so situated that it is impracticable at present for them to attend the State Normal School during the period necessary to graduation. Applications are received from many of these who desire to take a course of one year or more, devoting their time exclusively to such branches as they are required to teach and to certain phases of pedagogical study that bear directly on the problems of instruction and school management that confront them from day to day.

To provide helpful work for these classes of teachers, adapted to their situation and needs, the State Normal School offers a variety of one year courses. These short courses include such academic subjects, of their own selection, as will meet the urgent needs of the classes of teachers referred to, also instruction in educational psychology, history of education, the principles of methods, and other pedagogical sub-

jects. The opportunity is also given to observe and study, under careful direction, the work of the model or training schools. These schools include a country training school, and eight grades of the city schools which are located in the Normal School building. Competent, skilled critic teachers are in charge of these schools. They are designed to be model schools and to furnish teachers the opportunity to observe and study school work in all grades under the best possible conditions. By an arrangement with the city school authorities of Terre Haute, opportunity is given also to observe the work in all departments of the Terre Haute High School.

TIME FOR ENTERING

For all reasons it is best to be present at the opening of the term, but students are admitted at any time in the year. Experience has shown that persons entering several days or weeks late and attempting to carry the regular number of studies and make a full term's credits are usually crippled in their work throughout the term. Hereafter persons entering three weeks or more after the opening of the term will be limited for the term to such number of studies as they can profitably carry.

CERTIFICATES AND DIPLOMAS

Under the law, when students complete the course of study, they receive certificates of graduation, not

diplomas. "At the expiration of two years after graduation, satisfactory evidence of professional ability to instruct and manage a school having been received, they (graduates) shall be entitled to a diploma appropriate to such professional degrees as the trustees shall confer upon them; which diplomas shall be considered sufficient evidence of qualification to teach in any of the schools of the State."

DISCIPLINE OF THE SCHOOL

The end of all school government and discipline, intelligently conceived and administered, is the rational self-control and self-direction of the pupil. This is to be the outcome in the pupil. The effort is made to derive all rules of government from the inherent nature and purposes of the organization itself. This is the true basis of such rules; from this alone they derive their authority, and not from the teacher's will and utterance. A system of school regulations which aims only at arbitrary restraint, without leading the pupil to order his conduct by clearly conceived principles of right doing, lacks the most essential educative qualities. The formation of correct habits of thought and action, the development of worthy character; these are the true aims of school discipline. The discipline of the Normal School is administered in this general thought and spirit. Students are led to see the reasonableness of the requirements made of them, so that their obedi-

ence may be intelligent and educative. In respect to discipline, as in all other particulars, the Normal School seeks to make itself in fact what it must be by definition—a model school.

EXPENSES

Board, including fuel and light, can be had in good families at \$3 to \$4 per week, according to the quality of accommodations. There are good facilities for self-boarding and for club-boarding in the city at a cost of \$1.75 to \$2.00 per week. Nearly all the students board in clubs, thus reducing their entire expenses for board and room rent to \$2.50 or \$3.00 per week for good accommodations. The expenses of many do not exceed \$2.25 per week. The only charge made by the school is a library fee of \$2 per term.

The necessary expenses for a year in the Normal School will not vary greatly from the following estimate:

ELECTIVE WORK

Students are required to elect work by subjects, not by terms. When a student elects a subject he is required to take a year's work in that subject, unless, for good reasons, he is permitted by the faculty to discontinue it and take up another line of study in its place. The rule does not apply to the elementary work in Latin, in which those electing the subject are required to take at least five terms' work.

All students above the preparatory course are permitted to choose for themselves the order in which they will pursue the subjects of the course.

ADVANCED STANDING BY EXAMINATION

The Normal School is authorized to give a formal credit on its course to the following classes of students: (1) College graduates; (2) graduates of commissioned high schools; (3) persons holding life State licenses; (4) persons holding professional or sixty months' licenses; (5) persons holding three-years' county licenses. These are all admitted without examination.

Persons not included in the above named classes, and wishing to be credited with any subjects in the course, are required to pass thorough, satisfactory examinations in such subjects. Effort is made to give every person full credit for all knowledge of subjects possessed on entering, and to assist him to

advance as rapidly and to graduate as soon as is consistent with a thorough teacher's knowledge of the subjects studied.

Examinations conducted for passing persons out of given subjects without detailed study of these in the school are made thorough, extended and professional in character. The object is not simply to test the applicant's knowledge of the subject in its academic aspects, but to ascertain what he knows of it from a teacher's point of view. The psychology of the subject, its method and its educational value are considered in these examinations.

Examinations for advanced standing will hereafter be conducted on the first and second days of each term.

Persons wishing to substitute credits on the Normal School course that have been made at other reputable institutions are referred to the various heads of departments, who will make such investigations and conduct such examinations as they deem best. Just credit will be given for all scholarship and professional training acquired at other institutions.

YOUNG MEN'S AND YOUNG WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATIONS

The Y. M. and Y. W. C. A. are the two Christian organizations of the school. They have for their principal object the development of a more perfect Christian character in each of their members and

the bringing of those who have never known the Christian life to a realization of its beauty and power.

The associations employ different means to accomplish their purpose. Each association holds one regular devotional meeting every week. The young men's meeting is held on Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Association Room; the young women's meeting is held on Thursday at the same time and place.

Regular courses of Bible study are planned and carried out each year. The work as now planned requires four years for its completion.

Two receptions are given each term. The first, at the beginning of the term, is for the reception of the new students. A very commendable feature of these receptions is the spirit manifested by the old students in helping the new students to feel at home.

There are two classes of members in each of the associations, the "active" and the "associate." The first is made up of those connected in good standing with some evangelical church; the second class, of young men and women of good moral character who are interested in Christian work, though not connected with any church.

The Association room is located on the fourth floor of the new building, and is furnished with piano, desk, chairs and hymn books—in fact, everything that is needed to conserve the interests of the associations.

CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION HOUSES

Each of the above organizations has rented and furnished a large house to be used as its headquarters and as a rooming place for its members. Large, well heated and well lighted rooms are rented at moderate prices. Reading and reception rooms materially increase the comfort and efficiency of the organizations.

DEPARTMENTAL STATEMENTS

A very brief statement is herewith presented by the various heads of departments concerning the instruction given in their respective subjects. Only the most general idea of the scope and character of the work done can be set forth in so small compass.

PHILOSOPHY OF EDUCATION

WILLIAM WOOD PARSONS, Professor.

PSYCHOLOGY

The work in psychology includes three courses in introspective psychology and three courses in experimental psychology. The work in introspective psychology is required and that in experimental psychology is elective.

The student should enter upon the work in introspective psychology not later than the third term of the sophomore year, in order to enable him to

complete the seven required terms of professional work by the end of the school course, carrying one required professional subject only during each term.

Students will be limited to one only of the required professional subjects each term unless the arrangements which make it advisable to pursue more than one such subject were made prior to the beginning of the spring term of 1905.

College graduates and students who have been granted the two years' credit on the basis of a license for sixty months or more are permitted to pursue more than one of the professional subjects during the same term. The first are entitled to pursue three of the required subjects during the first term (Psychology I and II and Method I), three during the second term (Psychology III, Method II and Practice I), and one during the third term (Practice II). Those who have received a credit of two years are entitled to pursue two of the required professional subjects during the first term of the senior year (Psychology III and Method I).

The work in experimental psychology may be entered upon as early as the first term of the junior year. There are advantages, however, in beginning the work in the third term of the junior year.

The student should plan his course so as to have completed the first and second terms in physiology by the time he is due in the first term's work in introspective psychology, since the knowledge of physiology, especially of the nervous system, con-

stitutes such an important basis for the work in psychology.

The courses in experimental psychology are numbered IV, V, and VI. These are laboratory courses in educational psychology.

It is, at last, established as a fact that the laboratory is as valuable a means of instruction in psychology as it is in biology, physics or chemistry. It multiplies opportunities for introspection. It makes possible the isolation for study of each element in a child's mental states, which are necessarily complex because conditioned by a complex schoolroom environment. Therefore, it guarantees a more complete mastery of conscious processes to any one who views these processes as educational method.

INTROSPECTIVE PSYCHOLOGY

EXPERIMENTAL PSYCHOLOGY

UNITED STATES HISTORY AND CIVIL GOVERNMENT

ELLWOOD WADSWORTH KEMP, Professor.

AUSTIN WILLIS INMAN, Spring Assistant.

The work of the department of United States History and Civil Government comprises four terms. The work is intended to present a course for the

eight grades and lead forward to the work in American history in the High School.

The chief subjects discussed are:

1. The nature of history.
2. Principles underlying the development of history.
3. The relation of geography to history.
4. The principles underlying the selection of material and teaching of history.
5. The material of history adapted to grade work.

The work begins with the development of the early life of the Aryan Race, and follows briefly the stages of its growth in general outline as it developed through Greece, Rome, Western Europe, and finally in America. This life is considered along with the life surrounding the pupil in the United States so that he may be able to compare the one with the other and gain a fuller view of the background of American History than he gains by beginning the study with the discovery of America.

Course I.—The aim of Course I is to present the principles upon which elementary history is based and the first four grades, and compare this life with that surrounding the pupil in American history down to 1750.

Course II.—The aim of Course II is to present the work of the fifth and sixth grades, and compare this with the life surrounding the pupil in the United States from 1750 to 1801. This course gives atten-

tion to the immediate conditions out of which the United States Constitution sprang; and also to the teaching of this material in the elementary grades.

Course III.—The aim of Course III is to show the growth of the ideas developed in courses one and two as they unfolded in America from 1801 to 1865; also to present the method of presenting this work in the seventh and eighth grades.

Course IV.—The aim of the work in the fourth course is to present the history of the United States from 1865 to the present time, giving special attention to the political and constitutional questions which have arisen in our country during that time.

METHODS, OBSERVATION AND PRACTICE

ALBERT ROSS CHARMAN, Professor.

This department deals with the process of learning on both its theoretical and practical side. Part of the time is given to the study of the principles and methods of learning and part is given to the application of the principles and methods in the Training Schools, which are the students' pedagogical laboratories.

The courses in the department are as follows: Two in methods, two in practice in the Training School, one in regular observation, and one in general observation. The two courses in observation are elective and the other four are required.

Students should enter upon the work in methods not later than the third term of the junior year so as to complete the four required courses in this department by the end of the senior year, pursuing one course each term. The student should complete the work in introspective psychology before entering upon the work in methods. No overlapping of subjects will be permitted, except in the case of college graduates and others having advanced standing of two years or more. See statement under Psychology.

METHODS

Course I.—The general conception of method with its stages of development. Method as an objective and as a subjective process. Special method. Method in one or more of the common school branches.

Course II.—Method applied to the lesson. The recitation viewed in relation to the other activities of the school. Observation in the Practice Schools. Interpretation of lessons observed. The organization and planning of lessons.

PRACTICE

Course I.—In this course students are required to observe and teach in each of the eight grades in the City Training School and in the Rural Training School. The time given to teaching and observing is divided about equally.

The aim is to give the student skill in organizing, planning and interpreting lessons, and also practice in presenting them.

The time from 3:40 to 4:30 is given to discussion, not only of lessons observed and taught, but also of the principles underlying artistic teaching, organization of the school, curriculum, program, etc.

Course II.—In this second course the time given to observing and teaching is about the same as in Course I. The students are allowed to emphasize the phase of work for which they are making special preparation. The opportunity for observation is extended to the city schools of Terre Haute.

Discussions from 3:40 to 4:30 are held frequently for the consideration of special problems, details of work and reports on work observed in other schools.

Each student is to select some special educational problem and study it carefully during the term and write a paper setting forth the problem, its difficulties and his mode of solving it.

The aim in this term is to give the student every opportunity which the actual school affords to study the work of the school theoretically and practically and also to do, under criticism, all the work which a well organized school requires.

OBSERVATION

Course I.—Regular observation may be elected by any student in any term in the course. Part of the

time is given to observation of lessons in the Training School and part is given to the discussion of the essential elements in the structure of the lesson in general and the consideration of them in connection with the lessons observed. Attention is also given to the organization of the common school branches and to questions of order, management and general organization of the school. Credit is given for this course.

Course II.—Beside the course in regular observation an opportunity is given for individual observation. This affords students a chance to observe the daily work of the school and thus become acquainted, to some extent, with the course of study, assignments, mode of presenting work, apparatus, reference books, programs, etc. In addition to the observing of lessons, the students are at liberty to attend the discussion conducted by critic teachers in connection with the practice work at the close of the school day.

At the close of the term each observer is to make a brief report, indicating (1) time spent in observing, (2) subjects observed, (3) new views of teaching gained, (4) the plan for a lesson. No credit.

The facilities for observation and practice are quite complete.

The City Training School, which is now conducted in a new, modern building, has eight grades and eight teachers.

The Rural Training School, six miles east of the city on an interurban car line, is a model district school in charge of a professionally trained teacher.

By an arrangement with the city school authorities, the members of the senior class of the Normal School are entitled to observation in all the grades, including the High School.

PHYSICS AND CHEMISTRY

ROBERT GREENE GILLUM, Professor.

PHYSICS

The work in physics is two years. The first year will cover the ground of general physics.

Course I.—The work of this course will be presented under two heads:

1. Matter and its divisions, properties and conditions, in which some attention is given to a discussion of the structure of matter, molecule, physical and chemical changes, the phenomena of attraction, cohesion, adhesion, capillarity, etc.

2. Mechanics. As motion and force, work and energy, gravitation, falling bodies, the pendulum, the simple machines, hydrostatics and pneumatics.

Course II.—This course will include three subjects:

1. Sound.—Nature of sound, velocity, reflection, refraction, characteristics of tone, forced and sympathetic vibrations, laws of vibrations, etc.

2. Heat.—Nature of heat, temperature, thermometry, production and transference of heat, effects of heat, measurement of heat and relation of heat to work.

3. Light.—Nature of radiation, velocity and intensity of light, reflection and refraction of light, spectra, chromatics, interference, polarization and optical instruments.

Course III.—The work of this course will be electricity and magnetism. The class will discuss static and current electricity, magnetism, electric generators, electromagnetic induction, electrical measurements, and some of the more important applications of electricity. All points in the class work are fully illustrated by experiment.

The laboratory work in general physics is all quantitative work, and the time of each course for the first year is divided about equally between the recitation and the laboratory work.

Course Ia. In addition to the above courses, a course will be offered in natural science. It will be one year. The first half of the year will be devoted to physics and the second half to chemistry. This course is open to all students, but is especially arranged for those persons who expect to do grade work only, and is intended to aid the work in geography and physiology. The work may be taken to

advantage at the beginning of the Normal School course.

Courses IV, V, VI.—Advanced Physics. The work of these courses will be more advanced work in physics in both the class and laboratory work, and will be arranged from term to term to suit the individual needs of the student. The laboratory is well equipped for work in physics, and each student is given every opportunity possible to make use of the apparatus. In all of the laboratory work careful notes of the results obtained are required.

SHOP WORK

Connected with the work in physics is a work shop, supplied with a work bench, a lathe run by a motor, and a full set of tools. Regular instruction will be given to students, who wish it, in devising and making apparatus to illustrate the elementary principles of the subject, without having to depend upon the use of expensive apparatus made by regular dealers.

ADVANCED STANDING.—Students who have had work in an academy, high school, or other school of good standing, may, upon satisfactory evidence of having done good work, shorten the time of the course in this subject.

CHEMISTRY

As in physics, the work in chemistry is two years. The first year will be devoted to general chemistry.

Course I.—In this course the work will be the non-metals. The class will discuss chemical changes, some of the common elements and compounds, classify the elements in groups, constant and multiple proportion, and such other matter as to develop the subject in the best possible manner for the student.

Course II.—Following Course I, the work will be a study of the metals. In this course a classification of the metals will be given in groups, and the work is supposed to lead up to qualitative analysis.

Course III.—The work will be a brief course in organic chemistry. In arranging this course it will be given with a view to aiding and supplementing the work in physiology.

In the above courses the work will consist of daily recitations and laboratory work. It is thought that the correct way to study chemistry is by actual experimentation.

The students are required to work out a line of experiments bearing upon the topics under discussion and such other work as may be assigned to them, and bring the results of this work to the lecture room for discussion. Such other work as is deemed necessary is presented to the class by the instructor.

Course IV.—Advanced Chemistry. This course will be qualitative analysis. The term will be devoted to the metals and acids.

Course V.—The first half of this term will be given to the completion of the work in acids begun in Course IV, and the last half of the term will be quantitative analysis.

Course VI.—In this term the work in quantitative analysis will be completed.

The chemical laboratory is well supplied with every convenience for pursuing the work in chemistry as far as it is carried in this school.

ADVANCED STANDING.—Students who have had work in chemistry in an academy, high school or other school of good standing may, upon satisfactory evidence of having done good work, shorten the time of these courses.

Arrangements will be made to give some instruction in glass blowing, preparation of apparatus and such other lines of work as are of service to teachers of chemistry.

PHYSIOLOGY

The work of this department will consist of two courses in general physiology which are required of all students, and three courses in advanced work, which are electives for persons qualified to take the same.

With the present enlarged facilities of this department, it is the aim to place all the courses upon a real practical laboratory basis. It is hoped to extend to courses in physiology the same scientific methods of study now alone tolerated in related sciences. Physiology has been the last science in the common schools to move from the plane of bookishness and formal instruction to the practical, scientific, first-hand study of real physiological facts and phenomena.

The physiological laboratories are large well-equipped rooms, with special tables for laboratory work. These tables are provided with compound microscopes, knives, needles and such other apparatus as is necessary in the study of the subject. In addition to over forty such individual table-places, the school possesses some of the best general apparatus available, such as myographs, sphygmographs, kymographs, tambours, induction-coils, etc. In this way the physiology of nerve and muscle stimulation, of reaction time of the blood flow, etc., is practically demonstrated.

The two courses of required work are to cover the ground usual in beginning courses, save that special instruction is added in the practical application of the methods of modern sanitary science.

The advanced courses furnish an additional year's work in the subject and are to prepare for efficient teaching of physiology in the higher grades and the high school. The first course will be in general ver-

tebrate histology, and such gross anatomy as is necessary to interpret physiological phenomena. The possession of stains, reagents, microtomes, a large warm-chamber, etc., furnish good facilities for this course. The second course will be a course in vertebrate embryology. This course is offered inasmuch as many things in physiology derive their true significance only when viewed from the standpoint of their origin and development. The third course is devoted to a study of the elements of physiological chemistry, and consists of a hundred or more experiments in digestion, blood coagulation, and the qualitative and in a few instances the quantitative determination of the more important compounds occurring in the body. Students taking this course must have had the preliminary courses offered in the department of chemistry.

LIBRARY

The library at present contains almost forty thousand volumes. The old library having been entirely destroyed, the books we have are new and carefully selected with reference to the special needs of our school, so that the number alone gives no real con-

ception of its working capacity. A special fund enables us to buy such books and periodicals as are needed in the regular work of the school, and the design is to build up gradually and steadily a large reference library especially strong in pedagogical literature.

PURPOSE, AIM, METHODS

The library is the general laboratory or workshop of the whole school. Text-books serve their more legitimate function as guides in the various subjects taught, and students are sent to the library with references more or less specific according to their advancement and individual needs, to the leading authorities and sources of information.

Instruction in the use of the library is both general and specific. The general instruction is given in the form of talks, explaining briefly (1) the nature and practical use of the card catalogue, the classification and shelf arrangement of the books, the rules and regulations; (2) the use of the title pages, prefaces, indexes, tables of contents, etc.; (3) the scope and special value of the general reference books, such as encyclopedias, dictionaries, atlases, periodicals and bibliographies. Besides instruction of this kind, individual assistance, so far as other duties of the library staff will permit, is rendered (1) in the search for the latest and best information upon particular topics, (2) in the guidance and selec-

tion of material for collateral and general reading, and (3) in explaining the mechanical contrivances of various authors, and in helping to answer the great number of questions that continually arise.

An immediate advantage of such a method of instruction is the conversion of the routine and spiritless recitation of the old regime into a varied and animated presentation of subject-matter gleaned from many eminent authors and original documents. There is here also an opportunity to meet those individual needs that are determined by the laws of heredity, physiological accidents, and previous training. A knowledge of books, a breadth of view, and an enthusiasm for truth are permanent and sure results of a right use of the library. By systematic training in scholarly habits of research it is believed that a pupil will leave this school greatly strengthened and enabled to pursue successfully his life work.

LITERATURE

In this department two courses in elementary literature or reading are required of all students except college graduates and those holding three years' or higher licenses. In addition an opportu-

nity is offered to do several courses of consecutive work in English and American Literature. In all of these courses the main object is to come into close relations with the literature itself. The practical problem of using literature as a means of education in the schoolroom receives the attention necessarily required in a professional school.

ELEMENTARY LITERATURE AND READING

Course I.—A number of selections suitable for seventh and eighth year grades and the first years of high school are studied and discussed in great detail in class. The simpler laws of literary method are thus inductively developed, and the fact is made clear that a piece of literature is an organism. In addition to other shorter selections the following are used: *Snow-Bound*, *Enoch Arden*, *The Vision of Sir Launfal*, *The Legend of Sleepy Hollow*, *Michael*, *The Great Stone Face*, *Sella*, *Sohrab and Rustum*, *The Courtship of Miles Standish*, *The King of the Golden River*. Each term.

Course II.—This course carries on the work of the preceding course in an effort to bring the student into still closer touch with literary masterpieces. The work will include a study of a long narrative poem, *Longfellow's Evangeline* or *Scott's Marmion*; a novel, *George Eliot's Silas Marner* or *Scott's Quentin Durward* or *Hawthorne's The House of*

Seven Gables; the essay, in selections from Emerson; the drama, Shakespeare's Macbeth or Hamlet.

ADVANCED LITERATURE

These courses are entirely elective. A student electing literature must take at least three courses. The work is so arranged as to admit of considerable freedom in choice of courses.

Course I.—An outline course in the development of English Literature. The object of this course is to gain a perspective of the entire literature as a basis for the more intensive study of special periods and authors. Halleck's History of English Literature is used as a text. This course is to be accompanied by Course IV in European History (English History) unless the student has had that work or its equivalent. The plan is as follows: Two terms are devoted to this combination course, the student giving half his time to each subject, and being credited accordingly. The Fall term (Course IA) follows the development to the end of Elizabeth's reign; the Winter term (Course IB) from 1603 to the beginning of the Nineteenth Century. (In the Spring term students who are prepared to do so may take Course I, reciting five hours a week.)

Fall and Winter, and Spring terms.

Course II.—English Poets. Tennyson, Browning and Matthew Arnold. Complete and authorized texts are used and the purpose of the work is to

come into touch with the poet at first-hand. The life of the author, his relation to his age, the character and value of his message, and the fitness of his work for class use will be considered.

Fall and Spring terms.

Course III.—English prose. Carlyle, Ruskin, Arnold, De Quincey and Macaulay. Some one or two works from one of these will be selected and studied in their entirety, and the other authors will be read rapidly in selections for points of comparison and contrast.

Winter and Summer terms.

Course IV.—Shakespeare. The origin and growth of the drama in England, the special features of Elizabethan life which throw light on the great play-producing activity of that time, Shakespeare's life and work, are topics briefly considered as a basis for the course. The chief points in the technique of the drama are discussed in connection with the study of some five or six of Shakespeare's plays. These are so chosen as to furnish examples of his work at different stages of its development. During the past year the plays used were: *Midsummer Night's Dream*, *Richard III*, *Hamlet*, *Romeo and Juliet*, *Twelfth Night*, *King Lear*, *Othello*, *Cymbeline*. Lee's *Shakespeare's Life and Work* or Dowden's *Shakespeare Primer* is in the hands of each student in addition to standard editions of the plays selected. A strong effort is made to understand and appreciate the main elements of Shakespeare's power as an interpreter of life.

Spring term.

Course V.—American Poetry. The writings of the leading American poets are used. Representative poems, not already used in the elementary courses, are studied in detail, while students are required to read rapidly enough of each author's production to have clear notions of its scope and value. The list includes Poe, Longfellow, Lowell, Whittier, Bryant, Holmes and Whitman.

Fall and Spring terms.

Course VI.—American Prose. This is a companion course to V. The field is too extensive to be covered even by rapid reading and selected masterpieces from each author are used. The list includes Franklin, Irving, Poe, Hawthorne, Emerson, Thoreau, Lowell.

Winter and Summer terms.

Course VII.—Fiction. An elementary course in fiction study. A number of typical short stories will be read and the various topics of this line of study illustrated, after which four or five longer works will be studied in considerable detail. Among the authors from whom material will be chosen are Scott, George Eliot, Dickens, Thackeray, Hawthorne, Howells. Fiction as an educational force and the best means of using it are problems of the course.

Fall and Summer terms.

Course VIII.—General Literature. The leading problems connected with the nature and elements of literature are considered in relation to some great masterpieces of world literature. Homer's Iliad and Odyssey, Dante's Divine Comedy, Goethe's Faust,

Milton's Paradise Lost, form a group from which selection will be made. No knowledge of any other language than English is necessary for this course.

Winter and Summer terms.

HISTORY OF EDUCATION

FRANCIS MARION STALKER, Professor.

This department traces the history of education as a distinct process in the life of the race, studies the growth and present condition of the school systems of the world, and acquaints the student with the vast field of educational literature. It is believed that such investigation will bring to the student of education broader culture, larger respect for the profession of teaching, and that it will open to him a field that will prove to be an abiding source of inspiration. Eight courses are offered; all elective. While the progressive development in the education of mankind will be most apparent by a pursuit of the courses in the order named here, continuity in election is not insisted upon.

Course I.—Education in the Orient. The meaning of education with the literature upon the subject, the standard of measurement of a people's culture, the primary sources of culture, and a comparative study of the education of the peoples of the Orient indicate the nature of this course.

Fall and Spring terms.

Course II.—Hebrew, Greek, and Roman Education. The contribution of each of these nations to culture is emphasized. Sparta and Athens are studied as types of Old Greek Education and Athens is studied as a type of the New, with the causes and effects of the change that took place. Roman education previous to the influence of outside forces, and Roman education as changed by outside influences; the Alexandrian movement and its educational significance; Christianity and Constantine; the work of Charlemagne and Alcuin complete the subjects considered. Winter and Summer terms.

Course III.—Education and the Renaissance. The great movements of this period in their educational significance are studied; the rise of scholasticism, the growth of universities, monastic orders, the reformation, feudalism, the crusades, free towns, guilds, burgh schools, rise of modern philosophy, and the revival of art that attended these movements. Fall, Winter and Spring terms.

Course IV.—Leading School Systems of Europe and America. The historical development of the German, French, and English systems, and the beginning and growth of such systems as those of Massachusetts, New York and Rhode Island furnish the basis of this course. Fall and Summer terms.

Course V.—The School System and School Law of Indiana. The growth of the system in Indiana, educational legislation, the New Harmony experiment, the two constitutions, the work of such men as Caleb

Mills, John I. Morrison, Robert Dale Owen and Barnabas Hobbs, the system as it is with its strength and its weakness, furnish the topics of discussion.

Winter term.

Course VI.—Supervision and School Management. A study is made of the school as an institution in relation to other institutions, with a consideration of equipment, factors, duties, course of study, and present day problems.

Spring term.

Course VII.—Ancient Educational Classics. A critical study of parts of Plato's Republic and Laws, Xenophon's Cyropaedia, Aristotle's Ethics and Politics, Quintilian's Institutes of Oratory, Plutarch's Moralia constitutes the work of the term.

Fall and Summer terms.

Course VIII.—Modern Educational Classics. A critical, comparative study of Comenius' Didactica Magna and Orbis Pictus, Rabelais' Gargantua, Locke's Thoughts on Education, Montaigne's Essays, Rousseau's Emile, Pestalozzi's How Gertrude Teaches Her Children, Richter's Levana, Froebel's Education of Man, Ascham's Schoolmaster, Herbart's Outline of Educational Doctrine, and Spencer's What Knowledge is of Most Worth, is made this term.

Winter term.

GEOGRAPHY

The work in geography is organized in accordance with the views of the leading German, British and American geographers, of which the following are among the best expressions:

"General geography deals with the general laws of the distribution of every class of phenomena on the earth's surface."—Neumann.

"Geography is the exact and organized knowledge of the distribution of phenomena on the surface of the earth, culminating in the explanation of the interaction of man with his terrestrial environment."—Mill.

"The whole content of geography is the study of the relation of the earth and its inhabitants. * * * It is the element of relationship between the physical environment and the environed organism that constitutes the essential principle of geography."—Davis.

Geography falls naturally into two co-ordinate subsiences, physiography, which deals with the physical environment, and ontography, which deals with the environed organism, while complete geography deals with the relations between the two.

The first great relation of geography is that of relief and climate, the second that of plant and animal life to both, the third that of man and his culture to all the rest, to his whole physical environment. The earth's surface and man are the terminal links of the chain. No one of them can be understood without a knowledge of those which precede. The geography of man rests upon a very broad foundation of physical science and in turn forms a part of the foundations of history, sociology and political economy. Geography is the bridge which unites the sciences of nature with the sciences of man. If this view of geography is correct, there can be but one method of teaching it, the scientific method, by direct, personal observation of the phenomena in the field and laboratory, with the actual objects in view wherever possible, and when that is impossible, with the best representations of them.

The geographical laboratory is planned as a workshop for the student and teacher. It is used for the storage and display of the best geographical material in the form of specimens, pictures, lantern slides, maps and models illustrating typical forms and distributions. Among these, and largely by their means, the student is expected to prepare his lesson for the recitation. The laboratory material includes Howell's models of the United States, Yellowstone Park, Canyon of the Colorado, High Plateaus of Utah, Wasatch and Uinta Mountains, Henry Mountains, Mount Vesuvius, Mount Shasta, Mont

Blanc, Mount Desert Island, New Jersey and Southern New England; and a collection of more than one thousand pictures and lantern slides and nearly two thousand maps and drawings. The equipment is being constantly increased.

The school library contains nearly everything available in the literature of geography, including numerous copies of the best reference books.

It is obviously impossible to study thoroughly the whole field of geography in one year. It is thought better to select certain portions of it for intensive study than to attempt a superficial treatment of a broader field. Six courses are given, including those topics which seem most fundamental and available for illustrating the general principles of the science and the best methods of its presentation.

Course I.—Physiography. The structure of the earth. Land forms produced by external forces acting through the agency of air, water and ice. Seventy hours of classroom and laboratory work, with four to six field excursions. The field work is insisted upon as fundamental, and will be extended as fast as facilities permit.

Fall, Spring and Summer terms.

Course II.—Physiography. The earth in space. The atmosphere and climate. The sea. Sixty hours of classroom and laboratory work, with daily instrumental observations of the weather.

Winter and Summer terms.

Course III.—Physiography. Land forms due to internal forces. Summary of land sculpture and the physiographic cycle. The atmosphere and climate as in Course II. Must be preceded by Course I. Seventy hours and weather observations.

Fall, Winter and Spring terms.

Course IV.—The geography of the United States. A fairly exhaustive study of our own country, its physiographic regions, climate, products and inhabitants, designed to afford a review and application of the principles learned in the preceding courses, and to emphasize the relations of human culture and industrial, commercial and social conditions to the physical environment. Must be preceded by Courses I and II or I and III. Seventy hours of class work and drawing a map of the United States on a conic projection, and a map of North America on a polyconic projection.

Course V.—The geography of Europe and Asia. A study of the principal countries and peoples of the Old World. Must be preceded by Courses I and II or III. Seventy hours. Fall and Winter terms.

Course VI.—The principles, problems and methods of geography. This course is planned for those who wish to make special preparation for teaching geography in grade or high schools. It includes lectures, laboratory work and seminar. Must be preceded by Courses I, II or III, and IV or V. Seventy hours.

Spring and Summer terms.

PENMANSHIP AND DRAWING

WILLIAM THOMAS TURMAN, Professor.

PENMANSHIP

All should write legibly. Courtesy requires it and business demands it. Rapid writing is necessary in business. To write legibly and rapidly and for a long period requires proper positions that the work may be done with ease. The teacher, above all others, should be master of these requirements if he would teach others to write. Theory without work is dead.

One term is devoted to the subject of writing. Proper positions for desk and blackboard writing are explained and practiced. Unshaded work in script, figures and printing is used and for this work a stiff pen is recommended as the best. The modern style capitals and small letters are standard. Any slant that gives legible, rapid writing may be used. Good board work must be done by every student.

DRAWING

Six courses are offered.

The teacher who is able to illustrate by a quickly executed drawing has a point of excellence that must command the attention of school people in general. The lack of this ability is acknowledged and deplored by the great majority of teachers.

The educational value of drawing is not to be underestimated. Careful observation, accuracy of representation, dispatch and neatness are shown nowhere better than in a problem in drawing, and together are a good indication of a student's ability and method.

Add to these the cultivation of the imagination and the consideration and a better understanding of what is considered most beautiful in nature and in art, and there seem sufficient reasons for introducing this subject into our public school courses.

The purpose of instruction in this department is not to make artists or to help finish a few pretty things, but rather to help teachers prepare themselves so they may be able to present in a more pleasing and instructive manner all of the subjects in their school work.

During the six terms pencil, charcoal, pen, brush and color will be used. Board work will be emphasized, and, whenever practicable, outdoor work will be undertaken.

Course I.—Drawing from familiar objects, of simple form. Landscape and still life in the most simple treatment. Constructive drawing and geometric problems.

Course II.—More advanced work of preceding term and drawing from forms which involve a con-

sideration of rules of perspective. Pictorial and decorative composition. Geometric problems.

Course III.—Perspective problems. More advanced geometric work and design. Study of masterpieces.

Course IV.—Drawing from casts and from life and more advanced work in preceding subjects.

Course V.—Above continued. Special consideration of different mediums. Art history.

Course VI.—Drawing in connection with other subjects. Schoolroom decoration. Drawing courses and the supervisor. Art history.

GRAMMAR AND COMPOSITION

The work of this department consists of two distinct lines—the grammar, the unit or subject-matter of which is the sentence, and the composition, the unit or subject-matter of which is discourse. The chief mental process involved in the mastery of the first is analysis; in the second it is synthesis.

GRAMMAR

The sentence, with its numerous forms and many shades of meaning, is the subject of grammar. This

great variety must be thought into the unity of a single principle. Every fact of the subject must be interpreted and seen in the light of this principle, if grammar is to be understood. That there is and must be such a general truth in every subject is clear, from the fact that subjects exist. It is not chance or caprice that has separated facts into arithmetic, geography, grammar, etc. There must be some idea in the subject which determines what facts belong to it, and to which all these facts are related. This will be the most general fact in the subject, since it must contain all the others, and every fact in the subject will embody, in a greater or less degree this central idea, thus making the subject a unity.

It is the purpose of the grammar work in this school to enable the student to get such a view of the subject. The student must see all the relations which exist in the sentence; the relation of the sentence to other language forms, the word and discourse; its relation to the thought which it expresses; and its relations to mind, the products of which it embodies. When he sees all these relations and what they determine with regard to the sentence, the student may be said to have an organized or a teaching knowledge of the subject of grammar. He has constructed the subject for himself.

In order to accomplish what is set forth above, four circles of work are pursued:

1. Under the study of the sentence as a whole, the class whole is studied. In this work the unity of all sentences is seen by observing their universal attributes.

2. Under the study of the sentence as a whole, the class whole is divided into sub-classes, and the marks of these classes are discovered.

3. Under the study of sentences in parts, the organic parts are first taken up. This circle of work with parts corresponds to the first circle of work with sentences as wholes.

4. Under the study of sentences in parts, the sub-classes of words, "Parts of Speech," are studied. The fourth circle of the work is to the third what the second is to the first.

In each of the four circles the student starts with the sentence, and after the consideration of parts, refers them all back to the sentence again—analysis and synthesis. The process is a passing from unity through variety back to the unity of the thought as expressed in the universal sentence form.

It is the purpose, also, to present the entire work in such a way as to give the student most skill in the use of the language.

The following courses in grammar are offered:

Course I.—Thirteen weeks, daily recitations. Topics studied: The thought and its elements, the sentence and its parts, kinds of ideas and classes of words used in expressing them, modifiers, the simple

sentence and classes of words used in forming it, their uses and modifiers, and the phrase.

Course II.—Thirteen weeks, daily recitations. Topics studied: The clause, the compound sentence, uses of words, phrases, and clauses in forming it, the complex sentence, uses of words, phrases and clauses in forming it, with especial emphasis upon the connectives in the complex sentence.

Course III.—Thirteen weeks, daily recitations. Topics studied: Parts of speech and their properties, the infinitive, and the participle.

These three courses in grammar are required of all high school graduates and all other students who enter upon a grade of license lower than a three years'. Students who enter upon a three years' or a higher grade of license may take all or a part of the work and receive credit for it on the course.

COMPOSITION

The language subjects, which deal with discourse, are distinguished from one another by the view they take of the subject-matter. Reading and literature deal with discourse analytically; the chief mental process in composition and rhetoric is synthesis. Composition is the complement of reading. It presents the nature and principles of the different forms of discourse, and their relations to the mind of the author and the minds of those addressed.

Three kinds of work are done in this subject:

1. A critical study of models of the different forms of discourse is made for the purpose of enabling the student to discover the central idea in all discourse, the relations in the process as determined by the theme, and the laws of the process as determined by the mind addressed. For this purpose, masterpieces of our best writers are used as far as practicable. In this way the student becomes acquainted with the principles of discourse in their concrete embodiment, and forms a good standard by which to criticise his own writing.

2. The students are helped to formulate the above mentioned inferences into the science of discourse by reference to different texts on the subject.

3. A great deal of writing under careful criticism is required.

The following courses in composition are offered:

Course I.—Thirteen weeks, daily recitations and conferences.

The work deals with the discourse forms of description and narration and gives instruction in the theory and the practice of English composition. The theory of composition is taught by recitations based upon Baldwin's College Manual of Rhetoric, supplemented by the best texts in our tolerably complete text-book library, and by oral and written exercises. The practice is obtained in the writing of daily themes, some of which are written in the classroom,

on topics announced after the class has assembled; and in the writing of longer themes prepared fortnightly.

These daily and long themes are carefully criticised by the teacher and returned to the student, most of them to be rewritten. Regular consultation hours are appointed and each student is required, at frequent intervals, to discuss his work with his teacher.

A good deal of reading is required in this course aside from text-books. The short stories of Hawthorne, Poe, Dickens, Kipling, Stevenson, together with the descriptions from some of these and from Thackeray and Irving are made use of in the course.

Students who are required to take the grammar are not eligible to this course until that work has been completed.

This course is required of all students except college graduates.

Course II.—Thirteen weeks, daily recitations and conferences.

The practical work of this course consists mainly in writing exposition and illustrates the work which may be required of high school students. The elements and the qualities of style are discussed and illustrated from standard authors.

The short daily themes and the longer weekly themes are carefully criticised. Explanations and comments upon these criticisms will receive much emphasis in class conferences, since the heavy work

for the teacher of composition lies in marking the written work of pupils and helping them to correct their errors.

This course has been planned especially to meet the needs of teachers of composition.

Course III.—Thirteen weeks, daily recitations and conferences.

This course deals with argumentation. The theory of argumentation is taught by recitations based upon Baker's Principles of Argumentation, supplemented by references to our text-book library.

Students are required to prepare two complete written arguments of twenty-five to thirty pages each, for which they previously prepare complete, written briefs. In addition to this each student debates at least three times orally. He is expected to prepare carefully briefs for these debates and to furnish the teacher with at least one written brief.

The written arguments are carefully criticised by the teacher and returned to the student for rewriting. For purposes of debate, the class is divided into sections of four and the discussions of each section are carefully criticised in recitation by the members of other sections and by the teacher.

Course IV.—Thirteen weeks, daily recitations and conferences.

This is a course in public speaking. The purpose of the course is to study carefully, by lectures, classroom work, and writing, the forms of public address; to provide opportunity for the practice of the

element of persuasion, discussed in Course III; and to emphasize the importance of style in public discourse.

Each student will write at least five addresses of about 1,000 words each. In the selection of topics and in the treatment of them students will be allowed considerable freedom, but they will be required to select such topics as will give them practice in the eulogy, platform or commemorative address, commencement address, after-dinner speech, etc.

The delivery of these addresses before the class enables the students to some extent, to wear off their embarrassment before an audience, and to obtain such self-control as will permit them to think with some degree of ease upon their feet and in the presence of people.

Incidentally, careful attention is given to distinct utterance, pronunciation, articulation, etc., and to the student's position on the floor, gesture, etc.

In the way of models for study in this course, the students have access to Reed's Modern Eloquence, Warner's Library of the World's Best Literature, etc.

Courses II, III, and IV are elective. They are open to students who have completed Course I. The student is advised to take them in the order in which they are here indicated. However, changes may be made to suit the needs of the student by consulting the head of the department.

MATHEMATICS

OSCAR LYNN KELSO, Professor.

FRANK RAWDON HIGGINS, Assistant Professor.

WALTER PIETTY MORGAN, Assistant Professor.

JOHN DALE CRITTENBERGER, Spring Assistant.

THOMAS J. KIRBY, Spring Assistant.

Fifteen courses are offered. A course covers the work of thirteen weeks, five times per week.

Course I.—Arithmetic. The origin of number, the expression of number, the fundamental operations, fractions, English and French systems of weights and measures, ratio, proportion, and involution and evolution. Every term.

Course II.—Arithmetic. Mensuration and percentage and its applications. Every term.

Course III.—Elementary algebra. The conventions, the fundamental processes, the system of rational numbers, and linear equations. Every term.

Course IV.—Elementary algebra. Integral functions, fractional functions and equations. Every term.

Course V.—Elementary algebra. Laws of exponential operations, the systems of irrational numbers (including imaginaries) and equations. Every term.

Course VI.—Advanced algebra. Series and related subjects. Dixon's College Algebra is used as the basis of this course. Fall and Spring terms.

Course VII.—Plane geometry. Elementary definitions, axioms, postulates, rectilinear figures, circles, constructions and additional exercises.

Fall and Spring terms.

Course VIII.—Plane geometry. Proportions, pencils of lines, parallels and anti-parallels, similar figures, partition of the perigon, mensuration, constructions and additional exercises.

Winter and Summer terms.

Course IX.—Solid and spherical geometry.

Fall and Spring terms.

Course X.—Trigonometry. Functions, formulae, equations and solution of triangles.

Fall and Summer terms.

Course XI.—Analytic geometry. The point, its co-ordinates (Cartesian and polar) and their transformations. The straight line, its equation, and the locus and transformation of the equation depending upon the above co-ordinates. Straight lines and points in their numerous relations. The circle and its equation, including the relations of circles and their many related straight lines.

Text: Tanner and Allen.

Winter term.

Course XII.—Differential Calculus. Text: Murray's Infinitesimal Calculus.

Spring term.

Course XIII.—History and teaching of mathematics. Arithmetic, algebra, geometry, and trigonometry, as based on Smith's The Teaching of Elementary Mathematics.

Summer term.

Course XIV.—Analytic geometry. Conic sections (the parabola, the ellipse, and the hyperbola), the general equation of the second degree and some of the higher plane curves. (See Course XI for the circle.) Text: Tanner and Allen. Summer term.

Course XV.—Integral calculus. Text: Murray's Calculus. Summer term.

In order that students may reach the more advanced subjects in mathematics before graduating, it will be necessary that they begin work in this department immediately on entering the school and continue it without interruption.

Those students who have had courses of mathematics in high schools should not go over all of the algebra and geometry again, but should enter the mathematics further in the course.

There is no objection to a student carrying more than one subject in mathematics in a given term with the advice of the department.

LATIN

JOHN JACOB SCHLICHER, Professor.

FREDERICK HENRY WENG, Assistant Professor.

THOMAS KIRBY, Spring Assistant.

All students electing Latin are required to pursue it for at least three terms. Those who do elementary work (Latin 1 to 5), however, may not discontinue the subject until they have finished Latin 5, or some higher term.

The work offered in Latin falls into two parts, an elementary course of five terms and a number of more advanced courses. The former of these includes a thorough study of the elements and the reading of Caesar and Nepos. Throughout this course especial stress is laid upon translation from English into Latin, in order to make the student's grasp of the indispensable fundamentals as clear and sure as possible.

Each of the more advanced courses extends through one term with five hours of class-work a week. Two of the courses offered (VI and VII) are intended as a continuation of the elementary course, while the rest constitute the advanced courses proper. These courses may be taken in any order to suit the program of the student. But when students have had their elementary work in other schools, or when they have not been in regular attendance at the Normal School for some time, they should consult the head of the department about the courses which it would be advisable for them to elect first.

Elementary Course (five terms).—In the first three terms, the forms and common constructions of the language, with daily English and Latin exercises; for supplementary reading, Ritchie's *Fabulae Faciles*. In the fourth and fifth terms, three books of Caesar and several biographies of Nepos, with exercises in grammar and composition. All of this work is usually given each term in the year.

Except in the case of students with high school preparation, the terms of this course must be taken in their regular order, and the entire course, or a satisfactory equivalent in high school work, must precede any of the higher courses.

Course VI.—Cicero's Orations; exercises in writing Latin and an outline study of the Roman government. Once or twice each year, in the fall, spring or summer.

Course VII.—Virgil's *Æneid*. Translation of three books, and metrical reading. Once or twice each year, alternating with Course VI.

Advanced Courses VIII to XIII.—One or two of these courses are given each term in the year. Four exercises a week are devoted to the study of an author, and one exercise to some collateral line of work, such as a branch of ancient literature, the literary activity and position of the author studied, Roman life, the topography and remains of ancient Rome, Latin composition. The authors studied in the various courses are selected, according to the needs and wishes of the class, from the following list: Livy; Sallust; Terence or Plautus; Pliny's Letters and Martial; Cicero, Tusculan Disputations I and De Senectute; Horace, Odes; Virgil's Eclogues and Catullus; Horace, Satires and Epistles; Cicero's Letters; Tacitus, Dialogus and Agricola.

Course XIV.—Advanced Grammar and Composition. (a) An introduction to scientific grammar.

(b) Advanced exercises in composition. Once each year, in the spring or summer.

Course XV.—Teachers' Course. (a) A discussion of the problems, aims and methods of teaching Latin in the high school, with special stress upon the work of the first two years. (b) An outline of various collateral lines of reading and study that are necessary or helpful to the student and teacher of Latin. The members of the class are put in contact with the books and works of reference in the library and are required to familiarize themselves with a few of the best works in each line. Once each year, in the spring or summer, and alternating with Course XIV.

PHYSICAL TRAINING

JOHN PATTON KIMMELL, Professor (Men).

FLORENCE BERTHA CURRY, Professor (Women).

The two gymnasias are situated in the basement, under the Library. They are equipped with modern appliances and apparatus for developing and training the body. Connected with each are baths, with hot and cold water. Before entering the gymnasium a physical examination, consisting of measurements and tests, is made for each student. The condition of heart, lungs, digestion and nervous system is carefully noted; also any local defects, such as round shoulders, muscular weakness in any part, abnormal

curvature of the spine, varicose veins, etc. The Directors prescribe exercises for the special needs of individual students, who may then work toward building up the whole body.

Class work will consist of carefully graded work in light and heavy gymnastics, free-hand exercises, games and sports of various kinds. Swimming and lawn tennis, field hockey, outdoor basket ball and other games and sports are available in spring, summer and fall terms. Special work in public school gymnastics, lectures upon personal hygiene, school sanitation and physical defects common to school children, will be included.

Three terms in this department are required before graduation. A credit is given for three terms.

Parsons Field, a fine tract of ground of five acres in extent, is available to all students. A baseball diamond, running track, football gridiron, and covered grand stand are completed. It is the aim of the Board to build a fine cinder track, a clubhouse with dressing-rooms and baths attached, some fine tennis courts, and to further improve the field.

Intercollegiate athletics and all contest games are under the control of the Athletic Association, an organization of students.

MUSIC

LELLA ANNE PARR, Professor.

GERTRUDE WATSON STRANG, Spring Assistant.

The work of this department is elective.

Course I.—Rote songs that are used later as a basis for sight-reading, study of rhythm; major, chromatic and minor scales; elementary work in ear-training, expression, invention and harmony. Book used, Eleanor Smith's Common School Music book, of the Modern Music Series.

Course II.—Ear-training, invention and harmony continued. Independent sight-singing gained.

Course III.—Battle-hymns, ballads, hymns, songs and choruses that may be taught in the grades or high school. Stories of great musicians culled, and arranged for use in public schools. Book used, The Ensign Collection, by Lella Parr.

Course IV.—Composition and analysis. Book of reference used—Percy Goetschius' Inventions. Harmony, including first law of Harmonization by Logier, intervals, triads, figured bass, inversions of triads, chords of the dominant, inverted, secondary and diminished sevenths, Neapolitan sixths and modulation. Book used—Emery's Elementary Harmony.

Course V.—Material of preceding courses classified and arranged for each year, month and week of

the grades and high school. Method of presenting this material studied.

Course VI.—Practice in teaching music in the training school. Observation in city grades and high school.

Four additional credits will be given for the following work:

1. For three terms of practice in the Chorus Class.

2. For one season of practice with the Terre Haute Symphony Orchestra.

3. For a certificate of proficiency from a reputable piano teacher in playing accompaniments for songs, etc., as outlined in Course V.

4. For advanced work in harmony and composition.

Course I and 1, 2 and 3 may be taken as fifth subjects.

GERMAN LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE

FREDERICK GILBERT MUTTERER, Professor.

FREDERICK HENRY WENG, Assistant Professor.

German is entirely elective. The work of the first four terms we call "The elementary course;" courses V and VI, "The intermediate course;" courses VII-XII, "The advanced course;" and course XIII, "The teachers' course."

The student entering upon the elementary course is required to complete it, unless he has had thorough instruction in the same subject-matter elsewhere, and enters upon the work here to review a particular subject with the purpose of entering better prepared in the more advanced courses. The only condition put upon the student taking up work in the intermediate, advanced, and teachers' courses is, that he have the preparation to pursue the work he selects to his advantage. The student may select more than one course each term provided he choose such additional courses as he can profitably pursue.

I.—The Elementary Course. The aim of this course is a knowledge of the grammatical principles of the German language, an understanding of simple German conversation, the power of speaking and writing in simple sentences, and the ability to read readily easy German verse and prose.

The German language is from the beginning, as far as possible, the medium of instruction. In the first three courses the classes study Spanhoofd's *Lehrbuch der deutschen Sprache* and Lange's *German Method*, with additional reading of easy narrative; in the fourth course, a short comedy and several short stories from modern writers, and Bernhardt's *German Composition*.

The terms of this course can be taken only in their regular order, and the entire course, or a satisfactory equivalent in high school work, must precede any of

the higher courses. Course V may be substituted for Course IV.

II.—The Intermediate Course. Courses V and VI constitute this course. The aim is facility in interpreting any piece of German writing of ordinary difficulty rapidly, and easily expressing orally or written, simple thoughts in German, and an acquaintance with German thought, and manner of life through the literature. German is the medium of instruction. The authors read are:

Course V.—Schiller, one drama, with additional work as time allows.

Course VI.—Freytag, *Bilder aus der deutschen Vergangenheit*, or a work by some other modern author, or equivalent substitutions.

III.—The Advanced Course. Courses VII-XII constitute this course. At least one of these is given each term. The recitations are conducted entirely in the German language. The courses are rapid reading courses, supplemented by essay writing and other composition exercises. The works read are studied from the literary as well as from the linguistic standpoint. Each author is viewed in relation to his time and the whole literary movement of the German people. The authors read are as follows: VII, Modern Prose—Readings from Keller, Wildenbruch, Heine, Sudermann, Hauptmann, or other authors; VIII, Goethe, two dramas; IX, Lessing, or a modern dramatist; X, Lyrics and Ballads; XI, German History. A selection from one of the

German historians, dealing with a period in the history of Germany; XII, a brief history of German literature, with illustrative readings.

IV.—The Teachers' Course. This course is planned for teachers of German, and such students as wish a systematic review of principles of grammar and rhetoric, together with advanced compositions. Special attention will be given to the difficult and important points involved in the teaching of elementary German.

EUROPEAN HISTORY

FRANK SMITH BOGARDUS, Professor.

The work of this department is so planned as to give two years' consecutive work in European history. The purpose is to lead the student to trace the growth of civilization among European peoples, and in this way to arrive at an intelligent conception of the life and institutions of the present time.

In order to accomplish this purpose extensive use of the library, in the way of reference reading, is made by all the classes. Special attention is paid to sources in all of the courses, the amount and difficulty of this work with source-material progressively increasing from courses I to VI. It is believed that the use of source-material is better adapted to secure the growth of a truly scholarly attitude toward the work than any other means at our command. The library is admirably equipped for this

work, there being some 3,500 volumes on its shelves intended primarily for the use of students in this department.

Occasional lectures and discussions of the pedagogical phases of the work find a place in all of the courses. The thought that they are sometime to teach this subject to their pupils is kept before the students.

Course I is introductory to the more advanced courses. Accordingly, the work of this term is directed largely toward securing correct habits of study and thought in the field of history.

A thesis of moderate length on a specially assigned topic is required in each course. This paper must be accompanied by a bibliography and references.

It is believed that the completion of these six courses will prepare the industrious student to teach the subject acceptably in the elementary and secondary schools.

Course I.—Greek history, with a brief survey of the ancient Oriental nations by way of introduction.

Fall and Spring.

Course II.—History of Rome to the fall of the Empire in the West, 476 A. D.

Winter and Summer.

Course III.—History of the Middle Ages to the close of the fifteenth century.

Fall and Spring.

Course IV.—A and B, English history to 1814.

This course is offered in conjunction with Course

I, Advanced Literature. The plan is as follows: terms are devoted to this combination course, the Two terms are devoted to this combination course, the student giving one-half of his time to each subject and being credited accordingly. The first term's work (IV A), will extend to 1603; the second (IV B), from 1603 to 1814. This combination course will be offered only in the fall and winter terms; in the summer term the class will recite daily.

Students wishing to take this course IV may do so without taking the course in literature.

Fall, Winter, Summer.

Course V.—Modern European history to 1814.

Winter and Spring.

Course VI.—Political Development of Europe during the Nineteenth Century. In this course the development of England, Germany, France and Italy will be studied. Only the most advanced students may take this course.

Spring and Summer.

ZOOLOGY AND BOTANY

ULYSSES ORANGE COX, Professor.

HERMAN BERNARD DORNER, Spring Assistant.

In addition to the usual morphology in zoology and botany, special attention is given to systematic relationships, life histories and ecology. Frequent field excursions constitute a required part of the work.

The purpose of the work is not so much to teach anatomical facts as the habits of living organisms and to instill in those who pursue these subjects the habits of correct observation and a love for nature.

ZOOLOGY

The work in zoology extends through six terms. The first three are devoted to a thorough study of general zoology, consisting of daily recitations and laboratory work. As to terms the subjects are divided about as follows:

Course I.—Fall term. A study of the lower invertebrates up to and including insects. Careful attention is given to the study of the cell under protozoa and life histories and economic relations are important phases of the insect work. Students are required to make accurate dissection of the chief types of animals represented in these groups.

Course II.—Winter term. Mollusks, primitive vertebrates, fishes and batrachians. Considerable attention is given to the systematic study of fishes.

Course III.—Spring term. Reptiles, birds and mammals. Besides the dissection of the types of each group special attention is given to the systematic and ecological relationships, and students must familiarize themselves with the common reptiles, birds and mammals of the region.

Course IV.—Fall term. General histology of animal forms. This is chiefly a laboratory course.

Course V.—Winter term. Advanced systematic zoology of special groups.

Course VI.—Spring term. Embryology, advanced cytology and general biological problems.

BOTANY

The work in botany covers six terms, the first three of which are devoted to general botany, which includes daily recitations and laboratory work.

Course I.—Fall term. The subjects for the term are: The plant cell, slime fungi, bacteria, diatoms, algæ and fungi. Each type is carefully studied in the laboratory and students are expected to collect, identify and preserve those forms that are easily preservable.

Course II.—Winter term. Bryophytes and pteridophytes. In addition to a careful study of the structure of the leading types, students will familiarize themselves with some of the more common forms.

Course III.—Spring term. Spermaphytes. A careful study of the morphology of the higher seed plants is made and students are required to carry on experiments in germination and related subjects. During the latter part of the term a systematic study of the more common flowering plants of Indiana is made.

Course IV.—Fall term. Physiological botany. This is chiefly a laboratory course, but it will be supplemented by frequent lectures.

Courses V and VI.—Winter and Spring terms. The work of these two terms will consist of special advanced laboratory work on special subjects to be assigned according to the needs of individual students. In general the work will be of a research nature and each student is expected to obtain results along some special line.

MANUAL TRAINING

M. L. LAUBACH, Professor.

Manual training has passed the experimental stage. Thoughtful men no longer question its value in our school system. Boys and girls delight in doing something with their hands, as well as with their heads. They delight in creating something that can be seen, handled and used. It connects school life with out-of-school life, the real with the ideal. It touches humanity in its daily life and pursuits, and hence is of vital interest.

This being the first year of the establishment of this department, the work will begin with courses in wood working suitable for the two upper grammar grades and lower high school grades. It will include the elements of cabinet-making. Other courses will be added later.

The ultimate aim of the work in this department is to give thorough instruction in a wide range of

manual training work. Its courses are planned with special reference to the needs of those preparing to teach. The fundamental processes of a variety of handicrafts suitable for schools will be taught. The work is planned to aid those who will teach in the grades, as well as those who wish to specialize in the subject.

Considerable attention will be given to methods of finishing, and simple means of decoration. Students will be expected to design some models and work out projects to meet certain conditions.

A short lecture course on the history of manual training will be given. Problems relating to the organization of manual training, equipments, courses of instruction, etc., will be discussed.
