Summer Field Trip Courses

As a part of its regular work in the College Courses to be offered during the First Summer Term, the Indiana State Normal School, Terre Haute, is presenting two courses in Geography to be taken as a field trip through the East. The courses are Science 69, (Field Geography), and Science 57, (Geographic Influences in American History). Both of these courses will apply on a Major in Geography, or as general electives, and, if satisfactorily completed, will net students a total of eight term-hours' credit.

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The Field Trip

It is planned that the classes will leave the State Normal School in busses at 8:00 A. M. on Monday, June 21st, under the supervision of Prof. and Mrs. W. LeRoy Perkins. approximate itinerary is as follows; Indianapolis, Richmond, Dayton, Columbus, Wheeling, Pittsburgh, Uniontown, Fort Necessity, Cumberland, Hagerstown, Gettysburg Battlefield, Frederick, Shenandoah Valley to Winchester, Ft. Myer, Arlington, Washington, Mt. Vernon, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Valley Forge, Sesquicentennial Exposition, Delaware Water Gap, Newark, New York City, up the Hudson to Kingston, Ashokan Reservoir, the Catskills, Binghampton, Watkins Glen, the Finger Lakes, Rochester, Niagara Falls, Buffalo, Erie, Cleveland, Put-in-Bay Island, Toledo, Ft. Wayne, and home. During this trip about three thousand miles will be covered in thirty days.

Presentation of Courses

Although it is not the purpose, nor would it be possible to limit the party to a study of the field of Geography exclusively, throughout the trip, yet the subject-matter of the two courses to be presented will be carefully outlined and emphasized, readings will be assigned, (a small library will be a part of the equipment furnished by the Normal), and recitations will be provided for from time to time. Returning to Terre Haute one week before the close of the First Summer Term, the classes will be given an opportunity to round out the courses in such manner as the instructor shall see fit to require.

Lodging and Board

It is thought advisable that the party obtain suitable lodging at small hotels, private homes, or camps, where comfortable beds may be had at reasonable rates. Breakfast will be taken at restaurants, but the noon and evening meals, as far as possible, will be cooked by the party at desirable stopping places. This will reduce the expense to a minimum and will provide an enjoyable break in the daily routine of travel and sightseeing.

Expense of the Trip

From careful estimates and from statements made by others who have conducted parties on such trips, it is figured that the total expense of the trip should not exceed one hundred and eighty dollars (\$180.00) per person. This amount includes enrollment in the two classes, transportation by bus approximately 3,000 miles, lodging and board for thirty days, and a reasonable allowance for incidental expenses. If one chooses to be economical, the expense ought to be less than the above-named amount.

Conditions of Enrollment

The party will be limited to thirty-five students. Reservations should be made at once. Withdrawals will be allowed up to June 10th, but after that date the enrollment will be considered as definitely fixed and the initial deposit will not be returned.

If you desire to enroll, a deposit of ten

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dollars is required with your application. Check covering this amount should be made payable to Registrar C. C. Connelly, and must be mailed with your application to Prof. W. LeRoy Perkins, Indiana State Normal

School, Terre Haute.

Following your enrollment you will be informed, from time to time, as to the progress of the plans, the successful working out of which will afford you a profitable and enjoyable Summer.
