INDIANA STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE BULLETIN, PUBLISHED JANUARY, FEBRUARY, MARCH, APRIL, MAY, AND JUNE OF EACH YEAR BY THE INDIANA STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE, TERRE HAUTE, ENTERED AS SECOND-CLASS MATTER MARCH 14, 1930, AT THE POST OFFICE AT TERRE HAUTE, INDIANA, UNDER THE ACT OF CONGRESS OF AUGUST 24, 1912.

The Mid-Spring Term at the Indiana State Teachers College begins with the first day of the seventh week of the regular Spring Term, and continues for the last six weeks of the term. The summer quarter of the school has been divided into two summer terms of five calendar weeks each, known respectively as the First Summer Term and the Second Summer Term. Although limited to five calendar weeks, each summer term represents six school weeks, that is, a full half quarter. This is made possible by the fact that there are no float periods in the two summer terms, classes meeting five days each week, but not on Saturday, as in previous summer terms. This is not true, however, of the Mid-Spring

Students regularly enrolled in these three terms will take two subjects only, but they will give double time to these subjects. The prepared recitation and lecture periods are, therefore, two hours in length. Similarly, the laboratory requirements of regular quarters are doubled. In this way, students may earn a full quarter's credit in each of the two prepared subjects undertaken and thus avoid the inconvenience of frac-

tional credits or incomplete subjects.

Courses are so organized that they fall into two distinct groups: (1) the Junior College, comprising the courses of the freshman and sophomore years; (2) the Senior College, comprising the courses of the junior and senior years. Courses having the initial number 1 or 2 fall into the first group while those having the initial number 3 or 4 fall into the second group. A student must have not less than forty per cent of his work in the senior college for graduation.

If there is a great enough demand for a course which is not offered on this program, the course will be offered. Requests for courses should be addressed to R. K. Devricks, Registrar and Director of Studies.

MASTER'S DEGREE COURSES

Tuition and Fees-

Free tuition is given to all resident students of Indiana pursuing courses leading to teachers' licenses. The tuition fee for students who do not take courses leading to teachers' licenses and who do not sign a written pledge to teach in the public schools not less than two years, is one dollar and twenty-five cents (\$1.25) for each schools not less than two years, is one dollar and twenty-live cents (\$1.25) for each term-hour per term, or five dollars (\$5.00) for each four term-hour course taken. Non-residents of Indiana pay six dollars (\$6.00) per term additional tuition. All students, resident and non-resident of Indiana, pay a Contingent Fee of seven dollars and seventy-five cents (\$7.75) for each term, payable on the day of registration. Penalties are charged for late entrance.
