The Mid-Spring Term at the Indiana State Teachers College begins with the first day of the seventh week of the regular Spring Term, and continues for the last six weeks of the term. The summer quarter of the school has been divided into two summer terms of five calendar weeks each, known respectively as the First Summer Term and the Second Summer Term. Although limited to five calendar weeks, each summer term represents six school weeks, that is, a full half quarter. This is made possible by the fact that there are no float periods in the two summer terms, classes meeting five days each week, but not on Saturday, as in previous summer terms. This is not true, however, of the Mid-Spring Term.

Students regularly enrolled in these three terms will take two subjects only, but they will give double time to these subjects. The prepared recitation and lecture periods are, therefore, two hours in length. Similarly, the laboratory requirements of regular quarters are doubled. In this way, students may earn a full quarter's credit in each of the two prepared subjects undertaken and thus avoid the inconvenience of fractional credits or incomplete subjects.

Courses are so organized that they fall into two distinct groups: (1) the Junior College, comprising the courses of the freshman and sophomore years; (2) the Senior College, comprising the courses of the junior and senior years. Courses having the initial number 1 or 2 fall into the first group while those having the initial number 3 or 4 fall into the second group. A student must have not less than forty per cent of his work in the senior college for graduation.

If there is a great enough demand for a course which is not offered on this program, the course will be offered. Requests for courses should be addressed to R. K. Devricks, Registrar and Director of Studies.

LICENSES

In offering the foregoing large choice of studies, provision is made for the following groups of teachers:

1. Teachers preparing for work in the one-teacher rural schools.
2. Teachers for the primary grades.
3. Teachers for the intermediate and upper grades.
4. Teachers for junior high schools.
5. Teachers and supervisors of the grades in the special subjects of art, music, home economics, commerce, and physical education.
6. Principals of elementary schools, first and second grade.
7. Teachers of high schools in the fields of mathematics, English, science, social studies, foreign languages.
8. Teachers of special subjects in the high schools, such as art, music, home economics, commerce, physical education.
9. Principals and superintendents, first and second grade.

The legal requirements for the several licenses issued by the State and the detailed descriptions of the courses in this institution leading to such licenses may be found in the annual catalog of the Indiana State Teachers College which will be sent to any interested teacher upon application to the Registrar.

Classes will be organized during the Mid-Spring and First Summer Terms for beginning students on all courses.

MASTER'S DEGREE COURSES

Courses will be offered each term for the work required for the Master's degree in Education and for the first grade administrative licenses in the following subjects: Education, English, Science, Social Studies, Latin, French, and Mathematics. Courses having the initial number 5 are of graduate level.

Tuition and Fees—

Free tuition is given to all resident students of Indiana pursuing courses leading to teachers' licenses. The tuition fee for students who do not take courses leading to teachers' licenses and who do not sign a written pledge to teach in the public schools not less than two years, is one dollar and twenty-five cents (\$1.25) for each term-hour per term, or five dollars (\$5.00) for each four term-hour course taken. Non-residents of Indiana pay six dollars (\$6.00) per term additional tuition.

All students, resident and non-resident of Indiana, pay a Contingent Fee of seven dollars and seventy-five cents (\$7.75) for each term, payable on the day of registration. Penalties are charged for late entrance.

All graduate students, resident and non-resident of Indiana, pay a graduate fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) for each term, payable on the day of registration. Penalties are charged for late entrance.

Students are expected to carry "prepared" courses for two periods only. Convocations will be held from time to time at the call of the President except during the Mid-Spring Term, when they will be held at the regular hour.
