CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

In the agricultural areas of Indiana and of the nation is produced a clientele of education that is unique in that it functions in the progress of the urban areas as well as in that of the rural. Modest though their numbers are as compared to the number of graduates of urban high schools, the rural high schools of America annually contribute their talent to the vocational and social life of the nation. For this reason the writer believes the rural educational areas merit more intensive study, community by community, in order that the educational needs of these communities may be more accurately determined and realized.

I. THE PROBLEM

The Decker High School, since its inception in 1908, has graduated several hundred of its students, sending them forth into the stream of professional and vocational life in many parts of the nation. The high school is located in Johnson Township, Knox County, in the heart of a rich, diversified, and specialized agricultural community, which has afforded employment both to farm labor and to farm

owner or operator. The general economic condition of the agricultural population of this school district has been good. The farm population of Johnson Township has furnished approximately eighty per cent of the Decker High School graduates. The other twenty per cent of the graduates came from the incorporated town of Decker, the population of which is largely dependent upon agriculture for its livelihood. The opportunity for making a living in agricultural pursuits in this community after graduation from high school has always been very favorable.

The Decker High School for the greater part of its existence has offered an enriched curriculum in addition to the traditional school subjects. Enrichment applies to both curricular and extra-curricular activities. Efforts have been made to provide educational facilities pursuant to good citizenship, morality, and sound economic resource-fulness.

Purpose of the study. It was the purpose of this study (1) to develop a statistical knowledge of the graduates of the Decker High School to be used as a basis for evaluating the curriculum of the school; (2) to show the

trends, locally, and to compare them with national trends wherever possible; (3) to lay a foundation for future studies of this kind; (4) to furnish an aid in building local school curricula; and (5) to demonstrate to what extent local graduates have achieved the objectives of their high school training, which are good citizenship, morality, and economic resourcefulness.

Scope and limitations of the study. The writer has attempted to present a case history of each graduate of the high school as of the present time. Certain data have been purposely omitted because of their controversial nature and in other instances because of lack of information. Facts having delicate sociological implications have been treated according to groups, thereby eliminating direct reference to individuals.

These are trying times. War has changed the status of practically every individual in this study. Many alumni are in the armed forces. Many have changed occupations or have moved to other locations in recent months. Several alumni are scattered throughout the nation. Thus, gathering the data for this study has been a long and trying process. However, through the courtesy and generous assistance of parents, relatives, and friends of the alumni and of the alumni themselves, the writer has been able, with few

exceptions, to obtain necessary facts relative to this study.

The occupational data are pre-induction in the case of alumni called to the armed services of the nation. The location of alumni refers to the permanent place of residence only. Some high school records were destroyed when the school building burned in the summer of 1916, and the writer has had to rely upon the honesty of the alumni of the classes previous to that time for evidence regarding the names of the graduates and the size of the graduating classes of the years 1908 to 1915. Most of this evidence is corroborated by records in the office of the County Superintendent of Schools.

Because of a dearth of studies of this kind, few comparisons are possible except in vital statistics. Nevertheless, certain significant trends appear of which cognizance has been taken.

Importance of the study. In the preparation of this thesis, the writer was without knowledge of any other study of this kind. Neither could evidence be found that the average high school administration makes a follow-up study of the graduates of the school in order to determine more accurately the adaptability of its curriculum to the needs of its students. The importance of this study is almost entirely local because it stands alone, but as other studies of this type are made and encouraged, this one will grow in

importance. It should function, locally, in curriculum building. After the close of the present war and a return to peaceful pursuits and the attending circumstances, this study will assume importance as an instrument for defining local trends in wartime as compared with peacetime trends in all the implications borne out in this thesis.

Source of data. Most of the data for this thesis were obtained by interviewing alumni personally and by personal letter whereby information was asked for and answers were returned on a voluntary basis. In some cases, where the distance was not too great, information was obtained by telephone communication. Information was obtained also from parents, brothers and sisters of alumni, and from close relatives and friends of alumni who helped to contact those removed from the immediate community.

The writer was graduated from the Decker High School, has been a teacher in the Decker School the past sixteen years, and has lived in this community practically all his lifetime. The writer has enjoyed a personal acquaintanceship with more than ninety-nine per cent of the graduates of this school and is, therefore, in an enviable position to conduct this research.

Much statistical data were obtained from such sources

as the official records in the high school principal's office at Decker and from the files of the county superintendent's office, where records of the annual graduates of the high school are kept; Statistical Abstract of the United States provided information concerning vital statistics, divorce, marriage, family, and occupations; The World Almanac and Book of Facts was the source of statistics dealing with education, vital statistics, and divorce; Fifteenth Census of the United States and Sixteenth Census of the United States presented facts pertaining to population.

CHAPTER II

THE TREND IN THE NUMBER OF GRADUATES

Although few in number, the first The early years. graduates gave their alma mater an auspicious beginning. This small group of alumni formed the nucleus about which was built an increasing interest in higher education. educational facilities of their day were indeed limited. They had to provide their own transportation, too. Many of the alumni recall walking as many as four miles in order to reach the high school and, after classes, beginning the long Others drove to school in horse-and-buggy fashion. trek home. A barn on the school lot was provided to stable the horses during school hours. During stormy weather or at flood time the pupils made arrangements to stay with friends or relatives in the town of Decker. Usually this was the first experience most of them had ever had living away from the farm.

The persistence of these pioneers in high school education fired the ambition of the youth of the community and after the first few hard years the enrollment began to grow, and there was a steady growth in the number of graduates.

The first three years, 1908 to 1910, the high school operated as a three-year high school. With the close of the

year in 1910 the school received its commission and became a four-year high school. The graduating class of 1910 was forced to go another year in order to graduate, and the class of 1910-11 became the first four-year graduates of the Decker High School.

Growth of the alumni. The first graduating class numbered 2, both young women. Since 1908 a total of 472 young men and women have been graduated from the high school. This number is in conflict with the 850 reported by Milton A. Bailey in his thesis on the history of the Knox County Public Schools. The writer has been unable to substantiate Mr. Bailey's number from the township or county school records.

Of the 472 graduates, 247 were female and 225 were male, an advantage of 22 for the female. The smallest class to be graduated was 2, occurring in the years 1908 and 1909. The two largest graduating classes each numbered 30, the classes of 1932 and 1936. The first eighteen years produced

138 graduates, 66 of whom were male and 72 were female. The last seventeen years show a total of 334 graduates, 159 of whom were male and 175 were female. This was an increase of 142 per cent in graduates over the previous eighteen years.

Table III shows a great increase in graduates each succeeding decade the school has been in operation. The last five years shows a decline of 6 per cent as compared to the previous five years. However, the number of graduates was exactly one-half that of the previous ten years and indicates the possibility of a leveling-off period prior to a decline in the number of graduates in the future.

Table IV reveals a steady growth in the number of high school graduates in all the decades since 1910, whereas the population trend is downward. This leads to the conclusion that more of the eligible population attend high school and that a greater percentage of those attending high school, graduate.

CHAPTER III

SOCIAL AND VITAL STATISTICS

I. VITAL STATISTICS

Expectation of life. It was assumed that the average age of the graduates was between eighteen and twenty years The oldest alumni would be near the middle fifties in age, and the youngest eighteen or past. Using eighteen as the youngest age of the graduates referred to here, and grouping them into intervals of ten, it was found that the median age was 29.2 years. Counting an elapsed time of thirty-six years since the beginning of the high school, the average age of alumni was found to be 35.5 years. expectation of life tables based upon the 1920 census was 56.91 years for males at birth and 57.55 years for females at birth. Both rates were for the State of Indiana. The rate for the United States was 55.33 years for males and The American Experience Table of 57.52 years for females. policies, allots 36.03 years life expectancy to those who have attained the age of twenty-nine. The life expectancy of those who have reached the age of thirty-five is 31.78 years, while those who have reached the age of fifty may expect to live 20.91 additional years. In St. Louis, a large mid-western city, the span of life for males was 52.34 years at birth and for females the span of life was 56.14 years at birth. Both figures are official rates based on the 1920 census. Judging from these basic figures, most of the alumni may expect to continue living for many years to come.

Mortality. Mortality among the alumni group has been exceedingly low. Out of a total of 472 graduates, only 14 are known to be deceased. This is but 3 per cent of the alumni group and averages but .4 deaths per year for the thirty-five year period. The death rate per thousand of population is .85 and was calculated as follows:

This, of course, is the average death rate per one thousand

Table VI shows the mortality rate to be higher among males than females in the alumni group in the ratio of nine to five.

of population over a period of thirty-five years. The 1940 death rate in the United States was 10.8 per one thousand of population; the 1930 rate was 11.4 per one thousand, and the 1920 rate was 13.1 per one thousand of population. The death rates per one thousand of population for the State of Indiana were as follows: 1920, 13.4; 1930, 12.1; and 1940, 11.8. It is plain to be seen that the chances for longevity are indeed favorable to the alumni.

Marriages and children of alumni. At the present time there is a total of 303 married alumni of which 68 are marriages contracted between alumni of the same school; 152 alumni are single. No information could be found concerning three of the alumni. Of the fourteen alumni who are deceased, seven were married at the time of death, and five of the deceased left children.

There are 375 living children of alumni; of this number 205 are of school age, and 62 of the school-age children reside in Johnson Township and may be expected to attend the local schools.

Births in alumni families averaged 10.7 per year over a thirty-five year period. This is a birth rate of 22.7

per one thousand of population and was calculated as follows:

Under this arrangement the birth rate would be the same in each of the thirty-five years, a statement which is unlikely; but as an average rate, it is useful as a medium of comparison. Besides, the birth rate in alumni families is greater, on the average, than the state or national rates.

The birth rates per one thousand of population in the United States were as follows:

1920 23.7

1930 18.9

1940 17.9

When compared to the average rate per one thousand of population in the alumni group, the national rate exceeds the alumni rate in the year 1920, only.

The birth rates per one thousand of population in the State of Indiana are as follows: 7

1920 22.0

1930 18.3

1940 18.1

Here the alumni birth rate is found to exceed that of Indiana by a comfortable margin, and it may be concluded that the alumni are fulfilling their destiny in the population trends of the nation.

II. SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

Family Status. One of the significant trends revealed by this study was the number of childless families. It was found that there were 261 families, all of which had existed for more than one year. Of this number, both parents in 34 families were alumni; 75 of the families had no children, or 28.7 per cent.

Of the 261 families 92 were one-child families, or 35.2 per cent; 49 were two-child families, or 18.8 per cent; 25 were three-child families, or 9.6 per cent.

The remaining 20 families were large, having from four to eight children to the family. Of these families 7 were four-child families, or 2.7 per cent; 3 were five-child families, or 1.1 per cent; 6 were six-child families, or 2.3 per cent; but 1 was a seven-child family, or 0.4 per cent; and 3 of the families had eight children, or 1.1 per cent, and they represent the largest families in this survey.

No explanation for the extensive number of childless families was attempted. It might be added, however, that

economic circumstances were found to be favorable to the rearing of children by most of those families having no children.

Divorce. There has been a total of 21 divorces during the thirty-five-year history of the alumni, or 4.45 per cent of the alumni group. The average was .6 divorces per year, and the divorce rate per thousand of population was 1.27, and was calculated as follows:

1000 • 472 = 2.12
$$\frac{2.12 \times 21}{35} = 1.27$$

The divorce rate per one thousand of population in the United States for 1920 was 1.60; for 1930 was 1.56; and for 1940 was 2.00. The average rate of 1.27 for the alumni group compares very favorably with the United States rate, being lower in every instance than that quoted for the United States.

Children were involved in but 5 of the 21 cases of divorce.

Illegitimacy. There have been but four cases of unwed motherhood among alumni. Two cases have since wed

and have additional children, and the other two cases work to support themselves and their children.

Alumni receiving public welfare assistance. There were but two alumni receiving public welfare assistance and for reasons beyond the control of the recipients.

Alumni convicted of crime or misdemeanor. The only known conviction was for a traffic violation of a minor nature.

Cases of Insanity. No cases of insanity are known to the writer, and none were reported to him.

Table VII shows the distribution of families according to the number of children in each family broken down into periods of ten years. The first ten-year period, 45 families had 99 of the 375 children of alumni, or 26.4 per cent. In the second ten years, 81 families had 131 children, or 34.9 per cent. The third ten years reveals that 124 families had 139 children or 37.1 per cent. The last five years show that 11 families have had 6 children, or 1.6 per cent of the total number of children of alumni.

The 45 families of the first ten-year period representing 17.2 per cent of the 261 families had 26.4 per cent of the children. In the second ten-year period, 81 families representing 31 per cent of the total number of

families had 34.9 per cent of the children. The third ten-year period has 124 families representing 47.5 per cent of the total number of families, and this group had 37.1 per cent of the children. The 11 families of the last five-year period represent 4.2 per cent of the total number of families and had 1.6 per cent of the children.

Of the 45 families of the first ten-year period,

11 had no children and they represent 14.7 per cent of the

75 childless families found in this survey. In the second

ten-year period, 20 of the 81 families were childless and

represent 26.7 per cent of the childless families of alumni.

Of the 124 families in the third ten-year period, 39 families,

or 52 per cent of the 75, are childless. The last five-year

period shows that five of the 11 families are childless, and

they are 6.6 per cent of the childless families of alumni.

By comparing Table VIII with Table IX on page 26, the family-size trends of the alumni group as compared to that of the national trends are readily seen. The trend is about the same, locally and nationally. In the smaller sized family groups, the local trend is more pronounced than is the national.

Table X clearly indicates the trend in size of families among the alumni possessing advanced educational standing. Childless and one-child families are predominate. This might lead to the conclusion that the more educated alumni contribute least to the birth rate among the alumni families. Yet, the 84 alumni families in the higher educated bracket representing 32.2 per cent of the total number of families have produced 33 per cent of the children of alumni families.

By adding the number completing the work for Bachelor's Degree, Medicine, and Bachelor of Law, it is found a total of 33 have finished college. This is 7 per cent of the alumni group. If the graduates in Pharmacy were included, the number that have finished college would be 35, or 7.4 per cent of the alumni group. This compares with 4.6 per cent who have finished college in the United States, and with 5.6 per cent of the native whites in the United States. 10

Alumni Background. Most of the graduates of the Decker High School were reared on the farm and in the town of Decker. In the vacation time between the closing and the opening of school, many of them labored in the melon fields and orchards of the community. Others assisted in operating their parent's farms. Farm labor was always in demand, especially in the harvest season when the cantaloupes and peaches ripened. The wage scale was comparable to that paid by agricultural communities elsewhere.

Vocational agriculture and vocational home economics were part of the high school training received by the alumni along with manual training and farm shop. 4-H club activities have been sponsored the past several years. In this way, the high school has contributed to the farm background and farm experience of most of the alumni.

Other educational opportunities were not denied to them. The school has offered to them also training in the field of commerce, which has enriched their vocational training. Studies in the fine arts and the usual traditional subjects, including Latin, were part of the curriculum offered. Athletics and physical education have been emphasized. Many extra-curricular activities were encouraged. But in the final analysis, it is evident that the curriculum was geared to the agricultural background of the community.

With this background in mind, it would be natural to assume that the graduates would, to a great extent, take up agricultural pursuits and that the holding power of the community would be great.

Mobility.* There have been 472 students graduated from the high school in this community, and of this number 458 are known to be living. Of the latter number, it was found that 189 alumni still resided in their original home community, or 41.3 per cent. A total of 267 alumni, or 58.3 per cent of the living graduates, had not moved out of the county of which their original community was a part. A total of 50 alumni, or 10.9 per cent, had migrated to other rural and small-town areas. The permanent addresses of 8 alumni could not be obtained except as to the state they resided in, so the exact whereabouts of this 1.7 per cent of the alumni is unknown.

Table XII shows that 388 alumni, or 84.7 per cent of the living graduates, are still residents of the State of Indiana. Of the 388 still residing in Indiana, 199 alumni, or 43.4 per cent of those living, have migrated to 45 different communities throughout the length and breadth

of the state, both urban and rural. The table also reveals that 63 alumni, or 13.8 per cent, have migrated to 17 different states in the United States, 2 have migrated to the District of Columbia, and 2 have migrated beyond continental United States.

Figure I best illustrates the distribution of the alumni. Most of the migration centers in the Middle West, particularly the north-central area. Migration to the eastern and western sections of the United States is fairly well balanced. The southwestern and western mountain sections of the United States seem to have been avoided by migrating alumni. The South has received about the same number of alumni as the extreme eastern and western sections of the country but they are scattered over a wider area. While one of the alumni migrated to an isolated outpost in the British West Indies, another settled in Canada opposite the industrial area of Detroit, Michigan. Approximately 95 per cent of the alumni reside within a five hundred mile radius of their former home.

Table XIII shows that 211 alumni have migrated to cities ranging in size from 1000 in population to 100,000 or more. Thus, 46 per cent of the alumni now living have left their rural community and have adjusted themselves to urban society.

A total of 74 alumni, or 16 per cent of all living alumni, have migrated to cities ranging in size from 10,000 population to 25,000 population; 76 alumni, or 16.6 per cent, have taken up residence in cities having populations in excess of 100,000; and 61 other alumni have selected cities of varying size for their residence.

of the 458 living alumni, 58.7 per cent have migrated from their original homes. Since the birth rate among the alumni is above the national rate, the death rate among the alumni is much lower than the national rate, and the population of Johnson Township is on the decline, it must be concluded that the community does not have holding power over its high school graduates.

Occupations. Since a large percentage of the alumni have a background of farm experience and training it might be expected that they would choose agricultural pursuits. By comparing Table XIV with Table XV, it was found that 28.8 per cent of the alumni gainfully employed were in agricultural pursuits, whereas the national rate was 25.6 per cent in 1920 and 21.4 per cent in 1930 for agricultural occupations. These figures are more favorable to the alumni group since

the national rate is based upon an age group starting with the age of ten. Such a preponderance favoring agricultural pursuits leads to the conclusion that agricultural subjects and related farm activities merit continuance in the local high school.

In the field of professional service, alumni show a preference for the professions far beyond that shown in the national scale. The higher educated alumni fall in this group.

Third place in the list of occupations chosen by alumni is held by the industrial group. Although somewhat below the national scale, it is still a sizable group. The local high school has not provided for this group as much as it should have. The curriculum should be built to include machine shop and other industrial arts, for the number of alumni that have gone into industrial occupations is large enough to justify the inclusion of industrial training in the curriculum.

Clerical occupations are chosen by 10.8 per cent of the alumni as compared to 7.5 per cent in 1920 and 8.2 per cent in 1930 in the nation. On the basis of comparison with national tendencies, then, this type of training in the local high school is justified and merits continuance. This statement is more especially true when we take into

consideration the great numbers gainfully employed in this field who later leave their employment for reasons of marriage and other causes and consequently are not included in surveys of this type.

In the trades, the national and local scale is about the same, while in the field of transportation and communication the local scale is slightly over half that of the national. Local alumni entering the public service field is negligible.

The occupational status of the entire alumni group is shown in Table XVI.
